**TEXAS STATE NEWS**

**Paris**—Account of bridge being burned across Blue creek in Oklahoma, passengers of a Frisco train were forced to walk several miles to the next station or remain with the train. Many walked to it and during the night it is believed the bridge burned as the result of the work of incendiaries.

**Whiteflight**—Mrs. D. Burnham was fatally hurt in a runaway accident here. She died about the middle of last night. While sitting in her buggy in front of the law plant, her horse was frightened at a wagon which was backing up to the door of the ice house. The animal dashed down the street leading through the main part of town. The buggy was overturned near the First National bank.

**Houston**—Manuel Gonzalez, a Mexican, was shot and killed in a restaurant on Congress avenue. Charlie Grant, a cook employed in the restaurant, was arrested on a charge of murder.

**Victoria**—As if by miracle a great number of people escaped injury here during the Jake Walters celebration, when a cannon, which was saluting his arrival, exploded. Pieces of iron were imbedded in a number of buildings, but not a person was struck by the flying missiles. Colonel Walters came here from Palestine during the intercoastal canal, the development of which he is advocating. He was introduced by Ben F. Fly. The crowd overflowed from the court house, where he spoke.

**Wichita Falls**—Another gas field and possibly another oil field was discovered at Burnett, north of here on the Red river. A petroleum company struck a strong flow of gas at a depth of about 1000 feet. There was also a good show of oil and the well is now being bled.

**Columbus**—Potatoes as a money making crop have demonstrated themselves in Columbus. Farmers have made \$1000 on 100 acres of 100 acres, the crop bringing from \$1.50 to \$1.80 per bushel. It is indicated that the acreage will be largely increased next season.

**Temple**—Mrs. John Merritt, living seven miles south of the city, died from the effects of a dose of carbolic acid. She had been in poor health for some months and this is assigned as the cause.

**Wharton**—Louis Anderson, a negro, was killed here by City Marshal Damon when he attempted to resist arrest. Damon had gone to the home of the negro to arrest him for beating his wife and had started away with him when Anderson asked to be allowed to return to the house for his hat. When he reentered the house he refused to leave and reached for a gun, when Damon fired, killing him instantly.

**Giddings**—H. Kerpman was buried at the Giddings cemetery the other evening at 3 o'clock. Mr. Kerpman was living alone at his home here and his friends having failed to see him since Sunday went to his home to see what had become of him. Upon entering the house a gruesome sight was beheld. From indications he had arisen from his bed Sunday night and in passing between his bed and the wall stumbled over a crosscut saw which was leaning against the wall. He doubtfully fell on his face, in which position he was found Wednesday morning. His face was badly bruised and swollen. He was pronounced dead when found and until he died late Wednesday evening was not able to tell anything.

**Bay City**—The jury in the case of Frank Shultz, charged with killing Will Plumming at Pledger August 11, 1911, acquitted Shultz after a trial of the case which consumed four days. This case was the heaviest fourth case Matagorda county has ever known. Private prosecution was dropped and the court, consequently, was the center of interest. A detachment of State Rangers was stationed here during the trial to prevent any trouble arising.

**M'NAMARAS SUFFER**

**Notorious Brothers Disciplined for Violation of Rules.**  
 SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 24.—The M'Namara brothers, dynamiters, are in bad favor at San Quentin. Within a week both have lost the privilege of receiving guests and writing letters. Their tobacco supply has been cut off, too. For the first six months of their terms the brothers were ideal prisoners, but last week they fell from grace. John J. M'Namara, serving fifteen years for the Llewellyn Iron works dynamiting, was the first to run foul of rules. He insulted one of the guards in the jail and was sentenced to the latter end of his term. The younger brother, serving a life sentence was found striking his work.

**MONSTER FISH IS LANDED**

**Fight 3 Days and 2 Nights to Subdue 16,000 Pound Fish.**  
 MIAMI, Fla., June 23.—An exceedingly rare fish in these waters was landed here recently by Captain Charles Thompson and his assistants after a fight that lasted through three nights and two days, during which the men nearly succumbed to fatigue and their vessel was badly damaged and nearly wrecked. The fish is known as a rhinodon typicus and is a native of Indian ocean. The specimen landed by Captain Thompson was 16 feet long and weighed 16,000 pounds. The river was 9 feet in length and weighed 2000 pounds. The gigantic fish was towed upon the bar here and skinned by experts. Captain Thompson will have it properly treated and then it will be sent north for exhibition. It is a great curiosity and has been viewed by thousands here. It will likely be given to the Smithsonian institution in Washington after being viewed by the public in several of the larger cities.

**SOVES PROBLEM OF YOUTH**

**Prof. Metchnikoff Announces "Glycoceptor" Will Prevent Old Age.**  
 PARIS, France, June 24.—There is considerable discussion among scientists in France in regard to the announcement by Professor Metchnikoff, of the Pasteur Institute, that he is studying the effectiveness of a microbe called "glycoceptor" as a preventive of old age.

**MUCH OF EARTH UNEXPLORED**

**Africa Alone Contains 6 1/2 Million Square Miles of Unkown.**  
 Despite the wonderful advance of exploration in various parts of the world, the Royal Geographical Society of London recently declared that no fewer than 20,000,000 square miles of the earth yet remains unexplored. Africa has the largest unexplored area, nearly 6 1/2 million square miles, while North America contains fewer than 1 1/2 million square miles of virgin territory. The largest continuous stretch of unexplored territory is in Liberia. This tract consists of about twenty thousand square miles, all of which is within two hundred miles of the sea. # HOUSEKEEPERS' DEPARTMENT

## GOOD THINGS TO EAT IN SUMMER.

By Mrs. Bessie Lee Moore.  
It was Charles Wagner, author of "Simple Life," who said that the kitchen is the corner stone of the social life of the nation. It is of the greatest importance to the nation what our mothers and sisters do in the kitchen. Love music and art, but the root of the family is in the kitchen.

As to food values: A word of caution to the woman who is eliminating meat from the menu these spring days. Do not let the drop in food values be so great as to injure the health. Eggs and cheese are among the best meat substitutes, while nuts, dried or canned peas, beans and graham, whole wheat and corn meal breads with plenty of good butter, cream and olive oil, are all good standbys. Escallops and force meats of fish or fresh vegetables make substantial dishes as also creamed fish, and the various forms of macaroni and spaghetti cooked with milk, tomatoes or cheese.

Good cream soups are as nutritious as meat soups, and their great variety there need be no deadly monotony in their serving.

**Our Spring Markets.**  
They usually abound in addition to these winter standbys carrots, parsnips, turnips, cabbage, a fine display of green things, such as peas, beans, onions, celery, lettuce, asparagus, rhubarb and spinach. Spinach is particularly good and inexpensive just now, and no vegetable is more wholesome. Spinach is one of the vegetables that improves with being warmed over. The thrifty housewife usually cooks it by the quantity, looking forward to its reheating. A freer use of olive oil is generally advised by physicians. A good cream soup, a salad of vegetable origin, dressed with olive oil, and accompanied by bread or crackers with these may supply all that is needed for a single meal.

**Planked Fish.**  
In planking and there is no better way of developing the distinctive

flavor of any of the delicate white meats if the plank itself is of first importance. It must be of hard wood, hickory, cherry, live oak, cedar or ash, well seasoned and saved about an inch and a half thick, rounded or tapered at one end like an ironing board—this is to accommodate the fall of the fish. It is best when possible to get one tongued and grooved at the ends with wire attachments to hold the fish in place. These can be purchased now at any of the hardware or department stores and so cheap that even the housekeeper of small means can afford to keep a plank especially for the cooking of fish. After a plank has been well charred and seasoned it becomes a treasure well worth numbering among the family heirlooms. Good olive oil is the best substance to use in greasing a plank, though butter or sweet drippings will answer.

**Have the Plank Hot.**  
Heat the plank in the oven. Have the fish split down the back, removing the backbone, and wash and wipe dry. Rub the season with salt and fasten to the hot board with the fixtures that come for that purpose. Brush with olive oil or melted butter and season with salt and pepper. The skin side goes next to the board. Put fish on plank in the bottom of a hot oven for twenty minutes then begin to baste fish frequently with butter and lemon juice until brown. Meanwhile boil potatoes, mash and whip light, add salt and pepper to season. Butter and cream to make quite creamy and soft.

**Vegetables Can Be Added.**  
If you wish, boil also tiny white onions, peas or young carrots as preferred. Cook the fish in a pan with butter and all on a Japanese tray or large platter, arrange the cooked vegetables about the fish pressing the mashed potato through a tube in rose fashion at intervals. If preferred the potato maybe put on the plank and broiled lightly with the fish. Garnish with cress or parsley and thin slices of lemon and serve hot.

# THE EYE OF ONE MAN GRAFTED ONTO ANOTHER

Blind Machinist's Sight Restored by Philadelphia Surgeon's Remarkable Operation.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 24.—Blind for seven years, his case given up as hopeless by physicians and surgeons, Flown Harris, a machinist, is at the Medico-Chirurgical hospital with his sight restored by one of the most daring operations ever attempted, the removal of the tissues from the eye of another man and grafted on the eye of Harris. Harris lost the sight of both eyes in a "flare-back" from the furnace in the shop in which he was working. Dr. L. Webster Fox, eye specialist of the hospital, believed there was some hope for him. When a patient came to the hospital with an eye so badly injured that it had to be removed, Harris was summoned. He was placed on the operating table. The eye was taken from the injured man, the eye ball was stripped of the diseased tissues and these were placed over the sightless orbs of Harris. Harris was kept in a dark room for several days. Then the bandage was removed and Harris could see a little. He is now awaiting the arrival of another patient who must lose an eye. When this patient arrives Dr. Fox will perform an operation on the second eye of Harris.

# THE REAL BREAKFAST DISH

A Hot Weather Breakfast Food That Contains no Heat Units, But on the Contrary is Cooling and Nourishing.

The most important question to the average housewife during these hot summer days is the selection of those foods that are nourishing and at the same time devoid of any undue heating qualities, as also the proper repast to begin the day with. The trouble with many summer breakfasts is that they are made up of those very foods that have a tendency to heat the blood, such as rolled oats, and corn flakes; they are nourishing of course, but are taken into the system at the expense of great unnecessary discomforts for the rest of the day to come. Of course it is necessary for us to eat, and as we begin the day with breakfast, why not partake of such articles of food that will cause us the least regrets during the day? # FARM NOTES

FARMERS SHOULD PRICE THEIR PRODUCTS.

L. E. Pool.  
After reading the many speeches made and letters written upon agriculture, rural schools, rural roads, and for promulgating both, I have gathered a few simple ideas. Now, my opinion is not any better than some other persons, but the spirit of progress and betterment is causing many people to read and think for themselves which will do more to get the voter to study the issues and cast his ballot upon the dictates of his own conscience.

Now, I deem the right of suffrage the most sacred right that a voter has, excepting his right to his family. If this right is of any importance then it ought to be a sacred duty for each voter to get himself in harness and discharge that duty to the best of his ability.

In my opinion, all prosperity in every legitimate occupation or business must look for its sustenance either directly or indirectly through some line of agriculture. But since the speculator is allowed to manipulate the price of farm products to suit his own convenience, the producers, must cooperate with each other in the buying and selling of farm products. On the other hand, if the buying and selling were based upon marketing supply and demand then the consumer as well as producer would have a regulated price which would nearly always show a profit to both parties over the old haphazard plan of dumping.

1. What is the difference between an untested queen and a tested one?

ANSWERS—1. If a man sends you a queen as such as it begins to lay, or any time before you have been from its eggs have emerged from their cells that's an untested queen. If he sends you one which has been laying long enough that he can tell by its worker progeny that it is purely mated with a drone of its own kind, that's a tested queen. An untested queen may have commenced to lay, or she may have been laying any time up to 21 days. A tested queen has been laying 21 days or longer.

You will not hear the bees in a tree unless you put your ear close against the tree, and the bees flying back and forth to their home in a tree do not make as much noise as they do when work-

### MEXICAN REBELS FLOCK INTO JUAREZ

More Fighting Expected on Banks of Rio Grande—Rebels Preparing for Their Last Stand.

JUAREZ, Mexico, June 24.—The American border may again be the scene of fighting between the Mexican federalists and the revolutionists. Friends of rebels have arrived here from Casas Grandes and other points on the Mexican Northwestern railroad, practically evacuating the entire railroad to the government troops, about 4000 of whom, under General Jose de la Luz Blanco, have formed a cordon just west of the rebel zone.

The arrival of all available rebels here is taken to mean that Juarez and the territory between here and Chihuahua on the Mexican Central railroad will be held by the rebels at any cost.

In the event the rebels north of Chihuahua make their last stand here the federalists may decide not to assault the town, but lay siege and cut off re-enforcements and supplies from the south. Two machine guns and two mortars have arrived from the south to be used in the defense of Juarez.

### Frightened by Federalists.

TORREON, Mexico, June 24.—The rebel chief, Pedro Ojeda, with sixty-six followers, rode into Peron Blanco, Durango, and demanded of merchants that they deliver \$500 per head to the rebel chief. The rebels were given thirty-five pesos and hurried away without doing damage when they heard federalists were coming. This city is quiet.


