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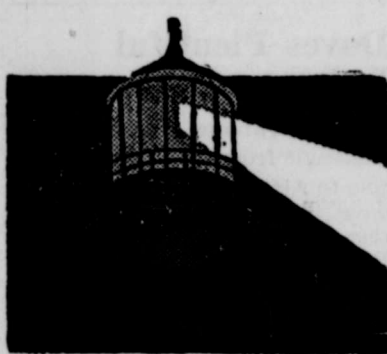

Plowboys Clobber Bulldogs In Opener

The Friday night game between the Loraine Bulldogs and the Roscoe Plowboys ended 45 to 0 in favor of the Plowboys.

The Loraine team made a better showing than the scoreboard indicated.

Roscoe made 15 first downs to the Bulldogs 4. The Loraine Bulldogs made 34 yards rushing and the Plowboys made 297 yards rushing. In passing yardage Roscoe had 57 to Loraine 39. The Bulldogs completed 3 out of 8 passes and the Plowboys completed 3 out of 8 passes. Punt averaged 2 for 29 for the Plow-

boys and 6 for 19 for Loraine. The Plowboys received 2 penalties totaling 20 yards and the Bulldogs received 2 totaling 10 yards. Loraine lost 0 fumbles and Roscoe lost 1.

Testing Program Initiated In Loraine Public School

The Loraine Public School is initiating its testing program for the year with the first grade being administered a reading readiness test and a mental ability test. The following testing schedule is planned for the 1965-1966 school year.

Grade 1, SRA Primary Mental Abilities Tests; September 13-14, 1965.
Grade 3, SRA Primary Mental Abilities Tests; January 10-11, 1966.

Grade 4, SRA Achievement Series; March 7-9, 1966.

Grade 6, SRA Achievement Series; March 7-9, 1966.

Grade 7, SRA Primary Mental Abilities Tests; October 19, 1965. *SRA Achievement Series; October 15, 18, 1965.

Grade 8, SRA Achievement Series; March 14-16, 1966.

Grade 9, *SRA Iowa Tests of Educational Development; November 1-2, 1965.

Kuder Preference Records, Vocational; January 18, 1966 (Morning Periods).

Grade 10, Differential Aptitude; Tests; January 18-19, 1966 (Morning Periods).

Kuder Preference Records, Personal; October 4, 1965 (Morning Periods).

Grade 11, SRA Iowa Tests of Educational Development; November 8-9, 1965.

SRA Primary Mental Abilities Tests; January 31, 1966 (First and Second Periods).

Grade 12, Kuder Preference Records, Occupational; October 12, 1965 (Morning periods).

*These tests are given in cooperation with the Texas State Testing Program.

Ability tests provide teachers and other personnel with an estimate of scholastic ability for judging the student's potentiality for success in school.

The achievement tests, measure of in-school learning as well as out-of-school learning of the curricular areas of reading, language arts, arithmetic, and work-study skills for the elementary grades and in addition for the junior high and senior high in the curricular areas of science and social studies.

The aptitude tests are not tests of what has been learned in school by the students but how well the students can do different kinds of work. Aptitude tests will help students to see specific kinds of jobs they can do well and also those they cannot do well. Probably most students have some general ideas about the kind of vocations they are going into; however, these tests can be very helpful to the students in deciding about their future vocation.

Vocational, personal, and occupational interest tests will be administered to the freshmen, sophomores, and seniors, respectively. The purpose of these interest tests is to get high school students to begin thinking more effectively about a career. People often choose occupations because of some chance influence rather than as a result of a careful review of the occupational fields. Students surveying the whole range of occupations are likely to be discouraged by the immensity of the task; therefore, they need some way of narrowing the field so they can investigate occupations most likely to suit them.

Poor: Hale, Lubbock, Hockley, Cochran, Foard, Hardeman, Cottle, Howard, Martin and Dawson.

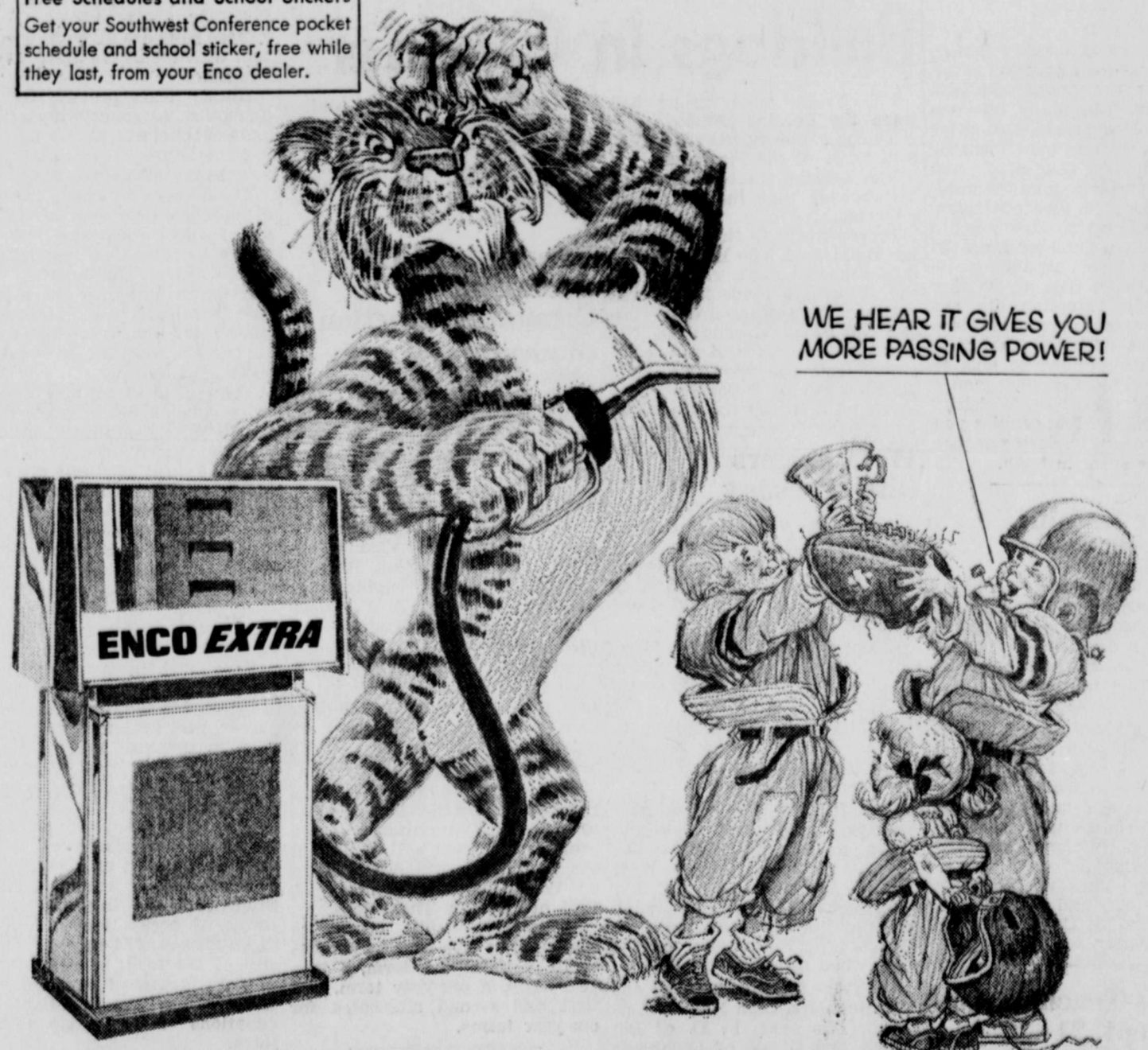

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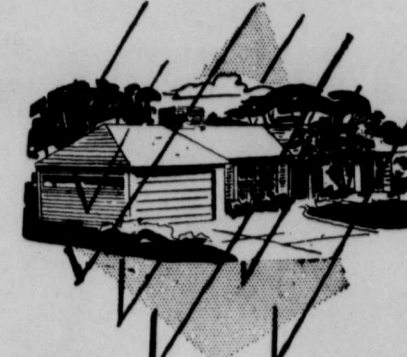
