PRISONERS OFF TO SERVE TERMS

Sheriff Flynt left Tuesday afternoon for Brownwood in response to a message from Bud Russell, penitentiary transfer agent, to meet him at that place with the prisoners held in the Ballinger jail who have been sentenced and are ready to be transferred to the state prison. Mr. Flynt carried Frank Sessions, a white boy, convicted of forgery, and sentenced to two years in the pen; Willie Campbell, negro, sentenced to two years for burglary, and Farris Searcy, better known among the colored folks as "Apron Straps," who will serve a six year term for burglary. The local sheriff stated that the jail was nearer clear of prisoners than it had been for six months. J. H. Boland, recently convicted of killing Charley Allen, is being held in jail in default of \$7500 bond, pending action of the higher court in his case. Two other prisoners are being held temporarily on misdemeanor charges, and unless some other man breaks

into jail, Mr. Boland will soon have the jail to himself.

CONCHO CO. SHERIFF MAKES BOOZE RAID

Sheriff Bob Miller, of Concho county, arrested three men Saturday night and confiscated four quarts of liquor, according to information received at Ballinger Sunday. Acting on rumors that liquor runners were operating in Eden, Mr. Miller gave chase Saturday night and succeeded in running down three men in a Buick car six miles South of Eden. The sheriff found four quarts of intoxicants in the car and he placed under arrest John Hefferman, V. M. Williamson and Gus Milam. The three men waived examining trial before the justice of the peace at Eden and were released on \$1,000 bond each pending action of the grand jury. The complaint against the men charges possession and sale of liquor.

HEAVY LOSSES FROM IDLENESS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Losses in earnings of workers in the United States for the past fiscal year, due to involuntary idleness, was placed today at more than six billion five hundred million dollars.

This estimate was made up by experts in furnishing evidence before the national unemployment conference which is in session here. The estimate, it is explained, covered loss on wages because of unemployment of all jobless people throughout the country from July 1920 to August 15, 1921, and is based approximately on normal pay levels and not on the scale of the highest wages paid. The efforts of the conference now will be turned to finding some remedy for the economic loss from such reductions in the earning power of the workers of the future by adopting some stabilized industrial plan.

ZR-2 LOSS DUE TO ACCIDENT

HULL, England, Oct. 4.—The catastrophe of the ZR-2 on August 24th, was due to an accident, according to a verdict of the coroner's jury here today, when the jury resumed its inquest to ascertain just how the accident occurred. The court of inquiry declared that there was nothing to show that the destruction of the airship was due to negligence or carelessness on the part of anyone. Practically all the wreckage of the dirigible has been thoroughly examined and a close investigation made.

OTHER NATIONS TO GET INVITATIONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Invitations to governments of Belgium, Holland, Portugal, asking them to become members of the conference for discussing the Far Eastern and disarmament questions, are being prepared today by the state department.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS HAVE GOOD DAY

Ballinger churches experienced a good day Sunday. Especially did the Sunday schools enjoy a good day with unusually large attendance and collections. Yet only about twenty-five per cent of the population of Ballinger attended Sunday school.

Ku Klux Clash Mystery; Officers are Improving

SAYS KU KLUX CLAIMS UNJUST

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—"The Ku Klux Klan engenders deep hatred in the hearts of creeds and races, which are discriminated against particularly when the Klan lays claim to one hundred per cent Americanism," John Clinin, Assistant United States District Attorney, said today in a statement issued after he had investigated the organization.

"There is nothing in the charter of a sinister or mystic nature," said the attorney, "but it is apparent that the membership automatically bars negroes, Jews and Catholics. It is unfortunate that an organization of this kind should be instituted at this particular time when the world is seeking to recover from the shock of the World War."

Clinin assailed the Klan's claims of being one hundred per cent American, asserting that its claim was a reflection on all creeds and classes who helped to win the war.

UNKNOWN HERO TO REST IN U. S.

PARIS, Oct. 4.—America's "unknown" soldier, who will find an honored sepulchre in the national cemetery at Arlington, will be selected by a non-commissioned officer of the American forces on the Rhine, at Chalons sur Marne, on October 24th, according to announcement here today.

GETS SEVEN YEARS FOR MISAPPLICATION

ABILENE, Oct. 4.—James Lyons Jr., upon plea of guilty to the charge of misapplication of funds in a Dallas bank, was sentenced to seven years in the Leavenworth prison by United States district court here this morning. Judge James C. Wilson passed sentence on Lyons.

RURAL SCHOOLS OPENING EARLY

The rural schools of Runnels county are setting a new record for early work. Twenty-six of the schools convened Monday, and Supt. Bugg stated Tuesday that every rural school in the county would be in operation by October 24th, which would be earlier than ever before in the history of the county.

The superintendent's office is working night and day making application for state aid. It is necessary that all applications be in Austin by the end of this week, and the forty rural schools in the county are applying for an average of \$500 each. Mr. Bugg states that practically all the schools have met the requirements and will no doubt be granted aid. The applications being made call for aid in sums ranging from \$250 to \$1,000, or the average of \$500.

With all schools in the county running on time by October 24th, means early closing for some of the schools, and will work to the advantage of those who will be needed on the farm again early next spring. There will be between 3200 and 3500 children enrolled in the rural schools. This does not include the independent district schools in the county.

AUSTIN, Oct. 4.—The Attorney general's department will not render an opinion as to whether a parade of the Ku Klux Klan in full regalia, or other body of men parading in masked form, is in violation of the Texas laws, unless such opinion is sought through the proper channels. Assistant Attorney General Keeling made this statement today in response to appeals from citizens to interpret the law.

GALVESTON, Oct. 4.—"The contention that any group of persons have the right to the administration of justice in their own hands is a product of ignorant and criminal minds," declared Judge Robert G. Street today, charging the grand jury to investigate the case where persons are whipped and warned to leave communities.

SMITHVILLE, Tex., Oct. 4.—The city council of Smithville has passed an ordinance fixing a penalty against any person refusing to assist an officer when "duly summoned to help enforce the anti-parade law here."

WACO, Oct. 4.—With the condition of Sheriff Bob Buchanan and Louis Crow and Ed Howard, who were seriously injured in the clash with the Ku Klux Klan at Lorena last Saturday night, slightly improved, interest here today centers on the unexpected announcement by District Judge R. I. Monroe, of the date of convening the grand jury for the purpose of investigating the incident which has come so near, and may yet cost the life of several men.

Lorena citizens today are still searching for the sheriff's gun which disappeared when he was knocked down after attempting to unmask the leader of the parade. Deputy Sheriff Burton today said that the reports that he shot Buchanan were untrue and that he did not fire until he heard the sheriff say "I'm shot."

Unofficial investigators have been informed that the people of Lorena are withholding comment until after the officials have acted on the case. The citizens of the little town continue to profess that they have no knowledge of who fired the shots which wounded Buchanan and several bystanders. The whole affair remains shrouded in mystery, and if there are any who know just how the shooting began they are keeping quiet. It is even difficult to get the sentiment of the community, and many persons here express the belief that official investigation will add little to the known facts.

REPUBLICANS COMPLETE DIPLOMATIC ROSTER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—The diplomatic roster of the new administration was virtually completed today with the announcement of the selection of eight American ministers to Latin-American and old world countries.

The choking to death of a fourteen year old boy at the Gatesville reform school a week ago calls to mind the smothering to death of a number of prisoners at the penitentiary a few years ago. The man guilty of that crime may escape punishment here, but if there is any hell hereafter, he should get his.

Men and women over sixty years old do not have to get exemption receipts from the tax collector in cities of less than ten thousand population to entitle them to vote in all elections, but men and women who have become twenty-one since January first of this year, must call at the tax collector's office and get exemption receipts. You can not vote without the receipt, and you must get it before the 31st day of January next.

If the railroad workers, miners and packers persist in pulling off their strikes, the unemployment conference should not experience much trouble in finding employment for the seven million people who are seeking some way to keep soul and body together during the winter months. The unions are fighting reduction in wages while the common laborers are fighting for a chance to work, and able bodied men are being put on the auction block.

KU KLUX PARADES
While the trouble at Lorena Saturday night is to be regretted, and without going on record as endorsing the Ku Klux Klan, we believe that the authorities who undertook to stop the parade went beyond their authority, and have no one to blame for the trouble but themselves. There is no law against the Ku Klux Klan, or any other secret order, staging a parade, so long as they do not molest or harm anyone, and if the Klan had violated any law in McClennan county the sheriff should have armed himself with a warrant of arrest, and he would have had the entire backing of the law abiding citizenship of McClennan county in serving that warrant. As it was he is in a good way to pass out of this life, and the most prominent and law abiding citizens of that county have petitioned the county attorney to take action against those who undertook to break up the parade.

Stories of Great Scouts

DANIEL BOONE, THE GREAT KENTUCKIAN

Daniel Boone was the son of Quaker parents who lived in Pennsylvania. Although the principal doctrine in the Quaker creed is that man must not kill, Daniel departed from the faith of his fathers early and became one of the greatest Indian fighters in American history.

When Boone was eighteen his parents moved to North Carolina and in the Yadkin valley of that state, young Boone became an expert woodsman and hunter. Attracted by the tales of a hunter who had crossed the Appalachians into the unknown Kentucky country, Boone visited the Blue Grass state several times until he finally decided to make that country his home. In 1775 he established Boonesborough, the first outpost of civilization in the "Dark and Bloody Ground," as Kentucky was called because it was a battleground for many tribes of Indians.

Boone's adventures with the Indians in his new home were innumerable. In 1778 he was captured by the Shawnees, who admired the scout's courage so much that he was not put to death. Instead Chief Black Fish adopted him, giving him the name of Big Turtle—rather an inappropriate title for a man so active. Boone pretended to be well-pleased with his captivity and after several months the watchfulness of the savages relaxed. Then he made his escape.

Several years later this same band of Shawnees came to Boonesborough to kidnap their former captive. They found Boone in a little shanty used for drying tobacco.

"Now Boone, we got you," said the Indians. "You no get away this time." "Yes, you have me but I am glad to go with you," replied the scout, "but I want my friends to have some of this tobacco."

He gathered up a number of the driest leaves and, unseen by the Indians, crushed them in his hands. Before they could move, he threw the powdered tobacco into their eyes. As the blinded savages rolled on the floor howling and dazing at their eyes, the former "Big Turtle" showed unexpected speed and was far up the trail to the fort before they could pursue him.

In his later years Boone was cheated out of the rich Kentucky lands he had fought so hard to win and he migrated to Missouri, becoming a hunter once more. He died there in 1820 at the age of eighty-six. A quarter of a century later Kentucky paid him belated honor by removing his body to the capital of the state and today Daniel Boone sleeps in the land where he won fame as a pioneer and scout.

SIMON KENTON, THE AMERICAN MAZEPPA

Second only to the name of Daniel Boone—whose life he once saved—is written in the annals of Kentucky the name of Simon Kenton. Kenton was a Virginian who served as a scout in Lord Dunmore's war shortly before the outbreak of the Revolution and who crossed over the mountains into the "Dark and Bloody Ground" of Kentucky in search of adventure. His exploits there won for him the undying hatred of the Indians and no less than eight times he was captured by them and sentenced to death.

In 1778 Kenton with two companions went north into Ohio to spy upon a tribe at war with the whites. While returning, they came upon a herd of Indian horses. The Kentonians resolved to take some of the animals along as trophies of the successful expedition. The Indians quickly discovered the theft and overtook the scouts just before they crossed the Ohio river.

One of the Kentonians was killed, another escaped but Kenton was taken prisoner.

"You steal Injun hoss?" they taunted him. "All right, we give you ride on him!"

So they tied the scout on a wild young horse and set it free in the forest. He finally was taken from the horse's back more dead than alive.

At the first village the Indians reached, they condemned the scout to run the gamut. When the signal was given, Kenton sprang through the line of warriors, armed with clubs and hatchets, and reached the council house. His goal, almost untouched. Near Zanesfield preparations were made to burn him at the stake, but the arrival of Simon Girty, the "white renegade" who recognized Kenton as an old friend, saved him.

His freedom was short-lived. Three weeks later the Indians again voted to put him to death. Again he was saved by a friend—Chief Logan, the noted orator of the Cayugas. When the Sandusky towns were reached, the Indians held a council and once more decreed the death penalty. Kenton was tied to the stake. Just as the torch was being applied, a British officer appeared and demanded the surrender of their prisoner to his commander at Detroit.

Kenton was kept captive in Detroit until 1779, when through the aid of an Indian trader's wife he escaped to Kentucky where he died in 1839.

LEDGER TO GET WORLD SERIES

The Ledger has perfected arrangements for receiving the world's series baseball games which will be played between the New York Giants and the New York Yankees. The games begin tomorrow (Wednesday) and will probably extend over into next week, the rules providing for the playing of the best five out of nine.

This is the first time since 1906 that two teams in the major leagues in one city have battled for the championship. Chicago clubs, the White Sox and Cubs, played off the championship in 1906.

Already every reserved seat has been sold for the games, and the fans are now praying for good weather. If the weather is favorable all previous records for attendance and receipts are expected to be smashed. Arrangements have been made to handle 40,000 spectators at each game. Members of the winning team will receive for their share of the receipts about \$7,500, while the losing team will receive about \$5,000 per member.

CHILDREN'S MANNERS

THE minute a child begins to eat with the assistance of its own small hands, the first lesson in table manners must begin. There is little excuse for the disgusting table manners of some children. They are due, really, to the fact that the mother or other caretaker finds it less trouble to let the child search aimlessly for its small mouth than to insist that it locate it daintily, surely and without experiment.

A very small child can be taught to eat nicely. Teach it that spotted bibs are beneath contempt. Patiently show it how to hold its spoon and cup, and help it to eat slowly. The lesson is a hard one for the teacher as well as for the child. But perseverance is the only way. And once the child has learned to eat daintily, the slovenly ways of untrained children when they are eating will be as distasteful to it as you would find them in a grown person.

Remember that children ape the manners of their elders. For this reason the greatest care should be used in the choosing of nursemaids, governesses or any one else who comes in constant contact with the child. Many well known men have talked, when excited, to their dying day in the brogue or burr of their childhood nurses.


And who can doubt that much of the gentleness of character and strength of spirit of Robert Louis Stevenson were inspired in him by the dear old nurse to whom he dedicated his "Child's Garden of Verse?"

The imitative method is the easiest whereby a child may acquire its manners. The small boy who adores his gallant father seldom forgets to take off his hat and stand in the presence of women. The small girl who looks up to her mother with affection is the pattern of loving courtesy to her father. Children often affect the graces of their elders in a most laughable way. But don't laugh at them. They will outgrow this priggishness. It is only a case of their imitative acquisition of manners.

It is the vogue of the day for small girls, up to the age of ten or twelve to curtsy when they meet their elders. After that they, like small boys, stand and shake hands. It is also proper for children to be quiet and unobtrusive when they are in the company of grown-ups.

Some of the set rules of children's manners, like these, they cannot learn by imitation. But if they are courteous, thoughtful and happy they will take an interest in acquiring these fit the superficial manners that will make their acquisition easy.


