DEATH TOLL NEAR 400 AND INCREASING

ABSOLUTE INDUSTRIAL ARMISTICE FOR A PERIOD OF SIX MONTHS IS URGED BY THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

FREEPORT, PA., Sept. 19.—An absolute industrial armistice for six months was urged by Attorney General Palmer here today to permit the solution of economic problems arising out of the changes wrought by the war.

Such a period of freedom from unrest, he declared, would result soon in increased production which would bring about an era of "easier living and better times" for all. On the other hand, the Attorney General warned, selfish demands by any one class cannot stimulate the national prosperity nor permanently benefit even those obtaining such demands by force. He strongly disapproved strikes.

Merit in Claim.

"Labor is asking a larger share of the joint product of money and labor and there is much merit in the claim," he said, "but the chance of getting it is not advanced nor the justice of it more widely recognized by the refusal of labor to produce."

The Attorney General's address was delivered at a reunion of the 78th regiment of the United States army, which was held at the hotel here today. He said that although many problems beset men's minds in these days of reconstruction, there is none which cannot be worked out "in the general interest" in a government where the people are the only rulers.

But, unless we shall be satisfied with that which is for the general interest," he continued, "and do not insist upon that which is in our own particular interest, there will be trouble and delay in the settlement. If men could learn to be patient under conditions which have resulted from the war, until a more accurate estimate of the possibilities of the situation can be made, all our problems will be sooner solved; but if impatience and selfishness shall rule and industrial peace and order be broken, it is perfectly obvious that nothing but disorder and delay can result.

Crying Need Is Peace.

The crying need of the world just now is for peace and not political peace between governments alone, but industrial peace among men also. An armistice must come; heads must cool; and anger must spend itself before men can sit together and know what is best for themselves and give due consideration to the rights of others.

"If we could have an absolute industrial armistice for America for six months, the necessary ingredients of capital, that is, both money and labor, would be active constantly in the problems of reconstruction, and the peaceful days would soon yield a spirit which would make it possible for men to solve the problems which now confront us."

ALLIED COMMANDERS THREATEN BOMBARDMENT OF FIUME UNLESS D'ANNUNZIO EVACUATES PORT

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Dispatches received by the wireless press from Berlin today quote reports from Munich and Laibach, Austria, as saying the Allied commanders have withdrawn their warships from the harbor at Fiume and have issued an ultimatum to Gabriele D'Annunzio demanding his evacuation of the port within 24 hours.

If D'Annunzio does not accede to their demand, the Allied commanders threatened to bombard the messengers state.

PARIS, Sept. 20.—Captain Gabriele D'Annunzio may be given 24 hours to move his forces out of Fiume, upon which city a squadron of Allied warships have fired their guns, according to advice received here by way of Berlin, Laibach and Vienna. It is indicated that this ultimatum will come from the Allied powers, representatives of which are reported to have conferred at Abbadia about two miles northwest of Fiume to which place they retired when Captain D'Annunzio entered the latter city.

In peace conference circles it is intimated the settlement of the question of the disposition of Fiume has been complicated by the D'Annunzio coup but Italian delegates insist a decision is being delayed because of the fact that President Wilson has not answered definite proposals made by Italy's representatives here. Americans assert the Italians are constantly changing the detail of their offer and that, for this reason, an answer has so far been impossible.

REQUESTS ENACTMENT OF LAW PROVIDING JAIL SENTENCES FOR PROTECTORS OVER THE COUNTRY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—Judge Ames, assistant attorney general, today wrote to Chairman Hagen of the House Agricultural Committee urging immediate passage of the amendments to the Lever food control bill providing jail sentences for profiteers.

Acting for Attorney General Palmer, Ames took this action following an announcement by the Labor department that food prices increased one per cent during August, reaching the highest level yet known.

The amendment upon which Ames asked immediate action has been before Congress more than a month and is now in conference between the House and Senate.

FAMOUS ITALIAN CITY PLUNGED INTO ANARCHY



Twenty-six thousand Italian troops are now in Fiume, according to the latest advice to the Italian peace delegation in Paris. The British and French troops have left the city, lowering their flags at D'Annunzio's request. The Italians are being reinforced constantly by deserters from the regular organization. It is feared in general conference circles that the Nitti government may fall because of the Premier's denunciation of D'Annunzio. The Supreme Council in Paris decided to let Italy deal with the situation created at Fiume by D'Annunzio's occupation of the city, deeming it purely an internal matter.

ORGANIZES FORCES FOR STRIKE OF STEEL WORKERS MONDAY

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Sept. 20.—Steel companies were reported today to have rented all the halls in Braddock and Homestead in the hope of preventing meetings of steel workers after their strike on Monday. Union officials meanwhile assert that the men will insist upon their right of assembly and will find places to meet.

In the absence of positive developments in the impending strike, aside from one or two mills closing temporarily, all manner of reports and rumors of preparations being made by the companies floated about Pittsburgh. These had to do with stringing of barbed wire and alleged graining of plants, but all were beyond verification.

The Allegheny and West Penn Mills at Brackenridge suspended operations today to enable the men to hold a meeting at which they will consider the action they will take with regard to the strike. The company, at the same time, issued a statement asserting its opposition to the closed shop. In event of a closed shop, it was stated, the plant will endeavor to continue to operate with loyal employees.

Secretary Foster of the steel workers' committee, claims several independent steel plants are already negotiating for settlements.

All companies in the Pittsburgh district profess little concern over a general walkout and declare their plants will open as usual on Monday.

PREPARATIONS FOR
GIGANTIC BATTLE

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Preparations for a gigantic industrial battle were made here today with a strike of steel workers practically certain.

Unions denied any intention of force. Steel companies dotting the entire Chicago industrial district regardless of the denials fortified themselves for a siege. Food in huge quantities was taken behind the high wooden barricades which surround most of the plants.

Company officials asserted only a minority of their employees would strike. They expected to keep loyal workers inside the plant for so long a time as necessary. It was denied arrangements had been made for the strike until the round table conference here October 6.

"We don't know whether or not we'll be alive by then," said Fitzpatrick. "Our organizers are being shot down in Pennsylvania."

JUDGE GARY IS AWAY
FROM OFFICE TODAY

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Judge Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation, was not at his office here today and will not be there during the day, it was stated by secretaries.

He refused to say whether he had left the city for steel mill districts, but made it plain that no further statement from the corporation would be forthcoming today. They would neither confirm nor deny published statements relative to the policy of the corporation during the strike, except to reiterate that a closed shop will not be countenanced.

INTEREST IN POLICEMEN'S
STRIKE NOW CENTERS ON
BOSTON CAR MEN'S UNION

BOSTON, Sept. 20.—Interest in the policemen's strike now nearing the close of the second week, was directed today to the possible action of the Boston car men's union, made up of employees of the Boston Elevated Railway system. A special meeting of the union is to be held tonight to consider "what action should be taken with reference to the present situation in Boston." Members of the police union were invited to be present.

PRESIDENT EXTENDS HIS
FELICITATIONS TO MEXICO

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—Text of a message sent by President Wilson under date of September 16 to President Carranza expressing congratulations to the Mexican people on their independence day was made public today by the state department.

"I take pleasure," the President said, "in extending to Your Excellency on this anniversary of the independence of Mexico my cordial felicitations and best wishes for the peace, prosperity and progress of the Mexican people."

FIRST CONVICTIONS
RESULT OF RIOTS

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—The first convictions on charges of participating in race riots here in July were life sentences imposed today on Walter Colvin, 16, and Chas. Johnson, 18, negroes.

They were charged with having killed a peddler.

MANY BELIEVE THAT NUMBER WHO LOST LIVES IN HURRICANE WILL BE NEAR ONE THOUSAND

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX., Sept. 20.—With the known dead near the 400 mark and steadily increasing, residents of Corpus Christi and other nearby Texas coast towns today resumed their dreary search for the bodies of additional persons who lost their lives through last Sunday's hurricane and tidal wave.

The number of known dead early today was 356, but many persons were of the opinion that it would be double that number when all of the shore line and wreckage had been thoroughly searched.

In Corpus Christi proper conditions were becoming more normal today. Although electric lights and street car service may not be restored for some time, the announcement that it had hoped to turn on gas in some of the less damaged parts of the city late today was hailed with delight.

Committees Praised.

Praise was being given today to the many relief committees and organizations that have worked untiringly all week to alleviate the distress of the thousands of homeless persons.

According to a statement issued by the principal relief committee last night, clothing and financial assistance constitute the immediate needs of the refugees and the people of the nation were called upon to render assistance along that line. The food situation was said to be satisfactory, due to the large quantities of supplies hurried into the storm area by federal and state authorities.

TRANSPORTATION TANGLE
IS BEGINNING TO CLEAR

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX., Sept. 20.—The transportation tangle in the Texas Gulf storm district was beginning to clear today. Receding flooded rivers, cessation of the days of rainfall, which followed Sunday's hurricane and tidal wave, enabled railway men to rush repair work on their crippled lines. Road gangs had started repairing the water swept highways.

Small towns on the edge of the devastated areas still were crowded with refugees today. Through an arrangement with the United States railway administration hundreds of Mexican laborers, with their families, are being transported to other sections of the State where work awaits them.

Jobs Suddenly Gone.

Scores of cotton pickers found their jobs suddenly gone when the crop vanished before the hurricane. Officials said today the whole story of the death toll never will be known. Aviators reported seeing many swollen bodies carried out into the Gulf. Others were buried by shifting sands.

Observers who have watched through the stormy area today placed the figure at from 500 to 600. State military authorities, under Assistant Adjutant General Cope, were in full charge today. Major General Dickman, following arrangements for withdrawal of federal forces, returned to Fort Sam Houston last night.

STEAMER AGROUND
WITH 2,000 TROOPS
OF BRITISH ARMY

LONDON, Sept. 20.—An Evening News dispatch from Kirkwall today reports a White Star liner aground, south of the Orkney Islands. It is believed, says the message, that 2,000 troops from Northern Russia are on board. The liner ran aground during a gale, the dispatch adds, but gives no further details.

Ronaldshead where the White Star liner is reported aground is in the Orkney Islands, north of Scotland. The Orkneys lie along the route taken by vessels coming from the Arctic and along the Norwegian coast to British ports. Presumably the liner was carrying British troops from the Archangel sector of Northern Russia, which the British army now is evacuating.

FORT WORTH RAINSTORM
THREE AND QUARTER INCHES

FORT WORTH, TEX., Sept. 20.—Yesterday's rainstorm here, in which three and a quarter inches fell in two hours, will result in a steady rise in the Trinity river between Fort Worth and Dallas. Damage to crops is heavy, especially northwest and southwest. Some Fort Worth & Denver trains were 12 hours late because of washouts. The rain was heavy at times Friday afternoon that traffic was stopped in the streets.

ESTABLISH NEW LINE OF
JAPANESE STEAMERS

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 20.—Establishment of a new line of Japanese steamers soon to begin service to New Orleans, via Cape Horn and South American ports, was announced here today by a representative of Nakamura and Company of Tokyo, Japan, the operating company.

MAKING EFFORT TO DETERMINE FATE OF STEAMSHIP AND 450 PASSENGERS AND SHIP'S CREW

KEY WEST, FLA., Sept. 20.—With a wrecking crew and divers examining the sunken hull and with scores of boats searching surrounding waters and islands for trace of bodies or survivors, the fate of the 450 passengers and members of the crew of the Spanish steamer Valbanera which foundered during the hurricane last week, was expected to be cleared up today. The naval station here has offered all facilities and with two Cuban gunboats will aid other craft in the search.

The Valbanera, bound from Spanish ports to Havana, was last heard from on the night of September 3, when she appeared off the entrance to Havana harbor. Yesterday a steamer bearing that name but reported by divers to be much smaller than the missing vessel, was found sunk off Rebecca Shoals light, 40 miles from Key West.

The wreck was located by the coast guard cutter Tuscarora and the submarine chaser 203 and was resting on a bed of quicksand in about 40 feet of water. Divers sent to examine the hull by the Cuban consul here reported the wreck bore the name Valbanera but said the vessel appeared only half as large as the missing liner.

Eisign B. R. Roberts, commander of the submarine chaser, also said he had seen the name plate Valbanera on the wreck and his statement confirmed belief that the sunken vessel was the one sought. There were no bodies in the vicinity of the wreck and nothing to indicate what had become of the 450 passengers and 151 members of the crew.

Further examination today of the wreck is expected to show whether those on board got away in small boats. None has been picked up but search of the surrounding waters and adjacent islands is being continued in the hope that some survivors might have reached land and that bodies will be found. Most of those on the ill-fated steamer were Spaniards or Cubans.

Reports that during the last several days faint wireless calls supposed to be from the Valbanera had been picked up continued today to be a mystery. The calls were said to have been picked up here and at Havana but were so weak as to prevent any effort toward locating their source.

THE CONSTITUTION.

The Constitution of the United States is a great and venerable document, but we know of no particular reason why it should be regarded as a theology, or why anybody who finds fault with it should be branded as a political heretic, according to the gospel of some of its vehement champions.

We know much more about the Constitution of the United States than the men who adopted it in convention 132 years ago, because we have had the experience of those 132 years and accordingly have earned the right to criticize it.

Since then it has been amended 18 amendments and a nineteenth is now pending before the Legislatures of the several states. Of those amendments two have been nullified in their entirety and another has been nullified in part.

The tenth amendment, which was the solemn guarantee of individual liberty, has now been destroyed by the eighteenth amendment, which wrecks the police power of the states and gives Congress power to regulate the personal habits and the personal liberty of the citizen. In the legislation to enforce this amendment the sixth amendment, which guarantees the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, is practically swept away.

Although the fifteenth amendment was ratified nearly 60 years ago, the right of citizens of the United States to vote is still denied on account of race and color. Congress has never lifted a finger to enforce the reduction in representation provided for by the fourteenth amendment when the right to vote is denied. The constitutional method of electing the President of the United States has been ignored for a hundred years. The method that is now in force is wholly extra-constitutional, and the electoral college in practice merely registers the popular vote in the several states on nominations made by national conventions which have neither constitutional nor legal standing. The most extraordinary fact in this connection is that no presidential elector has ever asserted his legal authority and been false to his moral trust.

On the gravest domestic issue that has arisen in the history of the country no solution could be found in the Constitution and a distracted people finally resorted to civil war. The failure to provide any means of settling a contested presidential election, but led to another civil war in 1876. The original purpose of the Constitution to establish a government of three independent co-ordinate branches long ago broke down. From the very outset the President was forced by circumstances to become the leader of his party, and this position of leadership made him the initiator of legislation. In times of crisis practically all legislation originates not in Congress but in the executive, and the President has come to be a Prime Minister as well as a President, without the direct responsibility of a Prime Minister to Parliament and people.

While the Federal courts are still nominally independent, they exercise powers that they do not expressly delegate to them by the Constitution, but which are held by their own assertion of inherent powers, and because of this power of life and death over legislation, every President appoints Judges who, for the most part, are in sympathy with the general policies of his party and his administration.

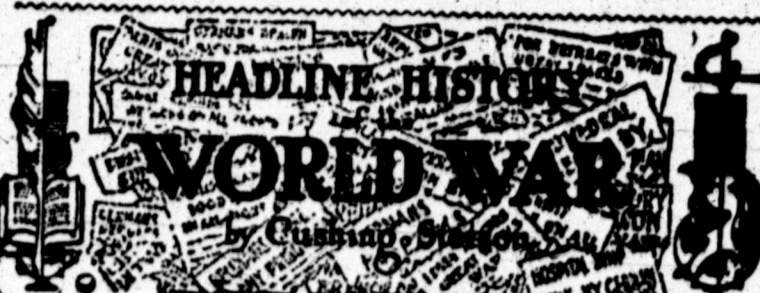
Nobody could be more astonished than the Fathers if they could see how their Constitution had worked out in practice. It is doubtful if they would recognize it as their child. Yet the fact remains that under this charter of government, in spite of all its numerous defects, the American people have achieved a most extraordinary political, economic, industrial and financial development. The trouble that they have had under it have been due chiefly to their own impulsiveness, their own impatience and their own folly, and against stupidity the gods

WILL THE BIG NOISE BE BATTING OR PITCHING IN COMING WORLD SERIES

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Opinion is divided on what will be the big noise in the world's series—batting or pitching.

John McGraw is foremost among the authorities who predict the 1919 championship banner will go to the team that gets the best pitching. Others maintain it will be the heavy artillery that will decide the series. There is the third group, which comes out, rather safely in predicting that in the present case it will be a combination of the two departments that will be the winning factor.

Many fans are getting away from the early theory that Moran has Gleason licked in the pitching department. Recent work of Dicky Kerr and Bill James and the promise shown by Roy Williams, late of the American Association, is making the bugs believe the White Sox aren't in such bad way for pitchers. Followers of the prospective American League champions maintain that out of his raft of pitchers Moran has only three dependable enough to be given a chance in the big fight—Salles Reuther and Eller. And they claim Gleason has three just as good in Cicotte, Williams and Kerr.

In the hitting, the fans generally grant the advantage to the American Association leader, Judson Collins. Gandi and Weaver have maulled every hurler on Ban Johnson's circuit and the Red pitchers don't seem super enough to stamp them out. Moran has two good swatters in Roush and Grob and the recruit sensation, Duncan, has been forging to the front with timely stick work. He may be the big noise of the series for Moran.

REQUESTS FOR TICKETS SURPASSES ANY SERIES

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Requests for reservations for the world series games to be played in Chicago between the Cincinnati Nationals and the Chicago Americans today began coming into the local club's headquarters, at a rate which surpasses any previous world's series here. All requests for reserved tickets must be made through the mail. The White Sox have to win one of their remaining seven games to clinch the pennant, even though Cleveland should win all its remaining games. The finish then would be:

DECLINE TO CANCEL NATIONAL AGREEMENT

TWO-STORY BUILDING AND TWO STOCKS OF GOODS WERE DESTROYED.

OTHER PROPERTY DAMAGED

Fire Starts Shortly After Midnight as Result of Defective Motor.

Fire originating from a defective motor in an electric fan caused a loss aggregating about \$55,000 at Iowa Park shortly after 12:00 o'clock this morning. The loss was itemized for a Times reporter as follows:

L. N. Lochridge, 2-story brick building, \$15,000.
Sam Yawitz, men's furnishing goods stock, \$15,000.
L. M. Garner, dry goods stock, \$20,000.

First State bank, window and desk destroyed, \$100.
Offices in second story of building, \$3,500.

Household effects, \$500.

Absence of any wind and a brick partition wall between the Yawitz store, in which the fire originated, and the First State bank doubtless saved the major portion of Iowa Park from destruction. For an hour, it seemed as if the town would be wiped out and frantic calls were sent Wichita Falls for assistance.

Fire Chief McClure knew, however, that the city's apparatus could not travel the muddy, cut up roads, and did not attempt to reach the fire with any equipment, but he, Chief of Police Smith, Motorcycle Officer Moore and a Times reporter made a wild taking a quantity of dynamite, which ride to Iowa Park in an automobile, had been requested when it was thought the town was doomed. The flames had spent themselves, though, when the automobile from this city arrived.

The fire was discovered by W. S. Penrod, who conducts a picture theater in Iowa Park. This was at 12:16 o'clock. The flames had gained much headway in the Yawitz store, and, lacking fire-fighting equipment, back of brigades sent against them were powerless to combat them.

The fire spread to the Garner store and then to the upper story of the building, where were located the offices of the New Era Refining Co., the Como Oil Co., and the living rooms of the Yawitz family and of another family whose name could not be learned.

Practically all of the Garner stock of goods, valued at about \$20,000 and covered by \$15,000 in insurance, and all of the Yawitz stock, worth \$15,000, were destroyed, as were the household belongings and clothing and other personal effects of the two families residing there and all papers, furniture and fixtures in the offices.

At 3:30 o'clock this morning no one could be found who knew whether any papers or other articles of special value had been burned when the refinery and oil company's offices were destroyed.

Mr. Lochridge carried \$10,000 in insurance on the building. That part of it occupied by the bank, of which Lochridge is president, was not seriously damaged, and it may be that the walls, which still were standing, may be used in the reconstruction of the building. The building was new, having been completed and occupied

WICHITA CITIZEN IN CORPUS CHRISTI DURING THE STORM

SAYS PEOPLE OF THAT CITY HAD NO NOTICE OF SEVERE DISTURBANCE.

GIVES VIVID DESCRIPTION

Was Stopping at Hotel Which Was Completely Demolished by the Hurricane.

People in Corpus Christi were not advised of the hurricane warnings issued by the government, according to C. H. Wittenbach, Wichita Falls grocer, who was visiting in Corpus Christi at the time of the storm, and who is believed to be the first person to reach Wichita Falls from that place. Mr. Wittenbach reached Wichita Falls Thursday, having left Corpus Christi Tuesday by the only open railroad route, a roundabout way through Sinton and Robstown which necessitated a five mile walk around a washout.

"People in Corpus Christi were merely notified that a slight gale was expected, and had no notice whatever that a hurricane had been predicted," said Mr. Wittenbach.

The Wichita gave a very vivid description of the storm scenes where the water raged through the streets in places as much as 15 feet deep, taking frame buildings down two or three in a row, and all but demolished the more substantial structures of brick and concrete.

Structures for the most part are standing, the interiors of the buildings are completely wrecked and gutted of their contents. Only three buildings are

left on the North Beach, the North Beach hotel, a school building and the hospital.

Hotel Demolished.

Mr. Wittenbach was stopping at the Blazer hotel which was demolished, those in the hotel making their escape before the structures being wrecked through an upstairs window into the second story of a brick business building opposite, carrying with them on a board one of the guests of the hotel who had been sick for some time before the storm.

Probably the most satisfactory remembrance of Mr. Wittenbach of the disaster is the success of his efforts to restrain the people, about 25 in number, who were in the building with him, from trying to make their escape. As the waves were rushing by at a depth of 10 feet around the building, he is certain that their attempt to leave the building would have resulted in the death of everyone who left.

Relief supplies rushed from Brownsville, which were the first to reach the place, averted a great deal of suffering, Mr. Wittenbach stated.

Belief that many bodies will be found to have been washed a considerable distance inland from the rear reaches of Corpus Christi bay, and that these bodies will considerably swell the death total, was expressed by Mr. Wittenbach. This belief was strengthened by the finding of nearly 50 bodies along the railroad line by the party with whom he left Corpus Christi. These bodies were buried at Sinton. "I saw a lot of Pelicans who were drowned in the storm," said Mr. Wittenbach. "If it was too much for those fellows, what kind of a chance do you think we had?"
