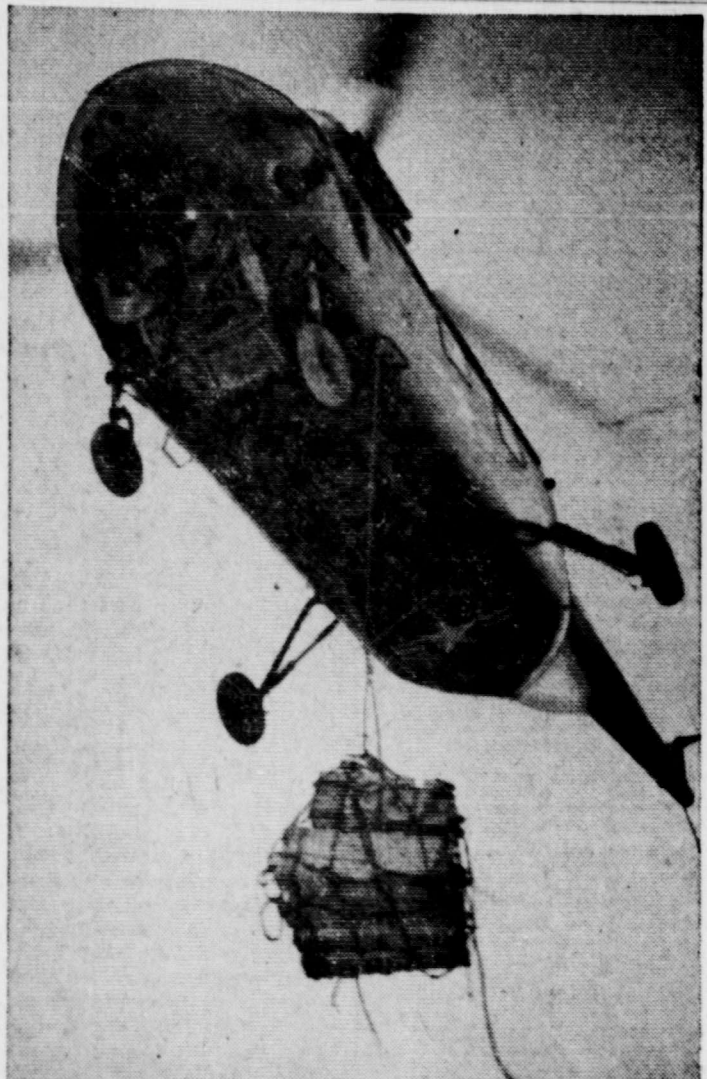

Election Ordered For May 18 On New College Tax Program

Inform Public Of Its Business Is Sheppard's Plea

SAN ANTONIO, April 24.—Attorney General John Ben Sheppard today told members of the South Texas Press Association that "there is no business in public office that should not be made public."

He condemned much of the present classification of government information as attempts at security from the public eye rather than the eyes of the enemy. "Freedom of the press is contested every day by men in high office," he said.

Sheppard quoted Napoleon as saying, "Four hostile newspapers are more to be feared than a thousand bayonets," pointing out that dictators have always feared the anger of the press.

The Attorney General called on newspapers to use their weapons to end tyranny in Texas. He called the editors' attention to the legal action now pending against a district judge in South Texas. "I don't know what the outcome will be, but every citizen has the right to a free and secret ballot and to have it counted the way he marks it," he stated.

"If there is any county in Texas where these liberties are being mutilated by political bossism, it is the duty of the State to call somebody to account," Sheppard said.

Members of the Press Association met in the Gunter Hotel Friday morning for a business session. Over 100 publishers and editors registered for the meeting.

Sheppard hailed the return of governmental powers and functions to the local level. He said, "It is up to you who have a voice on the local level to see that these functions follow a straight line to your county seat with no stop-overs in Austin."

"Democratic government begins to die when it gets so far away from the people that they cannot see those who govern them walking on the streets."

Sheppard discussed the legislation pending in Congress on the tidelands. He termed the continental shelf off the coast of Texas as "the new frontier of our state," profiting out that Texas already has the conservation machinery to supervise its development. "Our state requires a minimum of \$5 an acre lease, while the federal government often leases for 50c an acre. It is not logical for two wells to operate side by side under different rules, one leased and supervised by the state and the other by the national government, both pumping away at the same reservoir."

School Trustees Call Election At Special Meeting

Property taxpayers of the Cisco Independent School District will go to the polls on May 18 to vote on the question of providing a tax of 50 cents per \$100 valuation for Cisco Junior College, according to action taken Friday afternoon at a special meeting of the board of trustees.

The school board called the election after considering a petition signed by 55 property owners of the school district. The law provides that such a petition must be signed by 20 taxpayers.

Cisco Junior College, which is free of all debts, now receives tax support at the rate of 20 cents per \$100 valuation from the area of the old Cisco school district. The election would extend the tax to the entire present district at the rate of 50 cents.

Tax revenues amount to between \$8,000 and \$8,500 per year for the college at this time. In the past few years, most of its operating revenue has come from state aid and from tuition paid by the Veterans Administration for GI students.

Under the proposed tax program, the college's revenues from this source would be increased to around \$33,000 per year. The school's buildings and equipment have a value in excess of \$300,000.

It was pointed out that the college has waited for several years to ask for more tax revenue while the financial condition could be improved for the public schools. College officials have invited the public to inspect the school's records and books at any time.

The school board named G. B. Langston as presiding judge for the election, which will be held at the city hall. Clerks will be Henry E. Reed of Long Branch and Hiram McCanies of Cisco.

Eligible voters will be those who have rendered taxable property and hold poll tax receipts and otherwise qualify as voters under the law.

The petition asking the school board to order the election was circulated following a meeting of school patrons and interested citizens last Monday night. At that time, various speakers called attention of the school's value to the community and its possibilities.

ROOM AT THE TOP

The saying, "There's always room at the top," has grown trite from endless repetition. But, like all such homely adages, there is more truth than poetry in it. In business after business, especially the larger ones, finding really competent executive talent of both an administrative and a technical character is an ever-present headache. Business, like the world produced so far, New York's Life Extension Examiners checked over more than 25,000 executives with an average age of 45.6 years, and found that only 20 per cent were in normal health. At a Chicago hospital 55 executives under 50 were examined, and only 3 were free from organic disorders. When 340 executives of one of our greatest corporations reported for a medical checkup, it was found that 235 had something wrong with them, and in 192 cases the disorders were serious. In another very large corporation 189 members of the top management group died during the 5 war years alone. A casualty company states that the average businessman dies 6 years before his time. This represents both a heavy human waste and a heavy economic waste. It is estimated, Time said, "that a \$20,000-a-year executive represents a \$250,000 investment by his company."

The result is that more and more concerns are going in heavily for executive health programs — one observer terms these programs "the hottest thing in medicine today." Generally speaking, they are on a voluntary basis, but every encouragement is given to the executives to participate. Often the men are sent to special clinics for a period of days and in some cases they can take their wives with them and enjoy recreational pursuits in idle time. The cost ranges from \$35 to \$125 a year per executive, and, to quote Time again, "Corporations with health programs are convinced that they are hard-headed business investments." All kinds of ills up to the potentially fatal are unearthed in the early stages when successful treatment is possible. Another benefit, in the words of one big company's medical director, is that "When an executive doesn't have to worry about his health, he feels and works better."

Time magazine dealt with this situation in a recent article which carried the grim heading, "The Pace That Kills." The first paragraph said: "Does the high pressure of their jobs cause top corporation executives to burn out faster and die earlier than other men? Though industry still lacks the statistics to make a watertight case, the answer seems to be yes."

Time went on to list some of the unhappy facts that have been

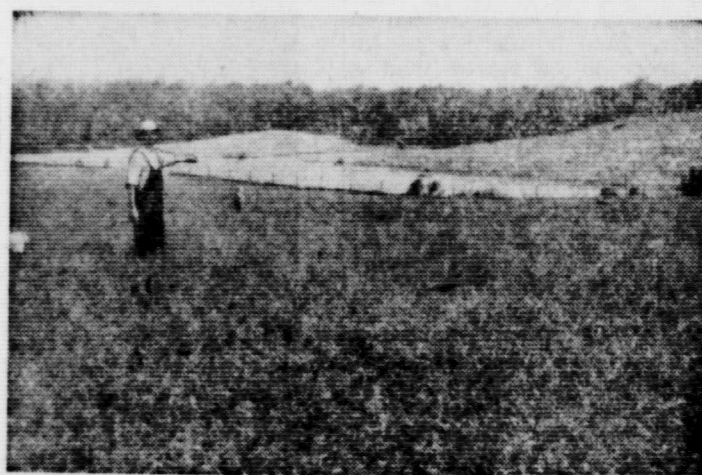

Legumes and Grasses Help Sandy Lands Produce More



Sandy soils put to good use. Alfalfa on level land, forest cover on sloping, stony soil, with intermediate strip of mediocre soil which will be planted to conifers.

Crop yields on sandy land can often be doubled or trebled through better management, according to A. R. Albert of Wisconsin, in CROPS & SOILS. Sandy soils suited to field crops range from medium-textured sands to fine sandy loams. Management is much the same but crop yields are higher on the heavier soils.

Wind erosion is a perennial hazard. A combination of unprotected soil, droughty conditions, and a strong wind can result in severe damage. Valuable new seedlings of legumes and grasses may be destroyed in this way. However, good protection may be obtained by establishing permanent shelterbelts of trees at 40- to 60-foot intervals or by growing different crops in 6- to 10-foot strips.

The first essential of good soil management on sandy lands is to grow well-adapted legumes and legume-grass mixtures. Half or more of the plowable land on every sandy-soil farm should be in forage crops.

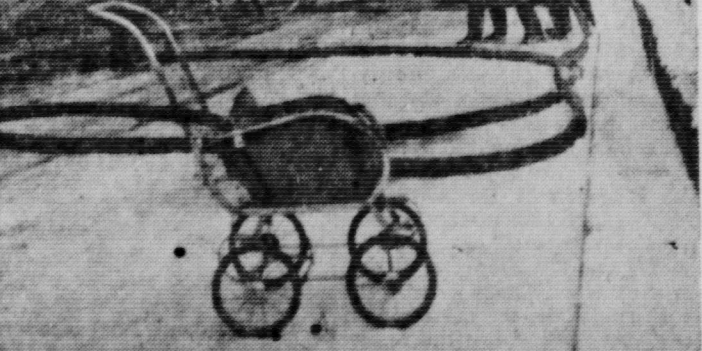
Alfalfa is the best all-around forage legume for well-limed sandy soils with a 6-foot or lower water table. Red clover can thrive where the water table is up to 3 feet, and Ladino and alsike clovers are suitable for low-lying sands. All three clovers will tolerate moderate soil acidity. Sweetclover is an excellent soil improving crop and can provide

emergency pasture for well-limed soils.

Another essential in sandy soil management is adequate fertilization, especially with potash, while the crop is growing in the field. Organic matter helps to "bind" sandy soils and gives them a darker color and water-holding capacity. It also provides food for soil organisms and makes commercial plant foods more efficient. Since it is difficult to accumulate organic matter in regularly-cropped sandy soils, it must be added regularly at the lowest possible cost in the normal course of crop production through the use of such materials as animal manures, crop residues, green manure crops, peat, sawdust, garbage and sewerage.

The principal advantages of sandy soils are (1) they warm up and dry off early in the spring so can be worked earlier, (2) they are easily tilled, (3) weeds can be controlled with greater ease, and (4) rainfall enters them readily and seldom runs off.

By protecting these soils from erosion and by following a sound program of soil management, adequate fertilization and the use of high-quality seed of adapted varieties, farmers can profit by these advantages more fully and obtain a higher and more stable income from their sandy soils.

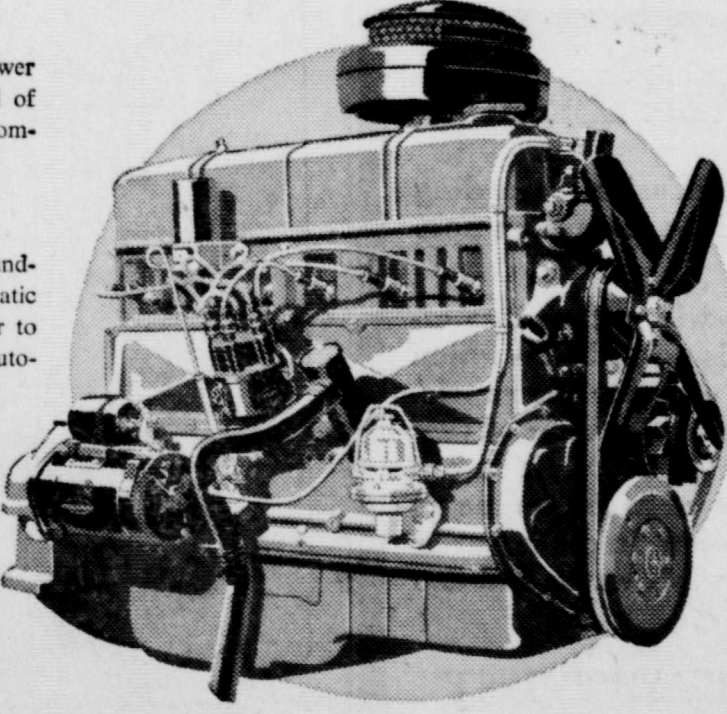

Displaced Texans To Celebrate On Sunday

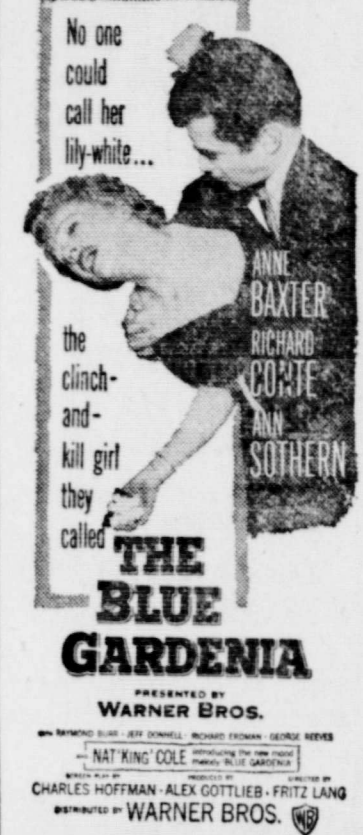

Deer Herds Have Seasonal Losses Due To Coyotes

AUSTIN, April 25.—The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission reported that seasonal losses to the South Texas deer herds have been reported.

He said Game Warden Supervisor Herbert Ward of Catarina and several of his wardens described comparatively heavy coyote kills during the winter months. They attributed the predation to a short rodent population and added that the coyotes now have changed their diet since late berries began ripening.

Meanwhile Game Warden William H. Gooch of Raymondville called attention to the case of a 1952 fawn, discovered in an emaciated condition which, a post-mortem showed, had been attacked by stomach worms.

Ernest G. Marsh, Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Commission, wrote Gooch, "This parasite generally is present in both domestic and wild stock but it rarely does serious damage to the host animal except at times when the host animal is in relatively poor physical condition."

"The past several years of drought conditions in your country has undoubtedly contributed to a general dietary deficiency among stock. This would be greater among deer with less control being exerted on their population density and with less supplemental feed in their diet. This deficiency, which would not necessarily be readily apparent, cre-

ates the perfect condition for the parasite to prosper. Though most animals would naturally recover from the subsequent severe depletionary effects of this parasite's activity, the host animal normally becomes visibly weakened. In this latter stage, bacterial infections are most likely to develop and cause further incapacitation of the host. Predation increases greatly. These losses will continue normally until the range reaches an optimum condition in the spring. As body nourishment is increased, the parasites are thrown off."
