Under the direction of County Judge Kilmer B. Corbin, the National Clothing Collection is scheduled to begin in this city on April 1, and to extend through April 30. His committee to assist in this campaign is composed of Mrs. E. R. Tinsley, Mrs. Joe English, Clyde Brannon, and Don Emory.

A goal of 25,000 pounds of clothing has been set for the local clothing drive.

The United National Clothing Collection is a united effort on the part of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, and various voluntary war relief agencies of the United States to secure the maximum quantity possible of good used clothing for free distribution to needy and destitute men, women and children in war-devastated countries.

Throughout war-torn areas clothing is very scarce or threadbare and worn out. More than 125,000,000 people are in liberated or to be liberated nations of Europe which are in dire need of clothing. Of these more than 30,000,000 are children. Because of the demands of armed forces and civilian needs, manufacture of clothing in the United States or other countries to relieve those distressed people will not get underway for some time. This means the needy men, women, and children in war devastated countries must depend on the help of the American people.

What is needed is good substantial used clothing for both winter and summer wear. Although clothing need not be in perfect repair, it must be useful to the people who will receive it. Underclothing and all types of cotton garments should be washed before they are donated, but need not be ironed.

Begin now to sort out your clothing for the drive, and have a nice collection ready by April 1, when the drive opens in this city.

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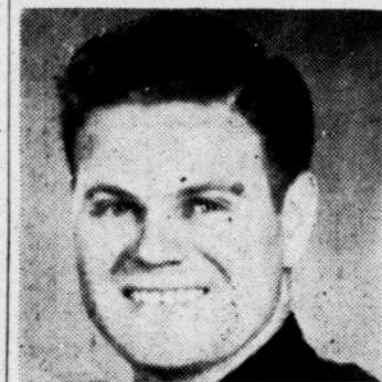

Seventh War Loan Quota Is \$445,000; Infantry Show To Be Given Here June 1st

According to information received by Carl Rountree, county chairman of the War Loan Drive, Dawson County's E bond quota for the Seventh War Loan Drive has been set at \$445,000. The Seventh War Loan Campaign is scheduled to open on May 14 and will continue through June 31.

C. M. Smith, regional manager, has reported to County Chairman Rountree that plans are being made to get an Infantry Show for this County during the campaign. He stated that these shows have created much interest to date.

The Infantry show is composed of a combat unit of approximately 35 men, who are all veterans of this war. These men show and demonstrate the use of all the newest types of weapons and show how pillboxes are taken, as well as many other interesting things.

According to present plans, the Infantry show will be brought to Lamesa June 1. The show has to be staged in intervals of about 3 days. Smith states that it will be necessary that the exhibition be held in the football stadium or some other out-of-door place.

Through this medium officials hope to help in the raising of funds for the Seventh War Loan Drive.

Texas has been assigned an E bond quota of \$168 million for the oncoming drive. This compares with a \$106 million E bond quota in the Sixth War Loan Drive. The overall quota in Texas amounts to \$450 million.

During the Seventh War Loan Drive special emphasis will be placed on the E bond quota, which is so important. In order to complete the E bond quota, individuals will have to purchase \$445,000 worth of the smaller denominations of bonds.

As further plans are made for the oncoming drive, announcements will be made in this paper. The chairman for the campaign has not yet been announced.

Friday morning, March 23, so that the boys can pick it up and take it to the freight car which will transport it to the paper mills.

If the scouts should miss your bundle, you are asked to call the Chamber of Commerce office, number 48, and tell them where your paper is located so that they can call for it.

The scouts plan to have 3 or 4 pickups running Friday, and hope to almost complete the drive during that day.

The freight car will be on track both Friday and Saturday, March 23 and 24, and rural people having collections should bring them in either of those days. Someone will be at the car, which will be located in the same place as heretofore, to accept the collections. Officials ask that you be sure and take your waste paper collections to the freight car, and not to leave it at the station.

Boy Scout Troop 28, which has as their Scoutmaster James Crumley who is assisted by J. D. McAmos, will use the money they make from the drive to defray expenses to the scout camp this summer.

Salvage of waste paper is a victory "must." Waste paper provided by industry and private homes is an essential raw ingredient in the manufacture of paper and paper-board products necessary for military and essential civilian uses. It is essential to make shell containers, cartons, and many other battle supplies.

Remember to collect all your waste paper together and to tie it and place it on the curb for the scouts Friday morning. Rural citizens are asked to take theirs to the freight car either Friday or Saturday.

Cpl. R. LaFaitte Reported Missing Since Feb. 27th

Mrs. Daisy LaFaitte of this city received the following telegram from the War Department Tuesday, March 20, at 11:30 a. m.

"The Secretary of War desires me to express his deep regret that your son, Corporal Raymond C. LaFaitte has been reported missing in action, since February 27 in the Mediterranean area. If further details or other information are received you will be promptly notified." The telegram was signed by J. A. Ulio, Adjutant General.

Cpl. LaFaitte, who has been in service since December 23, 1943, has been overseas since December of 1944. He served as a tail gunner on a B-24, and was on his fourth mission when he was reported missing. Cpl. LaFaitte is a graduate of Lamesa High School. He is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Minor, who reside at 804 South First Street in this city.

Cpl. LaFaitte is a member of the 59th Bomb Group which was awarded the Distinguished Unit Citation for destroying the Bad Voslau Airplane and Assembly Plant, in what the American press hailed as the "greatest bombing of the war by Liberators." A photograph was taken at the field during the formal award ceremonies which included Cpl. LaFaitte, and which appeared in a booklet produced by and for the 49th Bomb Group of the 15th Air Force.

Forgotten Peru City No Longer Isolated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Iquitos, Peru, is no longer the "forgotten city."

Iquitos (pop. 34,000) is less than 500 miles from the Pacific as the crow flies. Yet it used to take a month to cover the distance.

Freight from Lima had to go 8,000 miles through the Panama Canal, down the Atlantic coast and up the Amazon.

Now, as Peru's isolated "Amazon empire" opens up rapidly because of war demands for rubber, rotenone, quinine and other products, Iquitos is only five days from Lima—two days by bus over the new

Pucallpa Highway and three days by river steamer. Planes flying from Lima in five hours land at Iquitos several times a week.

French Citizens Care For Grave Of Pfc. D. Meek

Editor's Note: Mrs. H. M. Meek who makes her home at 412 North Bryan in this city is in receipt of a card and two letters from French citizens, which reveal details concerning the plot where her son, Pfc. Darrell M. Meek is buried. Pfc. Meek, a paratrooper, was killed in action on June 12 in France. He participated in the initial landing in France. A card and letter were received by Mrs. Meek from A. Renaud and wife, and from Mademoiselle Andree Mace. A Renaud is mayor of Sainte-Mere-Eglise; and the card which he wrote is printed below, and is followed by the letter from his wife, and the communication from Mademoiselle Mace. The letters are printed exactly as they were sent:

Mayor of Sainte-Mere-Eglise, Manche, France, to Mrs. H. Meek with his best regards and deepest sympathy—Union of prayers for your dear son. Darrell is in our cemetery, plot c, row 1, grave 18.

The following letter is from Mrs. Renaud.

1st of February, 1945 Le Maire de Sainte-Mere-Eglise a Mrs. Meek, H. M., 412 North Bryan Lamesa, Texas.

My very dear Mrs. Meek,

I have had your letter and hasten to write to you. There has been a long delay until I got this letter and after, I intended to see a very nice girl to speak to her about your request. This girl, unhappily was not here and now she is back home. She is going to write to you and tell that she will care fraternally for Darrell's grave just as if he was her brother or her sweetheart. She will also send you her picture. She is the same age as Darrell. She speaks and writes English. I will speak English to you. You may write me at any time and I shall try utmost for you.

I am a mother. I have three sons, dear Mrs. Meek, too young to go to war: 15, 10 and the last is a baby not yet 3 years old.

I know what a mother's heart is for a beloved son. Yours was so good, so brave, so perfect. I see it after the letters enclosed—the chaplain's letter, the commanding officer's letter—for which I thank you so much.

We worship, him as a fine hero, as he is. We might have seen him on D-Day as it was the first town delivered and the place where the parachutists dropped—Sainte-Mere-Eglise.

Our blood has been mixed during the battle with the blood of our dear parachutists, we have helped us as well as we could. In this little town, we have had one hundred civilian people killed and wounded and in every place in the whole Normandy there were hundreds of civilians—dead side by side lying down with the brave soldiers.

So, my dear Mrs. Meek you may ask me anything. I shall do it for Darrell's sake. Write to me again. With all my love, yours most sincerely, Mrs. Renaud, mayor's wife, Sainte-Mere-Eglise.

The letter printed below is from Mademoiselle Andree Mace: Sainte-Mere-Eglise 14 February 1945

Dear Madam,

Madam Renaud has asked me to write you this letter concerning the care of the grave for your beloved son. My name is Andree and I live at St. Mere-Eglise. I am born the 23 September 1926, two years younger than your son. Although there are not many young girls in our small village, I have accepted the honor of taking care of your dear son's resting place. One among in the others followed down the first on the French ground for the liberty of the world. I shall do this with devotion and the spirit of one sister.

When I had some time, I went pray and put some flowers on the graves of those dear soldiers that rest for their country for us. I am very happy to be designate by Mlle. Renaud for pray of the resting place of one soldier of what I shall have the joy to know the dear family by correspondence and that after the war, I shall have the honor of the visit. Mlle. Renaud has some indications that you have given to her, find the grave of your dear son and I am very tender homage to him with all my family. I have asked 2 American officers for take some pictures of your son's grave, but it is forbidden for anybody to take grave's pictures but as soon as I could, I shall do for you. I can say to you that the cemetery is very beautiful and clean.

By this cold weather, we haven't flowers, but I must go to Cherbourg for take before I send one for you because this one I have is old, also in the same time, I shall buy some flowers, that shall be for

me the biggest pleasure.

Dear Madam, you can see that I don't know very much American. I have learned two years only by lessons at home, waiting for the liberators. We have been accused because we have known invasion parachutes, and we are the first village, this one where is the resting place of your beloved son, the first free of the French.

The liberation has been for us a big sacrifice, but nothing near of yours, and never we could not thank you enough. I think that for you dear Madam, years has been very tall. I have learned by Madam Renaud that your son is dead in hero and for one right cause I hope that this, you shall do live with courage, know that your sacrifice is not without result. You have maybe also still with you some child, that shall be for you comfort of your big sorrow.

I wish, dear Madam, received one picture of your son and I promised you again with all my French heart to do many visits to your son's resting place, for pay the tribute that we must at the Americans.

I send you one picture. This picture has been taken, they are two years, with my brother.

Dearest Madam, I hope hear you sooner. Receive the expression of my devotion, the most affectionate, ANDREE.

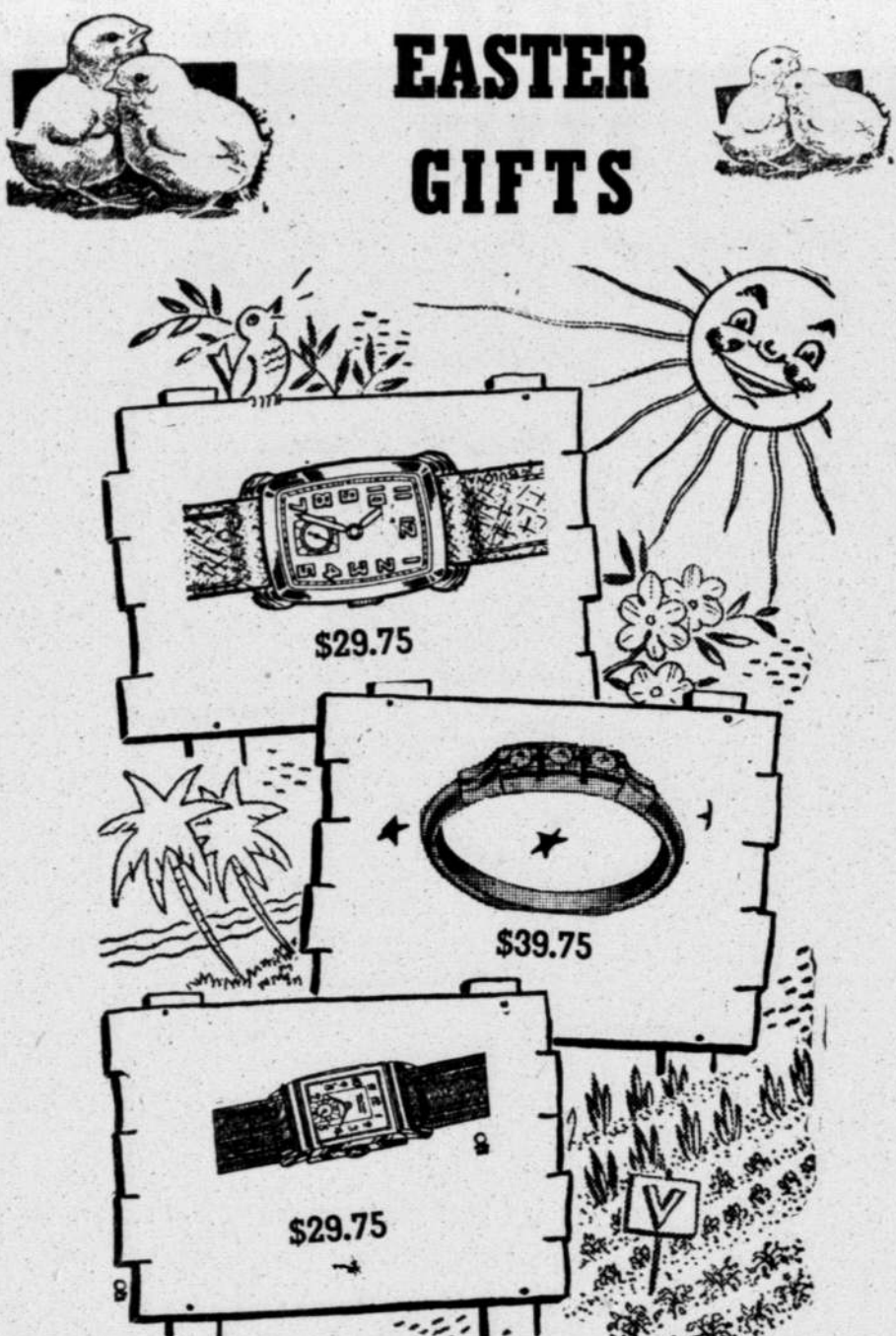

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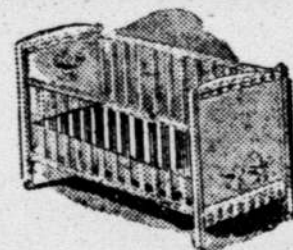

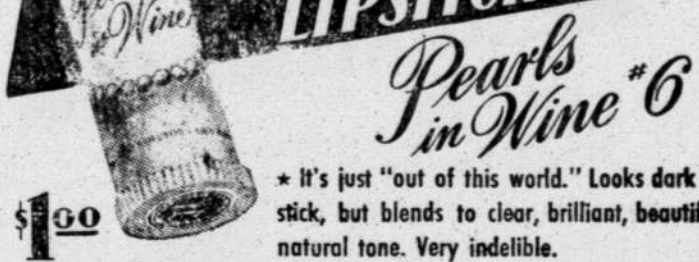

Hancock 4-H'ers Report On Their Tuesday Meeting

"It is possible to spoil the appearance of attractive dresses or blouses by wearing the garment with missing buttons or with buttons which do not match," Mrs. Myrtle Negy, home demonstration agent of Dawson County told girls of Hancock 4-H club in their regular meeting Tuesday.

Mrs. Negy instructed the girls in proper methods of sewing on buttons advising them first to collect all buttons, thread the same color of the buttons, needle of a suitable size, thimble and pins. Second, she advised that they mark the exact place for the button and then fasten the thread through the material twice leaving a knot on the outside of the materials. Place a pin on the material and sew over the pin. After winding the thread around the button about four times shank is formed which makes the button more stable. Next fasten the thread by going through material about four times leaving the thread between the material.

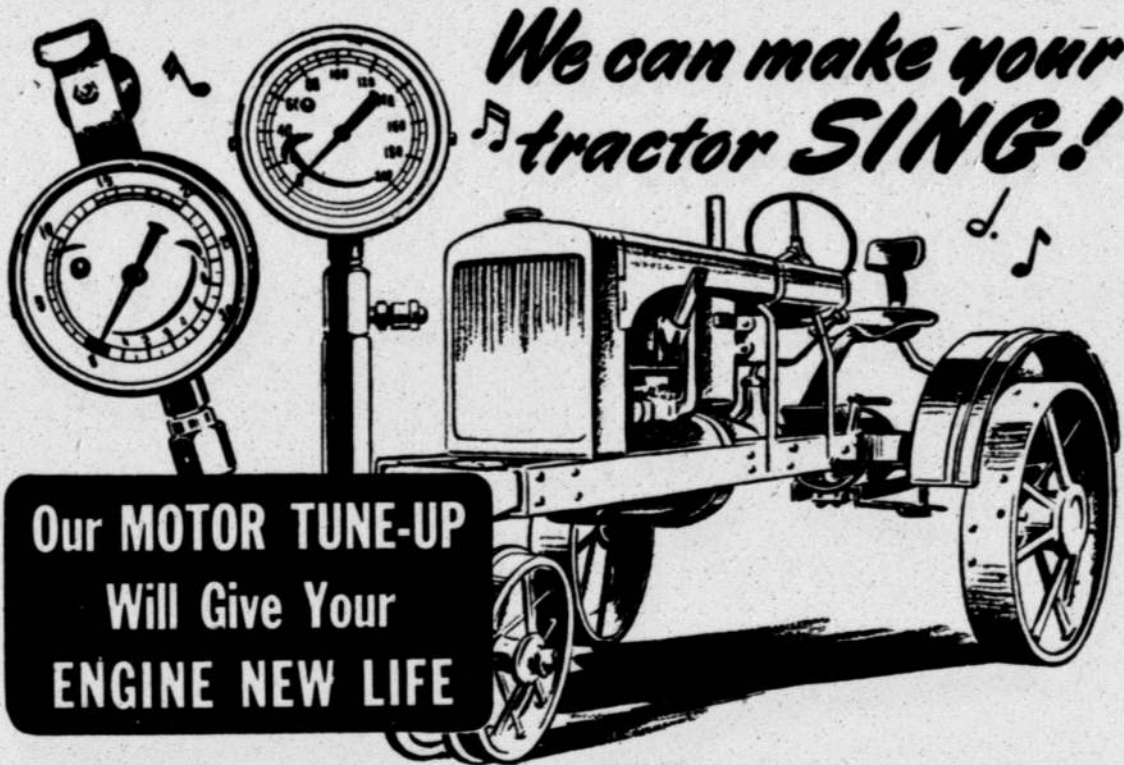

Farm Labor Saving Devices Are Being Used In This County

T. A. Barfield, county agent, and J. L. Morris of this county attended the farm labor saving device exhibition held in Lubbock Saturday, March 17.

Barfield states that he hopes to have such an exhibition here in May. He reports that there are several labor saving devices in use in this county at the present time, which would prove helpful to other farmers of the area. Especially good are a cotton harvester which runs bolts through a gin stand and removes the bolls, and a Johnson grass digger which cuts roots up and throws them on top of the dirt and exposes them to the sun. The latter device is owned by Shelby Reed.

The county agent stated that the most outstanding device at the Lubbock exhibition were a post hole digger, and a combination terracing machine and potato digger, and some cotton harvesters.

Points To Step Up Dairymen's Profits Given

County Agent T. A. Barfield states that there are several pointers which would be worthwhile for cattlemen to keep in mind at this time of the year.

One pointer he gives to dairymen is that with the coming of Spring, there will be lots of Spring grass and agriculturists should feed some dry feed to counteract gastric acid in the early Spring grass.

Since fresh green grass is high in protein, you can cut protein content of feed down to 12 to 14 per cent mixture.

Barfield advises that you give grass a fair start before grazing your cattle heavily, as this will make for more feed from the pastures.

He stresses the point that with the shortage of labor, now would be a good time to get rid of low producing cows, stating that the prices are favorable for selling them for beef, and that figures from the Dairy Herd Improvement Association prove that low producing cows are less profitable.

He cites these figures. A cow producing 250 pounds of butter fat per year costs \$79 to feed and her income is said to be \$68 above feeding cost. A cow producing 400 pounds of butter fat per year will cost \$102 for upkeep, and income above feed cost will amount to \$177.

Figures from high herds show that a cow producing an average of 346 pounds of butter fat, will have a feed cost of \$142 per cow, and an income above feed cost of \$166. In a low herd, a cow producing 152 pounds of butter fat per cow, with a feed cost of \$93, will have an income above feeding cost of \$46.

This shows a difference of \$120 per cow, realized in profits, and proves that high production cows are the most profitable to keep.

James Tuckness Succumbed Here Tuesday, Mar. 21

James Lewis Tuckness, a resident here for the past 31 years, passed away in this city Tuesday, March 21, at the age of 82. Final rites will be read at the Higginbotham Funeral Chapel with the Rev. J. E. Corbin officiating.

Born June 22, 1862, Mr. Tuckness had farmed for many years but at the time of his death, he had retired.

He was making his home at 1508 South First Street when he succumbed.

T-Sgt. Porterfield Cited With Group In European Area

Editor's Note: The following article concerns the 324th Fighter Group of which T-Sgt. Fred M. Porterfield is a member. Sgt. Porterfield is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Porterfield, who reside at 1612 South First Street in this city. He entered the service in October of 1941 and has been overseas for the past 2 years. Sgt. Porterfield is a member of the Air Corps in which he serves as a radio man. He is a graduate of Lamesa High School.

The desert veterans of the 324th Fighter Group, now hitting the Germans from an advance fighter base in France, have received a cluster to the Presidential Citation.

The group, commanded by Col. L. C. Lydon of Stuart, Iowa, has earned seven battle stars. Its fighting record goes back through Egypt, Libya, Tunisia, Sicily, Italy and Corsica.

The citation was awarded for two action-packed days last Spring May 12th and 14th, when the Allies in Italy were starting the push that carried past Rome and beyond.

Twice on May 12th the P-40s of the group smashed enemy resistance on Monastery Hill. Making the strike through a heavy overcast and intense ack-ack fire two dozen P-40s dropped more than five tons of bombs on the pinpoint target. Allied troops within 300 yards of the area were untouched, the resistance was eliminated and the offensive enabled to continue.

The planes also attacked enemy troops massing in a narrow gully on the hill and preparing to counterattack. To hit the target the pilots had to make their dive-runs into and pull out against a steep mountain slope. They placed their bombs flush on the German infantry.

On the 14th, American doughs were being held up by stubborn enemy troops in the heavily fortified town of Castellonoro. In two slashing blows, only minutes apart, the 324th flyers struck this key center of resistance with especially prepared bomb loads. So paralyzing was the blow that the infantry was able to take the town immediately after without firing a shot.

Commendations have been received from all commands under which the 324th has served, with the first Presidential Citation coming for the group's part in the Tunisian victory.

Classification Service For Cotton To Be Offer In 1945

Free classification and market news service during the 1945 cotton crop year again is available from the War Food Administration to organized cotton improvement groups in Texas which apply for it under the Smith-Doxey act. Applications for this free service may be filed as soon as members have planted their cotton, according to James D. Prewitt, vice director and state agent for the A. and M. College Service. Improvement group which file applications promptly, he adds, can obtain the maximum service for their members.

Mr. Prewitt explains that applications must be filed with the Office of Marketing Service, WFA, not later than August 1 for groups in all Texas counties lying entirely, or for the most part, east of the 100th meridian. Groups in Texas counties lying entirely, or for the most part, west of the 100th meridian must file applications on or before August 15. Membership of improvement groups and the reported acreage planted by members have shown a steady increase since the Smith-Doxey classing service became available to farmer in the 1938 season. The WFA Office of Marketing Services, Cotton and Fiber Branch, reports that the average number of members per group has increased annually through the Cotton Belt from 60 in 1938 to 133 in 1944. In Texas, 1,185 organized groups representing a membership of 106,185 in 1944 reported planting of 5,382,669 acres of adopted varieties. Although the membership was slightly less than in both 1942 and 1943, and the number of organized groups fewer than in 1942, the reported acreage of adopted varieties planted in 1944, exceeded the reported acreage of the two preceding years.

Cotton samples classed for improvement groups under the Smith-Doxey act throughout the Belt in the 1944-45 season are expected to represent about one third of the nation's total ginnings. This compared with 29 per cent of ginnings in the 1943-44 season.

Instructions and application blanks may be obtained for Texas groups from county agricultural agents, or from Office of Marketing Service office at 1104 South Ervay Street, Dallas 1, room 517, and U. S. Courthouse, El Paso.

Various Divisions For The Livestock Show Are Listed

Plans continue to progress for the Dawson County Livestock Show to be held in Lamesa at the fair grounds on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, April 4, 5, and 6.

In previous editions of the paper, the officials for the show, the program, rules regulating the show, and the 4-H Clubs and FFA divisions have been published.

Plans for the open show of the affair have also been announced by officials of the show. The Jersey and Shorthorn division includes several classes, and ribbons for five places will be awarded in this portion of the show unless otherwise designated.

The following classes are to be included in the Jersey and Shorthorn Division: class 18, cow 4 years old or over; class 19, cow 3 years old and under 4 years; class 20, cow 2 years old and under 3 years; class 21, senior yearling heifers 18 months old and under 24 months; class 22, junior yearling heifers 12 months old and under 18 months; class 23, senior heifer calf 6 months old and under 12 months; class 24, junior heifer calf under 6 months; class 25, senior champion female which is for classes 18, 19, 20 and 21 and in which one ribbon will be awarded.

Class 26, junior champion female which is for classes 22, 23, and 24 and one ribbon will be awarded; class 27 is for the grand champion female and a banner will be presented. Class 28, bull 3 years old or over; class 29, bull 2 years old and under 3 years; class 30 senior yearling bull, 18 months old and under 24 months; class 31, junior yearling bull 12 months old and under 18 months; class 32, senior bull calf, 6 months old and under 12 months; class 33, junior bull calf under 6 months; class 34, senior champion bull for classes 28, 29, and 30 in which a ribbon will be awarded; class 35, junior champion bull for classes 31, 32, and 33 in which one ribbon will be awarded, and class 36, grand champion bull and a banner will be presented to the winner of this class.

W. K. Crawley and G. C. Hardisty serve as superintendent of the Jersey and Shorthorn Division.

Superintendent of the Beef Animal Division is Virgil Phipps. Special rules applicable to this division state that entries are open to anyone, and that ribbons will be awarded for the first five places in each class of registered Hereford cattle. Animals entered in this division must be registered Hereford cattle. Animals entered must be registered with the respective breed association or subject to registration. Breeding animals in this division may be sold at private treaty but are not eligible for the auction sale. General rules will be followed where applicable.

Classes of beef animals are as follows: class 39, bull calf under 1 year old; class 40, bull calf over 1 year and under 2 years; class 41, bull calf 2 years old and over; class 42, champion male; class 43, heifer under 1 year; class 44, heifer over 1 year and under 2 years; class 45, heifer or cow over 2 years; and class 46, champion female.

In the swine division, of which F. E. Hardy is superintendent, entries are open to everyone. Each contestant is entitled to enter only

two animals in each single barrow class or two gilts in each gilt class. There is no limit on the number of pigs in the litter classes. To be eligible for ribbons, barrows must come within the following eight classes: light barrow, 170 to 210 pounds; medium barrow, 211 to 250 pounds; heavy barrow, 251 to 350 pounds. All gilts must be registered and farrowed after September 1, 1944. An entry in the litter classes shall consist of six or more pigs. All hogs must have been owned by exhibitor at least 60 days before the show.

Classes for the Poland China section of the swine division are as follows: class 47, single light barrows; class 48, single medium barrows; class 49, single heavy barrows; class 50, champion barrow; class 51, Poland China gilts; class 52, sow and litter of 6 or more pigs.

The Duroc portion of the swine division includes these classes: class 53, single light barrow; class 54, single medium barrow; class 55, single heavy barrow; class 56, champion barrow; class 57, Duroc gilts; class 58, sow and litter of 6 or more pigs.

For the Hampshires, Berkshires, and other breeds of swine the following classes have been arranged for the show: class 59, Hampshire gilts; class 60, Berkshire gilts; class 61, Hereford gilts; class 62, O. I. C. gilts; class 63, Hampshire, Berkshire, Hereford, or O. I. C. sow and litter of 6 or more pigs.

Another division of the Fat Stock Show is the horse division, of which Dr. J. M. Harrington is superintendent. Entries to this division are open to anyone. Palominos may enter in both quarter and thoroughbred saddle stock division and the palomino division.

The quarter and thoroughbred saddle stock division includes the following classes: class 64, 1944 foals; class 65, 1943 foals; class 66, saddle type horses over 2 years old; class 67, reining type horses over 2 years old; class 68, grand champion colt, and class 69, grand champion saddle or reining horse.

North America's Role Discussed By Major Scott

"The Role of the North American Continent in World Affairs" was discussed by Major H. G. Scott, Canadian Publicist, at the High School Auditorium Friday night, as a part of the Rotary Institute of International Understanding lectures.

After a resume of the enemies activities against the Allied nations, Major Scott explained that we are meeting the challenge to civilization and in spite of disappointing checks and set-backs that we are moving slowly but steadily towards victory.

He reported that when victory is won, it will not mean that our work is done or that the time has arrived to rest idly on our oars. "After all, war and the winning of victories over other nations are not the ideal of civilized people," he stated. "They are at best a stern necessity to avert worse things—

slavery, oppression, the triumph of wrong in the world, a relapse into barbarism."

He asserted that when the war is won, a host of problems will face a desolated world — problems of relief to ravaged, ruined peoples, of reconstruction of what has been destroyed, of the resumption of the constructive work of the world, which aims at providing its people with the means of living a healthy, contented life, in peace but not in indolence, active and energetic but not mutually hostile, ambitious to construct, not to destroy, intolerant only of wrong, eager to conquer not their fellows but the ancient evils of the world, greedy for knowledge rather than material wealth, concerned with the secrets of nature rather than those of their neighbors.

Scott pointed out that it is here that North America can play an outstanding role in the history of the world. "Our ancestors have won and bequeathed to us a territory of great extent, limitless wealth, and varied character. It is still to a great extent undeveloped. Canada in particular has half a continent with only twelve million people in it. The climate is good in its varied range. We have escaped most of the old prejudices, old enmities and old feuds that haunt the old worlds of Europe and Asia. We have evolved social and political systems, which in spite of their faults as systems and our faults as individuals, have given us a measure of happiness, security and ordered, tolerant, efficient freedom perhaps as great as or greater than those possessed by any other society in the history of the world. We do not need to take our fellows' territory to supply our needs. If we need an outlet for our vigorous energies, we can challenge the deserts, the swamps, the barriers of distance, the rigors of climate. We can make war on disease, on crime and lawlessness, on cruelty, and ignorance. We can show to other nations the example of our success, if they care to follow it. We can avoid trying to compel them to accept our authority over them. We can make this continent of ours a good land from which others will be glad to learn willingly, not one which will be forced to obey reluctantly."

Tribes Fete Braves Bound For Battle

WASHINGTON — Ancient tribal ceremonies have been revived by Indians as their young men go to war to fight for the "Great White Father."

The ceremonies, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, explains, are an expression of the red man's devotion "to a great purpose and their dependence upon divine aid for its achievement."

"Reports of such sacred ceremonies have been numerous since Pearl Harbor," the bureau says, "and they are conducted not in a spirit of show."

"So doing, we can turn back the challenge not only of Germany and Japan, but of all the forces which now would stop the advance of civilization in the fullest sense."

Kraut Making Is Advised By War Food Assistant

Just now, winter cabbage is quite plentiful in Texas, and Mrs. Jack Phinizy, emergency war food assistant, recommends that home makers make large quantities of sauerkraut for use through the year.

She states that the nation's winter cabbage crop is about 56 per cent above the average, and Texas and Florida produce about two-thirds of the total supply.

She advises that in selecting cabbage for krauting, choose mature, sound hard heads—Ballhead and Flat Dutch are good varieties. Green cabbage contains more vitamin A, but white cabbage will make a lighter colored kraut. You can figure on getting one pint of kraut to every pound and half of cabbage, reports Mrs. Phinizy.

Demonstrations on making kraut were given by the demonstration agent in this county about this time last year, but should it be your first attempt or if you have not seen kraut made by recent methods, bulletins and full information are available at the office of the county home demonstration agent.

Mrs. Phinizy states that the fermentation processing of cabbage usually requires ten days to three weeks, and temperatures best for curing it are between 70 and 85 degrees fahrenheit.

INFORMATION CONCERNING DRAFT DEFERMENTS GIVEN

The following article is from L. E. Eager of the local Selective Service Board and the information it contains is brought to the attention of all registrants and employers:

Under present Selective Service Regulations the following procedure is necessary for local boards to consider any registrant for deferment who is not employed in agriculture or Merchant Marines.

Regardless of the expiration date of their present classification of any registrant between the ages of 18 through 29 inclusive there must be filed a Form 42A (Special-Modified) Affidavit-Occupational Classification. These forms must be filed on all men now in class 11-B or 11-A, and before these forms are filed they must be forwarded for review by the following Federal Government Agencies Authorized to certify whether or not these registrants are "necessary to and regularly engaged in an indispensable and irreplaceable activity in war production or in support of the national health, safety or interest."

The list of government agencies mentioned above include the War Production Board; Petroleum Administration for War; Office of Defense Transportation; War Food Administration; Rubber Reserve. There are other agencies who cover other employment, but it is not anticipated they will apply to this immediate district. If you are not sure as to which of these agencies your business comes under we will try to assist you. We do not at this time have the proper addresses of the above agencies but expect to have in the near future.

The above directive applies only to registrants through the age of 19 through 29. For ages 30 through 37 the applicable forms will still be form 42 or 42A. In considering the classification of the age group of 30 through 33 it must be established that they are "necessary to and regularly engaged in an activity in war production or in support of the national health, safety, or interest," and if you have filed a Form 42A on these men in this group it is not necessary to file another until the period of their deferment is up. This does not mean that their deferment will continue until it expires, as local boards will review all deferments in the light of new regulations. Registrants ages 34 through 37 will merely have to establish that they are "regularly engaged in an activity in war production or in support of the national health, safety, or interest."

The above directive simply means that unless by April 1, 1945 there has not been filed a Form 42A (Special-Modified) Affidavit-Occupational Classification, with proper certification by the proper Government Agency, all men in the age group of 18 through 29, except registrants employed in agriculture, will be reclassified into class 1-A as available for military service, except registrants who have been re-

jected by the armed forces.

The above Form 42A (Special-Modified) is obtainable at your nearest local board. It is the desire of this local board to assist all employers or self employed registrants to comply with the above directives but if you expect to retain your employees it is necessary the above directive be complied with before April, 1945.

S-Sgt. Lewis Gets Award For Action In Leyte Battle

S-Sgt. Tom Burl Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Lewis, who reside at 1408 North Third Street, is a member of the 1st Medical Squadron of the 1st Cavalry Division which was recently awarded the Gold Star. The citation for the award is as follows:

"From 26 June until 25 December 1944, the 1st Medical Squadron, operating under the most adverse conditions of climate and terrain, with the shortage of officers and enlisted men, maintained hospital facilities far above those normally expected of a unit its size. On Leyte Island, evacuation, hospitalization, and medical supplies were promptly established on A-Day, and during the following sixty-seven days of continuous combat a constant supply of badly needed medical items for the front line troops was maintained and speedy evacuation of the sick and wounded was effected. All collecting and clearing installations maintained close support of the advancing cavalry troops operating over the most discouraging conditions of terrain, over roads made impassable by constant torrential rains, and in the wake of two raging typhoons. All officers and enlisted men worked assiduously administering to the needs of the sick and wounded. Hospitalization facilities were expanded over fifty per cent above normal operating capacity without effecting the proficiency of unit in the care and treatment of patients."

"Throughout the operation, the Medical Squadron, although busily occupied in the accomplishment of its herculean tasks, continued to maintain the highest standards of morale and discipline and achieved much in conserving the fighting strength of the 1st Cavalry Division."

A member of the service for the past 5 years, Sgt. Lewis has been overseas approximately 2 years. He is a former student of Klondike schools. His wife resides in El Paso. She is the former Miss Roberts Ogden of Midway.

Private Phillips Division Cited By French Recently

Editor's Note: Pvt. Tommie Phillips, a member of the Third Division which was recently cited by the French government. Pvt. Phillips who is the son of Rev. and Mrs. Earnest Phillips of Klondike, is a member of the Field Artillery and has been overseas for the past 16 months. He landed on the beachhead of Anzio and participated in the invasion of Southern France. Below is printed a portion of an article recently carried in the Stars and Stripes newspaper which tells of the presentation of the citation:

Another noteworthy first was chalked up by the Third Division Tuesday when it became not only the first American division to be cited by the French government during this war, but also the first division authorized to wear the coveted fourragere, French cord of honor.

In an impressive and colorful ceremony with high ranking officers of the American and French armies looking on, the French government citation was read by General de Latte de Tassign. The general then pinned the cord to the division colors and presented a fourragere to Maj. Gen. John O'Daniel, the Third's commander.

General de Gaulle, who ordered the citation, paid tribute to the way the division carried on the splendid tradition of courage that earned it the nickname of "Rock of the Marne." He went on with high praise for the great leadership of the gallant chief, Gen. O'Daniel.

The French recalled that the division had just completed more than 180 days of continuous combat from the shore of the Mediterranean to the banks of the Rhine. During the last phase of the ac-

tion, the division was under the command of the First French Army. In particular, the actions of the division in the Colmar pocket clean-up were noted.

The citation reads as follows: "Official Croix de Guerre Citation." To the Elite Division which remained faithful to the finest traditions of courage and sacrifice which had been its pride during the last war when it acquired the vigorous leadership of Gen. O'Daniel, a chief known for his energy and his ability to maneuver, the division, remaining in line without interruption, fought victoriously from the beaches of the Mediterranean to the banks of the Rhine.

Attached to First French Army under command of General de Latte de Tassign for the operation of the Colmar pocket, the Third Division has by the power of its ever renewed attacks taken a large part in the victorious battle of Colmar. During the night of 23-24 January 1945 this Division succeeded in crossing by surprise the Fecht and Ill rivers and captured the first enemy line of resistance moving across a terrain covered with obstacles and in spite of raging snow blizzard.

Giving the enemy no rest and pursuing him with an ever increasing ardor, the division crossed the Colmar canal to successfully surround and capture the town of Neuf-Brisach, thereby cutting one of the only two possible lines of retreat of the enemy still fighting in the region south of Colmar.

The division during this action captured over 4,000 POWs, thus brilliantly completing the series of glorious operations in which it participated from the Mediterranean to the Rhine.

CHEMICAL SEED TREATMENT
County Agent, T. A. Barfield, stresses the importance of chemical treatment of cotton, peanut, and grain and sweet sorghum seed. Treatment of seed selected for planting this year is a proved means of obtaining a better stand of plants and increased yields, treatment of cotton planting seed also reduces damage from seedling diseases, such as damping off, sore shin and anthracnose. Other benefits are reduction of damage from angular leaf spot and bacterial boll rot, along with increased seedling vigor. Plants which are vigorous and healthy during the first few weeks make possible early cultivation to control grass and weeds.

Tests at the Temple Experiment station with cotton, sorghum, and other chemicals during a two-year period showed an average increase of 168 pounds of seed cotton per acre with fuzzy seed. Barfield says the cost was about ten cents an acre for the chemical. Directions on the container of the chemical should be followed closely.

Grain and sweet sorghum seed always should be treated if kernel smut is present. But it usually pays also to treat seed which is free of smut. It gives better germination, especially with hedges and fetters seed which do not germinate well unless moisture and soil temperature conditions are favorable.

Barfield believes it is a wise practice to treat peanut seed chemically for better stands and yield. But tests show it is more important to apply the treatment to machine shelled seed than to hand shelled or unshelled seed. For this purpose he recommends either two ounces

14. Inoculate or treat all seeds. Treat vegetable seeds with proper kind of mercury dust before planting. This controls seed-borne disease and aids germination. Treat legume seed with proper culture of inoculating dust.

15. Tomato blossom shedding. Plant good, healthy vigorous plants as soon as frost danger is past. Plant adapted varieties. Plant the Porter type or other hot, dry weather-resistant types, beginning 3 to 4 weeks after spring frost is past.

of arsan or three ounces of two per cent ceresan or sperson per hundred pounds of seed. But he cautions against using the five per cent ceresan on peanuts because it causes seed injury.

For further information consult your county agricultural agent for details of chemical seed treatment.

CHEMICAL GUN KILLS COYOTES

The coyote is a pretty smart animal and sometimes he'll escape traps, and poison. But a new device, a chemical gun, is proving effective in North Texas where losses of poultry and young stock have caused farmers and stockmen to swear vengeance.

"Humane coyote getter" is what the gadget is called. R. E. Callender, wildlife specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says it's really getting the job done. The coyote getter consists of a cylinder loaded with 38 cartridges which contain cyanide gas. After the cylinder is driven into the ground the trigger is covered with rabbit skin and a scent bait attached. When Mr. Coyote investigates he trips the trigger and is shot in the mouth with the deadly poison, and that's the finish of him.

Mr. Callender says the chemical gun costs little more than a dollar, but the price is cheaper in large lots. The cartridges cost three dollars for fifty. Last month he showed hundreds of adults and 4-H club boys how to load and set the coyote getter, a job which is dangerous and must be done with care.

Out in Farmer County stockmen have found the guns most successful when they were set in a coyote "run." Lee H. McElroy, the county agricultural agent, says

it's also important for the rabbit hide or sheep skin to be tied securely around the shell holder, otherwise, rats or other rodents may pull off the camouflage.

Regardless of the technique, the coyote killing business was good last month. Archer County's kill reached the 500 mark after a three months' campaign, and more than 200 were poisoned by a Federal trapper in Motley County. One stockman, A. B. Simpson, found 10 dead coyotes the morning after poison had been put out. Girls as well as boys learned coyote-getting techniques at one demonstration.

Mr. Callender gave in the Gilliland community of Knox County. The predators have become so bad there that eight farm families have given up raising chickens and turkeys.

County Agent, T. A. Barfield can furnish information on where these new coyote-getters may be purchased. It would be wise to have him give you some precautions to use in setting the device.

Joseph Medley Is Wanted For Murder By F.B.I.

Dean R. Morley, Special Agent in Charge, Dallas Federal Bureau of Investigation, today announced a nation-wide manhunt looking to the arrest of Joseph D. Medley. A warrant was issued on March 10, 1945, for the arrest of Medley by U. S. Commissioner, Washington, D. C., charging him with fleeing from the District of Columbia to avoid prosecution for the crime of murder. He is sought for the brutal murder on March 6, 1945, of Mrs. Nancy Boyer, who was killed by being shot twice through the head.

He is also wanted for leaving the custody of a guard of the State Prison at Jackson, Michigan, on November 27, 1944, where he was serving a sentence for armed robbery.

Medley is reported to have two revolvers in his possession. One is carried in a shoulder holster. The other weapon is allegedly a snub-nosed type.

Medley is described as 43 years of age, born July 22, 1901, at Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; weight 185 pounds; height, 5 feet, 11 1/2 inches; build, medium; eyes, grayish blue; hair, dark, heavy, streaked with gray, parted on left side and combed straight back; nose, prominent, sharp; eyebrows, heavy; face, clean shaven; scars, slight scar right side of nose, 2 cut scars inner right wrist, small scar at base of nose, burn scar on back below left shoulder, burn scar on upper chest, 1 inch cut scar above right ear, teeth, has both upper and lower plates; foot, wears 10 1/2 narrow shoe.

Victory gardeners in Texas are asked to grow one million gardens in 1945. That means that every person who grew one last year ought to grow one again this year, and that there should be a few extras. As a general rule, the Fall gardens in Dawson County were more successful last year than Spring gardens. However, there were some very good early gardens in the county. These were grown in protected places. Some people had excellent frame gardens. Others had good tub gardens which produced plants early. The successful ones were planted in protected areas where the wind and sand did not destroy them. Four-H club girls who grew Sears Roebuck gardens last year had good Fall and Winter gardens. The victory garden program in our county will be as good as we make it. It is up to each gardener to decide at what time of the year he or she can have the best garden and where to plant that garden. The following are a few pointers and "thumb rules" that may enable gardeners to do a better job. It might be a good idea to clip these rules and keep them to refer to during your gardening season.

1. Cultivation of garden vegetables should be shallow and frequent. Cultivate shallow since most vegetables feed largely with in top 3 or 4 inches of soil. Cultivate weekly or as soon after rain or irrigation as possible to control weeds and grass, conserve moisture and prevent soil crusting.

2. Row Beds should be flat or nearly flat in areas of low rainfall and where no irrigation water is to be added.

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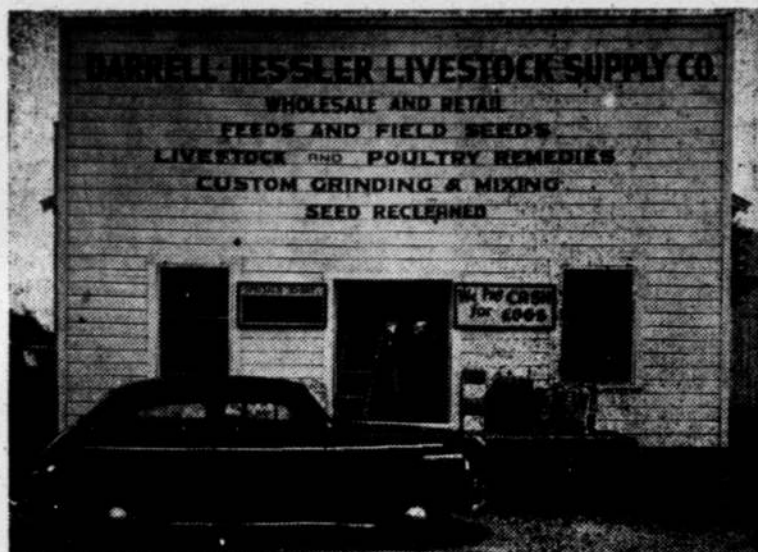

MEATS AND FATS — Red stamps Q5, R5, S5; last date for use, March 31. Red stamps T5, U5, V5, W5, and X5; last date for use, April 28. Red stamps Y5, Z5, and A2, B2, C2, D2; last date for use, June 2. Red stamps E2, F2, G2, H2, J2, last date for use June 30. New Stamps will be validated April 1.

PROCESSED FOODS — Blue stamps X5, Y5, Z5, and A2 and B2; last date for use, March 31. Blue stamps C2, D2, E2, F2, and G2; last date for use, April 28. Blue stamps H2, J2, K2, L2, and M2; last date for use, June 2. Blue stamps N2, P2, Q2, R2, and S2; last date for use, June 30. New stamps will be validated April 1.

SUGAR STAMPS — Stamp 35 last date for use June 2. No new stamp will be validated until May 1. **SHOES** — Airplane stamps 1, 2, 3 in Book Three continue valid indefinitely.

CIVILIANS AT WAR

The Government needs and asks its citizens in this 172nd week of the war to:

1. Retread, recap and repair every worn and usable tire to avoid a serious breakdown of automobile transportation.
2. Join your neighbors now in locating vacant lots for community gardens. Beginning March 26, applications for extra gas for travel necessary to cultivate victory gardens will be accepted by your ration board.
3. Fill one of the 2,100 essential jobs in 50 war plants manufacturing rockets, which are needed in far greater quantities to hasten victory.

BUTTER SET-ASIDE INCREASED FOR APRIL AND MAY

The War Food Administration has fixed the butter set-aside quota (amount of butter put aside for government purchase) for April at 40 per cent of production, and for May at 55 per cent of production. Previously, during February and March, the set-aside percentages were 20 and 25 per cent respectively. Efforts are being made to maintain butter production and to keep the available civilian supplies flowing into trade channels on a fairly even monthly basis. During April and May quantities of creamery butter for civilians will be about 80,000,000 pounds as compared with an average of about 82,000,000 pounds during February and March.

HOUSEWIVES MUST GET CANNING SUGAR ALLOTMENT FROM RATION BOARDS

The Office of Price Administration says there will be enough sugar

to preserve as much fruit as was actually "put up" in our homes last year. The same amount of sugar (70,000 tons) has been set aside this year for home canning as was set aside last year. Last year, however, 300,000 tons more sugar than the total amount allocated for home canning was bought by housewives. A large part of this sugar was bought with stamp 40, the home canning stamp, and much of it was used for ordinary household purposes. This year's total sugar supply is smaller than in 1944. If any over-issuance of canning sugar were allowed, it would have to come out of the amount allowed for other home use. In 1945 no stamps will be validated for canning sugar. Housewives will be given sugar coupons for home canning by their local boards. Each housewife's home canning sugar allotment will be based on the amount of canning she did last year and the amount she plans to do this year. She will be allowed up to a maximum of 20 pounds per person, or 160 pounds to a single family, even though the family may contain more than eight persons.

NON-HIGHWAY FARM GASOLINE INCREASE FOR SECOND QUARTER OF 1945

The nation's food growers will get extra gasoline for non-highway use during the second quarter of 1945, says PAW. Petroleum Administrator Harold L. Ickes has announced the allocation of 1,276,000 barrels of automotive gasoline a day for U. S. civilian consumption in the second quarter of 1945, comprising the months of April, May and June. Compare with the quantity of gasoline made available to civilians in the corresponding quarter of 1944, the new allocation is 19,000 barrels a day greater, the additional fuel being assigned to the War Food Administration for farm use. Commenting on this, Deputy Administrator Davies said: "The quantity of gasoline required for non-highway farm use always rises sharply in the second quarter to provide fuel for spring plowing, cultivating and planting, and we have provided for that increase as usual. This year we were asked for an unusually large quantity, with the explanation that it was hoped to enlarge the productive farm acreage of our country by about 10,000 acres. There has been an increase in the number of tractors added to the nation's farm equipment, and we are informed that plans have been worked out to run all tractors 20 per cent more hours per day."

NO RESTRICTION ON ROTENONE CONTENT OF 1945 INSECTICIDES

Rotenone supplies for the current crop year (October 1944 through September 1945) will be approximately the same as for the previous year. WPB says, "Shipping facilities for importing the unprocessed rotenone from South America still constitute a problem. However, supplies of rotenone for essential commercial, farm, home and victory garden insecticide requirements are expected to be favorable, according to WPB. There are no restrictions on the permissible rotenone content of insecticides during the current agricultural year, as the result of a policy adopted jointly with the War Food Administration. WPB pointed out. This policy is intended to enable manufacturers to offer finished insecticides having a rotenone content necessary for adequate crop protection."

RATIONED FOOD ALLOTMENT FOR INDUSTRIAL USERS TO BE REDUCED

With civilian supplies of meats, sugar, butter and canned fruits and vegetable at lowest point since the

war began, OPA has announced two actions designed to bring industrial use of rationed foods into line with these small supplies. Industrial users include bakers, manufacturers of beverages, pharmaceuticals, fruit spreads, and manufacturers of other unrationed products in which rationed foods are used as ingredients. The two actions are: (1) Beginning April 1, 1945, the allotments of all rationed foods for most industrial users will be reduced; (2) between March 16, 1945 and June 15, 1945, physical inventories of rationed foods and ration buying power if the form of checks, coupons, etc. in excess of adequate working inventories will be taken up. The action thus announced is the third of three steps planned last December. The first was taken on December 26, when the backlog of old, unneeded ration stamps in consumer hands was taken up and all consumers were put on an equal basis as the year began. The second step came on March 6, when provision was made for taking up the excess "spending power" of restaurants, hotel dining rooms, and other institutional users.

INVEST FARM PROFITS IN WAR BONDS

By Frank L. Eversull, President North Dakota Agricultural College The Wartime Farm Program is far more extensive than growing and harvesting crops. It involves a way of life and an expansion program that will meet the needs of a post-victory America and a post-victory world. Those of us who are close to the soil will long remember the magnificent contribution agriculture has made to the winning of the war in spite of limitations of manpower, privations of equipment and overtaxed transportation facilities. American farmers have done the most gigantic task in the face of the most terrific odds in the whole history of agriculture.

Today the farmer finds himself in possession of money and financial backing, the like of which he has not experienced before. There is certainly a tendency to spend these richly earned gains to buy the equipment and to do the jobs on farm properties that have been indicated during the last ten years. But he is face to face with the problem of shortages, rationing and poor materials.

This is the time when agriculture should plan for the future. No adequate planning can be made which does not include a maximum investment in War Bonds. These securities will furnish the necessary financial undergirding to guarantee adequate equipment and buildings to make farming a genuine way of life in the days which are to come. Saving is the only way to keep debts down, to eliminate inflation, and to be prepared for the needs of a new agriculture when this war shall have been won.

There is no better advice to give and no better words to heed than these—Invest every cent of your surplus money in War Bonds and keep them against the day of their maturity.

REDUCED SUPPLY OF FATS AND OILS FOR U. S. IN 1945

The total supply of fats and oils in the United States will be substantially reduced in 1945, according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Demand for fats and oils is expected to continue strong in 1945. Military demands at present are heavy, both for the expanded military program and for relief distribution in areas under military

jurisdiction. Requests for Lend-Lease and other exports, including exports to liberated countries, continue large. With national income now at the highest level in the Nation's history, civilians would consume larger quantities than will be available for civilian use. Prices of most fats and oils probably will remain at ceiling levels through the summer at least. The increasing stringency in supplies of fats and oils is reflected in recent government regulations to aid War Procurement. According to preliminary estimates, domestic disappearance of fat and oil products in 1944 was over 10.3 billion pounds (in terms of fat content), about 400 million pounds more than in 1943. The major factor in this increase was expanded production of soap for the military, with some increase for civilians. Civilian consumption of food fats was reduced about one pound per capita in 1944 from the 1943 level. If exports, including military shipments for relief, continue large in 1945, domestic disappearance of all fats and oils probably will be reduced five to 10 per cent because of the smaller total supply of fats available, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics said.
