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State Capital News

Gov. Preston Smith's decision to run for a third term drew sharp new attention to an increasingly crowded and complex 1972 political scene.

Smith said he would seek vindication in strict-loan scandals. He plans to tell "over and over" that he killed (by veto) the bank deposit legislation urged by Houston banker Frank Sharp which the legislature passed in 1969.

Meanwhile, former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough said odds are now 10-to-one he will be a candidate—either for governor or the senate—next year. But he declined to indicate which race is most likely to attract him.

State Sen. Wayne Connally, youngest brother of U.S. Secretary of Treasury (and former Governor) John B. Connally, jumped into the lieutenant governor's race. Connally is a conservative Democrat.

Harold (Barfoot) Sanders of Dallas reportedly is getting set to run for the U.S. Senate as a Democrat.

Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso indicated he will reveal at a dinner in his home town December 7 whether he will enter the lieutenant governor's race or stand for re-election.

Republicans, calling for a "top to bottom cleanup" in state government, began recruiting preliminaries, concentrating on the governor's race. (They already have a U.S. Senate candidate, incumbent John Tower).

The Republicans, in an informal statewide poll of gubernatorial preferences, came up with S. Ross Perot, wealthy Dallas businessman, who is a political independent, as their favorite.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Dolph Briscoe, Uvalde rancher-banker, continued full-fledged campaigns for governor. Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall and Houston newspaper executive William P. Hobby Jr. have been in the lieutenant governor's race for months.

COURTS SPEAK
Texas Court of Criminal Appeals upheld a new law which allows those accused of crimes to waive rights to a grand jury indictment before trial in cases where the death penalty is not applicable.

In other recent cases the Court of Criminal Appeals held "That photographs of a bloody death scene are not automatically prohibited from consideration in murder trials."

"That a court is not to look beyond a bill as passed by the legislature to consider if the act creating a new trial court was duly submitted to a special legislative session by the governor."

COURT COST 'SURTAX' PROFITABLE

Some 716 cities and the 254 counties collected \$335,348.70 during September from a new "surtax" on court costs earmarked for improving criminal justice.

Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported on first collection under the law. Money will meet state and local matching fund needs for federal grants under the Omnibus Crime Control Act.

The new law provides an additional court cost assessment of \$2.50 for a misdemeanor case conviction in a court where jurisdiction is limited to a \$200 maximum fine and specifically includes traffic violations. It also directs a \$5 additional charge on other misdemeanor convictions and \$10 for felony convictions, to be collected as other fines or costs in cases.

AUTO LICENSE OBJECTION WITHDRAWN
A new Texas Motor Vehicle Commission member withdrew his protest to licensing of an objection auto dealer in Corpus Christi.

Jack McKenzie pulled down his objection to TMVC's granting a regular license to Barton-Grubbs Volkswagen, which began operations in Corpus Christi three months ago. McKenzie who operates a VW deal

ership, said he remains convinced he proved that a competitor in the city was not needed for several years. But he conceded, "reasonable men may differ on the facts presented."

December 1 was the deadline set by the new Motor Vehicle Commission act for new car dealers, distributors, manufacturers and factory representatives to get required state licenses. McKenzie said the hearing before the Commission November 4 was "vital" and served a purpose in "forcing the factory to justify its actions."

HOSPITAL PLAN AVAILABLE
A draft of the 1972 Texas state plan for construction and modernization of hospitals and related medical facilities is available for public review at the State Health Department here.

The plan is the basic document on which the State Board of Health will make recommendations for federal Hill-Burton grants and subized loans.

Fifty applicants are requesting \$44.5 million in Hill-Burton grant funds and \$58.5 million in mortgage insurance. The requests are aimed at providing financing for construction in excess of \$215 million. Hill-Burton provides both grant and loan programs to build and modernize general hospitals and long-term-care facilities, outpatient centers, tuberculosis hospitals and public health centers.

The Texas plan also contains a complete inventory of most health facilities in the state, a delineation of 134 service areas, determination of area needs and priorities and methods of administration.

BOLLWORM WARNING ISSUED
Unless the pink bollworm is controlled within the next few weeks, heavy losses, if not complete ruin, can be expected for the cotton crop in North and North Central Texas, the state agriculture department warns.

Commissioner John C. White said farmers must take immediate steps to destroy cotton stalks and plow under debris as quickly as rains will permit. End of November was the plow-up date for more than 40 counties in the North-North Central area.

VETS PROTEST NEW SCHOOL
Creation of a new veterinary medical school at Texas Tech in Lubbock will contribute to an oversupply of veterinarians in the state, Texas Veterinary Medical Association stated.

TVMA said the money could be spent better in aiding medical professions which have a shortage of doctors. Vets educated in Texas are already having to go out of state to get jobs, the association argued.

A farmer for 11 years in Gray, Donley and Wheeler counties, he also had served as a city commissioner and a member of the McLean School Board.

He was a retired Chevrolet dealer, and had won several sales awards in the district comprising his dealership.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, J. E. of Roswell, N. M., Bill of the home, and Joe of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. Tommy Johnson of Canyon; and 13 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

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Hunting License Sales Heading For New High

Hunting license sales rolled along at a record pace this week as the deer and turkey seasons opened over most of Texas.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials reported a total of 290,621 resident hunting licenses were sold in September and October, compared to 288,874 for the first two months of the 1970-71 license year.

If the pace is maintained as expected, license sales will exceed last year's 780,659 resident licenses sold and their value of \$2,341,759.

Sales of exempt licenses for hunters under 16 and over 65 also are running ahead of last year, as are non-resident license sales.

The fiscal year 1970-71 saw more than \$2.6 million in revenue brought into the state's coffers from sales of the four major hunting licenses -- resident, non-resident, exempt and five-day migratory bird license.

Prairie Chicken Have Few Panhandle Hunters

The Panhandle prairie chicken harvest went begging this year, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

The birds were in little danger because of the lack of hunters. During the two-day seasons hunters bagged only 179 chickens.

However, the 116 hunters confessed firing 664 times to down the 169 birds they took home, no doubt hoping their wives wouldn't ask how many they saw or shot at.

The prairie chickens were plentiful. Shotgunners saw an estimated 2,060 birds during the 326 hours they spent in the field.

Hunters Take 44 Aoudad Sheep

Hunters in the Palo Duro Canyon area of the Texas Panhandle harvested 44 aoudad or Barbary sheep during the 1971 season, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A total of 147 permits was issued to landowners.

The 1970 harvest in the same area tallied 41 animals. One ram this year had 32-inch horns, a respectable trophy.

The heaviest sheep taken was a 210-pound ram.

A total of 44 aoudads from the McKnight Ranch in New Mexico were stocked by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in 1957. The herd is estimated at about 650 animals and is annually spreading its range. The sheep is a game animal only in eight Panhandle counties. In other parts of Texas the animal is considered an exotic and may be harvested at any time of year.

West Texas game management officials say the deer and turkey harvest may be slightly down from the same period last year, but hot weather has been a factor and most hunters are anxiously awaiting frosty weather to make all game species more active. Heavy vegetation makes game difficult to see, but turkey hunters are pleased with the large numbers of birds they are finding.

During late summer months many West Texas hunters were feeling glum about turkey prospects for the Permian Basin and Edwards Plateau, but they are finding more turkeys than expected.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists said earlier in the year that the carryover of birds indicated a good hunt for 1971, but many hunters bemoaned the low poultr crop. The predictions proved out, as deer hunters are downing some fat gobblers.

Gobblers as small as 16 pounds have been reported, but others up to 23 pounds live weight with grandpa-sized beards have made hunting well worth the effort.

EDUCATION CORNER

I believe that Education is a cooperative enterprise in which many agencies participate. The public schools should provide those essential educational services that are not provided by other agencies in our society. The public schools thus have a primary or chief responsibility for some phases of our education and partial or shared responsibility for other phases. The schools have the primary responsibility for:

1. Basic general education, including literacy
2. Shared responsibility for education in such fields as safety, health, and character.

In order to improve the educational program in the McLean School District, a "five year program" has been established. Every year for five years a major area will be studied and improved by the teaching staff.

This year, 1971-72, audio visual aids have been selected as the major area of study. The next four years, one each year, a major area of study such as Student Discipline, Teacher Evaluation, School and Community Relations, Communications, Guidance Services, and Health Services, etc. will be studied via the Inservice Training Program.

At the end of each year each principal will write an abstract of the Inservice Training Program and keep it on file to be made available for the accreditation inspectors.

PESO Region XVI Education Service Center will furnish a specialist in audio-visual aids who will conduct the largest portion of the inservice workshops.

All teachers of mathematics in grades 7 through 12 will meet one hour per month December, 1971, through May, 1972.

Each year a different subject will be studied by the principals and the teachers that teach that particular subject in grade.

All teachers new to the McLean Schools this year will meet with their building principals for one hour per month.

Teachers will become more informed about the McLean School District and neighboring school districts.

Teachers will receive instructions regarding the various duties of the teachers and procedures regarding the many and various forms that need to be filled out to meet the many and varied requests of the Texas Education Agency.

Teachers will become aware of the history, tradition and cultural aspects of the McLean Schools and the community that we serve.

Teachers and their students in their classroom, or any other educational setting are the "educational program."

New properties of human blood have been discovered by researchers working at the University of Texas in Austin and Galveston which may have profound influence on the diagnosis of certain disease conditions.

Dr. George B. Thurston, a professor of mechanical engineering and physics at UT found that blood possesses an elastic structure which must be disrupted before normal flow can take place.

"It is already known that a close relationship exists between the viscosity (thickness) of blood and coronary heart disease and peripheral arterial diseases," said Thurston. "An exact measurement of the blood elasticity may provide a more precise index to this thickening condition."

Such information is needed to understand the behavior of the distribution of the blood in the circulatory system. It is also necessary for the design of devices used in cardiovascular surgery, including artificial heart valves, circulatory assist pumps and artificial hearts.

"In the artificial pumping of blood, it is well known that the blood becomes damaged," said Thurston. "It is possible that one origin of this damage rests with the sticking between the red blood cells, which form the elastic structures."

The blood studies are being continued to explore further the influence of commonly used additives, such as aspirin, upon the elastic property of the blood.

In other research in Texas, scientists at the UT Medical Branch in Galveston have discovered that snake venom causes, among other reactions, abnormal-looking red blood cells. The cells become spherical and grow spiny projections, or burrs, all over them. No one year knows why.

Ted Bond and Dr. M. Mason Guest of UT Galveston undertook the venom-blood research after receiving requests from clinicians across the state for information. It seems some snake-bite patients bleed and continue to bleed, and others don't.

The researchers discovered that some venoms cause clotting. Others completely defibrinate, or destroy all the fibrinogen --- the plasma protein necessary for coagulation of normal blood. The cause has not yet been found due to the complex chemistry of snake venom, which contains enzymes and non-enzymic proteins.

Quail Outlook Below Average

Quail hunters will probably have to hunt a little harder for their birds this year.

Bird dogs and their masters will find the going rough, especially early in the season.

The weather doubt'-crossed the hunter -- first by being too dry to early in spring to allow good hatches of birds, then by bringing heavy summer rain to trigger rank vegetation.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials across the state rate the quail populations from "about average" all the way down the scale to "very poor."

Some areas of the state -- notably South Texas -- will have less than half the number of birds as were seen the year before. In almost every quail area around the state the birds remained on the nest through the summer, and some hatches were noted as late as October.

Overall, the situation in the Western third of Texas looks reasonably good, especially in the range of the hardy blue quail. The blues enjoyed some successful late hatches, thanks to added vegetation and insects for food.

The best areas for quail in West Texas probably will be

the Permian Basin and the lower portion of the Edwards Plateau toward Lake Amistad. The quail picture in the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions is expected to be poorer than last year.

The bobwhite situation is more dependent on late hatches.

Moving eastward, some of the better hunting in the state may be in the Possum Kingdom area. An area north of the lake, bounded roughly by Vernon, Wichita Falls, Breckenridge and Stephenville, also looks good.

To the south toward Central Texas and the upper portions of the Edwards Plateau, hunting will be spotty.

Quail hunters in northeast Texas are in for some good shooting, especially after the first of the year. However, they are going to find some rough going a the first of the season due to the rank growth of under brush.

There seems to be plenty of birds, and there is lots of good food. Birds are in excellent shape and should remain fat throughout the hunting season. Hunters will find birds in varying stages of maturity, due to nesting conditions.

In South Texas, biologists have few encouraging words for quail hunters. Birds are few, and under growth is so thick that hunters and dogs will have a difficult time, probably throughout the season. The quail weren't successful in their first efforts in nesting because of the drought, and when they tried later, heavier-than-usual rains took their toll. Biologists report the bobwhite population to be roughly half of what it was last year.

However, in the western portion of the region, quite a few blue quail have been reported so hunting there should be about normal. In Southeast Texas the quail population is higher than usual in the coastal counties. The inland counties had a late hatch, and the birds there are still small.

Vegetation is heavy, and there seems to be a lot of food. Hunting is not likely to be good in the inland counties for some time because of the small quail and dense undergrowth.

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Teenage Diets And Nutrition

Pressure from friends is a major reason teenagers have such poor diets.

Miss Reasonover recently attended the Nutrition Education Conference in Washington, D. C., where youth panels and 25 agencies concerned with youth nutrition, discussed the diets of teenagers. About 400 representatives probed the question, "Who is responsible for developing the dietary habits of youth?"

Values, life styles and environment all relate to teenage nutrition, but peer pressure for conformity is strong. Teenagers conform with blue jeans, long hair, a clean complexion and a slim body, and they conform with their eating habits. So if following a fad diet will mean a slim body, the teen considers it worth a try -- at least for a week.

Natural foods are the latest vad. Teenagers get about one-quarter of their daily intake in snacks. Their habits, then, may be changing, at least for awhile.

Despite the fads, 80% of today young people follow the value patterns of their parents, including eating habits. With few exceptions, dinner is the last nutritional stronghold. And an important way to develop good food habits in the home is to provide a positive learning situation -- one that is part of real life directly involving teens. To succeed, don't be out of reality.

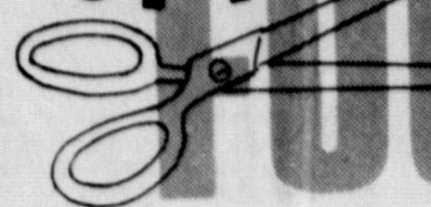

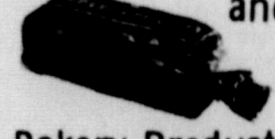
