

Calves Bring 9.92 Average In Sale Here

Club Boys Dispose Of
50 Animals; Top Price
Of 15 Cents

Fifty 4-H and FFA calves, exhibited in the third annual Big Spring district livestock show Monday and Tuesday, averaged 9.92 in auction at the Big Spring Auction Co. ring Wednesday afternoon.

Top price was the 15 cents paid to Henry Moates for his 925 milked steer which was adjudged the

Complete tabulation of the calf sale appears on Page 6.

Howard county winner, Jess Slaughter paid second highest for a 850-pound steer from W. L. Wilson, offering 13 cents.

Most active buyers were Robinson & Sons Grocery, purchasers of the champion calf, with five steers; John Poe of Stanton, who bought seven steers; the State National bank, buyer of five, and G. & L. (Armour), four. Westerners, Krey Packing Co. of St. Louis, and Big Spring Cotton Oil Co. bought three each.

Prices ranged from the 15-cent top to 8.80 but there was only one to go below nine cents. Only two lambs went through the sale.

Premiums added \$56 to the \$178 total Henry Moates received for his calf.

TEXAS TO DEMAND RETURN OF CONVICT

DALLAS, Mar. 21 (AP)—Texas will demand the return to Huntsville prison of Robert Lucy Cash, escaped life term who was arrested Tuesday at Boulder, Colo., and turned over to authorities at Bixbee, Ariz., District Attorney Andrew Patton said today.

Assistant District Attorney Earl Street left for Austin, state capital, to apply for extradition papers.

Cash was convicted here for the murder of Harry Leon Helfman.

No Winners In Sight, According To Ickes

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—Secretary Ickes, who advised a third term for President Roosevelt, said today that no democratic presidential candidate now in the field could control enough delegates to win the nomination.

He included Vice President Garner, Federal Security Administrator McNutt and Postmaster General Farley.

Ickes made the statement to his press conference in reply to a question, and declined to elaborate. Ickes, who once said that McNutt could not get the support of the liberal element if he were the democratic nominee, declined to comment in this respect about Farley.

The liberals, he said, would continue to work for the re-nomination of Mr. Roosevelt regardless of all candidates.

Meanwhile, talk of a Hull-Farley democratic ticket was revived on Capitol Hill, as discussion of the postmaster general's unreserved announcement of his candidacy ran the gamut of interpretations.

Most senators expressed the opinion the cabinet officer, in saying flatly his name would be presented to the democratic national convention, did so believing that President Roosevelt would not be a candidate for a third term.

A few interpreted the announcement as placing Farley in the same category as Vice President Garner—a candidate whether the president runs or not. Farley would not clear up this point in talking to reporters yesterday at Springfield, Mass.

Would Trim Funds For Wage & Hour, Labor Agencies

House Appropriations Committee
Reduces Roosevelt Budget Estimate

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—Contending that the labor relations board was "overstaffed" and that a "confused administrative problem" existed in the wage-hour administration, the house appropriations committee asked congress today to trim next year's funds for those agencies.

The committee proposed an appropriation of \$2,543,000—\$337,000 under President Roosevelt's budget estimate—for the labor board and \$5,105,000—or \$1,000,000 less than budget figures—for the wage-hour administration.

The recommendations were incorporated in a \$64,159,700 bill for needs of the labor department, the federal security agency and four other related agencies during the fiscal year beginning July 1. The total was \$11,798,942 below the president's recommendations and \$19,118,170 less than the amount which was available for the current fiscal year.

Most of the reduction below the budget was accounted for by a \$10,000,000 cut in a \$245,000,000 item for grants to states for old-age assistance.

The committee proposed that the labor board save \$45,600 annually by eliminating the economics research division headed by David Sapos. Counsel for the special house committee investigating the board presented evidence recently designed to show that Sapos held radical views.

"The committee is of the opinion that the National Labor Relations Board is overstuffed," the appropriations group said in its report to the house, and also suggested a reduction of \$57,000 in salaries of the board's trial examiners.

It reported that, unless congress amended the wage-hour law "to clarify certain ambiguities" and the administrator could simplify procedure, "it would be imprudent" for congress to approve in full the enlarged administrative setup the budget bureau proposed.

Leaving virtually intact a \$9,837,000 item for the immigration and naturalization service, the committee rejected proposals to reduce the border-patrol service and spoke of "a most unsatisfactory condition" regarding violation of the immigration laws by Mexicans.

"It should be pointed out of course," the committee added, "that all of the immigration violations involved in this calculation are not committed by those of Mexican nationality, but it is the information of the committee that persons of that nationality are the chief offenders."

The report observed that if state department investigation of this situation proved unproductive, the committee would seek "some other deterrent."

At the same time, Morgenthau repudiated proposals to use some of the \$2,000,000,000 in the treasury's stabilization fund to avoid the debt limit.

"I certainly am not going to use the stabilization fund or any other trick method to avoid the debt limit," the treasury head said.

"It is strictly up to congress and if they vote to spend money which will exceed the limit, it is up to them to do something about the limit."

"I don't think the \$45,000,000 limit is very important. There is no reason why it should not be 46, 47, or 48 billion dollars. I would not worry if it was \$50,000,000,000."

"But it should be done in an open, legal way by congress."

SAN JOSE, Calif., Mar. 21 (AP)—The sheriff's office received a report today of a cave-in at the Red Mountain magnesite mine, about 30 miles south of Livermore, where about 100 men were at work. The report said at least one man was dead.

BACK IS INJURED

Oville Robinson, employee of the West Texas Sand & Gravel company, sustained back injuries, the extent of which were not determined early Thursday afternoon, when a caterpillar shovel fell and struck him as he worked at the company pit seven miles southeast of Big Spring. Robinson was brought to the Big Spring hospital for medical treatment. He was operating the caterpillar shovel when the accident occurred.

Edwin Thomas (Tom) Michael, 49, connection foreman for the company, succumbed to burns that covered his body.

Three other company employees standing with Michael near the door of the pump station were in hospitals here. W. C. Clark and H. C. Holsing, burned about the face, hands and legs, and H. C. Morgan, burned about his face and hands, were reported in a serious condition.

The explosion and fire damaged the pump station and a half mile south of the pool, serving a line from the pool to the main connection.

An investigation was under way by company officials to determine the cause of the blast.

The victim had lived in Holliday eight years and is a former Oklahoma resident. Burial will be at Temple, Okla.

Another Hike Is Sought In Farm Fund

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—The senate, moving toward a vote on the billion-dollar farm bill, today heard Senator La Follette (Frog-Wis) urge expansion of its provision for the government food stamp system.

The westerner asked that funds for disposal of surplus commodities be increased from \$85,000,000 recommended by the senate appropriations committee to \$112,000,000.

La Follette declared the surplus removal activity was "one new deal program that has worked and won unanimous support."

Free Garbage Collection Service May Be Instituted Early In April

Arrival of two trucks to be used in the collection of garbage by the city gave rise to hopes Thursday that the service might be instituted soon.

The city is installing enclosed bodies on the two trucks and tentative routes are being mapped to the end that there may be a weekly or semi-weekly pick-up on refuse.

Also under advisement is an ordinance regulating the collection of garbage as a municipal function.

Contrary to rumors, the service is to be free to residences and in a limited way to business houses. There will be no extra charge attached to water bills, said a city official. Regular collections will be made in the business districts, but extra amounts of trash and refuse will have to be disposed of privately by the concerns.

The new service, talked here for several years, may be instituted early in April.

France Sets Up New Cabinet; Changes Hinted For Britain

Chamberlain
Hears Aides
Criticized

Shakeup May Come During
Easter Recess
Of Parliament

LONDON, Mar. 21 (AP)—Parliament recessed for the Easter holidays today amid growing reports that Prime Minister Chamberlain would reconstruct his cabinet during the interval before sittings are resumed April 2.

The house of commons sessions ended with outspoken criticism of two cabinet bigwigs, Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir John Simon and Lord Privy Seal Sir Samuel Hoare, voiced by Gregory Mander of the liberal opposition.

"It is widely felt throughout the country that the chancellor of the exchequer and the lord privy seal are heavy liabilities both at home and abroad," he said.

Speculation outside commons mentioned Air Minister Sir Kingsley Wood and Supply Minister Leslie Burgin as ministers likely to be displaced by the prime minister in reshaping his cabinet for more vigorous prosecution of war tasks.

The air ministry, meanwhile, announced that one German plane had appeared today over the Shetland islands and then vanished without dropping bombs when British fighting craft took to the air.

Letters Asked In Support Of Air Service

A substantial gain in the number of letters citing benefits of a north-south airline was reported by the chamber of commerce Thursday morning.

However, a great number more are needed from business and professional men, and others who would be aided by establishment of such a line with a stop in Big Spring.

J. H. Greene, chamber manager and chairman of an inter-city committee pushing for a north-south line, said that letters should contain an explanation of specific benefits according to a person or his business from the service and should refrain from indulging in generalities.

Greene, incidentally, will leave Friday morning for Lubbock to join representatives of that city in a flight to Denver, Colo., for an inter-city conference on the projected line Saturday.

This likely will be the last such meeting before the Civil Aeronautics Authority hearing in Washington on April 15.

It's 'Swamp Fever'
Holding FD Down

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—President Roosevelt was confined to his room again today with what he facetiously called "swamp fever." A secretary, Stephen Early, said the president's temperature was normal last night but was up again this morning to 99.4 degrees, eight-tenths of a degree above normal.

"He is in grand shape," Early said, "and nobody is worried and nobody is concerned."

Early said Mr. Roosevelt's recovery from his head cold was delayed because he had come back to work too soon after becoming ill.

LA GUARDIA SEEKING
BIG FUND FOR WPA

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—Mayor F. H. La Guardia of New York came to Washington today to ask congress and President Roosevelt to provide at least \$1,500,000 for the WPA in the coming fiscal year.

The mayor said that a survey by the U. S. Conference of Mayors, of which he is president, indicated that at least 1,400,000 workers would be forced off the WPA rolls around July 1, "and we have never guessed wrong," he added.

"There isn't a city in the United States that could absorb those people," La Guardia declared. "Every mayor is worrying and helpless in providing for this additional load."

DETROIT, Mar. 21 (AP)—A special federal grand jury today indicted 13 organizations and 18 individuals for alleged anti-trust law violations in the electrical contracting, business, and charged that agents for an electrical worker's union were paid to hamper work attempted by contractors who refused to join the combination.

The indictment charges all defendants with conspiring to form a combination in restraint of trade in violation of the Sherman Act.

Local 55 of the AFL International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and two of its business agents, Lloyd J. Coons and Frank Canedo, are accused of ordering union electricians to engage in a "slow-down" designed to increase costs when working for any contractor not a party to the alleged conspiracy. The intent, the jury charged, was to make it unprofitable for such a contractor to operate here.

The Detroit Electrical Contractors association and ten individual Detroit firms are charged with establishing arbitrary and artificial bids for electrical contracts, and allocating the contracts among themselves.

STEAMER SUNK

LONDON, Mar. 21 (AP)—The Danish steamer Minsk, 1,229 tons, was sunk by torpedoes and shellfire Tuesday night, it was disclosed today when nine survivors landed at a Scottish east coast town. Twenty of the crew are missing.

Reynaud Head Of Govt. Organized To Win The War

PARIS, Mar. 21 (AP)—Energetic Paul Reynaud today formally took the helm of the French government as premier and foreign minister in a broadened "win the war" coalition cabinet drawn from the socialists on the left to groups of the right.

Edouard Daladier, whom Reynaud succeeds as premier, stayed in the new ministry as minister of national defense. Reynaud's former portfolio in the finance ministry went to Lucien Lamoureux.

Reynaud also set up a "war committee" composed of himself, Chautemps, Daladier, Colonial Minister Georges Mandel and Finance Minister Lamoureux.

A separate "economic council" also was established, similar to Britain's ministerial economic warfare group. Members include Lamoureux and all ministers whose duties are concerned with national economy.

Reynaud called his first cabinet meeting for tomorrow morning, to be followed by a council of ministers — the cabinet meeting with President Albert Lebrun. These sessions will be followed by governmental declarations before the two chambers of parliament.

The new government failed to present the national union character at first expected because of the refusal of two rightist groups to support it, the republican federation led by Louis Marin and the republican alliance headed by ex-Premier Pierre-Etienne Flandin.

The cabinet therefore depended strongly on Daladier's radical-socialists, who furnished seven members, and the socialists, largest group in the chamber of deputies, represented by three ministers.

The new cabinet: Paul Reynaud, premier and foreign minister; Camille Chautemps, vice premier; Edouard Daladier, national defense; Cesar Campinchi, navy; Laurent Eynac, air; Raoul Dautry, armament; Henri Roy, interior; Louis Rollin, commerce; Albert Serot, justice; Lucien Lamoureux, finance; Georges Mandel, colonies; Albert Sarraut, public instruction; Henri Queuille, provisions; Paul Thellier, agriculture; George Monnet, blockade; Anatole de Monzie, public works; Charles Pomaret, labor; Jules Julien, communications; Louis Frossard, information; Alphonse Rio, merchant marine; Marcel Héraud, public health; Albert Riviere, pensions.

The socialists, largest party in the chamber without representation in a French cabinet since Daladier took power in April, 1938, have three ministers in the new government, Monnet, Riviere and Serot.

The designation of peppery, 61-year-old Reynaud, whose reorganization of French finances is rated as one of the greatest achievements of the Daladier cabinet, was well-received in parliament.

Legislative circles, whose demands for more strenuous French war efforts led to Daladier's downfall, considered Reynaud well qualified to lift the war out of stalemate with British-French initiative.

Forced To Withdraw Consuls In Poland

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—American citizens in partitioned Poland were cut off from all direct diplomatic representation today as the United States, acting under German compulsion, withdrew its consular officials.

The state department ordered the withdrawal after unavailing protests to Berlin, but informed Germany that it was reserving "all of its rights in the matter."

The order, the state department said, applied to diplomatic representatives of all foreign countries. Informal sources in Berlin said that for visa purposes the lack of consulates in the area was inconsequential because no one can visit the territory without a special permit from its governor general.

The evacuation of diplomatic establishments in German-held Poland, however, in effect, made Germany the sole source of official information on conditions in the area.

Negotiations are in progress, however, to obtain permission for American relief workers to enter the district to supervise distribution of aid to Poles. The number of American citizens now resident in Poland was fixed at 533 by the state department.

The official reason was advanced for the German order. One explanation offered was that Berlin believed some consulates engaged in undesirable activities, and decided to remove them all.

The state department arranged to handle all future matters concerning American nationals in Poland through the American embassy in Berlin.

The new spring clothes that are going to make America's Easter Parade are truly feminine fashions.

They have the characteristics that belong to women. They are soft in design instead of strictly tailored (even suits have been softened). They are cut to show curves, are alive with color, show fondness for flowers, jewels and such. They put a little piquancy into something like a big begonia heart on a lapel and even show a flash of temper in a touch of scarlet on a belt. Altogether, they're good.

Biggest news in their cuts lies in the fact that they have loosened up the winter's wasp waist. Most talked of silhouette is the long torso, that curves the waistline smoothly without cinching it and moulds the figure to the hips, where the skirt joins, to give a long-waisted look. Still easier fitting are some new chemise frocks whose bodices blouse out loosely over belt tops and whose skirts fall in pleats.

Otherwise the description of the silhouette has a familiar sound. Skirts are still short and full. (Paris has even shortened some, bringing their hemlines to mid-knee.) Waistlines are neat and still small; necklines often fairly high; shoulders still widened and slightly padded, though dresses show less exaggeration in this respect than last year. Sleeves are generally fairly simple.

"Everybody can't be a Luther Burbank, but the average garden farmer can benefit from Burbank's contributions to plant culture.

The "plant wizard" inspected thousands of plants, selected perhaps 50 or 100 to be grown for propagation or seed purposes and destroyed the rest. Those he kept were picked because they had better flavor, thinner skin or more colorful flowers.

Beginning gardeners probably will have greater success if they

It costs just as much in space, time and labor—sometimes more—to cultivate half a stand as it does to grow a full stand. In a small garden, seed costs usually aren't big enough to be a deciding factor in what to plant.

Obtain seeds only from a source that has a reputation for handling quality goods and is familiar with the conditions of your locality.

In addition to selling you seeds, any good dealer or nurseryman will give you valuable tips on selecting and cultivating plants. He knows what will grow in your locality and the best and easiest methods of getting it to grow.

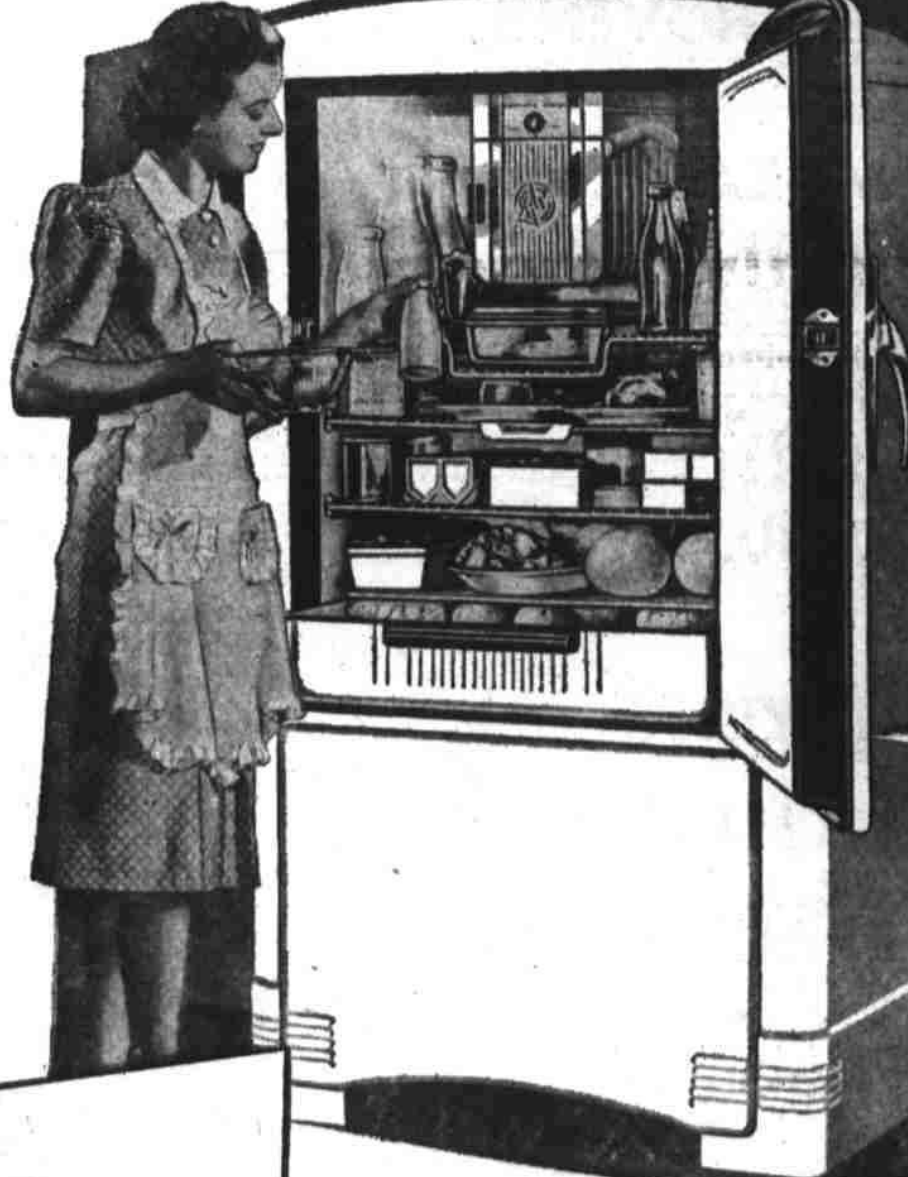

Handbook On AAA Program Mailed Out

Howard county agriculturists are being mailed their copy of the "Texas Handbook," a digest of the 1940 agricultural conservation program as specifically affects Texas.

The book, in clear and concise language, explains every phase of the program from conservation practices to computation of payments.

Accompanying it is a letter from M. Weaver, county administrative assistant, pertaining to matters relative to complying with and receiving full payments for their part in the current farm program.

These are a few of the high points listed in the letter: Farmers are permitted to plant a garden or truck patch on soil conservation land and receive a soil building payment on same—provided that 10 different kinds of vegetables are grown and that any one vegetable doesn't occupy more than one-

third of the entire area of the garden.

Only when a true variety of sweet sorghum is grown can acreage planted to such crop be classified as non-depleting. Mixed or hybrid seed are classed as soil depleting.

Alternate strips of cotton and feed with rows of fallow call for the fallow strip to be at least 162 inches wide. Thus rows must average at least 40 1-2 inches wide.

Excess cotton may be destroyed at any time before bolls are formed in order to be within cotton acreage allotment.

Sweet sorghum grown on retired land (regardless of when grown) is not to be threatened for seed or grain.

Easter Breakfast Parties Start The Day Gay

You can get Easter off to a joyful start if you give a breakfast party for the family or friends.

Have the table sparkle with the symbols of Easter that herald the coming of spring—gay blossoms, fluffy chicks, pink-eared bunnies and eggs in rainbow colors.

Menus should get heartier as the day advances, so you'll have to regulate your menu by the hour of your breakfast.

An assorted trayful of juices and fruits delights the guests and allows them individual choices. Always serve appetizers very cold.

You can dress up your cereals, too. Sprinkle cooked cereals with chopped figs, shaved brown sugar or nutmeats. Fill ring moulds with cooked cereal, heat it in a moderate oven, unmould and fill the centers with prunes, apricots or sliced bananas mixed with raisins. Stuff baked fruit—peaches, pears, apples or apricots—with cooked or prepared cereals and pass honey or maple syrup for the sweetening. Youngsters will love to have their cere-

real served in Easter egg shells with tiny chicks perched nearby.

BRAZIL NUT BREAD

2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1-3 teaspoon salt
1-3 cup shortening
1-2 cup milk
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon orange juice
1 tablespoon grated orange rind
2 eggs
1 cup Brazil nuts, finely chopped

Sift flour, baking powder and salt and set aside until needed. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, beating as you add. Add orange juice, and grated rind. Add whole eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add Brazil nuts. Then give the mixture an extra good beating and last fold in sifted dry ingredients alternately with the liquid, adding about one-third of each at a time. Mix well. Bake in a greased loaf pan about one hour in moderate oven.

Here are some ways to vary the serving of eggs for this festive breakfast:

- 1-Half-fill buttered custard cups with corned beef hash, add eggs and bake until they have set. Carefully remove to serving platter and garnish with cream or shredded lettuce. Or shape nests of corned beef hash and set a poached egg in the nest.
- 2-Cook individual servings of ham, place 1-2 inch rings of orange (pulp removed) on each and carefully drop eggs into the rings. Bake until the eggs have white films over the top. Sprinkle with seasonings and garnish with parsley.
- 3-Sprinkle egg omelet with grated cheese, bake until well browned and surround with broiled bacon curls.
- 4-Fashion codfish cakes to resemble nests, brown and fill with creamed eggs and diced sausages.

For new editions of popovers, muffins, biscuits or cornbread, put some chopped cooked ham or crisp bacon in the batter before it is baked—of course neither ham nor bacon should then be served in any other part of the menu. For a sweet touch, add some chopped figs, dates or candied pineapple to biscuit dough, scones or waffles.

ANTI-PICKETING ORDER BRINGS PROTEST

NEW YORK, Mar. 21 (AP)—A protest against Mayor LaGuardia's order prohibiting picketing of foreign government offices was the immediate outgrowth today of a police battle with pickets before the French consulate.

Mounted patrolmen rushed several hundred demonstrators yesterday, pummeled them as well as passerby, and loaded 22 scratching, biting and kicking pickets into patrol wagons. None was hurt seriously.

The demonstration, sponsored, was a protest against "the expulsion of Spanish refugees from France," a move which the French have denied.

Higher Tanker Rates Putting 'Squeeze' On Oil Industry

HOUSTON, Mar. 21. (AP) — The Texas oil industry is in the midst of the keenest competition in its history, Houston oil circles report.

The recent reduction of the import duty on South American crude oil, followed by a big hike in oil tanker rates, dealt a stiff blow not only to refiners, but producers as well, the oilmen say.

Protests have been lodged in Washington by oilmen from the Southwest, Midcontinent and Eastern Seaboard against oil tanker rates. They said tanker rates from Texas ports to the Atlantic Seaboard north of Cape Hatteras were raised from 14 cents a barrel last August to 64 cents a barrel at present.

After the tariff reduction, one company alone was reported to have placed 33 tankers in the Venezuelan trade, bringing imports of oil into the United States. The hiked tanker rates weaken the Texas oil industry in its competition with imported crude, oilmen claim.

As a result, a movement is afoot to demand that the interstate commerce commission take over the regulation of coastwise water freight rates. Rail and pipe line rates already are regulated by the commission.

Shippers from Gulf coast points are having to absorb the increase in prices. Usually there has been a sufficient differential between

Gulf coast and Eastern Seaboard prices on oil and its products to absorb prevailing transportation costs. For instance, when the rate was 14 cents a barrel last summer, 70 octane motor fuel was quoted on the Gulf coast at 5 1-4 to 5 1-2 cents a gallon, while the price for the same product in New York was 6 to 6 1-2 cents a gallon.

Today, however, the oilmen lament, while there has been a 400 per cent increase in tanker rates there has been no corresponding increase in market quotations. Motor fuel is selling at from 5 1-2 to 6 1-4 cents a gallon on the Gulf coast now; the same product sells for 6 1-4 to 7 1-2 cents a gallon in New York.

The situation has resolved into a well-concealed struggle between the few who have tankers and the many who have none. Neither side cares to talk much about it. Those who have no tankers say they are dependent on those who have. Under such circumstances they feel it would not be healthy for them to talk.

Oilmen attribute the shortage of tankers, which caused the rate increase, to the number of tankers placed in the South American trade and to the European war. While only about 28 allied and German tankers have been sunk since the outbreak of the war, the convoy of the allies is much slower than regular transportation and calls for

twice as many tankers, oilmen said.

"Showdown" on the situation is expected soon, as the heavy gasoline consumption period will begin in a couple of months, due to increased motoring in late spring and summer. A greater consumption is expected this year, because of the war.

"Do you believe," declared Strauss in his argument, "that a woman whose husband was working on the WPA would be carrying \$528 in her stockings? I wouldn't."

"I wouldn't believe it either," answered Laborer Malone, foreman of the jury.

The attorney cautioned him about court procedure and repeated the question.

"I still wouldn't believe it," continued Strauss.

"I wouldn't either," came back Malone.

A mistrial was declared.

AN ANALYSIS OF THE WAR DEVELOPMENTS

By DEWITT MACKENZIE

It would be difficult to imagine England's grand old man of statecraft and sport, the seventeenth Earl of Derby, making that very blunt speech in which his son, War Secretary Oliver Stanley, chastised the bad lads of the U. S. A. whom he accused of charging Britain with lack of initiative in the war.

Lord Derby is by nature a diplomat—unemotional, solid, rich in commonsense, and a bluff and altogether likeable gentleman of the old school. He is the finest type of cosmopolitan Englishman, who long ago learned the simple but important truth that a word spoken in resentment may cause more international damage than all the statesmen can ever repair.

The earl is a great friend of the United States and has spent much of his long lifetime working for good relations. I venture to say he probably doesn't even approve of the pointed way in which his son took us to task and made us stand in a corner.

Of course, in nursing our bruises it is only fair to remember that War Secretary Stanley probably was speaking under stress of emotion. The government was being attacked in parliament on the grounds that it had been allowing Herr Hitler to hold the initiative.

Naturally when the conduct of the war is being challenged, the war minister feels a responsibility and one can't blame him for feeling

ing piqued when people call the conflict "in language culled from the ring-side, a phony war."

The minister said this phrase was used by folk who, after a good dinner, sit down and urge two fighters to tear each other to pieces. I don't know whether he was speaking of Americans or some other blood-thirsty people, but if the remark was directed at us it does seem a wee bit strong.

However, if we consider this war a continuation of the last one, we really have paid for our ring-side seats (though maybe I shouldn't speak of war debts). And as paying spectators we reserve the right, not to tell the fighters how to proceed, but to pass such comment as is permitted to neutral observers. I don't believe, though, that we are quite so bloody-minded as the minister seems to think.

Stanley also said if Britain hadn't gone to war the people in the United States would have said "why aren't you fighting?" That remark also seems somewhat overheated.

He might well recall that when his distinguished father was minister of war the United States was fighting shoulder to shoulder with the British. He might recall, too, that the Washington administration has worked diligently to try to halt Europe's recent wars, and that even now President Roosevelt's peace finding emissary is on the way home after his researches.

May Not Grant Extradition To Florida

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Mar. 21 (AP)—Gov. Culbert L. Olson, studying amazing charges of cruel and inhuman treatment of Florida chain gang convicts, says he is convinced that Harry Biosdale should not be extradited to the Ralston, Fla., prison from which he escaped five years ago.

The governor, who talked by telephone yesterday with Gov. Fred B. Cone of Florida, said he believes Biosdale had become fully rehabilitated during the five years he had lived in California since his escape.

Olson said he would not definitely deny the extradition request, however, "until I hear further from Gov. Cone."

Biosdale admitted he escaped from a jail at Tallahassee while being returned to the road camp after hospitalization.

Anna Zacek, attorney for the fugitive, said Biosdale had lived in Los Angeles without any attempt at concealment and using his true name. She presented scores of letters, telegrams, petitions and affidavits protesting the extradition of the World War veteran, who was sentenced to a 15-year term for robbery.

Biosdale charged that road gang

prisoners were treated so inhumanly several convicts chopped off hands or feet to escape work.

Documents bore tales of floggings, suspension by the wrists, starvation rations, sweat-box torture and the shooting to death of prisoners by guards.

The charges brought a vigorous denial from Florida prison officials.

Farm And Ranch Talk AROUND THE COFFEE POT

The Howard county FFA and 4-H show took precedence over all other local news this week when boys from six counties exhibited their choice stock in the county warehouse northwest of town. The new warehouse, ideally located and constructed for a show of this sort brought many compliments from visitors as well as local people who visited it for the first time.

Anna-Belle Edwards, attractive young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marion Edwards of Big Spring, was one of two representatives at the Fort Worth Stock show last week to be invited to perform at Madison Square Garden in New York next October. Margaret Owens of Osona was the other lucky lady. It will be a repeat performance for Anna-Belle.

Dr. Frank Boyle is having a portion of his place near Elbow community re-fenced. Those who wonder why the Doctor left several piles of brush stacked in his pasture when it was cleared will learn that the sportsman simply left it as a shelter for game birds. Dr. Boyle also jumped the gun for farm improvements this week by setting out 100 young Chinese elm trees on his place.

Quite a few of the young exhibitors at the local club show sold their calves at the auction sale Wednesday. Although they received good prices for their stock, some of the spirit of the show was lacking because of scarceness of business firms in the bidding.

Henry Montes, who exhibited the grand champion Howard county calf received fifteen cents for the animal. Lawrence Robinson, representing Robinson and Sons Grocery bid thirteen cents, then jumped his bid to fifteen before the animal left the ring. Other contributions jumped the premium to \$5. Outside contributors were Jess Slaughter, 1-2 cent per pound; Carl Mercer 1-2 cent per pound; Big Spring Cotton Oil Mill, 1 cent; Big Spring Motor Co., 1 cent; Vaughn Bakery, 1-2 cent; Aggregate contributions were: Big Spring Herald \$5; Andy Brown \$5; Miller-Oldham, \$5; Wacker's, \$2.50; Dr. Frank Boyle, \$1.50; J. W. Haygood, \$1; and Newton Robinson, \$1, and Burr's Store, \$5.

Around 150 guns participated in a rabbit drive in the Lomax sector Wednesday. The number of rabbits killed was variously estimated from 1,000 to 2,500. Close to 100 of the hunters were Big Spring people who got their first chance to timber up their shootin' irons on the 20-section drive since last fall. The drivers were treated to a dinner on the J. Y. Robb farm consisting of barbecued beef, mutton and the old standby—son-of-a-gun.

Two hunters—Howard Schwarzenbach and Pat Patterson—killed a fox each in the drive.

Ranchers figure that 14 rabbits will eat as much grass as one cow. Figuring from that basis, 71 head of cattle could be pastured for every 1,000 jackrabbits killed.

Prices being paid by local produce houses for farm products Thursday were: hens 7 to 10c; fryers 20c; eggs 11c and grade No. 1 cream 25c.

An interesting exhibit at the County FFA and 4-H club show was four Rambouillet bucks shown by Breeder L. F. Hodges of Sterling county. The bucks averaged over 250 pounds.

The Big Spring Auction company, which celebrated its second anniversary in Big Spring last month, showed a true spirit of cooperation with the club boys when

their animals were sold through the auction ring Wednesday as witnessed by the prevailing good prices received by the lads.

Pat Martin, Jr., of Pyote, who showed the grand champion calf at the Monahan stock show this week received 20 cents a pound for the animal. The show was judged by G. W. (Stud) Barnes who officiated at the club show here. Calves sold there averaged \$14.75 per cwt.

HELSINKI, Mar. 21 (AP)—American volunteers in Finland will remain indefinitely, it was disclosed today by the Finland association, which appealed for continued contributions of supplies for the American unit.

American volunteers, continuing to arrive, are being assigned with their unit to border patrol duty and reconstruction work.

The newspaper Uusi Suomi said today that Finland's coalition war government, formed by Premier Risto Ryti Dec. 1, the day after Russia started her invasion, is expected to resign immediately after the Easter holidays.

The newspaper said it was likely that President Kyosti Kallio would ask Ryti to remain as premier.

Meanwhile, the removal of Finns from the Karelian Isthmus, ceded to Russia in the peace treaty of Moscow, March 12, has virtually been completed.

Hosiery No. 1
Item In Lady's
Wardrobe Budget

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—The next time you see a pair of silk stockings go tripping down the street, ponder this, brother: Many a woman spends more on them than on dresses.

It has been figured out by the labor department, which has been doing a little plain and fancy investigating on what city folks spend on clothes.

The average woman invests more than one-eighth of a \$55 clothing budget at the stocking counter. To be exact, she spends \$7.61 for hosiery. (That's a little more than 11 pairs at 69 cents each.)

Shoes are the biggest item—\$7.83. Dresses come third, a mere \$6. The working girl spends a little more, especially if she is a clerical worker; the homemaker much less.

The mere male provides no such startling statistics. His big moment comes every two years, when he gets a new suit, price \$24. Annually he spends \$6 less for haberdashery, etc., than women do for their accessories.

All the figures were based on a 1234-36 survey, with the family income of those questioned averaging \$1,524 a year.

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Always Farm Disparity?

Last May, when the senate voted \$338,000,000 for the farmers, Secretary Morgenthau was led to comment, "I don't care to discuss the merits of the (agricultural) bill, but I do want to say the increase added to our present deficit disturbs me greatly."

Early this month, the senate appropriations subcommittee approved a \$297,000,000 rise in funds for the department of agriculture. This added to \$983,000,000 was the farm bill's total which had been approved by the house at \$749,000,000 and recommended by the president at \$788,900,000. On the seventh anniversary of the first AAA, the president told farm leaders how he had tried to keep his 1932 pledges. The extraction of the farmer from his unhappy plight in the intervening years has already cost more than three billions of dollars in direct government payments and fundamental difficulties are still unsolved.

Swivel point of the whole agricultural dilemma is money—not alone the actual cash that the farmer does or does not receive, but the relation between his income and the prices of his necessities. There has been, except for a brief period in 1937, it is shown by the Administrative and Research corporation, a wide gap between these two price levels. Despite the sharp upturn in farm quotations resulting from the war boomlet, the farmers' purchasing power at the close of 1939 was not much better than it was in 1934.

What the administration has tried and is still trying to do is to purchase farm prosperity. If the senate and house approve new fund expansion, an additional \$900,000,000 will be needed, which is equivalent to the amount that congress has pared from 10 different appropriation bills now up for consideration. In addition, this amount will either break through the statutory debt limit of 45 billions, or make mandatory the raising of new taxes. And it appears obvious that the added appropriation will make little headway toward correcting the farmer's income-outgo ratio.

Farm subsidies are not a monopoly of the present administration and any political party in office over the coming years will be faced with the necessity of compromising political hand-outs with farm "economics." And whatever method is used, whether direct crop subsidy, farm loans or price parity programs, taxes will be the source of payment. And these taxes will go toward raising the prices of goods which the farmer now finds to be at a disparity.

NEW YORK—Have you ever stood in front of a restaurant window and watched a pretty girl flip flapjacks? Well, don't deceive yourself. It wasn't the flapjacks that interested you, it was the girl. They stand in a window before five great vats of boiling grease and they fry more than 4,000 chickens every week. It's one of the best free shows on Broadway. It's the best crowd-gatherer between 42nd street and Carnegie Hall, and it goes on every day in the week, from noon till after midnight.

WASHINGTON—Secret: Wheeler-for-President club sent around a letter the other day with a line at the top, "personal and confidential." The next line was "to the public."

Politics: Talk in dry circles here is that the prohibition party may try to draft Roger W. Babson, the economic sage of Wellesley, Mass., as its candidate for president. From national headquarters in Chicago, the offer already has gone to Mr. Babson. I hear. The statistician would easily be the best-known candidate the party ever had, might even run up more than 800,000 votes and thereby outstrip any other candidate the party ever put forward in vote-getting. His position as moderator of Congressional churches in the United States would help.

Geography: The business section and much of the principal residential district of Washington is in the capitol's backyard. Many Washingtonians go weeks and months without ever seeing the front of the capitol.

Diplomacy: Ambassador Joe Kennedy's intimations before he went back to England that it might be all right with him if somebody took over his job before very long has started another guessing bee. Most often guessed, Secretary of War Woodring.

Information Bureau: Lewis Deschler, house parliamentarian. He answers about 50 questions a day, keeping the representatives straight on what they can and can not do, so far as the rules are concerned.

Census: Secretary Ickes jumped the gun on the census bureau. His boys in Death Valley national park in California have been taking a census for months—of desert bighorn sheep. The boys report it's proof of the old adage, too. Count a couple of bighorns and you're so weary you can't hold your eyes open.

History: April 15 being the 75th anniversary of the death of Abraham Lincoln, I went up to the capitol today to search out the catafalque on which the body of the Civil War president lay in state in the capitol rotunda—and found it—in George Washington's tomb!

Far down in the sub-basement of the capitol, directly below the center of the dome, is the simple crypt that was intended to house for all time the bodies of George and Martha Washington. Its walls are whitewashed brick. An arched entrance is barred by iron gates, held together by a ponderous, but modern, lock. On the wall at the left of the entrance is the congress resolution of 1799 providing for construction of the tomb. On the wall opposite is a list of the 11 men whose bodies have rested in state on Lincoln's bier. One of the honored dead is nameless. The unknown soldier.

The catafalque itself, a simple 11-by-6-foot table-like structure of rough pine boards, covered with black cloth, is the only thing in the tomb. Two years ago, to protect it from dust and moisture, the bier was placed in a glass case, where it will remain until it is used again.

Other than Lincoln and the unknown soldier, the men whose remains have rested on the bier are Thaddeus Stevens, Charles Sumner, James A. Garfield, John A. Logan, William McKinley, Maj. P. C. L'Enfant, Admiral Dewey, Warren G. Harding and William Howard Taft.

The bodies of George and Martha Washington were never moved to capitol tomb, because, in 1832, Washington refused permission for transfer of the Washington refused permission for transfer of the first president's remains. The reason... Washington in his will provided for construction of a new vault at Mount Vernon and specifically expressed his wish that he and his family be buried there.

Except for an occasional congressman or senator, who knows of the presence of the tomb and brings some friend to see it, it is hardly ever visited. It's not on the capitol sight-seeing itinerary. Of all the historic rooms in Washington, it is the least known.

Border Patrol Report Given

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21 (AP)—Work of federal border patrolmen operating along 2,018 miles of Mexican boundary was cited before a congressional committee considering legislation to appropriate funds for the labor department next fiscal year.

Testifying in support of his request for funds, James L. Houghteling, immigration and naturalization inspector, told a house appropriation subcommittee that 351 patrolmen watched along the border, 1,321 miles of which was in Texas.

He said 126 of the number were employed out of the San Antonio district, 135 out of El Paso and the remainder westward through California to the Pacific ocean. The El Paso district extends from the Big Bend country of West Texas to Ajo, Ariz.

Discussing methods of operation, Houghteling said the patrol usually worked in two lines, one close to the border and the other some 30 to 40 miles inland. Cooperation of residents in that margin territory in informing officials of the presence of strangers is one of the important checks the service has on aliens trying to slip into this country.

Houghteling commented the border patrol for its efficiency, asserting that very few aliens enter the country at other than ports of entry. He estimated that approximately 1,000 alien sailors annually abandon their ships on reaching American ports and are at large in the country. Many are caught when arrested for some offense committed years later.

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Lower Freight Rates To Mean Heavy Saving

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21. (AP)—Reduced rail freight rates scheduled to go into effect in the Southwest will mean savings in shipping costs of \$700,000 annually to cotton growers of Texas and Oklahoma, according to Charles B. Bowling, chief of the transportation section of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

The estimate was made in a letter to Chairman Jones (D-Tex.) of the house agriculture committee. He cited as an example the old rate of 50 cents per 100 pounds on cotton shipped from Amarillo, Texas, to ports on the Gulf of Mexico, and said the proposed rate of 46 cents represented a saving of 13 cents, or 88.9 cents per bale weighing 530 pounds.

The rate reductions were recently agreed to by traffic executives of southwestern rail carriers to meet motor truck competition, and AAA officials said, and are expected to go into effect by the time cotton movement begins this summer. They must yet be approved by the interstate commerce commission.

Rate reductions planned from Texas and Oklahoma points to Gulf ports from Lake Charles, La., westward and cited in Bowling's letter, other than Amarillo, included:

Lubbock, Texas, 59 cents to 46 cents; Wichita Falls, Texas, 43 cents to 34 cents; Childress, Texas, 86 cents to 46 cents.

Reductions based upon distances were as follows: 100 miles, 11 cents to 10 cents per 100 pounds; 200 miles, 22 to 20; 300 miles, 34 to 29 cents; 400 miles, 53 to 40; 500 miles, 59 to 46; 600 miles, 64 to 52; 700 miles, 76 to 60.

DRESSES ON 19 CTS. A DAY, WITH CLOTH WATCH ON BUDGET

AUSTIN, (AP)—A college girl can be well dressed for as little as 19 cents a day.

Only one girl out of 80 questioned at the University of Texas home economics department was able to accomplish it, however.

She spent \$70 for clothing in one year; the group average was \$230 and the greatest expenditure was \$730.

The girl who spent \$70 bought four dresses, two of wool, one linen, and one silk; two wool suits, a tweed coat and a sweater and made four blouses and slips. She paid 69 cents for gowns and 79 cents for hose. Two pairs of shoes cost \$4.98 and \$1.50.

The girl with the \$730 wardrobe had 12 daytime dresses, five evening gowns, 16 pairs of shoes, seven hats and six purses.

Movie Shows How Counterfeiters Work



1. Professional money-passers usually work in pairs. These two have stopped their car near a grocery store where a passing job will be attempted. The fellow in the driver's seat is taking a bogus \$10 bill from a flashlight cylinder used to conceal a roll of counterfeit. His companion will attempt to pass the bill.

2. The passer has presented the phoney \$10 in payment for a small purchase. But the alert clerk suspects that the bill is spurious. She detains him under pretext of insufficient change in the cash register. She calls the manager to ask for change. The manager detects the counterfeit, phones the police.

3. A policeman arrives and takes the bogus bill passer into custody. (The actual passer usually carries only one bogus bill into a store with him, so that if apprehended he may be able to persuade a policeman that he himself is an innocent victim of counterfeiting. A second policeman has advanced on the car outside.)

WASHINGTON—The U. S. Secret Service has gone into movie production. As part of a campaign to make counterfeiting "the most unprofitable racket in America."

The famous governmental agency, which combats bogus-money passing, is presenting a picture called "Know Your Money." It will be shown in all sections of the country.

The movie aims to teach Americans, particularly tradespeople, bank employees and other handlers of money, how to tell counterfeit bills and coins from the real stuff. The film also shows how an intended victim can help catch a fake money-passer. Leading roles, including those of victims and passers, are taken by secret service personnel.

Losses from counterfeiting, which reached a peak of \$1,500,000 in 1937, dropped to \$365,000 in 1939. Officials attribute the big decline largely to an educational campaign in 1938 among money-handlers in New York where a high percentage of bogus currency was being circulated. The officials are confident the new nationwide campaign will bring losses down to a negligible sum.

The small business man is the most common victim of the counterfeiter. It's much harder to pass him bills in larger stores where they handle lots of money and are constantly on the watch for fake currency.

The most effective way of telling whether a suspected bill is good or bad is to compare it with a genuine one of the same type and denomination.

First, observe carefully the portrait of the famous American on the bill. The genuine is lifelike, stands out from oval background

which is a fine screen of regular lines. Notice particularly the eyes. The portrait on the counterfeit is dull, smudgy or unnaturally white; scratchy; background is dark with irregular and broken lines.

Second, study the seal. On genuine bills, sawtooth points around the rim are identical and sharp. On counterfeit, sawtooth points are usually different, uneven, broken off.

Third, inspect the serial num-

bers. On genuine, they have distinctive style, are firmly and evenly printed; are of same color as seal. On counterfeit the style is apt to be different, poorly printed, badly spaced, uneven in appearance.

Fourth, inspect the paper. Good bills are printed on distinctive paper containing very small red and blue silk threads.

BRITISH LINERS OUT ON THE OPEN SEA

NEW YORK, Mar. 21. (AP)—Two of the proudest liners of the British merchant fleet ploughed uncertain waters today in a gamble with wartime hazards of the high seas.

Slightly more than 12 hours after the 35,730-ton Mauretania last night slipped out through a misty rain from the pier where she had been tied up for three months, the

giant Queen Mary nosed out into the sunlit-Hudson and passed down the bay.

The destination of the two liners was known to their commanders, who sailed under sealed orders, not to be opened until they were well at sea, but presumably sending them on dangerous missions as troop ships.

U. S. Gasoline Stocks Reach A New High

TULSA, Okla., Mar. 21. (AP)—The oil industry marked up new records for production and gasoline stocks but their effect was tempered somewhat today by a better feeling reported in the motor fuel market.

Stocks of finished and unfinished gasoline marched over the 100,000,000-barrel mark for the first time in history to 100,816,000, the American Petroleum Institute reported.

Crude oil production for the nation also reached a new peak of 3,890,050 barrels daily.

But on the market side, spring demand apparently was being felt. Two Tulsa concerns reported a quarter cent rise in Oklahoma natural gasoline since last Saturday.

Some published prices for house brand gasoline in the Mid-Continent area were up a quarter cent this week. Refiners termed the market tone firmer with demand also good for third-grade gasoline, kerosene, tractor and diesel fuels.

In the export trade, one marketer said a cable from London advised that Great Britain has banned shipment from the United States of lubricants to Belgium, Denmark and The Netherlands. Illinois displaced Oklahoma as

the third largest oil producing state in the nation.

In the field, the Oil and Gas Journal reported 500 completions for the week ended March 18, compared with 521 the previous week, and 408 a year ago.

Twenty-two Devonian Lime wells were completed in the Salem field of Illinois and Jasper county got a new pool. The Stoltenberg pool of Ellsworth county, Kansas, was extended in three directions. A wildcat, five miles southeast of Stroud, Okla., was showing for a pool opener. Montague county, North Texas, acreage prices are ranging from \$10 to \$100 an acre after completion of two deep discoveries. A new Tensleep sand pool was opened in Carbon county, Wyoming.

FAST-CLIMBING PLANE NEW TYPE DEFENSE AGAINST BOMBERS

ST. LOUIS, Mar. 21. (AP)—A "deadly" defensive weapon against bombers—an "interceptor" plane which can climb at a rate of more than a mile a minute—is being produced for an undisclosed foreign government at the St. Louis plant of Curtiss-Wright Corporation.

Test flights of the first plane off the production line yesterday showed it was "the fastest climbing type in the United States as well as the fastest climbing plane in the world, to our knowledge," said C. W. France, general manager of the factory.

The ship fairly leaped off the ground after a short run and the test pilot reported later he flew

vertically during part of the flight. The plane has a speed well over 300 miles an hour.

"This type of plane is much more effective than anti-aircraft batteries in combating high-flying enemy bombers because of its mobility and the rapidity with which it may be directed against an attack," France said.

Soil Erosion Expert To Be In Abilene

ABILENE, Mar. 21.—Dr. W. C. Lowdermilk, Washington, D. C., is recognized as one of the world's foremost authorities on man's age-old struggle with soil erosion. Monday, March 25, he will come here to present an illustrated discussion of Soil Erosion and Civilization in the Abilene high school auditorium at 8 p. m., J. Federal Bill Proposed To Abolish Poll Tax Watched; Would Probably Mean Abandonment Of Texas Law

AUSTIN, Mar. 21.—Texans who favor abolition of the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting are watching with close interest the hearing in congress on the Geyer bill.

The Geyer bill would forbid the poll tax requirement for voting in a federal election. Should it pass congress, it would prove a strong factor in complete abolition of the poll tax by the states.

Governor W. Lee O'Daniel is opposed to the poll tax requirement for voting in any election. Maury Maverick, mayor of San Antonio, is a strong opponent of the poll tax. Others from time to time have raised their voices against the poll tax.

Mrs. Homer P. Rainey, wife of the president of the University of

Texas, recently condemned the poll tax as un-American. Maverick in a recent national broadcast declared "what we have in the South today is a voteless white class" who can't afford to pay a poll tax. Speaking as a Texas southerner and as an American, there can be no semblance of democracy or any solution of the economic problems of the South unless the southern people as a whole vote.

Passage of the Geyer bill would almost force states requiring payment of a poll tax to abolish it. Otherwise, these states would be discriminating against voters who elect state officials. A person voting for a state official would have to pay a poll tax while the person who was interested only in federal officeholders would not be required to pay a poll tax.
