Voters To Decide Sales Tax Issue

Voters go to the polls this Saturday to express their wishes concerning a city sales tax for Olton. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Presiding judge will be R. L. Chitwood and with Ray Schultz named as alternate presiding judge.

Mayor Parley Myers said the election was called after an unanimous vote from the city councilmen for the action.

A study of the city budget prompted the action in a regular city council meeting in January.

The mayor said that the need for maintenance equipment, along with added personnel and street improvement were only a few of the reasons for the additional tax proposal.

The one percent sales tax would be levied upon the same items that are now taxable by the state. Items exempt from state taxes would also be exempt from the city sales tax.

Mayor Myers said, "This seems to be the fairest type of tax that we could choose. The fact is that the city is to have to raise additional money for these needs and if the city sales tax issue doesn't pass, then we will have to look elsewhere -- probably a raise in property taxes. This means that the property owners would carry an additional load while others, who enjoy the same benefits from additional service the city would be able

to supply, would not be taxed."

According to the Texas Municipal League, the per capita ratio for Lamb County is \$9.38. Using this ratio to a population of 2000 persons, a total of \$18,760 could

be collected in sales taxes per year in Olton.

Mayor Myers concluded, "I hope every eligible voter will come and vote in this election, so that we may know what the people of Olton really want."

No Candidates In Race For City Council Posts

As the deadline nears for filing for the positions of city councilman and school board of trustees, only four incumbents have filed for the six vacancies created as terms expire this year for three school board members, two councilmen and the mayor's position.

Two Olton FFA's Bring Home Calves

Two Olton high school freshmen, members of the Future Farmers of America, scrambled victoriously last Saturday night in the Astrodome in Houston.

Mike Burleson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elma Burleson, and Gordon Hukill, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nolan Hukill, participated in the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble.

Hundred-and-two -pound Mike, weighed one pound more than the smallest contender.

The two Olton youths caught their calves, placed halters on them and led them across the finish line to earn the presentation of \$200 to

be used in buying registered beef heifers.

Twenty-four boys vied for possession of the 12 frisky calves turned loose in the Astrodome arena.

Each boy will keep a record of his project and write an essay about his calf and its progress as well as submit monthly reports of the project. The heifers will be entered in the Houston show next year.

Calves are numbered with numbers representing the donor of the calf, who becomes the boy's sponsor. Rex Couble of Custer Bill's Western Wear in Houston is sponsor for Mike Burleson. Gordon's sponsor is B. R. Restess of Great Southern Life Insurance in Houston.

A total of 175 calves are given away during the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Gary Dickenson, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Dickenson Jr., is a last year's winner.

His heifer was named Reserve Grand Champion at the Lamb County Junior Livestock Show earlier this year. As required, Gary is exhibiting his heifer this week at the Houston show. Judging is today.

In addition to the excitement of their success in the calf scramble, the Houston trip was eventful in other ways. It was the first time for each boy to fly and their first trip to the fabulous Astrodome. They were accompanied by Jon Scott, local vocational agriculture instructor.

Local Men Discuss Feedlot For Olton

Forty-two interested farmers and businessmen met in the PCA party room Tuesday evening to discuss the possibility of securing a feedlot in the Olton trade area.

James Rogers of the Plainview office of Production Credit Association met with the group to discuss advantages of such an operation from an investment standpoint as well as the economic development of Olton.

Discussion of the proposed idea of a feedlot in the Olton territory had been only an over-the-coffee cup consideration until the called meeting Tuesday night.

Cost of a 30,000 head capacity feedlot was discussed as well as 20,000 and 10,000 sized operations.

Location of a feedlot in the Olton Trade territory would not only mean an increase in prices for locally grown grain, it was explained, but would also add to the possibility of secur-

ing additional small industries.

Anyone interested from the standpoint of investment are asked to call the bank, PCA office or Chamber of Commerce office.

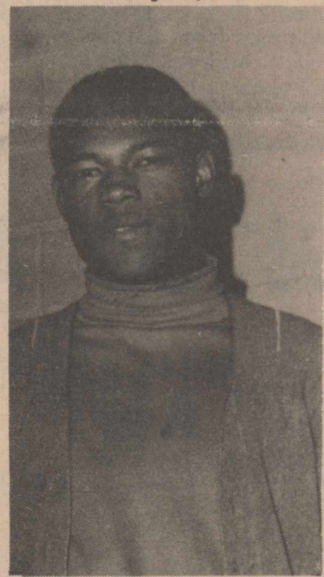

Annual Stock Show Scheduled Next Week

The 24th annual FFA, FHA and 4-H Livestock Show will get under way Thursday, March 6, with weighing of animals to begin at 8 o'clock that morning.

All animals must be weighed in by 6 p. m. Thursday and in their proper places. Entries close Monday March 3.

Participants in the show must be Olton FFA, 4-H or FHA club members in good standing, between ages of nine years and 21 and must be enrolled in public school in September.

Grand opening of the show will be Friday at 12:30, followed by the judging of the swine at 1 p. m. and sheep judging at 4 p. m.

Judging of fat steers will begin at 1 p. m. Saturday.

The livestock judging contests will be held Saturday beginning at 8 a. m. FHA awards will be presented at 12:45 and the FHA cake sale will begin at 2 p. m.

The auction of champions will begin at 2:30 p. m. Saturday. All prospective buyers are asked to attend the auction if possible, as a photographer will be present to take pictures of the animals with the owners and buyers.

All grand champion animals must be marked with a hole in their ears and must be sold at the Olton Fat Stock Show Sale. Any breed champion or reserve breed champion that is to be sold should be marked in the same manner.

Trophies and/or ribbons will be awarded grand and reserve grand champion animals in the swine, sheep and cattle divisions.

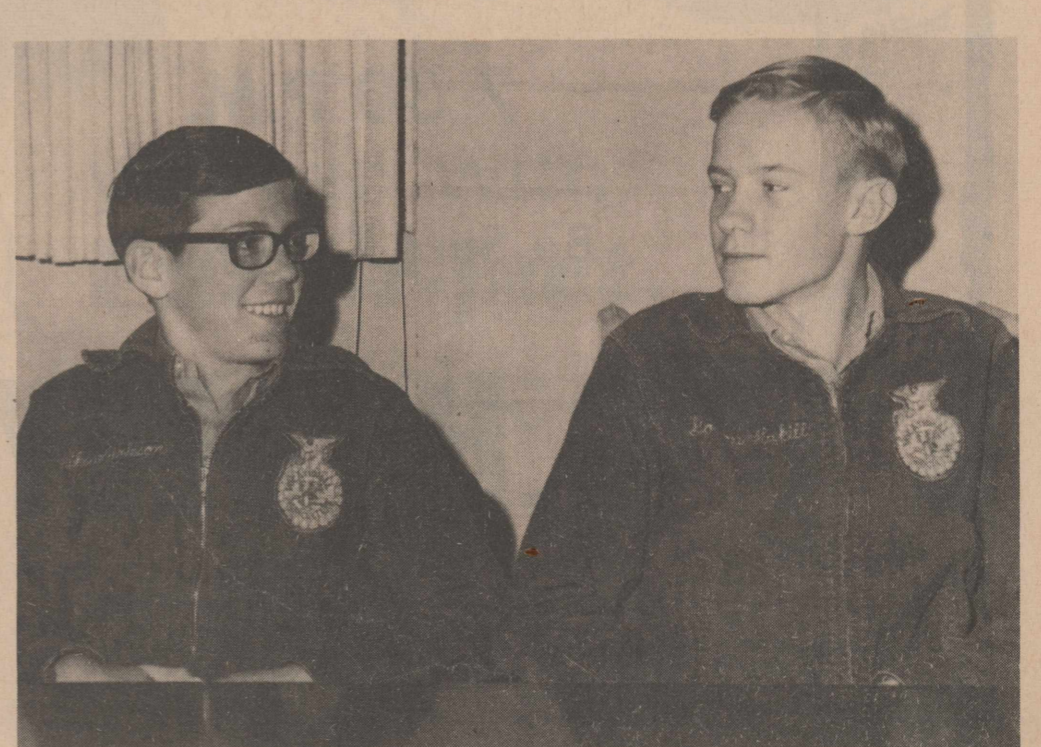

Million Dollar Feedlot To Be Established By PGC In Area

Local economy will get a boost this year in the form of a 30,000 head feedlot to be located near Mayfield community, only 14 miles from Olton.

Producers Grain Corporation selected the section of land belonging to William M. Bloodworth Jr. of Dallas and survey work is sched-

uled to begin in the next few weeks.

Fritz Richards, Olton Grain Co-op Manager, said that in a sense the feedlot would belong to the area farmers, inasmuch as PGC is an organization of all co-op elevators and in reality, the co-op elevators are actually owned by the farmers, who

share in the profits of such elevators.

This feedlot is going to be a big help to the farmers in this area," Richards commented "It is going to be set up in such a way that a small farmer will have as much an opportunity to invest in cattle as will the big farmer. As I understand it

now, it will be open to any one who wants to have cattle fed. The economy of the area will greatly benefit from such an operation as this feedlot."

"I have heard comments about the feedlot being built at Hale Center. Actually, it is only 3 miles closer to Hale Center than it is to Olton."

The section contains virgin grassland gently sloping toward playa lakes in the area and is considered a choice selection for the commercial cattle feeding operation.

Frank M. Pharris, executive vice president and general manager of Producers Grain Corporation, said that the establishment of a feed lot owned by the cooperative farmers of the area served by PGC "is a logical step in the movement of the cooperative farmers grain."

"This is just the first step in our feed lot program which was discussed and made public in Producers Grain Corporation's 30th annual meeting in Amarillo in December."

The lot will cost approximately one and one half million dollars and will be the most modern feed lot that it is possible to construct.

The feedlot is being constructed to handle 30,000 head with an expansion plan up to 50,000 head. The lot will employ 30 people and will have a payroll of over \$300,000 per year.

Representative for this district on the board of directors of PGC is Dee Martin of Plainview

Dear Editor

Must Pull Together

Dear Sue,

I have a few words to say to the farmer. I am not campaigning for any office or asking for any job. I am going to try to wake up the Olton farmer and try to strike a spark to rekindle the fire that has gone out long time ago.

It has been a long time, but maybe you can remember when we got a fair price for our commodities—when our tractors cost about \$3500.00 and our milo sold for \$2.00 per hundred weight. Now our tractors cost \$7,000.00 and our milo brings \$1.60 per hundred weight. Our tractors have doubled in price and our milo prices are down 40%.

Are you content with what you receive for what you sell? I think I know the answer to that question. You say, "It doesn't seem like we can do anything as a group anymore."

Do you remember about a year ago the farmers of Olton signed a letter of intent stating we were going to build our own gas line? Now the gas company is making some concessions. If you have one well on one end of the line and one well on the other end, they will combine them together as one meter reading; making the bill some cheaper. They will also build you a gas line to a new well. These are some of the things I know they will do.

I have heard of others and all we did was hold a meeting. We didn't get all we wanted; but it was a start in the right direction. We have done a few things right, but we have done more things wrong.

One thing, we tell our troubles to each other. It's true we are all in the same boat and the boat is slowly sinking. If we will all get a bucket and dip just a little we can save the ship. It seems there are some that had rather drown than work together.

The farmer reminds me of a tug of war; pulling against each other just as hard as he can pull. Wouldn't it be nice if we would all get on the same end of the rope just once and pull just as hard together as we do against each other.

What is wrong?

POLITICS? Yes, politics, my friend, until you forget about the political parties we can't work side by side for the same thing. We are so hard headed we won't listen to simple reasoning.

When someone comes up with some suggestions, the first thing someone says is, "IT WON'T WORK!"

This is what is wrong with the American farmer today, he doesn't think positive. We do not tell our problems to the right people and the right "people" is NOT Uncle Sam.

We have beat our brains out trying to change things through Congress, but six per cent of the people cannot make a very loud noise.

Well, who are the right people? How can we as individuals help ourselves make more money; honest money, out of what we have to sell?

One way is we are going to have to ORGANIZE.

When we say "ORGANIZE", farmers throw their heads over the rail and vomit. Makes me sick too, to think how we were sold out by Farm Bureau and Farmers Union, but let's keep them around for a while for this reason: While they are in a big fight with each other over something that doesn't amount to anything, all the political heads will be looking on, and maybe we can knock a home run.

The farmers hold in their hands the life blood of the world. He gets less for what he sells than anyone else.

If General Motors has too many cars on the market he cuts production by holding cars off of the market; this gets General Motors the price they ask.

The service station owner has a price of 35¢ a gallon his gas. If I drive up to the pump and tell him I'll give him 25¢ a gallon, you can bet I won't get any gas.

You say, "How does he do it?" It's simple. This is a holding action. He holds it until he gets his price of 35¢ a gallon.

We as farmers can do the same thing with our milo. (IT WON'T WORK) How many times have you heard that? Everytime a move is made someone thinks if it doesn't have my brand of politics I can't or won't go along.

Some will say, "Well, I can't hold my grain, the bank won't let me." You can put the grain in the loan until we get a fair price, even if we have to use the resale.

If you are satisfied with what you have and with what you get for your milo read no farther.

If you are interested in a fair price for what you sell, join an organization that has only one thing to offer -- a fair price.

They have no insurance, -- no politics, -- no tires, -- no batteries. Just a fair price.

N.F.O. Join it. Don't wait and see what your neighbor is going to do because he is waiting to see what you are going to do. If your neighbor doesn't join, you know he is getting all he wants already.

If you listen to him he may be farming your land next year.

Olton Bands To Present Popular Tunes Concert

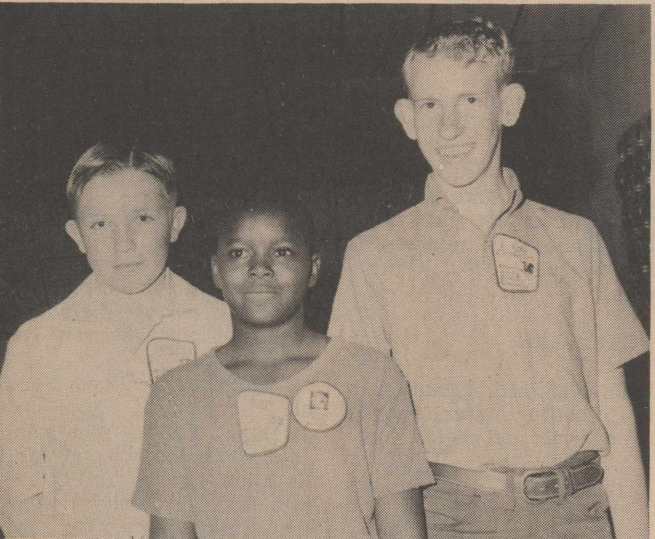
Popular tunes and marches will be the featured attraction of a Concert of the Bands Tuesday, March 4th at 7:30 p. m. in the high school auditorium.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of January according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no deaths, three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,805.00. In comparing the rural traffic deaths of January, 1969 to January, 1968 of the 60 counties which comprise the Lubbock DPS Region there was a 37 per cent increase in deaths.

The veteran Patrol Supervisor stated, "If January is a representation of the next 11 months in Texas, traffic accidents will claim 3,900 lives in 1969, an all time high".

The Sergeant also issued a reminder that April 15 is the deadline for obtaining the 1969 inspection sticker of all motor vehicles registered in Texas.

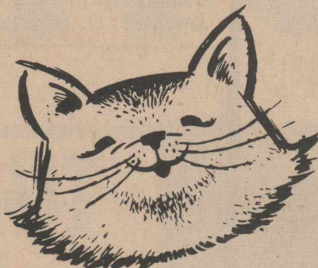

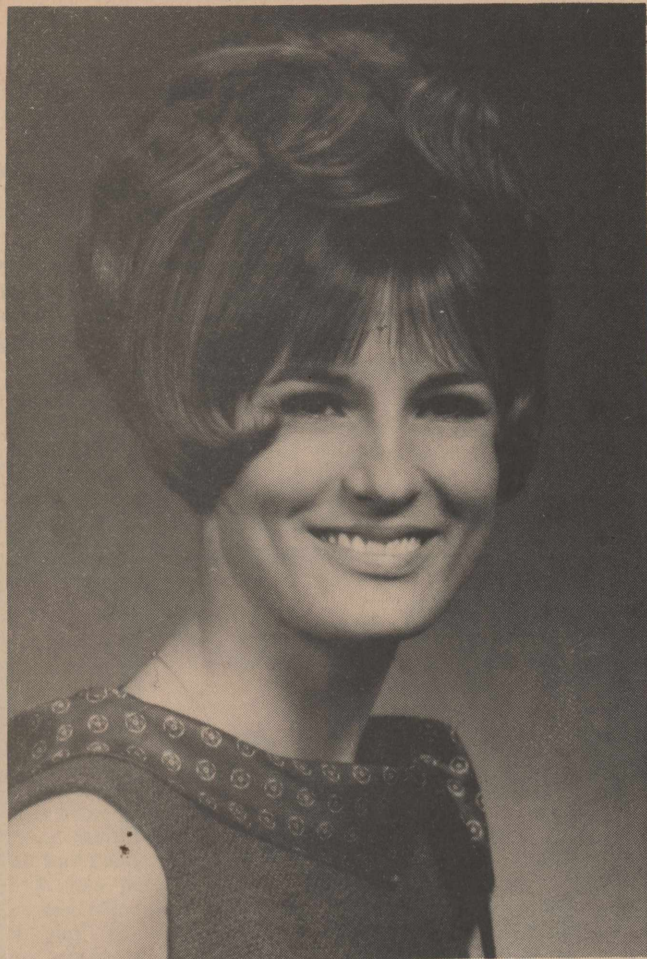

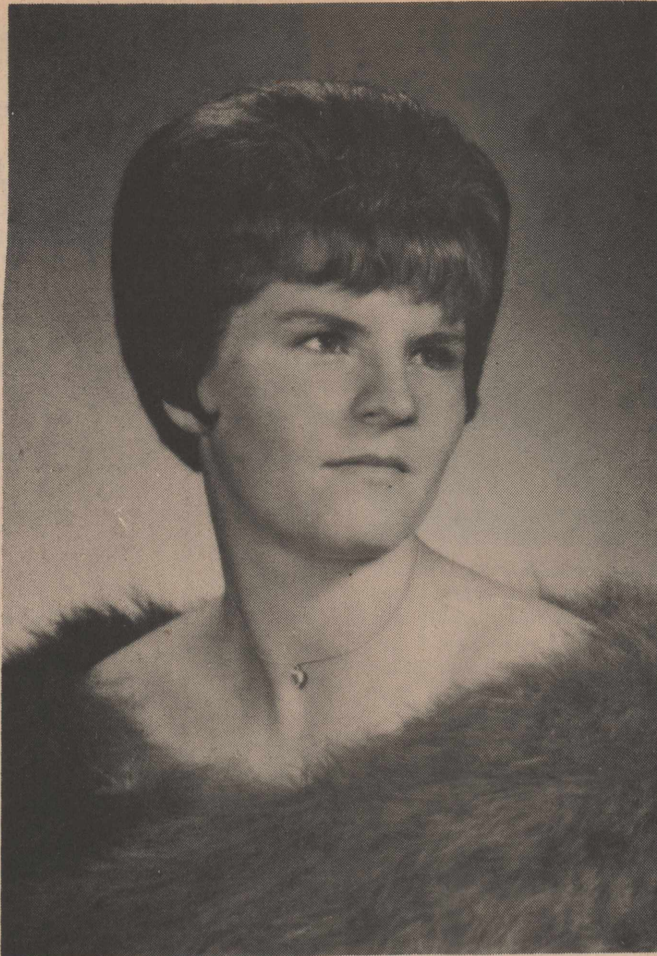

6 eggs
2 c. sugar
1 1/2 oz. pkg. vanilla wafers
1 7 oz. can cocoanut
1 c. pecans
1/2 c. milk

Mix butter and sugar, add eggs. Crush vanilla wafers. Add wafers and milk. Beat well. Add cocoanut and pecans. Pour into greased and floured tube pan. Bake one hour and 15 minutes at 325 degrees. Cool 10 minutes.

PORK CAKE
1 lb. leaf lard, ground fine
3 c. boiling water, poured over fat and cooled
5 c. brown sugar
1 lb. raisins or walnuts or 1/2 lb. each
6 c. flour
2 level tsp. soda, sifted in flour
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. cloves
2 eggs
Add brown sugar to cooled lard in water. Mix spice and flour. Mix thoroughly. Bake at 300 - 325 degrees.

PORK CAKE ICING
2 c. brown sugar
2 c. white sugar
1 stick butter
1/2 c. milk
1 lb. dates
1/2 c. walnuts
1 tsp. lemon juice
2 tsp. grated lemon rine
Mix butter, sugar and milk in large saucepan. Cook to hard ball. Add remaining ingredients. Spread completely over cake to seal in freshness.
May place in air tight container with wet cloth and store in cool place. Cake will keep for one to three months.

VICES. These services are available to any disabled person who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, Mr. Montgomery added.

The Easter Seal Campaign will run through Easter Sunday, April 6. Mr. Montgomery urged increased support for the Easter Seal Society and its program of services to crippled children and adults.

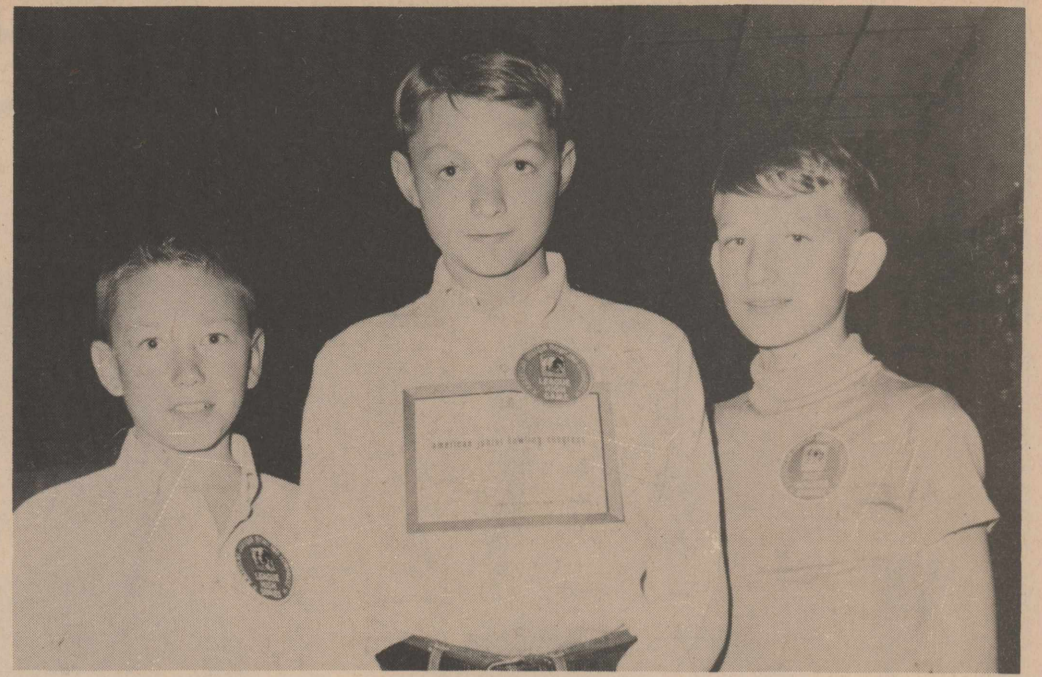

DPS Reminds Motorists Of Inspection Deadline

"With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 32 per cent of the registered vehicles in Lamb County have been inspected," stated Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of The Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline," Johnson added.

"Any driver operating a vehicle on public roads after April 15 that is required to be inspected will be operating in violation of the law," Johnson said.

Captain Johnson called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13% to 3%.

Johnson said, "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident."
