TOWERS DIES AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

The entire community was greatly shocked on last Saturday morning by the death of one of our best citizens, James B. Towers. His was a very short duration, taking to his bed only on last Friday with what seemed to be just a cold. On Thursday the case developed into pneumonia and the same early Saturday morning. Towers was born near Boston, Massachusetts on August 20, 1867 and died on December 30, 1922.

Mr. Towers has been a resident of Perryton for only a year, during this short time he has made a host of acquaintances and he was engaged in the painting business and was an expert sign painter. During the time that he had been in business he had built up a very lucrative patronage. Prior to moving to Perryton Mr. Towers and family had resided in Spearman and in Hansford, Texas.

Mr. Towers was married a number of years ago to Miss Persephone Towers of Hansford County, who was the daughter of one of our fellow townsmen, Mr. W. Wilbanks. To this union were born three little girls, two of whom are living, Colleen and Rhoda. The little girl, Arnett, died at the age of eighteen months and is buried in the Ochiltree Cemetery. Mr. Towers was a member of the Methodist Church and led a very devout Christian life. If all of us could live as good a life as he then this would be a better place in which to live. The funeral was held at the Methodist Church on Sunday afternoon. Rev. Sweeney of Canadian had charge of the services and preached a very beautiful sermon. The pall bearers were all brothers of Mr. Towers. Burial was by the side of his daughter in the Ochiltree Cemetery. FLORENCE COPELAND

FARM PRODUCTS SHIPPED FROM PERRYTON

During the year of 1922 a total of 821 car loads of farm products was shipped from the Perryton station alone. This does not include the shipments from the Wawaka and Farnsworth stations which are billed through the Perryton depot. One of the most satisfying reports is in the hog and chicken shipments. Carload shipments of hogs were practically double the output of 1921. The poultry shipments also were about double. The broom corn market showed a very substantial increase. Cattle shipments were not quite as heavy as last year and the small grain crop was also lighter. Total shipments as follows:

SOLD THE DEPUTY A HALF GALEON

Andy Hargis and Dan Staten were arrested last Friday morning on the charge of selling liquor, and were later fined fifty dollars each and given a jail sentence of thirty days, which they are serving. In addition to their fines imprisonment, their Ford car, in which they carried liquor, was confiscated, and sold for \$150.00, which was appropriated by the state. One of these parties sold Deputy Dallas Lewter, of the sheriff's office, a half gallon of his home brew, furnishing direct evidence of their guilt.

Homer Long of Texhoma, is also in the county jail awaiting the next term of court, on the charge of having liquor in his possession and selling a half gallon to the wrong party.

W. R. Roberts is another liquor law violator, out on bond, the officers having found six and one-half gallons of whiskey buried in his yard, twenty miles northwest of Guyton. The officers were unable to locate the still in which it was supposed to have been brewed.—Guyton Herald.

THE SKIM MILK

The profit or loss from an enterprise is frequently determined by the disposition of the by-products. Dairymen should bear this in mind when disposing of their skim milk. Sometimes the returns from the judicious feeding of this by-product to calves, hogs or chickens, and the sale of butterfat, yield more than the sale of whole milk.—The Dairy Farmer.

TURKEY CROP IS MONEY CROP

The turkey crop of this section has been exceedingly large this year. The two local produce houses have done a big business as turkey buyers this year. About thirty-six hundred head of turkeys have been killed and dressed on the local market. The total weight was about 50, 200 pounds being bought from the growers for something close to \$17, 300. The two houses here paid out a total of about \$550 for picking locally, and about \$360 for local freight. This means that better than \$18,000 was brought into the country by the turkey business this year as the above figures were made for the Thanksgiving and Christmas buying periods. Besides the stuff listed above the Faust and McMillan Produce Company bought turkeys at McLean and to be counted off the above number is about 500 head bought at Mobeetie by the Wheeler Produce Company and killed and dressed at Wheeler.

It is a conservative estimate to say that twenty thousand dollars was brought into Wheeler by the turkey business when the buyers profit is added to the above figures.—Wheeler News Review.

A REAL GAS WELL NORTH OF TEXHOMA

A representative of the Texhoma Times inspected the gas well that has recently been brought in five miles north of Texhoma. This well has been known as the Allison Test Well the past eighteen months, and a strong flow of gas was discovered at a depth of 2,695 feet. The other night while we were there the gas was turned on full blast, and it had such tremendous force that it was deafening. Then they lighted a pipe leading from the well, which shot a gigantic blaze into the air, there being at least forty feet of fire. Men who are familiar with gas wells say that this well will provide ample gas to provide fuel for drilling in the field here indefinitely, besides it would be sufficient to supply two or three towns the size of Texhoma. Considering all this, this well in our opinion has been a grand success, even though an oil gusher was not discovered. Mr. Allison states that just as soon as the leases can be extended the second well will be started.—Texhoma Times.

CANADIAN WILL HAVE GIN; BIG ACREAGE SUBSCRIBED

At a meeting of the citizens of Canadian on Tuesday, Dec. 26, in Judge W. D. Fisher's office, practically all arrangements were made for getting 5,000 acres of cotton signed up tributary to Canadian. Proper seed will be bought for planting, and a modern gin will be installed. A field man is signing up the acreage now and is meeting with splendid success. At the next regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, Jan. 9th, it is hoped that all arrangements will be satisfactorily closed for a good cotton crop for Hemphill County.—Canadian Record.

TO CELEBRATE SPUDDING IN OF NEW WELL

At a very enthusiastic meeting of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce it was decided that Perryton would provide a big free dinner at the spudding of the Empire No. 1. This new well which is located in what is now known as the Perryton Field will be spudded in on Tuesday, January 16th. Arrangements are being made to feed thousands of people on that day. It will be an event long to be remembered in the history of this country.

The Empire No. 1 is located 18 miles northwest of Perryton and is on the N. E. quarter of Sec. 6, Township 1, Range 21, Beaver County, Oklahoma. It is 2 1/2 miles north of the Ragdale Store. A large block of land in this vicinity has been blocked by L. S. Hobbs and M. R. Coffee of this city. The contract for the drilling of this well was made through the agency of Hastie and Smith of Wichita with the Empire Oil and Gas Co. of Bartlesville, Oklahoma. The Empire Company is one of the largest concerns in the oil business and there is no doubt but what that they will give the territory a thorough test. The geologist in charge of the operations for this test was Hamilton E. Anderson of Wichita, Kansas. Mr. Anderson is an old experienced man in the oil business and is well known as a very successful geologist. His work was checked and approved by Mr. Kautz, the Assistant Chief Geologist of the Empire Company.

The drilling of the well will be under the supervision of Walter Harding of Bartlesville, Oklahoma. A crew of the Empire rig builders from Eldorado, Kansas are now on the location. They will have the derrick erected and the bunk houses all completed in ample time for the test to be spudded in on the 16th of this month. The tank builders are also here to erect the fuel and water tanks. A two inch water line one and one-half miles in length has been laid, which will supply an adequate water supply. The rig which is being erected is a Standard with equipment to go 4000 feet if necessary. Operations will start with a 22" hole.

GREATER PROSPERITY FOR 1923

Secretary Herbert Hoover, perhaps the most authentic and analytical observer of world and domestic economics, says business and industry can regard the last year with satisfaction and look forward to continued prosperity during the first months of 1923. Various federal bureaus and departments, with a most convincing array of figures, set forth the increased industrial activity, the higher prices received by farmers, and a decline in food prices.

There is hardly a discordant note in this general song of prosperity. Only one thing is mentioned which is not as it should be—the prevalent car shortage. While conditions today are no doubt uniformly better than they have been since the period of depression, they have become so in spite of the transportation situation and not because of it.

Over the same wire with Hoover's statement came news of a coal famine in New York while the city is threatened by a blizzard. What is the reason? There is an abundance of coal in the ground and there is a tremendous demand for coal every where.

Yet in the coal fields of southeastern Kansas, for example, the mine whistles are not blowing every morning because there are not sufficient cars to deliver the coal after it is mined.

While New York shivers, and while various other parts of the country are dangerously near a coal shortage, miners are idling away their time because the American transportation system is not capable of taking care of the demands on it.

The whole nation may well be gratified at Mr. Hoover's message of optimism. But it remains a fact readily apparent that this country will never enjoy prosperity to its fullest extent and industry will never be expanded to its maximum until there is a transportation system capable of handling the nation's needs.

Railroads are absolute essentials to such a system, but their service always will be handicapped when they are subjected to injudicious and inconsistent regulation by the government. Another essential is great motor truck lines, hauling farm products at a minimum cost. A still greater essential is the improvement of inland waterways—the navigation of the Missouri and the completion of the Great Lakes St. Lawrence project.

The official survey of the situation is encouraging. A still more optimistic report will be possible once the nation is relieved of its present transportation shortcomings.

DAIRY FACTS

PRACTICE OF PASTEURIZING

Dealers Know That Milk So Treated Keeps Better and Prevents Spread of Disease.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The practice of pasteurizing milk is growing rapidly in the cities of this country, as shown by figures collected by the United States Department of Agriculture. Through pressure of health departments and through voluntary action by milk dealers, plant after plant has been switched over from raw milk. It is now generally recognized by those who have studied the problems of milk supply, that proper pasteurization does not injure the chemical or nutritive properties of milk, and that it does destroy all bacteria that may produce disease. Milk dealers know that milk so treated keeps better and satisfies customers, and that it prevents outbreaks of disease which might cast discredit on their product and injure their business.

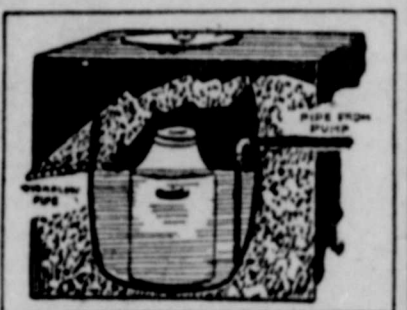
With these facts in mind it is easy to see why the practice has grown. In 1915 only 77.8 per cent of the cities with population of more than 500,000 reported more than half of their milk pasteurized, while in 1921 every city in this class had a milk supply more than 50 per cent of which was pasteurized. In 1915 more than 10 per cent of the cities of 75,000 to 100,000 people had no pasteurized milk, but during the past year all of them had some part of the supply pasteurized. The increase in pasteurization in small cities is particularly striking. Take, for example, those from 10,000 to 25,000 population. In 1915 about 40 per cent had pasteurized milk, but in 1921 nearly 61 per cent had it. Even in cities below 10,000 population pasteurization is becoming more common.

KEEP CREAM DURING SUMMER

If Cooled to 50 Degrees Promptly After Separating It Will Keep Several Days.

The dairyman must figure a way to keep the cream in good condition during the hot weather months. There is always someone saying "cream can't be kept sweet very long during the summer months," but it has been proven that cream cooled to 50 degrees shortly after separating can be kept sweet for several days. To accomplish this, it is necessary to have a cooling tank. Such tanks may be bought from the dairy supply houses, but if only a small quantity of cream is produced a homemade tank will do the trick. This tank is made as follows:

Take a water barrel and around it make a box about 3 feet square by about the height of the barrel. Insert a pipe leading from the pump into the

barrel extending to the bottom. An overflow pipe is then placed on the opposite side of the barrel leading to the outside of the box. This overflow pipe should be placed as high as the neck of a large cream can. The intake pipe from the pump should extend to the bottom of the barrel as the warm water then rises and overflows.

The space between the box and the barrel is filled with sawdust or other insulator and the box finally covered to the edge of the barrel. A close fitting lid is then placed over the top of the barrel and completes the tank. When a partly filled can is set down a stick across the barrel above the can will help to hold it down.—A Miller, in the Farm and Home.

METHOD OF RAISING CALVES

Most Economical to Make Use of Good Calf Meal on Farms Where Whole Milk is Sold.

Where whole milk is sold, undoubtedly the most economical method of raising calves is by the use of a good calf meal. Calves that have been raised properly on calf meal make just as good cows as those raised on whole milk or skim milk.

When Cow Holds Milk.
When a cow persists in holding her milk, a common remedy is to attempt to divert her attention from the operation of milking by providing some tempting food.

Drawback to Dairy.
Perhaps the greatest drawback to the dairy business is that a cow will produce a little milk, no matter what she is fed. Too many dairymen are satisfied with that little bit.

Methods Work Well.
The methods aren't the same, but one works as well as the other—culling hens and culling cows.

Be Regular With Calves.
Be regular in the various operations performed in caring for the calves.

\$1,441,486 A YEAR'S
DISASTER RELIEF COST

Red Cross Aided 145,000 Victims in United States—Losses Total \$30,000,000.

Seventy-two disasters, with hundreds reported killed and injured, and more than 145,000 either homeless or requiring assistance, called for emergency relief measures and the expenditure of \$1,441,486.36 by the American Red Cross during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, according to a statement based on the forthcoming annual report of the Red Cross. The greatest toll of life was taken by hurricane and tornado, while the overflowing of rivers, the breaking of dams and torrential rains drove the greatest number of people from their homes. The property loss was estimated at more than \$30,000,000.

The year's disasters reported included twenty-six floods, nineteen tornadoes, fifteen fires, four epidemics, two theatre collapses, two shipwrecks (one an airship), and a bridge collapse, mine explosion, railway collision, and a drought. Of the floods in the United States that at San Antonio, Texas, caused the greatest property loss, \$6,000,000 and the high mark of fatalities, 100, while the flood in the vicinity of Vicksburg and Natchez, Miss., forced 31,000 persons from their homes.

A National Calamity

In the Red Cross disaster relief records there will probably remain for many years one calamity which touched nearly every state with a sense of horror and of loss. This was the distressing collapse of the roof of the Knickerbocker Theatre in Washington, D. C., resulting in ninety-six deaths and 125 persons injured. Situated in the center of the beautiful Northwest residential section, this motion picture theatre was patronized by many persons of prominence both in the official and civil life of the National Capital, whose family and personal connections radiated out over the entire country. The horror was intensified by a terrific snowstorm which, though it retarded, did not block Red Cross relief.

Airship Crash Finds Aid at Hand

The crash and destruction of the U. S. Army's large airship Roma in Virginia last February with the loss of 31 officers and men and 11 injured was the first disaster of its kind to call for Red Cross relief in this country. The suddenness of the accident tested the preparedness of the organization and of the Chapter at Hampton, Va., but the response was immediate and relief furnished the survivors, also funds for the expenses of relatives of the dead who came from long distances to claim their own.

In the year's overseas record for aid rendered by the Red Cross are two fires in the Philippines, one in Manila, which destroyed 1,000 homes, with a loss of \$1,500,000 and 5,000 persons made homeless, the other at Tonio, which drove 3,000 from their dwellings. In medical relief that was quick and effective the smallpox epidemic in San Domingo, which had a total of 22,000 cases with 225 deaths in a single day, tested the readiness of the Red Cross for action, and the same can be said of the San Domingo hurricane, which killed 12 persons and reduced the homes of 182 persons to wreckage. A flood in San Salvador, with a death toll of 50 and 2,000 refugees, was also effectively handled by the local Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Relief Machinery Perfected

The year has seen the further perfection of disaster relief administrative measures in every field of American Red Cross activity, and that the work may be carried on to still greater accomplishments the American Red Cross is appealing for widespread renewal of membership during the annual Roll Call, to be conducted this year from Armistice Day (November 11) to, and including, Thanksgiving Day (November 30).

ORDINANCE

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY FOR A SPECIAL ACT OF THE LEGISLATURE AT ITS NEXT REGULAR SESSION CONVENING IN THE CITY OF AUSTIN, TEXAS, JANUARY, 1923, RELATIVE TO CERTAIN CHANGES IN THE STREETS AND PLAT OF THE CITY OF PERRYTON, TEXAS.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That the City of Perryton, in Ochiltree County, Texas, will apply for a special Act of the Legislature at the next regular session thereof convening in the City of Austin, Texas, January, 1923, after thirty days from the first publication of this notice, giving and granting to said city authority to close and reduce certain streets situated in and shown upon the plat of said city as dedicated to public use, as follows:

FIRST—To reduce the street on the west side of Block No. 40 in said city known as "West Main Court" to alley 20 feet in width and establishing the property line at the center of said alley, and to widen Main Street through said block 40 to 125 feet from property line to property line, the center of said street being the center of said block No. 40, and to adjudge all that part of said Block No. 40 west of said Main Street after passing through said block to be a part of Block No. 39, and to plat that part of said Block No. 39 as thus established into town lots to conform to all other blocks and lots in said town situated on said Main Street.

HomeTown Helps

BRING INDUSTRIES TO CITY

Wideawake Communities Realize the Value of Having the Best of Civic Institutions.

"Industry has come to recognize the commercial value of good schools, good housing, good planting, good churches and good health," B. Letcher Lambuth told fellow realtors at an industrial property conference at the national real estate convention in San Francisco.

"All of these," Mr. Lambuth said, "are safeguarded in the model industrial city. Gary schools are not only model educational institutions; they are a profitable investment, as far as the steel corporation contributes, directly or indirectly, to their construction and maintenance."

"Cities of this character are sometimes built to house the labor of a great industrial corporation, as in the case of Gary and Granite City; sometimes to develop business for a railroad, as in Kingsport, Tenn. Equal or greater, perhaps, in magnitude, although differing in scope, are the central industrial district and the clearing industrial district in Chicago and North Kansas City, Mo."

"Each of these, and many others with which I am not familiar, are major real estate operations which, in the end when properly designed and administered, will rival in interest and sometimes in profit the original operation which they were designed to supplement and serve."

"Their great interest lies in the fact that they isolate and demonstrate the factors which make for the success of commercial and industrial cities."

"Permanent and productive industry is a combination of capital, labor and management. Management selects a location where raw materials may be assembled, manufactured and marketed most conveniently and profitably. Commerce and business serve industry."

"Cities are trade centers, points where raw materials may be assembled, manufactured and marketed with the greatest convenience and economy. There capital and labor and management congregate."

"The prosperity and growth of cities depend upon their ability to attract and sustain business, commerce and industry."

ATTRACTED BY ZONED TOWN

Statistics Show That the Idea Has Gone Far Beyond the Status of Experiment.

To avoid the common condition that industrial plants encounter of having to do business on a "residential basis," denied large-scale facilities in their vicinity on account of protests by residence owners, Alameda, Calif., with other cities, has established industrial zones in which no new permits to build residences will be granted. A leading municipal engineer is quoted as saying that the prohibition of residences in industrial zones is one of the most important protections to put in a zoning ordinance. This method is being used on to develop Hoboken, N. J., as a great industrial terminal.

In New Jersey it has been found that the unzoned suburban town is at a distinct disadvantage as compared with the community protected by a zoning ordinance. People are asking themselves why they should invest money in a home or lend money on a mortgage in an unprotected, unzoned locality. The zoned towns are actually absorbing the better grade of development. The result has been that builders, architects and real-estate owners in unzoned towns persistently urge their local councils to adopt zoning, so that they may have as good a selling proposition to offer prospective clients as their competitors in the zoned towns.

Information concerning zoning progress in states and cities of the United States has been made available by the division of building and housing of the Department of Commerce at Washington, D. C. A selected bibliography of zoning is issued by the division and may be obtained on application.

Making a Lawn.

The use of a light sprinkling of nitrate on the lawn is the best and quickest way to produce a luxuriant stand of blue-green sward early in the season. The action of the nitrate of soda may be noted if a lump of the nitrate is dropped on the lawn. In a short time it will be observed that there will be a tuft of thicker, ranker growth about this spot. The main design in sprinkling nitrate upon the lawn should be in even distribution.

Speaking Movies.

Speaking movies on a new principle, said to be not unlike the transmission of photographs over telegraph lines, are being produced in Germany. Light waves are converted into sound waves and amplified.

New Alloy.

Aluminum with 11 to 14 per cent of silicon yields an alloy which is lighter than aluminum itself, stronger, more resistant, and more suitable for casting than known aluminum alloys.

GOOD HIGHWAYS

ROAD WAGES ARE DECREASED

Bureau of Public Roads Prepares Chart Giving Interesting Study of Conditions.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

A chart prepared by the bureau of public roads of the United States Department of Agriculture showing the trend of common labor wages on highway construction in various geographical divisions since 1915 presents an interesting study of conditions during the period. The price per hour which in 1915 ranged from 12 cents to 28 cents, gradually rose to from 31 to 62 cents in 1920 and has now declined to from 15 to 47 cents. At the present time the prices are as follows: 15 cents in the South Atlantic states, 18 cents in the states east of and bordering the Ohio and Mississippi rivers and including Alabama, 24 cents in the Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Louisiana group, 26 cents in the states included between the Ohio and Mississippi rivers, 29 cents in the states from Kansas and Missouri to the Canadian border, 36 cents in the mountain states and 47 cents in the Pacific states. Figures for the New England and Middle Atlantic states have not yet been completed.

On the chart referred to the lines showing the trend in the various divisions have the same general rise and fall and cross each other in only a few cases, a particular exception being in the states from Kansas and Missouri north to the border, where the highest rate of all the groups prevailed up to 1920 and which has since shown the most marked decrease, dropping from 62 cents in 1920 to 29 cents in March.

SURVEYS LESSEN ROAD COST

Contractors Given More Definite Basis for Bidding on Construction of Highways.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Road material surveys now being made in several states will give contractors a more definite basis for bidding on road work and result in cheaper costs of construction, says the bureau of public roads of the United States Department of Agriculture.

In making these surveys, supplies of stone, gravel, sand, slag, and other materials are located, samples tested and information secured as to accessibility, freight rates, and other factors. This information is of permanent value as supplies are rarely exhausted. By furnishing a contractor information as to the location of satisfactory

materials one element of risk is removed, and some of the states report that they have definite proof that such service has resulted in decreased bids.

The bureau of public roads in the course of its operations has tested some 9,000 samples of rock, sand, gravel, and slag, and reports are available giving the location from which the sample was taken together with results of tests. There are now 68 laboratories engaged in testing road materials and data are being rapidly accumulated even in states that are not at this time making an intensive survey.

LOWER CONSTRUCTION COSTS

Decreased Prices Are Indicated in Bids Submitted on Federal-Aid Highways.

Confirmation of the predicted lower level prices for road construction this year is found in the reports on bid prices of 286 miles of federal-aid roads received by the bureau of public roads of the United States Department of Agriculture.

The average cost per mile of some of the types of roadway, including the cost of grading and drainage, were: 78 miles of gravel at \$9,150 a mile, 46 miles of concrete at \$29,000 a mile, 47 miles of bituminous macadam at \$25,200 a mile, and 23 miles of bituminous concrete at \$25,000 a mile.

Pay It Out of Taxes.

Georgia is planning expenditures of \$75,000,000 for the construction of a network of highways throughout the state. The costs are to be paid entirely by tax on gasoline and motor license revenue.

Highway Cost Per Person.

After deducting the amount paid by automobiles in license fees, one and one-tenth cents per day was the cost of the American highway to the individual man, woman and child in this country last year.

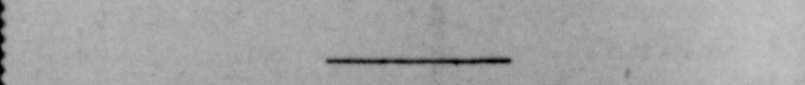
