New York, N. Y. Sept. 25—Private James F. Bull Perryton, who recently enlisted in the United States regular army, sailed recently from New York City aboard the army transport, "St. Michel", bound for the Panama Canal Zone.

Private Bull in volunteering for duty in Panama, selected the air corps branch of the service, and upon arrival in the Canal Zone he will be assigned to one of those units on duty there. FIVE INJURED IN CAR WRECKS

EPIDEMIC OF CAR ACCIDENTS IN AND NEAR PERRYTON DURING PAST WEEK SIX WEEKS

An epidemic of automobile wrecks and collisions in and near Perryton during the past week resulted in serious injuries to five people and the junking of about a dozen cars. The worst accident was the head-on collision on last Saturday evening of the new Tudor Ford driven by Thurman Boren with a Ford roadster driven by Elmer Bennett, on the state highway just south on the grade through Perryton lake.

Thurman Boren and his sister, Miss Mavis Boren, were coming into Perryton from their home. Elmer Bennett and Miss Clara Bell were driving south. The cars met on the lake grade when Boren turned out to pass a car which was ahead of him. He did not see the approaching Bennett car and as he pulled out to go around, the two cars met head-on. The occupants of both cars were severely injured. Miss Boren's injuries being very serious. She suffered a broken left knee cap with the leg fractured below the knee and many severe cuts and bruises. The other young people in this accident are under the care of physicians suffering from numerous cuts and bruises. Both cars evidently were going at a high rate of speed judging from the damage done to the two automobiles.

Leonard McGaughey narrowly escaped serious injuries when the Ford truck which he was driving for the Hi-Test Service Station turned turtle near the Shearer Cold Storage plant on Wednesday morning. The exact cause of this spill will probably never be known. McGaughey was not driving very fast at the time. It is supposed that either something went wrong with the steering mechanism or a tire blew out causing the truck to flip over. It was thought at first that McGaughey's skull was fractured as he had a number of deep cuts on his head. He will probably be out in a few days as soon as he recovers from the heavy loss of blood.

A number of other accidents have occurred in which fortunately nobody was injured. The Willys-Knight sedan, owned by W. C. Barber and driven by Melvin Manning flopped over several times on the highway just north of town on last Sunday afternoon. None of the young people in the car were injured and very little damage done to the car.

Ray Nelson's Essex coach driven by Earl Gibson, and a new Pontiac coupe driven by Gene Mayfield collided at a street intersection in the southwest part of town last week end. No one was injured. The Pontiac came out second best in this mix-up.

At least two cars were damaged in a series of accidents on last Saturday night on the state highway a few miles west of Notia.

A new culvert is being put in by the state highway department and it is reported that the old culvert was out with no stop sign or danger signal up. Ira Ferguson of the Perryton Coca-Cola had stopped to help another car out that had run into the open ditch when a car driven by a Mr. Kelley from Canadian came along at a high rate of speed. When the Kelley car hit the open culvert, it became unmanageable and crashed into Ferguson's Star roadster, which was parked nearby injuring the occupants and damaging both cars.

A collision on the highway north of town was reported Monday night. One car was parked by the side of the road repairing a tire when another car headed into it. No injuries were reported. And still practically every automobile advertisement that we read, stresses speed above everything else.

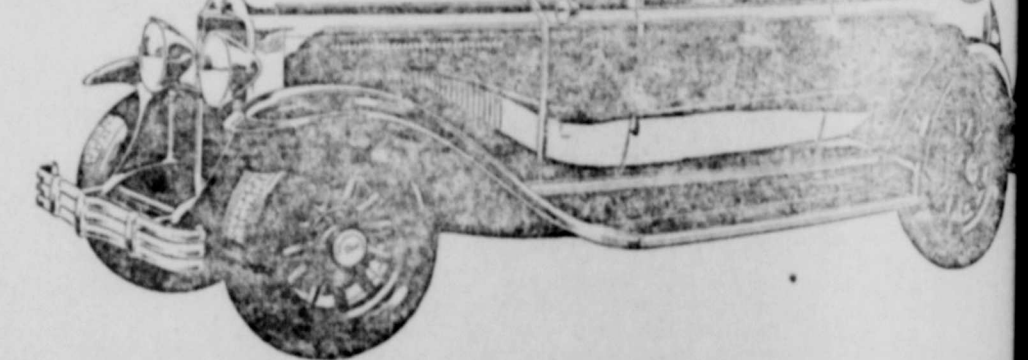

An Unusual Sentence

Judge Sentences Criminal in One Of New Mexico's Most Famous Old Cases

An old murder case, the details of which have long been forgotten, was recalled in a recent issue of the Dallas Morning News, and will prove particularly interesting because of the court's sentence and the reaction of the defendant.

About 1884 in what was then the Third Judicial District of the Territory of New Mexico, Jose Maria Martin (pronounced Marteen) was tried for murder. The crime must have been particularly brutal and without provocation, for the jury in the District Court at Taos promptly found him guilty.

No Roses for Jose
Judge Kirby Benedict, presiding in that district, concurred with the finding of the jury and, according to Twichell's New Mexico History, pronounced sentence on the defendant in the following words:

"Jose Maria Martin, stand up! Jose Maria Martin, you have been indicted, tried and convicted by a jury of your countrymen of the crime of murder and the court is now about to pass upon you the dread sentence of the law. As a usual thing, Jose Maria Martin, it is a painful duty for the Judge of a court of justice to pronounce on death. There is something horrible about it and the mind of the court naturally revolts from the performance of such a duty. Happily however, your case is relieved of all such unpleasant features and the court takes positive delight in sentencing you to death!

"You are a young man, Jose Martin, apparently of good physical condition and robust health. Ordinarily you might have looked forward to many years of life, and the court has not doubt you have and have expected to die at a ripe old age, but you are about to be cut off in consequence of your own act.

"Jose Maria Martin, it is now springtime: in a little while the grass will be springing up green in these beautiful valleys and on these broad mesas and mountainsides flowers will be blooming; birds will be singing their sweet carols and nature will be putting on her most gorgeous and attractive robes and life will be pleasant and men will want to stay; but none of this for you, Jose Maria Martin; the flowers will not bloom for you, Jose Maria Martin; the birds will not sing for you, Jose Maria Martin; when these things come to gladden the senses of men you will be occupying a space about 6x2 beneath the sod and the green grass and those beautiful flowers will be growing above your lowly head.

The Judge's Parting Words

"The sentence of the court is: That you be taken from this place to the county jail; that you be there kept safely and securely confined in the custody of the sheriff until the day appointed for your execution. Be very careful, Mr. Sheriff, that he have no opportunity to escape and that you have him at the appointed place at the appointed time. That you be so kept, Jose Maria Martin, until—Mr. Clerk, on what day of the month does Friday, about two weeks from time, come?"

"March 22, your honor."
"Very well, until Friday, March 22, when you will be taken by the Sheriff from your place of confinement to some safe convenient spot within the county (that is in your discretion, Mr. Sheriff, you are only confined to the limits of this county) and that you be there hanged by the neck until you are dead, and the court was about to add, Jose Maria Martin, 'May God have mercy upon your soul,' but the court will not assume the responsibility of asking an all-wise Providence to do that which a jury of your peers has refused to do. The Lord could not have mercy on your soul! However, if you affect any religious belief, or are connected with any religious organization, it might be well for you to send for your priest or your minister and get him, well, such consolation as you can; but the court advises you to place no reliance upon anything of that kind!"
"Mr. Sheriff, remove the prisoner."

The sentence must have been too much for Jose Maria Martin, for shortly afterward he made good his escape and was never heard of again.

TEN WHEAT SOWING ESSENTIALS

Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association
By H. M. Bainer, Director

1. The best seed obtainable is none too good. The resulting crop is determined, to a large extent, by the kind of seed sown.

2. The old standard varieties should not be discarded for newer varieties unless there is definite assurance that they are better.

3. Rye in wheat is an unnecessary waste; it lowers the grade and decreases the selling price.

4. In buying seed wheat, look out for weed seed. A large part of the dockage in wheat is nothing but weed seed.

5. The fanning mill is a great seed wheat improver. It removes weed seeds, cracked kernels, sticks, straws and chaff, insuring a more uniform stand and more vigorous plants.

6. Proper seed treatment is an absolute insurance against smut. Smut decreases the yield and lowers the price.

7. It is a mistake to sow too much seed per acre. Too thick a stand often draws too heavily on the soil moisture, causing a dwarfing of the plants, shriveling of the grain and a reduction in yield.

8. For best results, neither the extremely early or the extremely late sowing dates are as good as the dates between these extremes.

9. There is no factor that will increase the wheat yield more than

early disking, plowing or listing. Every experiment Station in the Southwest, as well as thousands of the best wheat farmers, have clearly proven that July preparation insures several bushels more wheat per acre than later work.

10. For best results wheat land should be rotated. There is no possibility of being able to maintain a healthy and highly productive soil, under a "one crop" system. Continuous cropping to wheat not only decreases the yield but increases the risk and damages by insects, plant disease and weeds.

INSIDE INFORMATION

Many fruits other than apples can be made into good vinegar. The United States Department of Agriculture has a bulletin on the subject.

Many windfall apples may be canned as sauce or pie apples. Cook them with as little water as possible, sweeten to taste, and pack boiling hot. Process five minutes in a hot water bath.

Crisp cookies are wholesome in the school lunch box. If you haven't a recipe, send for Farmers' Bulletin 1450—F. Home Baking. You will also find in it good recipes for doughnuts, for biscuits, muffins, popovers, and various kinds of cake, as well as directions for making yeast bread.

Chose designs for children's clothes with ironing in mind, whether you make the clothes yourself or buy them readymade. Fussy ruffles and queer-shaped parts take up the time of the laundress, and never look as well after washing and ironing as trim, smooth garments that are well-cut and made of interesting materials.

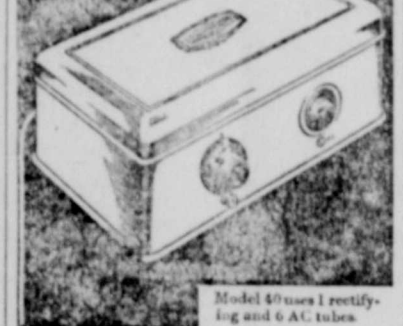
Oysters are in season again. They are extremely valuable as a source of various minerals needed by the body. Like other fresh fish, they supply iodine, and should be eaten when possible if other sea foods are hard to get. If you like fried oysters, dip them in egg and bread crumbs, and then let them stand a while to harden the coating before frying.

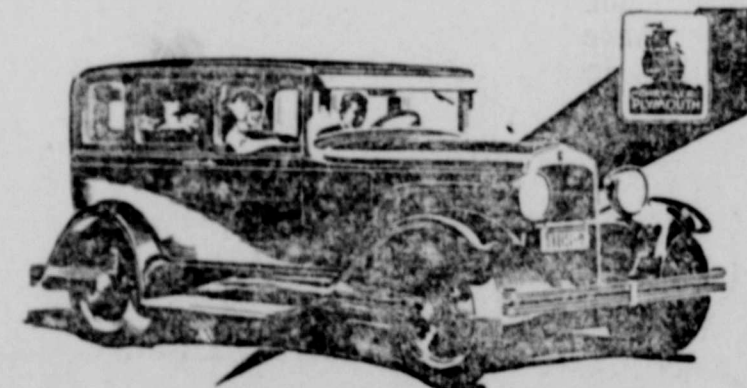

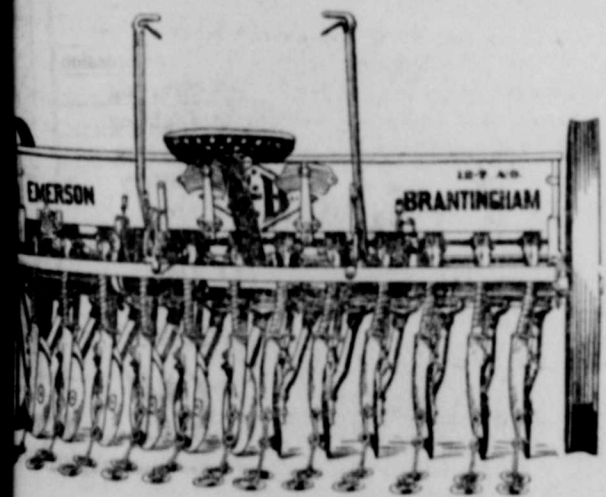

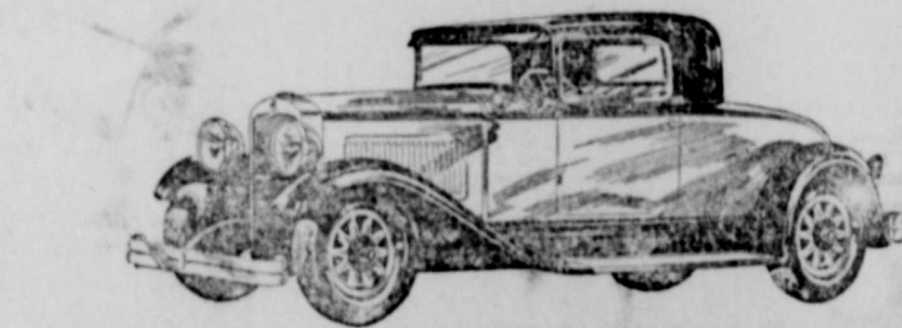
