## Pioneer Succumbs

### Roy Buchanan Dies At Age 86

A Colorado citizen who as an engineer in the 1920's assisted Russia in exploration for power plant sites died here early Saturday.

He was Roy D. Buchanan, 86, who for many years had been a stock farmer and manager of real estate - agricultural interests in this area for out-of-state property owners.

Buchanan succumbed in Root Memorial Hospital from complications resulting after he broke his hip two weeks ago. He sustained the injury at his farm in Seven Wells Community, but managed to drive his car to town for medical attention.

He was the son of Mitchell County pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Buchanan, and came with his family to Mitchell County at age 5 in 1890. He was born Nov. 16, 1885, in Cleburne. After graduating from high

school here and the University of Texas, Buchanan assisted in surveying the then primitive areas of northern and western Mexico for a railroad.

In 1927, with a group of American engineers, he was a guest of the Russian government to explore for power projects along Russian rivers. Later he became chief engineer for American Aluminum Company at Paramaribo, Dutch Guiana, in South America.

He was a member of First United Methodist Church here.

Funeral service will be conducted Sunday (today) at 2:30 p.m. in Kiker - Rains - Seale Funeral Chapel with his pastor, Rev. Billy Wilkinson, officiating.

Pallbearers will be Perry Mitchell, Oran Carpenter, Hestand Redwine, Glen Thomas, Alva Hickman, Joe Earnest, Bob Ratliff and John T. Merritt.

He is survived by 3 sisters - Mrs. Angelina Hammock of Abilene, Mrs. Ruth Major and Miss Katherine Buchanan of Colorado City; a grandniece, Mrs. Richard M. Chelini of Cambridge, Mass., a teacher of classics at University of Massachusetts, and by a grandnephew, Dr. Steven Norris of Chicago, Ill.

## Phones Increase Here

### Reflects Growth For City

More than 4,000 telephones were in service in Colorado City as of Dec. 1, a healthy increase of 3.7 per cent during 1971. Bill Gilliland, manager for Southwestern Bell, reported Saturday.

"Telephone growth is considered a good indicator of overall economic growth," Gilliland said. "The addition of 148 phones last year shows that Colorado City is on the grow."

Gilliland said Colorado City residents are using their phones more, too. In November, 13,800 calls were dialed here on an average business day. That's a 6.3 per cent increase over November, 1970.

Looking to the future, Gilliland said local telephone projects scheduled here this year include completion of a dial equipment installation to provide 100 new phone numbers to meet growth.

Another addition of 200 numbers will be completed in 1973.

Additional underground cable facilities for the west section of the city are planned, along

with additional buried cable to serve Lake Colorado City.

"Growth and expansion are likely to continue for the city's communications system," Gilliland said. "Telephone engineers predict that Colorado City will have more than 4,500 telephones in service by the end of 1975."

He added that a record \$150 million construction budget has been set for Southwestern Bell's San Antonio Area, of which Colorado City is a part. The 1972 budget includes expenses for central office equipment, buildings and additional plant facilities, such as telephone cable, in an area covering approximately the western two-thirds of Texas.

## Burleson Will Seek Re-Election

Congressman Omar Burleson notified the Record Saturday he would be a candidate for re-election to his 17th District post, which includes Mitchell County.

The congressman said he had filed for a place on the ballot in the Democratic Primary May 6.

Burleson, who resides in Anson and has his district office in Abilene, was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th

District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress.

Opposition in the primary is not likely for the Congressman, who is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee. And deadline for candidate filing is only 2 weeks away, Feb. 7.

# Crop Estimates Going Down As Gin Costs Soar

Production total for Mitchell County's 1971 cotton crop is being revised downward and ginning costs are going up.

Latest estimates from 8 gins indicate the crop is likely to amount to less than 18,000 bales.

The gins had turned out 10,622 bales Friday afternoon, according to a check by County Agent Bobby Lemons.

About 500 more bales were in the yards at the gins when the check was made.

Final output will be around 17,082 bales, according to estimates on ginning yet to come at the 8 gins.

"That's the figures and estimates from the ginners," reported Lemons, "and if they are correct, then the 10,622 bales already ginned Friday represent 62 per cent of the crop."

The crop--latest in the memory of most cotton farmers here--is slowing gin operations and causing expenses for gins to spiral upward.

Gins reported they are getting so many sticks, stalks, unopened bolls that numerous stoppages have resulted.

To prevent stoppages gins are having to slowdown their operation to move the cotton through.

"All gins are running slow and still having lots of stoppage," Lemons said. "Sometimes they are down 2 or 3 hours."

One gin this week turned out only 10 bales in 10 hours because of the difficult ginning.

It is just taking more time to gin a bale, gin managers reported, and it is hard on equipment, wearing out some of the machinery.

All of this, of course, will be reflected in profit-loss statements of gin operations.

The 10,622 bales ginned at this week's end reflects a gain of more than 2,000 bales over the previous weekend when the total was 8,039.

Here is a count, as of Friday afternoon, of the 8 gins:

Broughton, Colorado City-433 bales, up from previous week of 295.

Producers Co-op, Colorado City-2,252 bales, up from previous week's 1,736.

Farmers Gin & Supply, Colorado City-762 bales, up from previous week's 630 bales.

Westbrook Planters-805 bales, up from previous week's 579.

Buford Co-op-915 bales, up from previous week's 663. China Grove Co-op-2,668 to-

tal, up from previous week's 1,990. Of this amount 1,334 bales is credited as Mitchell County cotton, up from last week's 995.

Loraine Producers Co-op-3,446 bales, up from previous week's 2,675.

Loraine Broughton-675 bales, up from previous week's 466.

Samples representing 28,000 bales of cotton were received for the week ending Jan. 21, according to the U.S.D.A., Consumer and Marketing Service. This brought the season total to 151,200 samples processed.

Grades and micronaire readings continued low, as they have been most of the season. The season is around 75 per cent completed, according to B. B. Manly, of Abilene Classing Office.

Low middling light spotted was the predominant grade and accounted for 36 per cent of the classing. Strick low middling light spotted was next at 33 per cent. Low middling spotted accounted for 14 per cent.

Fifty-seven per cent was reduced in grade because of bark content. Staple distributions

showed that 64 per cent were staple 30, 22 per cent staple 29, and 11 per cent staple 31.

Mike readings continued low with 15 per cent in the premium 3.5-4.9 range. Twenty-six per cent of the samples miked 2.6 and lower. 28 per cent were 2.7-2.9, 23 per cent were 3.0-3.2, and 8 per cent miked in the 3.3-3.4 range.

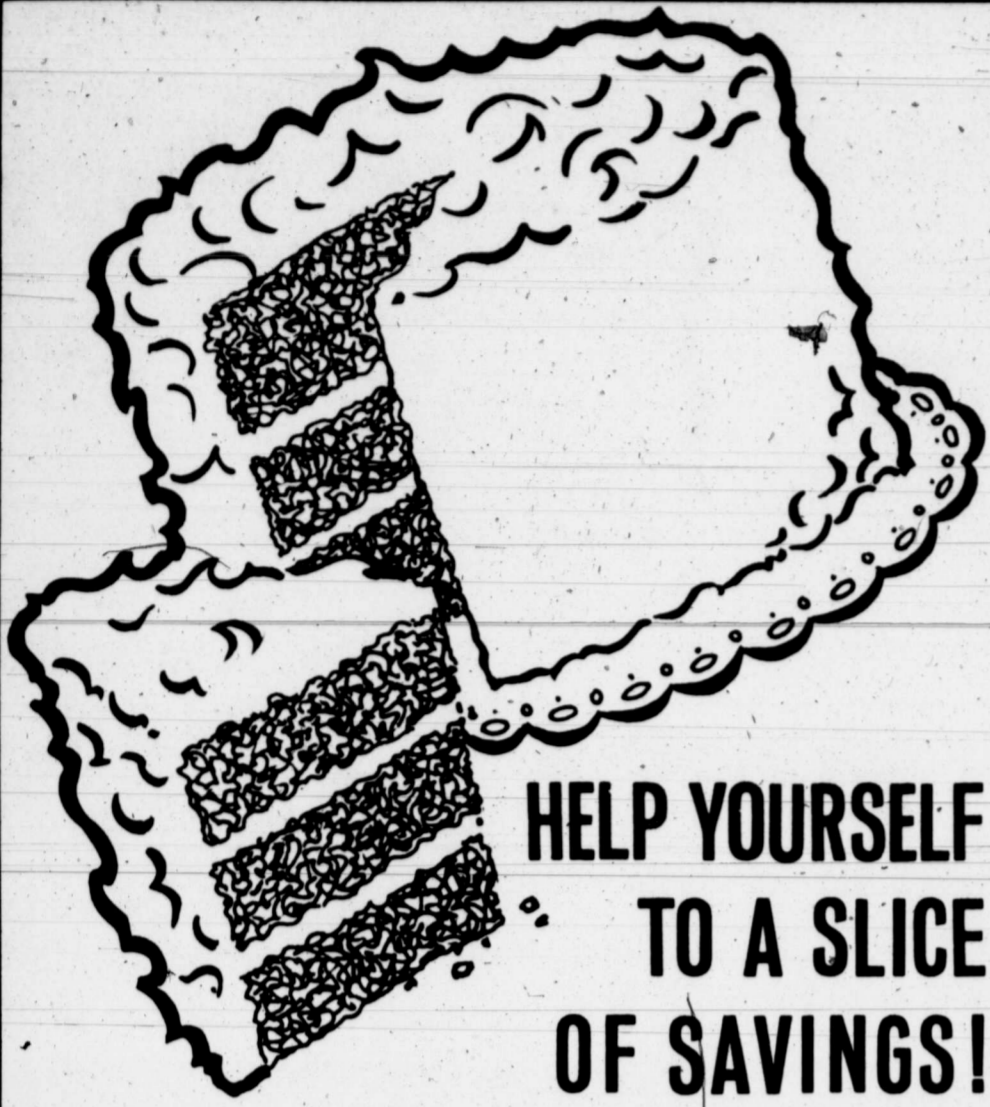

But the general quickly warned against an "anti-military binge" that cuts back military spending too far, eliminates vital military research and development.

Maj. Gen. Moore said the U.S. facing a defense dilemma with Russia now superior in intercontinental ballistics, increasing its other military capabilities and research while here in the U.S. there is developing a feeling the military has failed the country.

"We must never let our president go to the negotiating table

as the second most powerful nation."

The general agreed to the "good" in idealism and in a reordering of priorities.

"But this must be kept in perspective. We can't lose our survival or we lose all the U.S. stands for. . . we dream for."

"I've fought in 3 wars and I don't cherish another. But we need a commitment of communities across this land to support a strong and viable military force."

Such a military force is not luxury, he said, but a necessity.

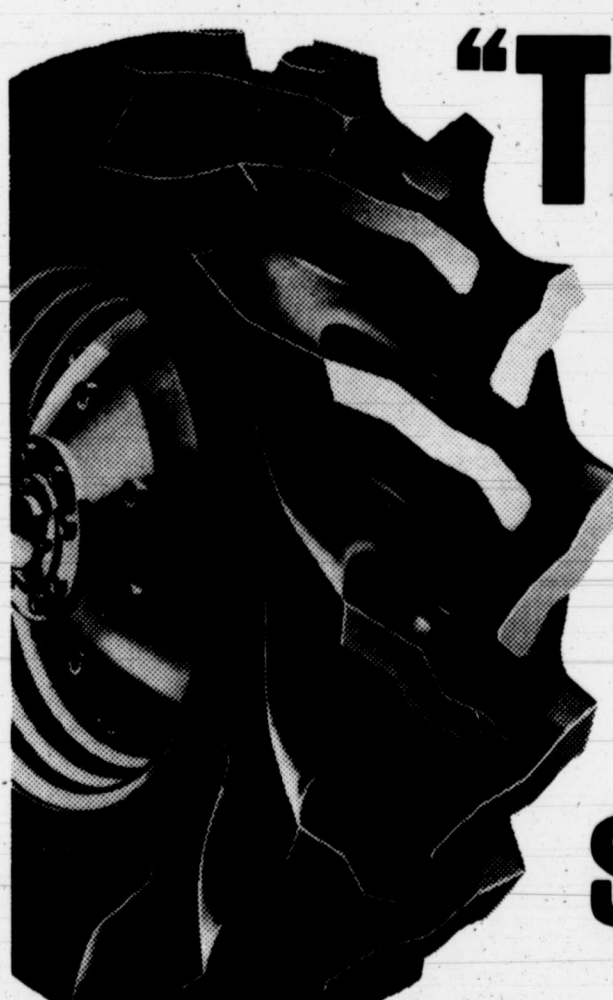

Mitchell County was placed in the 30th Senatorial District by the Legislative Redistricting Board. The incumbent is Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon and an opponent has filed against him.

The same redistricting board composed a new State Representative District 61 which includes Mitchell, Fisher, Jones, Nolan and part of Taylor County. That wiped away Mitchell's current legislator, Dee Jon Davis of Big Spring.

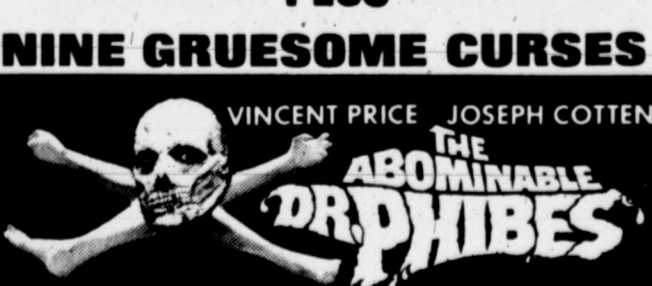
