## TWELVE OKLAHOMA BANKS CLOSED

### FAMILY OF FOUR FOUND KILLED

#### DEATHS DUE TO MURDER AND SUICIDE

##### FATHER IS BELIEVED TO HAVE SHOT KIDDIES, WIFE AND SELF

(By Associated Press)  
OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 27.—Relatives arriving today at the home of T. M. Henley, 48, near Newala, southeast of here, to spend Thanksgiving, found the Henley family, consisting of the father and mother and two children, shot to death.

Carl J. Traub, justice of the peace acting as coroner, expressed belief Henley had killed his wife, his children and himself.

Found Over Gun  
Henley's body was found over a shot gun. The bodies of his wife, Mrs. Cora May Henley, and their two daughters, Wanda June, 6, and Flora, 1, were nearby. The four had been dead approximately ten days, deputy sheriffs estimated.

Discovery of the bodies was made by C. J. Ballard, brother of Mrs. Henley, who was accompanied by his sister, Miss Annie Ballard, and their parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Ballard, all of Sulphur. They had anticipated a pleasant holiday visit.

#### FILM FIRMS ARE CHARGED

##### ANTI-TRUST VIOLATION CHARGED AGAINST 2 COMPANIES TODAY

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Attorney General William Mitchell today began two anti-trust proceedings against the Fox and Warner Brothers and other film interests charging violation of the Clayton act.

The complaints were filed in the United States district court here.

Names Warner Brothers Pictures, Inc., Stanley Company of America, controlling 25.041 shares of First National Pictures, and First National Pictures, Inc., as defendants.

In the other complaint the Fox Theaters corporation, Fox Film corporation and William Fox are named defendants.

Recent expansion activities by Fox and Warner Brothers interests, involving the purchase of stock control in competing companies, is said to be the cause of action.

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#### FIRE CAUSES HUGE DAMAGE

##### BUSINESS BLOCK IN KERENS IS BURNED EARLY TODAY

(By Associated Press)  
KERENS, Nov. 27.—A business block of Kerens was destroyed by fire which burned more than two hours before it was brought under control today by the fire department of Kerens and Corsicana.

Seven stores, all one-story frame and brick structures, were burned to the ground. An explosion, cause undetermined, tore the roof off one of the structures. The loss is estimated at \$100,000 to \$150,000.

Started In Cafe  
The fire was believed to have started in a cafe, stores in the path of the flames included a grocery, two dry goods companies, a garment company, a tailor shop and a hardware store.

The Kerens fire department fought the flames unaided for more than a hour, summoning the Corsicana equipment only after the surrounding business district appeared in danger.

A hose and chemical truck from Corsicana, 14 miles away, started for Kerens but were delayed because of heavy fog.

#### BUILDING IN LUBBOCK TO CLIMB HIGHER

##### EXPENDITURE OF OVER \$5,000,000 SEEN IN CITY AND COUNTY

While a sectional reaction to President Hoover's urge to speed up public work to stimulate industrial and trade conditions is almost certain, a local stimulus to pending projects is contemplated by Lubbock city and county officials, who announced today a proposed program of construction which will aggregate an expenditure of \$5,796,372 for 1930.

In response to request from Governor Moody, Mayor Harley D. Woods informed the state executive today that Lubbock contemplates an approximate \$650,000 expenditure for municipal improvements in 1930 and estimated that the building permits for the year will probably reach \$2,100,000 valuations.

Estimates Lower  
"While the estimated building valuations for 1930 are much lower than this year's figures, we believe that construction will be substantial enough to answer employment needs," said Mr. Woods. "We do not contemplate that 1930 will be the peer of 1929 in building permits, because many needed and major projects, such as the Hotel Lubbock addition and the new Hilton hotel have been included in this year's valuations."

Included in the \$650,000 municipal improvements are the new Avenue H subway, now under construction, paving projects and sewer and water extensions.

#### To Get Benefits

Lubbock county will play a great part in the locally beneficial program, provided all present proposals crystallize. Judge Robert H. Bean outlined today a program for 1930 which would necessitate an expenditure of \$100,000.

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#### Two Are Arrested For Theft Of Car

### SUDDEN DEATH LAST NIGHT OF LARGE STOCKHOLDER IS CAUSE OF CLOSINGS TODAY

##### "FROZEN ASSETS" BLAMED FOR THE FAILURE OF INSTITUTIONS; \$2,520,976 ON DEPOSIT

(By Associated Press)  
OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 27.—C. Graves Shull, state bank commissioner, announced today that 12 state banks failed to open their doors today. The closings were an immediate result of the sudden death last night of H. A. McCauley, 55, of Sapulpa, who was interested in all twelve.

Representatives of the state bank department were placed in charge at each institution.

Those Closed  
The banks announced to be closed were: Sapulpa State bank; The Bank of Mounds; Henryetta State bank; Bank of Commerce, Weleetka; First State bank, Vian; Citizens State bank, Weleetka; Falls; Davenport State bank; Oilton State bank; First State bank, Teriton; Avant State bank; Keystone State bank, and the Bank of Kellyville.

Total deposits of the 12 failed banks as of October 4, given in the last statements to the bank commission were \$2,520,976. Capital stock totaled \$310,000.

President of Nine  
McCauley was president of all the banks those at Henryetta, Weleetka, Falls and Vian.

Commissioner Shull attributed the failures to "frozen assets."

McCauley had \$50,000 life insurance which was made payable to the banks which he controlled. Shull said most of the money was to go to the Sapulpa bank.

Shull said there was a possibility the bank at Henryetta, the one at Sapulpa and possibly one or two others would be reopened in the near future.

McCauley, former mayor of Sapulpa, died of apoplexy, it was said by the physician, Dr. P. E. Lewis. C. J. Alexander, assistant state bank commissioner, in charge of the affairs of the Sapulpa State bank, said he understood McCauley was in Tulsa yesterday, attempting to arrange a loan to carry the Sapulpa

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#### HANGING CASE PROBE CLOSED

##### NO ACTION IS TAKEN IN RATLIFF'S CASE AT EASTLAND

(By Associated Press)  
EASTLAND, Nov. 27.—The special grand jury called here to investigate the lynching of Marshall Ratliff, banker, was dispersed today, having utilized its voluminous mass of testimony to the regular jury which convenes December 2.

The short time intervening before the date for the regular jury to meet was given as the reason for dispersing without definite action toward his band's hangman.

Deplorable Affair  
In a report the jury called the lynching a "deplorable" affair, and said that because of the "magnitude of the offense" and the short time left it recommended all information be turned over to the incoming grand jury. The special jury examined 150 witnesses during its four days of deliberation.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Acting Chief of Detectives E. D. Ellis reported today investigation has indicated that William F. Purdie, 25, arrested here on a robbery charge and held in jail, is not Robert Hill, escaped convict from the Texas state prison.

Ellis said he had found evidence indicating Purdie had been serving a 14-months sentence in Leavenworth federal prison at the time Hill escaped.

#### PURDIE NOT HILL, OFFICERS REPORT

Purdie still is held for Texas authorities on robbery and burglary charges. He is accused of the theft of an automobile and burglary of several homes in Burk Burnett, Texas.

### JURY GIVES \$10,000 VERDICT ON SUIT FOR ALIENATION

WACO, Nov. 27. (AP)—Willard Wigley was awarded \$10,000 damages by a jury in 54th district court here Monday in his suit against Pio Crespi, alleging alienation of his wife's affections and asking \$10,000. The former Mrs. Wigley is now Mrs. Pio Crespi. Of the damages, \$5,000 was actual and \$5,000 exemplary.

Wigley is a furniture dealer in Waco. Crespi is a cotton buyer and publisher. He was a neighbor of Wigley at the time the events charged in the suit took place. Later he moved to Dallas, where he and Mrs. Crespi, the former Florence Patten Wigley, now reside.

Divorced on Same Day  
Willard Wigley and his wife and Pio Crespi and his wife were divorced on the same day, November 1, 1927. Shortly afterward Wigley filed suit for \$10,000, charging alienation of Mrs. Wigley's affections. The following February, the former Mrs. Wigley became Mrs. Pio Crespi.

Wigley has custody of the two children of their marriage.

The jury decided the case on ten special issues, answering them all "yes."

### Girl Fliers Forced Down In Endurance

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# SOUTH PLAINS ECONOMIC CONDITIONS SOUND, BANKERS DECLARE

## YEAR'S CLOSE FINDS AREA'S STATUS GOOD

### DIVERSIFICATION IS GIVEN CREDIT FOR PROSPERITY

Substantial liquidation of loans and a national response to increased diversification have placed economic conditions in the Lubbock area on a substantial basis as the year closes, according to bankers given today by two local financial institutions.

Financial condition of the South Plains is better than it has been for three years," said C. E. Hargrave, president of the Lubbock National bank. "Bank deposits have increased to unprecedented figures and collections have been improving substantially during the harvest season."

Reasonably Secure  
"The business personnel of the area will enter 1930 in the face of reasonable security. Hailstorms and other misfortunes which spotted the section several months ago have not been felt widespreadly. Present indications point to a cotton crop which will exceed that of last year, and on the other hand the recent bountiful offering of moisture has placed a good season in the ground for the start of a new year."

Lubbock is fortunate in that the spirit of building activities of 1929 have assured adequate housing, periodically at least, for early 1930 expansion.

Union Views Development  
O. L. Slalon, president of the First National bank, views the present encouraging business condition as the result of revenue from more diverse interests, much of which have been established during this year. "While cotton is still the major crop, we have also realized considerable rural returns from poultry and dairy development," he said.

Deposits Higher  
Deposits in Lubbock's three banks at the close of business November 26, aggregated \$5,539,531.55, as compared with a total of \$4,272,163.47 for the same date last year.

Francis Baker, president of the Citizens National bank, refused an interview, explaining that he was too busy to talk, when called upon by a representative of the Lubbock Daily Journal.

Changes in Senate Seen  
Jones May Succeed Warren; McNary May Change

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—In the forthcoming reorganization of Senate republicans necessitated by recent deaths and resignations, it appeared that Senator Wesley Jones of Washington, would advance to the chairmanship of the appropriations committee rather than shift to the chairmanship of the appropriations committee, which was made vacant by the death of Senator Warren of Wyoming.

Jones Prefers Change  
Friends of Senator Jones understand he prefers to take over the appropriations committee chairmanship, thus vacating the leadership of the commerce committee. Senator McNary is next in line for chairmanship of the commerce committee, but the Oregon senator has indicated a preference to retain the chairmanship of the agriculture committee. Senator Johnson of California, then would become chairman of the commerce committee, which will be charged with the consideration of an important part of the Hoover program for inland developments.

# Little Theater Gives First Play Of Winter Season

"The Queen's Husband" Is Presented Before Full House Here On Tuesday

PLAYING before a capacity auditorium the Lubbock Little Theater presented, "The Queen's Husband," a three act comedy by Robert E. Sherwood at the local high school Tuesday evening. This was the initial presentation of the winter season.

The setting of the play is laid in the palace of a fictitious kingdom in the North Sea. King Erick, played by Ellis R. Heinemann, Tech professor, is merely a figurehead as the play opens and more determined to play checkers with the footman than to be bothered with affairs of the State which are ably taken care of by the queen, Mrs. Alfred Strehl. Indeed from the beginning the powers go to the queen. General Northrup the Prime Minister, ably played by Frank Kent, and Lord Birken, whose roles was taken by Dr. Leroy T. Patton.

A complication which arises early in the play and is understood by the king, his daughter and his secretary is the romance which has started when Princess Anne, Miss Sophia Fawcett, falls in love with an untitled personage, none other than the king's secretary, acted by Johnny Campbell. The Queen determines to go to America in the cause of her country and gain sympathy and incidentally a few million dollars. For the other than merely casual observer there is a terrible intimation that the Queen is not unlike Queen Marie of Romania.

This thought gains evidence when it is revealed that she is quite desirous that her daughter marry a neighboring emperor, played by Lennis Baker, whom the princess has never seen and knows only by a unsavory reputation. The Queen insists that the princess owes a duty to her country.

Northrup, Lord Birken and Major Blunt, Charles Roderick, fight a revolution against anarchists and radicals and there is fear for the king's safety evidence by everyone except the king who keeps one in doubt as to his being a person of much ingenuity or merely "dumbness."

**Colorful Costumes**  
The Princess appearing every few minutes in a different costume added color to the scenes and made quite a lovely addition to a play that was inclined to drag in spite of the king's and the secretary's plan to elope, aided in their plottings by the king, but at last moment Anne refuses to leave her father.

The Queen returns from America with her borrowed millions and hundreds of press clippings, and decided that the marriage between her daughter and the neighboring emperor go through without delay. More complications arise during which time Laker, an anarchist, James Gordon, and Dr. Fellman, a radical, Holle Cross, have an audience with the king and queen at the same occasion that the Prime Minister and Lord Birken are present and the Prime Minister resigns in a hurry which turns out to be the very thing that the king had wanted all the time.

**Goes To Cathedral**  
The play is brought to a close when upon the departure of the queen for the cathedral, the king has guards to bring the poor secretary from the prison and asserting his powers as king and high vicar of the church performs the wedding between the princess and Granton. The king has at last made himself known as king instead of merely the queen's husband.

Unlike other Little Theater plays there appeared to be no outstanding acting done individually, although Frank Kent made an excellent and antagonistic prime minister and Enoch Dawson made an excellent footman. The king did not forget one time to come up on his intonations instead of dropping his voice at the close of his sentences, and Mrs. Strehl made a beautiful queen, especially in her royal costume.

**Minor Characters**  
Minor characters were Perley, a maid, played by Miss Doris Baugh; ladies-in-waiting, Misses Evelyn Rutherford and Ellen Graves; a soldier, Gordon Dickinson, and a sergeant, Benjamin Powell.

The excellent direction of the play was due to the efforts of Mrs. Alan Strout who worked unstintingly towards making the comedy a success. The Lubbock high school orchestra conducted by H. A. Anderson, afforded entertainment before the first curtain and between acts of the play.

## STYLE AND COLOR IMPORTANT TO GOOD GROOMING

The well groomed woman considers three things in selecting her wardrobe. Her figure—the possibilities of enhancing its good points and detracting from the poorer ones. Her face—whether it retains its youthful contours and has become matured. And lastly, her coloring—complexion, hair and eyes.

Women have made rapid strides in the art of good dressing during the past few years. They no longer permit themselves to be "talked" into buying an ill-fitting dress, of bad cut and unbecoming color, just because it boasts of good material. Quality is important, of course, but style and color are doubly so.

The new type of dresses are slightly more difficult to fit to the average figure, than the straight line, long-sleeved frocks of the past few seasons. Only the smallest waists can stand the harsh line caused by the high-waist belt. The princess line dress that depends upon shirring for its comeliness is frequently more becoming and easier to wear. Unless a woman has trim ankles, the straight length, very long gown is becoming and has a tendency to make her ankles look thick. That is why the irregular hemline is attractive because of a sense of illusion and a feeling of rhythm.

**Don't Overlook Off-Shades**  
Most women know by the color of their hair and eyes what colors to avoid. But frequently, there are off-shades of the desired color, that can be worn to splendid advantage, particularly if the woman knows the little tricks of selecting her make-up to harmonize.

For example, most women with hair bordering on the "red" shade know that the color red is to be avoided in selecting a gown or hat. Yet, the very shade that almost borders on a black in a dull color may be worn advantageously during the winter months. The type of woman has to exercise more care in her make-up and selection of clothes than any other, because nature has provided her with the most brilliant crown of all—her lovely hair. If she selects a creamy powder, not a dead white, it will blend

more readily, and her rouge and lipstick must be carefully chosen to blend with the shade of her hair—not to clash, as the reds are a quarrelsome family. Most of the shades of beige are becoming to this type, and green-blues and blue-

greens depending on the color of the eyes.

Most of the "harsh" shades should be avoided by the fair-haired girl. All of the pastel tones, particularly the blues, pale rose, Nile greens and blues, are flattering. White, pink, light blue and black are vivid complements to her in the evening. She should use a light, soft shade of rouge, a light rachel powder and a vivid lipstick, for daytime make-up, and the more vivid orange tones at night. Her eyes can be accentuated with a pale blue line.

The brown haired girl, particularly if her eyes are blue, has a greater variety to choose from. Any smart shade—wine, blue, deep yellow, and beige. Gray is one to be avoided, unless her eyes are a gray blue and her complexion fair. Black should always have a dash of white to brighten up the hair. This type of girl looks best in the brighter shades for evening wear, and scintillating gold and silver cloth is becoming to her. Her daytime make-up should be simple and clean. Use a rachel powder with a touch of rose in it and a bright lipstick. For evening, the same shade of powder with a brighter lipstick. Her eyes may be brought out with a dark brown pencil.

**For Real Brunettes**  
The true brunette, with dark tresses bordering on the "blue" tone, looks well in beige black and the darker shades that accentuate the mystery of her eyes and hair, such as dark green and violet and the rich tones of wine red.

Ivory white, black, cerise, and light dull yellow are effective for evening wear, and this type can wear the brilliant lame clothes better than any other. Her make-up should be most discreet, a natural rose rouge and a rachel powder, with a touch of orange in its foundation. Her powder and lipstick may be the same at night, but her rouge should be of the trick played by the electric lights—is best when of an orange tone. The charm of this woman lies in subtlety and so her rouge and powder must be blended carefully and softly and never over-accentuate her brilliance.

## ECKENER GETS U. S. CITATION

ZEPPELIN COMMANDER GIVEN GOLD MEDAL FOR WORLD TRIP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Dr. Hugo Eckener was awarded a gold medal today by the National Geographic Society for piloting around the world an aircraft of the type he so bitterly attacked as a newspaper editor at the time Count Zeppelin was making his first dirigible experiments.

Notification of the award was sent to Dr. Eckener through the German embassy at Washington. He plans to come here in March and at that time the medal will be presented formally by members of the society.

Attacked Earlier Trials  
The attacks of Eckener upon the early experiments by Zeppelin caused the balloonist to seek out the editor and take him on some of his flights. On one of these trips, the craft exploded just before landing, and both narrowly escaped death. Count Zeppelin threatened to give aviation after the disaster, but Eckener, already converted into an enthusiast, persuaded him to keep on and promoted the popular subscriptions that enabled him to do so.

## WARTHOUTSEN GETS AERO CLUB PLAQUETTE

BERLIN, Nov. 27. (AP)—Baron Friedrich Karl von Koenig Warthausen, who recently completed a trip around the world in a light airplane, last night was awarded the highest honor of German aviation circles, the bronze plaque of the Aero club, at a dinner of that society. The award was for "meritorious service to aviation" and Americans similarly honored have been Orville Wright, Clarence Chamberlain and Charles A. Levine.

The first to congratulate the daring young flier was United States Ambassador Jacob Gould Schurman.

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## STANDARD TO ACQUIRE FIRM

BRITISH COMPANY WILL BE UNDER U. S. IN NEW PLAN

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—The Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey, through its subsidiary, the Standard Oil Export Corporation, has offered to acquire, through an exchange of stock, the Anglo-American Oil Co. Ltd., bringing this important British distributor of petroleum products again under Standard.

Anglo-American was segregated from Standard of New Jersey in 1913, after the supreme court decision of 1911 declaring Standard a trust in violation of the Sherman law, which resulted in the splitting of the old company into 33 units. Standard Anglo-American markets oil entirely abroad. Its return to the Standard organization is believed to be desirable under the law.

To Exchange Shares  
Standard of New Jersey offered to exchange one share of Standard Oil Corporation, 5 per cent non-voting \$100 par value preferred stock for each 5-8 shares of Anglo-American ordinary shares. The offer has been approved by the directors of the British company.

In a letter to stockholders the directors urge the exchange offer be accepted. The letter points out that Anglo-American is confined to marketing and that under existing conditions a marketing company operates at a considerable disadvantage.

The Standard Oil Export Corporation, is owned jointly by the Standard Oil Corporation of New Jersey, and its operating subsidiaries, Standard Oil of Louisiana, the Carter Oil Company, and the Humble Oil and Refining Company. It handles the export business of these companies.

The national leader, accompanied by Ernest Cox, state commander, will arrive in San Antonio November 30 in time for a breakfast. He will go to Kerrville to inspect the Legion hospital and return to San Antonio that night to address the South Texas legionnaires.

A conference of the commanders and adjutants of Texas at which Bodenhamer will be the guest of honor will be held in Austin the morning of December 1.

## NEW VICTORY FOR MEDICAL SCIENCE IS SEEN IN SUCCESSFUL TREATMENT OF PERNICIOUS ANEMIA WITH LIVER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Success in the treatment of pernicious anemia by administration of liver obtained from unborn calves was revealed today by the department of agriculture.

The report was made on authority of Dr. R. P. Steddom, chief of the meat inspection service which supplied the Ohio State university hospital at Columbus, Ohio, with five pounds of foetal livers from healthy cows to be used as a last chance for saving the life of a young man suffering from aplastic anemia.

After administration of the livers in a pharmaceutical form, the patient's blood count mounted to 4,750,000 red corpuscles and the hemoglobin, or color, to 90 per cent of normal. Dr. Steddom recalled from statements forwarded by the parents at Westerville, Ohio, several weeks later, during which no further administrations were made, the patient was released from the hospital. Persons suffering from this disease rarely recover.

Dr. Steddom said today he saw in the Ohio case a new victory for medical science.

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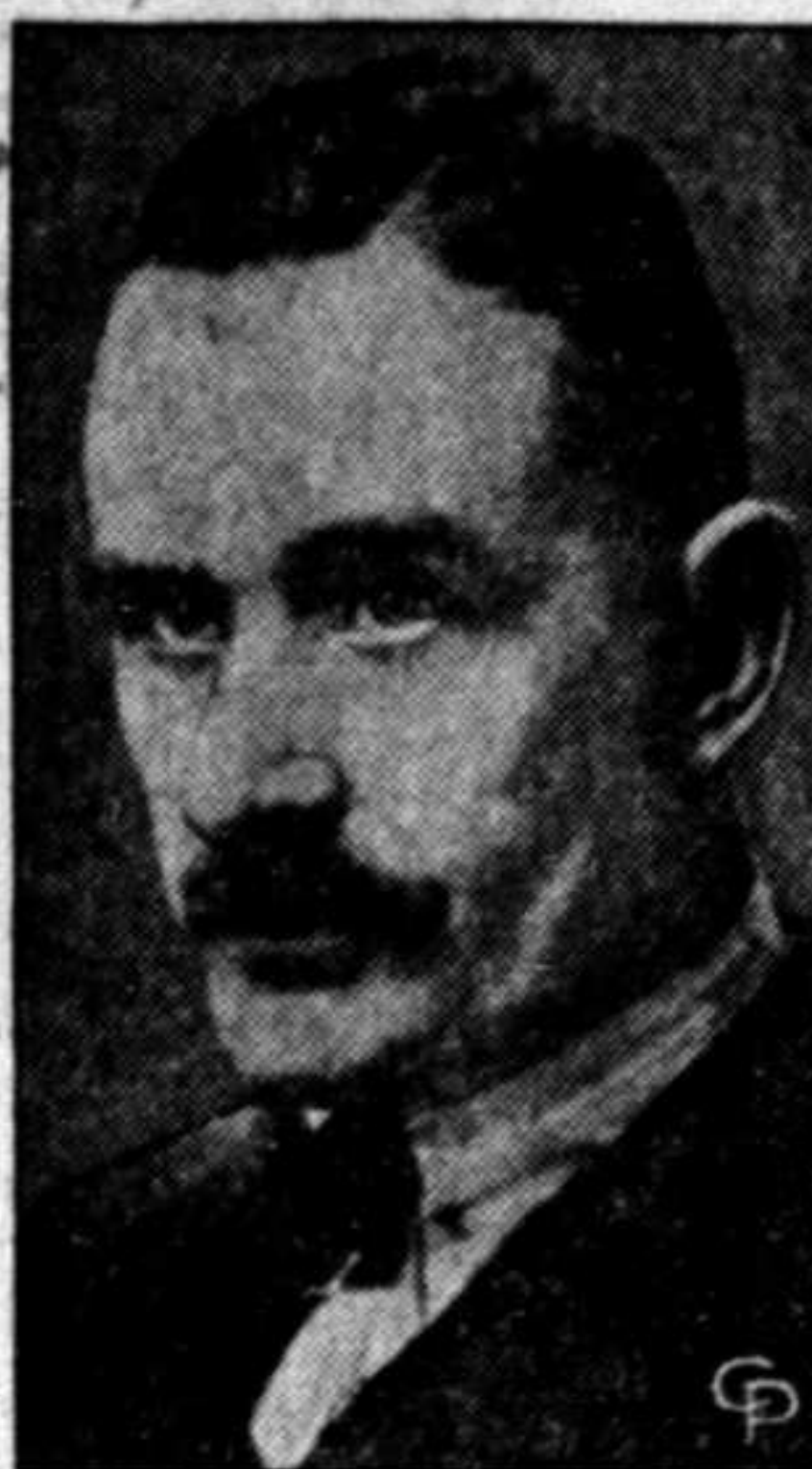

## NEW RULES ON BILLS GIVEN

MELLON ANNOUNCES A NEW METHOD FOR U. S. FINANCING

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—General rules governing the sale and issue of treasury bills, which soon are expected to be put into use as a new method of government financing, were announced today by Secretary Mellon.

The plan is to sell the bills at a discount instead of selling treasury certificates bearing interest as means of taking care of the government's temporary financial needs. It was approved by Congress last June.

Issuance Accepted  
The issuance of the regulations was accepted as indicating the treasury would use this method, at least in part, in its December financing. At that time two issues of treasury certificates are due and will total approximately \$750,000,000. Because of this officials believe the total treasury offering for the winter financing might approximate \$600,000,000.

The fourth quarter's income tax payments are due on December 15 and are expected to aggregate \$400,000,000, which amount with the sale of the certificates or bills would provide for the government financial needs until next March.

The regulations provide that the bills are bearer obligations of the United States to pay at a certain time a specified amount without interest and that they are to be sold on a discount basis. They will be issued in denominations of one thousand, ten thousand and one hundred thousand dollars and will be exempt from all taxation except estate and inheritance taxes.

The regulations further provide that the secretary of the treasury reserves the right to select the best bids and award any part or all of the issue to such bidder.

## DO C. I. A. GIRLS EAT VERY MUCH? LARGE AMOUNT OF FOOD PREPARED IN ANNUAL THANKSGIVING DINNER AT DENTON SCHOOL

(Special To The Journal)

DENTON, Nov. 27.—Thanksgiving is open season on turkeys at C. I. A. More than 135 of them will be served to the students on Thanksgiving Day in the college dining rooms.

Turkey dressing, 250 pounds of it, will be prepared by the negro cooks. The order of the dietitian for that day calls for 35 gallons of cranberries, 500 pounds of potatoes, 55 gallons of peas, 7 bushels of pickled peaches and 45 gallons of fruit salad.

Enough turkey gravy will be made to fill a 25 gallon vat. Coffee will fill a receptacle three times as large and will have 25

quarts of cream to go with it.

If every roll to be served that day were placed end to end, there would be 1000 feet of them, all baked in the college bakery. More than 450 pounds of fruit cake and 70 pounds of nuts will be served.

It is expected that about 1500 students, guests and faculty members will remain on the campus. The dinner for all of these will cost only \$1400, or less than \$1 a plate for the traditional turkey day meal.

## DAIRY FIRMS ARE MERGED

BIG COMPANY FORMED BY FOREMOST AND SOUTHWEST

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Consolidation of Foremost Dairy Products, Inc., and the Southwest Dairy Products company was arranged today at a meeting of the directors of the companies.

In connection with the proposed merger, the foremost company will increase its authorized common capital from 1,000,000 to 2,000,000 par shares. The basis for the exchange will be 1.42 shares of Foremost for one share of Southwest Dairy.

The Foremost Dairy Products, Inc., operates in Alabama, Florida, Georgia and South Carolina.

Organized in June, 1928, through the merger of about 12 smaller companies, the Southwest Dairy Products Co., has confined its operations to the southwest. Its plants are located in Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana, with the main offices of the company at Dallas.

## Daily Crude Yield Showing Increase

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The daily average gross crude oil production in the United States increased 13,250 barrels for the week ending November 23, totaling 2,831,250 barrels, says the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The daily average production east of California was 1,933,750 barrels, a decrease of 11,750 barrels.

Refineries representing 95.4 per cent of the estimated daily potential refining capacity, operating at 75.5 per cent of their capacity, reported daily average run of crude oil to stills as 2,649,100 barrels. Daily average the previous week was 2,655,300 barrels for refineries representing 94.9 per cent of potential capacity operating at 76.1 per cent of their capacity.

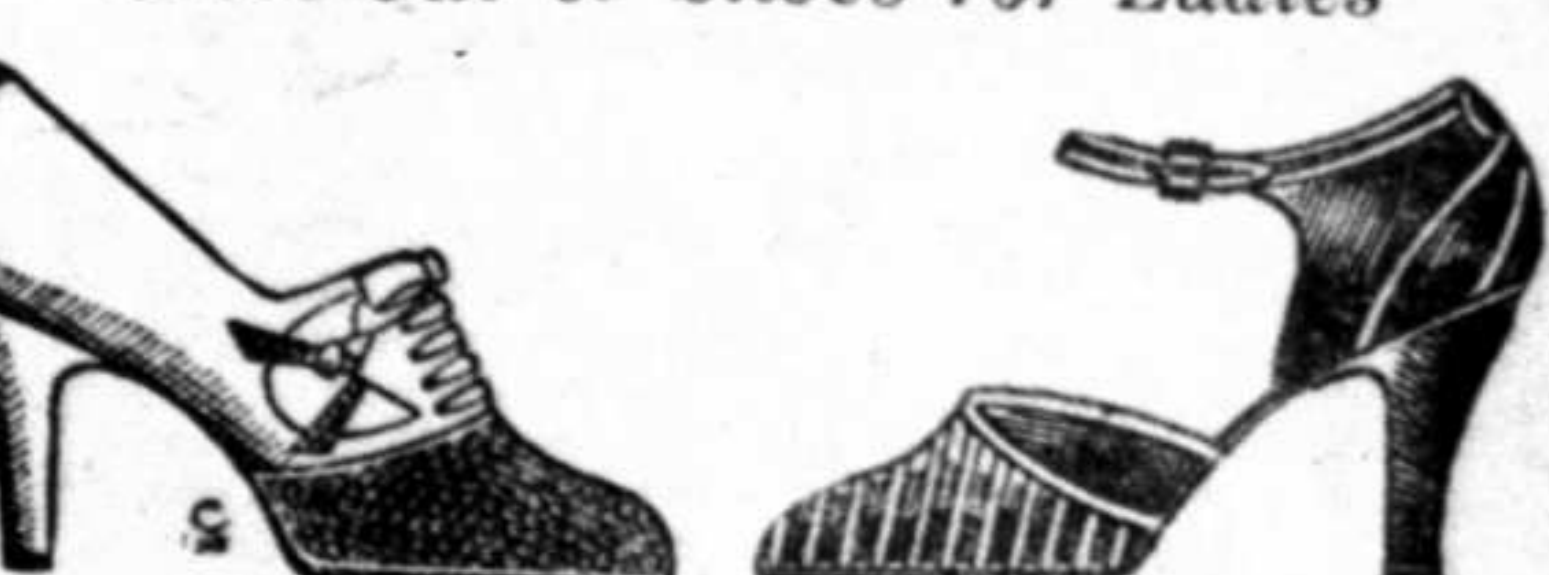

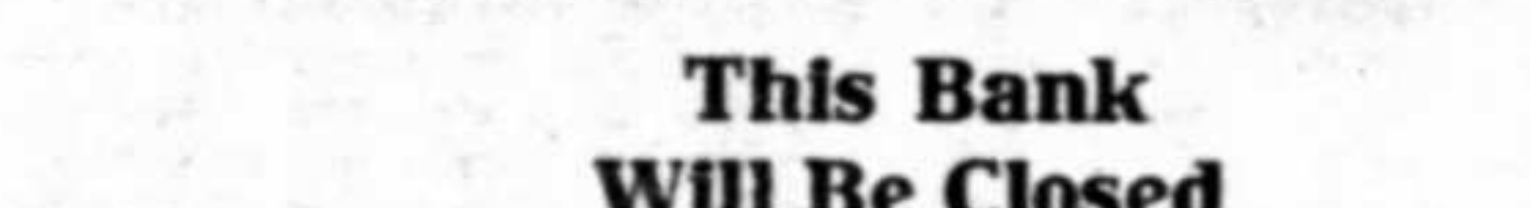

# PLAINVIEW CHALLENGES LUBBOCK'S GRID SUPREMACY THURSDAY



As the current football campaign is nearing a close, there is considerable discussion over District One concerning the admission of at least one more city into the Class A circle next year. At present there are seven teams in the district, giving the member clubs but six conference games during the season. The addition of another team would force each entry to play seven games in the round robin schedule and the season is plenty long to allow such a program.

Pampa and Childress are the cities making strong bids for membership in this district and it is entirely probable that one will be admitted at the meeting at Quanah next Spring. The Intercollegiate League ruling on the matter states that after a high school reaches an enrollment of 500, its team must enter Class A competition. Therefore if either Pampa or Childress have reached this enrollment, the choice of their entry into Class A football will not be with the schools. The league ruling further states that if a school has not reached an enrollment of 500 but is strong enough to put a Class A team on the field, it may apply to the state department for admission into the first division.

The latter ruling may furnish impetus for Slaton, Lamesa or Post to seek a berth in District One. Class A. Either of these teams might have finished high in the Class A race this season, possibly ahead of Quanah, Vernon and Plainview. The Pampa Harvesters, incidentally, boast a strong grid machine this year that has battled its way into the final of the Class B race in District One. This week the Harvesters meet Hereford for the championship of their district. The winner of this game will tie with the title holder in District Two in the bi-district encounter.

We are further reminded that the football season is nearing its close by several fan letters, giving all district selections. The team given best was picked by a Lubbock fan who has seen the majority of the District One teams in action during the season.

Ends—Pampa (Lubbock) and D. Castanheira (Wichita). Tackles—Dolan (Vernon) and Frazell (Lubbock). Center—Nicklaus (Amarillo). Guards—Steen (Wichita) and Noland (Amarillo). Quarterback—Lawson (Lubbock). Halfbacks—Gibson (Amarillo) and Smith (Lubbock). Fullback—Craw (Electra).

It will be plenty hard to improve the team named above, although we are likely to make several changes in the mythical eleven we present at the close of the season. It remains a certainty that Lubbock will have at least three men on the first team and probably four. Bob Rich stands a splendid chance to get first mention as does Joe Leaverton, Westerner center.

We have been informed by Superintendent R. W. Cluck of Spur that officials from that city did not sign the forfeit papers, giving Post the Nov. 11 game, as has previously been reported. The Spur school executive affirms that whoever gave out the information that this action had been taken was badly mistaken. In the first place, Donny Miller, the player in question did not even take part in the game. Post game. The purported visit of Spur officials to Post was for another purpose and not to discuss the eligibility of Hufey, Cluck declared.

The Spur superintendent takes the stand along with Superintendent Green of Slaton concerning the manner in which the District Two championship race has been handled.

Neither do I feel that Lamesa has played a representative schedule. ## Rivals To Meet On Turkey Day

### NATION'S GRID MENU FINDS ANCIENT FOES IN GAMES

BY HERBERT W. BARKER Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—A number of fine old eastern football rivalries will be renewed this week, most of them on Thanksgiving Day, but one of the most important—Army and Notre Dame—on Saturday.

Before the Cadets and the Ramblers from South Bend, Ind., put on their spectacular struggle at Yankee Stadium, such ancient feuds as Cornell-Penn, Pitt-Penn State, Washington and Jefferson-West Virginia, and Brown-Colgate will have been fought again. Added to the program will be such combat as Carnegie Tech-New York university on Thanksgiving Day and the Dartmouth-Navy, Villanova-Temple and Boston College-Holy Cross trays two days later.

Of traditional meetings this week the Cornell-Penn duel is the oldest. With the exception of the war year of 1918 the Red and Blue and the Red have battled annually since 1883. Penn holds a decided edge in the series with 26 victories in 35 games. Cornell has won seven and two were tied. Cornell, with one of the best teams in the east, hopes to gain its first victory over Penn since 1923.

Pitt's unbeaten and united Panthers, meeting Penn State for the 25th consecutive year, should gain its 17th victory in the series with the Nittany Lions who have had an in-and-out season this year. Penn State has beaten Pitt only seven times since 1904 and has to go way back to 1919 to point with pride to a triumph over the Panthers although the games of 1920 and 1921 were scoreless ties.

The Syracuse-Columbia battle is the ninth in a series that began in 1901. Columbia has only one victory and a tie to show against Syracuse's six triumphs, and the chances are all against a Lion win this year. Colgate seems to pack enough punch to average a number of defeats. Brown has pinned on the Maroon record since 1917. Of the nine previous games, Brown won five, Colgate one and three were tied. The annual Turkey Day battle between W. and J. and West Virginia's Mountaineers finds the Presidents decided favorites.

Notre Dame will be after its 11th victory over the Army when these rivals of 16 years' standing get together in the outstanding game of the week on Saturday. Knute Rockne's Ramblers have won 10 of the 15 previous meetings; the Army four with one tie. Notre Dame, unbeaten and united, will be a heavy pickup choice over the Cadets, who have yet to win a major game this season. Notre Dame will be handicapped by the absence of Rockne, who is ill, and Moynihan, star center, who suffered a broken leg in the Northwestern game on Saturday.

## TWO SCORE GAMES SLATED IN DIXIE

ATLANTA, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Two score Thanksgiving Day football games are slated for Dixie.

A duel of star halfbacks is forecast for Lexington, Ky., when Tennessee, seeking another victory to add to its perfect record, pits Gene McEver, Dixie scoring leader, against "Shipwreck" Kelly, Kentucky's sophomore flash.

By winning, Tennessee will not only strengthen its bid for the conference title, but will retain possession of the coveted bear rug trophy, which for several years has passed back and forth between the winners of the annual feud.

Tulane goes to Baton Rouge to play Louisiana State, last obstacle to a clean slate and a claim for the championship. Bolstered by the return of their quarterback ace, Downes, Georgia, goes to Birmingham to clash with the University of Alabama in the twenty-second game of their series. Alabama is favored.

The bout will have no bearing on the title race, but will give the Porks an opportunity to boost their standing, as the Aggies are accounted members of the southwest circuit for the one day. An Arkansas victory is forecast.

Tomorrow's tilt will serve as an appetizer for the main show Saturday at Fort Worth. There is no such tradition attached to the championship struggle between Texas as Christian and Southern Methodist, but it promises to be more violent. The Mustangs are busy figuring out a defense against the forays of Cy Leland, Frog backfield terror. The Christians are laying plans to maul the dazzling aerial game of the Ponies. Neither will be entirely successful.

## Bears Meet Owls

Coach Morley Jennings will take his disappointing Baylor eleven to Houston for a final joust with the Rice Owls Saturday. The contest will occasion little interest under the circumstances. The Owls, as usual, will be favored to come up on the short end.

Coach Jennings, incidentally, has been fortified with the knowledge he will be at the head of Baylor athletics for at least three more years. The Wolves were on his trial after the Bears lost to the Mustangs and Progs on successive Saturdays.

Not As Strong Critics who picked Baylor to win the conference crown now admit the school's material was not as strong as it appeared on paper. The Bears had only one Jake Wilson.

As comparative scores never mean anything when the Longhorns and Aggies get together, a close, hard fought game is looked for at College Station. Taken on their season's record, the Steers appear at least a touchdown stronger, but the Aggies are expected to offset this advantage with the inspired game they always play on their home grounds. They will be out to dedicate their new stadium in a fitting manner.

Seventeen Aggie and Longhorn stars will be playing their last game. Captain Mills, Dorsey, Richter, Alabrook, Conover, Brown, Ewell, Varnes and Bible are Aggie regulars who graduate. The Longhorns will lose Captain Brown, Sealar, Rees, Besty, Rose, Burnet, Hargrove and Chestnut.

## CALIFORNIA WILL REPRESENT WEST

## DISTRICT CLASS B TITLE RACE GETS SETTLEMENT IN CONFAB HERE, OFFICIALS PLAN; VIEWS ARE GIVEN

Plans for the final settlement of the football championship of District Two, Class B received another jolt yesterday in the form of a protest from Slaton on the eligibility of Lamesa to compete for high honors in the district race.

Statements from Superintendent L. T. Green of Slaton, pointing out that Lamesa had not played a representative schedule, were followed by a formal protest and a request that the executive committee meet immediately to decide the matter.

Due to the fact that V. Z. Rogers, Lamesa superintendent and district chairman, was directly interested in the protest, the committee head appointed W. E. Pally of Floydada as temporary referee to preside over the special meeting held here at Texas Tech this morning.

Previously Chairman Rogers gave reasons to show why he could see no reason to consider the protest. The Lamesa school head pointed out that by the present plans, the Tornados will have played the same number of conference games that Slaton has played. He further mentioned that the executive committee had ruled on the current question on two previous occasions and that all schedules had been accepted as representative.

While only Lamesa, Slaton and Ralls are directly interested in the present squabble, communications have been received from several other schools in the district, the majority of which have taken sides with Slaton.

Superintendent R. N. Cluck of Spur told the Avalanche-Journal that he agreed heartily with the stand taken by Slaton authorities and advocated immediate action on the part of the executive committee. Harry Taylor of Post and Marlin Hayhurst of Brownfield likewise expressed disfavor over the Ralls-Lockney-Lamesa plan.

A. C. Dick, Hyatt, editor of the Ralls Banner, has acted as spokesman for fans from the Rabbit center. Hyatt points out his reasons to show that Lamesa and Ralls assuredly deserve the right to meet for the title.

His letter to this newspaper follows: "Feeling that your excellent newspaper stands for fair play, I am writing you, at the solicitation of many Ralls people, attempting to set forth some facts that will relieve the minds of many of your readers of some misrepresentations contained in an article appearing in the Morning Avalanche, headed: 'Slaton Claims District Title, and was allegedly given your paper by reporters after an interview with Mr. L. T. Green, superintendent of Slaton schools.'

"While those who really know all the facts about the 'muddle' in the district 2, class B championship race will find many misleading statements in Mr. Green's numerous assertions, it is the desire of the writer and all Ralls folks to only call attention to a few of those which more vitally concern our own team, the Ralls Jackrabbits.

"First, Mr. Green alleged that Ralls had only played three conference games prior to meeting Lockney. Facts are, Ralls had played five conference games prior to meeting Lockney, as follows: Brownfield, Levelland, Littlefield, Floydada, Crosbyton. The two games we have played with Lockney makes seven which is a heavier schedule than any other team of the district has played.

"Second, Ralls and Slaton had a game scheduled for October 12th while Slaton authorities (themselves) called off in order to play the Lubbock Westerners on that date. Ralls' schedule was 'full' for the remainder of the season and Coach Lovorn did not think it fair to cancel regularly scheduled games with other teams in order to set a new date for Slaton. In fact, there is no record that Slaton even asked for another date.

"Third, Coach Lovorn tried to get an early season game with Spur and Spur's coach refused to play until the latter part of the season and a game was scheduled for Thanksgiving. The district committee ordered that this game be cancelled in case Ralls won the right to meet Lamesa by defeating Lockney. Had Ralls lost to Lockney the game with Spur would have been played.

"All the above facts developed at the meeting of the district athletic committee, the Slaton and Spur school authorities agreeing that they were true. It further developed there that the Post school authorities thought it best not to play Ralls due to former 'misunderstandings' between the two cities and it was their initiative and not Coach

## EATON TELLS OF SEED RULE

COUNTY AGENT GIVES  
EXPLANATION FOR  
FARMERS HERE

The pure seed law of the state of Texas, so far as grain sorghum is concerned, is a culmination of widespread demand for purity of product on the part of growers, representatives of the extension service and experiment stations.

D. P. Eaton, Lubbock county agent, explained today.

"The law has two purposes," he continued. "Its first purpose is to give the man who produces pure seed protection from unscrupulous growers, and, secondly, it is an effort to protect the farmer who plants seed, guaranteeing him that he will be able to secure from those growers seed of known variety of variety."

All Have Opportunity

"It is not the purpose of the board to operate in such manner as will deprive the farmer in any particular locality of the dealer in an advertisement. It is specifically understood that any individual has the opportunity and privilege of complying with this law, its rules and regulations, in production of registered and certified seed."

"This protection carries with it the seal of the state of Texas, which gives support of the legislature. Therefore, only those who come under supervision of the law, whose crops are inspected by the chief inspector of the board, will have certification of the state."

Receive Best Seed

"As a result the grower will receive the best seed procurable at any of the markets of the country."

Rules governing the seed follow:

"Seed shall be grown from bagged seed, produced on experiment station last year."

"Seed shall be pure live seed and show 100 per cent purity as determined by field inspection."

"Seed, harvested, threshed, re-cleaned, sacked and stored under conditions to prevent mixture."

"The grower shall thresh and clean registered seed by equipment owned and operated by him."

"Seed of recognized variety of seed, a strain of proven merit, free from pest diseases and weed seed."

At the same time Oklahoma commissioners opened sealed bids here. The Texas highway commission read the same bids at Austin.

While representatives of the attorney general's office of Oklahoma and Texas have been working through congressional delegation to bring about adoption in congress of a resolution authorizing the states jointly to span Red River, a new navigable stream, with free bridges, that permission has not been received.

## FOUR GIGANTIC PLANES BEING PLANNED IN U. S.

### AIR TITANS WILL CARRY 206; COST OVER TWO MILLION

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—Plans for the construction of four monoplanes, so big that Fifth Avenue traffic could pass between their "landing legs", were announced Tuesday by the General Development company of Connecticut through its vice-president and chief consultant, Dr. William Whitney Christmas.

These titans of the air, the largest in the world, with a wing spread of 362 feet and a gross weight of 721-2 tons, will be capable of carrying 260 passengers under department of commerce regulations. They are scheduled to be completed late next year at an estimate cost of \$2,000,000.

The planes, which will have a speed range of 60 to 145 miles an hour, will be powered by eight 1000 horse power engines, grouped in two units of four each. They are intended for long distance cross country passenger, mail and freight transportation.

Each ship will be equipped with lounge, dining saloon, staterooms and an observation deck. Passengers will be carried principally in the steel wings, which will be nine feet thick. The crew will consist of 17 men—a master, a radio operator, four pilots, a purser, two engineers, two machinists and eight cooks, pantries, waiters and stewards.
