Voters Decide Issue Tuesday

Tuesday is election day in Eastland and local voters will have to seek out two polling places to get all of their work done.

The city election will be held at City Hall. Three candidates have filed for the three vacancies so it looks like another uncontested race. Seeking re-election are Jack

Germany and Bob Perkins. The third candidate is Milton Fullen.

The special Senate election voting place will be in the first floor of the courthouse. Seventy-one names are on the ballot in alphabetical order. Some 50 persons had voted absentee by closing time Friday, the last day to cast absentee ballots.

Some 4,000 Eastland County voters are expected to go to the polls. Leading candidates in this county seem to be Bill Blakley, Jim Wright, John Tower, George Davison, Maury Maverick and Henry Gonzalez.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Saturday voters turned out in limited numbers to re-elect two members of the school board. Winning new terms were J. T. Gregory and Rev. W. E. Hallenbeck, Jr.

Water Board to Lift Permits of Two Lake Docks

The Eastland County Water Board has notified two holders of commercial permits at Lake Leon that their permits will not be renewed upon expiration in September.

Lake Leon Lodge, owned by E. E. O'Keefe, and Chock-A-Block Marina, owned by Dr. H. B. O'Keefe, are the two permit holders involved.

Dr. O'Keefe said notification that his permit would not be renewed did not have any explanation why. He said the Water Board's attorney told him the permit would not be renewed because of lack of cooperation with Board officials.

Dr. O'Keefe said the real reason was because of personal friction with Eb Richardson, lake patrolman. He charged that Richardson has harassed him and his customers.

Closing of the two commercial docks will mean that only two commercial docks will still be open. One of those is run by Richardson.

Two Entomology Teams to Enter District Contest

Don Kincaid, adult 4-H leader of the Cisco Jr. High School reports the names of two entomology teams that he has trained for the District 4-H Elimination Contest to be held on April 15 at Tarleton State College at Stephenville.

He will have both a senior and a junior team competing for district honors. Jimmy Easter, Truly Clark and Philip Gosnell will be on the senior team and Gary Phipps, Mike Weed, Darrell Gosnell and Sidney Mahaney will make up the members of the junior team.

Robert Hamilton, and John Tenyson are planning to enter the district contest with their electrical method demonstration. If they should win first place in the County Eliminations on Saturday April 1st. They are also members of the Cisco Jr. High School 4-H Club.

The entomology team have been trained to identify over sixty different insects, to learn their life cycles and their host as well as the chemical control for the insects.

Waverly Massengale, Eastland rancher and president of the County Livestock Raisers Association, is urging all cattle owners over the county to make their plans now to attend the meeting. Those who attend may hear a first hand explanation of the program and be able to ask questions regarding the clean up of this disease that effects both cattle and man he said.

Dr. Henderson has been in the county several times in the past to explain the Brucellosis program, first to the dairymen and later to beef cattlemen. At the April 5th meeting both beef cattle ranchers as well as dairymen are invited and urged to attend.

ON WORLD TOUR

New Zealand Summer Is Enjoyed by Perkins

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles written for the Telegram by Joseph M. Perkins, who is on a world tour.)

The Oriana landed us at Wellington three days ago and our first impressions of New Zealand are entirely favorable although we notice vast differences between here and Texas ways. In the first place New Zealand is exactly opposite England on a globe of the world, and the seasons are in reverse. It is now late summer down here and we are eating locally grown strawberries, green peas, sweet corn, grapes, apples and plums. All of these are of excellent quality. The prices are small and not as attractive looking as those we get in America but the flavor is good.

This is a very English community and traffic is on the left side of the roads instead of the right. On sidewalks people pass each other on the left. Another thing that is very noticeable is the general use of strollers and baby carriages. The city buses even have places where strollers can be carried. They are similar to the baggage compartments on our Greyhound busses.

New Zealand is a pocket size wonderland, being about the size of Colorado. It consists of two large islands of nearly equal areas with a narrow strait between. These islands are called North and South. The land varies from green grazing sheep pastures to scenic mountains, lakes, geysers and glaciers. The most spectacular mountain scenery is on South Island and that is where we are going first. North Island contains much grazing and farm land and also wonderful thermal region with its amazing variety of

geysers, boiling pools, mud volcanoes and mineral springs. Here also are many beautiful lakes where fishing is said to be good.

In Wellington there is a shortage of hotels and we are staying in a "Luxury Apartment" where we can cook our own meals and enjoy the comfort of five rooms and a bath. In the apartment above us are members of the American Embassy and our apartment was vacated by members of the New Zealand Embassy, who sailed on the Oriana.

Wellington, a city of 123,000 people is situated at the head of a U shaped bay, with a ring of low mountains behind it. It is the capital city of New Zealand and is a most attractive place. The newspapers are quite different in appearance from those in the United States. There is no news on the front page and that gives them a very dull and uninteresting look. The first five pages of the evening paper are all filled with notices and advertising with column after column of "situations vacant" as there is an acute shortage of skilled labor and office help. Following the advertising section there is local and world news with considerable space devoted to sports, cricket and horseracing especially.

The standard of living is high in New Zealand and with its mild climate, free from either extreme heat or cold, it would seem to be a good place in which to live, especially if one had sufficient funds and did not have to work for a living. In this respect it reminds me of Vancouver Island off the coast of British Columbia where many retired Canadians find living is comfortable, cheap and easy and amid pleasant surroundings.

Library Week Again to Be Observed Here

National Library Week will be observed from April 16-22, it was announced today by the Texas Committee for NLW. This marks the fourth annual national observance of a program designed to increase appreciation of the vital role of the printed word in our national life, and encourage support and use of libraries of all kinds by every American. The Eastland Library again will participate.

Chairman of the National Steering Committee is Norman H. Strouse, president of J. Walter Thompson Company. Sponsored by the National Book Committee, Inc., an on-profit citizen's group, in cooperation with the American Library Association, NLW receives the full cooperation of newspapers, magazines, and broadcasting media. Its theme for this year, "For a Richer, Fuller Life—Read!" will be developed in news, photo and feature stories, special articles by famous programs across the nation.

Already work has begun on the national, state and local level, with increased support from national, civic, cultural and fraternal organizations, business and industry, labor unions, universities and other educational institutions.

Chairman of the Texas Committee is Dillon Anderson of Houston, prominent lawyer, author, and former head of the National Security Council. Anderson pointed out that the Week stimulates public awareness of long-range, year-round goals for meeting the reading needs of the total community, creating a climate for intellectual growth so essential for personal and community fulfillment. Other members of the Texas Committee include Texas author J. Frank Dobie of Austin, serving as honorary chairman; and Henry Steinboer, a public relations director for the San Antonio Public Library, serving as Executive Director of the state program. At a meeting this month in Dallas, the committee will formulate and subsequently announce its plans for the 1961 observance.

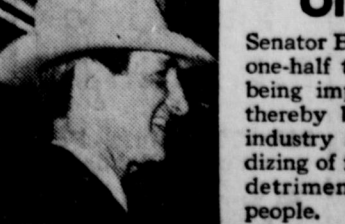
Carrol Shelton Receives Tech Science Award

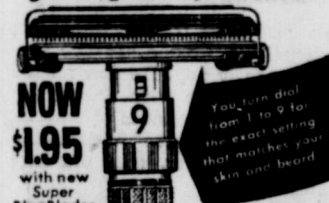

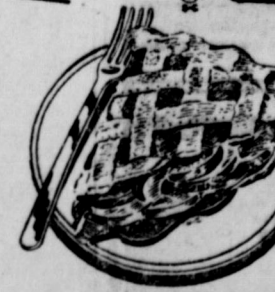
