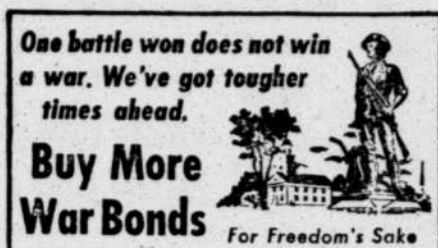

Bond Quotas Are Assigned Communities; Best Bond Seller In Stores Gets Cash

Plans for the Fifth War Loan campaign, which opens June 12 and runs through July 8, are taking shape and J. R. Earnest, chairman of the drive has announced the quotas for each community in Dawson County. Last week Dawson County's quota of \$805,000 was announced, out of which \$320,000 Series E Bonds are to be sold. Following is a list of the communities and their quota for the new bond drive, as well as the quota which they were assigned during the Fourth War Loan. Chairman Earnest reports that the quota assigned each community for the Fifth War Loan was based on the results of the sales in each of the communities during the Fourth War Loan Drive.

Each industry in Lamesa will also be assessed a quota for the on-coming bond drive. Earl Goen is in charge of this phase of the drive and will assign the amount of bonds to be sold by local industries.

Chairman Earnest states that the community in Dawson County which completes its quota first will receive a handsome flagpole and flag of their community. The flagpole and flag will be furnished by County Judge Kilmer B. Corbin and the County Commissioners.

Mr. Earnest reports further that one of the features of the drive is the mystery shopper who will visit the local stores every few days during the drive and pay a sum of cash to the clerk who will try hardest to sell him a bond. The clerk with the best approach, and with the most tactful sales talk in selling a bond will receive a cash sum for his efforts.

In the Fifth War Loan Campaign, Mrs. Arthur Hull, will serve as chairman of the Ladies Division in this county. In the last drive, the local women were particularly helpful in assisting with the quota. Mrs. Hull will call on the women of this area, for assistance in this project and will organize them for the drive. Women who desire to help in the campaign should contact her.

Mr. Earnest states that many voluntary workers will be needed to put the drive over in Dawson County, and he requests that all who will help, contact him. Each community will need workers to put over the drive. The ability of Dawson County to reach their objective will depend largely on the extent to which it organizes down to the smallest community.

Subsidy Payment To Be Increased In Few Months

Charles Tarter, administrative officer at the local AAA office, announced Saturday, May 20, that the Dairy Feed Subsidy Program would continue to operate in this county.

He stated that during the period beginning May 1 and ending August 31, 45 cents would be paid per hundred weight for whole milk, and that 6 cents would be paid per pound for butterfat.

Tarter reported that the period from September 1, 1944 to March 31, 1945 70 cents would be paid per hundred weight for whole milk, and that 10 cents would be paid per pound for butterfat.

O.P.A. Will Make A Service Survey

Following up the grocery store and restaurant price surveys made recently by price panels of local boards throughout the District, this week the price panels are making a service survey which will be a check on prices charged by automotive repair establishments, laundry and dry cleaning establishments, appliance repair shops, and shoe repair shops. This announcement came from the District Office of Price Administration in Lubbock.

These surveys are in line with the continuous program of the price panels to bring prices in line with legal ceilings. Laundry, dry cleaning and shoe repair establishments will be surveyed from May 22-29; automotive and appliance repair shops from May 29-June 3.

1400 Packages Of Cigarettes Sent Across By Lions

L. F. Kennedy of McCarty Community states that area received approximately 2 inches of rain. O. K. received approximately 1-4 inch, and Hancock received moisture ranging from 1-2 to 3-4 inch, Klondike and Key received an 1 1/2 inch rain.

Citizens residing near Cotton Center report a light shower, and persons residing near Highway Baptist Church state that it did not rain in that area.

The six mile territory directly west of town received approximately 1 inch of rain.
