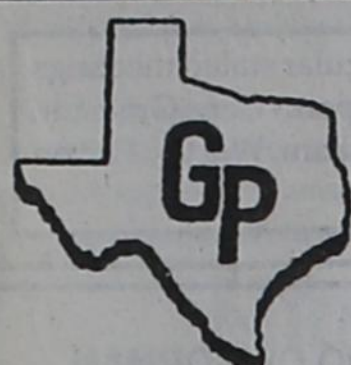

Third Grade Field Trip To Safety City

On January 31st, the third grade classes and their teachers, Mrs. Caraway and Mrs. Spivey had a unique learning experience and a very exciting day when they were the guests of Safety City in Abilene. This \$1,000,000.00 facility is run by the Abilene Police Department and the Abilene Public School System. At this miniature town, with paved multilane streets, working traffic lights, overpasses for trains, pedestrian sidewalks, and a bicycle course, students are taught safety rules for riding bicycles in heavy traffic, giving hand signals, and crossing busy intersections correctly. Patrolman Dean of the Highway Department and Officer Woodard of the Abilene Police Department first taught students to read and obey the three types of road signs. Students learned that there are warning signs, directory signs, and construction signs and that each type can be identified by color and shape. After ten hours of classroom instruction here in our classroom at Gorman, and 45 minutes instruction from Officer Dean at Safety City, the class was divided into three groups. The pedestrian group under the direction of our room dad, Harvey Bryan, used their newly learned skills on the pedestrian route. The bike riding group under the direction of Officer Woodard and his assistant Tracy Keith, biked through busy intersections safely by watching the traffic lights and approaching traffic. The third group of our students drove miniature battery powered cars as they followed the directions of Office Dean and his assistants Paula Lewis and Melinda Abbe. Our young drivers drove their cars in the correct lanes on the multilane roads, gave hand signals, watched and obeyed the traffic lights, stopped for pedestrians, and watched for bike riders also driving on the road. Each group had an opportunity to be bike riders, pedestrians, and car drivers. Also assisting supervise students driving, biking and walking across busy intersections were our room moms, Sarah McCauley and Muriel Gomez.

We appreciate the Abilene Police Department for giving us this learning opportunity in such a fun setting, and our room moms and dad who gave generously of their time to make this trip possible.

Three candidates have filed for places on the City Commission for the May 3rd election.

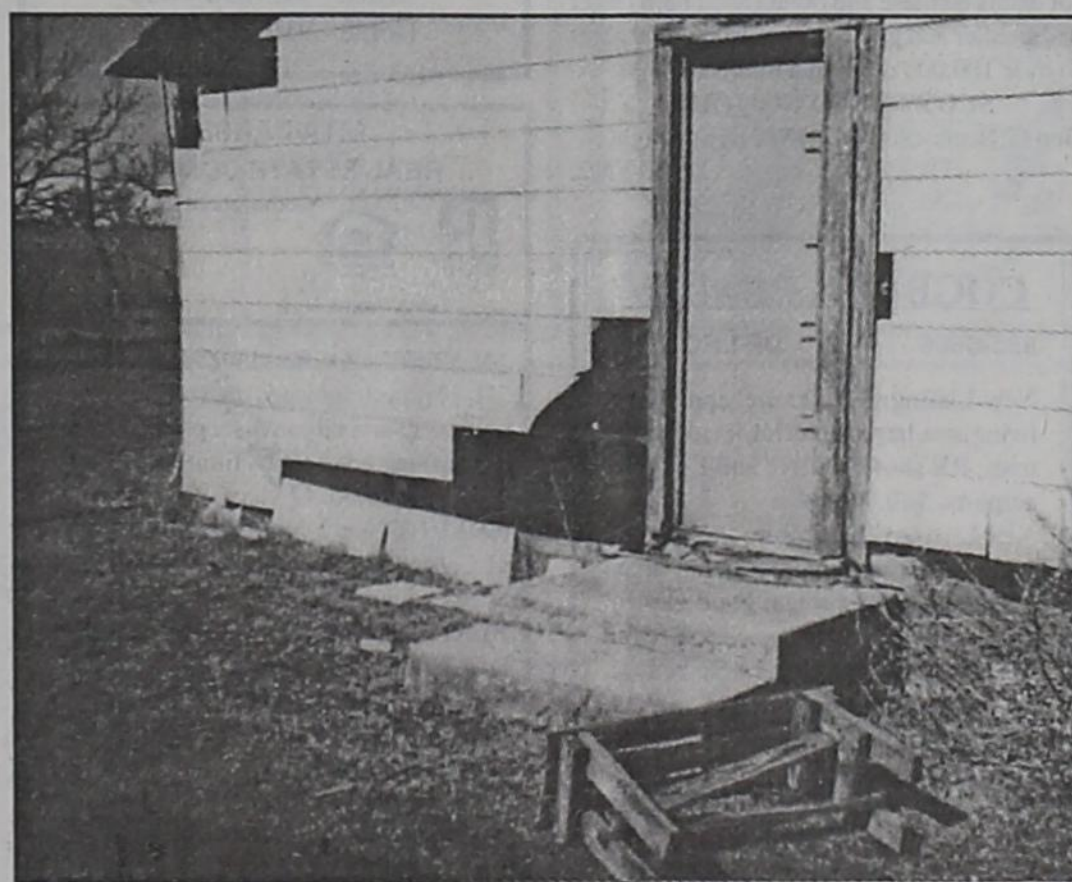
Kenneth Good, a teacher in Rising Star school has filed for Place one and Jamie Espinoza, employee of Easley Trucks has also filed for Place one.

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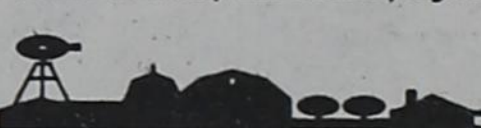
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KOKOMO NEWS

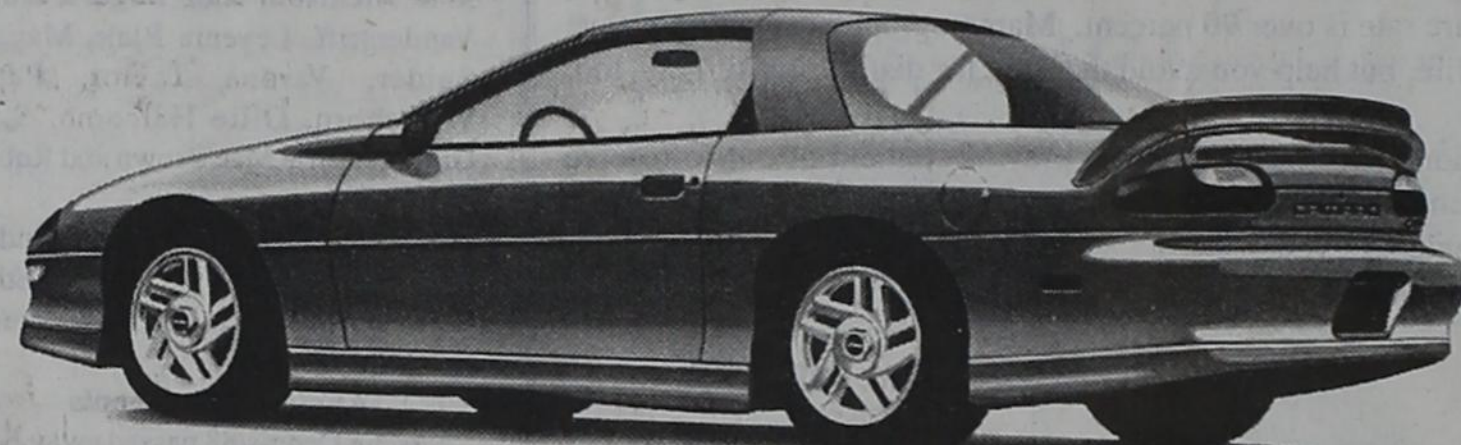

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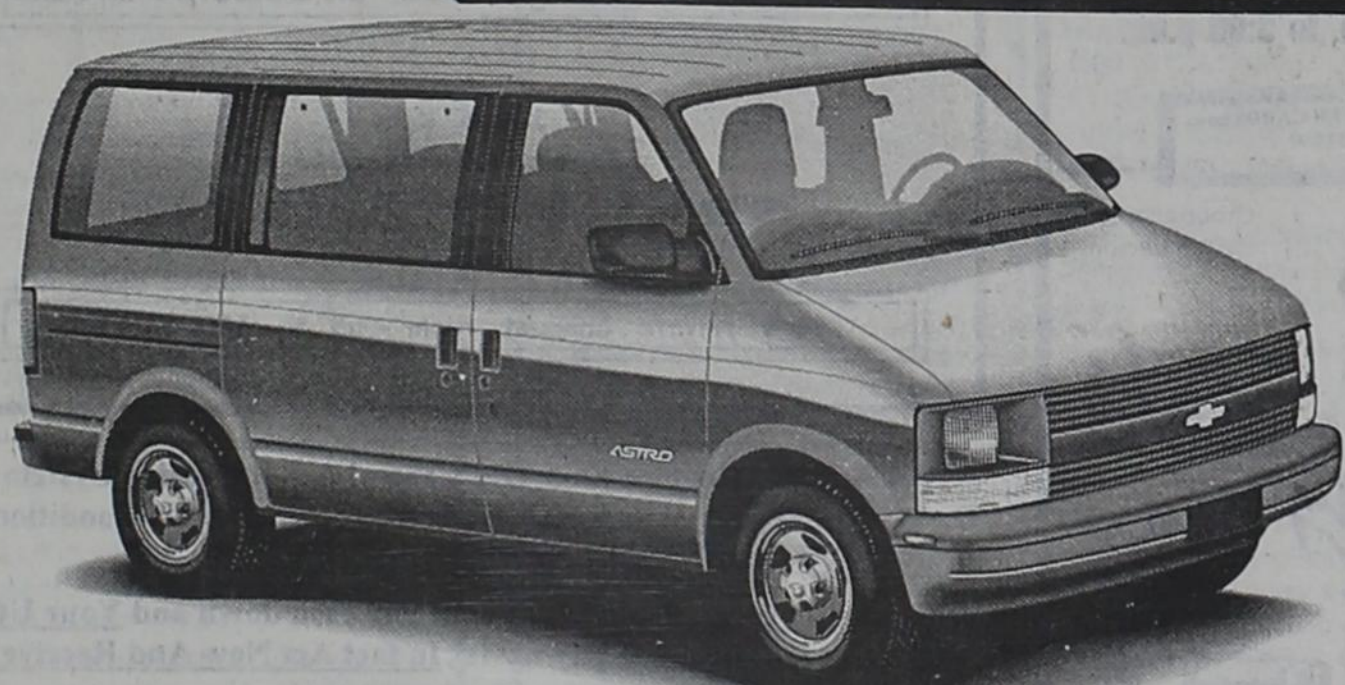
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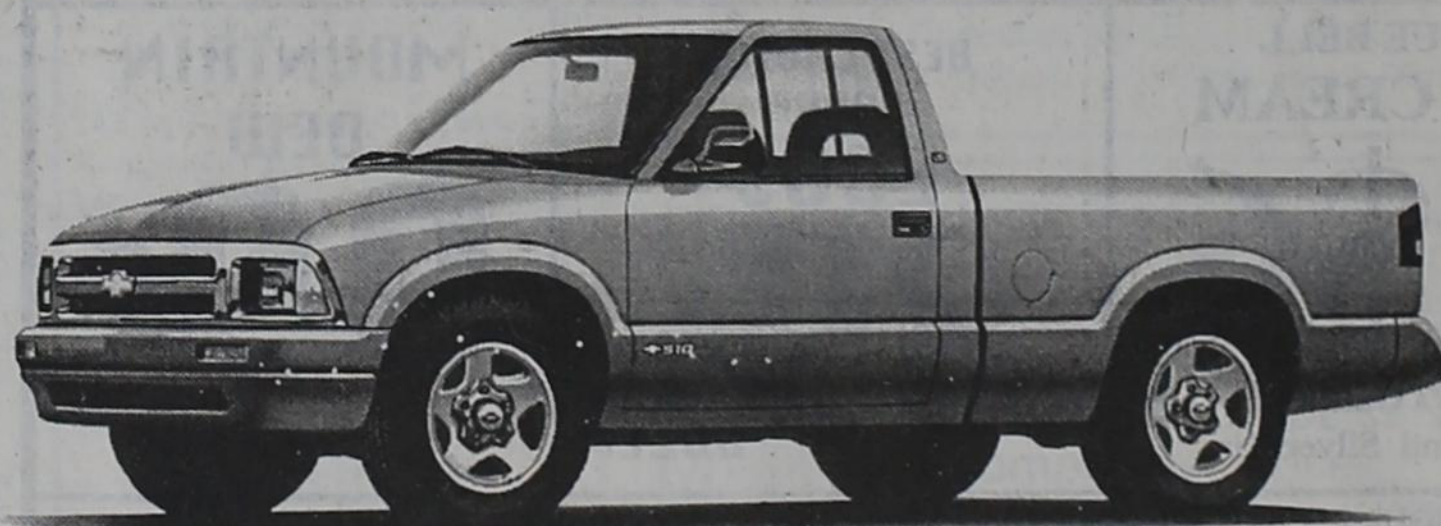
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
