Heart Attack Fatal To Sister Of Merkel Man

Mrs. Kate Harris, 80, sister of Charley Russell, died in her sleep at her home in Fresno, Calif., Tuesday, September 9. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Born in Kentucky, she married J. A. Harris in Merkel in 1906. They moved to California in 1910 and celebrated their golden anniversary there in 1946.

Mr. Harris, a well known gin operator, died about a year ago.

Survivors include three children: Mrs. Cleo Henry, Fresno; Mrs. Mary Love Brown, San Diego; and Jack Harris of Fresno; and the one brother, Charley Russell of Merkel, last survivor of nine children.

Badgers Downed By Hamlin, 24-14 For First Loss

Hamlin struck for two quick touchdowns in the third quarter to break an 8-3 halftime tie and went on to hand Merkel its first defeat, 24-14, Friday night.

The Pied Pipers scored first with three minutes left in the first quarter. Ken Prewett carried the ball 91 yards on the first play after the Badgers had stalled on the Hamlin 9. John Richey made it 8-0.

The Badgers came back to tie before the half as Manney Denton tossed to Lanny Perry, the play covered 60 yards. Denton passed to Jerry McLeod for the evening two points.

A sustained drive by the Pied Pipers on the opening kickoff of the half netted them a touchdown. John Richey covered the final four yards. Ed Shields, left half, scored what proved to be the winning two points over right tackle. Three minutes later Hamlin put it away, with Prewett crossing the second time. Shields again added the conversion.

The Badgers made a comeback effort in the fourth period, scoring with only 30 seconds gone. Quarterback Denton gave a delayed back to Joe Neill, who scampered 22 yards.

Phone CO-OP Users In South Taylor Ask No Toll Calls

An amendment to the by-laws which would permit an increase in the membership of the board of directors of the Taylor Telephone Cooperative Inc. was unanimously approved at the annual membership meeting of the cooperative Tuesday.

The action came as the result of complaints from South Taylor members about unequal distribution of the board.

When the amendment is officially ratified the cooperative will have a 12-man board instead of the present nine-man board. The board will be composed of a representative from each of the 12 exchanges comprising the cooperative.

Another grievance brought out by the members was the no toll service to Abilene for members on the Tuscola, Lawn, Ovalo, Buffalo Gap and Bradshaw exchanges.

The no toll service, described by Coy McDougal, field representative of Rural Electrification Administration, as an "extended area service" contract between the telephone cooperative and Bell Telephone.

A motion made by W. L. Marshall Jr. of Tuscola to include the five exchanges on an EAS contract was unanimously approved. An additional motion to include Nubia and Noodle on a similar contract was approved.

Bryan Bradbury, Abilene attorney and legal counsel for the cooperative, presided at the meeting.

Saturday Is Kids' Day At Dyess AFB

A full-scale program has been planned by base officials for the annual Kid's Day celebration at Dyess Air Force Base Saturday, September 27.

Numerous displays are planned, ranging from jet bomber aircraft to sentry dog demonstrations. The displays, which will be open starting at 8 a.m. will be located in the south hangar and outside, the hangar on the parking ramps.

Two sentry dog demonstrations will be held this year—at 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. The dogs, which are used by the Air Police, will attack an agitator in protective clothing and also will give a mass obedience demonstration.

Aircraft on display will include the B-47 bomber, a C-124 Globemaster, displays of jet engines and KC-97 tanker engines.

Fire displays and fire trucks will be one of the major attractions along with the small arms display and an armored car with a machine gun mounted on top.

Rep. James Wright of the Fort Worth Congressional district was the featured speaker here Tuesday afternoon when 295 members of the Taylor Telephone Cooperative met for annual session.

Cong. Wright was introduced by Rep. Omar Burleson, Anson, congressman from the 19th Congressional District.

The Fort Worth congressman spoke on what, in his opinion, were the three phases of the last Congress—the "sputnik" phase, the "recession", and international affairs.

In the last phase it was pointed out that only the countries with strong faith, strong economy, and strong defense can remain free. He said that most of the tax dollar goes for past wars and preparing for another with 62 cents for national defense, 11 cents for interest on the national debt and seven and one half cents to activities of the veterans program.

Isadore Mellinger, president of the Merkel Chamber of Commerce, welcomed the members and presented President Charles Myatt with deed of trust to a free parcel of land in Merkel on which to construct a future headquarters office.

During the session, on a motion of Ed Graham, Tuscola, and approved, the board of directors were asked to consult the membership before a definite site was chosen for the main office. Graham said he felt that it should be more centrally located in the area served by the cooperative.

In a report by Mr. Myatt a summary of the growth of the Telephone Co-Op since its organization in 1951 was given.

The cooperative grew from no pole line to a present total of 950 miles; no subscribers to 1,376; no exchanges, to 12, serving seven West Texas counties; from one or two employees to 11; from no payroll to an annual payroll of \$40,000; from no investment to one of \$1,085,000.

The gain in subscribers since 1954 is as follows:

Nolan, from 76 to 96; Noodle, 28 to 64; Nubia, 25 to 42; Hamby, 64 to 94; Hayley, 130 to 171; Potosi, 59 to 206; Bradshaw, 26 to 37; Wingate, 82 to 120; Tuscola, 122 to 225; Buffalo Gap, 54 to 58; Lawn, 118 to 162.

In the past two and a half years the cooperative has paid REA \$134,666.84 on its loan.

In the election of four directors Frank K. Antilley of Shep was re-elected to Place No. 6; Boles Fry, Tuscola, was named to Place No. 7; J. C. Raper, Lawn, was named to Place 8; and Joe McDuff, Abilene, was named to Place 9.

At a meeting of the new board, Charlie Myatt was re-elected president; Clark Perkins, Nolan, vice president; and Frank Antilley was re-elected secretary.

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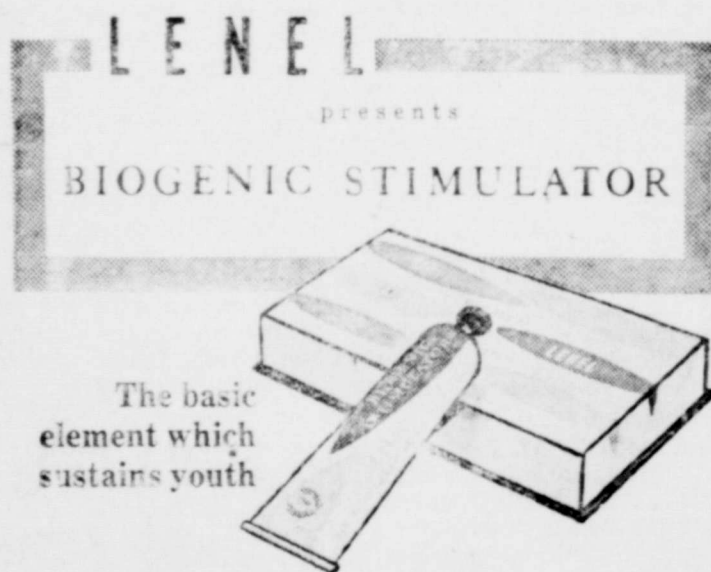

Teenage Doldrums Call for Patience



At a party a few weeks ago a number of parents were discussing their teenagers. One father complained that his son was too lazy to eat; a mother complained that her daughter was nearly as bad. It turns out that both the kids are fifteen. To me that explained a great deal.

Have you ever noticed how boys

and girls about 15 years old get a case of what I call the "doldrums"—just plain listless, dull and bored? This teenage disease isn't confined to any one section of the country, or any one type of teenager. They all get it.

From the parent's viewpoint this is a trying time. Their sons and daughters are inclined to be dif-

ficult. They lack all inspiration to help around the house; they are moody; they are unhappy. Everything the parent does to help the situation seems to make it worse.

There's really no reason to worry about it. It is a stage that teenagers go through. They're still children, and yet, are physically young men and women. They are usually in the second grade of high school and the freshmen avoid them and the upper classmen ignore them. They are just plain frustrated.

Fortunately a little time helps. They grow out of the "doldrums." Parents who don't realize this and try to do something about it often wind up with a rebellious teenager on their hands. Take it easy and have patience. This is one stage in the teenager's development when you will have to give in more than parents are inclined to.

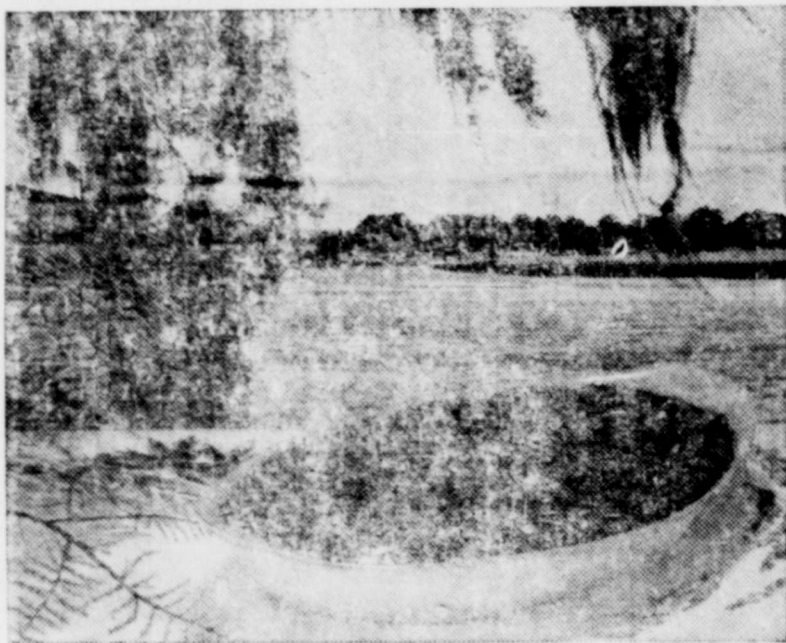

Bayou Pecan & Rice Dessert

The cook in the Deep South has used the home-grown products, pecans, rice and syrup to make a dessert so wonderful you'll never forget it! It takes 40 minutes baking to toast the pecans and blend the vanilla, eggs, butter and dark syrup into a heavenly sweet. Use one of your fancy baking dishes and serve this dessert from the baking dish at the table. This dessert is so delicious it deserves a ceremony of some sort!

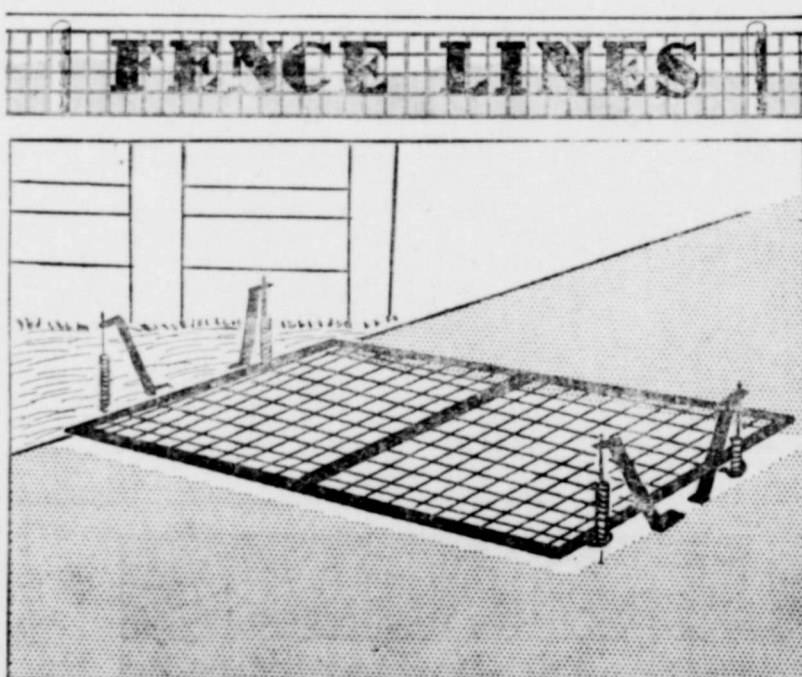
INGREDIENTS:

2/3 cup uncooked rice
1 1/3 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
3 eggs, beaten
1 1/3 cups dark corn syrup
1 cup granulated sugar
3 teaspoons vanilla
3 tablespoons melted butter
3/4 cup milk
1 1/3 cups coarsely chopped pecans

METHOD: Put the rice, water and salt in a 2-quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat down low. Cover with a lid. Simmer over this low heat 14 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat but leave the lid on 10 minutes.

While the rice cooks, mix together the eggs, dark syrup, sugar, vanilla and butter. After the rice cooks, stir in the milk. Cover and cook over low heat until the milk is absorbed. Stir occasionally. Press the rice over the bottom of a glass pie plate or shallow baking dish holding about 8 cups.

Just before baking, pour the egg-syrup mixture over the rice. Sprinkle with the pecans. Push the pecans into the syrup mixture. Bake uncovered, in a pre-heated 350° F. oven 40 minutes. Serve warm. Top with vanilla ice cream or whipped cream, if desired. This recipe makes 8 generous servings.

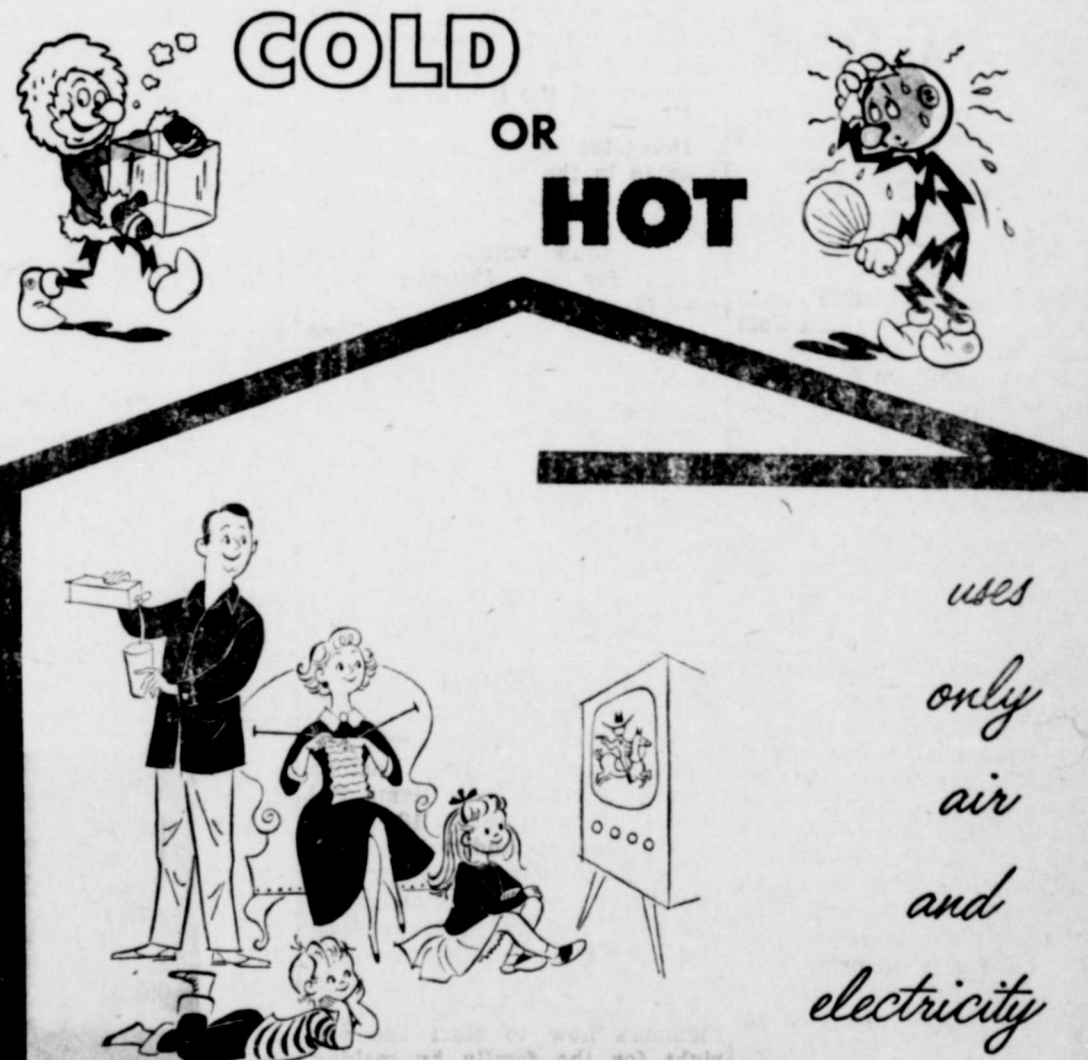


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THE balance sheet of crime never gets so heavy as during times of recession or depression, a fact which might seem to underscore the announcement that the Department of Justice is setting out on an intensified, long range program against organized crime in the nation.

As announced by Attorney General William P. Rogers, the plan reflects the thinking of experts such as J. Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation; Harry J. Anslinger, Commissioner of Narcotics; and Lt. Gen. Joseph M. Swing, Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization.

The plan calls for the concentration of information and investigative effort on the racketeers and hoodlums in this country with the highest priority given to a hundred of the top racketeers. Information will be gathered from each of the cooperating investigating agencies and will be analyzed by lawyers of the criminal division. Malcolm Anderson, recently appointed Assistant Attorney General for the Criminal Division, Department of Justice, will direct this combined effort.

The organized Crime and Racketeering Section of the Criminal Division will be expanded and strengthened. To give initial impetus to the program, a special group, including several former Assistant United States Attorneys, headed by Milton Wessel of New York, will be added to the Division.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation will investigate the federal crimes within its jurisdiction, the principal statutes being Hobbs Anti-racketeering Act, Obstruction of Justice, Extortion, and Interstate Fraud by Wire. Also the liaison with local police that the FBI has established through the National Police Academy and the FBI laboratory is expected to be of aid in cooperation in the field.

The Treasury, with its various investigative agencies, will give full cooperation. Many offenses committed by racketeers fall within the investigative authority of the Bureau of Narcotics, the Internal Revenue Service, and the Secret Service.

The special group will first analyze the pool of information on the 100 top hoodlums now available from all the investigative agencies. Thereafter they will request additional investigation along lines suggested by the examination and they are authorized to request the convening of an investigatory grand jury. This is not planned to supplant the work now being done by the United States Attorneys in the field or the work of any investigative agency or their techniques, but rather to implement that work.

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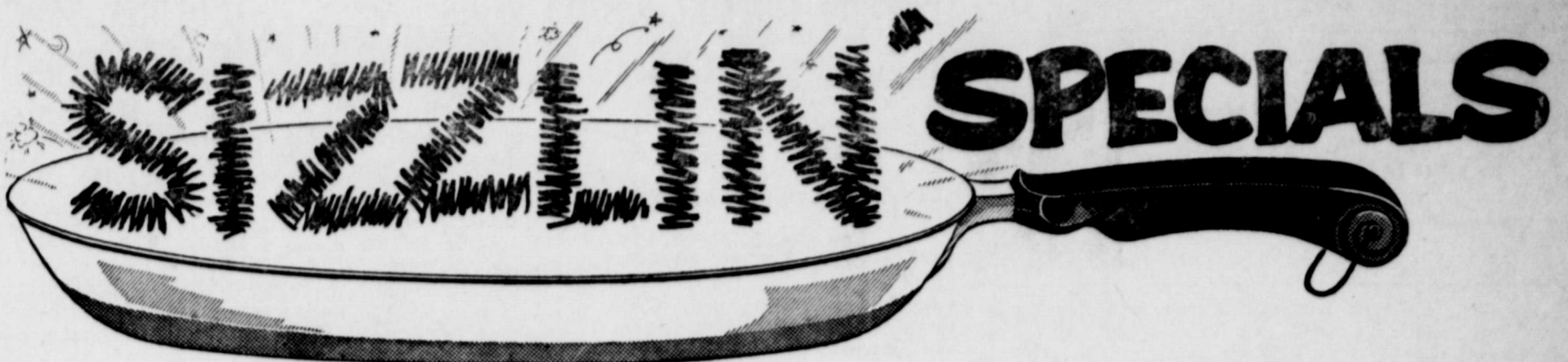

A LA CHICKEN CORNBREAD RING

2 cups cooked chicken
1/2 cup chopped onion
1-3 cup margarine or butter
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon marjoram or thyme
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
2 cups chicken broth

Melt fat over low heat; saute onion and celery until lightly browned. Add flour and seasonings, blend until smooth. Add milk and chicken broth gradually. Cook, stirring constantly until sauce is thick and smooth. Add Worcestershire sauce. Add chicken to sauce and heat thoroughly. Pour into baked, hot cornbread ring. Serve immediately.

CORNBREAD RING

1 cup cornmeal, 1 cup sifted flour, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup shortening.

Sift together dry ingredients into medium-sized bowl. Add egg, milk and shortening. Beat with rotary egg beater, until smooth, about 1 minute. Do not overbeat. Bake in a greased 8-inch ring mold in hot oven 450 degree F. 20 to 25 minutes. Turn out onto a platter. Fill center of cornbread ring with creamed chicken. Makes 8 servings. (The cornbread may be cooked in a bread pan and cut in squares or in a muffin pan.)

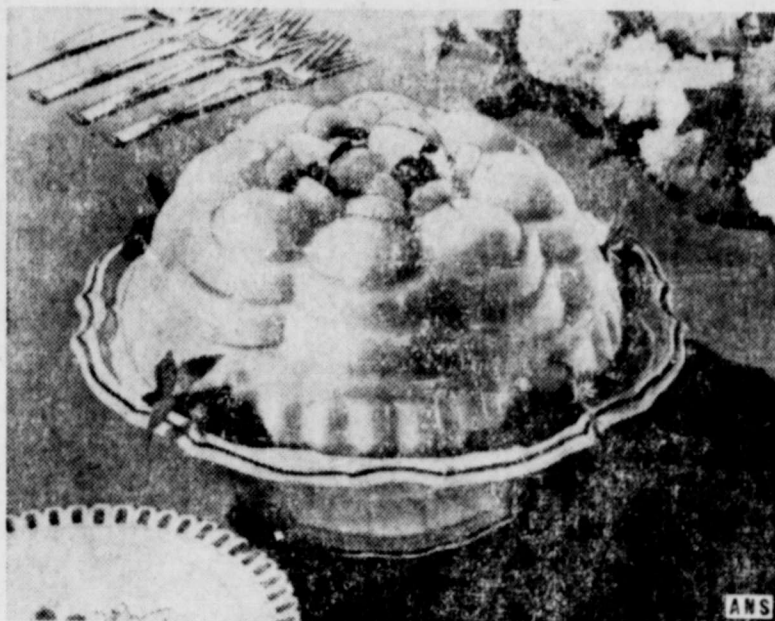

Pour milk into a mixing bowl. Add pudding mix and beat slowly with egg beater just until well mixed, about 1 minute. Let stand to set, about 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, set bowl of thickened gelatin in ice and water and whip with egg beater until thick and fluffy. Fold pudding into whipped gelatin, blending well. Pour into mold. Chill until firm. Makes about 10 to 12 servings.

"I REMEMBER" BY THE OLD TIMERS

From Mrs. E. V. Archer, Hamilton, Kansas: I remember when children wore asafetida bags as a deterrent to contagious disease germs.

Many, too young to have shared in this odd bit of witchcraft, have escaped the worst smell known to "preventive medicine."

To make an asafetida bag, you sewed several lumps of the evil-smelling stuff into a small sack, attached it to a cloth band, and secured the band around the victim's neck with stout stitches. There it swung from frost until corn planting time, when germs presumably went away for the summer.

Once in place, the asafetida bag never was changed, never removed. By winter's end, it had taken on quite a patina. And if the passing of time thinned or diluted the richness of its aroma, memory denied it.

Navy Sets Dec. 13 For NROTC Exams

VADM. H. P. Smith, Chief of Naval Personnel, announced today that the 13th annual national competitive examinations for the Regular Naval Reserve Officers Training Corp. will be given to interested high school seniors and graduates on December 13. Application forms are now available and must be received before November 15, he added.

Designed to supplement the officer output of the Naval Academy, the NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at the civilian college of his choice which has an NROTC unit. All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives an annual retainer of \$600 for four years. During the summer the student goes on fascinating training cruises as a midshipman. After completing the usual four year college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty as a prospective career officer with the Navy's far-flung fleets. For those who apply and qualify, immediate assignment to flight training will open new careers in Naval Aviation.

High school seniors and graduates between the ages of 17 and 21 may apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a rigid physical exam early in 1959. From the pool of qualified young men remaining in competition, approximately 1800 will be selected to begin their naval careers next September.

The NROTC college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty with the Navy and Marines. Separate quotas are established for applicants from within these services.

Closed Circuit TV Makes Bow At ACC This Year

Closed-circuit television made its bow Sept. 15 at Abilene Christian College when classes began for the 1958-59 school term.

The system, installed at a cost of about \$10,000 will be used in the teacher education program and in teaching multiple classes simultaneously.

The system consists of three cameras, five receiving sets and hundreds of feet of cable and wire.

Dean Walter H. Adams said, "As far as we know this will be the first time in a Texas college that closed circuit TV will be used in teacher observation work."

Education students in the Bible Building may observe any selected classroom in the Campus School building (grades one through twelve). A camera automatically controlled by the Education teacher in the Bible Building can scan almost the entire classroom in the Campus School by using any of four lenses. Another camera is focused on the blackboard and teacher area.

The other immediate use of the system is simultaneous teaching. A teacher may conduct a class from an originating room, and he is picked up on receiving sets in three classrooms simultaneously. A student assistant is in charge in each of the classrooms.

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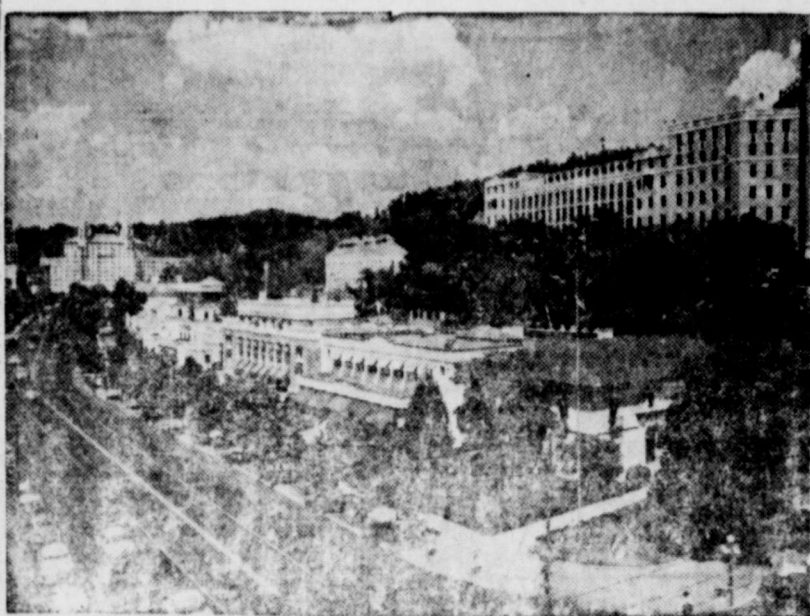
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BATH HOUSE ROW—HOT SPRINGS, ARK.

Nestled in the Ouachitas, where lakes and mountains, forests and streams unite to form a vacation wonderland, is Hot Springs, Arkansas—"America's Own Spa."

Hot Springs is truly America's own, for it belongs to the people. It is the only health resort in the nation where the natural hot waters which flow from the earth are owned, controlled and endorsed by the United States Government.

Located in the Ouachita Mountains of Southwestern Arkansas, Hot Springs is actually four resorts in one. It is a spa, a national park, a lakeside playground, and a mountain retreat.

Historically, the Hot Springs region was visited by Hernando De Soto in 1541; the area was included in land claimed for France by La Salle, 1682; included in region given Spain by France, 1762; became part of the United States with the Louisiana Purchase. The first spa treatment institution was erected in 1830 (previously hillside pools were used) and in 1892 President Andrew Jackson signed the bill that set aside the famous thermal springs. The city and park are named for natural hot springs, from which flow one million gallons of steaming water each day at average temperature of 143 degrees Fahrenheit.

The National Park Service of the United States Department of the Interior regulates the park and bath houses. There are hydrotherapy facilities in 18 pay bath houses. Eight are in the park at the base of Hot Springs Mountain, constituting what is known as "Bath House Row," and ten are located at various points in the city.

Population-wise, the Chamber of Commerce says that Hot Springs has 48,811 in its resident area; but over three million visitors annually flock into the area.

Contrary to some opinion, Hot Springs National Park is not in the foothills of the Ozarks; it is in the Ouachita region. Arkansas has two major resort areas—the Ouachitas and the Ozarks and the Arkansas River divides the two. The Ouachita range is unique in being one of the few ranges in America with ridges running east and west. All others run north and south. Highest range between the Rockies and Alleghenies.

ITS' THE LAW IN TEXAS

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and

descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants surviving, then the

surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

Allergies: What They Are, What Causes Them

Allergies cause many of the most perplexing problems faced by modern medical science. While some of the phenomena relating to allergic disease have been known for hundreds of years, there are still many unanswered questions.

It is estimated that close to 20,000,000 Americans suffer from some form of allergy, four million of whom have hay fever or asthma. These two allergies alone cause a loss of 25 million work days a year . . . very expensive diseases to both the working man and his employer.

Allergies fall into several categories. Inhalant allergic reactions are undoubtedly the most well known to us. These include hay fever, types of asthma, allergic headaches and other allergic manifestations. Inhalant allergies are normally seasonal. They are caused by air-borne pollens from trees, grasses, and weeds. Persons allergic to one, frequently are not bothered by the others. For example, tree pollen sufferers have their greatest difficulty in late spring when tree pollen is prevalent. Grasses usually give off their pollen in June and early July and the weed varieties come along in August until early frost.

Food allergy is also prevalent. Offenders in this group include a wide variety of foods such as eggs, milk, shellfish, nuts, strawberries, etc. Hives are commonly caused by an allergic reaction to certain foods.

Contact allergy is better known to us as the itching blisters caused by brief contact with poison ivy and poison sumac plants. Certain chemicals and dyes also cause severe allergies in persons who become sensitized to them through exposure.

Bacterial infections, which may often go unnoticed, can cause allergic reactions in many persons. Frequently the infection is not serious enough to cause fever but nevertheless can develop into obvious allergic symptoms. Another form of allergy which is not well known is a physical allergy in which people are sensitive to light, heat, cold, etc. These allergies are somewhat rare and are ordinarily the reason for the common allergic symptoms of wheezing and sneezing.

What is an allergic reaction? It is a condition of unusual sensitivity to substances ordinarily



harmless when taken into the body or to those which come into contact with the body. The agents which bring about this unusual sensitivity are called allergens.

It may take from a few days to many years for an allergen to produce sensitivity. What happens is that the offending substance sensitizes areas of the body over a period of time, and the body reacts to this by producing antibodies. You may not know that you have an allergy until you experience a skin eruption, itching watery eyes, a runny nose, sneezing, coughing and other irritating symptoms.

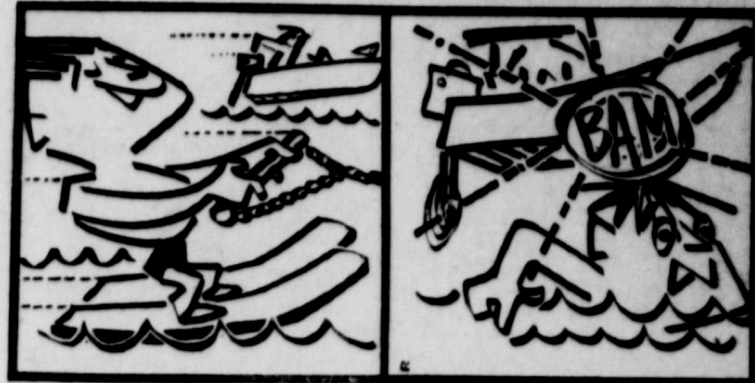
Allergies develop just as often in children as in adults. If your children suddenly develop sneezing, coughing, watery eyes or runny noses, skin rashes or digestive disturbances, it is wise to have your family doctor check the child for a possible allergy.

Your doctor has many tests to determine if your symptoms result from an allergy or some other cause. With his help you may be able to discover the cause of your many hours of discomfort due to allergic reaction. Once your doctor knows the cause of your allergy, he can frequently prescribe a course of action which will not only relieve the condition, but frequently prevent it.

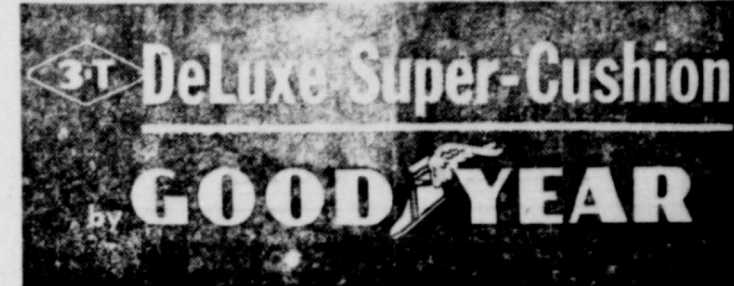
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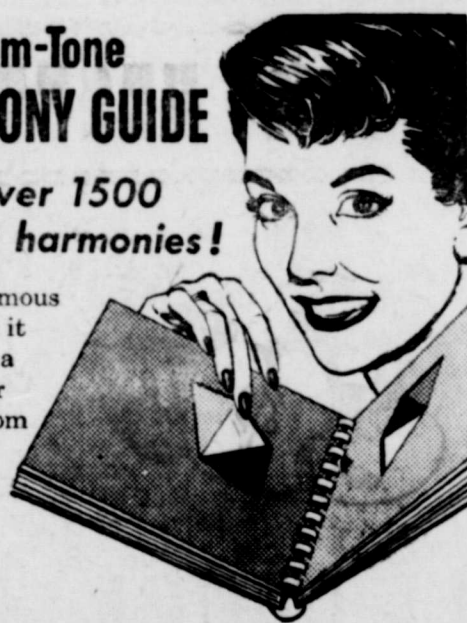
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THE BIGGEST SHOW-OFF

And I've never heard anyone call him 'show-off' since.

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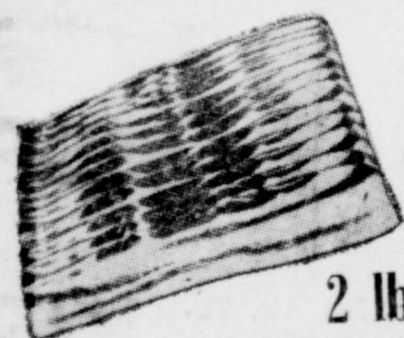

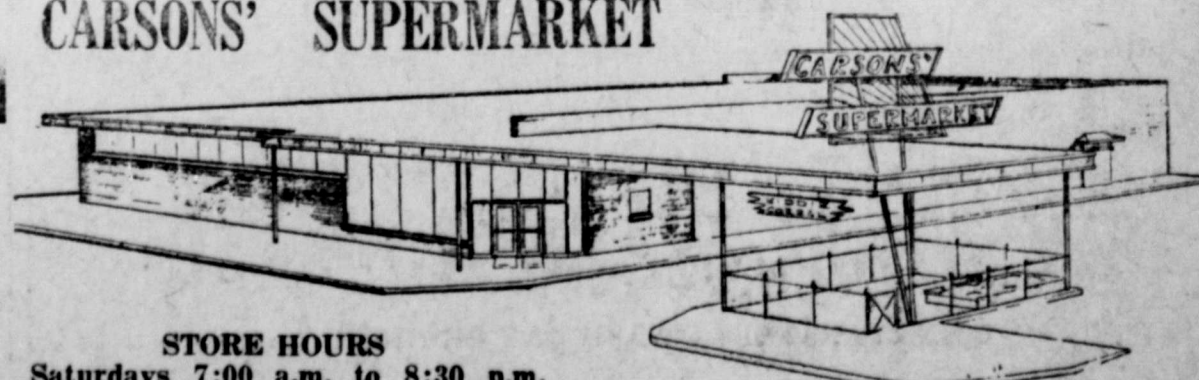
