Two Million Die From Starvation In Eight Months

Two Million More Doomed To Die Of Exposure, Cold And Disease; Fanatics Accused Of Massacres
Kill Adult Males
Situation Is Held As Most Terrible Ever Experienced In China; Failure Of Crops Is Blamed

(By Associated Press)
SHANGHAI, Jan. 14.—Harrowing stories of cannibalism were added to the tales of horror recounted of famine and cold that are reported to have taken 2,000,000 lives in China within eight months. Another 2,000,000 persons are said to be doomed to die by starvation. Typhus, grim sister of famine, is charged with the death of thousands. Millions of Chinese are said to be dying of exposure and disease. Fanatics are accused of massacring all adult males of several villages of Kansu province. Situation Terrible
George Andrews, a missionary born in Kansu province and just returned from nine months of relief work there, said that famine, disease and exposure in Kansu, Shensi and Szechwan provinces had caused one of the most terrible situations ever experienced in China. Failure of crops last year and no seeds planted for the coming season, together with below zero weather in the Yangtze valley and north China, were ascribed by Andrews as causes for the widespread suffering.
Speaking of a statement from Peking that 2,000,000 had died in Shensi province of famine, Andrews said that conditions were far worse in Kansu, where "85 per cent of the province is afflicted with famine."
Famine Terrible
"Prospects for the coming year," Andrews asserted, "are that north-west China probably will experience

Va., for whom a nationwide search has been made in connection with the slaying of a Pennsylvania state highway patrolman. Mrs. Schroeder and two men are arrested with her, after an exchange of shots with a posse near Laveen, Ariz., tonight, were questioned by Sheriff Wright. The men tentatively were identified as T. R. Crawford and M. Glenn Dwyer, wanted with Mrs. Schroeder for the murder of Corporal Brady Paul.
Negro Dismissed From West Point
WEST POINT, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Alonso Parham, negro, of Chicago, was among the 64 cadets honorably discharged today from the United States Military Academy for failure to pass their mid-term academic examinations.
Parham was deficient in only one subject, mathematics, and he is eligible to take a re-examination in March, which if successfully passed, will entitle him to re-enter the academy.
Forty-eight of the cadets dismissed today were plebes, or freshmen, and the others were sophomores.

World Statesmen Are Gathering In London For Meet

Five Power Navy Limitation
Conference Promises To
Be Most Momentous Event
At British Capital

LONDON, Jan. 14. (AP)—The foremost statesmen of the world are gathering in London for what probably will be the most momentous meeting of its kind ever held in the British capital, the five power naval limitations conference. It convenes one week from today. Given success, the conference may result in additional guarantees of security for the powers of the world and relief from much of its huge burden of military taxation. Given failure, observers envisage possible armament races and international disputes which may bring on threats of war.

Americans On Way
The delegation from Japan already is here, the Italian and French delegations will arrive shortly and the American delegation reaches London Friday from Plymouth.

Formal opening of the conference takes place next Tuesday in the royal chamber of the house of lords with an address by King George. Meanwhile preliminary conversations, given their precedent in the Dawes-MacDonald and MacDonald-Hoover meetings of last summer and fall, already have got into full swing.

Japanese-British conversations started in earnest last Thursday, with each intent on outlining before the conference their government's attitude toward various technical details which are to be thrashed out in the formal conference. With arrival of the Americans Friday, Anglo-American conversations and Franco and Anglo-American conversations will be in order.

Details Guarded
Details of the Anglo-Japanese conversations have been guarded, but it was understood a subject has been submarines—which the British and Americans are willing to abandon altogether, but which Japan and France insist are necessary for defense.

London is making ready to welcome the delegations and the throng of experts, attendants, secretaries, journalists, and the like. Reservations at leading hotels have been taken, and even the smaller hostels anticipate crowding.

ONE WITNESS HEARD

Public Utility Publicity
Methods Investigated

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (AP)—Council for public utility associations today presented their only witness in the federal trade commission investigation of power utility publicity methods.

Preston S. Arkwright of Atlanta, chairman of the public policy committee of the National Electric Light Association, president of the association, and president of the Georgia Power company, supplemented documentary evidence introduced last week by describing the organization and work of the N. E. L. A.

The N. E. L. A., Arkwright said, has a membership of 21,495 companies and individuals, but is supported principally by the dues of 715 member power companies. He emphasized the association does not own or manage any power companies and it has no control or power of veto over any company's actions or utterances.

DETROIT, Jan. 14. (AP)—Election of officers and conferences on methods and policies of the Anti-Saloon League of America today occupied the vanguard of the national convention of the league, to open here tomorrow.

There will be a memorial service this evening for Edward S. Rhumaker, former superintendent of the league in Indiana, and other officials who have died since the last convention.

Francis Scott McBride, general superintendent, read his report. He stated it was a "hopeful feature" that all legislative and administrative officers were not sidestepping their responsibilities regarding enforcement and that throughout the country enforcement is responding to "official assistance."

RULE ON SMUGGLING

Owners Of Vessels Are Held Responsible By U. S.

WILMINGTON, Del., Jan. 14. (AP)—The federal district court of Delaware today ruled that any person who in any foreign country owns or outfits a vessel and loads her with goods that may not be imported into the United States and sends her out with a view of landing the goods in this country is liable under the tariff act regardless of his nationality.

The ruling was made by Judge Hugh M. Morris, in denying a motion that a jury be instructed to return a verdict of not guilty in the case of John T. Callahan and others.

Callahan, whose home was said to be in Newark, N. J., was alleged to have been the owner of the schooner Charles Edward, seized by coast guards four miles off the Delaware Capes on the night of Nov. 10, 1927, with a cargo of liquor estimated to have been worth \$200,000.

PRISONER ESCAPES

SWEETWATER, Jan. 14. (AP)—Hope Leonard, under two sentences of two years each escaped from the county jail last night where he was held awaiting grand jury action on a charge of automobile theft. He was sentenced by Abilene and Ballinger juries for car theft.

Changes Proposed In U. S. Airmail

Shakeup Of Rate Scale Is
Recommended By Post-
master General Brown;
New System Outlined

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 14. (AP)—The entire rate scale and air-mail system of the postoffice department would be changed by recommendations outlined here today by Postmaster General Brown.

For the first time, the postmaster general gave a "hard-stick" of air-mail compensation, which would supplant a system in which one carrier received as low as 5 cents and another as high as \$3 a pound.

Would Concentrate

Under the system suggested by Brown, the post office department would concentrate its exceptional aid on essential routes, those that have been traveled by oil, team, pony express, railroad and auto, and would use planes as it now uses trains, at fixed rates per mile for definite weight spaces.

Discussing the condition of the industry, the postmaster general said:

"The experience of all companies in 1929 was substantially the same. With a paying load of only 16 to 40 per cent of capacity, all closed the year with operating deficits so great the very life of the passenger transport industry today is in the balance."

He declared this was because the American public was provided with facilities for flying from coast to coast before any considerable number of people had made sightseeing trips over their native towns. He added the situation is one that properly occasions the deepest public concern.

BODY DISCOVERED

Negro Is Burned Almost
Beyond Recognition

ATHENS, Jan. 14. (AP)—The body of Jerry Clifton, aged negro, was found in his cabin at Antioch, burned almost beyond recognition, the sheriff here was informed today.

The negro lay with his head in the ashes of his fireplace, and the head and upper part of his body were badly burned. Because of the possibility that he had been strangled and fell into the fire, a verdict was withheld by the justice of the peace holding the inquest.

The verdict was withheld by Justice W. B. Bristow when he learned the negro had a sum of money, and a 20-dollar gold piece he was known to have carried was missing.

Reports Are Exaggerated,
Health Officer Says

TEXARKANA, Jan. 14. (AP)—The Texas state health officer today drew the attention of the state of Arkansas today with the arrival of Dr. C. W. Garrison, Arkansas state health officer, for a conference between city and county health officials.

Dr. Garrison explained his visit was based on "rumors" that there was a "good deal" of smallpox in Texas, especially in Texarkana. A reassuring statement that the first estimate of as many as 250 cases was highly exaggerated was issued. It was said there were not more than 40 or 50 cases in the two cities and counties.

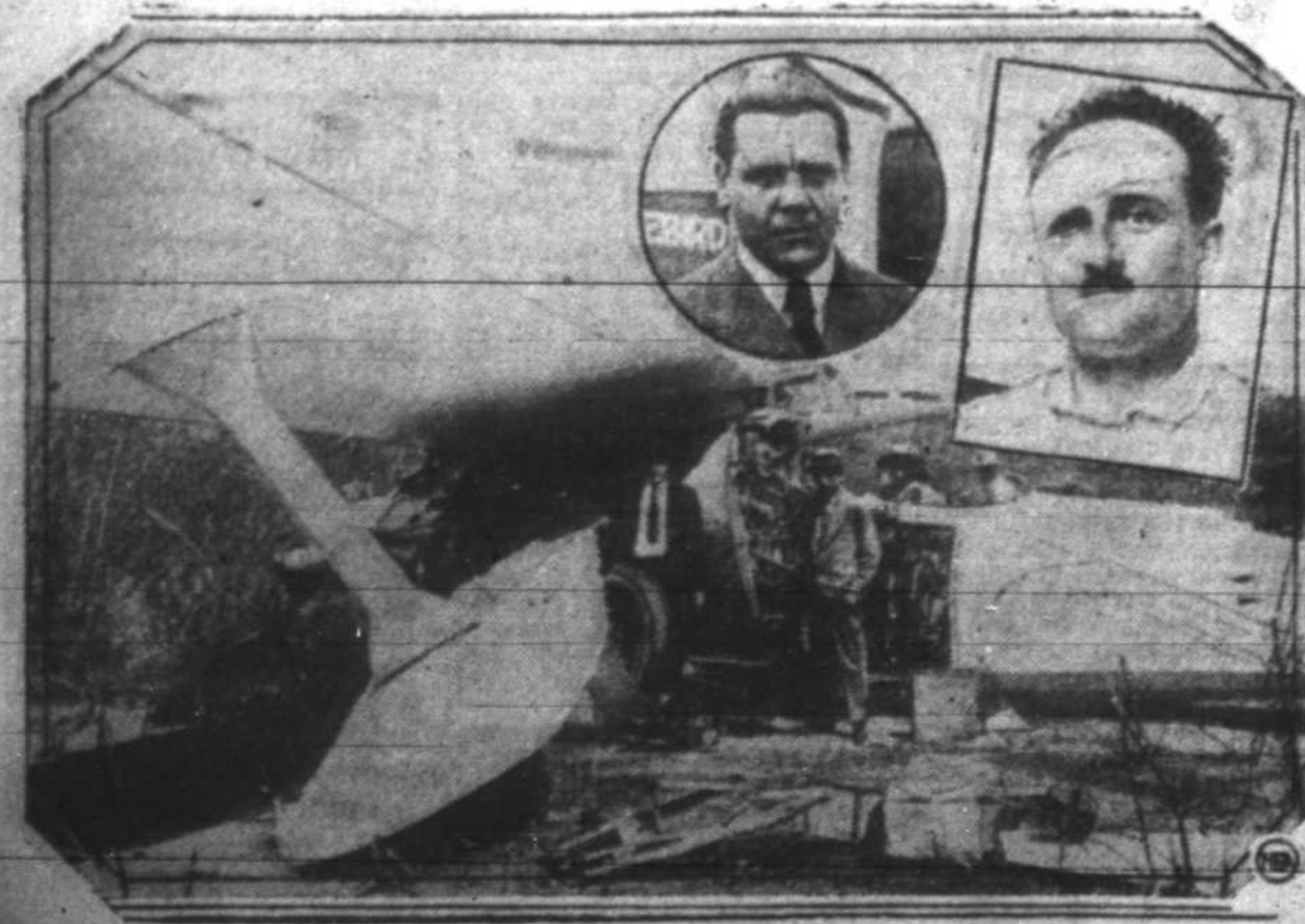

Offspring-Or-Divorce Marriage Plan Finds Scant Favor With Authorities Who Brand It Illegal, Foolish, Unfair

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Any way you figure them, trick marriage contracts must be wrong. The first "companionate" unions brought a storm of condemnation and now its antithesis, marriage à la Moyer, is coming in for its share.

Ethel Oylette Oen and William Kenneth Moyer were among the many who opposed the idea of companionate marriage. They had a chance to study it at first hand, too, for they were friends of Josephine Haldeman-Julius and her young husband, who had agreed to live together in trial relationship until such time as the birth of a child might make the bond permanent. Their wedding attracted national attention.

But Moyer and Miss Oen, themselves being in love, decided that a deliberate intention to avoid parenthood was fundamentally opposed to a true meaning of marriage. They would, they agreed, take the opposite view—that the object of marriage is to rear a family, and that the failure to do so should dissolve the bond.

Here's Their Contract

So when they appeared for their ceremony, they signed the following contract: "I, William Kenneth Moyer, of the City of Chicago, Illinois, and I, Ethel Oylette Amelia Oen, Borough of Sun Prairie, Wisconsin, do hereby agree to marry for the deliberate purpose of creating a child. If, at the end of two years we have failed in our purpose it should be the privilege of either one to apply for an absolute divorce without consulting the other."

Then the solemn broke. Legal opinions from two prominent attorneys agreed that the added clause could not be binding, at least in the state of New York.

Morris Ernst, nationally known liberal lawyer and author, pointed out that it was illegal for two married people to agree on terms of divorce while they are still married. "Certainly, so far as the state is concerned, the object of marriage is children, and the best possible protection of them. But it is my opinion that the state is interested in the marriage only after there are children, and not in the relationship of two individuals before. Consequently, I do not consider that this pact really means anything, especially since it is doubtful that it could be enforced."

Says It's Unfair to Women
Justice John Ford, of the New York Supreme Court, not only questioned the legality of the clause but denounced the whole idea as unfair to the woman, as all new-made marriages are.

"A man," he said, "can hold up his head again after any experience, but what chance is there for a woman to marry again if her husband divorced her under such an agreement?"

Dr. Mary Mallon, prominent physician and social worker, disapproved thoroughly of the baby clause.



"A woman shouldn't have her first baby until she has her first 'crisis,'" said John B. Watson, lower left, psychologist and author. "This marriage contract could not be binding," declared Morris Ernst, center, liberal lawyer. "Such a marriage is bound to be a failure," said Winifred Stoner, lower right, prominent educator. But not at all discouraged are Mr. and Mrs. William Kenneth Moyer, shown at top, who have agreed to allow a divorce within two years if by that time they have not become parents of a child.

"Women," she said, "are the creators of the race and the artists in love. Like all artists and creators they need freedom rather than restrictions. People who actually love each other do not want companionate marriages or baby contracts. They want only the exquisite flowering of the mental, physical, emotional and play instincts that marriage grants."

"With our present knowledge of medical science, there are practically no sterile women. But, that does not imply that every marriage demands offspring, or that children are the object of marriage. To get a divorce at the end of two years because there is no child would be as silly as to get one because a couple had no automobile or no house and lot. People should not marry with the idea of divorce, but with the

intentions and vows of each other regarding all phases of common life.

"There is something appealing in the Moyer contract—the idea of two people realizing that the important consideration in marriage is the family."

Educator Opposes Idea
Mrs. Winifred S. Stoner, noted educator, believes that such an agreement is wrong and foolish.

Said she: "If two people love one another, they will want to remain together, no matter what happens. If they marry prepared to divorce each other at the start, their life cannot help leading that way."

John B. Watson, author and founder of the credo of behaviorism found the contract much too arbitrary.

"The early happy years of marriage should be devoted to getting established, to being happy and to having a good time together while the wife is young and attractive," he said. "A woman shouldn't have her first baby until she has her first wrinkle."

Clergyman Hits Scheme

The idea is not sponsored by the clergy, most of whom consider it demoralizing. "It is," one said "practically a trial marriage which these young people have contracted to make. Their perception of marriage is not a clean, spiritual one. When marriage is entered into under such conditions it is almost predestined to be a failure, and to bring about disagreements and unhappiness."

Author Theodore Dreiser is highly in favor of the scheme. "They do it in Russia," he said. "A couple can get a divorce there in two weeks just by saying they don't care to live with each other any longer. That doesn't mean they all do so by any means, but they have the privilege, if they want it."

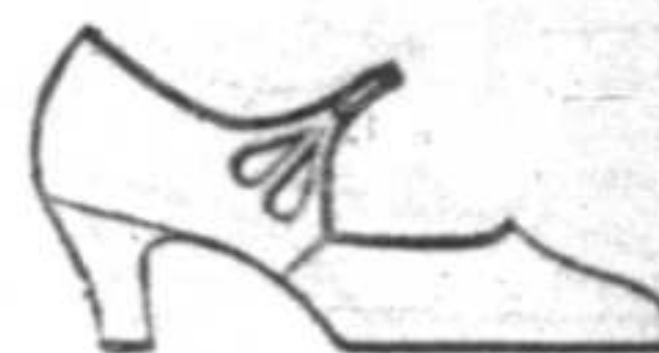

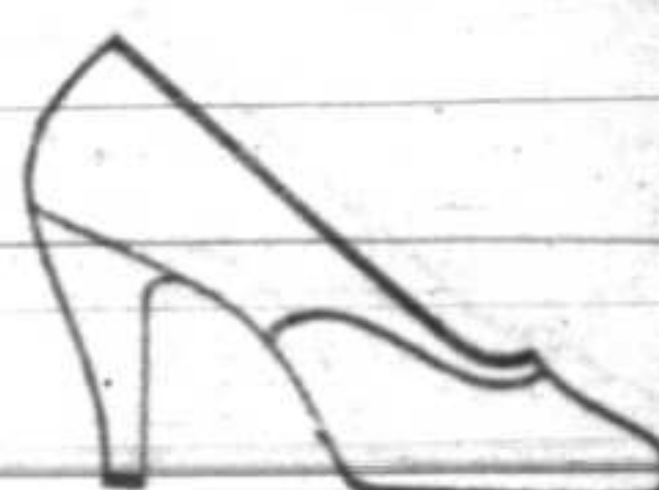

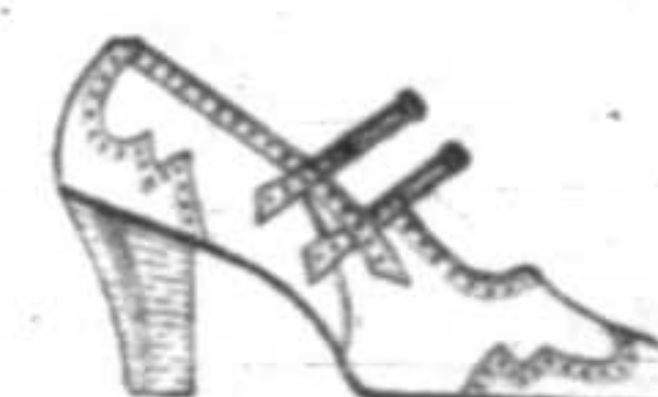

Most spring-like are the new sprigged linens and chiffons. Both suggested the fact that crocuses and hyacinths are imminent. Both have a softness suggestive of gentle spring zephyrs.

The flowered chiffons this season are much daintier than those arresting ones of a season ago. Nowadays a note of quaintness is at a premium and the patterns of both chiffons and fine linens capitalize this.

Instead of flaunting startlingly large and gorgeous flowers, both the chiffons and the linens figure tiny sprays of dainty blossoms reminiscent of the prints of grand-mother's day.

Quietness Is Chic.
In the way frocks are fashioned, there is a note of quaintness, too. If made of flat crepe or other unpatterned materials, they tend to use much hand-work, with rolled edges, fine tucks, buttons and other touches of decoration, usually of self-fabric. Boleros are very good for spring, so are vestee effects, a hint of Empire in high waistlines, gored skirts, belts with unusual fastenings and soft collars and cuffs.

A wild rose flat crepe for warm days features the new square neckline and square armholes. It has a new kind of trimming, a corded motif in self material that forms the bolero and the yoke of the skirt.

There is a fan-pleated skirt, a style likely to be popular this spring because of its real fullness, though it appears restrained. Topping this frock is a natural leghorn hat in a size and shape that is quite fitting for this semi-dressy type of dress.

Recommendations Of Hoover Being Carried Forward

Realignment Of Prohibition Forces Sought In Attempt To Transfer Dry Unit To Justice Department

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (P)—The first concrete move to carry out the recommendations of President Hoover and the law enforcement commission for a re-alignment of prohibition forces came today with the introduction by Chairman Williamson of the house expenditures committee of the administration bill to provide for the transfer of the dry unit from the treasury department to the department of justice.

He said hearings would be arranged on the measure soon with a view to reporting out the bill in the near future.

Bill In Line.
Williamson said his bill "is in line with the recommendation of the president."

"If enacted into law," he said in explaining the measure, "all that part of the bureau now in the treasury department having to do with the enforcement of the prohibition act, including the field service, will be transferred to the department of justice."

"The granting of permits and the administration of the internal revenue law will remain in the treasury. The attorney general, however, may exercise with the responsibility veto power in the matter of issuing permits under regulations to be prescribed jointly by the attorney general and the secretary of the treasury."

Enforcement Difficult.
"From the very first," he said, "it was perfectly patent that the 18th amendment and the Volstead act would become a bone of bitter contention and that enforcement would be difficult."

"The department of justice is the only agency of the government that is at all equipped to deal effectively with the problem. I believe that the lodgment of enforcement in a single agency, with the responsibility definitely fixed, will result in wholesale reforms both in personnel and methods that will put vigor and teeth into enforcement if further legislation is necessary, congress stands ready to act."

No Controversy.
The expenditures committee chairman said no controversy had arisen between department heads with respect to the proposed transfer.

"On the contrary," he continued, "there has all along been the fullest cooperation with a view to such changes as might be of assistance in securing the best possible enforcement of the prohibition act."

"The leaders in the house," he said, "have given assurance that the decks will be cleared so that prompt consideration may be had when the bill reaches the calendar."

Absolve Hoover Of Impropriety Count

Negotiations With Cuban And American Sugar Interests Are Considered By Senate Lobby Committee

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (P)—President Hoover was absolved today by the senate lobby investigation committee of any impropriety in connection with negotiation with Cuban and American sugar interests charged against the chief executive in testimony before that group.

Reporting to the senate, the committee asserted in addition that a "reprehensible" effort had been made to stir up Latin America antagonism against the United States by those opposing an increased tariff on sugar.

Expenditures Listed.
It listed the total expenditures of those for and against such an increase at more than \$400,000, with \$175,000 to \$200,000 spent by the former and \$200,000 to \$225,000 by the latter.

With reference to testimony that President Hoover had sought to bring about an agreement among the sugar interests on a sliding scale of sugar duties for incorporation in the pending tariff bill, the committee said that "in all this your committee finds no impropriety nor anything open to censure or criticism."

"And it is quite likely," the report said, "that representatives of both the contending forces waited on the president to incline him favorably toward their views, respectively, and, the sliding scale solution having been proposed, he suggested that they get together in an effort to work out some plan, and in that connection informed them he would have inquiry made into the practicability of the idea by experts of the departments."

"In any event," the report added, "it appears from the testimony that he did cause such inquiry to be made. In all this your committee finds no impropriety nor anything open to censure or criticism."

Referring to the employment of Edwin P. Shattuck, New York attorney, by H. C. Dr. Schacht, Key Man at Reparations Meeting, Is Wizard of World Finance

THE HAGUE, Jan. 14.—Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, the German financial genius with the Scandinavian Christian name, is coming in for more praise and condemnation than any other public man in all Germany, now that the war debt conference is under way.

And by his very absence from the conference while it settled into a deadlock and sent an emergency call for his expert assistance, the head of the German Reichsbank did not further endear himself to the delegates at The Hague, where S. Parker Gilbert, of the U. S. Agent-General for Reparations, and other representatives of the six great powers held secret conferences. Dr. Schacht sent word that he would drop around within a few days.

The doctor may not think very highly of the Young Plan of war debt payments. But Germany was amazed when, prior to the conference, he made public a note he had addressed to the government in which he sharply criticized its position concerning the Young Plan.

Both Cheered and Berated
So now he is being cheered by the nationalists and big industrialists and berated by the government and the majority of its supporters. After all, the latter faction pointed out, the doctor sat in the Paris negotiations last April as Germany's chief delegate; it was in that capacity that he signed the agreement, and he is the head of the German state banking institution. They think that it scarcely behooves him to say anything that would aid the enemies of the Young Plan.

The onus of Schacht's criticism was that, since the adoption of the Young Plan, the government had tamely acquiesced in new obligations which he did not foresee and for which Germany had received no counter concessions. He listed "unprotected annuities raised by \$40,000,000 marks."

A surplus of 300,000,000 marks in liquidated property seized during the war by England and never returned.

Large sums to be paid by the government to Germans whose property was liquidated in Poland. Annuity of 19,500,000 marks for 37 years to Belgium to refund paper marks issued in that country while German troops occupied it.

The answer of the German cabinet was immediate and sharp. It said Schacht had been consulting with it concerning necessary financial reforms and had promised he would issue no statement which would embarrass the government before the second Hague conference and before the national referendum on the Young Plan, forced on it by the monarchists.

Republican papers went further. They said the publication of his memorandum would harm Germany in America as well as in Europe; that it would help the monarchists in their referendum; that it was a maneuver on the part of Schacht to make himself the dictator of Germany's finances.

And Schacht is just about a dictator now. He is one of the self-made men who have come to the fore in Germany in the past four years. During his university career he specialized in the study of economics. By 1913 at the age of 37, he was made sub-director of the great and powerful Dresdener bank. In 1923 he was called by the republic to become its currency commissioner.

Mark's Dismal Flight
The mark had made a stupendous flight into the abyss. Hundreds of millions of marks sold for one dollar, whereas the pre-war rate was four to the dollar. It was his job to stop inflation, to restore Germany to a gold basis, and to give the mark an actual fixed value, not only at home, but abroad.

In the process of deflation, many of the middle class suffered. But the mark was restored.
So successful was he that in 1924 he was elected President of the Reichsbank. His chief opponent was Dr. Helfferich, who was best known for his policy of financing the war by a system of loans and inflation. The contest thus took the form of inflation versus deflation and the latter won. In 1928 Schacht was unanimously re-elected for another term of four years. It was he who was largely instrumental also in calling a halt on the vast loans German municipalities were making in the United States, on the ground that these loans were largely spent on luxuries instead of necessities.

He it was who the other day abruptly asked the plan of the German Finance Minister to float a \$100,000,000 loan with an American house. When Dr. Schacht said he would not O. K. the loan, wild predictions were made that the minister would have to resign, and the cabinet itself was about to fall.

When Dollars Stayed Home
But the wizard then announced that the Reichsbank itself could and would supply the needed cash. So the finance official remained in office and 100,000,000 American dollars remained at home.

Schacht has always been known for his independence and his downright methods of speech. In 1927 he issued a book on the stabilization of the mark. Three piquant sayings give a taste of his quality.

"The Treaty of Versailles is a model of ingenious measures for the destruction of Germany."

"The dubious honor of having closed his ears longest, and most obstinately to the recognition of the facts belongs to Poincare."

(Recently Premier of France.)

"It was years and years before the 'Conquerors' slowly got into their heads that the World War had involved enormous injury to all concerned and that it was a sheer impossibility to make a single people (the Germans) pay the cost of it."

The contest will be conducted by H. J. Bower of Texas Technological college in the same manner as the club contests will be conducted two weeks later at the college. Judging will be done of Milo, alfalfa, hedges, wheat and oats. There will also be 20 bales of cotton to be classed and the boys will have to show their skill in budding and grafting.

A perfect score is 500 points for the entire contest, the highest contestant to date has 244 points out of a possible 250, and the lowest contestant has a score of 216 points. Floydada F. F. T. club has won the large cup given by Texas Tech at Lubbock for the past two years and

AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—Governor Moody has in mind extending clemency to some 200 inmates of the Texas penitentiary. He said today that with about 200 men now on furloughs and paroles he was considering paroling and furloughing probably that many more.

"But, the problem is how to select the men to favor with clemency," he said. "I do not know how to go about it. It is a terrible responsibility. It is depressing to pick up a newspaper and see where some convict on parole or furlough has killed some one or broken another law."

Contrary to popular belief, there are not so many prisoners who are serving sentences for violation of the prohibition law, he said.

When a newspaper reporter volunteered a guess that 60 per cent of the inmates must be liquor violators, the governor came forward with the information that not over 18 per cent were of that class of offenders.

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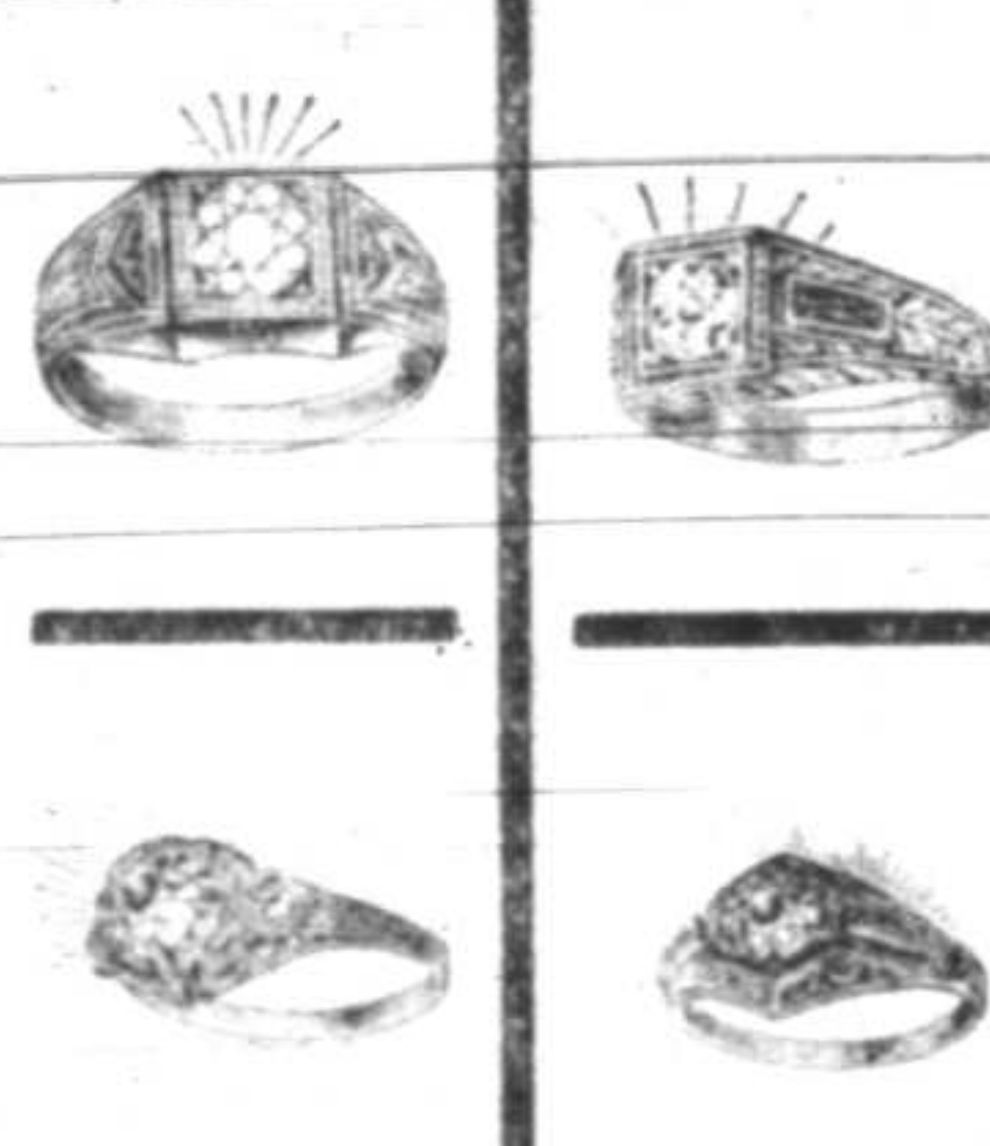

Hayworth to Catch
Raymond Hayworth, recalled from the Toledo American association club last August, is expected to develop as the regular catcher. Merwyn Shea, Pinky Hargrave, Bill Steinke, recruit from Seattle, and George Renna, obtained from Toronto this winter, will be available.

Dale Alexander will play first again. Alexander batted .343 in 1929, his first season with the Tigers, to lead American League rookies and collected 25 home runs. Gehring at Second

WHEN better basketball teams are built the chances are that the state of Indiana will produce them.

Perhaps no other state in the union, unless it be Kansas, can compare with Indiana in basketball enthusiasm and general high standard of ability. Within its borders are many good teams and the small colleges seem to be fully as tough as the big ones.

Take the case of little Butler university of Indianapolis, which already this season has trimmed Purdue, Montana State, Vanderbilt, Nebraska, Illinois and Chicago, among others, but dropped a one-sided decision to Indiana Central Normal School.

McKenzie, convicted slayer of Sam Street, San Antonio chief of detectives, was asked: "You are not crazy, are you?" He asserted he would rather be in the penitentiary than at the Terrell State hospital, where he was taken from San Antonio, and later removed here.

District Court Is Sought in Gray Co.

First Ranking Players Not Available For Davis Cup Competition This Year; Hopes Rest With Youth

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 14. (P)—Despite the fact that William T. Tilden and Francis "P. Hunter, first two ranking players in the United States, will not be available for the Davis Cup competition this year, we have implicit faith in the younger group, which will be "on its own" for the first time.

Youths Impressive
Tennis followers were impressed last year by the performances of Wilmer Allison and John Van Ryn in winning the English doubles championship at Wimbledon and the Davis Cup doubles in the challenge round at Paris.

Equally impressive was the showing of George M. Lott and John H. Doeg in capturing the United States National doubles championship. Several more young men have their hearts set on earning places on the 1930 Davis Cup team, and if their 1929 records can be taken as a criterion, they will be in the running for the highest honors.

Much as we admire the skill and the will-to-win of our younger players, we must not be deceived in regard to the strength of the Frenchmen. If René Lacoste, Jean Borotra and Jean Borel are in the defense of the cup, our task will assume colossal proportions. With Lacoste and Borotra at their best, we will have only an outside chance of coming through.

We also must not minimize the strength of England, Australia and Japan. Germany, which met the United States in the inter-zone finals last year, will be handicapped by the loss of Hans Moldenhauer, whose untimely death is regretted by all tennis devotees.

The triumphs of Allison and Van Ryn in Europe last summer, after their discouraging start in their work-outs in Philadelphia, revealed their potentialities. They showed their metal under fire, and it is because they proved their worth under stress that we feel hopeful of success as we make preparation for the start of the 1930 Davis Cup drive.

Charlie White to Return to Ring
CHICAGO, Jan. 14. (P)—Charlie White, one of the hardest left-hand punchers in lightweight ring history, is planning a comeback after six years in retirement. During 18 years in the ring White met two champions, Ritchie Mitchell and Bennie Leonard, as well as virtually all other outstanding lightweights of his time. He has been training for three months and has declared himself ready for action.

Cheating Cases Revealed in Texas University; Six Students Expelled

AUSTIN, Jan. 14. (P)—"Cheating" still was going on recently among students of the University of Texas. Nine cases involving scholastic dishonesty were handled by the discipline committee in the past six weeks. There were six convictions and suspensions from the university.

One case involved plagiarism, in which it was claimed the student had "lifted" passages from a popular magazine and incorporated them into a term paper. V. I. Moore, dean of student life, stated.

Has Hard Task
"The discipline committee is frequently charged with 'kicking' students out of school. This committee has perhaps the hardest task of any assigned to faculty members. The men and women who compose it study each case carefully and with due regard to the interest of the individual, as well as of the institution and the other students in it."

One year ago the Students' Assembly abolished the "honor system." Since then instructors have

been responsible for all examinations given to their respective classes. Now it is contended this scheme for supervising examinations has few, if any, merits over the abolished honor system. Some are urging the inauguration of a proctor system with "teeth in it."

The bank of Southland was closed December 2. The following day it was discovered that the time lock on the safe had been set to its maximum time, and Pope had disappeared. When the safe was opened three days later \$300 in small change was found, though deposits of the bank were said to have totaled \$55,000.

Finding of Rare Metals in Meteors Indicates Other Worlds Like Earth

ITHACA, N. Y., Jan. 14. (AP)—Discovery of arsenic and germanium in meteors at Cornell university was announced today.

A report to the American Astronomical society tells how a super-sensitive method of analyzing with light reveals these two elements in half a dozen meteors that fell to earth from outer space in the last century. Arsenic has been suspected previously. Germanium, a rare, grayish-white metal chemical resembling tin and silicon, was unknown in meteors.

Revives Speculation
Their finding revives the old speculation that somewhere in space worlds exist which are like the earth. Astronomers find that none of the sun's family of planets, including Mars, present exactly the same conditions as earth for maintaining life.

Some meteors come from the regions about the sun, but astronomers have identified others as visitors from the immensely vaster outer space regions so distant that no present telescope can disclose planets in them if they exist. But the possibility that under the averages of chance other worlds exist but there is suggested by the staggering numbers of other suns which astronomers say occupy this outer area. In only the nearby portion of space called the galactic system, according to Sir James Jeans, British astronomer, estimates have been made that there may be from 30,000 millions to 300,000 millions of stars, which are suns of varying sizes.

No element which does not exist on earth has been detected in this mass of stars. The Cornell analysis adds one more bit to the accumulating evidence that the entire universe may be made of the same substance as the earth.

The meteors were analyzed by Dr. Jacob Papish, professor of chemical spectroscopy, who developed the spectroscopic light analysis method.

Tulsa Realtor On Trial For Murder

Revolver, Pretty Young Woman, Bloodstained Shirt Figure In Shooting Case; Defense Claims Suicide

PAWNEE, Okla., Jan. 14. (AP)—A revolver, a pretty young woman in furs and soft hat and a blood-stained shirt figured in the trial here today of B. O. Shepherd, Tulsa real estate man, charged with murder in connection with the shooting of Robert Hatcher of Webb City, Mo., at Tulsa last August 13.

The young woman was Miss Alice Andrews, 23, who formerly

was Shepherd's stenographer. It was in her apartment Hatcher was shot, the state alleges, by Shepherd, who had rented the apartment for her, and the defense alleges by Hatcher's own hand.

Revolver Found
John Kennedy and Henry Schrock, Tulsa ambulance drivers, testified they found the revolver beside Hatcher's body which sprang just outside a bathroom in Miss Andrews' apartment.

The young woman identified it as one which she had seen in the pocket of Shepherd's motor car when she drove with him to the apartment shortly before Hatcher was shot. It was the same, she said, which she saw in a bag of groceries which Shepherd carried to the apartment. Shepherd first showed it to her, she said, after he and Hatcher had quarreled violently at Shepherd's office the day

before the shooting. He told her, she said, he never intended to harm anyone with it, but he might sometime use it as a "bluff."

The blood stained shirt was Hatcher's. It was introduced as an exhibit by the state over the objection of the defense. It was identified by Dr. J. B. Gilbert, Tulsa county physician. A hole showed where a bullet had pierced it. It was not powder burned, Dr. Gilbert testified, nor was young Hatcher's wound.

EXPLOSION FATAL

SHENANDOAH, Iowa, Jan. 14. (AP) Virgil Bettis was killed and Hugh Shaddock was injured seriously in an explosion in the manufacturing section of the city gas plant today. Bettis' body was found nearly an hour after the explosion, cause of which was undetermined.

Avenue H Closed For Subway Work

G. W. McCleary, city manager yesterday announced that Avenue H, from 8th street to a point between 5th and 6th streets, has been closed to traffic during construction of the underpass at the Santa Fe tracks in north Lubbock.

A traffic officer has been placed at location of the avenue under the excavation to allow persons to enter the subway area who are engaged in business with the wholesale firms within that district. Detour signs, directing traffic under the Broadway viaduct, have been placed at Avenue H and 8th street, Texas avenue and 6th street and 4th street and Avenue H. Another sign will be placed uptown at

Main and Avenue H.
Traffic en route to Plainsville may find an outlet over Avenue M thence to First street and through the Mexican colony of the city. No signs, however, have been installed to direct traffic over this route.
