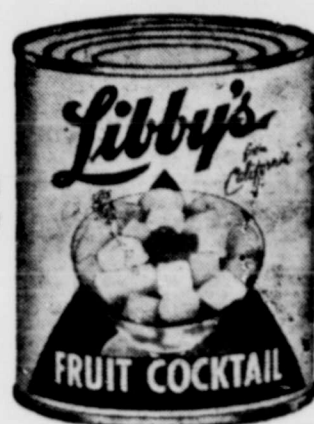

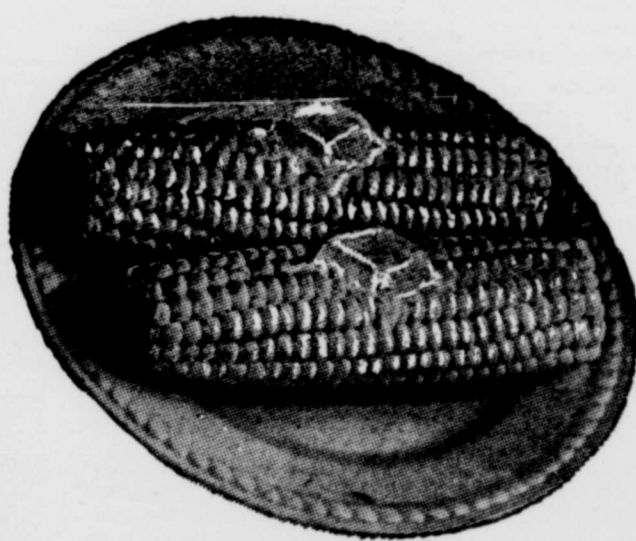

Letters were read thanking the Federated for gifts.

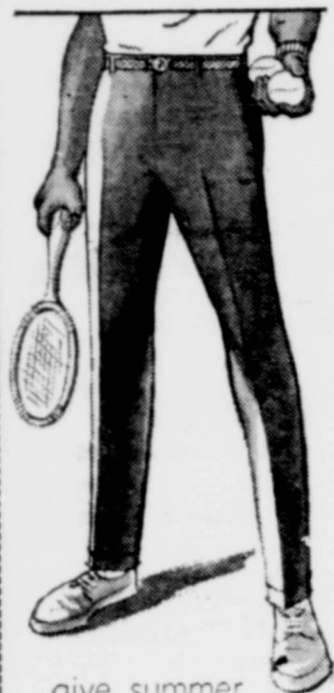
Mrs. W. C. Vann brought a most inspiring devotional.

Submitted by the Federated Missionary Society of Burkburnett:

1. This hospital serves 59 counties for white patients and 108 for Negro patients.

2. Thru more PERSONAL attention from our community many of our patients will improve and even leave our hospital at a faster rate.

3. Many trucking companies will SHIP FREE OF CHARGE to state hospitals.

4. Wichita Falls State Hospital has approximately 2,800 patients.

5. The state spends approximately \$3.49 a day per patient for his basic necessities of food, clothing, medication, etc. If he arrives with no money or personal possessions, the state gives him none during his hospitalization.

6. Numerous patients receive no visitors, funds, nor letters from their families and friends.

7. Approximately half our patients are men.

8. Our patient population varies at present from 13 years to 99 years of age; from those who cannot read or write, to college graduates, successful business and professional people.

9. There is no planned educational program on the hospital grounds.

10. Full services of Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Texas Educational Agency are available to patients with vocational potentials.

11. Our hospital has approximately 13 doctors and 11 nurses for the entire institution. Some of our doctors must carry a patient load of 400 or 500 patients.

Services You Can Render

(A comprehensive orientation program under planned supervision is required of those giving REGULAR, INDIVIDUAL volunteer service at the hospital. This program is coordinated through Volunteer Services.)

 Discusses Investing vs. Gambling

I have spent the day reading a remarkable book—"THE PICTURE HISTORY OF WALL STREET"—368 pages size 12". This history shows clearly that the fundamental facts underlying investing during the decades apply equally to this New York Stock Exchange founded just 170 years ago. Let me describe ten facts of safety and income come from careful selection and soundness of your investment come usually from "gambling"; although your total investment will rise and decline

in "value" along with the Dow-Jones Averages. But big profits come from buying into new ideas, new discoveries, and scientific developments. To make big money, read scientific journals—rather than ordinary financial news.

(2) Newton's Law of Equal and Opposite Reaction can be depended upon when the AREAS involved are properly considered. This was first noticeable when African sales and gold were the only "commodities" traded on Wall Street 200 years ago. I believe that we will continue to have periods of Decline and Depression during the next few years. Congress can legislate only to temporarily postpone declines, but cannot change the AREAS involved.

(3) A study of Wall Street history during the past 170 years shows that dips in the stock market have always come unexpectedly, without warning. This was true when slaves, gold, or stocks were selling abnormally high—as at present. Such bear markets have always followed great wars, from Napoleonic Wars through World War I. No such bear market has yet occurred following World War II. The D-J Industrial Average was around 100 in 1942 and has since climbed fairly steadily upward, standing around 670 today.

(4) Special groups of stocks have acted differently during the past 150 years. The demand for slaves and land declined from 1860-65 while the demand for gold and railroad stocks was very active. Then, being over-

Lemon Pudding Takes To Cake



A versatile short-cut to modern cooking is packaged pudding and pie filling mix. Here lemon pudding makes a flavorful filling for an elegant cake roll.

Lemon Pudding Cake Roll
 1 package Jell-O lemon pud- 1/2 teaspoon salt
 ding and pie filling mix 3 eggs
 1 cup sifted flour 1 cup sugar
 2 teaspoons double-acting bak- 1/4 cup water
 ing powder 1 teaspoon vanilla

Prepare pie filling as directed on package. After filling is thickened, pour into a bowl. (To avoid surface film, place waxed paper directly on surface of hot pudding.) Chill.

Meanwhile, measure sifted flour, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Beat eggs with rotary beater or at high speed of electric mixer until thick and lemon colored. Add sugar gradually and beat until light and fluffy. Blend in water and vanilla. Gradually fold in flour.

Pour batter into 15x10x1-inch pan, which has been greased on bottom and sides, lined on bottom with waxed paper, and greased again. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 12 to 15 minutes, or until cake springs back when touched lightly with finger. Turn cake out onto cloth which has been sprinkled lightly with confectioners' sugar. Quickly remove paper; roll cake, rolling cloth up in cake. Cool on rack.

Beat cooled filling until smooth and creamy. Unroll cake and spread with filling. Roll up again, leaving end of cake underneath. Chill. Sprinkle with additional confectioners' sugar, if desired. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

bought from the Indians for a few trinkets valued at \$24.00. If the Indians had taken the cash and invested it at 6% interest, compounded quarterly, this \$24.00 would today amount to around sixteen billion dollars. So don't forget the great power of compound interest even if the bonds yield you only 4 1/2%.

(7) Seek the professional opinion of investment advisers who have been in business over fifty years and have made money for their clients. Tell your adviser that you want to diversify according to the basic fundamentals—but that you are willing to do some "gambling" by buying now into companies which may have a big future.

(8) Keep in good health—do not worry. Unless your health is good your judgment cannot be good. You do not need capital or a college diploma to "gamble" successfully; but you do need good health, a good wife, plenty of sleep, and to say your prayers.

(9) The best "gamble" of all is a bunch of good children. Have enough of them and some are sure to turn out to be "whizzes"—very smart. Keep out of debt. I have never borrowed or loaned one dollar in my life or bought on margin.

(10) Profits must come from forecasting the future. Your bankers will call it "gambling." But every forward-looking man has been a "gambler"—from Columbus to those scientists who, like M.I.T.'s Provost Charles T. Townes, are now working on condensed light rays and masers and lasers! Forget the moon; but capitalize on four big things: (1) The heat of the sun; (2) the coming scarcity of fresh water; (3) the cellulose of wood and cotton, to give us cellophane, plastics, and fibers; and (4) science. Stick to these four fundamentals, although you can diversify your holdings over many companies.

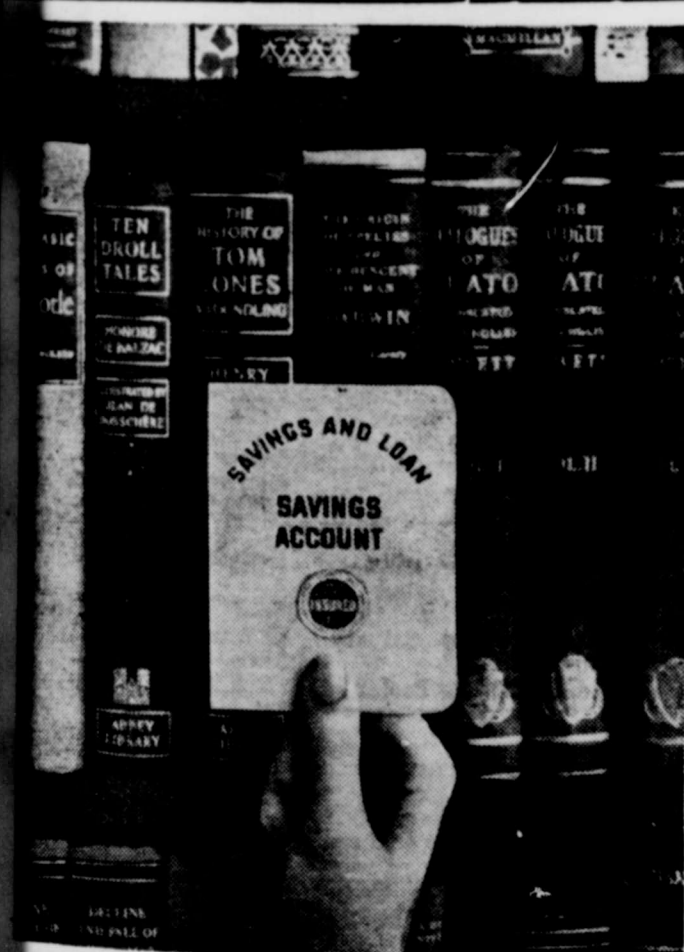
We are living in a new age, the age of "television," fuel cells, ion engines, harnessing gravity, and good bacteria. Don't spend too much time on present educational courses based only upon memory. Rather,

popularized—as the electronics and space stocks are today—they had a terrible slump with most of the companies going into receivership. Most of the stocks in the same group suffer more or less together; but different groups can act very differently.

(5) Bonds—other than governments—were almost nonexistent until 75 years ago when corporation bonds began to be issued. A study of quotations show that the bond market is usually going down when the stock market is going up. Careful investors will hold both stocks and bonds in a proportion varying according to conditions. For instance, good corporation bonds can now be bought to yield 4 1/2% while the stocks of the same corporations will yield today 3% or less. Hence, the switching of stocks into bonds has now begun on Wall Street and it will continue until the stock yield

equals the bond yield.

(6) Naturally, everyone who knows Wall Street will advise diversification of all kinds. Don't put all your money in stocks and bonds. Real estate can be bought in the Central West and South West at \$75 per acre. One must pay more to get land in an oil or mineral "terrain." There never will be any more land. If you can get enough rent for pasture rights to pay taxes, buy such land. When buying land, be willing to pay for adjoining fresh water. Someday fresh water in quantity will almost be "liquid gold!"

I believe in African gold stocks—also good Mutual Funds and especially insured savings to pay 4 1/2%. I once asked Thomas A. Edison who was the greatest inventor. He replied "The man who invented compound interest." The lower Manhattan Island—with Wall Street later its center—was

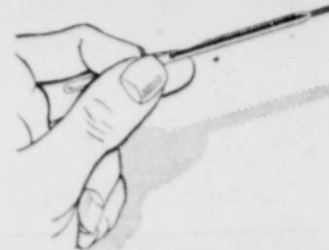

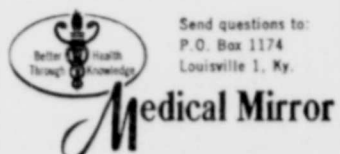

Q. I have read that rheumatic fever develops after a child has had strep throat. How can a parent tell the difference between strep throat and an ordinary, harmless sore throat?

A. The parent can't be sure but here are some helpful suggestions: Fever and sore throat are two symptoms that should warn the parent of the possibility of streptococcal infection. Whenever a child does not seem up to par, take his temperature four times daily. This is especially important if the child complains of a "scratchy" or sore throat. If fever is present (temperature by mouth of 101°F. or more) a physician should be consulted.

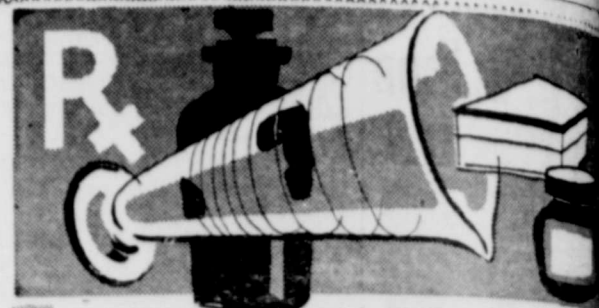
