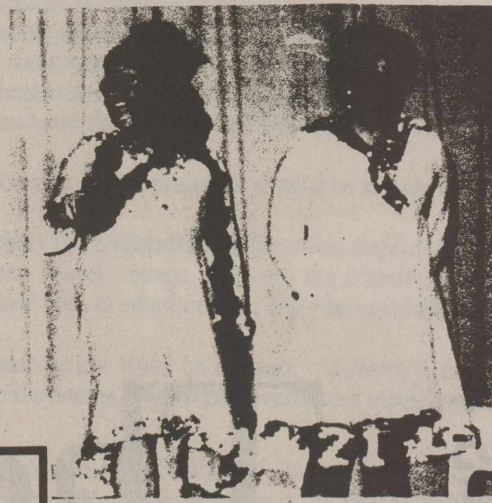

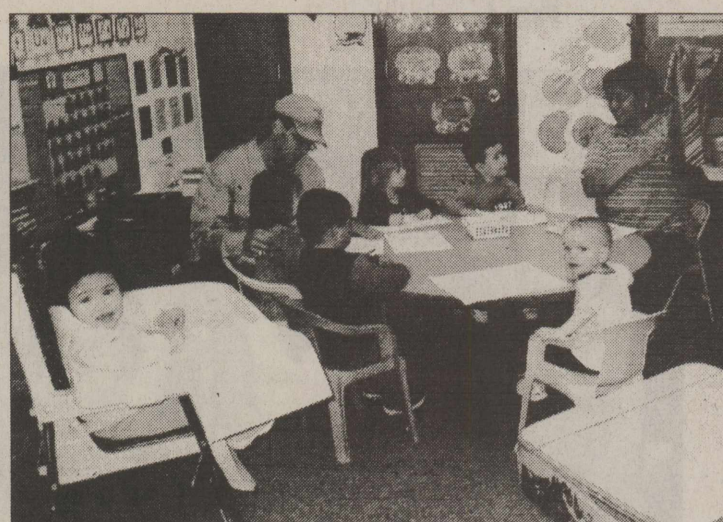


**Lollipop Junction

PANHANDLE ALLIANCE PRESENTS POSITION ON DAIRY SOLICITATION FOR SHERMAN COUNTY

Panhandle Alliance, Inc., a local non-profit organization, is presenting its position on the solicitation of dairies in our area. We are not categorically opposed to the prospect of dairies coming into our area, but we believe everyone needs to be aware of the situation and have input into the process.

Panhandle Alliance promotes the concept of sustainable development, protecting our water supply, air quality, and our quality of life. Our area was under the threat of having some 2-3 million hogs move in under applications by Seaboard. That threat has diminished for the present time. Everyone needs to be aware that there are similarities between the large dairies and the present feedlots in our area, but there are also similarities between some dairy operations and the hog feeding industry.

Facts that need to be considered regarding the dairy prospects are listed below.

- What kind of waste management system will they use? ASAE (American Society of Agricultural Engineers) standards for waste handling systems use the following waste generation amounts for various livestock species (per 1000 lbs. of body weight): beef cattle-58 lbs., dairy cattle-86 lbs., and finishing hogs-84#. Dairy cattle are the champion waste generators due to the way they are fed for milk production and their body size. We must know what kind of waste handling system will be used. Will they rely on dry lot systems (like the feedlots use now) where dry manure is stacked and later spread on fields and the only runoff into the lagoon is from precipitation and spillage, or will they rely on "wet barn" systems where all the waste is washed from the barns into the lagoons using large quantities of water and creating a huge volume of liquid waste?
- What kind of design specifications will be used? Dr. John Sweeten with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Amarillo said in a conversation with some Panhandle Alliance's directors that most of the time the wrong objectives are stated to the engineers early in the process. The first question is usually, "Can you design a waste system that will meet the legal conditions and do it cheaply?" Dr. Sweeten stated that the first question should be, "Can you design a waste system that will exceed the current legal specifications, that will meet future specifications, and avoid contamination problems in the future?" Current TCEQ (Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, formerly TNRCC) specifications for livestock facilities are lax compared to specifications in other states that have already had problems and are even lax compared to standards TCEQ has for "industrial" waste generators and municipal waste systems.
- What impact will a landowner selling land to a dairy or dairy developer have on his neighbors? If you sell to a dairy or a hog operation, are you willing to live within 1/4 mile of it? That's what TCEQ says the minimum distance to a dwelling should be. Would you be willing to live within 1 mile of it? Does your economic benefit injure your neighbors?
- What will be the impact on the local economy and infrastructure? This applies to any development project. Things that must be considered include the impact on local school systems, roads, existing businesses, and future growth. A new industry that generates a number of low-paying jobs is a net loser, school systems are overloaded without an increase in tax revenue, low-paying jobs tend to create a transient population, increased law enforcement costs, and a decline in housing values.
- How does a new industry fit with what we have now and the potential for other businesses? Many small communities have developed local tourism where folks from the city come to the country for the weekend, spend a lot of money, and then go back to their jobs in the city. What impact on future tourism will the development of large odor generators have?
- What impact will the dairy (or any other industry) have on our existing water supply? Wet barn systems use more water and pose a much greater threat for contamination.

Panhandle Alliance proposes that the following conditions need to be met before we can even begin to support the solicitation of dairies for our area.

- Dry lot systems are infinitely preferable to wet barn systems. If wet barn systems are to be used, we believe that underground monitoring systems must be used to detect leakage. This exceeds current TCEQ standards, but it should be made a condition of the sale of land.
- Absolutely no tax abatements should be offered or granted. Historically, economic development groups that have done this have seen high rates of failure of the businesses that had to have them.
- Annual water testing of wells on the premises should be stipulated and results made available to the public.
- Impact on existing markets for feedstuffs and resulting impact on competing businesses must be considered. This may sound strange, but with the transition from corn to cotton and the escalating cost of irrigated crop production, this must be considered. Our area is already a net importer of feed grains.
- Impact on existing infrastructure must be studied. Highways, county roads, rural electrical and phone service, school systems, and local government services must all be considered.

All of the directors and most of the membership of Panhandle Alliance, Inc. live in this area and are involved in production agriculture. We know what the economic situation in agriculture is, but we are also concerned about the future of our area.

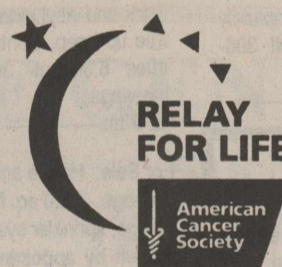
