County Ponders Budget Problem

Members of the County Commissioners Court held a budget workshop Friday.

"We must cut spending to the bone," Commissioner Johnny Shackelford stated.

Because of questions raised by the new tax relief law as to anticipated revenue and because of increased inflation, the county is facing a deficit spending situation, if the current budget is approved and the estimated tax is collected.

The budget expenses total \$1,331,485, as currently proposed. The anticipated income is \$978,700. That leaves \$352,785 that must be cut from the budget or adjusted by taxation.

Legally, the tax rate can be increased up to 3 percent without taking

the issue before the public for vote. Assessment on property value can be increased without presenting the issue for public vote, with the provision that the individual involved is notified at least 20 days prior to the convening of the Board of Equalization.

The board met June 27 and will meet again about the same date in 1980, making any tax

revision impossible until 1981.

County taxes are currently as high as legally possible on the current assessed valuation. In order to increase taxes the properties in the county will have to be reassessed.

The estimated cost of the reassessment is well over \$100,000, with the county liable for about one fifth that amount. This money would have to be added to the budget and paid for out of taxes.

Commissioners are currently discussing the budget issue with county department heads to try to cut spending to the bare essentials.

Judge Bill Carter presented about 25 areas to be reviewed for possible expenditure cuts.

These areas include, fewer telephones in the court house, revised

maintenance contracts, central control of county equipment inventory, revised policies on use of county credit cards, central purchasing agent, possible secretarial pools, attrition in employment (allowing persons to retire without filling vacancies) and others.

"Something has to be done and we are trying hard to find a workable solution," Carter stated.

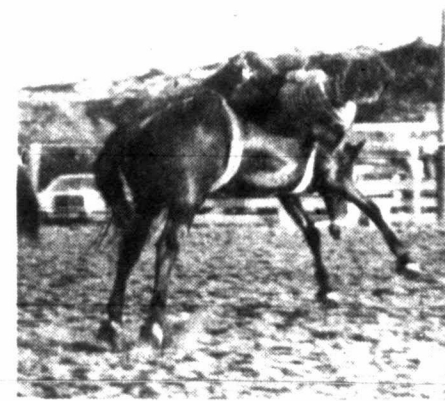
Commissioner Paul Hunter commented, "We must cut back in every area possible."

Commissioners will meet again on July 30 to review the budget. They will discuss ideas with department heads and study cost accounts prior to the meeting.

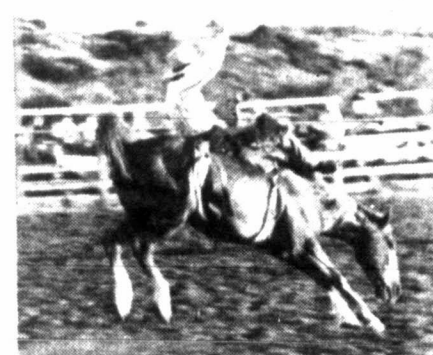
The budget should be approved by August 15 and in the office of the State Comptroller by October 15.

July 4 Fly-In Is Big Success

They came by automobile, airplane, bus, camel, dunebuggy, helicopter, mini-bike and truck to attend the Annual Mitchell County Fly-In.

Spectators and contestants began filtering into the Auxiliary Air Strip at 6 a. m., Wednesday,

for the gala Fourth of July Celebration.

By the end of the day's events, over 2,000 persons had come and gone with more than 100 aircrafts being "flown in" from all over the country.

Awards were given for five categories of pilots. The pilot who

won the trophy for coming the farthest distance was Chris Cooper, a 1965 graduate of Colorado High, currently working for Exxon and living in Anchorage, Alaska.

Cooper flies a Cherokee Warrior and owns a flying service in Alaska. This was the fifth time he and his family have attended the Fly-In.

Last year, Cooper's sister Carol Johnson won the distance trophy when she and her husband, Don, flew in from Little Rock, Arkansas.

Cooper is the son of Bill and Ruth Cooper of Cooper's Cove. He is one of five members of the family who flies.

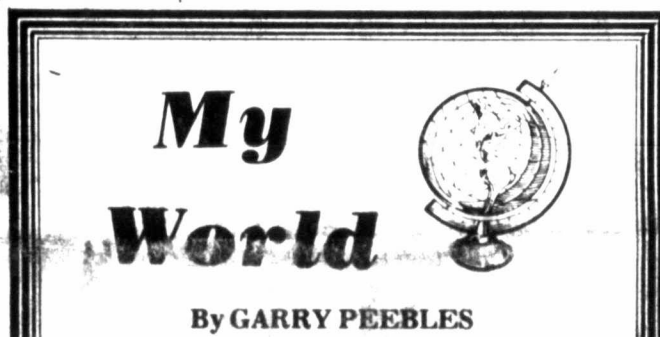
Oldest pilot award went to C. D. Hickson of Wink, Texas. He listed his age as 62 years and 11 months.

"I learned to fly in a Piper Cub in 1937," Hickson commented. A former Mitchell County resident, Hickson has attended the Fly-In for the past three years. He flies a 56 Tri-Pacer.

Hickson and his wife ran the Dairy Frost in Colorado City from 1964-67. He currently owns and operates a dump-truck in and around Wink.

Edward Hart flew in the most unusual plane. In his front yard, he built a single place K-1 aircraft. The wingspan is 17 feet and it will fly at 120 miles per hour.

Hart who lives in Big Sping said he purchased the plans for the aircraft from Rand-Robinson

Traveling Off During Holiday

The combined effects of the gasoline crunch and the July 4 holiday coming in the middle of the week caused a considerable number of people to spend the holiday at home.

Lake Colorado City State Park Superintendent Bill Griffin stated that about 4,400 people passed through gates on Independence Day as compared with 9,555 for the same day in 1978.

Griffin added that even with the smaller number, the park was still full and that it was actually a benefit that fewer people made it as the park had been badly overcrowded on the previous holidays.

He went on to say that overall the park had drawn some 60,000 fewer people up to this point this year than in 1978. Griffin attributed this decline to the gasoline situation, to the fact that the lake level was down from last year and to the

fact that the park was so overcrowded most of the time last year that a lot of those people decided to go elsewhere.

There were other evidences that fewer people were moving about this past July 4 than in previous years. Both of the service stations on Interstate 20, Blessingame Exxon and J&J Gulf, reported that their business was way off from last year's holiday. They both said that it was down by more than half. They gave the reasons for this decline as the fact that the holiday was in the middle of the week and also that many people had been listening to the television and radio stations telling them to stay home.

Although most people may have stayed home, that doesn't mean that everything was completely quiet, however, as reported by Colorado City Police Department. See HOLIDAY Page 2

Changes Made At Loraine

The Loraine City Council passed two ordinances in their meeting Tuesday evening in City Hall.

The ordinances were in regards to alcohol beverages within the city limits and street traffic control signs.

The ordinance on alcoholic beverages states that any person or persons may be fined an amount not to exceed \$100 if found to be in a state of intoxication in a public place within the city limits of Loraine. If any person or persons are found guilty of consumption or in possession of any alcoholic beverages in a public place, outside a personal vehicle, or activity sponsored in the downtown buildings they are subject to a misdemeanor charge and a fine not to exceed \$200.

The ordinance on street signs and traffic control signs states that it is unlawful for anyone to destroy, damage, injure or carry off any city street signs or traffic control signs within the city limits. Anyone found guilty of such an act is subject to a fine of not more than \$200.

The council also passed a resolution to tax automobiles.

An application to the West Central Texas Council of Governments was approved by the council to be re-submitted for request of grants to be used on improvements on water and housing in Loraine.

The council will replace a water meter on a residence as requested by a local citizen.

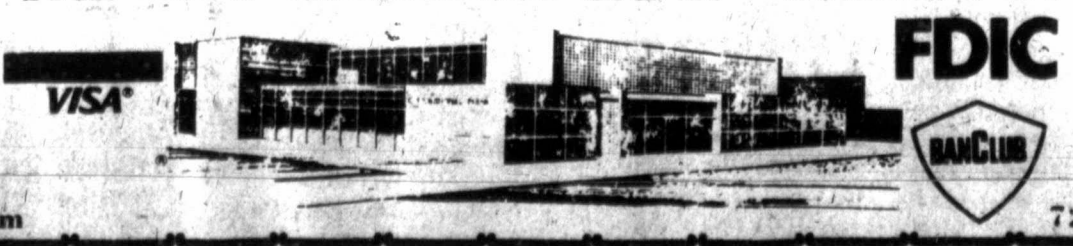

If you're really interested in being a hero I think you should probably settle for being one to your family and friends, since they will probably look past your weak points and let you remain on your pedestal.

Finally, and back to John Wayne, I have a record album which is the sound track of the movie, "The Alamo", which also has one of the short speeches he made in his role of Davy Crockett.

Of course, there is serious doubt that Davy ever actually said any of the following but it sounds good and I think it kind of sums up what I've been trying to say about what a person should be, hero or not.

That's what's important, to feel useful in this old world, to speak out for what's right or to hit a lick against what's wrong, even though you may get walloped for it, cause there's right and there's wrong, you gotta do one or the other. 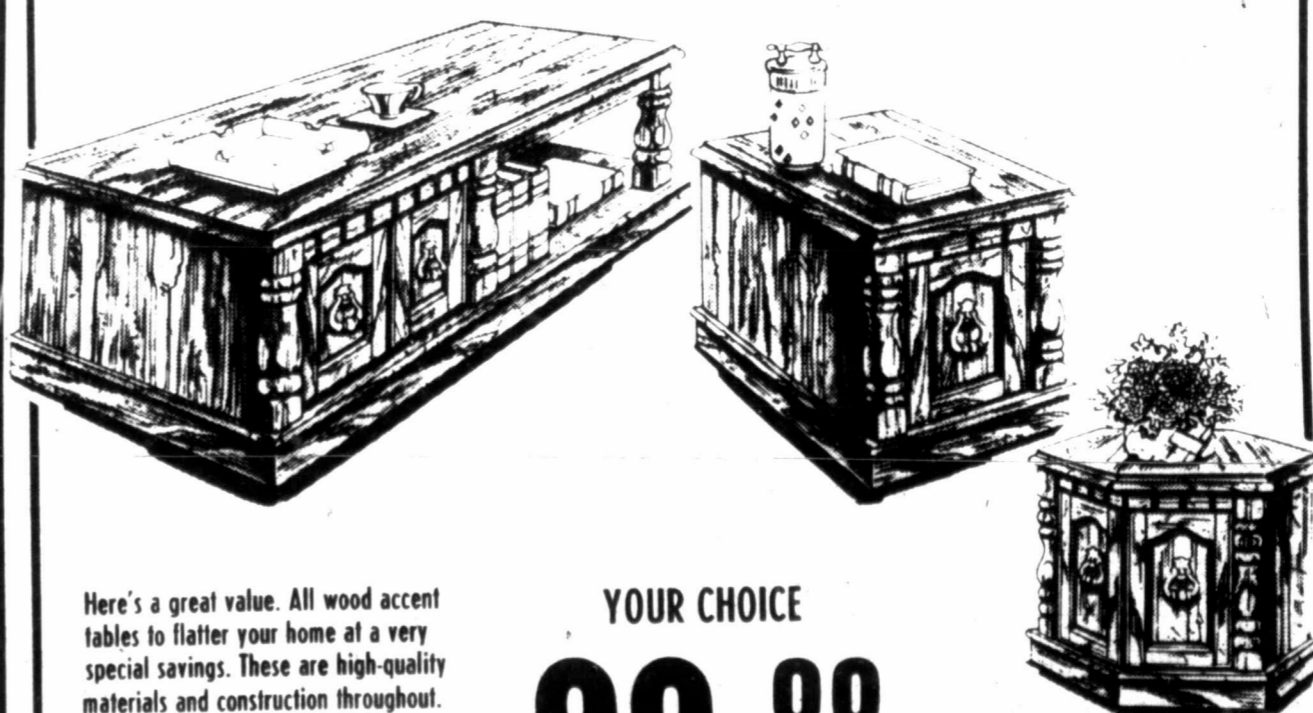

Engineers in California. Reminiscent of Amelia Earhart, a Lockheed 12-A built in 1937 took the prize for the oldest aircraft on display.

The completely refurbished, twin engine aircraft is owned by John Fields Jr. and was flown here by Dean Bennett.

A young man named, Stephen Lister flew a Cessna-150 from Abilene to attend the Fly-In and take the prize for youngest pilot. Lister listed his age as 19 years-young.

Red umbrellas and canvas chairs lined the edges of the runways, as spectators enjoyed parachutist, from the Elm-dale Club in Abilene, performing freeform, relative jumps and canopy relative work.

At one point in the demonstration, a father and son team made a precision jump, with the son riding the guidelines of the father's parachute.

Between planned events, the crowd moved up and down the runway examining fly-in aircrafts and taking brief rides.

Pilots proudly displayed their planes and gave explanations of weight, size, speed and cruising speed.

Doyce Weaver was one of the proudest participants in the show.

He is the 10 1/2-year-old grandson of B. G. Weaver, of Big Spring. "My grandfather built his own airplane. It's great; you should come see it," Doyce said enthusiastically.

The airplane, a low winged, mono-plane (fly-baby) weighs 695 pounds can cruise at 85 mph. It holds 12 gallons of gasoline and has a 400 mile range. The wings fold up, allowing it to be trailered or

stored in the garage. Weaver said it took him two years and eight months to complete the construction in his garage and he attends air shows and demonstrations as a hobby.

The afternoon sky were filled with streaks, dives and tail slides. The infamous death spiral was repeated again and again as daredevil aerobatic pilots went through their paces to thrill the audience below.

One brief flurry of excitement came when one plane was temporarily lost on the horizon and feared downed.

Just as the crowd reached the verge of panic, the brightly painted plane burst into view doing several loop-de-loops over the end of the runway.

With the end of the aerobatics, hundreds of persons again filled the runways, examining aircrafts and enjoying the privilege of climbing in and out of a huge C-130 on loan from Dyess Air Force Base.

Surprise of the day was a visit by Sugar, the Dromedary Camel.

This tender-footed beast could be seen stretching her long neck around corners, over unsuspecting shoulders and under aircraft wings in pursuit of her favorite beverage, Coke-A-Cola in paper cups.

More than one unsuspecting person tempted this desert traveler, to the delight of the hundreds of children continually following her tracks.

She would very gently nudge the cup until it was turned up to her thick lips and drink the contents to the last drop in huge gulping swallows.

Sugar belongs to Phil Kendrick of "The Annual Kendrick Easter Pageant", presented every Thursday and Friday, June 14-August 17 between Cisco and Eastland.

Kendrick purchased the Arabian camel as a baby, seven years ago, to use in the wise man scene of the Pageant.

The Texas Highway Department will present an off-system bridge inventory for discussion.

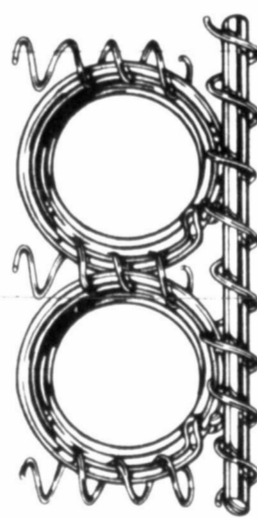
