Cleavinger to lead ASGA

Wildorado-area farmer Bill Cleavinger has been named president of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association.

Cleavinger, long-time head of the Texas Sugarbeet Growers Association, was named ASGA chief during the group's recent San Antonio convention. ASGA represents 12,000 sugar beet growers in 14 states.

As leader of the national group, Cleavinger has begun a nationwide campaign to tell the producers' side of the 1985 Farm Bill's sugar policy, and how he feels large users are trying to wreck the domestic industry.

Cleavinger is quick to point out that the current sugar program doesn't promote the spread of communism in sugar producing countries, isn't costing taxpayers millions of dollars in subsidies, and isn't creating artificially-high prices for consumers.

"These fallacies have been fed to the national media by a multimillion-dollar propaganda campaign of misinformation by the Sweetener Users Association," Cleavinger charged. "This group is composed, mainly, of soft drink bottlers, food processors and other major sweetener users."

"Their campaign is very evident in the national media and even in some of our area newspapers where consumers often read or hear that the national sugar policy is a rip-off."

Cleavinger noted that the current average sugar price is below the 1980-81 price, when there was no national program. Cleavinger also

claimed that Americans pay less for a pound of sugar than households in other developed countries.

Refuting claims that restricted imports of sugar from Caribbean and other sugar-producing countries could lead to Communism, Cleavinger pointed out that 25 other commodities have import quotas as part of their program, and that exporters are paid the same price as American producers.

Cleavinger said the lower "world" market price is held down by the European Economic Community, which subsidizes its producers. Cleavinger said EED has dumped more than 25 million tons of sugar on the world market in the past seven years.

The world price is not a good barometer to use when comparing the

U.S. sugar price, Cleavinger said.

"Although the world price is below the U.S. price, it's highly erratic and represents unrefined sugar," says Cleavinger. "The world price has seen a 40 percent increase in the past two months. The world market doesn't guarantee a steady sugar supply."

"According to our research, Americans are more concerned about a guaranteed sugar supply than about its cost."

Cleavinger can understand why major users are pining for a different policy.

"If the price of sugar drops a penny a pound, it produces an additional \$22 million in profits for Coca Cola," said Cleavinger. "While Coke and Pepsi are against sugar import restrictions, they don't mention that the soft drink industry successfully lobbied Congress for exemption from the exclusive franchise prohibition in U.S. antitrust laws."

"These users seek higher profits at the expense of consumers and sugar producers and processors alike."

Cleavinger pointed out another danger of increased sugar imports—some countries still allow the use of DDT and other chemicals forbidden in the United States.

"Without this policy, all, or a large majority, of the domestic sugar industry would be destroyed," Cleavinger said. "We would all be at the mercy of foreign producers, much like we are for oil and gas. I don't think that's something Americans want."

Hughes plans close watch on probationers

Bob Hughes, the county's new chief probation officer, said he doesn't like to go through the back to reach the front.

"I like things streamlined and I like to get where I'm going in the shortest possible way," said Hughes, who was hired Feb. 1.

Hughes said his new staff performs in this streamlined fashion, but "they just need a little more training and direction. As for any sweeping changes, I've talked to the people (the staff) here and they are doing a good job."

Hughes previously worked in the Dallas County probation office with the Intensive Supervision Probation program which he hopes to install in the Deaf Smith County probation program.

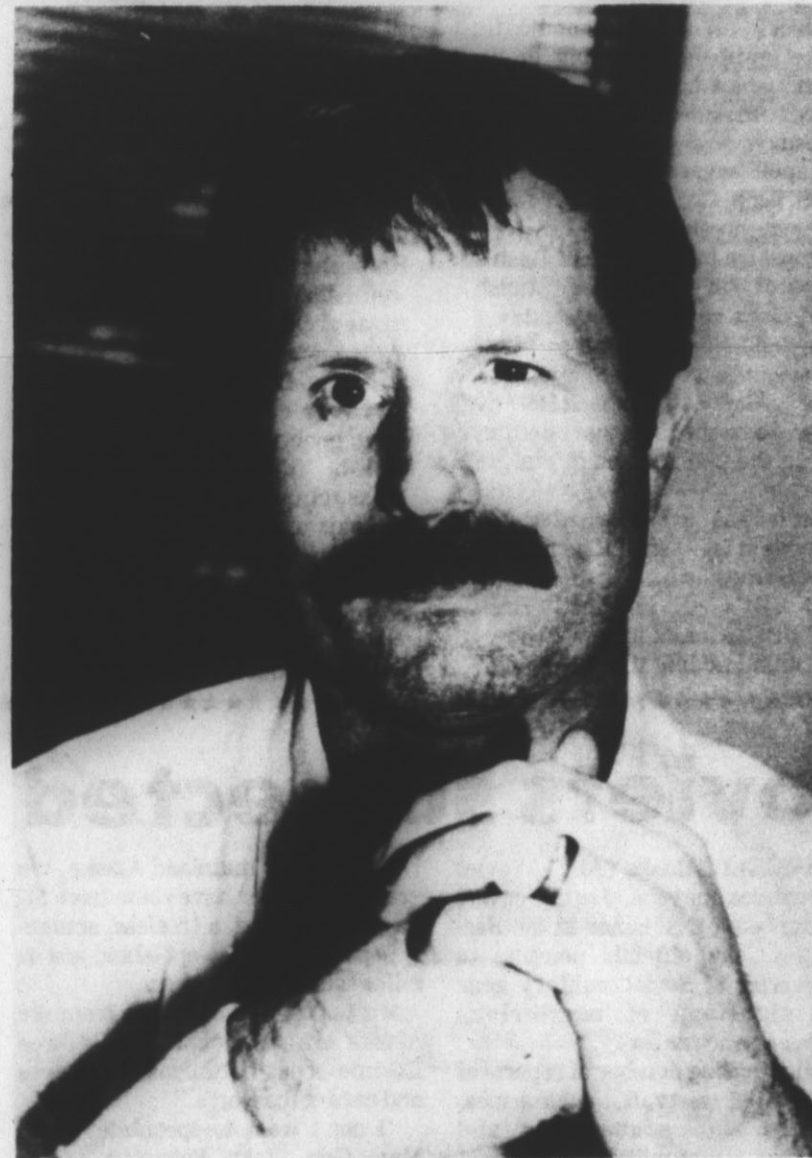
"It's just more of a close monitoring system by the staff where the person on probation reports weekly and we keep a close watch on them," said Hughes.

Despite the close monitoring, Hughes was quick to point out that the probation office is not a policing force.

"What the probation office does is motivate the person into breaking old patterns of behavior through counseling or drug therapy. If the people on probation don't want to change their behavior, we head them down to Huntsville," said Hughes.

Hughes said Hereford and Deaf Smith County were better equipped to handle this reformation process than most cities and counties their size.

"I understand Deaf Smith County has a mental health-retardation center, some

good private counselors and an excellent Alcoholics Anonymous group," said Hughes.

Witnessing a new pattern of behavior form in persons on probation is common for Hughes after working in the probation

field 14 years, he said.

In 1974, Hughes said he started as a probation officer in Hunt County and swiftly moved to chief probation officer. After 1978, Hughes worked in Ellis County, Lamar County and Dallas County until he arrived in Hereford.

Services set for Moore

Troy Moore, former city and county commissioner, died at his residence Wednesday evening after a lengthy illness with cancer.

Services will be held at 2:30 p.m. Friday in First United Methodist church and burial will be in West Park Cemetery under the direction of Rix Funeral Directors of Hereford.

Moore, 78, served four terms as a Deaf Smith County commissioner in 1942-50, and later served two terms as a city commissioner in 1956-62. One of his sons, Troy Don, is currently serving as a county commissioner.

Mr. Moore moved to Deaf Smith County in 1929 from Hall County, where he was a farmer and rancher. Moore Independent Oil Co. was formed in 1935 and the name later changed

to Farmers Drive In, before becoming Moore Oil Corporation in 1972. He spent almost 30 years in the wholesale and retail oil and gas business before retiring.

Moore was born June 21, 1909 near Memphis. He was a member of First United Methodist Church, a charter member of Hereford Rotary Club, a member of Elks Lodge, a 32nd Degree Mason and member of Scottish Rites. He married Lois Sowell on Aug. 31, 1931 in Clovis, N.M.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, Troy Don and Martin Reid Moore II, both of Hereford; daughter, Sharon Swanson of Corona Del Mar, Calif.; one sister, Ruth Miller of Amarillo; seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Bivins claims big lead

Republican state senate candidate Teel Bivins told Hereford supporters Wednesday he held "a very big lead" over Republican primary opponent Ron Slover and felt the organization was already in place "to defeat whoever comes out of the Democratic primary" in November's general

election.

With the March 8 primary less than a month away, Bivins said his organization had been in place "from Amarillo to Hereford to Levelland to Darrouzett since December, long before my primary opponent even filed," and felt that organization would carry him through the November election.

Bivins displayed confidence throughout his visit at the Hereford Community Center, never saying "If I'm elected." Instead, the Amarillo cattleman used "When I'm in Austin" throughout the hour-long discussion.

"The one thing I've heard from people throughout the district was that our state senator wasn't working with the rest of the area delegation," Bivins said. "That makes a difference. We need to speak with a common voice, and I want us to be a team. We only have 200,000 registered voters in our district, and that dictates that we have to work together."

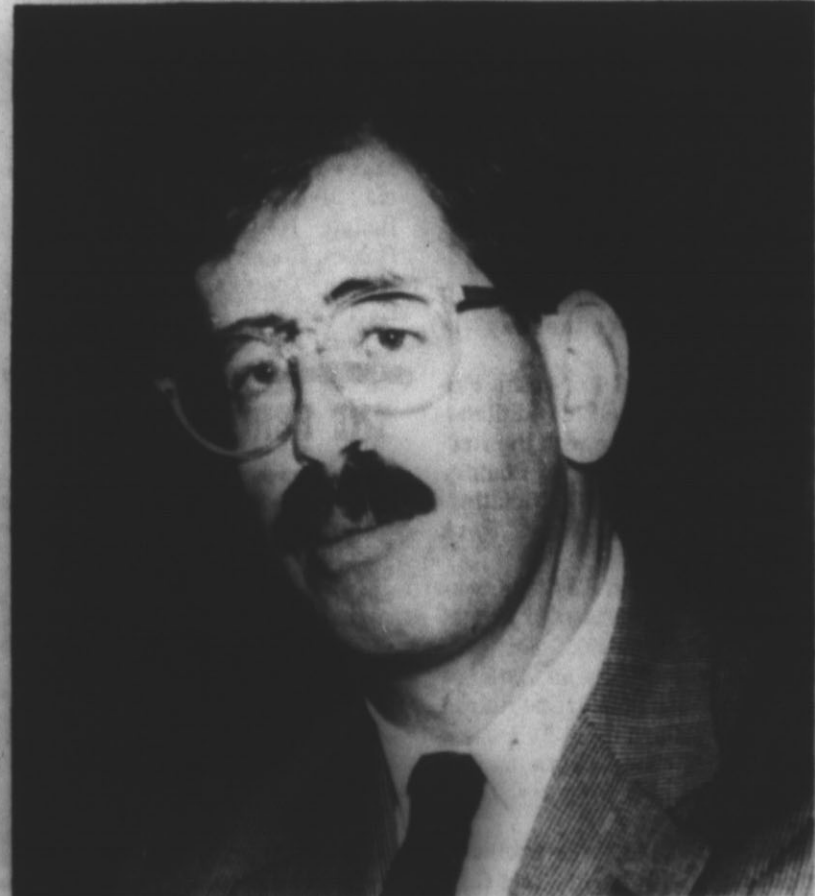
Bivins said his priorities would include a reduction of state spending, a "shrinking of the state bureaucracy," and a focus on economic development.

"We need to force our bureaucracy to shrink," Bivins explained. "That would best be through a consolidation of state spending. That may not be the best way, but this state is going through hard times."

"There are 240 state agencies that have their own personnel policies, for instance. There are 40 state agencies that only issue licenses. We don't need 40 different agencies to issue licenses," Bivins said the state may best be served by "15 super-agencies, but I'm not sure on that."

Bivins also reinforced earlier promises to work on a ban on corporate and personal income taxes.

"We're one of only four states without a state income tax, and that's a real ace of spades when it comes to economic development."

Amarillo suspect slain after hostage episode

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — A man suspected of several rapes and robberies who took a hospital worker hostage was fatally shot by police officers who said they feared for the woman's life.

Shelby Manuel, 49, was shot and killed by Amarillo SWAT team members after he held a Northwest

Texas Hospital worker hostage in the facility's radiology department for more than two hours Wednesday afternoon.

"The officers observed what they felt was an overt motion on the part of the suspect to harm the hostage and they terminated that threat by firing shots at the suspect," said Amarillo police Lt. Jimmy Stevens.

Stevens said officers shielded the woman, who was in "very close proximity" to Manuel when the shooting began shortly before 3 p.m.

Manuel had been held in the Potter County jail on nine counts of robbery, rape and injury to an elderly person when he was brought by sheriff's deputies to the hospital for a checkup, said Sheriff Jimmy Boydston.

Manuel escaped from deputies and

wielding a homemade knife, took the woman hostage about 12:40 p.m., said Stevens.

"While in the stage of dressing out to get ready for X-rays, he ran out a back door, found a scalpel-like instrument and took an X-ray technician hostage," Boydston said.

Authorities negotiated with Manuel for approximately two hours before storming the room.

Hospital spokeswoman Lynell LaRue said the female hostage, whose name was not immediately released, suffered "deep shock" after the incident.

The woman, who was described as a longtime employee at the hospital, was released from the hospital Wednesday evening, said nursing supervisor Monty Stiles.

Court stops execution

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A Houston man with a history of violence avoided the Texas death chamber for a fourth time today when the U.S. Supreme Court halted his execution about 90 minutes before it was to occur.

Calvin Williams, 27, was scheduled for lethal injection after midnight for the 1980 strangulation of Emily Anderson, a Houston travel agent.

The high court, however, responding to appeals from Williams' attorneys, voted 7-0 for a reprieve about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday.

"Thank you," Williams told an assistant warden who informed him of the stay.

A few minutes later, with chains around his wrists and ankles, he was removed from a small cell adjacent to the death chamber and returned to death row, where he has lived for nearly the last eight years.

Williams earlier had promised that he would not be placed on the death chamber gurney without a fight.

"I'm not going to walk in there and just hop up on that table," Williams said in an interview last week.

Williams acknowledged breaking into the apartment where Miss Anderson was slain, but insisted the burglary occurred a month before the killing. His fingerprints, however, were found in the woman's stolen car, recovered a few blocks from Williams' home.

Williams' attorneys contended in appeals the Texas death penalty law is flawed in that it does not allow jurors to consider mitigating circumstances and forces them to return a death verdict.

Other incidents reported were theft of toys totaling \$200 from a yard at 201 Ave. B; and a report that two men were drinking on the Town and Country parking lot at 100 S. 25th Ave.

There were no arrests, accidents or fire calls reported.

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Candidates in New Hampshire

Bush says he can survive

The Democratic presidential candidates sharpened their attacks on one another and Vice President George Bush insisted his Republican campaign could survive another setback, as the contenders jockeyed for position in the New Hampshire home stretch.

Nearly all of the 13 candidates were campaigning today in the state, which holds its first-in-the-nation presidential primary on Tuesday.

A poll suggested Bush's chief rival, Bob Dole, was narrowing the vice president's lead in New Hampshire in the wake of Bush's embarrassing third-place finish in the Iowa caucuses on Monday.

In an ABC-Washington Post survey, reported in today's editions of the Post, Bush led Dole by only four percentage points, within the poll's six-point margin of error.

Bush was asked whether his campaign is finished if he loses in New Hampshire.

"No, it's not finished," Bush told NBC in an interview Wednesday night, adding that he thought

he would win.

The vice president, who spent part of the day at the White House and part on the campaign trail, said he and President Reagan hadn't discussed the trouncing he took in Iowa at the hands of Pat Robertson.

Robertson continued to crow about his second-place finish in Iowa, and lectured reporters who described him as a former television evangelist. He termed the tag a "bigoted slur," saying he preferred to be called a religious broadcaster.

The ABC-Post poll indicated Robertson's support had climbed into the double digits in New Hampshire. While he remained well behind the front-runners, he made greater gains over a survey a week ago than they did.

On the Democratic side, Rep. Richard Gephardt was riding the wave generated by his first-place finish in Iowa. Although Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis still enjoys a comfortable lead, the poll indicated a surge in support for the Missouri congressman.

Sen. Paul Simon, who finished a close second to Gephardt in Iowa,

also rolled up an increase in New Hampshire, but a slightly smaller one.

Both Dukakis and Simon made Gephardt their principal target as they campaigned in New Hampshire. Simon was launching a new ad campaign in the state today, hammering away at the theme that Gephardt's populist campaign themes don't match up with his voting record.

Dukakis, meanwhile, attacked Gephardt for voting for Reagan's 1981 tax cut. Those who finished back in the pack in Iowa found themselves dogged by questions about how long they could hang on.

"I've got a 50-state campaign and will go all the way," said Gary Hart, who picked up less than 1 percent of the vote in Iowa.

Former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt, who finished fifth among the six competing Democrats in Iowa, said he'd wait until the day after the primary to make an assessment.

Three of the Democrats took time out from campaigning Wednesday night to replenish their war chests. Tennessee Sen. Albert Gore staged a big-money

evening in Dallas, netting \$700,000.

Gore, who bypassed Iowa and registered almost no support in the caucuses, repeated his assertion that Iowa "cannot anoint the winner of the Democratic nomination."

Simon and Gephardt, meanwhile, were drumming up cash in New York and Washington respectively.

Dole, who has often needled Bush about his patrician background and talked up his own humble beginnings, sounded a familiar theme as he campaigned in Londonderry, N.H.

"You've got to have a feel for real people," he said.

Such populism proved popular, as Rep. Jack Kemp donned a clerk's apron and began bagging groceries in Goffstown, N.H.

"I'm a man of the people," he said. Kemp also kept up his attacks on Dole, claiming the Kansas senator favors tax increases.

Kemp won the endorsement Wednesday of the Concord Monitor, the state's most influential evening newspaper. Among the Democrats, the paper picked Gore.

Bush needing help; Reagan still silent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Trounced in Iowa and desperate for victory in New Hampshire, George Bush — the fellow who talks up loyalty about seven times a day — sure could use some help from the boss. If Ronald Reagan ever wanted to give his vice president a boost, the clock is ticking.

From the Oval Office comes ... silence.

In the White House and throughout the political community, there is a general belief that Reagan will continue to remain mum, as he has long promised he would, refusing to endorse anyone for president until the GOP nomination is settled.

"I know there are some of the vice president's supporters who have assumed that at some point, the president would play lifeguard. I don't think so," said Mitchell Daniels, Reagan's former political director.

"I take the president at his word, that he does not want to meddle or appear to meddle in the nomination process," Daniels said. "I think he's trying very hard and carefully to live up to the vow of neutrality that he's taken so long."

Eddie Mahe, a political consultant, said that neutrality is the only position Reagan can take without splitting the GOP, and that the president wants to be a unifier.

Noting that Reagan is still very popular in New Hampshire, Mahe said a Reagan endorsement would be very helpful for Bush.

"It also would be extremely divisive and, over time, would not be helpful," Mahe said. "It would be destructive to Ronald Reagan's agenda in the Senate. Remember, a majority of Republican senators are supporting Bob Dole, not George Bush."

If Reagan endorsed Bush, other

Republican candidates would have to go on the attack against them. "You can't sit there and let someone as big as Ronald Reagan endorse your rival," Mahe said. "You have to fight back."

Daniels recalls being with Reagan at private meetings when political associates of 30 years or more asked the president about his preference. Daniels said Reagan "was very careful to stay on the straight and narrow" and refrain from tipping his hand.

Would Reagan let Bush sink, if it came to that? "Yes," Daniels predicted.



"It's important to remember the extent to which Ronald Reagan has unified or homogenized the Republican party," Daniels said. "Reaganism has become the party dogma. Everybody in the race is a Reagan supporter; nobody is a Reagan opponent."

No one doubts that Reagan and Bush have a special relationship and are good friends.

"But I have to remain neutral until the decision is made by the party as to who their nominee will be," Reagan said two months ago in his most recent comment on the issue.

For the record, Bush's staff says he's happy with Reagan's neutrality. "We don't expect anything different from that to occur," said Stephen Hart, a Bush spokesman. "The vice president agrees with that position of neutrality, thinks it's appropriate."

Soviets suspected of U.S. landings

GAMBELL, Alaska (AP) — Soviet commandos may be staging covert landings on a U.S. island in the Bering Sea, say officials pointing to discoveries of Soviet military gear and sightings of mysterious strangers who ran away.

An increasing number of reports of unidentified aircraft, submarines, swimmers in scuba gear and discarded Soviet military equipment have been turned in to U.S. intelligence agencies, officials said during a visit here this week. Although many sightings have occur-

red on or over mainland Alaska, the greatest number have come from St. Lawrence Island, a treeless, sparsely populated windswept island just 40 miles southeast of Siberia.

Most of the reports come from the Alaska Army National Guard's three Eskimo scout battalions, "the eyes and ears of the North."

"I don't want to speculate," said Maj. Gen. John Schaeffer, commander of the Alaska Guard.

"We don't have a Soviet person on hand so we can completely verify this, but circumstantial evidence is

that they're conducting some activity on the island. They're doing it around the world — in Scandinavia and the Philippines — so why not here?"

The island's largest villages are Gambell on the northwest side and Savoonga near its center.

The 100-mile-long island's shoreline collects debris from a variety of sources, much of it from fishing boats working the Bering Sea.

"St. Lawrence Island is a beachcomber's paradise," said Sgt.

1st Class Renard Nichols, with the Guard's 1st Scout Battalion in Nome.

"What we concern ourselves with is a something like a Soviet-made battery found two miles inland. And when we hear about a frogman and there aren't any (fishing) boats around, that sets the alarm bells ringing."

Other items generating official curiosity include a Soviet liferaft found half-buried above a deserted beach, a Soviet gas mask with filters for a new chemical agent, shoulder board insignia from Soviet uniforms, fuel drums with Soviet markings and fresh boot prints headed inland.

"There have been lots of reports about humans on the island," said 1st Lt. Reuben Nicholson, who commands the island's company of Eskimo scouts. "But the people have run and we could not identify who they are. We know they are not from the island. People on the island do not run from each other."

Nicholson said several American oil companies have interests in the area, and fishermen and crabbers often work their boats just offshore.

"Some of these people may be coming onto the island to pilfer whatever ivory (from walrus) they can find," he said.

"We work just as hard to prove these things erroneous as we do that there were Russians on the mainland," said Nichols. "If I get my hands on a spetsnaz body, then we'll agree that it's a Russian."

Spetsnaz — Voiska Spetsialnovo Naznacheniya — is an elite group equivalent to the U.S. Army's Special Forces.

Unlike several islands in the Aleutians to the south, St. Lawrence has no top-secret military installations or supersensitive equipment that might attract Soviet attention, officials said.

Dear editor:

A problem exists at Hereford High School relative to available parking spaces for students. Partly due to construction activities at the high school, the students are forced to find parking somewhere on the streets of areas adjacent to the high school.

When they don't observe the strict letter of the law prohibiting parking within 30 feet of an intersection, they are ticketed for a parking violation. Not many people are aware of such arcane laws such as this. Thirty feet is a considerable distance, more than is commonly observed anywhere.

I have visited with the principal at the high school and learned that there have been no advisements issued to the students warning them of such violations. There are no markings on the street designating proper parking spaces, nor are there any painted curbs to alert students of encroachment upon prohibited areas.

Designated parking spaces in downtown Hereford are within 20 feet of an intersection. Why can't

Waldheim says he'll hang on despite report of his World War II activities

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — President Kurt Waldheim said he will remain in office, despite a critical report on his World War II activities that has divided the governing coalition over whether he should resign.

Statements by Socialist officials indicated that Waldheim is an increasing burden for the coalition, but the issue seemed far from resolved.

Austria's coalition government is made up of the Socialist Party and the conservative People's Party, which nominated Waldheim for the largely ceremonial post of president.

Prominent Socialists, including Chancellor Franz Vranitzky, refrained on Wednesday from demanding Waldheim's resignation, but indicated they would like to see the president quit.

The chief secretary of the Socialist party, Heinrich Keller, said on Wednesday: "The Socialist party speaks neither for nor against a resignation" but is "ready to accept such a decision."

In an interview Wednesday on Austrian television, Heinz Fischer, the Socialists' parliamentary floor leader, showed his party's uneasiness about Waldheim remaining in office.

"I do not hide the fact that we ... in the coalition, and apparently outside it as well, live with a mortgage," said Fischer, using a German phrase meaning burden or strain. He called for a fresh effort by the coalition partners "to reconsider the whole matter under the aspect of what is best for Austria, for our reputation, for our future policy, for the unencumbered implementation of the government program."

Waldheim was quoted as saying that Hans Rudolf Kurz, the chairman of the commission of historians that probed his wartime past, "has unequivocally stated that there was no culpable conduct on my part and that I was not involved in any war crime actions."

DEAR ANN LANDERS: May I share an experience that may be helpful to others?

I had had it up to here with my local cable company. I'd tune in once in a while just to see what the kids were watching on MTV and I'd go in to shock.

What with the violence, the filthy language and the "star" prancing across the stage with a three-foot-long hot-dog shaped balloon protruding from his pelvis, I finally told my 10-year-old daughter that she could never again watch it. Then I got a look at George Michael's video, "I Want Your Sex," and that was the last straw.

The next day, I telephoned the cable company and demanded that they take MTV off my TV. I was told by a customer service representative that it was part of the basic service and all I could do was not watch the channel. I went back and forth with her for 10 minutes. She kept repeating that nothing could be done.

In desperation, I asked to be put in touch with some sort of parents' advocacy group or an organization that monitored cable TV. After a brief pause, she said, "Just a moment, sir, I'll connect you with repair service."

DEAR DAD: Here it is and I thank for you what may well be a monumental contribution to the parents who read this column.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: My husband's brother and his wife asked him for a \$5,500 loan so they could put a down payment on a house before their first child was born. That was three years ago. We haven't seen a dime since the first (and only) payment of \$250 in March of 1985.

Last week they drove up to see us in their brand-new Oldsmobile. When I saw the car I said, "How beautiful," although I was boiling in-

side. When they left, I told my husband that I thought they had a lot of nerve coming here to shown off their new car when they still owe us \$5,250. DEAR ANN LANDERS: I'm a parent who must send an unaccompanied child (age 8) across the country to spend holidays with his father from whom I am divorced.

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ASK DR. LAMB

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am a 37-year-old woman and I take laxatives every day to keep my weight down. I usually take two or four pills at night. I have lost 20 pounds in about four months. I don't binge on food, so I don't think I'm bulimic.

I want to know if I can get cancer from this. My mother died of cancer of the bowels a few years ago.

DEAR READER: There seems to be a gene that one inherits which increases the risk of colon cancer, so with your family history, you may indeed be more likely to get it. That is why you should be particularly careful to have regular evaluations and checkups for possible early cancer.

But I don't think your laxative habit will cause cancer. There is no evidence that any of the laxatives available have caused colon cancer. They cause a lot of other trouble, particularly an irritable bowel that doesn't function properly. That can lead to persistent constipation problems, difficult bowel movements, abdominal cramping and other symptoms. It is a mistake to take regular laxatives on your own. Their use should be limited to a few temporary situations.

Your weight loss probably has more to do with your not consuming as many calories as you did. Some individuals do take laxatives in the hopes that it will induce weight loss. Scientific studies fail to show that taking laxatives, without also decreasing your calories, has any significant effect in helping people to lose weight. You may have lost some salt and water from your colon, but that is not loss of body fat.

You didn't mention your weight or height. Keep in mind that it is not always healthy to get too thin. Probably at least 10 pounds of your weight loss over the last four months is water loss and emptying your colon, not fat loss.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am having trouble finding information on the cholesterol content of foods. Could you give me some guidelines?

DEAR READER: There is a lot of variation depending on how the food is prepared, but there are some general rules that provide a working basis for estimating the cholesterol in your foods. There is no cholesterol in vegetables, fruits, cereals, or vegetable oils. Cholesterol is an animal product.

For raw, lean meats — including fish, chicken and red meats — in a 3½ ounce (100 gram) portion that is edible (no bone or inedible part) there is about 70 mg of cholesterol. This applies only to muscle fibers such as breast, thigh, or round steak. Organ meats are fairly high. A 100 gram portion of liver contains 300 mg of cholesterol.

Some shellfish are moderately high in cholesterol, with 150 mg for 100 grams of shrimp and 200 for lobster. But 100 grams of oysters contain only about 50 mg of cholesterol.

Egg yolks contain about 220 to 250 mg per yolk. A quart of whole milk contains 140 mg; a quart of 2 percent low-fat milk, 73 mg and a quart of skim milk only 18 mg. A pint of coffee cream contains 300 mg of cholesterol. A 100-gram portion of processed cheese, such as cheddar, contains 100 grams of cholesterol. The same amount of butter contains 220 mg.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have been having terrible cramps every month. I have two children and the youngest is 9. I'm only 31. These terrible pains started about two years ago.

My period comes like clockwork. I don't take any birth control pills. The first few days the pains are so bad I can't walk, eat or do much of anything. My joints ache, mostly the right hip joint. No medicine has been able to cure me.

I have been to several doctors and am taking Ponstel, but it doesn't help those couple of days. My doctor suggested a hysterectomy, but I am afraid. I must make a move, as the monthly cramps hinder me at work and at home. Please suggest

something. Would it be better to — through a hysterectomy and ear, menopause or suffer with cramps? I have been trying to get pregnant the last year, but nothing works. Do you think there is a relation between not being able to get pregnant and my bad cramps?

DEAR READER: Painful menstrual cramps, called dysmenorrhea, can occur in young women who have no disease. This is called primary dysmenorrhea. But they also occur secondary to a variety of diseases. These cramps are called secondary dysmenorrhea. The pain in most cases is caused by a release of a hormonal substance called prostaglandins.

The cells that line the uterus produce a lot of prostaglandins. These cause the constriction of blood vessels that cause the lining of the uterus to stop functioning and to shed — the process of menstruation. The prostaglandins also cause cramping. Medicines to counteract prostaglandins help to relieve the menstrual cramps. These medicines include: Naprosyn, 250 mg three to four times daily; Anaprox, 275 mg three to four times a day; Ponstel, 250 to 500 mg three to four times a day and Motrin 400 to 500 mg four times daily. When one of these doesn't work, another one may be tried. These medicines make it possible for most women to have relief, particularly if the pain is not too severe and if it is primary dysmenorrhea.

A hysterectomy should certainly be the last resort. If these medicines do not work, a better solution is to take oral contraceptives. Not only do they suppress ovulation, but they also limit the growth of the lining of the uterus. That means fewer prostaglandins are formed and there is less chance of pain. Oral contraceptives are successful in managing about 90 percent of the cases of primary dysmenorrhea. Of course, you will not get pregnant while taking oral contraceptives.

If you don't take contraceptives and do get pregnant, naturally you will be free of the problem for the duration of your pregnancy.

Difficulty in getting pregnant can be part of primary dysmenorrhea, but it also may suggest that you have endometriosis — which can cause secondary dysmenorrhea. This is caused by the endometrium — the cells lining the uterus — being displaced, to the tubes, ovaries and other parts of the body. When these displaced cells undergo changes during menstruation, the area bleeds and causes pain.

Some of these cases can be treated medically (Danazol, 200 mg two to four times daily, or the use of oral contraceptives). But in other cases, it is necessary to have surgery to remove the displaced tissue. This tissue can block a woman's tubes and cause infertility. The surgery does not always have to be a total hysterectomy. With this information in mind, clarify with your doctor what you have and what is causing it, before deciding on an operation.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I was discussing problems in getting pregnant with my friend and she said some women are allergic to their husband's sperm and that is the reason they can't get pregnant. I've never heard of such a thing. Wouldn't a woman know if she were having an allergic reaction? If a woman is allergic to sperm, what can be done about it?

DEAR READER: Yes, a woman can be allergic to her husband's sperm and not know it. The antisperm reaction results in inactivating the sperm cells rather than causing some allergic reaction like a rash. The only real indication is infertility. This is thought to occur in about 10 percent of all infertile couples.

The sperm cells are a foreign body and the woman's immune system has developed antibodies to them. It is a lot like rejecting a transplanted organ. But a number of women with such sperm antibodies still get pregnant.

Both detection of the problem and its treatment leave a lot to be desired. The oldest method of treatment involves using a condom to prevent any of the husband's semen from coming in contact with the woman for a prolonged period of time.

But snoring can be a sign of serious sleep disorder called sleep apnea, says Dr. Donald Greenblatt, who teaches at the University of Rochester.

While not every snorer has sleep apnea, those who do stop breathing for short periods, Greenblatt says. As the oxygen level drops, the body's defense mechanism "wakes up" the snorer to get him breathing again. The snorer may not recall being aroused hundreds of times during the night, but typically feels worn out and drowsy the next day — even after a full night's sleep.

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Romantic dinner for two inspired by Cupid

(AUSTIN)—Before spring ever dons its leafy dress, romance soars into the air aboard an arrow let loose from Cupid's bow. Perhaps this brief reprieve striking the heart of mid-winter is a reminder of the days ahead when the earth explodes into blossom and youth's fancy turns to love.

Valentine's Day, the honoring of romantic love, probably descended from Lupercalia, a Roman festival given for Rome's version of the Greek god, Pan. Celebrated in February at the end of the Roman year, Lupercalia wore the aura of romance and a new beginning. In one observance, young men drew names of young women from a box. People so matched were considered partners for the new year.

The Christian feast of St. Valentine is as much a product of myth as the Roman festival. Valentine probably was a martyr, either a young man jailed for his religious beliefs or a bishop, put to death Feb. 14. As one legend goes, the young Roman left a farewell note for his jailer's daughter, signing it "from your Valentine." Thus was born the first Valentine card.

As time moved on, Valentine's Day became first a religious holiday and then a day honoring love and lovers. Cupid acquired new power to transfix hearts, and ribbons, frills, sweets and flowers were exchanged.

In today's world, roses and heart-shaped boxes of candy do as much to acknowledge romance on Feb. 14 as any other gifts. But the woman intent on snaring a beau and the man wishing to woo a lady often take the opportunity a step further with an intimate dinner for two.

Though cooking for someone you wish to impress can be stressful, careful planning will make it less so. A good rule of thumb: Keep it simple and romantic. "Choose recipes that are impressive but easy to cook. Do as much work ahead of time as possible so you will appear unruffled when your guest arrives—as if you whip up elegant meals at the drop of a hat," said Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) home economist Carol Guthrie.

Guthrie suggests a menu of mainly Texas products including tender beef filets, rice simmered with green onions and fresh mushrooms and a crisp spinach and citrus salad. (Forgive the souffles, Sam Houston. Chocolate is a "must" for Valentine's Day.)

She recommends starting as many dishes as possible early in the day. Rice can be boiled and set aside, spinach can be washed and chilled, dressing made, cream whipped and chocolate sauce prepared. Steaks must be cooked at the last minute and the souffles popped in the oven after the main course has ended. Serve dinner with an icy bottle of champagne or a good Texas wine. St. Valentine will bless you.

1/2 C. orange sections
1/2 C. grapefruit sections

Combine first six ingredients in small bowl to make dressing. Chill. At serving time put spinach and citrus sections in a bowl. Toss with desired amount of dressing. Makes 2 servings.

CANDLELIGHT CHOCOLATE SOUFFLES

2 T. milk
1 tsp. cornstarch
1 (1 oz.) sq. chopped semi-sweet chocolate
1 1/2 tsp. instant coffee dissolved in 1 T. boiling water
1 tsp. orange liqueur
1 T. plus 1 tsp. sugar, divided
1 tsp. unsalted butter
1 egg yolk at room temperature

2 egg whites at room temperature
Dash cream of tartar
1/2 C. heavy cream, lightly whipped with sugar and vanilla

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Butter two 3/4-cup souffle dishes. Sprinkle with sugar, tilting to coat and shaking out any excess. Mix milk and cornstarch in very small, heavy saucepan. Place over medium heat and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to boil and thickens. Remove from heat and stir in chocolate until melted. Whisk in coffee and orange liqueur until blended. Whisk 1 tablespoon sugar, butter and egg yolk until smooth; set aside. (Chocolate mixture may be covered and held several hours at room temperature, if desired. Reheat slightly before using.) Beat egg whites in small bowl on low speed until foamy. Add cream of tartar and beat on high speed until soft peaks form. Add 1 teaspoon sugar and continue beating until whites form firm but very moist peaks. Pour chocolate mixture over whites and fold together quickly and lightly until only a few streaks of white remain. Do not overmix. Spoon into prepared souffle dishes to about 1/4 inch from top. Place on baking sheet and bake 10 minutes or until souffles have risen well above rim of dishes and shake slightly when jiggled. Serve immediately with softly whipped cream. Makes 2 servings.

Q. What's the best pan shape for microwaving? B.P., Yakima, WA
A. A ring shape promotes even cooking of foods that won't be stirred during cooking—cakes, breads, muffins. The microwaves penetrate food from the center, sides, top and bottom more evenly than with a square or rectangular pan.

Q. I'm on a low cholesterol diet. Will making soup stock from beef bones contribute cholesterol to my diet? W.K., Chicago, IL.

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A. Yes, but only in small amounts generally within guidelines of low cholesterol diets. The beef bones, however, must be well trimmed of fat and meat, since meat is marbled with fat.

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Names In The News

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actress Gale Storm, who played "My Little Margie" in the 1950s television show, plans to marry former ABC executive Paul C. Masterson in April.

Masterson, president of the Permanent Charities Committee of the Entertainment Industries, and Miss Storm announced their plans Tuesday through spokesman Phil Krieger.

The couple, who met last August at a dinner party, will be married April 23 at the South Shores Baptist Church in Laguna Niguel, Krieger said. It will be the second marriage for each.

Miss Storm, 56, appeared in "My Little Margie" on CBS and NBC in the early 1950s and "Oh Susanna," which was renamed "The Gale Storm Show" on CBS, in the late 1950s. ABC acquired the rights to the show in 1959 and kept it on the air until 1960.

Masterson, whose age was not given, was West Coast vice president of administration for ABC before taking over the entertainment industry's umbrella charity arm.

Miss Storm has four children from her previous marriage. Masterson has three.

LONDON (AP) — "Hope and Glory," John Boorman's autobiographical movie about London during World War II, dominated the nominations for the 1987 awards from the British Academy of Film and Television Arts.

The movie, a hopeful in next week's Oscar nominations, took 13 of the 68 nominations in 17 categories announced Tuesday, including best picture, Boorman for best director and Sarah Miles for best actress.

Winners in the craft division will be announced March 13. Those in production and performance will be announced March 20.

PHILADELPHIA (PA) — Composer Henry Mancini and four music companies dropped a \$10,000 copyright lawsuit after a tavern agreed to buy a \$500 music license.

Mancini, Northridge Music Co., Jerry Leiber Music, Mike Stoller Music and SBK Catalogue Inc. sued The Fun House of Bethlehem last November, accusing the bar of failing to buy a permit to allow local bands to perform popular songs.

The plaintiffs dropped the suit Tuesday after bar owners Christopher and Tina Kowalski agreed to purchase the \$500 license from the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, as required by federal copyright laws.

"First, we didn't know we had to pay ASCAP to play the music," Mrs. Kowalski said. "Then, we never know all the music the bands are going to play, anyway. More than half the time, it's original stuff."

Mrs. Kowalski said ASCAP agents investigated The Fun House last July when a band known as The Vultures performed "Peter Gunn," a Mancini score.

The Fun House's lawyer, Charles Osinski, said he considered the settlement fair.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Boy Scouts of America praised Nancy Reagan for her battle against drug abuse by presenting the first lady with the organization's highest award for volunteer service to youth. President Reagan placed the

beribboned Silver Buffalo award on Mrs. Reagan's shoulders Tuesday in an Oval Office ceremony attended by top Boy Scout officials and a half-dozen Scouts from around the country, the White House said.

Mrs. Reagan is the first wife of a sitting president to receive the award, said her spokeswoman, Elaine Crispin.

The Silver Buffalo, which Reagan received in 1983, was established in 1926 to recognize those who have made an outstanding contribution to the nation's youth.

NEW YORK (AP) — Eleven American states are named after famous men and women, but only one of them was American-born.

Delaware was named for the British governor of Virginia, Thomas West, Baron De La Warr. Georgia was named after King George II. Louisiana commemorates Louis XIV of France.

New York took its name from England's James, Duke of York and Albany. North and South Carolina were named for King Charles I. Pennsylvania was named after Admiral Sir William Penn, father of William Penn.

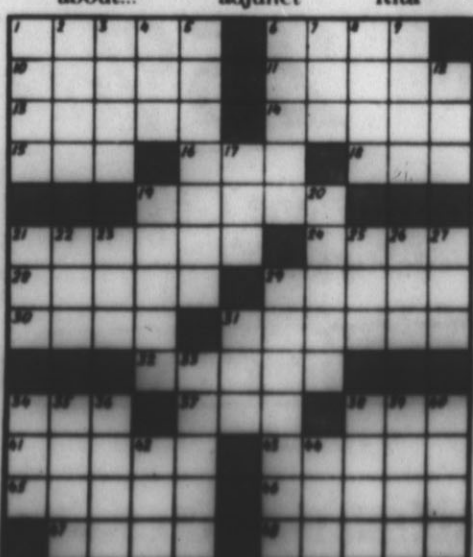

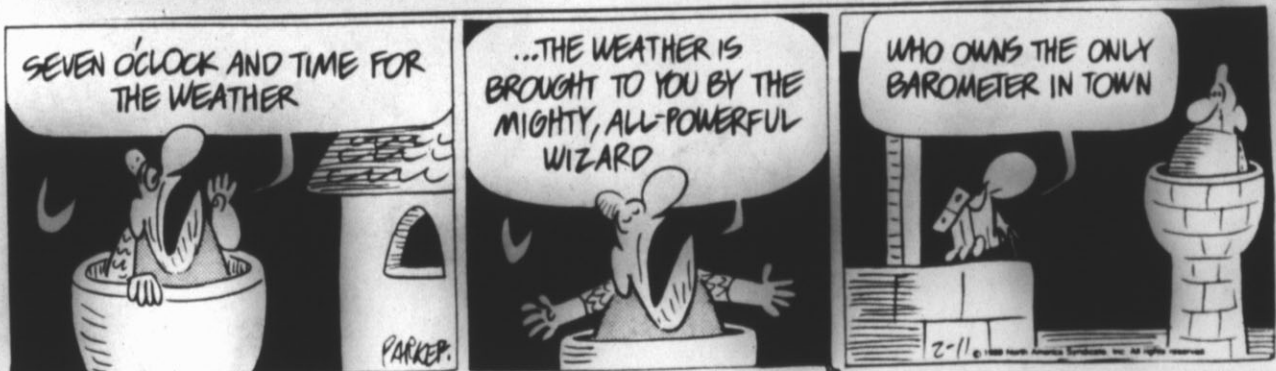

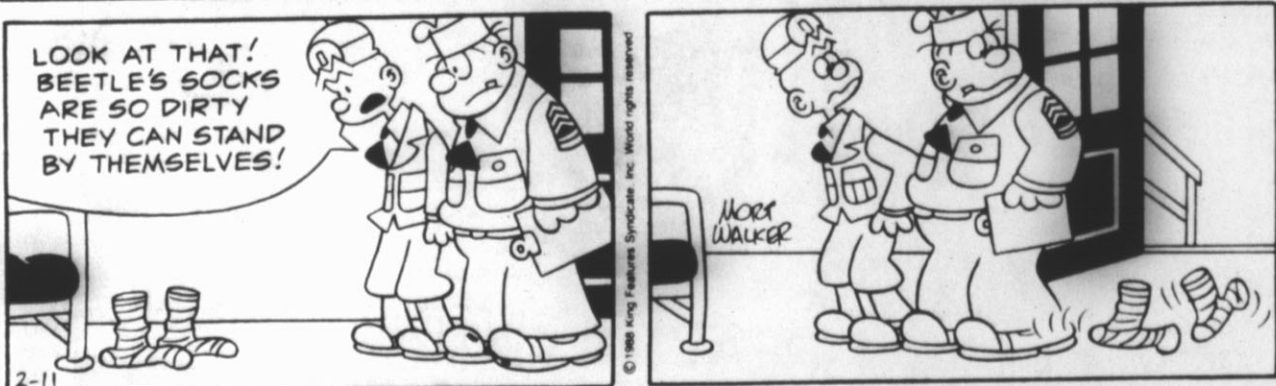

Temple 'proves' its ranking by defeating Villanova

For Temple to prove it belonged at the top of the Top 20, the Owls needed the right opponent.

"People have been saying that we've beaten hash-house teams and Villanova had beaten some good teams," Temple's Howard Evans said. "So we wanted to show we could beat them. We wanted Villanova badly."

Evans had a school-record 20 assists and 17 points and freshman Mark Macon scored 31 Wednesday night as No. 1 Temple beat No. 20 Villanova 96-86.

Temple, promoted to the top spot this week, got its first victory of the season against a ranked team. The Owls lost by one point at Nevada-Las Vegas in their only other game versus a Top 20 opponent.

Villanova led 65-61 with 10:42 left before Temple responded with a 10-2 burst. The Owls made 14 foul shots in the final 1:50 to preserve the victory over their Philadelphia Big 5 rivals.

"We showed our character in coming back," Coach John Chaney said of his Owls, 19-1, after their 79th victory in the last 81 games at McGonigle Hall.

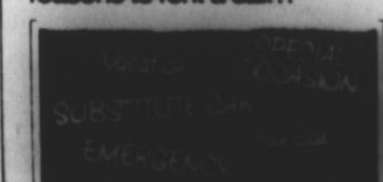

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After losing to Dallas on Tuesday, 124-93

Different Jazz team beats Mavericks 93-80

It was a different Utah team that beat Dallas 93-80 Wednesday night than it was that lost in Dallas the night before, said Jazz Coach Frank Layden.

Thurl Bailey scored 24 points and Karl Malone added 20 points and 13 rebounds to lead the Utah offense Wednesday night.

The Mavericks played without high-scoring forward Mark Aguirre, who sprained an ankle in Dallas' 124-93 victory over Utah on Tuesday.

In his absence, the Mavericks' starting front line of Detlef Schrempf, Sam Perkins and James Donaldson went 3-for-23 from the field. Rolando Blackman led the Mavericks with 18 points, and Roy Tarpley added 16 points and 17 rebounds.

"There's no doubt the loss of Aguirre hurt them," Layden said. "I'm not foolish enough to believe it didn't. But that was a different Jazz team you saw tonight, too. It was a team that was aggressive. It was a team that played smart."

"I really believe we would have beaten them tonight with or without Aguirre," Layden said.

"We played defense tonight, as opposed to last night," Utah's Mark Eaton said. "We played moving defense instead of standing defense."

The Mavericks hit 35 percent Wednesday night, compared to 52 percent Tuesday night.

"Our offense never came around," said Derek Harper, who was 6 for 16 for the Mavericks. "Our offense struggled all night, and, as a result, they won the game."

John Stockton had 13 points and 16 assists for the Jazz. Kelly Tripucka scored 15 points, including 10 in the first quarter, but left the game midway through the third quarter with a strained muscle in his right calf.

The Jazz led 44-27 late in the second period, but Dallas closed the gap to 62-57 on a pair of free throws by Tarpley at the end of the third period.

But the Jazz scored the first seven points of the final quarter, and with 8:49 remaining, Stockton scored, was fouled and converted the free throw to put Utah up 72-58. The closest Dallas could get after that was nine points.

"We just wanted to come out in (the fourth quarter) and pick up the tempo," Bailey said. "It'd been kind of lopsided the whole game. But right there we got after it."

Utah led 26-14 after a quarter. Bailey scored 10 points in the second quarter as the Jazz maintained its 12-point margin and ended the half with a 46-34 advantage.

In other games, it was New Jersey 93, Chicago 84; Cleveland 118, Washington 102; Detroit 98, New York 87; and Boston 136, San Antonio 120.

Celtics 136, Spurs 120

The San Antonio Spurs learned that when Boston's Larry Bird is hot, he's tough to stop.

Bird scored 18 of his 39 points in the third quarter Wednesday as the Celtics beat the Spurs 136-120.

Bird also led rebounders with 17, all on defense, and had 10 assists.

Boston, down by as many as 12 points in the first half, came back to a 72-68 deficit at halftime.

Bird, scored 14 points in the first half, then came out of the locker room on a hot streak.

"The first half we really didn't play our level," said Bird, who scored four three-point goals. "The second half we opened up and got it going once our shots started to fall. We played Celtic basketball in the second half."

Alvin Robertson, who was guarding Bird and who led Spurs scorers with 32, said Bird was too much.

"Bird is an established player. Boston gets calls and you have to know that going into the game," Robertson said. "It's not just Larry who gets the calls."

With 7:45 left in the third quarter and Boston up 81-76 Bird went on a roll, scoring 11 consecutive points while the Spurs only managed to score 8, giving Boston a 92-84 lead.

Boston increased the lead to as many as 17 points in the final period.

Kevin McHale scored 27 points and Robert Parish had 26 for Boston.

Mike Mitchell came off the bench to score 25 and Johnny Dawkins had 20.

"Bird getting on that hot streak was the difference tonight,"

Dawkins said. "He is an incredible player. We ran guys at him and double teamed him and he still hit the shot or found someone open."

The Spurs took the early lead and led by as many as 12 in the second quarter before the Celtics closed the

gap to 72-68 at halftime.

Mitchell, who scored 19 points in the first half, was shut down in the second half when he scored only 6 points.

Boston coach K.C. Jones said he did not make any unusual speeches

at halftime.

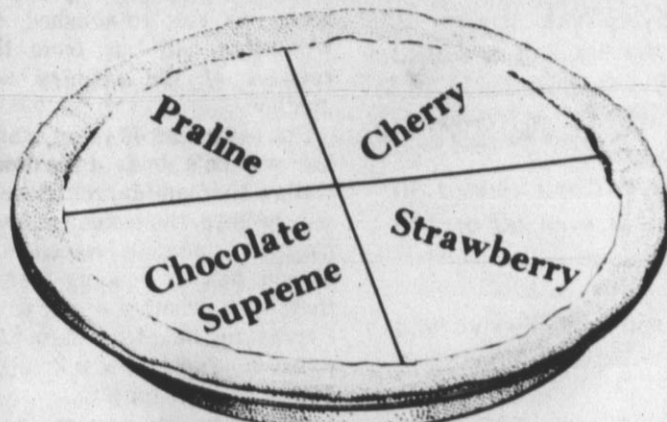
"It took a while for us to wake up," Jones said. "Larry really went off the deep end tonight. We never get tired of watching him. Everything he threw up went in."

San Antonio coach Bob Weiss said Bird was unstoppable.

"When he hits a stretch like that there's not much we can do," Weiss said. "What really hurt us though, we panicked in trying to stop Larry."
