Ghosts and goblins may find their way to Hart Elementary School Friday, Oct. 30 when the Elementary Halloween Carnival gets underway. Fun time is 12:30 to 3 p.m. in the elementary gym. Parents and preschool children are invited to join in the festivities.

All sorts of Halloween fun is planned including a spook house. Kindergarten students will offer Cokes and popcorn balls. Ring toss fun will be sponsored by first grade.

Second grade is in charge of the dart throw with the third grade sponsoring a concession. A doll throw will be conducted by the fourth grade.

Fifth graders will sponsor a cookie walk; sixth grade, Cokes, fishing and bean count.

Ping pong throw will be organized by Plan A with the Reading Lab sponsoring fishing.

Storm Window Bid Accepted

Math teachers Kathryn Jahay and Brenda Campbell met with school board members Oct. 12 to review their programs in grades seven through 12.

An audit report for 1980-81 was presented by Kaci Jones of Brown, Graham and Company of Tulia. The report was approved.

A low bid of \$1,912.50 submitted by Ed Harris Lumber Company for 75 storm windows at \$25.50 each was accepted. The windows will be placed on south and east windows of the school's 16 houses. Storm windows have already been installed on north and west windows of the houses.

A new front entrance for the band hall was discussed but no action taken.

Football Guessing Game Lead Held By Glen Black, Ehly

Dedication services will be held Sunday afternoon, Oct. 25 for three new cottage residences at Girlstown. The special program is scheduled to begin at 2 p.m.

Expected to participate in the ceremony are Don and Sybil Harrington, Beta Sigma Phi International representatives and Lions International representatives, primary donors of the three cottages.

Following the dedicatory ceremony, a tour will be given of all facilities. Marshall Cooper, administrator, invites all friends of Girlstown to attend.

"We want everyone to see what they've done. It's absolutely fantastic, that we've been able to come this far as

quickly as we have," he says.

Cottage type living quarters will replace the dormitory which burned last spring, destroying it and the personal belongings of some 46 girls plus staff people.

New cottages will house some 15 to 18 girls each with apartments for live-in houseparents in each cottage. The new facilities will provide more home-like living and give girls the opportunity to learn to cook, wash clothes, and do other homemaking tasks.

All Girlstown supporters and other interested persons are invited to attend.

Girlstown Slates Dedication Of Three Cottages Sunday

Law Requires Motorists To Stop

Texas Motor Vehicle Uniform Act requires motorists to stop when overtaking or meeting a school bus which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children. Motorists are reminded that this law is mandatory when a school bus is displaying two alternating flashing red lights.

Motorists shall stop, and remain stopped, until the visual signals are no longer actuated, the bus resumes motion, or the bus driver signals other vehicles to proceed ahead.

There was not much offense by either team until Hart regained possession of the ball at their own 30 yard line with 2:58 to play in the first half. With :16 left in the first half, Clay Barnes bulled over from the one yard line, capping an eleven yard play drive. The run for two points came up about two feet short, so at intermission Vega held onto a slim 7-6 lead over Hart.

As the second half began, both defenses "dug" in and pretty much controlled the play. The only serious threat of scoring in the third quarter resulted from a muffed quick-kick attempt by Hart, giving Vega the ball at Hart's 27 yard line.
