BY NOW most workers who get a weekly or other periodic paycheck may have been handed the new W-4 form to fill out, part of the "simplified" tax reform measure. The form includes a 4-page instruction sheet designed to confuse the worker as much as possible.

This form is supposed to help you figure out how much you want your employer to hold out of your check for income taxes, and major magazines such as Consumer Reports and television network financial planning commentators have been telling us recently that we all need to fill out those forms, even if they are a pain in various parts of the anatomy (neck, elbow, etc.)

These financial wizards say that all employees need to be sure that their bosses don't hold out any more than they are supposed to, because if they do, the companies are getting the use of the workers' money that the workers need every week to buy beans and things. In other words, they don't want workers to be getting a big refund when they file their tax returns.

I guess they figure that rather than get a big refund, a worker would be better to get the smaller amount withheld each week and then put the difference in a savings account, which would earn him a little money, if he could get by on the same amount as when too much was withheld.

That's all true, but almost nobody would do that. Most workers spend what they

make, and wouldn't put any more away in a savings account.

The main thing these money management advisors apparently don't know is that most workers want their employers to hold out more than they are supposed to, figuring that it's better to get a couple of hundred bucks back every year than to have to come up with that much more in taxes.

Many of us count on that annual refund for vacation money, to pay another six months of car insurance or whatever.

The W-4 form does allow the employee to tell his/her boss to hold out extra dollars each week, so those who want to do things just like they always have can do so.

Meanwhile, the law says you must file a W-4 form if you work for wages, and it must be filed by next October. If you don't, you then have a choice of either giving the government all the money you make, being executed by hanging, or being locked in a little room for six months with all four walls papered with government forms.

HENRY FORD reportedly had a habit of going to the offices of other executives whenever a problem had to be discussed, rather than calling them into his office. He did it to save time, explaining that "I've found that I can leave the other fellow's office a lot quicker than I can get him to leave mine."

Daylight Burglars Again Ransack Rural Home

Attempts were made to break into O'Donnell Lumber and Hardware, the mini-mall and a barber shop.

Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering \$500 rewards in the O'Donnell burglaries and in a major

Gardner advised that the school has received a very complimentary report from the accreditation committee of the Texas Education Agency, which reported after visiting the school that it is in very good compliance with TEA standards. The committee did suggest a need for an elementary library, and the school board president, Joe Hays, instructed the administration to look into the feasibility of adding such a library.

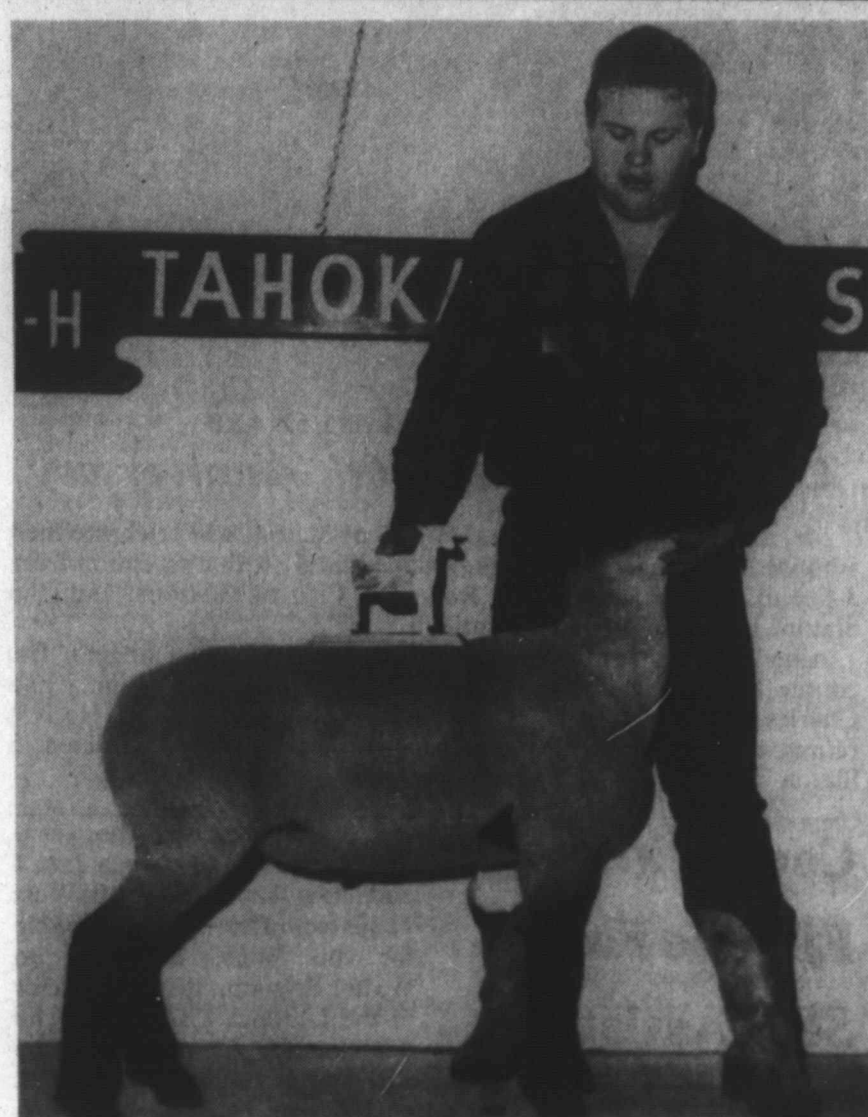

Curried Turkey with Water Chestnuts

After the holidays, use leftover turkey in this deliciously different mild curry dish. Grand for entertaining.

1/4 cup	oil	3 tbsp.	flour
1 bunch	green onions	1 tsp.	curry powder
1	small stock celery	1 tsp.	paprika
1	green pepper, sliced	1/2 tsp.	sweet basil
1 tbsp.	slivered almonds	1 1/2 cups	chicken broth
2 cups	water chestnuts, thinly sliced	1/4 cup	pimiento
2 cups	diced, cooked, turkey or chicken	1 cup	drained pineapple tidbits

Slice green onions and celery diagonally, about 1/2 inch thick. Heat oil in a skillet and sauté onions, celery and peppers until slightly browned. Add almonds, water chestnuts and cooked turkey. Mix well with flour, paprika, curry powder and basil. Sauté lightly, stirring constantly, until well blended.

Mix in broth, pimiento and pineapple. Cover and let steam briefly. Season with pepper. Serve on rice. A good accompaniment is Cranberry Chutney.

There were no injuries reported in any of the other wrecks, including four worked in the county by Dept. of Public Safety officers. Of those four, two Friday and two Saturday, three vehicles overturned and one struck a tree.

In jail during the week were one person for public intoxication, one for no drivers license and no insurance, and one for no drivers license.

Retired school teacher donates funds for laser to Texas A&M University

COLLEGE STATION — A conversation five years ago made an impact on a retired schoolteacher who in turn made an impact on the veterinary facilities at Texas A&M University.

Mrs. Maurine Mullins, who resides near Weatherford, has presented \$50,000 to Texas A&M University to purchase an advanced laser for veterinary eye surgery.

Texas A&M will have the nation's only veterinary school with exclusive access to such a device, said Dr. Dean Gage, associate dean of veterinary medicine. A similar instrument in North Carolina is shared by several institutions.

Mullins, who taught school in Fort Worth for nearly 40 years, has been supportive of Texas A&M veterinary programs in the past, explained Gage. Because of her support, five years ago she was invited to tour surgical facilities at the newly expanded small animal clinic.

In conversation during the tour, she asked Dr. Ned Ellett of Texas A&M about the possibility of a laser instrument for veterinary ophthalmology. She recalled that conversation as one of the reasons for her donation, said Gage.

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Texas Consumers Still Optimistic

Despite a stormy 1986 state economy, many Texas consumers as they headed into 1987 seemed to be weathering the downturn with enough confidence to consider major purchases during the next year.

That is the conclusion drawn from a survey by the Institute for Communications Research (ICR) at Texas Tech University. The mail and telephone survey of 387 Texas residents asked the likelihood that they would make a major purchase of a home, car, major home appliance or personal computer during the next year.

Almost 40 percent thought it likely they would buy a major appliance and more than a quarter felt the same about buying a car. Almost 19 percent considered it likely they would buy a personal computer and nearly 10 percent thought a house was a likely purchase during 1987.

On a new home—the biggest investment most people make—9.4 percent of the survey respondents considered a purchase likely or very likely in the next year. Men and women were almost identical in their belief a home purchase was likely as 9.6 percent of the males and 9.3 percent of the women thought so.

Surprisingly, the likelihood of a home purchase cuts across all income levels fairly closely. About 7 percent of those making under \$10,000, 7.9 percent of those making between \$10,000 and \$20,000, 9 percent of those making between \$20,000 and \$30,000, 11 percent of those making between \$30,000 and \$50,000 and 12 percent of those making over \$50,000 thought a home purchase possible.

Of the survey respondents, 27.5 percent considered it likely or very likely that they would buy a new car during the next year. That compares with 68.1 percent who thought it unlikely and 4.4 percent who were uncertain.

As incomes rose, the greater

the likelihood respondents would buy a new car. Those making under \$50,000 totaled 61 percent of the respondents but only 12.6 percent thinking a car purchase was likely. By contrast, those making more than \$50,000 accounted for 39 percent of the respondents and 15.9 percent of those planning on buying a new car.

Some 39.2 percent of the respondents said they were likely to buy a major home appliance during the next year. Of the respondents, 49.2 percent said they were unlikely to buy an appliance and 11.5 percent expressed uncertainty.

Among Texas consumers, 18.9 percent thought it likely they would buy a personal computer during the next year.

1987 Farmers Home Emergency Loans Tied To Crop Insurance

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for 1987 losses will need to have crop insurance if it is available, FmHA State Director, J. Lynn Futch said.

"All family-size farms should be aware that a newly-effective provision of the 1985 farm bill prohibits our making emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under multiple-peril crop insurance programs sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC)," said Futch.

"Therefore I urge every family-size farmer in the State of Texas to seriously take into account this new relationship between insurance coverage and emergency-loan eligibility."

Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is now available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice, plus an additional 35 specialty crops in

most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the program costs by about 50 percent, Futch said, making crop insurance a worthwhile option to consider regardless of the newly-required tie-in with emergency loan eligibility.

If a farmer obtains the insurance required, and if the value

of his crop loss is still 30 percent or more after the insurance payment, the operation will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.

Effective in January, the new requirement will affect crops planted in 1987, and thus will not affect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987. Insurance must be multiple-peril, covering most forms of disaster, rather than hail-only.

Fighting Cancer

News from The American Cancer Society

Everyone knows that the best time to put out a fire is when the fire is a small one, rather than waiting for it to become a large forest fire. The same holds true in the treatment of cancer. The cancer which is small and limited to a confined site is easier treated, and the results are often far superior to those for the treatment of large cancers which have spread to other parts of the body.

It is known that cancer starts with one, or a small number of abnormal cells. These cells continue to multiply and often live longer than their normal counterparts. The cancer cells are often "less" sticky and break off into

the bloodstream and lymphatics, and then travel to other sites in the body where the cancer begins to multiply and grow. With time, these cancer cells develop a resistance to the various modes of therapy, whether it be radiation therapy or chemotherapy. These cells "learn" to adapt to an environment which views these cells as being abnormal, and develop the ability to withstand various methods of cellular destruction.

The best time to eliminate the cancer is when it is small. The small tumors are technically easier to remove by surgery. Small younger tumors have not yet developed the internal metabolic sophistication to resist radiation or chemotherapy as well as the larger cancers.

How do we detect the cancers in their infancy? Presently, we have several means by which we could make the diagnosis of 40 percent of all cancers before they have spread to other parts of the body. These include simple physical examinations, mammography, pap smear, and blood tests. Everyone should undergo periodic screening for the early detection of cancer; your physician will know the proper schedule for these tests.

Over the next several months,

we shall discuss in more depth the early warning signals, the various modes of detection, and describe how we treat cancer once it is found. Should you desire more information, please contact the American Cancer Society.

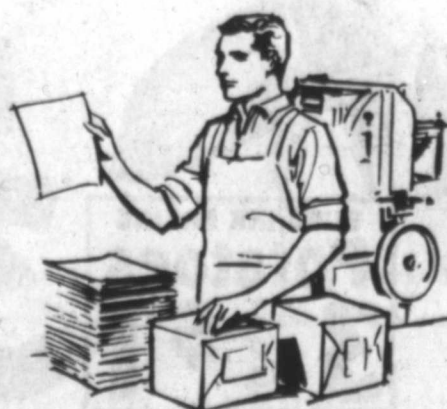

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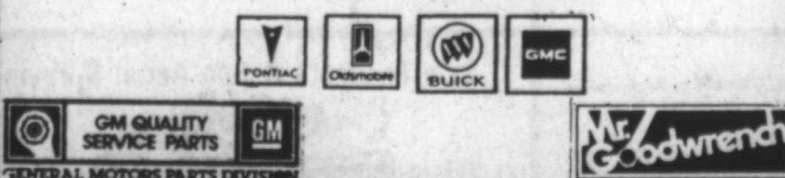
