Hall County poultry breeders will have a show this year—February 21 and 22, following which the Hall County Poultry Association will be re-organized and officers elected.

Decision to have the annual spring show this year was made at a meeting of breeders and poultry enthusiasts with Mrs. Roy Guthrie, County Agent W. B. Hooser and Gene Barentt, vocational agriculture teacher, expressing the opinion that the time was ripe for resuming the annual shows.

The show will be held in the Hollis Boren building just west of the J. C. Penny store. All entries must be in place by the night of February 21. Judging will be completed by the night of February 22.

Awards will be made on individuals and pens. A special show committee, headed by Mr. Hooser, was named. Serving with him are Dr. Ted Franklin, Mrs. Del E. Wells of Lakeview; Mrs. Charlie Franz of Turkey and Thurmon Hutchins of Estelline. Gene Barentt is acting secretary; C. A. Williams is superintendent of the show, assisted by Ira Lawrence. A special committee to arrange for commercial exhibits at the show is composed of Roy Guthrie, R. A. Massey and Mr. Hooser.

Following the death of E. M. Ewing, president of the association for several years and one of the county's leading poultry enthusiasts, the annual show was called off in 1942 and 1943.

It is planned, however, to re-organize the association at a meeting called for the night of February 22, at which time officers will be elected.

Venire of 50 Men Is Summoned for Murder Case Jury

Negro Will Go to
Trial Monday; Five
Indictments Returned

A special venire of 50 men from which to select a jury for the Walter Houston murder case has been summoned by Sheriff W. C. Anderson for next Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

Houston, a negro, was indicted by the grand jury this week for the murder of Ernest Verge, another negro. He is in the county jail.

County Attorney Allen Grundy will assist District Attorney Sam Hamilton in the prosecution of this case.

A second murder case has been set for trial before District Judge A. S. Moss. It is the case of Barney Blair, under indictment on a charge of murder in the death of his former wife Bessie Blair.

This case is set for Monday, February 21, and a special jury venire of 150 men will be summoned next week.

Five felony indictments were returned by the grand jury this week.

Three indictments charging forgery were returned against John Hammer.

Robert Leister was indicted on a charge of removing mortgaged property from the state. The fifth indictment was the Houston murder case.

Less Than Half of Bond Quota Has Been Raised

Ink or Indelible Pencil? Anyway It's an OPA Mess

It's either ink or indelible pencil, or both—or maybe it isn't. Or, maybe the OPA doesn't know, or is guessing, or is putting out conflicting stories.

At any rate some of the gasoline retailers say they have been warned by OPA officials that gas coupons must be endorsed in ink—and that an endorsement with indelible pencil can not be accepted.

The OPA district office in Lubbock, however, sent The Democrat a news item saying that either "ink or indelible pencil" is a legal endorsement.

Most of the dealers are accepting indelible pencil endorsements, as they have all along, and inasmuch as such an endorsement is generally accepted as legal on most government business it is not believed that retailers in Memphis will have any trouble getting their coupons redeemed.

It's confusing though, isn't it, to be told one thing—and then told something else by the same group of officials.

2 HALL COUNTY MEN, FIRST TO GO IN SERVICE IN 1940, ARE NOW BOTH HOME ON LEAVE

A second lieutenant and an enlisted man are having a reunion in Memphis this week.

They represent one half of Hall County's first detachment to be sent to the Lubbock induction center on November 19, 1940 almost a year before Pearl Harbor.

They are Lt. A. W. (Cobb) Rasco and Pvt. Paul Dodson. Both are home on leaves and it is the first time they have been together since going into the service.

Lieut. Rasco is wearing a new set of wings. He graduated as a pilot on Tuesday at the Blackland Advanced bomber school at Waco.

Pvt. Dodson is on leave from Camp Cooke, California, where he is in the field artillery. Dodson has been in Memphis for a week

Survivors of that ghastly "Bataan Death March," still huddling in Jap prison camps, their bodies wasting away from starvation, lack of medical care and from the ravages of disease, they can't read the home-town news from Hall County.

They don't even get letters from home. We know what they've gone through, how they have suffered how thousands of them succumbed to the ordeal at the hands of their brutal captors.

We know from reading the experiences of Col. Dyess and the handful of others who escaped from the Philippine hell-holes set up as prison camps, what war is in an impersonal way. Our sympathy goes out to them. We say we wish we could do something to help them, to help bring about total victory over our enemies.

Yet, if the survivors of Bataan did have an opportunity to hear from the home front—we're speaking of Hall County now—they would learn this bit of news:

Hall County has not bought one half of its quota of the Fourth War Loan bonds—and the campaign ends next Tuesday, February 15.

These figures would be down in print for the survivors of Bataan to read: Our quota is \$479,000; up to Wednesday we had purchased \$205,049 in bonds.

The question is not what would these men think, but what are the people of Hall County going to do about it?

Chairman C. T. Johnson of the county committee doesn't doubt the sincerity or patriotism of the people of Hall County. He has seen them "come through" on various occasions in putting over the task at hand. He thinks that the lack of personal solicitation is responsible for the showing to date, that because they have not been personally approached and asked to buy bonds, hundreds and hundreds of persons have not bought.

Most people are busy. Persons serving on committees do not have the time to see everyone. Therefore, the appeal is urgently made that citizens do not wait to be solicited, but that they go to the nearest bank or postoffice or other issuing agency—and buy all of the bonds they can.

Next Tuesday is the deadline. The national goal is 85 per cent subscribed. Nathan Adams of Dallas, state war finance chairman, reported Wednesday that the Texas quota is 71 per cent subscribed.

Hall County has not reached the 50 per cent mark.

A statewide radio program will be given Friday night from 8 to 8:30 o'clock in behalf of the "final push" in the Texas campaign.

Legion Will Help Discharged Men on Pay Applications

Should Have Discharge
Recorded, Davis Warns
Before Papers Mailed

Men eligible for mustering out pay are offered the services of the Charles R. Simmons post of the American Legion in filling out their applications, Post Commander W. C. Davis has announced.

A special committee with Jim Vallance as chairman has been named by the post to give this aid to the men who have been discharged.

Commander Davis warns service men that they should have their discharge papers recorded in the county clerk's office and that certified copies should be used in making application for the mustering out pay.

Mustering out pay ranges as follows: Less than 60 days service, \$100; more than 60 days \$200; and overseas duty, \$300.

Marines will file their application with the Corps commandant, Washington; navy and coast guard enlisted men with the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts, Field Branch, U. S. Navy, Cleveland, Ohio; and men in the army, to their state finance office, which in Texas is Transport building, Fort Worth.

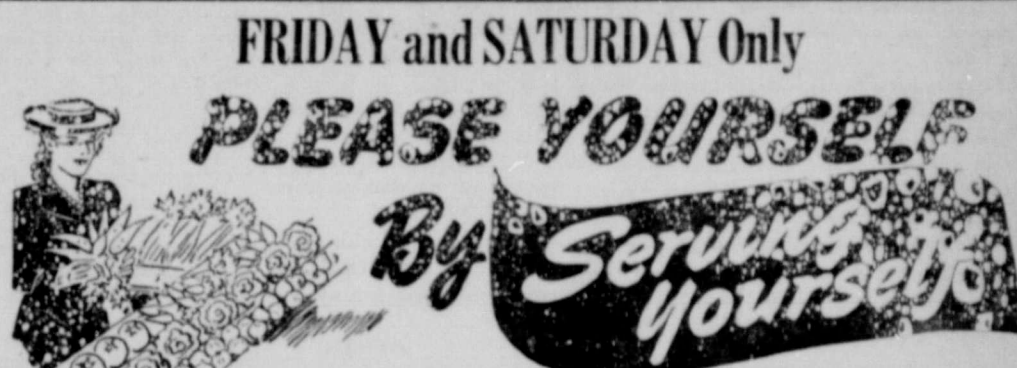

"Last Sunday, with other members of my Legion post, I went to a church in my home town for a memorial service for Edward T., the first local boy killed in action in World War II. Truthfully, I only attended because our Commander asked us to.

"The Rev. K. read the scripture lesson, taken from I Samuel 20, dealing with the wonderful friendship between Jonathan and David, in which when they realized that David must flee for his life from the wrath of King Saul, Jonathan said: 'Tomorrow thou shalt be missed.' And as the good pastor dwelt on the many places where Edward would be missed, I was still missing the true significance of the memorial service, for try though I might, I could not recall that I knew this boy personally.

"Then like a bolt of lightning it struck me: Here was a boy I never knew who owed me nothing, who traveled thousands of miles away from those whom he did know and love, and died for me.

"As I sat overwhelmed by the thought, the good pastor continued. 'Edward died that we might have freedom of religion.'

"Freedom of religion. As the words rang in my ears, I thought of myself and thousands of others who have no time for worship on Sundays, of the half filled churches and the seeming indifference of thousands—and yet this boy died for this freedom.

"Freedom from want, freedom from fear and want. . . these words challenged me. I thought of all the scheming, complaining and cheating in regard to gasoline, food rationing and the many war restrictions. Had I not complained because I was asked to give a little of my time to selling Bonds? I thought of the many excuses that I heard when I finally did go half-heartedly on my mission.

"Freedom to do the things I want to do. . . and I looked around me and wondered. Just a mere handful could find time to honor the memory of this boy who had given his life that all of us might do the things we want to do.

"As I sat in the church with the faithful few who would miss Edward in the morning, a challenge came to me: Here is a boy whom I never knew, yet he went to his death that I might enjoy this land of ours and all its wonderful opportunities. Am I worth dying for? Are you worth dying for?

"I cannot truthfully say 'Yes' to this question. I can only hope that as the burdens and sorrows of this war bear down on us, I may never fail to hear that challenge, and that I may try to do my part honestly and unselfishly.

S/Sgt. A. F. Day, of the Dalhart Army Air Field, has sent us a copy of a letter addressed to "Honorable Lawmakers" concerning the Soldier's Vote Bill. The sergeant is of the opinion that Congress is making a political football of the soldier's vote question and that there has been "entirely too much arguing and not enough action." He condemns Senator Taft, of Ohio, who accused the president of insulting the Congress when he called for adequate legislation on the servicemen's vote issue. To the Senator, Sergeant Day says, "We (the servicemen) feel that your conduct is a direct insult to us. We feel that your vote proposal in passing the issue down to the 48 states is a clever way of making it impossible for some of us to vote."—Dalhart Texan.

We stress "equality" in our land but shy away from it when it comes to bearing the burdens and sacrifices of the fight."—Wheeler Times.

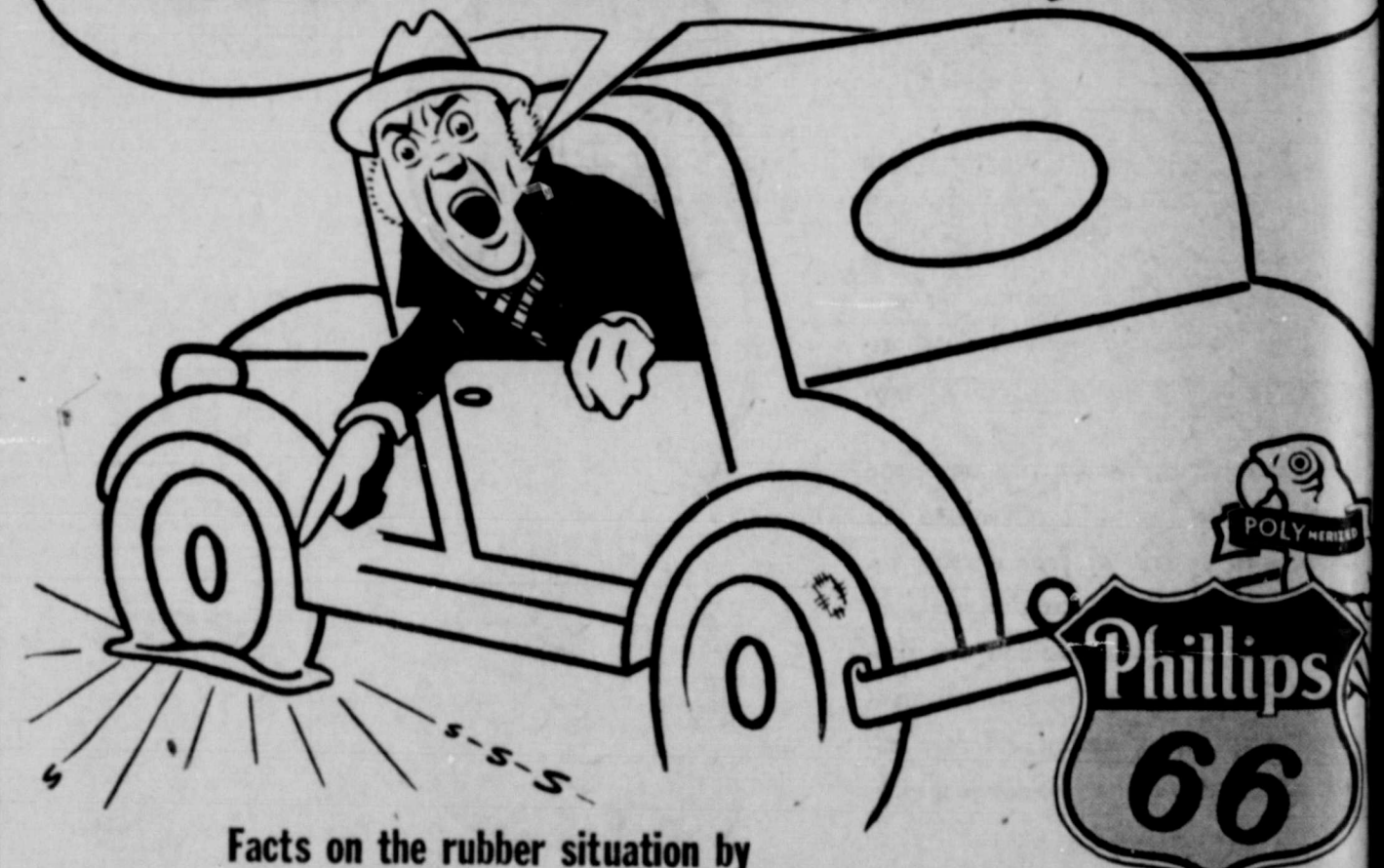

Truck Owners Are Warned on Tires

Danger of large numbers of Texas trucks being laid up on account of lack of tires was stressed here today by W. W. Leigh, assistant to the rubber director, Washington.

Unless truck and bus operators of this state pay more attention to proper loading and speeds and especially to recapping tires many will find themselves without tires in the next few months, he said.

At a meeting of truck and representatives of the Office of Defense Transportation and Office of Price Administration, the Washington official called attention to the fact that only 33 tires have been recapped in recent months in Texas for every 100 new tires issued. The national average is 65.4, he said. New York's average is approximately 88 and Minnesota's more than 100.

Truck operators blamed lack of manpower for failure to take tires to recappers when worn smooth.

"You people of Texas must practice conservation as you have never before," the Washington official said. "Used tires have been shipped into Texas to keep the cars going but I tell you now the supply is vanishing."

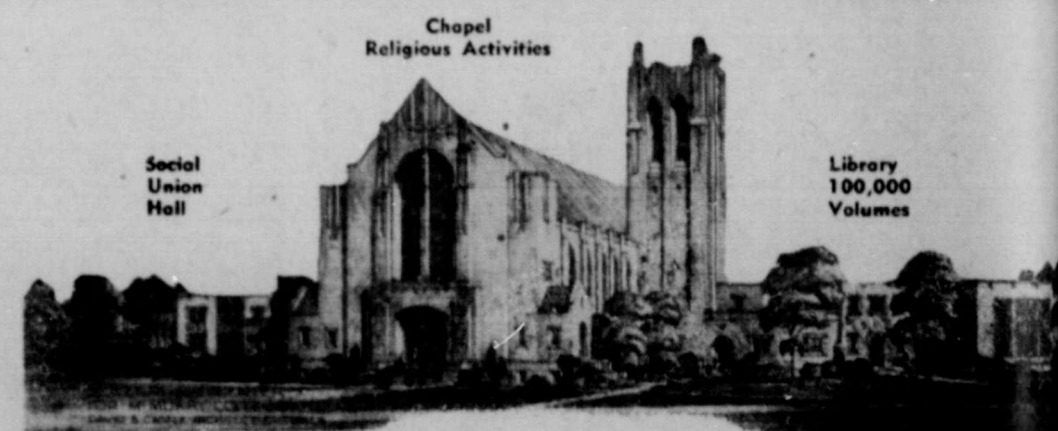
