Construction Contract Let

A contract for highway construction in the Lubbock district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer O. L. Crain, and will be in Castro, Hale and Swisher counties.

High Plains Pavers, Inc. and Western Pavers, Inc. of Plainview were awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and surfacing on 13.6 miles of Farm to Market Roads 168, 3183 and 3141. Low bid was \$523,426.82.

The project extends from the north city limits of Hart, southward to the Lamb County line; from US Highway 87, 2.0 miles north on FM 1767, eastward to FM 400; and from State Highway 86, 4.0 miles west of Tulia, southward to FM 928. H. C. Weaver of Plainview is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 250 working days.

Swisher members held their annual NFO banquet recently also. Guest speakers were Don Kimball, State NFO president, and Johnny Watkins, radio and television farm announcer.

SENSING THE NEWS

Continuing efforts in the Senate to halt or retard development of needed defense systems is a deeply disturbing indication of the responsiveness of some national legislators to pressure from anti-preparedness elements.

Know-nothing attitudes towards defense aren't new factors in our national history. After World War I, America's defenses were dismantled. As a result, Germany and Japan were able to emerge as powerful aggressor forces. The eventual result was the attack on Pearl Harbor and a second world war. Neo-isolationism from the New Left could produce an equally tragic result within a decade -- a third world war.

Today, however, there is a new factor in the move towards unilateral disarmament. Adm. Thomas H. Moorer, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, recently said that "the most significant syndrome affecting our perspective today is often called 'anti-militarism,'" adding "I look on it as 'anti-common sense'."

Adm. Elmo R. Zumwalt Jr., the new Chief of Naval Operations, in an address at Annapolis, warned that "the concept of military preparedness is being questioned by an alienated segment of our population."

It is something new in our history to have an "alienated segment of our population." But there's no denying the truth of the admiral's observation. We have in our country today not simply a faction that disagrees with foreign policy but an element that hates America and wants to see it humiliated and defeated.

Good citizens find it hard to believe that some people, enjoying the blessings of this land, actually seek its destruction and the breakdown of its values.

Yet evidence of the existence of the "alienated segment" is all around us -- in the pathological character assassination of military personnel, in the fire-bombing of ROTC centers, in the funding of underground papers on defense bases, and in the praise the New Left lavishes on revolutionary movements and the cult of violence.

A few years ago, the extremists seemed a mere handful. Today, the disaffected element clearly is of considerable size. With the active encouragement of elements in the

news media, especially the TV networks, the "Alienated" have strengthened their position. Evening newscasts may bring interviews with those who openly boast of resisting their country and opposing its lawful orders. Sympathetic publicity is lavished on those who refuse to fight or who, overnight, declare themselves to be conscientious objectors.

The situation in Congress, with respect to defense appropriations, is serious indeed. But it is not half as serious as the situation involving the "alienated segment." Today, the country faces a grave loyalty issue. No nation can long survive if loyalty is not emphasized and if disloyalty is not punished.

We have heard much in recent years about the "right" to dissent, but there is a great deal of opposition to national defense these days which cannot be described simply as "dissent." The only word for it is disloyalty, for the objective of the opponents of defense measures is the weakening of the United States and its transformation into a second or third-rank world power. The American people cannot afford to be naive about the current wave of disloyalty, for their lives -- and the future of our country and governmental system -- are at stake.

As Vice President Agnew has pointed out on numerous occasions, the nation has a grave problem with an effete intelligentsia that controls communications in many of our metropolitan centers. This same intelligentsia has come to dominate many of our public and private educational institutions and to re-orient the thinking of young intellectuals in the direction of defeatism and nihilism.

The defense issue of our time covers a broad spectrum of problems. We have a severe problem with respect to defense equipment. While America acquires new surface ships, submarines, aircraft and missiles at a slow rate, the Soviets are augmenting their armed forces as rapidly as possible. But that's only part of our national defense problem. Even more important is the matter of national morale. Defeatism and nihilism must be eradicated from our country if the United States is to endure as a strong, free nation. This our No. 1 task.

He may pursue any course of study recognized by the college and leading to a baccalaureate degree. Following graduation he must serve as an active duty Army officer for a minimum of four years.

Selection is based on academic excellence, extracurricular

activities, physical standards, Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or American College Testing Program (ACT) results, and evaluation of motivation and leadership potential following the student's appearance before a scholarship selection board.

It is of note that from 16 to 24 per cent of our American business executive making from \$100,000 to \$300,000 per year, and top government executives, took ROTC training.

The Army plans also to award 400 three-year scholarships and 630 two-year scholarships to college men already enrolled in ROTC.

We live in a world of pictures. A photograph is a picture or representation obtained by any process of photography, according to Webster. There are pictures of the screen, pictures of television, and the modern family entertains by showing pictures of past events and places. We see all kinds of pictures each day.

Educators have discovered that the process of learning may be speeded up through the use of pictures. We seem to remember longer those things which enter through the channel of the eye rather than the ear.

And then there is another picture that reveals a little of what is inside of man that we call "X-ray". They are hard for the layman to read and to tell anything about. For one who has been taught to watch for certain things, this becomes easy for them to detect any problem that might arise. The "X" stands for the unknown and the "ray" for the penetrating force which might detect any problem in the physical makeup of man.

There are still some flaws in the use of X-rays because if there are objects in a pocket or anything between the machine and the point of penetration, it might look as if there were a problem of some kind when there was not. Everything has to be set up just right to get a true picture.

And, too, we find that man will pay to have this work done and will not tell the whole truth about what he knows about his own physical problem. Especially if he has been going against the doctor's orders. Why, do you suppose, we will not help cure our own ills by telling what we know? This usually costs us in the long run.

Then there is the photograph of the human soul. Only divine photography can capture the image of the human soul, and reproduce it with infallible clarity before a righteous judge.

The psalmist said, "O Lord, thou hast searched me, and know me. Thou knowest my down-sitting and mine uprising, thou

understandest my thoughts afar off. Thou compassest my path and my lying down, and art acquainted with all my ways." (Ps. 139:1-3)

What sort of picture are you making?

Actors frequently say, "I'm making a picture," meaning that they are portraying a certain character upon the screen for the public to see. But the true picture that one makes is etched into the fibers of his soul, by the way one thinks, acts, and lives.

In the final analysis a man's true character is the sum total of what he really is. A very wise man wrote, "For as he thinketh in his heart, so is he." (Prov. 23:7) This is the picture God knows. Literally, or spiritually, divine photography records the direction in which the heart is turned, and exemplifies forever the principle that "where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

In Hebrew thinking a man's name was of great significance because it indicated the character of the individual who possessed that name. Thus when Jacob wrestled with the angel until the breaking of dawn and neither won, finally the angel asked "What is thy name?" In essence the angel asked, "What kind of man are you?" And when Jacob's name came under the searchlight of the angel's gaze, he was not proud of it, because it was tainted with the evil deeds of his past.

How would your name look if actually reproduced as God sees it? The way it will look in the light of eternity is a true photograph of your own soul.

Financial Facts

Did you know that American currency has been printed in a variety of colors?

Today we're used to only one type of color combination on our paper money. The predominant colors are black and green, with the portrait on the obverse in black and white. The bills are also considerably enlivened by various colors of seals, serial numbers and other embellishments.

In the past, however, our currency was printed in other color combinations. Some interesting examples are these:

The Refunding Certificates of 1879 were printed in black and white. They were somewhat dull but still served their purpose.

Brownish black was the color

used for the Silver Certificates of 1873 and 1880 and the first issues of the National Bank Notes of 1882 were printed in brown.

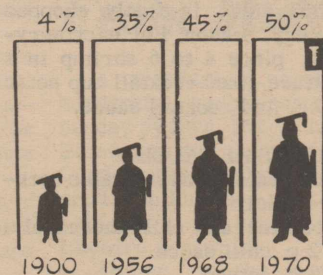

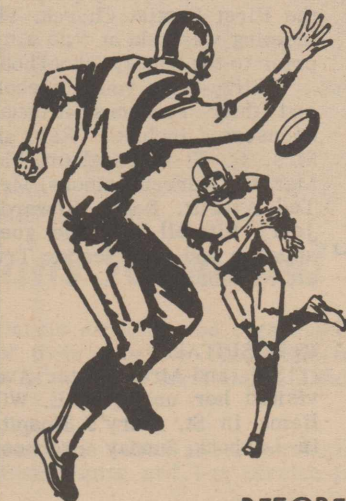

APPETIZERS --DIPS -- CANAPES

TASTY TUNA SPREAD

1 can chunk-style tuna (1 c.)
1 3-oz. pkg. soft cream cheese
1 T. mayonnaise
1 T. finely chopped onion
1 tsp. horseradish
1 garlic clove, mashed or finely chopped

AVOCADO DUNK

2 avocados
1/4 c. mayonnaise
2 T. lemon juice
1 garlic clove, mashed
1 tsp. chili powder (may be omitted)
Freshly ground black pepper, and salt to suit taste
Peel avocados and mash the pulp. Add other ingredients and mix well. Cover and let stand at least 1 hour. Serve with corn chips.

CHILI CON QUESO - a good dip
1 med. size onion, saute in 1 T. butter until done.
Add: 1 No. 2 can tomatoes
1 can whole green chilies, finely chopped
Cook until done.
Add 1 1/2 lbs. Velveeta cheese, cut in small pieces
Salt and pepper to suit taste
Leave on low heat until cheese melts
(a dash of oregano may be added if desired)

SHRIMP COCKTAIL

Clean cooked shrimp, removing black line from back. Chill. Mix in finely chopped celery. Season. For each serving, place 4 to 6 shrimp in a lettuce-lined cocktail cup set in ice. Add cocktail sauce.

COCKTAIL SAUCE (for seafood and vegetable cocktails)

Combine and chill thoroughly:
1/2 c. chili sauce
1/3 c. catsup
1/3 c. prepared horseradish
1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
NOTE: For a sharper sauce, add 1/4 tsp. salt, 2 T. lemon juice, dash of pepper and a few drops of tabasco sauce.

WEDGIES

Spread 4 slices of large bologna or minced ham with softened cheese (cream cheese) seasoned with onions or chives and mustard. Place slices together (like layer cake). Chill and cut into wedges.

FLAMING CABBAGE

Clean a large cabbage. Curl outer leaves back from top. Cut out center; hollow it out about 6" deep. Place a sterno lamp in the cavity (lamp hidden but flame should come almost to top of cabbage). Place cabbage on serving plate. Surround with a frill of parsley. Thrust wooden picks through cocktail sausages, and stick into the cabbage. Stick an olive onto end of each (to protect fingers from flame). Guests broil their own sausages.

COOKIES

SUGAR COOKIES

4 c. flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 c. butter
1 1/2 c. sugar
2 eggs
1/2 c. sour milk
1 tsp. vanilla
Cream shortening, sugar and eggs. Add dry ingredients

that have been sifted together. Roll. Cut into desired shapes. Sprinkle with sugar. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in 400 degree oven until done, approximately 10 minutes.

ICE BOX COOKIES

1 c. butter or shortening
2 c. brown sugar
2 eggs
2 T. sour cream
3 1/2 c. flour
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cream of tartar
1 tsp. salt
1 c. nuts
Flavoring, if desired

Mix and shape into rolls. Let stand in the refrigerator over night. Slice, Bake in hot oven.

CHOCOLATE DROP COOKIES

1 c. brown sugar
1/2 c. butter or shortening
1 egg
1/2 c. buttermilk
1/4 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. baking powder
2 sq. bitter chocolate, melted
1 1/2 c. flour
1 c. chopped nut meats.

Sift flour, soda, baking powder, salt, together. Melt chocolate. Cream sugar, shortening and egg. Add melted chocolate and nuts. Drop from teaspoon on greased and floured cookie sheet. Bake in 350 degree oven until done. When cookies are done cover immediately with chocolate frosting.

COCONUT BARS

1 c. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 c. butter
1/2 c. brown sugar

Blend sugar, salt and flour and butter as for pastry. Pat into an ungreased pan to 1/2 inch thickness. Bake in moderate oven 350 to 375 degrees for 10 minutes. Top with topping and bake 30 minutes longer.

COCONUT TOPPING

2 T. flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 c. shredded coconut

Hog Production Grows In Texas

More and more Texas farmers are agreeing with the words that appear under the head of a smiling pig: "Hogs are Beautiful."

For whether the porkers are really pretty or not, many of them are agreeing that swine production holds particular promise in the state.

Charles Taylor, associate editor of the Texas Farmer-Stockman, explains in the September issue of the magazine, that Texas has plenty of grain to support feed requirements for an expanded hog industry.

Pigs convert feed to meat more efficiently than other red meat animals, and hence have more potential profit.

Texas markets can use more pork. The state produces only about 25 to 30 percent of all the pork it consumes.

Swine can produce a higher return on investment than any other form of livestock.

"Good management and a liking for the business make the difference between success and failure," Taylor reports, as he cited two cautions about the hog business. Usually high hog prices in the last year led many farmers to take a second look at raising the animals. But by now prices have taken a drop and the U. S. pig crop for 1970 has already been predicted to be the largest since 1943.

Even so, Taylor reports that "The long-term, solid potential for hog production in Texas still remains good."

Accent On Health

The home has been the subject of poets and songsters for ages, and the words to such songs as "Home Sweet Home" bring wistful memories to those old enough to remember them.

But to those in the fields of public health and safety, "Home Sweet Home" is a place where accidents occur all too often, says the Texas State Department of Health.

One of the big home hazards of today is in the field of poisonings. More than a half-million children will swallow poison this year in the United States and 90 per cent of all cases reported will involve children under the age of five.

Children are the greatest victims of accidental poisoning because of their inquisitive nature. Closets and cupboards are great places to hide and investigate. A child will taste, bite and swallow anything he can reach, and teething time calls for chewing on furniture, toys and window sills.

Not only children but adults, too, are subject to poisoning.

Take a look around your home and what do you find? You normally think of insecticides, rat killers and some rug cleaners as poison. But do you realize that many of the time saving and labor saving substances under your kitchen sink, in your bathroom, in your garage and in your workshop or basement can be deadly? Your medicine closet is particularly dangerous.

The kitchen is perhaps the biggest threat. The oven cleaner, drain cleaner, bleach, dishwashing compounds and furniture polishes are every-day

To help poison proof your home, there are some steps you can take. 1. Store all medicines and household products in locked cabinets; 2. Clean out medicine cabinets regularly; 3. Don't put hazardous objects in soft drink bottles but keep them in their containers; 4. Don't leave any medicines, cleaning compounds, insecticides or fuel oils where children can get to them; 5. Don't use lead-based paints on toys or furniture.

"Safety First" is more than just a slogan when applied to your home, which can be a booby-trap unless precautions are taken in advance.
