Engineering Contract Is Approved

The Colorado City Council approved a contract and took action on several items facing them when they met in City Hall Tuesday night.

A contract with Freese and Nichols for an engineering study on the sewage treatment plant was approved in an effort to correct the sewage problem the city has faced recently. The company in

which the contract was approved is from Fort Worth and Lee Head will supervise the project. They will provide professional assistance and representation with the regulatory enforcement hearing in Austin and also do a study on the waste water treatment plant here.

The Council heard several requests for funds from

the hotel-motel occupancy taxes. The VFW Post 9178 Wilson Wyatt made a request for \$1,000 to \$1,500 to improve the outside area of the post. The post has a membership of 206 and will host the district convention in 1983.

The Colorado City Playhouse, represented by Tandy Curlee and Porter Richardson, made a

request for \$4,000 to expand the Playhouse. They noted the Playhouse has been open for 17 years and the membership is higher than it has ever been.

The Colorado City Bass Club made a request for \$1,500 for a two-day tournament in September. Woody Anderson, spokesperson, stated that the 15 member non-profit organization wanted to sponsor the tourney to promote bass fishing and bring people into Colorado City.

The Mitchell County Community Action Program asked for a reduction in their lease agreement for six months, as they have lost all state funding.

The Colorado City Chamber of Commerce, represented by Joe Kirschbaum, made a request for \$9,000, noting that in six different cases, 80 percent of the hotel-motel occupancy funds went to the Chamber. Kirschbaum informed the Councilmembers of the different functions sponsored by the Chamber and made the request for \$6,500 for a rodeo and \$2,500 for other Chamber sponsored events.

The Colorado City Airport Association asked for \$2,000 to conduct a "fly-in" on July 4. It was noted that all money left over would be used to improve the facilities.

The Kiwanis Club requested \$400 for the gazebo project and City Manager Rick Crowley stated that the city wanted to make a request for \$1,500 for kitchen equipment in the Civic Center, along with a \$400 request for a microwave for the Center.

The Council appointed J. H. Guelker to the Housing Authority Board and also made an adjustment to the City Attorney Pete McKinney's salary. They approved an increase from \$500 to \$600.

Sales Indicate Sign Of "Good Times"

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for March.

The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collections ever distributed—29 percent over the same period in 1981.

This record payment, reflecting taxable sales made by Texas businesses in January, is the second record payment in two months, but Bullock added a note of caution.

"Record sales can be one indicator of good times, but they are not an indicator of profit margins. These taxes are based on sales price or market value. True, Texans are spending more but these figures don't tell us what the merchants or suppliers or manufacturers are having to pay for the goods they buy."

Bullock explained that last month's record \$106.4 million payment to cities who levy the local sales tax represented collections from taxpayers who pay monthly as well as those who pay quarterly and yearly.

The biggest check this month went to Houston, which received \$10.3 million, compared with \$8 million last March.

Colorado City received \$15,173, up 28.86 percent from the city's March 1981 payment of \$10,593.

The City and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

Texas Medical Association Auxiliary To Sponsor Marijuana Education Program

T-shirts, brochures and bumper stickers comprise a marijuana education program sponsored by the Texas Medical Association Auxiliary.

The project, conducted in cooperation with the state's War on Drugs campaign, carries the theme "Stop Pot!"

The green-and-white T-shirts include that message along with an insignia of a marijuana plant encircled and crossed out in the manner of a traffic sign.

The brochure, entitled "The Dirty Dozen—12 Things You Need to Know About Marijuana," notes that:

—More than three-fifths of all high school seniors have tried marijuana. In the last five years, the number of teenagers smoking it daily has almost doubled.

—The ingredient that causes the high in marijuana is THC, which tends to collect in fat. Since the brain has abundant fat, THC heads there. It also collects in the liver, lungs, kidneys and glands. The chemical remains long after the buzz has gone away.

—Recent tests show that it may take as much as a month for the body to clear out the THC from only one marijuana cigarette. Be-

cause the body still has almost half of the dope left after one week, even weekend smokers have it in their bodies all week.

—Marijuana adversely affects the growth and division of all kinds of cells. It may be worse on the lungs than cigarettes. Even light, but regular, smokers show

mild lung damage in less than two months. Heavy marijuana smoking narrows the breathing passages. In addition, tests on monkeys indicate that marijuana may damage brain cells permanently.

—In pregnant women who smoke marijuana, THC goes directly to the unborn baby and inter-

feres with protein formation and the growth of new cells the baby needs.

—Regular users often cannot drive well, have difficulty remembering details, show a loss of willpower, have problems concentrating and are paranoid.

The brochure also offers tips to parents in

dealing with the situation.

Order blanks for the T-shirts can be obtained from county medical society auxiliaries or from the TMA Auxiliary, 1801 N. Lamar Blvd., Austin 78701. Brochures also can be obtained there. The bumper stickers will be available by May.

YOU AUTO KNOW

Q. I've had what seems to be a chronic problem with vapor lock in my '81 Dodge. I've tried everything from new fuel filters to new gas lines to an electrical fuel pump. No luck. The car has a lot of good miles left. Is there any small item I may have overlooked which could cure my Dodge's woes?

A. Possibly, and it's a simple procedure. Take a good close look at the routing of your fuel lines. Many times both home mechanics and shops are careful to keep gas lines clear of the engine block, and the heat it radiates. But, both shops and home mechanics may miss one simple source of heat: The exhaust system. Check your fuel lines for proximity to both the engine and the exhaust system - the whole way from the fuel tank to the fuel pump. If you find a line too close to either source of problems, it's usually an easy procedure to re-route the line with an extension.

ORDINANCE NO. 82-87

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS, CERTAIN PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER OF SAID CITY, THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS PROVIDE FOR OPEN MEETINGS EXCEPT IN THREE DISTINCT INSTANCES MORE FULLY SET OUT IN BODY OF THE ORDINANCE; (2) PROVIDE FOR ELECTION AT LARGE OF A MAYOR OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS; (3) PROVIDE FOR REMOVAL OF RESTRICTIONS AS TO THE APPOINTMENT OF A CITY COUNCIL MEMBER AS CITY MANAGER UPON VOLUNTARY RESIGNATION BY CITY MANAGER OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION I.

In accordance with the provision of Article 1170 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas and other applicable laws, a special election shall be held in the City of Colorado City, Texas on Saturday, April 3, 1982 at the polling places hereinafter described, between the hours of 7:00 o'clock a.m. and 7:00 o'clock p.m., at which election the following proposed amendments to the Charter of the City of Colorado City, Texas, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the City of Colorado City, Texas.

AMENDMENT NO. 1
Shall Section 25 of Article II of the Charter of the City of Colorado City, Texas be amended to read as follows:
Section 25: On the 2nd Monday of April following the regular municipal election held on the first Saturday of April, or as soon thereafter is practical, the Council shall meet at the usual place for holding meetings and the newly elected members shall qualify and assume the duties of office. Thereafter, the Council shall meet regularly at such times that may be prescribed by its rules but not less frequently than once each

month. Special meetings shall be called by the City Clerk upon request of the Mayor, City Manager or a majority of the members of the Council.

All meetings of the Council shall be open to the Public, Save and except, in the following distinct instances: (1) The Public may be excluded from that portion of a meeting during which the Council seeks the advice of its Attorney with respect to pending or contemplated litigation and settlement offers; (2) The Public may be excluded from that portion of a meeting during which a discussion is had with respect to the purchase, exchange, lease, or value of real property; (3) The Public may be excluded from that portion of a meeting during which a discussion is had of cases involving the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline, or dismissal of a Public Officer or Employee or to hear complaints or charges against such officer or employee, unless such Officer or Employee requests a Public Hearing. Whenever any deliberations or any portion of a meeting are closed to the Public as permitted by this section, no final action, decision, or vote with regard to any matter considered in the closed meeting shall be made except in a meeting which is open to the Public and in compliance with Notice Provisions for regular and special meeting of the City Council of Colorado City, Texas.

AMENDMENT II.

Shall Section 12 of Article II of the Charter of the City of Colorado City, Texas be amended to read as follows:
Section 12: The City Council shall be composed of six councilmen and the Mayor of the City. Three Councilmen and the Mayor shall be elected for a term of two years at an election to be held on the first Saturday in April, 1983 and every odd numbered year thereafter. Three Councilmen shall be elected for a term of two years at an election to be held on the first Saturday in April, 1984 and every even numbered year thereafter. If no qualified person runs for the office of Mayor in April of 1983 or in any odd numbered year thereafter, four Council Members instead of three shall be elected, and the City Council at its first meeting after said election shall select one of its members to serve as Mayor of the City, who shall serve until his term of office as Councilman expires. All of such Councilmen and the Mayor shall be subject, however, to the qualifications as provided in Section 13 of this Charter.

AMENDMENT III.

Shall Section 18 of Article II of the Charter of the City of Colorado City, Texas be amended to read as follows:
Section 18: The Council shall appoint a City Manager who shall be the Chief Administrative and Executive Officer of the City who shall have the powers and perform the duties set forth and provided in this Charter. He shall be chosen by the City Council solely on the basis of his executive and administrative training, experience and ability, and need not, when appointed, be a resident of the City of Colorado City, but during his tenure of office, shall reside within the City. In the event that a City Manager of the City is terminated from his employment, or requested to resign from his employment, no person who has held an elective office of the City of Colorado City shall be eligible for an appointment of City Manager within one year of his release from such office, and no Councilman shall receive such appointment during the term for which he shall have been elected, nor within one year after the expiration of said City Councilmen's term. In the event that a City Manager voluntarily resigns his position, any person, including a person holding elective office in the City or a City Councilman, shall be eligible for appointment as City Manager.

SECTION II.

Said election shall be held at the following place, to-wit: The City Hall of Colorado City, Texas, 180 West Third Street, Colorado City, Texas, with the following named person appointed Judge, to-wit: Sue McGuire, of said election.

SECTION III.

Said election shall be held under the provision of the Charter of the City of Colorado City, Texas, and the Constitution and the laws of the State insofar as same may applicable, and qualified voters shall be allowed to vote upon said proposed charter amendments and all shall

vote in the election precinct of their residence.

SECTION IV.

The wording on the ballot shall be as set out hereafter:
For Amendment No. 1
All voters who favor the amendment that requires the City of Colorado City to have meetings open to the general public save and except in specific situations shall have written or printed on their ballots the words,

"For amendment of the charter to the City of Colorado City to provide for meetings open to the general public save and except a closed meeting or executive session in the following limited circumstances, to-wit: (1) in instances in which the City Council seeks its Attorney's advice with respect to pending or contemplated litigation and settlement offers; (2) during that portion of a meeting in which a discussion is had with respect to the purchase, exchange, lease, or value of real property; (3) during that portion of a meeting during which discussion is had of cases involving the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline, or dismissal of a Public Officer or Employee or to hear complaints or charges against such officer or employee, unless such officer or employee request a public hearing. Whenever any deliberations or any portion of a meeting are closed to the Public as permitted by this amendment no final action, decision or vote with regard to any matter considered in the closed meeting shall be made except in a meeting which is open to the Public and in compliance with the notice requirements of other sections of the charter."

TREMENDOUS TRIFLES

THE BAKED POTATO THAT LAUNCHED A STATESMAN

Following all the publicity, Donahay ran for Governor of Ohio. "Honest Vic" won a whopping victory. At the expiration of his first term, Donahay ran for re-election. The voters returned "Honest Vic" to office.

Flushed with victory, Donahay decided to run for the Senate. His backers played the label of "Honest Vic" for all it was worth. Donahay was swept to Washington on a surging tide of votes.

In the Senate, Donahay made a good record for himself, and the papers continued to call him "Honest Vic." Finally Donahay retired from public life voluntarily. He had never lost an election. But without that baked potato eaten by a forgotten official, "Honest Vic" Donahay might never have risen from his auditor's job.
