EVENTS DURING PAST WEEK

During the past week the shipment of grain, broom corn, cattle and hogs have been rather light on account of the continued shortage of cars. There are orders in for at least fifty cars to ship cattle and hogs which are unfilled. Eleven cars of broom corn have gone out this week and ten cars of wheat. Harrison and Stevens shipped two cars of wheat to Kansas City. J. S. Talley shipped three cars of hogs to San Antonio and one car to Wichita. Perry and Cutter loaded out two cars of hogs for the Los Angeles market.

LETTER FROM RUSSIA

The Warkentin of the Geo. R. Warkentin store has a letter which was recently received from his sister, Peter Wall, who resides near Moscow, Russia. One of the most interesting features of this letter is the immense amount of postage which was required to send it from Russia to America. There was a total of 3042 Rubles in stamps on the letter. In the old days this would have been a small fortune. A year ago a Russian Ruble was worth about 50c in our money. This letter was mailed on August 1st and reached Perryton on the 3rd of the month. Mrs. Wall says that conditions are becoming better in Russia but that they are still far from ideal.

KLUX PARADE STREETS AT PANHANDLE

It is said to be the first in the kind on record, occurred last Friday night when a number of the Klux Klan's parade led a parade of the Klux Klan through the streets of the Panhandle. The Klansmen marched abreast in the lead, the negroes followed in red uniforms. Immediately following the band 158 klansmen in white marched double file. The parade halted at the Panhandle Hotel where the band played the Star Spangled Banner, after which the Klansmen marched to the point of the Panhandle near the school building. Following the parade, a special meeting was held in a hall in which the officer was severely reprimanded with a knife. It is said the result of the officer's efforts to control traffic. W. D. M. of Panhandle, charged with the connected with the affair, has been released under a \$1,500.00 bond. Officer V. B. Armstrong is recovering from his injuries. The band, directed by Verlon, was one of the last army bands organized at Camp Funston. The negroes received a letter from the local Klan, thanking them for their services, which was read by the negroes.—Panhandle.

MID-WEST HIGHWAY MARKERS NOW IN PLACE

E. W. Mosbacher of the Hutchinson Chamber of Commerce was in our city the fore part of last week with a crew of men completing the marking of this section of the Mid-West Highway. This great highway which runs from Sioux City, Iowa to El Paso should be very beneficial to us and add much to our big volume of tourist trade. This highway comes down through Hutchinson, Kansas, Beaver and Baiko, Oklahoma, through Perryton and to Amarillo by way of Spearman and Dumas. With the marking of this highway we are now on five great highway systems. The markers have been erected in a good substantial manner. They are of heavy gauge iron and are bolted to iron bars which are set in cement in the ground. They are of attractive design and easily read from the road. This highway should become a favored route for travel from the middle west to the south. It will also be used a great deal for local travel. We have long needed a good marked road between Beaver and Perryton. Practically every mile of this road in this county is in the best of shape. There is a short sector on the west side of the county that is not graded. This two or three miles should be worked at once. We understand that the citizens of Spearman and the Commissioners of Hansford County are now exerting every effort to grade a road from Spearman to the east line of the county paralleling the railroad. This should be done at once for there is a great amount of travel between this place and Spearman. We are strong for the good road boosters of Hansford County in the fight they have had with some of their stay in the rut non-progressive citizens who live along this proposed route.

LETHARGIC DEMOCRACY SPELLS REPUBLICAN VICTORY

Dallas, Texas, October 10.—The sovereign voters of American states are calling for a return of Democratic rule and government at Washington according to word coming from the Democratic National Committee to Miss Margie E. Neal and John C. Harris, Chairmen of the Texas Finance Committee but there is no certainty of Democratic victories in doubtful states in the 1922 general elections on November 7 unless forces of Democracy are willing to aid in the fight.

Campaign forces have been organized in every senatorial district in the state and every effort is being made to complete the campaign by October 15 so that the Texas fund of \$50,000 may reach the hands of Chairman Cordell Hull of the Democratic National Committee in time to stem the tide in doubtful states.

"Texas Democrats have been asked for \$50,000," Miss Neal said "and the sum is small in comparison with the size of the Democratic hosts of Texas. We want this to be a year in which the average man and woman finances the party's campaign for leadership. The Democratic party always has been the defender of the average man and it has not departed from that defense. It would require no more than a dollar bill from less than one tenth of the Democrats of Texas to meet the Texas assessment. Naturally less than that number will contribute and some will have to subscribe larger amounts. We have no doubt that those who are able to give large sums will subscribe freely. But we want the word to go forth that Texas Democrats by the thousands have given their bit to the campaign." CHICKENS AND COWS PAY BIG DIVIDENDS

It will be of interest to our readers to learn what Mrs. Mattie Trice realized from her poultry and cows during the year of 1921. Mrs. Trice owns 480 acres of land ten miles north and six miles east of Perryton which is clear of all indebtedness. She came to this country eighteen years ago from Chicago, Illinois where she had been employed by the Marshall Field Dry Goods Company for twenty years, and homesteaded on a farm in Beaver County. Since that time she has bought additional land, made good improvements on her farm, raised a family and the chickens and cows have paid the biggest part of the bill. Today she does not owe anyone a single dollar and has a substantial bank account. During the year of 1921 she realized \$1143 from the sale of eggs and cream and \$357 from the sale of chickens. This is a total of \$1500.00 or \$125.00 per month. Would not this amount come in handy on any farm. It is only an example of what many farmers are doing and what every farmer in this country could do if they would be willing to expend the necessary labor.

WHO WANTED THE ARMISTICE?

In the much discussed interview with Rudyard Kipling, the English poet is said to have maintained that President Wilson forced the Allies to give in to Germany, resulting in the premature signing of the armistice. Mr. Kipling denies the substance of the interview, but this alleged remark nevertheless raises a question on which little light has been shed. What took place in Allied councils directly before the extending of the armistice terms has not been fully disclosed to the world.

Will Irwin, noted war correspondent, wrote a letter recently to the Boston Herald in which he said the French, and not the Americans, forced the acceptance of the armistice. Mr. Irwin says he learned the facts just after the armistice from a source "thoroughly informed and entirely reliable."

According to Mr. Irwin, the Allied authorities believed that if the war were to go on to a complete, smashing victory, the glory and the chief power in the final settlement would go to America—they did not wish to leave the settlement to a man so at variance with their ideas as Woodrow Wilson.

The American correspondent says Mr. Wilson placed the matter of an armistice squarely before Marshal Foch, who called the Allied commanders together in a council of war. Experts reported on the current military situation, going into detail on the proposed attack in Lorraine. This project, it was believed, would cost 250,000 men in killed and wounded, although the prospects of success were excellent.

General Bliss, one of the American representatives on the council, favored carrying the battle to crushing German defeat. Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig, commander of the British forces, argued for an immediate armistice, if Germany was ready to quit. The French authorities agreed with Haig, influenced largely by the uncertainty of all military action and believing that, all things considered, the wiser policy would be to bring about an immediate cessation of hostilities.

All in all, the armistice seems to have been the result of Allied concurrence in what was believed to be the best course to pursue, avoiding the sacrificing of many thousands of lives for results that might be obtained just as effectually by allowing Allied forces reached German soil.

If Mr. Irwin's information was authoritative, as he says it was, America is acquitted of a charge the truth of which would not have been complimentary to her national honor. It

PROTECT THE LIVESTOCK FROM

During an open winter it is difficult to prevent the barn lots becoming muddy. But are often allowed to get in worse condition than necessary? Is it not time to have a firm walk the house to the barn, from the barn to the water troughs and the barn to the roadway? Could the mud holes be filled up, the raised above the surrounding and ditches made to prevent from coming on to the barn from other land? All these not prevent mud, deep mud or after a prolonged wet season they would make a big improvement over usual conditions.

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LIVE STOCK FACTS

SHEEP RID LAWN OF WEEDS

Dandelions and Other Plants on Court-house Square Eagerly Devoured by Animals.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The courthouse lawn in Elbert county, Colo., like many other lawns, was badly infested with dandelions. The county agent suggested killing them by pasturing rather than plowing under the sod. According to reports received by the United States Department of Agriculture, the test was approved by the commissioners. Sufficient hog wire to fence the lawn was purchased and two pastures 100 feet long and 80 feet wide were made. A farmer living near town furnished six old ewes, which were placed in one pasture May 14, when the dandelions were at their best. A week later four more were added to the flock.

The ewes were changed from one pasture to the other at one-week intervals. They soon had the dandelions and grass eaten down and kept it down. They ate blossoms and buds

readily, and the hearts out of the dandelion plants close to the ground. Better results would have been obtained had the sheep been put in earlier, but the experiment proved quite effective in ridding the lawn of dandelions.



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PREVENTION IS BEST REMEDY

White Scours in Calves and Pigs is Caused by Infection—Treatment Not Promising.

White scours in calves and pigs is caused by infection; virulent colon bacilli are mostly responsible. Treatment of infected pigs is not promising; the main thing is prevention. Do not feed too heavy a grain ration for a period of two weeks before farrowing. Feed bran, roots and alfalfa, with a light ration of corn or barley, and be sure to provide opportunity for exercise. However, these things are of little consequence after infection appears. Keep your sows with little pigs on the ground, in individual hog houses. This will be safer than keeping them in the same old pens, which may still be infected. These hog houses should be kept out in a field and well scattered. This gives opportunity for exercise and lessens the danger of infection. Provide a small amount of litter or bedding for each house. Use disinfectants freely.—Veterinary Department, Colorado Agricultural College.

SHEEP REQUIRE GOOD SHADE

Plenty of Right Kind Returns Big Dividends—One Tree is Much Worse Than None.

Plenty of the right kind of shade for sheep returns big dividends, farmers and sheep raisers say. Only one or two shade trees in a pasture are worse than none at all since a place to which the sheep come day after day soon becomes a hotbed of parasites, they add. The construction of small shades which can be moved from place to place is solving the difficulty for many farmers.

ARTIFICIAL SHADE FOR HOGS

Protection of Some Kind Should Be Provided in Pasture Where Trees Are Lacking.

Where there are no trees in the hog pasture to provide the much-needed shade during the summer months, an artificial shade is a most important part of the summer equipment. A good shelter may be constructed by setting short posts in the ground and building a roof of light boards over these. Windstorms should be guarded against by nailing the boards securely.

LIVE STOCK NOTES

Do not lose sight of the good high-grade coal-tar dips, which are certainly valuable when applied according to directions.

Shade and a wallow for hot weather, and wood ashes, charcoal and other stomach rectifiers, are necessary if the hogs are expected to do their best.

THE MILK SUPPLY A SERIOUS FARM PROBLEM

The farm leaders and farm owners of the South have apparently not yet fully grasped the importance of a full milk supply for all the families on our farms. This is a problem the importance of which can scarcely be exaggerated. That it is a difficult problem to solve under our Negro tenant system of share cropping does not in the least justify its further neglect. The white man of the South can no longer be indifferent to the mental and physical well being of the Negro, except at his own material loss.

If, as all who have tried it have found out, there is no real substitute to take its place in rearing a pig or a calf, surely we must accept the statements of the authorities that milk is an absolute necessity for the growth and proper development of the human—black as well as white. There is no greater problem today in the South, none that is more far reaching or on which the solution of all other problems more largely depends than the milk supply on our farms. Until this problem is solved, school, health, financial, and even moral problems must remain doubly difficult of solution. The physical health and development of a people is the important basic problem on which the solution of all others rest. The physical development of farmers and farm laborers will be defective so long as one-fourth to one-third the farm families are without a cow and many more without a constant and adequate milk supply. It is without any exaggeration the biggest problem in the South today and is only partly recognized.—Tait Butler, in The Progressive Farmer.

An extremely interesting and important ceremony took place the other evening in Kansas City, Kas., when Huron Chapter, Order of De Molay, bade an official ritualistic to 126 members of the chapter who had attained their majority and automatically ceased to be members of the order.

The ceremony was exemplified for the first time by Huron chapter, but the ritual provides the same for every chapter and all over the country young men of 21 are being "graduated" from De Molay.

Boys who enter the order at the prescribed age of 16 years have five years of the special training which membership affords as a preparation for the duties of citizenship and for their conduct until they become of age. The average term of membership is of course considerably less, though as time passes and the order grows, the boys are entering it near minimum age in increasing numbers. In the first year or two of its existence the average age was nearer 18 years.

It is a matter of enormous significance when a boy becomes a man. The Roman youth donned the toga virilis several years earlier than that at which American laws invest the youths of this country with the honors, privileges, duties and responsibilities of manhood. It is self evident that after three or four years of what is actually intensive preparation for the duties of actual citizenship, as well as the inculcation of the duties of what the order calls "junior citizenship," the De Molay who attains his majority is pretty certain to be a credit to his parents, to his country and to the order which devotes so much effort toward this preparation.

The ritual provides a ceremony designed to impress upon the minds of the graduates "the solemnity of the stage at which they" have arrived. So far as known, the Order of De Molay is the only one in existence which so insistently emphasizes the importance of the boy's years from 16 to 21, and is the only one which sends its "graduates" forth into active life with an impressive farewell ceremony. It is little wonder that such an order has

NATION DRYING UP

Putting a kick in prohibition is costing the government around \$10,000,000 a year and will take at least a decade. So says Federal Prohibition Commissioner Roy A. Haynes. The prohibition machine is knocking a bit now, Haynes admits but the knocks are chiefly from knockers who are feeling the pinch of enforcement activities. Millionaire bootleggers are in the past, he says. They were thriving a year or so ago, but now there aren't any such things. The bootleg business is languishing. Wood alcohol and badly distilled drinks are still causing deaths and cases of blindness, but customers are getting more wary. New significance is given these days to the advice "beware of the first drink," for the first may be the last, if you get the wrong brand. Prohibition officials control all bonded red liquor and say they have decreased smuggling.

"In ten or twelve years," Haynes says, "we'll hear as little against national prohibition as we hear now about prohibition in States that have had it for generations." Appropriation for prohibition enforcement last year was \$9,250,000. This year it is \$7,500,000. Income in the year it is National Revenue Department from distilled and fermented spirits for an average year before prohibition was \$134,868,034.12. Last year the revenue from "nonbeverage" spirits withdrawn from bond was \$78,097,756.93. Income last year from prohibition enforcement fines, forfeitures, etc., approximated \$5,000,000.

GLASS REMOVED FROM BOY'S FOOT.

Addison Cutter, the fifteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cutter of Perryton, underwent a second operation in Canadian last Friday for the removal of glass from one of his feet. Doctors E. H. Snyder and L. V. Dawson performed the operation after locating the glass with X-rays. The piece removed was a rectangle in shape, about three-eighths of an inch wide and an inch and a quarter long.

The lad underwent a similar operation here four months ago, in which a similar piece of glass was removed. There remains another piece of glass to be taken out.

Several months ago when the boy was sick with fever and delirious he kicked a foot through a window glass, and the physician in dressing the wounds made by the broken glass removed all pieces that he could find, but it seems that three pieces went in so deep they could not be noticed. The foot healed and the boy recovered from the illness, but the foot bothered him and doctors could not locate any trouble, until Mr. Cutter came to Canadian with the boy and had X-ray pictures taken of the foot.

One piece of glass was in the foot horizontally, one piece lying flat with the bottom of the foot, and the third piece lying parallel with the foot, with one edge down. Their position among the bones of the foot makes their removal a delicate and difficult operation.—Canadian Record.

THIS IS NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

The fire waste of the country is excessive, and is sapping its prosperity. Reduction of the fire waste is an important part of the campaign for the conservation of the national resources.

Fire losses in the United States and Canada in 1921 were \$332,654,950, most of them due to carelessness.

Fire losses and the cost of fire prevention in the United States amount annually to \$600,000,000, or more than the total American production of gold, silver, copper and petroleum in a year.

The cost of fires each year is one-half the cost of all the new buildings erected in a normal year.

The annual per capita fire waste in the United States is \$2.51, in Europe, 33c. Cause: The latter has better construction, less carelessness, increased responsibility.

If building in the United States were as fireproof as in Europe, the annual cost of fire losses and protection would be only \$90,000,000.

Over 15,000 are killed and 50,000 are seriously injured annually as a result of fire.

Defective flues are responsible for 13 percent of all the fires.

All fires are the same size at their start. Every second counts, so be prepared.

An ounce of fire prevention is worth a pound of fire extinguishment.

The way to get lower insurance rates is to have fewer fires, adequate water supply and modern fire fighting apparatus.

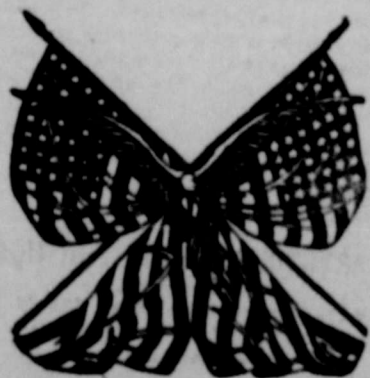
