All he knows is that his taxes keep on inching up, year by year, that bonded indebtedness keeps on increasing, and that the army of state employes never stops recruiting.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

DON'T you love the way rhubarb looks, all pink and green and tempting?

Some people claim it's acid-forming but that's nonsense. The leaves contain some oxalic acid and should not be used, but they have such a small amount that after cooking the oxalic content is nil.

Aside from its pleasantly tart flavor which naturally stimulates the appetite, rhubarb is a good source of important food elements. It has phosphorus, that constituent so necessary for strong teeth and sound bones, and the essential vitamin C.

Be careful not to over-cook. Vitamin C is destroyed if subjected to too great heat for too long a time and as little water as possible should be used because the rhubarb is very juicy.

Add Sugar After Cooking

When you make sauce, be sure not to add the sugar until the plant is tender. Not long ago a housewife said it took so much sugar to make the sauce sweet enough for her family to eat that she couldn't afford to use the plant. I found that she was cooking the sugar with the sauce. Add sugar just before taking off the fire. Then let come to the boiling point and remove at once. This makes a deliciously sweet and delicately flavored sauce.

For rhubarb tapioca cook the fruit in tapioca and water, adding sugar when tender, or the tapioca can be cooked separately and poured over rhubarb arranged in a buttered baking dish and the whole baked thirty minutes in a moderate oven. Serve with sugar and cream or with a custard sauce.

The first rhubarb usually has a very tender skin and if well washed need not be peeled. As the

season advances the skin grows tough and stringy and should be removed.

Rhubarb is ideal with fish menus and when made into a hearty dessert does much to bring up the calory count of a meal.

Rhubarb up-side-down cake is one of our favorite desserts with fish or pork in the spring.

Rhubarb Up-Side-Down Cake

One pound rhubarb, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup hot water, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla.

Wash rhubarb and peel if necessary. Cut in inch lengths. Melt butter in spider and add rhubarb. Keep warm while preparing batter. Beat yolks of eggs until thick and lemon colored. Add half the sugar, beating. Beat in hot water and remaining sugar. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder and add to first mixture. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff. Add vanilla and pour over rhubarb. Bake forty minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.). Serve with whipped cream, sweetened and lightly flavored with vanilla. Sprinkle rhubarb with sugar when cake is turned up-side-down on a serving plate.

We have the first service Sunday night. All of our congregations, and any others who may wish to attend, will meet at the Recreation Building. We will start the service at 7:15. Be on time.


The young people will meet in their respective places for their usual Sunday evening programs. Then all go to the central place of meeting for preaching.

All Dogs Must Be Vaccinated Again Before Licensing

Many people who had their dogs vaccinated for rabies last year are under the impression that it immunized their dogs for the remainder of their lives, it was pointed out today by R. A. Jamison, city secretary.

As a matter of fact the city ordinance requires that dogs be vaccinated each year and those that were vaccinated in May of last year must be vaccinated again this year. It has been found that the serum lasts for only one year and in order to prevent the spread of rabies the vaccination receipt must be shown before a license can be obtained.

Many who do not understand this have applied for licenses for their dogs without first obtaining a receipt from a veterinary showing that the dog has been vaccinated this year, and in that case licenses cannot be issued, it was pointed out.




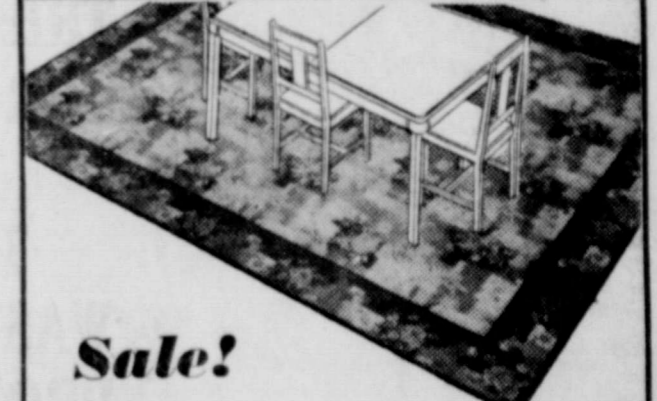

Recipes approved by Miss Hogue and given for your convenience are as follows:

Date Roll
3 cups sugar
1 cup milk
Set over slow flame until sugar dissolves. Cook to 230 degrees, add 1 package dates stoned and cut into small pieces. Stir until

dissolved, add 2 cups nuts, 1 tspn. vanilla. Beat until creamy, roll in buttered paper.

Mocha Frosting
Beat 1/2 lb. of butter to a cream, add gradually 2 1/2 cups confectioners sugar and a scant 3 tbsps. of very strong Admiration coffee, 1 tbspn. vanilla.

Jelly Pancake
1 box raspberry or lemon jello
1 cup boiling water
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups fruit
1/2 pt. whipping cream
1 jelly roll with red jelly
Dissolve jello in boiling water, let cool. Whip cream until stiff. When jello has thickened slightly fold in fruit and whipped cream. Pour mixture into spring form pan which has been lined with slices of jelly roll. Let stand overnight or at least 6 hours.

3 cups cherries, pitted

1/2 cup sugar
1 tbspn. butter
dash nutmeg
1/2 lemon cut into small pieces
Roll pie pastry, line pan. Fill by adding 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 the tapioca in bottom of pan. Add cherries and lemon, remainder of sugar, tapioca, nutmeg and butter. Allow top crust to overlap lower crust 1/2 inch. Cut off with shears, moisten edge of top and fold under lower crust. Crimp edge. Place in oven that has been pre-heated to 450 degrees and reduce control to 350 degrees and bake 45 to 50 minutes.

Coffee Ice Cream
16 marshmallows
1 cup hot Admiration coffee
1 1/2 cups whipped cream
Add marshmallows to hot coffee and let melt. Add whipped cream and mix together, put in tray and freeze.

Peanut Bread
Cream together 1 tbspn. Mrs. Tucker's shortening
1/2 cup peanut butter
Add 1 egg well beaten
2 cups milk and the following sifted dry ingredients:
1 1/2 cups bread flour
2 tpsns. salt
4 tpsns. K. C. baking powder
1/2 cup broken jumbo peanuts
Mix thoroughly and pour mixture into greased pans. Bake about 40 minutes at 400 degrees.

Crystallized Pickles
6 large pickles, sliced thin
3 cups sugar
3 cinnamon sticks, broken
1 hand cloves, whole
Let stand 48 hours or longer.

Refrigerator Cake
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter
Yolks 3 eggs beaten
2 tbsps. cream or top milk
1 small flat can grated pineapple
Little vanilla
1/2 lb. vanilla wafers, or
1 1/2 box National Biscuit Van Wafers (rolled fine)
1 cup broken pecans
Line pan with 1/2 inch crumbs, some of dough, more crumbs and nuts and more dough. Then wafers on top. Put in ice box overnight. Serve with whipped cream on top. Serves 8.

Streamline Cake
Here is a chocolate cake gone modern because of the speed with which it is consumed. Should be baked in a pan 2 1/2 inches deep by 9 inches by 15 inches.
Cream 1/2 cup Mrs. Tucker's shortening and
1/2 cup sugar
Add 1 egg and beat it thoroughly. Add a second egg and beat as before. Add 2 squares of bitter chocolate (melted) and flavor with 1 tspn. vanilla. Then 1/2 tspn. salt
1 cup sour milk
1 tspn. soda in
2 tpsns. lemon juice
Add quickly to cake. Bake 350 degrees for 40 minutes.

Baked Cabbage with Tomatoes and Cheese
3 cups shredded cabbage
1 cup grated American cheese
1 1/2 cups stewed tomatoes
1 tbspn. butter
1 cup bread crumbs
salt and pepper
Cook cabbage 5 minutes in salt water. Line buttered baking dish with a layer of cabbage, then tomatoes and cheese and crumbs. Dot with butter. Bake 30 minutes. If dry add little milk.

Carrot Timbals
Cook 1/2 cup bread crumbs in 1/2 cup of milk until mixture is thick.
Add 1/2 tspn. pepper
1 1/2 tspn. finely chopped parsley
1 1/2 tbsps. butter
2 1/2 cups mashed carrots

Stir in yolks of 3 eggs. Beat whites of 3 eggs until stiff and fold in carrot mixture. Fill buttered molds with mixture, set in pan and surround with hot water. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees until firm (about 30 minutes). Unmold and serve.

Stuffed Onions
Boil white sweet onions in salt water. When nearly tender drain in collander. Take out centers, being careful not to break onions and chop fine. Season ground meat with onions, a bit of chopped parsley, 2 tbsps. bread crumbs. Fill center with mixture. Sprinkle with buttered bread crumbs and paprika and bake to delicate brown.

Cheese Ring for Salad
Use individual ring molds. Fill mold with grated American cheese and add to this enough lemon jelly that has been dissolved in 1 1/2 cups hot water to hold cheese together. Serve combination salad in center of mold. Serve on bed of lettuce.

Individual Fruit Salad
Place 1 marachino cherry in center of mold, add 1 tbspn. lemon jello that has been dissolved in hot water, then add 2 tbsps. fruit salad and fill mold with lemon jello. Serve on lettuce leaf.

Banana Salad
Cut bananas in halves lengthwise and crosswise. Roll in mayonnaise dressing, then in chopped nuts. Garnish with grapefruit sections.

Roast Beef
Wipe roast with damp cloth. Trim into neat shape if meat cutter has not done this. Salt and pepper. Place on a rack in an open roasting pan without addition of water and set in an oven at 325 degrees.
Rare, 18 to 20 minutes per lb.
Medium, 22 to 25 minutes per lb.
Well done, 27 to 30 minutes per lb.

Shrimp Creole
3 cups hot boiled rice
2 tbsps. Mrs. Tucker's shortening
2 onions sliced
4 stalks celery, chopped
2 tbsps. Gold Chain flour
1 tbspn. salt
2 cups tomatoes
2 cups peas
1 tbspn. vinegar
1 tspn. sugar
1 cups cooked shrimp
2 tbsps. chili powder
Cook onions and celery until brown in shortening, add flour, seasonings, and slowly the water. Cook 15 minutes. Add tomatoes, peas, vinegar, sugar, and shrimp, continue cooking 10 minutes or until shrimp are thoroughly heated. Mold rice either in cones or ring and surround with shrimp creole.

Frozen Salad
Mash 3 ounces of Philadelphia cream cheese in 1 cup mayonnaise, 1 1/2 cup whipped cream, contents of 1 bottle marachino cherries and 1/2 cup of chopped stuffed olives. To 1/2 of mixture add 1 cup drained crushed pineapple and cherries. Color pink, place in bottom of freezing tray then add remaining mixture, olives and color green, slice and serve on lettuce leaf with mayonnaise.
