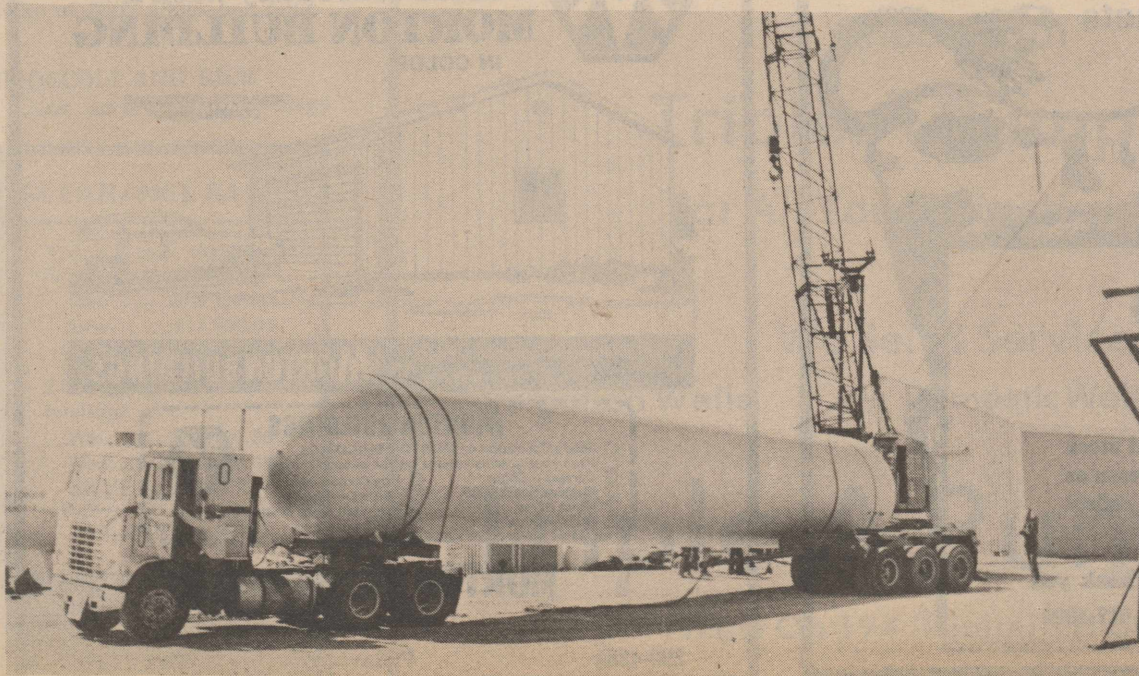
because of lack of response from other teams.

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Five Minutes With The Bible

REASONS FOR BELIEVING THE BIBLE TO BE TRUE

If the Bible is not true, then there is no acceptable and trustworthy history. No other history has such characteristics of authenticity and genuineness and reliability. The Bible has every mark of being authentic. The fact that these men with a cross section of livelihoods, accomplishments and talents have written a sublime and harmonious book is unequivocal proof that these men "spoke

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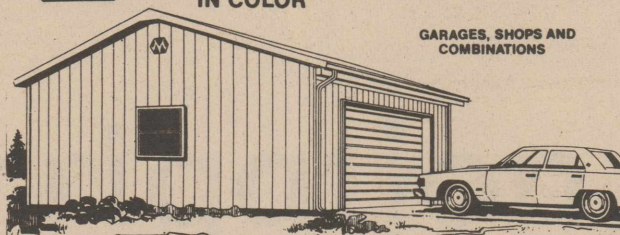
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from God, being moved by the Holy Spirit" (II Peter 1:21).

BEEF & BEAN ENCHILADAS

1 1/2 lb ground beef
1 chopped onion
1 - 15 1/2 oz can mashed refried beans
1 t salt
1/8 t garlic powder
1/3 c taco sauce
12 corn tortillas
2 cans (19 oz each) enchilada sauce

3 c Cheddar cheese, shredded
Saute ground beef and onion until meat is browned and onions are soft. Dip off excess grease. Stir in beans, salt, garlic powder, taco sauce and heat until bubbly. Heat enchilada sauce. Pour half of it into an oblong 3 qt casserole dish. Place about 1/3 cup of beef mixture on each tortilla that has been dipped in hot fat and drained. Place flap side down after overlapping meat mixture. Pour remaining enchilada sauce over filled tortillas. Add cheese on top. Heat in 350°

oven until cheese is melted.

SOUR CREAM COFFEE CAKE

2 sticks margarine
2 c sugar
2 eggs
1/4 t salt
1 t vanilla
2 c sifted flour
1 t baking powder
1 sm carton sour cream
Topping:
1/2 c chopped pecans
2 T brown sugar
1 t cinnamon

Beat margarine and sugar until creamed. Add eggs, salt and vanilla. Add flour and baking powder. Add sour cream. Place one half mixture in well greased and floured pan. Sprinkle on one half of topping. Pour rest of batter in, then sprinkle on rest of topping. Bake at 350° about one hour.

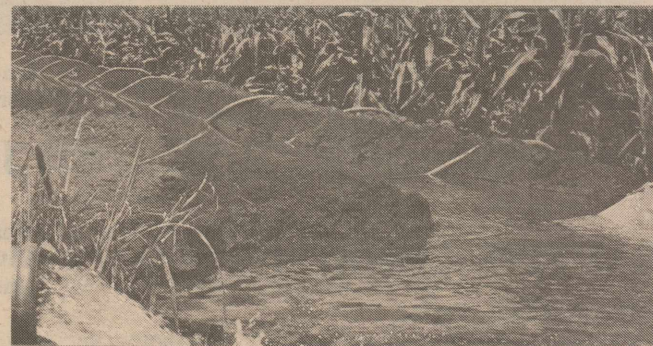

will spend six days visiting places of historical interest, visiting members of Congress and getting a first hand view of their "Government in Action."

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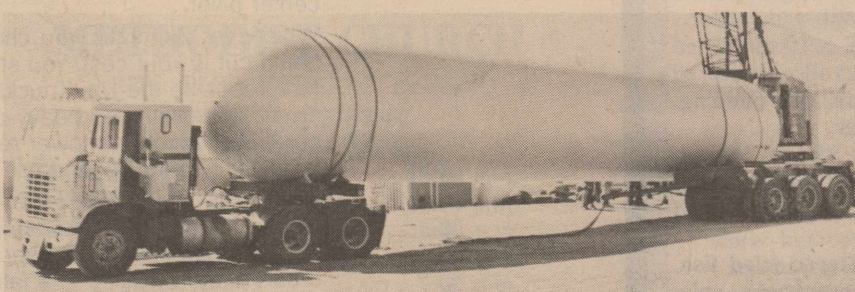
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Little Dribblers

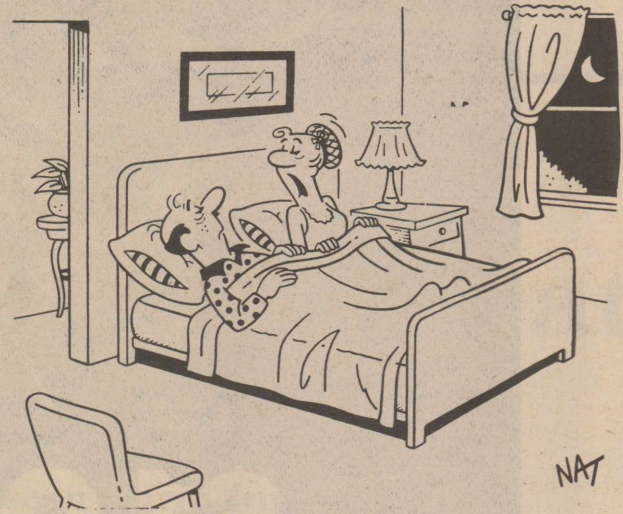

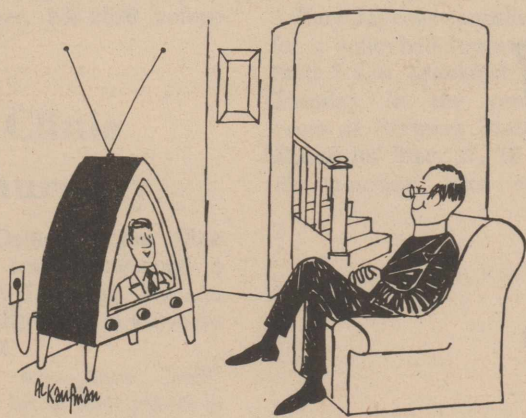
