WORTH, July 10.—Light showers were reported today over most of the cotton belt by the weather bureau.

A fall which began at noon continued Saturday. Heavy showers were reported from Albany, Brown, Eastland, Kaufman, Kerr, Mexia, Uvalde, Waco, Schieffelin and Weatherford.

Temperatures in the high 70's and low 80's were predicted to continue over most of the week-end.

Two thirds of the United States were predicted to have showers Saturday in the north, which has caused more than 200 deaths in four states.

Survey showed heat deaths down 89. Persons were killed by lightning in local thunderstorms. Most suicides were traced to families.

ANCE THREATENS Collapse of All Non-Intervention

PARIS, France, July 10.—The threatened collapse of the non-intervention plan unless France and Italy agree to her conditions to make neutrality effective.

Two foreign office statements said: The French government will not accept the non-intervention plan at London Monday that Tuesday the control facilities along the French-Spanish border are suspended.

A statement explained the border will remain closed to munitions to Spain.

Bill Before FDR Would Give Aid On Leon Project

Progress of the bill creating a National Water Board in passing Congress and now ready for approval or rejection of President Roosevelt has been watched by J. Frank Sparks, chairman of the Leon River Flood Control district.

According to Sparks, the bill includes the Leon River Flood Control district, composed of Eastland and Callahan counties, in a list of projects to be surveyed by federal officials. Also, under the bill, according to Sparks, the water board, when created, shall report each January to Congress on its investigations of projects and designate the most promising for construction. The board also will be empowered to designate the agency by which the projects shall be constructed.

The bill before Congress was originally passed and signed in 1936. It was called the omnibus flood control bill. It provided for surveys but there was no appropriation.

Sparks also stated work is in progress by the Texas Reclamation Department on a topographic survey of the proposed damsite and lake as planned by the Leon directors. He said Pete Ball, technical assistant in charge of the survey, with his two assistants, Leon Uphaw and Jack Caldwell, have been transferred by the Texas Reclamation Department to another project. R. C. Wisdom, has been transferred to the project, taking Ball's place. Assistant Wisdom are L. Z. Simeco and Joe Sparks.

The current work is for the purpose of mapping the proposed damsite and which under present plans would be south of Eastland near Mangum.

LEXINGTON IS LAST HOPE OF FINDING PAIR

HONOLULU, July 10.—Naval authorities directing the search for Amelia Earhart and Fred Noonan missing nine days, placed their last hope today in the 62 planes of the Lexington.

Openly pessimistic officials said the slim chance the fliers would be discovered depended on the Lexington's airmen, scheduled to start flights early next week.

Pending arrival of the Lexington, the Colorado and its three planes resumed the search south-east of Howland Island. The coast guard cutter Itasca, and the mine sweeper Swan, also continued the search.

ABOARD THE U. S. S. COLORADO, July 10.—One of the Colorado's planes, searching for Amelia Earhart, landed at Hull Island today, to learn from residents there, including one white man, that nothing was known of the missing flier and her navigator.

WTCC Head Will Aid In Greeting Arkansas' Chief

An invitation to be the guest of Fort Worth in welcoming Governor Carl Bailey of Arkansas and a delegation from that state Monday afternoon has been accepted by Milburn McCarty, Eastland, West Texas Chamber of Commerce president.

Governor Bailey and his delegation will be met at 6 o'clock p. m. at the railroad station in Fort Worth.

MAJOR CROP OF PEANUTS IS ASSURED

Eastland county's estimated 30,000 acres of peanuts expected to yield 20 bushels an acre was virtually assured by rains Friday and Saturday, according to Extension Agent Elmo V. Cook. Peanuts is the county's main crop.

While no check had been officially made, the rain was believed county-wide. In Eastland over an inch fell Saturday. Friday's precipitation was about a quarter of an inch.

The peanut situation, agriculturists said, is in far better condition than last year. The estimated yield of 20 bushels an acre is higher than last year's figure. Dick Weekes, Alameda, chairman of the Eastland County Agricultural Conservation Committee, explained the higher yield this year in many farms is due to commercial fertilizer.

Rain was called a "life-saver" for June corn and in many instances helped early corn. June corn will need more rain later, however. Also benefited were grain sorghum, late truck, late peaches. To fruit trees the moisture was also of benefit, for, as Cook explained, it gives trees a chance to store up food for another crop.

One Well Completed While Others In County Arrive Closer to Goals

No. 2A, L. C. Downtain, one and a half miles southeast of Eastland, section 2, E. T. R. R. survey, block 6, had set 10-inch casing at 462 feet Saturday as work progressed rapidly in quest of a 30-barrel-a-day production found recently in the No. 1A Downtain from which it is 450 feet west.

Dorothy Oil company No. 1 Taylor and Beard, seven miles east of Eastland and three miles west of Ranger, E. Finley survey, had been set up. Location is 150 feet from the east and south lines of the 50-acre lease. The well is to seek production at 1,300 feet.

Anderson-Drewery No. 1 Kate Grist, section 36, Lavaca county school land, block NW4, 14 miles southwest of Cisco, has been completed for an estimated eight barrels from the lime, 3,938-77 feet. The oil, it was stated, tests 40 gravity.

Gallagher & Lawson et al, one-half mile south of Deedemona, the test to be carried to 5,500 feet, set 10-inch casing at 2,731 feet. Drilling from this depth, it was reported, will be slower than previous progress.

Hickok Producing & Development company No. 2 Grover S. Cleveland, section 477, S. P. R. R. company survey, eight miles northwest of Cisco, was drilling past 1,205 feet. Production of gas as found in 1935 from No. 1 Cleveland is the goal.

States Oil corporation No. 5 J. W. Henderson, north of Eastland, NEM section 8, block 4, H. & T. C. survey, was drilling below 2,480 feet. Depth of 3,600 feet is contemplated.

Dr. R. C. Ferguson No. 1 Carodie Fox, league 2, McLennan county school land, block 28, seven miles south of Ranger, was shut down at 1,125 feet after setting 3-16 pipe 15 feet off the sand.

Hickey et al No. 1 W. M. Martin, two miles southeast of Deedemona, but in Erath county, was drilling at 1,590 feet.

\$20,000 WORTH OF NEGLECT

A football stadium that has cost almost \$20,000, and which would be worth all of that when completed, is being woefully neglected, just because the school board has failed to cooperate with Frank Reese, groundskeeper, in furnishing him a lawn mower to keep the grass cut.

Reese has been hired by the school board as janitor of the Hodges Oak Park school and as groundskeeper of Bulldog Stadium. Each day he keeps three sets of hose and sprinklers running on the field to keep the grass green, but the school board and the athletic committee in particular, has fallen down on the job and has neglected to furnish him with a mower.

Day after day Reese pleads for a mower, and all in vain. Day after day the athletic committee sits around and does nothing about it. Day after day they admit that the grass should be cut, for without being cut it will never form a turf for the playing field.

Ranger High has prospects of having a fair football team next year. With the cooperation of the athletic committee, which could well be dubbed the "do-nothing" committee, the field is going to be a sorry place on which football games can be played. The grass has already reached a height where mowing it might kill some, but with proper attention, which Reese is willing and anxious to give, a good playing field could be provided by the opening of the football season.

And meanwhile the athletic committee sits around and does nothing except admit that they should do something, and then pass the buck.

Why not plow up the field and plant turnips? No mower is needed to raise them, and with things going along as they are no games can be played on the field anyway, so it could be put to some purpose. Better still why not spend a few dollars to protect a \$20,000 investment?

JAP-CHINESE FORCES STAGE BIG BATTLE

PEIPING, China, July 11.—(Sunday)—Chinese and Japanese forces were locked in the heaviest fighting within a week tonight as hundreds of additional troops for both sides were rushed to the area.

The Japanese news agency reported that four divisions of Nanking's crack first army were moving north.

Japanese authorities also were reported to have dispatched reserves after Chinese were charged with violating an agreement to cease hostilities until peace negotiations were started.

Japanese reports in Shanghai said the Chinese government had been petitioned to declare war against Japan. The new democratic salvation society telegraphed officials in Nanking demanding an immediate declaration of war.

The Japanese also reported that after the resumption of hostilities after the reported surprise attack by the Chinese, the Japanese had occupied two villages occupied by the Chinese 29th Rout Army.

Judgment Given For Dr. A. K. Wier In Dog's Demise

Eastland county's celebrated foxhound case in which J. A. Blackwell sought damages from Dr. A. K. Wier of Ranger for the death of the animal from poison on the latter's ranch resulted Friday in a judgment for the defendant.

County Judge W. S. Adamson rendered a judgment in keeping with the jury's answers to special issues. The case had been under advisement for several weeks. Under the judgment Blackwell does not recover anything from the defendant.

The case originated in justice of peace court in Ranger. The jury, with J. W. Miller as foreman, found in the special issues:

1. That Blackwell's dog died on July 19, 1935, from eating poison put out by the defendant on his (Wier's) ranch.

2. That Wier had agreed with Blackwell that he would not put out poison on the ranch without first notifying the latter.

3. That the agreement was not based upon valuable consideration.

4. That Dr. Wier failed to notify Blackwell he put out poison prior to July 19, 1935.

5. That there was no negligence on Wier's part in not notifying Blackwell the poison was to be placed on the ranch.

6. That the failure to notify Blackwell was not the direct and proximate cause of the death of "Charley," the dog.

7. That Wier did not cause the death of the dog.

8. That "Charley" was worth \$50.

9. That Wier did not place the poison with the intention to poison the dog.

10. That Wier did not place the poison to induce or entice "Charley" on the ranch.

11. That the poison was placed on the ranch to protect sheep and goats from animals that had been killing stock.

TEX. CONVICTS ARE SOUGHT IN ARDMORE, OK.

ARDMORE, Okla., July 10.—An alarm was broadcast throughout Southeastern Oklahoma today for three escaped Texas convicts led by Pete Traxler, Oklahoma's No. 1 outlaw, after a filling station was robbed seven miles east of here.

A check with Texas officers convinced them, Ardmore officers said, that Traxler and two companions committed the robbery.

The filling station operator took down their Texas license number, verified as that on a car stolen by the convicts who escaped from the Eastham prison farm late Thursday, leaving a trail of blood and robbery through East Texas.

Three men were in the car. Two staged the robbery while the third waited in the car. Besides Traxler, officers believed the others were Charlie Chapman, bank robber, and Fred Tindol.

DALLAS, July 10.—Capt. Lee Miller of the Texas State Police said today he was certain that the robbers of an Ardmore, Okla., filling station were three fugitive Texas convicts.

DALLAS, July 10.—State police here were notified today that three fugitive convicts from the Eastham prison farm had abandoned a stolen state police car near Big Sandy, Upshur county, stolen another machine and fled.

Waller Benton of Fort Worth, one of the four fugitives, left no trail.

DALLAS, July 10.—As long as escaped convicts do nothing more drastic than take automobiles away from state police, Governor Allred is not going to be alarmed, he said here today.

"I would a whole lot rather they get the police car than have the same sort of tragedy that happened when Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow were running around killing police," he said.

Ranger Withdraws Softball Team of Oil Belt League

Letters have been sent out to all teams participating in the Oil Belt Softball Association schedule to the effect that the Ranger entry was withdrawing from the league and would not participate in games in the future.

The decision on the part of Ranger to withdraw was reached because of schedule conflicts could not be worked out satisfactorily, and because of lack of interest in the league by players.

Ranger entered the league with the understanding that the schedule would be worked out more equitably, and since this was never done and it was impossible for the Ranger team to compete because of previously scheduled games, the team was withdrawn from the league.

Protest Is Filed Upon River Canal

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Rep. Clyde L. Garrett of Eastland, Texas, filed with the Board of Army Engineers a protest against the proposed Trinity canal.

He filed the protest at the request of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and others interested who asked further public hearings so they could present evidence opposing canalization of the river.

Film Stars' Pal Held In Robbery Staged Years Ago

LOS ANGELES, July 10.—Mysterious John Montague, strong man of the Hollywood golf course, was taken to municipal court today on a fugitive warrant which sought his removal to New York State on a charge of robbing at Seas County roadhouse in 1930.

Montague's attorney asked the judge to reduce the \$25,000 bail under which Montague, playmate of Bing Crosby, Oliver Hardy, Edgar Kennedy and other film notables, was held in jail.

Montague made bail immediately and was released. July 26 was set as the date for the hearing on the fugitive warrant.

Closing the Period of Ocean Pioneers

Maybe it was not altogether without significance that Amelia Earhart turned up missing in the Pacific on the very day that Pan-American and Imperial Airways began work on the establishing of a commercial trans-Atlantic air service.

The old eras and the new, in ocean flying, thus overlapped very neatly.

Miss Earhart, gallant lady and gifted flyer, was perhaps the last of the free-lance trail blazers. That is to say that she stood for the old era in ocean flying—the era of high adventure, danger, and high-hearted romance. It was a great era and it had some great names on its rolls: Miss Earhart's, Lindbergh's, Byrd's, Chamberlain's, and all the rest. But it was an era which ended (as you might say, if you wished to be fanciful) when Miss Earhart's radio went silent somewhere off Howland Island.

As it ended, a new one began. While Miss Earhart's big plane was coming down somewhere on the surface of the Pacific, an even larger plane was taking to the air at Port Washington, Long Island. The Pan-American Clipper III was setting forth on the first leg of a projected flight to England. At the same time, the Imperial Airways ship Calendonica was getting ready to take off from England for America.

There is no "lone wolf" angle to either of these flights. They are the fruits for years of research. Their object is not to take risks but to avoid them; not to show what one man in a plane can do, but to demonstrate that the co-operation of many men, prepared as carefully as the operations of a railroad are prepared, can span the ocean with regular, passenger-carrying commercial service that will be safe and unexciting enough to pay its own way.

So say all of this is not to cast the slightest aspersion on the free-lance tribe, as represented by Miss Earhart. The free lancers blazed the trail. Without them, Pan-American and Imperial would not be doing what they are doing. The free lancers were the pioneers, so to speak, who went on ahead and spied out the land; the commercial companies are the city planners, the immigrants, the people who took the frontier the pioneers had discovered and made it cease to be frontier.

For that, after all, is what is happening. We have passed one more frontier—we who in a century and a half have passed so many frontiers. And the passing took place in a singularly dramatic way.

One plane missing, far out on the lonely Pacific. Another plane heading into the dawn, half a world away. And the day of the ocean pioneers is closed!

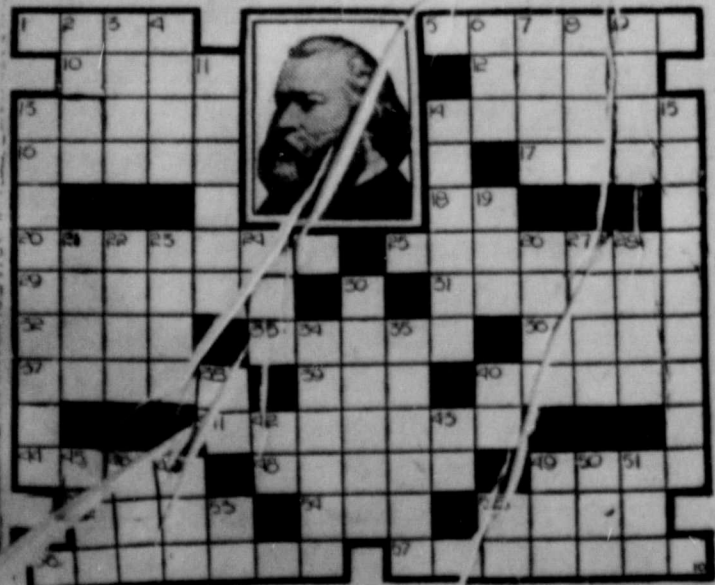

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for July 18

Weekly Sunday School Lesson

GOD ENCOURAGES A LEADER

Text: Exodus 3:3-16; 4:10-16; 5:1

THE lesson of today only enforces what we have already considered concerning God's encouragement of Moses and his strengthening of a leader who felt his own weakness and inadequacy.

We are told, sometimes, that the God of these ancient Israelites was a tribal God, and that they had not found the glorious conception that arose in later Israel and in New Testament times, of a God of the whole earth.

But it is something more than such a limited conception that one finds in the representation of God as speaking to Moses. When Moses asks his name and how he shall know and tell his people of the divine reality, the reply is that he is to say, "I AM hath sent me unto you."

"I AM THAT I AM"—what a noble conception that is, conveying so magnificently the emphasis upon the living presence of God! This God of the Fathers is an everlasting God, a covenant making and a covenant keeping God in whom men of devotion and faith can find security and strength.

MOSES is still concerned about his lack of qualification as a leader. He is conscious that he is not eloquent. He is slow of speech and of tongue. Here again, though, lack of eloquence is not to be despised. How many great and real leaders have been feeble in speech!

This was one of the complaints against Paul, whom we have compared to Moses, that his presence was weak, and that he lacked the gift of speech, of Apollos, and others. But one can think of many men small in stature and unimpressive in presence and speech who have, nevertheless, been the creators and inspirers of great causes.

Boys Take Over Juries' Quarters

District court jury dormitories, scene of many serious deliberations of men deciding criminal and civil suits, vibrated with boyish enthusiasm Friday night in the courthouse at Eastland.

Because of rain the dormitories were used by the 4-H club boys attending the two-day encampment at Eastland. The rain prevented sleeping in the open at city park as planned. Saturday noon marked the close of the outing.

The girl 4-H club girls were forced by the rain to discontinue their encampment and the outing for them was ended at 5 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Speakers for the boys included Dr. J. H. Caton, Eastland, who discussed diseases; L. L. Johnson, state boys' club work agent, who traced history of club work; R. R. Reppert, extension service entomologist, who gave a talk on insects, and Hugh F. Barnhart, assistant county agent.

Mayor C. W. Hoffmann of Eastland gave an address of welcome, presented 4-H club Sunday attendance prizes to Flatwood, Kokomo and Romney clubs and extended an invitation for all club members in the county to accept a free swim at the City Park Swimming pool in Eastland.

and movements, and who have accomplished almost incredible things simply because faith and determination have driven them, and they have become the medium of a greater power than themselves.

The Lord rebuked Moses because of his lack of faith in himself. "Who hath made man's mouth? or who maketh a man dumb, or deaf, or seeing, or blind?" Cannot God, in His power, give words to men who lack eloquence?

Nevertheless, Moses found a mouthpiece in Aaron, his brother, who was evidently a man of words as Moses was a man of action.

THUS equipped, with a new inner strength and with the support of the eloquent Aaron, Moses goes down to his task to face Pharaoh in the name of the God of Israel, and to say, "Let my people go, that they may hold a feast unto me in the wilderness."

It was not to be as easy a task as Moses might have supposed. God's will is for the deliverance and safety of his children, but there are problems of human freedom and destiny that man has to work out in co-operation with God, and the divine power does not work miracles where men themselves fail. The way that was before Moses was to test alike his faith, his courage, and his strength.

The call of a man to a great task is only the first incident in his destiny.

The real time of testing comes not in his acceptance of the call, but in the power of faith and will with which he holds to his task, day after day, no matter what the discouragements and no matter what the dangers. Moses became a great leader not merely through his call, but by the strength of his faith and his unyielding will.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

NOW that corn's on the cob there should be rejoicing in hungry hearts. It's one of America's grandest foods. Strip off the husks, pull out the silken threads and plunge into boiling unsalted water. Boil from 10 to 15 minutes, depending on tenderness. Remove from water at once, serve with mountains of butter and salt at hand. If the corn is not very sweet, add a little sugar to the water first. Avoid salt because it toughens corn in cooking.

Cut corn from the cob for a variety of July temptations. For a variation on the breakfast egg theme, try this recipe:

Corn and Eggs Scrambled
(4 to 6 servings)

Three-quarter cup fresh cooked corn, scored and cut from cob, 4 eggs, 1-3 cup top milk, 1-2 teaspoon salt, pepper to taste.

Beat eggs slightly. (Eggs for scrambling must never be light or completely beaten.) Add all other ingredients. Heat 2 tablespoons butter in clean frying pan. Pour in egg mixture. Cook slowly, scraping constantly from bottom. Cook until fairly dry but not tough. Scrambled eggs should be creamy—yes, as creamy as young corn.

With steak or chops, try this corn combination.

Corn and Green Peppers
(4 to 6 servings)

One and one-half cups fresh cooked corn cut from cob, 1 green pepper cut in thin strips, 3 tablespoons butter, salt to taste, 1-2 cup cream.

Heat butter in pan, add peppers and cook 2 minutes. Add corn and cook 1 minute. Then season and add cream and bring to boil once. It's a wonderful delicacy.

Arizona Corn Pudding
(4 to 6 servings)

Three cups young uncooked corn cut from cob, 1 large onion, 1 tablespoon lard, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 1/2 tablespoons chili powder, 2 tablespoons finely chopped celery, 1-3 cup grated hard cheese, seasoning.

Chop onion very fine. Heat lard, fry onion. Add all the other ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Turn into buttered baking dish. Cook in moderate oven (375 degrees F) for about 4 hours.

For delicious fish cookery, save the husks from green corn. Place in each husk an individual serving of raw halibut and a strip of green pepper. Wrap and tie securely. Place the husks in a pot with about 1 inch of water. Steam for 3 hours, add more water if necessary. Serve in husks with an appropriate sauce.

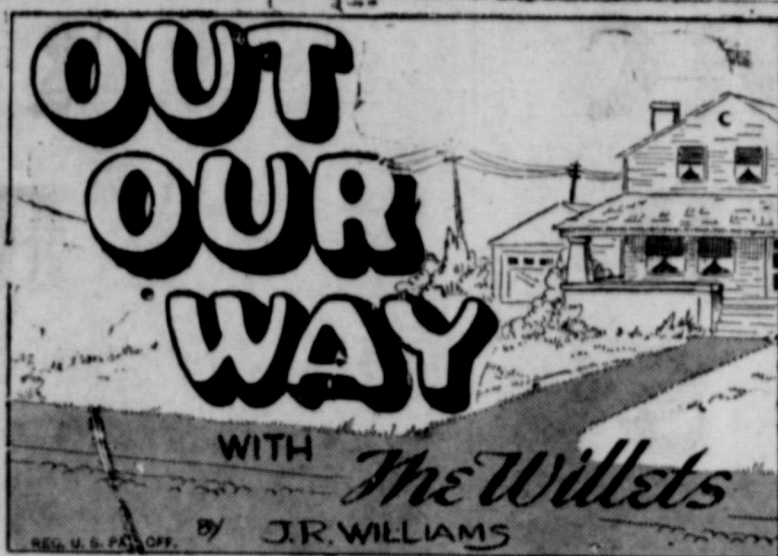

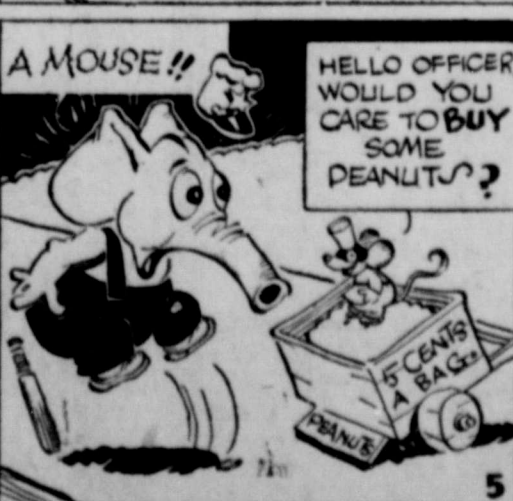

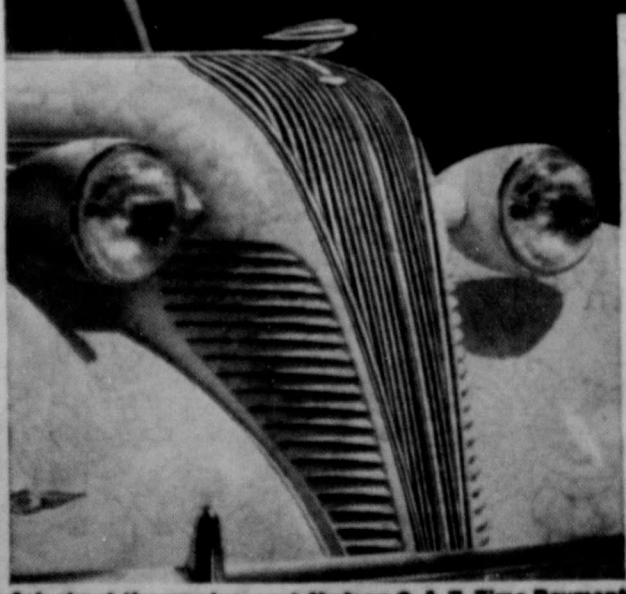
