The Grand Ball of the Turners at the Casino.

Every circumstance seemed to combine to make this the grandest entertainment of the season.

The closing of the fair, the large number of strangers in the city, the recent return of many of our best citizens from their pleasure or business tours at the North, the auspicious season with its cool, enchanting nights, all contributed to make the feast and frolic one, that will long remain in the pleasurable memories of those who were fortunate to be present.

The guests began to assemble early, and by 10 o'clock the amphitheatre was thronged with the beauty and fashion of San Antonio and vicinity, and the sweet soaring notes of the orchestra, and the swift, skillful whirl of the dancers made the scene seem fairy-like and enchanting.

Those whose privilege it has been to attend the entertainments given by the members of the Casino and Turner's Clubs will comprehend well our meaning, when we say that the arrangements of the affair was in keeping with the reputation these societies enjoy. There was no confusion, notwithstanding the immense throng of divotees in attendance, there appeared no mistakes or omission in any department of the arrangements; order prevailed throughout, and with the bright lights that shone on the fair women and gallant men, and illumined the handsome and newly garnished hall, the scene was lovely to behold.

It would require much more time and space, than we can afford to contribute to enter in the well deserving details, and we regret being unable to give more than a passing mention of the entertainment and its guests, as our participation therewith was but brief.

The variety of dances were not as great as is usual with American parties, but were chiefly of the more spirited and exhilarating, as well as graceful selection, such as waltzes, gallops, polkas and others of the style known as "round dances"; the dancers were danced a few times, but we believe, this was the only square dance indulged in.

At about half after 12 o'clock, A. M. the company, or so many as could be seated, repaired to the supper room, which on this occasion was the long bowling alley in the lower part of the building, where were spread two tables running parallel the entire length of the apartment, and affording seats for about two hundred persons. The tables were supplied with all the substantial and delicacies of the season.

The company betook themselves to the enjoyment of the viands and wines, with the skill of a practiced hand (and month). The seating was the signal for the flash of wit and the flow of soul, and the merry ring of soft female voices in mirth and laughter told the glad tale of banished care. There were no noisy or boisterous speeches from the men, who showed a better taste and higher consideration for their fair partners, by attending to their wants and amusement.

The flood of the amber stream flowed in profusion, and was kissed and quaffed by rosy lips, and laved the bearded throat, until the edge of appetite was blunted. The feast closed with a toast, preceded by a few appropriate remarks by Mr. Hubrick, "the health and happiness of the fair ladies, who graced the occasion with their presence."

At about half after one, A. M., the guests returned to the dancing hall and entered into the whirl of the dance with renewed vigor, which was continued until the "wee small hours."

The number of beautiful and stylish dressed ladies present was so great to particularize, even had we been able to learn all their names, (which we were not.)
