### Boy's Hero Worship Brings on Trouble

A nine-year-old boy's hero worship of a 15-year-old got 'em both in trouble. And the older boy is being checked by County Judge Elmer Martin that he influences the nine-year-old in the right direction.

The trouble started with \$37.00 in cash in Colorado City's Community Center. All of the money—\$27.00 in cash drawer, \$5 candy money and \$5 in bank bag—was taken from the center shortly after noon Saturday. All except about \$8 was recovered.

The younger boy, whose mother is ill and hospitalized, told investigating officers that he took the cash. His 15-year-old buddy and another boy had expressed a desire for spending money, so the youngster took it on himself to give 'em what they wanted.

### Committee To Raise Financing

Operation upstream, Mitchell County's effort to retain location of a proposed Colorado River reservoir within the county, moved toward the legal and technical field Wednesday with leaders looking for professional assistance in their fight.

At the same time, directors of Colorado River Municipal Water District—the agency applying for permit to build the dam in Coke County—wasted no time in their effort to solidify support for 435,000 acre feet lake with communities above, below and at the side of Mitchell County.

### Deer Season Set Here for Nov. 14

A longer, big-game hunting season is scheduled in the fall for Mitchell County and remainder of the Possum Kingdom District.

The longer season, with deer hunting beginning the second Saturday of November (Nov. 14), was announced this week by the State Parks & Wildlife Department.

Here's a rundown of the hunting seasons for the Possum Kingdom District, which includes Mitchell, Archer, Baylor, Border, Bosque, Brown, Clay, Coke, Comanche, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hamilton, Hill, Hood, Jack, Johnson, Knox, Midland, Mills, Montague, Nolan, Palo Pinto, Park

er, Reagan, Somervell, Stephens, Tarrant, Taylor, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise and Young counties: Antelope Oct. 3 through Oct. 11. Bag limit one per season by permit only. Deer—open season, Nov. 14 through Dec. 31, except in Stephens, Palo Pinto, Young, Jack and Montague counties where closing date is Dec. 6. Bag limit—2 buck deer. Antelope deer may be taken by special permit only in areas designated by the Parks & Wildlife Department. No more than 3 deer in the aggregate.

Mitchell County's battle for the dam—originally planned within this county—and the CRMWD board went to their separate paths Monday following a special luncheon in Villa Inn Restaurant. At the luncheon the Mitchell steering committee—led by its chairman, Charles C. Thompson—gave notice that Colorado City, Loraine and Mitchell County would fight to protect local interests. And just as politely and emphatically, Charles Perry, Odessa banker and CRMWD president, declared the district's intention of going ahead with building plans at the new Coke site with or without Mitchell County's blessings.

## County Asks New FM Road Linkage

Mitchell County Commissioners Court is pushing for the extension of Farm-to-Market Highway No. 2319 west from Baumann community to intersect with State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee) south of Colorado City.

The court's new recommendation for it is the third requesting the project and FM extension in one of two new road developments in the county's southeastern area.

In the other development, crews in Commissioner J. L. (Jack) Nugent's precinct were moving in to begin dirt work on a new road linking State Highway 428 with the road in south county extending west from approximately right-of-way for this road previously has been secured and the dirt work will be a major step in actual construction of the route, which will provide access to and from oil development in western Nolan County and along the Mitchell-Nolan boundary.

This new road is in the vicinity of the Jim Maddox ranch in the county's southwest corner. The proposed extension of FM 2319 west from Baumann community was recommended for first priority in a letter to J. C. Roberts, district engineer for Texas Highway Department in Abilene. County officials have been seeking

state action on the FM project since 1960. All four commissioners and County Judge Elmer Martin signed the letter recommending the FM extension in Commissioner Moody Richardson's Precinct 4.

The paved FM extension, if accomplished, would intersect 208 near Lake Champion and would provide another access to the lake area in addition to serving a key farming area south of Colorado City and Loraine.

The letter to Roberts, the district engineer, states: "We appreciate the consid-

eration that has been given to Mitchell County on Farm-to-Market roads by the Texas Highway Department.

"We would like to recommend that Farm-to-Market Road No. 2319 be continued west, from the Baumann Community, and intersect State Highway 208, near Lake Champion.

"This would serve a good farming area, connect other highways and would greatly benefit this area.

"We would like for this road to be given priority in your Farm-to-Market road planning."

## 7 Firemen Back From A&M School

Seven firemen from Colorado City and Loraine are back home after participating in the Texas Fireman's Training School at Texas A&M University, in College Station.

They returned Friday from the school, conducted by A&M Engineering Extension service.

John Morgan of Colorado City took the basic fire fighting course—house fires, forcible entry, salvage, protect-

ive equipment, portable equipment, automatic sprinkler systems and basic rescue operations.

In the advanced fire fighting course were Dale Mathis of Colorado City, Kenneth Johnson and John Mies of Loraine, receiving instruction in chemistry of fire, pump operations, ventilation, LP gases, transport, truck and storage tanks, butane tank fires, airplane fires and use of effective fog streams.

Fire Marshal Virgil Eaton of Colorado City and Jack Coffee of Loraine enrolled in the fire marshal course that included fundamentals of inspections, fire hazards defined.

## Sale to Spur Oil Projects

Oil and gas committee of Colorado City's Chamber of Commerce began making contacts Wednesday for local basing of crews in the prospective additional oil development near Mitchell-Sterling County boundary.

The committee's work was prompted by announcement that E. E. Shaheen of Abilene had sold his properties in the Triple M Wellcamp (multiple) area of northwest Sterling County.

Shaheen sold his interest and operation in six wells and approximately 1,400 acres to Sunset International Petroleum Company, Beverly Hills, Calif.

The Abilene oil man reported that Sunset International

plans additional drilling in the area within the near future.

An office was maintained here and some crews were based in Colorado City during development of the Triple M field, which is about four miles south of the paved highway at Hyman in southwest Mitchell County.

On the Spade Ranch the county line in Sterling County, operator Wednesday was attempting to complete as a producer the Southland Royalty Company No. 1 J. E. Chappell.

Robinson Drilling Company moved out the rotary at a plugged back depth of 7,622.

The No. 1 Chappell is located 467 feet from west and 1,667 feet from the south line of Section 46, Block 18 SPRR Survey.

## Suspect Loses Beer -- Then Money Too

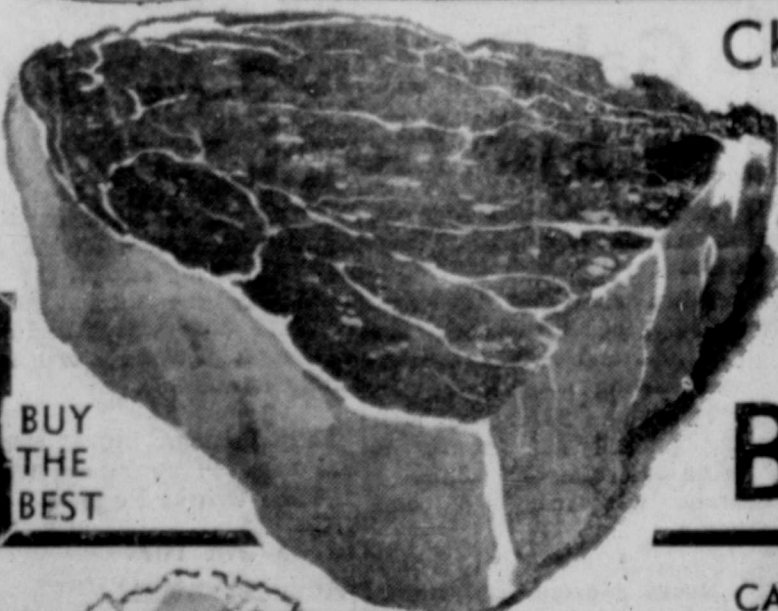

## ON TWO-YEAR CONTRACT C. W. Ralstin Family Leaves For New Venezuelan Home

Las Morochas, Venezuela, will be home for the next two years to the **C. W. Ralstin** family, who lived at 220 East 9th here until last week.

Mr. and Mrs. **Ralstin** and their three daughters, **Sheri**, **Debby** and **Susan**, will fly via Vlassa Airlines from New Orleans to Maracaibo, Venezuela, on Monday. The remainder of their trip to Las Morochas will be made by car.

Leaving Colorado City Saturday, they planned a week of visiting family and friends in Houston and Odessa before traveling to Louisiana. Mrs. **Ralstin's** parents live in Houston. His parents make their home in Odessa, where he grew up and was graduated from Odessa High School. Mrs. **Ralstin** calls Canada her home though she has lived in Texas for a good while.

**Ralstin** and his family came to Colorado City from Midland in 1962. He is employed by the Dowell-Schlumberger Corporation as a service engineer. He has worked for the company for ten years, six of which he has been trying to go to South America. **Ralstin** plans to spend six years in Venezuela by renewing his two-year contract at least twice.

The family are members of the Lutheran faith. They have attended services at All Saints Episcopal Church while in Colorado City.

The two older girls will attend classes in a private school set up by major oil companies operating in the area of Las Morochas. **Sheri**, a fifth grader this fall, is ten years old and has been actively engaged in Girl Scouting. She hopes to continue her scouting in Venezuela if there is an organized troop there. **Debby** is seven and will be a second grader this year. The other daughter, **Susan**, is only three.

Housing for the family will be provided in a company-owned camp, with the house completely furnish. This convenience posed a major problem to the **Ralstins**, who own several rooms of furniture. In the three weeks they had to prepare for their trip, they had to sell all their furniture as well as sort their possessions into two categories—those to be taken and those to be stored.

Mrs. **Ralstin** is looking forward to household help, which can be obtained at very reasonable pay in Venezuela, she said.

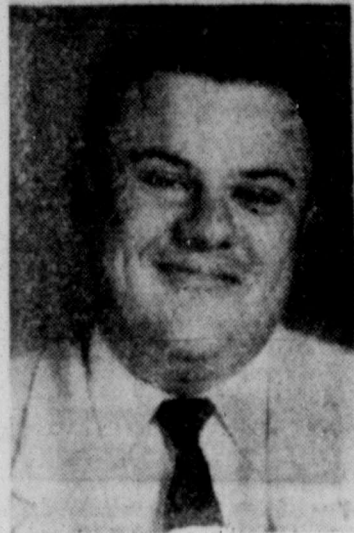
The program at the Colorado School of Mines in Golden, Colorado, concentrates on the topics of Geology and Chemistry.

missioner Marcus Vest, City Councilman Martin Weaver, Charles Root, all of Colorado City, and Ronald Bruce, Lions Club president of Lorraine.

CRMWD officials confirmed here Monday that with the move of the site to Coke County, the district plans to increase its water supply responsibilities to Coke and Nolan County, south and east of the area it now is serving, as well as other possible areas.

This is a point that Thompson and other Mitchell County citizens claimed was a change from the original plan of water conservation, on the Colorado River in this area and, that by increasing its area of responsibility under the new site, would be losing more than it gain from a large reservoir in Coke County.

But CRMWD officials have scheduled a public hearing in Sweetwater for today (Thursday) at 9 a. m. in the Municipal Auditorium.

Sweetwater is studying the possibility of joining in the support for the Coke County site and building a pipe line

to the new reservoir.

Upper Colorado River Authority officials, which includes Robert Lee, Ballinger and Sar Angelo areas, have been invited to confer with CRMWD officials, too.

Spokesmen for the Upper Colorado group have indicated they want to protect their water "rights" below the dam, but have not specified if these rights are in conflict with plans of CRMWD.

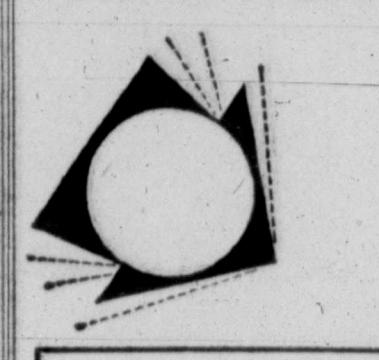

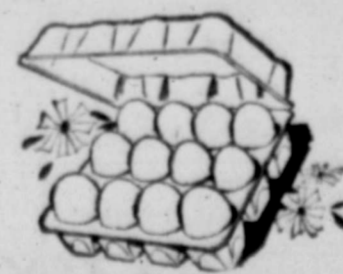
