Mr. Oates informed the News Review that a tentative date of Thursday, November 20, had been set for the cut-over from the present system to dial. Without a delay caused by weather, the officials stated that the change would be made at 6 a.m. on that date.

Tax Collections for October Show Increase Over Last Year

Total taxes collected in Hamilton County during the month of October was \$125,458.01, according to information submitted by Billy G. Wood, tax assessor-collector.

\$120,344.67 in county taxes have been collected, plus \$5,645 collected for the Evant Independent School District.

Mr. Wood stated that 57.13 per cent of the taxes due for state, county and school taxes have been collected, which is above the 53.04 per cent for October last year.

Poll taxes paid to date total 513, which is six less than paid at this time last year.

Uvalde Man Injured Near Here Wednesday

E. P. Barber of Uvalde was injured about 3 p.m. Wednesday when his car overturned east of Hico on Highway 6.

Mr. Barber was taken to Hico Hospital by Barrow-Rutledge ambulance where he was admitted for observation.

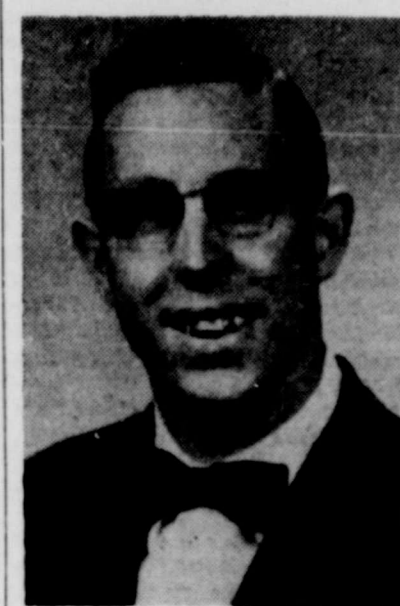

\$982.26 Netted by P-TA in Annual Halloween Carnival

Net proceeds from the annual Halloween Carnival amounted to \$982.26, approximately \$300 more than was made last year, it was reported at the Parent-Teacher meeting last Monday night. Mrs. Jack Barnett was general chairman of the carnival this year.

During the business session, and upon recommendation of the executive committee, members approved the selection of a committee to receive written suggestions from P-TA members pertaining to the expenditure of the money derived from the carnival. The committee, which is composed of Mrs.

W. F. Hafer, Mrs. H. V. Hedges, and Supt. O. C. Cook, requested every member to submit ideas for worthy and needy projects before November 17.

Following a musical program by the sixth grade, which was directed by Mrs. Ruby Brummett, the guest speaker, Dr. E. L. Bowden, chairman of the Education Department of Hardin-Simmons University, spoke on "American Education—Why?"

The sixth and tenth grades won the parent attendance awards.

Refreshments were served in the lunchroom following the program.

Hico residents trudged to the polls in surprising numbers in the Tuesday General Election, casting 214 votes for various candidates. The 214 figure represented the largest number registering in any box in the county. Election Judge A. A. Brown stated that the Hico box led all others by a 30 or 40 vote margin.

The large vote can be attributed mainly to the nine Constitutional Amendments on the ballot, and indirectly to the Senatorial race. A large amount of the success of the vote can also be attributed to local men who went out Tuesday with a loud speaker urging and reminding people to go to the polls.

Hico voters approved three of the Amendments, while vetoing the other six. Number three on the ballot, which provided for vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justice of the Peace to be filled by the Commissioner's Court until the next general election, carried by a vote of 102 to 88.

Number four on the ballot carried 101 to 86. The Amendment called for forced resignation of District, County or Precinct officials who announced for another office while having more than one year to serve in their present position.

The other amendment which carried locally, the old-age assistance proposition, was number 8 on the ballot and received a 100 to 87 vote margin.

The other Amendments drew the following vote: No. 1, 47 for, 137 against; No. 2, 49 for, 136 against; No. 5, 70 for, 109 against; No. 6, 72 for, 118 against; No. 7, 69 for, 117 against; No. 9, 67 for, 111 against.

Supreme Court: Robert W. Hamilton 195; John Q. Adams 8 (Republican).

Local Air Force Sergeant Termed Ambassador in U.S. European Goodwill Tour

HQ 17th Air Force, Libya (Sp).—Swinging through language barriers in North Africa, Asia Minor, and Europe, has earned Staff Sergeant Fred D. Spinks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Spinks of Hico, the accolade of "Ambassador" from one of America's veteran diplomats.

S-Sgt. Spinks, 27, who plays trombone, is a member of the 17th Air Force Band which by mid-October had travelled some 27,000 air miles in the Mediterranean and Mideast areas in continuance of President Eisenhower's goodwill program of American participation in overseas trade fairs as well as providing entertainment for U. S. personnel.

This marks the second year the 17th AF Band—conducted by and under the command of CWO Alfred H. Sanders Jr.—has carried out the musical mission of goodwill to people in Libya, Morocco, Greece, Italy and Turkey.

Covers Plenty of Mileage. In 1957 the band winged nearly 6,000 air miles to further the President's "People-to-People" program. This year the Commanders have been giving plenty of musical mileage, since mid-February they have been on tour an average of 10 days out of every 30.

"Such bouncing around," said trombonist Spinks, who entered the Air Force in June 1948 at Waco, "sometimes means irregular hours and fatigue—but we get to know people in many countries and never miss an engagement."

This spirit has sparked requests for return performances in Moroccan medinas and isolated aircraft control and warning sites, Italian town squares, the downtown park in Tripoli, Libya, as well as historic Iraklion on the mid-Mediterranean island of Crete.

In early May of this year, the band—which has a total weight of 2.5 tons including musical instruments, stands, PA systems, lights, scores, and musicians, accumulated in excess of 1,000 head.

Some antelope, beaver, and wild turkey also abound on the place. Visitors were shown the commercial quail raising project which was undertaken a few years ago. They have facilities to care for about 10,000 birds, and for \$25 a day sportsmen can be assured of killing their limit of birds. If they don't the ranch will make up the amount to 10 birds. The ranch also leases for deer hunting, charging \$25 a day for the privilege.

After the visitors returned from the tour, a Fort Worth catering service served barbecue lunch to the guests.

The huge ranch is truly a show place, and if readers should ever have the opportunity to make a tour of the place, they would perhaps come away as amazed as we were.

According to Spinks—packed into a C47 aircraft at their home base, Wheelus, for a wearisome, ten-hour-long flight to Morocco and appearances at the Moroccan fair in Casablanca at the special request of the U. S. Ambassador to Morocco.

Band Booked Solid.

One reason the 17th AF Band is "booked up solid" for performance in the Mediterranean area at fairs and for other occasions is because the 15 swingin' musicians offer uncanoned, non-political entertainment.

"We," as Sgt. Spinks put it, "go over big on closed circuit TV shows, radio broadcasts, the theater stage, or at a concert in the park."

"At Wheelus we play for Officers', Airmen's, NCO's and service clubs, the high school cafeteria, and for orientations as well as for serenades at seasonal sports events."

"In addition, our marching band activities include retreats, honor guard ceremonies and welcome concerts for incoming personnel at the flightline or at docksides for MSTs ships."

Improves Relations.

Kudos for the Commanders come from all around the Mediterranean. From Iraklion earlier this year, for example, came the report from the American commander at Crete that "Greco-American relations sky-rocketed during the band's several appearances."

"The clincher, however," enthused Sgt. Spinks, "came after our last ten-day tour in Morocco."

It stemmed from Casablanca Governor Ali Bargash's request that the 17th AF Band play for a benefit ball at the city hall and performances in both Casablanca and the Moroccan capital of Rabat for student leagues.

Wrote veteran diplomat Cavendish W. Cannon, then U. S. Ambassador to Morocco: "I am sure the visit of this excellent USAF musical organization has had important results and that the 17th AF Band has further justified its reputation as 'musical Ambassadors' of the United States."

Sgt. Spinks took his initial lessons from the first trombone player of the West Point Military Academy Band. Moreover—he traveled 20 miles for the instructions which he received at his own expense, while stationed at Stewart Air Force Base, N.Y.

Sgt. Spinks is married to the former Margaret Erika Buckmann. Currently they and their children, Karla Lynn, 2, and Laura Lee, 10 months, live at 233 Caroli Bandiera, Tripoli.

Mrs. M. I. Knudson and daughter, Susan, left Saturday for Camilla, Georgia, to visit her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Holder. Mr. Holder recently suffered a stroke, but is recovering satisfactorily.

Expansive Flat Top Ranch. The huge 17,000-acre ranch of Mrs. Pettit, located near Wal-Springs, is a picture of conservation practices which is proof of what can be done with wise management of worn-out land.

Mrs. Pettit purchased the acreage about 20 years ago, and has one of the finest show places in the Southwest out of the depleted range and farm land. Last Monday, the ranch was open to approximately 1,000 invited guests for a field day and tour of the place. The ranch personnel expended no expense in making the one of the finest in the history of the show place. Chartered planes were brought in and guests conducted on a 3-hour tour of the ranch, viewing the improvements, the many varieties of fine trees, lakes, and other conservation practices which have been added to the range during the present ownership.

One of the most amazing things the visitors observed was the abundance of water and the knee-high grass growing on the ranch. Pettit has more than 50 lakes of various sizes laced throughout the borders, which supplies an everlasting supply of water. Even in the six years of severe drought in this area, Flat Top never had a water problem.

The ranch specializes in registered Hereford cattle, but in recent years they have expanded to take in hog operation. The ranch has been known for its abundance of wild game, and officials of the State Game Department estimate that they have a deer population of about 100.

The ranch is truly a show place, and if readers should ever have the opportunity to make a tour of the place, they would perhaps come away as amazed as we were.

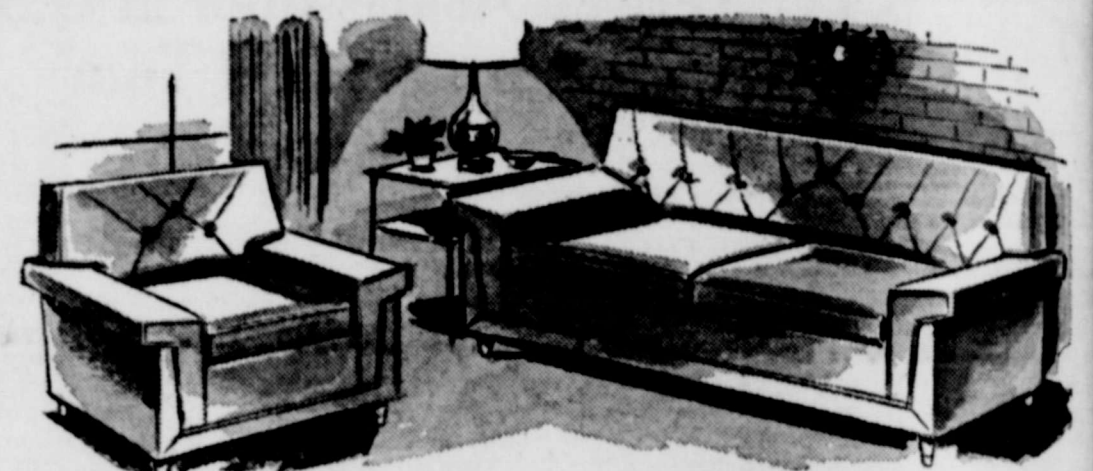

To this union four children were born, one son and three daughters, namely Horace Rowe, Hico Rt. 3, Mrs. T. J. Hill of Dallas, Mrs. R. H. Gaston of Fort Worth and Mrs. W. P. Jones of Stephenville. She is also survived by four grandsons, Gerald Douglas Warren of Dallas, Wyley Gene Jones of Stephenville, Joe and John Gaston of Fort

Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Edd Alley of Albuquerque, N. M. and Mrs. Ora Lee McNeal of Sacramento, Calif.; and three brothers, Walter and Will Parker of Albuquerque, and Thomas Parker of Roswell, N. M. Will Parker attended the funeral services, and we believe one sister also attended. Some of the family were unable to attend.

Mrs. Rowe was preceded in death by her husband 10 years ago. She was converted and joined the Presbyterian Church at an early age.

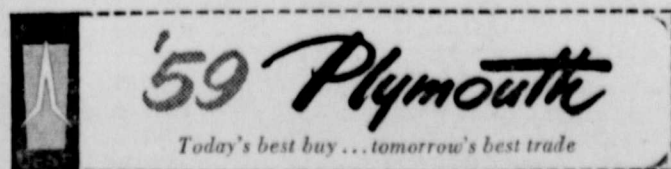

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Life's 'Firsts' Brings Many Fond Memories

Life's Firsts, when recalled, bring many sensations to one. Naturally we do not remember all of life's firsts by any means. But some are remembered rather vividly. Such as one's first train ride, visit to a circus, or attending a great state fair. Well, I suppose I had better recall a few for this week.

My first train ride occurred in 1884, when I was just past three years old. Only two glimpses of events on that train ride recur to mind. We boarded the train at Alvarado, for that was the southern terminus of the M. K. & T. railroad at that time. When we got on the train, it being night, word was received by the crew of the train that it was to be held up by bandits between Alvarado and Fort Worth. All I remember about it was the tension that was evident. As a small kid I remember how scared my mother was and clutched us two children close up to her and was full of alarm each time the train stopped. But nothing happened, whereas I might have had a thrilling memory to treasure of a holdup by old-time bad men, I just remember the tension due to the rumor.

Then the next day as we proceeded toward the town of Bowie on the Fort Worth and Denver railroad, there comes a glimpse to me of how thirsty my Brother Joe was. He had never been on a train, and when he saw the water can in the corner of the coach with its tin cup suspended by a string at the side of the water can, he got awfully thirsty. Mother took him to the water can and gave him a drink. He kept his eye on that water receptacle and in a few minutes he wanted another drink. Mother used to allege that he must have drunk a gallon of water from Fort Worth to Bowie, a matter of less than fifty miles. You observe that I did not say "water cooled", for in those days the water was the temperature of the atmosphere. It was many a year later before water was iced on the trains.

There was the first day I ever saw the inside of a school room. It was the year 1890; the place, Files Valley in Hill County. Miss Laura Grigsby was the teacher, and she was a rather husky female, quite capable of taking care of herself under any ordinary circumstances. In the school that year was a whole herd of big boys, men-size fellows, and every one of them bent on fun, rather than

learning. They deliberately did things to bring on a scene with Miss Laura. And they were boys of the best families of the community.

Miss Laura had them all up at the end of the day and had prepared for the event with a half dozen good long keen dogwood switches. After a brief examination of each culprit she adjudged them all guilty and assessed punishment at a good whaling with those dogwoods. I had never seen such a thing and I was both frightened and amused. Miss Laura really did dust the jeans of those great hulking fellows, a full half-dozen of them. Not a one winced, for it was a tradition among the big boys never to wince or show any fear, and if it hurt just to take it without a whimper. And during the next two months, that is until school ended in March, I saw the splendid young woman teacher thrash that same bunch of boys at least a dozen times. They seemed to enjoy being in the spotlight for a brief time.

Then there was the first time that I ever attended the State Fair of Texas. In those days, the M. K. & T. railroad ran a daily excursion train from Waco to Dallas to carry visitors to the fair. It was due about dawn at Italy where we lived in 1895. But Dad must have been as excited over the event as we two boys were, for he got us up at four o'clock and we walked to Italy a mile and a half and then waited for the train two hours. The train bump-

ed along at the amazing rate of fifteen to twenty miles an hour and we got to the fair grounds in time for dinner, having the delightful experience of riding the pitching trolley cars.

Those old-time four-wheel trolley cars did wonders, looking more like a bucking bronco than anything else.

We saw wonders that day I had never dreamed of. The Midway especially intrigued me, but Dad wanted to see the agricultural exhibits especially, while my brother and I wanted to see all those funny men along the Midway and listen to their pitch as they tried to induce customers to go into their tents.

We did not pick much cotton next day, for we would get to talking about the sights seen on the yesterday and forget to reach for the cotton bolls.

Dr. Jackson of Fort Worth Is Author of Parade Feature

Dr. Holland T. Jackson of Fort Worth, author of a story in next Sunday's Parade, heads the second largest medical association in the nation—the American Academy of General Practice.

The AAGP has grown to 24,000 members in the 12 years since it was founded. Dr. Jackson was one of the 15 physicians who organized the academy, which is devoted to improving patient care and sustaining high standards among family doctors.

Dr. Jackson and other officers and members of the AAGP have now taken on a job as big or bigger than getting the academy started.

They are working toward abolishing the time-honored internships for family doctors. What they propose instead is a two-year training program, called a general practice residency, to start when the student graduates from medical school.

They look upon internships as out-moded and duplications of training that students receive starting in their third year at medical school.

Dr. Jackson and other proponents of the program are now trying to sell the idea before state academies of general practice all over the nation.

Reared in Hico, Dr. Jackson went to Fort Worth after graduating from the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston. He is 48, married and the father of two daughters and a son. The family lives at 211 Crestwood Dr. in Fort Worth.

Former Hico Resident Named to Honorary Society at A.S.C.

Thomas Ray Leeth, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Leeth of Fort Worth, and former Hico residents, was among the 38 students of Arlington State College that have been named to Phi Kappa Theta TSC's honorary scholarship society.

Students were named on the basis of work done in the spring semester of 1958. The honor list is computed on fifteen hours of work by students, and an 89-plus average.

Funeral Services Held Last Friday For Mrs. J. L. Rowe

Funeral services were held at Fairy Baptist Church at 2:30 p.m. last Friday afternoon for Mrs. Jennie Elinor Rowe, 76, with Rev. D. L. Barnes conducting the services. Burial was in Fairy Cemetery.

Mrs. Rowe was found dead in a chicken house at her farm home near Fairy early last Thursday, a short time after her house was destroyed by fire. Doctors said Mrs. Rowe apparently died of natural causes, and had been dead for several hours before her son, J. H. Rowe, who lives nearby, saw the house on fire and investigated. She was the widow of J. L. Rowe, who passed away in 1948. She had resided near Fairy for 48 years.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. T. J. Hill of Dallas, Mrs. W. P. Jones of Stephenville and Mrs. R. H. Gaston of Fort Worth; one son, J. H. Rowe of Hico; two sisters, Mrs. Ed Alley of Albuquerque, New Mex., and Mrs. Ora Lee of Denver, Colo.; three brothers, T. E. Parker of Roswell, New Mex., Walter Parker and Will Parker of Albuquerque; and four grandchildren.

On the Home Range

FALLING LEAVES CAN BE OF VALUE

Leaves which are now falling
and cluttering yards and gardens
can give a boost to next year's
flower or vegetable garden if prop-
erly handled.

Burning leaves may be easier
but the extra time required to

put them in a compost pile will
return big dividends. The compost
can be used next year to increase
soil organic matter or for mulch-
ing flowers, shrubs or vegetables.

Making a compost pile is a
simple operation. Scrap lumber or
a few feet of net wire and four
posts will take care of the en-
closure. Then start with a six-
inch layer of leaves. For every four
square feet of enclosure dissolve
a cup of commercial fertilizer,
such as 8-8-8, or 6-2-6 in wa-
ter and sprinkle the solution over
the layer of leaves.

Continue adding layers until the
pile reaches the desired height.
Leave the top layer somewhat
saucer shaped as a water-holding
aid and cover it with a shallow
layer of soil. Decomposition of the
leaves will be speeded up if the
material is turned and water add-
ed at regular intervals.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Sweet Potato Banana Rolls

2 pounds sweet potatoes
1 tablespoon butter or margar-
ine
1 teaspoon salt
Fourth teaspoon grated lemon
rind
Half cup sugar
1 egg, beaten
2 medium bananas
3 cups crushed cornflakes
Cook potatoes until soft. Re-
move skins and mash. Add season-
ings and beaten egg. Mix well.
Shape potato mixture into 8 balls,
mold around one and a fourth-
inch chunks of banana. Roll in
corn flakes. Place on a lightly
greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350
degrees for 15 minutes. Serves
eight.

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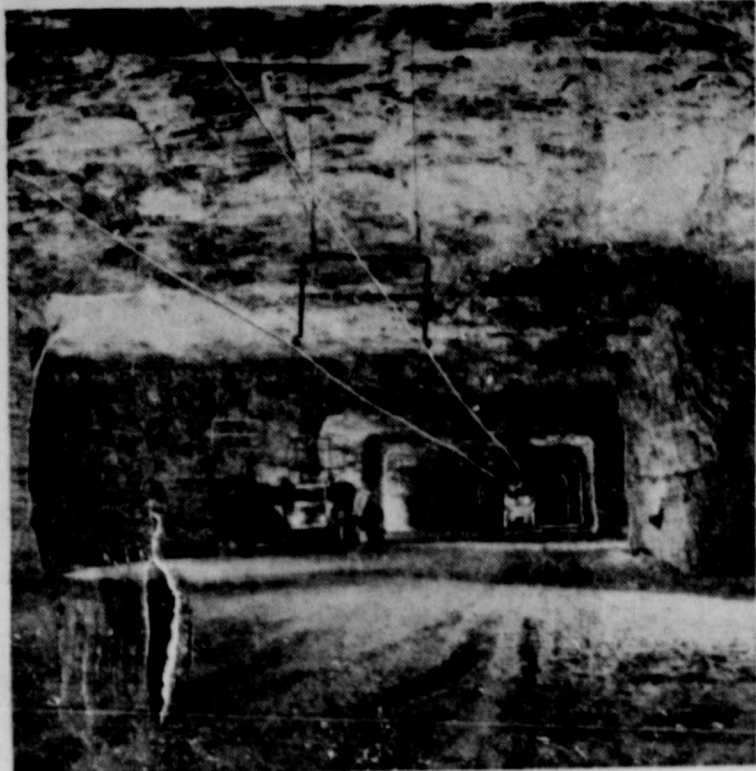
have given a tremendous boost to grass growth.
By deferring grazing of native grass pastures now, food reserves in the grass roots will be restored and an early vigorous growth can be expected during the next growing season.
Research work indicates that a grass plant deferred from grazing produces approximately four times as many roots as a closely and often grazed one. The forage now being produced can be utilized during the winter months after the food reserve in the roots have been restored and the seed crop has matured and fallen to the ground.
Deferred grazing is one of the practices that the ASC office will help pay on, too.
There are several things which may cause feather-picking or cannibalism in a poultry flock. Limited feeding and watering space, crowding, lack of proper ventilation, irritation caused by lice or mites, or the energy level of the diet and the form in which it is fed, may all be factors in causing the trouble. If the above conditions are in good order in your laying flock and you still have trouble, try debeaking.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

With winter coming on and a period of inactivity for much of our farm equipment, now is a good time to start thinking about storing combines, hay balers, and other complicated machinery.
Farm machinery is getting more expensive each year it seems, and too, more expensive machinery is being used in the county each year.
Most of the complicated machinery used today is that which is most susceptible of all to depreciation from weathering.
The best place for them is under a shed and out of the weather. More simple tools like harrows, discs, etc., need only to be scraped clean of rust and corrosive material and given a good coat of paint. Not too many give their tools a going over with paint but it is something that will pay off. Anti-freeze weather is not long off so don't get caught with your anti-freeze not in radiators.
It is getting a little late, but still not too late to do some fall deferment of native pastures. Our good fall rains, cloudy weather,

and equipment were from the local school district, which is required to furnish these elements for participation. The money paid directly comes from government sources. Texas governments (county and state) spend about three dollars to the federal government's one dollar now toward operation of the program.

A major part of the federal government's aid in the school lunch operation comes in the form of food commodities purchased by the government to help relieve agricultural surpluses for specific application to the school lunch program. For many commodities at many times, school lunch foods purchases have helped relieve market pressures during seasonal supply gluts, helping strengthen our farm economy while furnishing wholesome food for our children.

In Texas alone, \$9 million worth of agricultural surpluses are channeled through the school lunch program in one year.

The school lunch program is a composite blessing to us. First and foremost, it provides our children with health-giving foods far better than we with our sack lunches ever provided; it gives us the opportunity to give meaningful help to many underprivileged children; and it provides one of the best possible means for useful distribution of surplus foods.

Omar Burleson Has 'Thankless' Job

Washington, Nov. 1.—American employers who think they have trouble trying to keep larceny out of the hired help's expense account should consider the plight of Congressman Omar Burleson.

As chairman of the House administration committee one of Burleson's jobs is to keep tab on how much money his colleagues spend on official travel overseas.

Trying to get itemized expense accounts out of some of these fellows is like trying to wring blood out of the proverbial turnip. They just won't cooperate.

Burleson's job would be a cinch if all his colleagues were as accommodating as another Texan, Rep. W. R. Poage, who just returned from a five-week agricultural tour of Europe and Africa, turned in a seven-page expense report to Burleson. It lists every penny he spent right down to the smallest tip to a bellhop.

"If every member of Congress made such a report and could show the results as you have done and do will there would be no criticism from our constituents," Burleson wrote Poage.

Secret to Public.

Burleson has tried to tighten the laws governing reports of this kind but he has been blocked by members of Congress. Last year he succeeded in passing an amendment which requires the traveling lawmakers to file reports with the chairman of their committees not less than 60 days after Congress convenes. These reports have been coming in as much as a year after they complete their junkets.

This amendment still does not open to public inspection a close look at how they're spending money overseas. The committee chairman can—and usually does—keep the detailed report secret and merely gives an over-all total. Nothing more.

By and large the junketing congressman is not spending the taxpayer's money as such. Instead he gets to dip his hands in a multi-million-dollar kettle called the "counterpart fund." This is foreign currency on deposit in almost every country which has received American aid but which must be spent in the country where it is held.

Cash for the Asking.

There is no limit to how much counterpart money a congressman can spend. All he has to do is call at the American embassy and ask for it. It's no secret that many a congressman lives extremely high on the hog with this counterpart money stuffed in his pockets.

When Poage returned he figured out everything he spent but couldn't account for \$84.55 so he simply made out a personal check for this amount to the State Department. Mrs. Poage was with him for part of the tour—Germany, Belgium and Spain—but Poage paid for all her expenses, even the difference between single and double rates in hotels. He also turned back several thousand francs, shillings and lira.

Two House committees—appropriations and armed services—make absolutely no accounting to anybody when its members travel abroad. They draw from a special appropriation that is replenished—liberally—every year.

By contrast the House foreign affairs committee has a standing rule that every one of its members must turn in a detailed expense re-

port to Burleson. One member, Rep. Walter H. Judd, of Minnesota, turned in a personal check for \$1,100 to cover personal expenses on one overseas trip and \$700 another time.

Burleson has come under fire by some of his colleagues who feel

he is trying to stop junkets. "But that's not true at all," he explains. "They serve a very useful purpose. If our people are going to think along global lines they certainly have to be familiar with the world."

Burleson thinks Poage is a good

example. He is going to be head of an agriculture committee which will study disposal of surplus American agricultural products abroad. He will have to know more about the world than what he reads in a book.
