AGED MAN DIES IN HAMMER ATTACK

FAIRY STORY?

Lost Fortune Is Returned After Long Court Fuss

(By Associated Press)
ELDORADO, Ark., July 25.—Fortune is smiling again at Pat Marr, 29, who at 22 left his New York east side home with a "grub stake" and in four years became a millionaire oil baron only to lose his wealth in litigation that ended in his conviction of a felony.

The New York state supreme court yesterday handed down a ruling that enriched the youth \$1,300,000 as it directed that the controlling interest in the Marr Oil corporation be returned to him. The court held that Marr was induced through misrepresentation to exchange his interest in the corporation for stock in the Southern States Oil corporation. Joseph Tumulty, secretary of the late President Wilson and Joseph C. Marr, Jr., receiver for the Southern States Oil corporation were defendants. The case had been in courts of Oklahoma and New York for three years.

Recovering Fortune
However the young man apparently was well on his way to recovering his lost fortune. Even last night when newspaper men sought him to discuss the ruling they learned he was at his new oil wells at Rainbow City working far into the night.

Marr came to Eldorado in 1921, the first year of the Arkansas oil boom. He had \$50,000 after the Smackover Light oil field was discovered and Marr was credited with the find. He acquired large holdings near Louann and organized the Marr Oil corporation. In 1924 he was arrested with other company heads to face charges based on evidence collected by government operatives. He was tried on a charge of using the mails to defraud and was convicted in federal court at Texarkana. A sentence of five years in the federal reformatory at Mansfield, Ohio, was imposed. The circuit court of appeals affirmed the sentence and the United States Supreme Court refused to review the case. Pending hearings Marr is said to have continued oil operations in Oklahoma.

He was paroled from the reformatory recently and went to Mexico, Texas, where he worked in the oil fields. About a month ago he came to Rainbow City where a new field was being worked. Three weeks ago he was reported to have brought in a 5,000 barrel gusher.

WRECKAGE OF PLANE FOUND

PIECES MAY BE PARTS OF NUNGESSER-COLLIS, IS BELIEF

COPENHAGEN, July 25.—A fragment of airplane wreckage with some silver and bronze colored fabric attached to it has been picked up off the Jutland coast. In the belief that the wreckage may possibly be part of the Nungesser-Collis plane, lost last year, the fragment has been sent to Paris for identification.

The wreckage was found by Dr. Frode, a Danish physician. There was a wireless receiver among the fragments and the only one missing of apparently similar description, Dr. Frode communicated with the French legation.

Before the piece of wreckage is sent to Paris it will be studied by two Danish experts who say that it is not improbable that it is a portion of the Nungesser-Collis plane, the "White Bird."

The "White Bird," manned by Captain Charles Nungesser and Captain Francois Collis left Le Bourget airdrome on the morning of May 8, 1927, and after being reported over Ireland disappeared from sight. Dispatches from Paris at that time said that no wireless apparatus was carried, the extra room being utilized for the storage of additional gasoline.

No trace whatever of the machine has been found during the past year.

Called By Illness

VICTORY SEEN IN WATER FUSS

INSULT NOT TO BACK PROJECT ON COLORADO

TEXAS TOWNS TO SEEK FURTHER RIGHTS ON WATERS OF RIVER

(By Associated Press)
ABILENE, July 25.—With announcement last night by the Middle West Utilities company of Chicago that it had terminated its negotiations with the Syndicate Power company looking toward development of hydro-electric projects on the Colorado river, citizens of West Texas who opposed the project apparently had gained a victory in the controversy which raged intermittently for several months.

At a meeting of interested parties six weeks ago at Brownwood it was announced that an agreement had been reached acceptable to all. At that time a representative of the Middle West Utilities company stated that his company was not disposed to press development of the Colorado river project if it were shown not to be to the best interest of the state.

W. T. C. C. Opposed Plans
The controversy arose when the Syndicate Power company obtained grants to water of the Colorado for purposes of hydro-electric development from the state board of water engineers. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce immediately called a meeting of interested parties, where resolutions were adopted, where the grant was in conflict with best interests of the section of the state involve and should be abrogated.

Decision Meets With Approval
BROWNWOOD, July 25 (AP).—Members of the Brownwood water district greeted with approval an announcement that the Insull interests had withdrawn their financial backing from the Syndicate Power company of Dallas, holder of several Colorado river permits for hydro-electric development.

The Insull interests, it was understood here, withdrew their backing at the request of the Texas concern.

Decision of the Syndicate Power company and interested Insull company to abandon the water project puts Brownwood in better position to obtain water for a reservoir on Pecos Bayou, a tributary of the Colorado, than at any time since the controversy began more than a year ago.

The Brownwood water board announced today that it would seek to have its permit increased by the state board of water engineers. A permit deemed insufficient for needs of the city was granted some time ago and the state refused to increase it in view of alleged prior rights of the Syndicate Power company.

City Employee Is Paralysis Victim
A. B. Jones, employee of the city light plant, was reported to be in a critical condition today following a stroke of paralysis which hit him at the plant at about 9:30 yesterday morning. He was unconscious throughout yesterday and last night and only a slight change was noted in his condition today, it was said. Jones has been living in Lubbock for the past fifteen years.

Building Permit
A building permit was issued today to M. A. Welch, contractor for a 4 room residence for John C. Craig on lot 9, block 65, Overton addition, to cost \$1,750. It was the fifty-fourth permit of the month and ran the July building figure to \$252,350 and \$2,034,000 for the year.

TWO KILLED IN GASOLINE FIRE

AS STORAGE TANKS IN ARIZONA IGNITE

(By Associated Press)
KINGMAN, Ariz., July 25.—Fire which broke out in the plant of the Union Oil company here, taking the lives of two men at the outset, raged unchecked in the huge petroleum store today but firefighters managed to keep it from spreading.

Both eastbound and westbound Santa Fe trains were being held up because the heat along the tracks was considered too intense to permit their passing the scene of the conflagration.

The blaze started yesterday when four men encountered trouble in the well on a large gasoline tank. The gasoline began to escape and flowed along the railroad tracks. Despite efforts of the four men to stop the flow, it continued and finally was ignited some distance from the tank.

Fire Engulfed Four Men
Immediately the loose gasoline was turned into a blazing river. The fire quickly engulfed the four men, whose clothes were set with gasoline. Harold Davis of Kingman and Charles H. Rogers of Los Angeles were burned so badly that they died. William St. Charles received burns which may prove fatal. The fourth workman, E. G. Farnham, was not seriously hurt.

Two Men Die IN GAS BLAST

(By Associated Press)
HENRYETTA, Okla., July 25.—Two oil field workers died today from burns received last night at a gas well nine miles west of here when gas from the well ignited, causing an explosion.

The explosion blew part of the derrick away and rocked the surrounding territory.

The dead, Stanley, Chatham, 30 years old, and Andy Hart, 40 years old, were working on the well when it exploded.

Cause Not Learned
The cause of the explosion was not ascertained. The men were alone at the well at the time. Persons about a quarter of a mile from the well were knocked down by the force of the explosion.

Chatham's home was in West Virginia. He is survived by his widow and five children. Hart lived at Oklahoma. He is survived by his widow and two children.

Rain Hampers Work In Wink Oil Field
WINK, Texas, July 25 (AP).—After five days of almost continuous rain in Wink county, oil field workers found their operations greatly hampered today. Streets in Wink were flooded and roads to the oil field were impassable. Citizens declare the present rainfall the heaviest in 20 years.

MOODY CALLED AS WITNESS IN MURDER TRIAL

STATE CHEMIST ALSO SUBPOENAED TO AID WIDOW'S DEFENSE

(By Associated Press)
RASTROP, July 25.—Governor Dan Moody and state chemist B. W. Wardlow have been subpoenaed to testify in behalf of Mrs. W. W. Waybourne, charged with the murder of her husband. It was learned here today. Wardlow is here ready to take the stand Mrs. Waybourne, scheduled to testify in her own behalf, was prostrate of nervous hysteria this afternoon, and at 10:30 a. m. Judge J. B. Price recessed court until 1:30 p. m.

Wardlow is expected to testify concerning the supposed exhumation of the body of J. J. Middleton, alleged to have been poisoned by his son, Hugh Middleton, blacksmith, who testified yesterday that he fired a Mexican to kill Waybourne at Mrs. Waybourne's request. Middleton is under indictment in both deaths of his father and Waybourne.

Defense Theory
The defense theory in the Waybourne trial is that the widow was implicated in the plot to kill her husband because she supposedly refused to keep silent about something she knew of the elder Middleton's death last fall.

Reason for the summons of Governor Moody was not revealed. Mrs. Waybourne had been called to take the stand Wednesday to offset testimony of Middleton, who turned state's evidence yesterday and told how he, at Mrs. Waybourne's bidding, hired a Mexican to kill her husband, whose insurance premiums they had been paying.

Issued On Tuesday
The Moody and Wardlow subpoenas were issued Tuesday afternoon. Whether Mrs. Waybourne has communicated with the Governor was not stated.

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NEW MARK SET IN JULY RAIN

MORE IN PROSPECT AS CLOUDS HANG LOW OVER BIG AREA

Rifts of clouds, muddy roads and soggy fields presaged more evidence this afternoon of the heaviest July rainy spell the South Plains has experienced.

A total of more than five and one half inches of rain have fallen on the territory in the vicinity of Lubbock since last Saturday. Five and twenty-seven hundredths inches fell up until last night when 27 inches were added at various intervals.

Good Crop Prospect
The rains have placed the section's crops in the best condition in years and paved the way for its greatest crop season, according to reports received by the Journal today from practically every point in the territory.

The fall has also turned the high-ways of the section in worse condition than in several years. Although not completely impassable with the exception of the stretch of road between the Labor party and Post and Snyder, travel has been slowed up considerably.

Buses were running out of the Union Bus Terminal here to all points in the section.

GRANDCHILD AND HUSBAND SOUGHT AFTER OHIO MAN IS FOUND SLAIN NEAR HIGHWAY

LAKE CITY, Fla., July 25.—A hammer murder which had for its victim, G. W. Simmons, aged tourist of Steubenville, Ohio, today confronted Columbiana county authorities while officers over the state were on the lookout for Simmons granddaughter and her husband who were seen with him last.

Sheriff W. B. Douglas piecing together fragments of stories brought in by his deputies surmised that Simmons' skull was crushed with a hammer during a struggle in a moving automobile on the outskirts of Lake City, and his body thrown into a clump of bushes where it was found.

Sheriff Douglas had information from Ohio that Mrs. Helen Booth, the grand-daughter, recently was made beneficiary under Simmons' will, but was unable to say how wealthy the Ohioan might have been.

Meanwhile Jacksonville police were holding an unclaimed automobile bearing blood stains and identified as a small sedan in which Mrs. Booth, Simmons and E. L. Booth, her husband, left a Lake City tourist cottage late Monday night or early yesterday.

Member Of Oldest Family In City

STEEBENVILLE, Ohio, July 25 (AP).—G. W. Simmons, who was killed at Lake City, Fla., with a hammer, was a member of one of the oldest families in this city and lived in an exclusive residential section. He left here about two months ago accompanied by a grand-daughter for Florida. For a number of years he had lived a retired life.

STEWART WINS INDIANA FUSS

FOILS OUSTER PLANS OF ROCKEFELLER BY STOCK PURCHASE

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 25.—The New York World today says that Colonel Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, has checked off efforts of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to force him from leadership of the \$500,000,000 corporation.

According to unimpeachable informants, says the World, Col. Stewart has cornered 81 percent of the stock of the corporation which he now controls by ownership or proxy.

Demands that Col. Stewart resign his post were made by Mr. Rockefeller after Stewart refused to testify before the Senate Transport Dome investigation committee.

The world says Wall Street is talking of a possible tightening of the alliance between Harry F. Sinclair, head of the Sinclair Consolidated Oil company, and Col. Stewart. Operations of the two companies already have been combined in the purchase of crude oil and transportation of oil by pipe line.

Their possible operation as a unit would create the largest single group in the oil refining and marketing industry in the world.

Duncan, superintendent of the Lubbock public schools, has received word from the state department of education at Austin that the Lubbock high school has been granted three new units of attendance—one half in reading, one additional unit in mathematics, and one-half additional in science, history and typing.

"Baby of National Committee" Becomes A Vice-Chairman of Democratic Party

WICHITA, Kas., July 25.—Away back in the '70s of the last century, a pioneer Kansas woman named Mrs. Laura V. Gardner was demanding that women be given the right to vote.

"Why shouldn't I be allowed a hand in running the affairs of state?" she used to ask. "Here I am, rearing five children without assistance. Shouldn't I have as much to say about government as a man?"

Mrs. Gardner lived to see woman suffrage a fact. At the time of her death she was a member of the board of education.

And now her daughter, Mrs. Florence Gardner Farley, is justifying her mother's faith in woman suffrage. For Mrs. Farley, "baby member" of the Democratic national committee, has just been named one of the five vice-chairmen. As assistant to Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross, of Wyoming, she is second in command of women's activities.

Politics is an old story of Mrs. Farley. The youngest child of the family, she was her mother's confidant during the dark days of the fight for suffrage, and in her childhood she learned much of the ways of political machinery. As she grew older she became a firm friend of the late Col. S. B. Amidon, who was probably the state's most prominent democrat. One result of this friendship was her election, seven years ago, as national committee woman from Kansas.

In that capacity Mrs. Farley attended the Madison Square convention. Party solidarity is one of her watchwords.

"There is no doubt in my mind that we can carry the country this year if we stand united and work harmoniously," she says. "Our purpose should be the success of democratic ideals. I believe those ideals of representative government will triumph if we work for them."

A few years ago Mrs. Farley's favorite form of recreation was horseback riding. But Wichita now has eight airplane factories, and Mrs. Farley has become an aviation enthusiast. Now she divides her spare time between horses and planes. Not long ago she and several others made an extended tour of the east by airplane.

OIL POSSIBILITIES OF SECTION ARE DISCUSSED BY ROTARIANS; SITUATION IN MEXICO EXPLAINED BY TECH HEAD

The present situation and the possibilities of oil in commercial quantities in the Seagraves, Hobbs, Lovington and the possible results of the assassination of President-elect Alvaro Obregon of Mexico, were topics for discussion at the regular weekly luncheon session of the Lubbock Rotary club at noon today. The luncheon was held at Hotel Lubbock.

Prior to the opening of the program Reece Wilson, member of the board of directors, presented Rev. Walter P. Jennings, recently retiring president, with a jeweled Rotary pin as a gift of the club. In making the presentation speech, Mr. Wilson praised the administration of Rev. Mr. Jennings and the latter replied in a few well chosen words of thanks.

Murray Is First Speaker

R. J. Murray, president of the club, was the first speaker. Recalling to the minds of his listeners his prophecy of two years ago that oil would be discovered in commercial quantities in the Lubbock basin territory, Mr. Murray sketched the operations in eastern New Mexico that far and renewed his prophecy that in 1929 this section would enjoy a brisk play. Mr. Murray is regarded as one of the best posted men in Lubbock on the oil situation to the west and south.

Walter S. Pacey, banker and student of economic and business conditions in this area, was the second speaker. He stressed the fact that the future of Lubbock and the South Plains is assured by virtue of the agricultural foundation, which he said had stood the test of time. He took the stand that the development of an oil field in the territory would not only be a wonderful business asset to the city but that it would also call for level-headedness and the best brains of leaders here to handle the situation to the best advantage of Lubbock and the territory.

Horn Talks on Obregon. Baring his remarks upon his personal knowledge of the situation in Mexico, Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Tech and formerly director of public education in Mexico City, decried the assassination of President-elect Obregon, whom he said, would have been a great leader of that country had he been given further opportunity. The speaker explained the troubled situation, placed the blame upon extremists, and said that he hopes Aaron Saenz, now governor of Nuevo Leon, would be made provisional president.

LUBBOCK CITIZEN, BACK FROM MEXICO TELLS OF ASSASSINATION OF OBREGON

(Continued from page 1)

that was a customary thing in Mexico, so the man would draw a sketch and show it to the subject, always getting closer to Obregon. He sketched the man to the right, then the one to the left of Obregon, and, finally, drew a picture of Obregon himself. He handed it to him, and as Obregon leaned over to look at it, the man shot him quickly five times. Obregon died almost instantly. No one seemed to realize what had happened; the orchestra was still playing, and, then, of a sudden, they were stunned into action.

"They trampled the assassin furiously, and would have killed him but a few sane men said, 'Do not kill the boy; get the truth from him.'"

"My sister and I were awakened by the entrance of my brother-in-law, as he came stumbling up the stairs of our home later that night moaning, 'Obregon! Oh, my God, my God! They've got Obregon!'"

He searched for some papers, which would admit him to the house where they had taken Obregon, and he went there to remain all night as a member of the bodyguard. But, before leaving, he said, "Don't let anyone, not even a servant, leave the house!"

"I tell you we were all in high nervous tension. The day that Obregon's body was removed from the city, all the banks and public places were closed for fear of violence."

"A friend of mine was coming to tell me 'good-bye,' for I had planned to leave soon, and as she stepped from a streetcar, a bullet whizzed by her ear."

"I wanted to leave as soon as possible, but my brother-in-law counseled against it, so I remained until Thursday, and you can't imagine how glad I was that I did, for the train I would have taken on Tuesday was wrecked by bombs planted by the revolutionaries."

"It is impossible," she said, abruptly, "to surmise what the result will be. Some people want a provisional president until another election can be held; others want a new constitution immediately. Cables will attempt to influence Congress, which meets September 1, to pass a law which will enable him to serve two years longer. That is the reason that he was looked upon with suspicion just after the assassination was committed. But, when he at once ordered all the police department to investigate, and when he went like a child over Obregon's body, the suspicion was averted, especially since Mr. Obregon, the Labor leader, had disappeared after handing in his resignation."

Revolution Is Feared
"It is thought that Saez, a very popular politician of the Obregon party, will be the next president, although my brother-in-law fears another revolution."

After the subject of the assassination had been quite exhausted, the Lubbock woman related other experiences which she had while in Mexico.

"When I arrived in Mexico City," she said, "the body of Carranza was being held there in state, and the entire nation was grieving over its ill-fated hero."

"It was indeed a tragedy, and, worst of all, is the information that Carranza had not wanted to leave when he did on that disastrous flight. The weather bureau had predicted a storm, but the newspaper and the various people who were backing him, urged him to leave, saying that many celebrations had been planned upon his arrival the next day. So he went, and his bride of only forty-five days became a widow."

Widow Far From Wealthy
"And, you know, I was told in Mexico City, that his widow is far from being wealthy, as the papers state, from Carranza's insurance and from the insurance of the government. The government insurance covered only his flight to Washington, but did not touch his return flight. Obregon had promised to provide him remuneration, however, and, now that Obregon is dead, Carranza's widow has no hopes of receiving any money."

Turning again to things political, she said:

"Here in the United States, we do not appreciate our privileges of freedom. Why, in Mexico, one can not lift his voice to give an opinion relative to politics that he does not understand his life. A woman murmured at the funeral of Obregon for some cause or other, 'I'm glad he's dead!'"

She was overheard and arrested and now no one knows anything about her."

Temperament Is Wrong
"I tell you, democracy is all right in the United States but it will not work in Mexico. The temperament of the people defeats it. Everybody wants to run things to suit himself."

"It is a shame, a tragedy, that it should be like that. Mexico is beautiful; perhaps the most beautiful country in the world today, but she is too dangerous. She has marvelous resources; gorgeous flowers and fruits, but life there is too uncertain. The high officials turn the country's resources to their own personal advantage, while the poor people and middle class people suffer and suffer. One wonders what is ever to become of them."

Absentee Voting Is Popular In County
Approximately 100 absentee votes had been registered with County Clerk Amos Howard here Tuesday night, as time for this form of ballot closed, it was announced, setting a new high record.

A total of 91 had been checked in late Tuesday afternoon, with a few others yet to be counted, and it is believed that still others which were placed in the mail by voters before the time expired will bring the number past 100.

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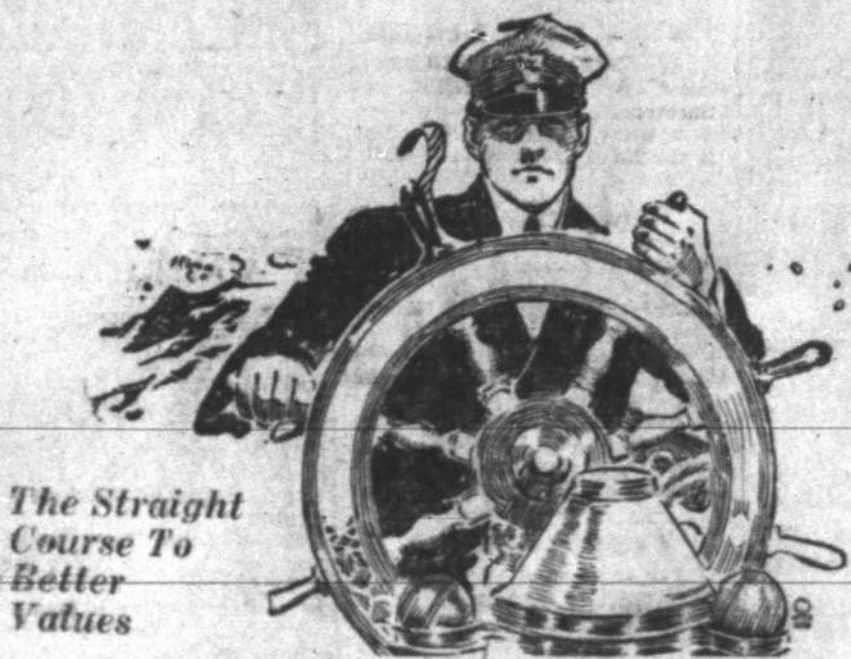

THREE MONTHS OF HARD WORK FITS CHAMPION

KNOCKOUT PREDICTED AS TUNNEY CLOSES HIS TRAINING

 CHICAGO, N. Y., July 25.—Three months Gene Tunney has toiled through a most rigorous training season and now, thanks to his own efforts alone, he is physically and mentally perfect for the first fight of his career, New Zealand champion tomorrow night.

Though Tunney has fought but once since 1926, when he warded off the title from Jack Dempsey to Tom Heenev, he still enters the ring, the better boxer of the two. He has probably gained a terrific science during his long lay-off, for he has always been a close student of his trade.

Knockout is Predicted
 Tunney claims he has never been stronger, that he is punching harder and he has confidently predicted that he will defeat Heenev, probably by a knockout.

During his training stage, using which he has never appeared outside of the ring in anything but a sweater, shabby linen trousers and an old pair of shoes, scarcely more than a shadow of his former self, Tunney has been developing a powerful right hand body punch, a blow which Heenev has always had great trouble fending.

He has never been so strong as he is now, and he has been working with him for the last few days. Tunney said when he left the ring, "Heenev is a rugged fighter, but I have complete confidence in my own ability. I am better than I was for Jack Dempsey last year."

His One Companion
 Tunney's only companion today was his dog, a small, scruffy animal who has been sharing the champion's lake side cabin for several weeks. Tunney will remain with Tunney until tomorrow morning, when Tunney will leave for Lake Pleasant in a motorboat, where he will camp in a tent.

Though most of Tunney's advisers and thousands of his well-wishers have pleaded with him to try a shore, commingled means of traveling, he has remained obstinate. The plane will be piloted by Bill Winger, Curtiss field aviator who first taught him to fly. Charles V. Bob of New York, owner of the plane, will be a passenger.

Unlike most boxers, Tunney has not become ill-tempered and nervous with the end of his training. He calmly went through his training yesterday and last night, patiently conversed with well-wishers until 9 p. m., when he retired to his cabin.

Colloim issued the following statement: "In response to the most urgent requests of the French Lawn Tennis federation that we should not let the opportunity of seeing one of the greatest players in the world in competition, I have decided to assume the responsibility of authorizing Mr. Wear to play Tilden on the Davis Cup team."

Colloim, communicating his declaration, cabled the United States Lawn Tennis association at New York as follows: "French misunderstanding our position and have brought pressure to bear on our Ambassador who says from the standpoint of international relations it is important accede to their request."

"Considering it to be the best interest of our association, I have issued the following, which I trust meets with your approval."

There followed the statement given above.

NEW YORK TRADING

July eased after the first flurry covering subsided, and the general list was selling about 10 to 15 points net lower by the end of the first hour, prices making new low ground for the movement.

October contracts sold off to 20.52 at net slightly better demand at that figure, although it was supplied on bulges of a few points. Offerings increased on publication of the weekly weather report this morning causing a fall to 20.48 for October, 21 points below the closing quotation of yesterday. There had been considerable selling earlier in the week in expectation of a favorable weekly report, and the market was steadily buying covering at a decline, which caused moderate sales. The market was steady at a decline of 8 to 11 points.

NEW ORLEANS TRADING
NEW ORLEANS, July 25 (P)—The cotton market opened steady at a price of 3 to 1 point in response to higher Liverpool cables. The early demand was quickly supplied however by ring selling induced by favorable crop advice and a statement by the Texas commissioner of agriculture estimating the Texas crop at 71 per cent of normal and forecasting a yield of between four and a half to five million bales. The report said that insect damage so far this season had been slight. The subsequent decline carried October off to 19.95 and December 19.85, or 17 to 18 points under the previous close.

Toward the end of the first hour the market continued easier and near the low with traders holding off in advance of the weekly weather and crop summary.

Offering increased later when the weekly report proved favorable and October sold off to 19.85 and December to 19.75, or 26 points down from opening and 21 to 24 points below the previous close. When the offerings were absorbed, however, the July position which expires at noon, soared 60 points or 3 a bale. The rally was said to be due to the absorption of July contracts by southern mills. Although delivery lost some of the gain, it remained firm. Other months advanced in sympathy and prices recovered about 19 points of the loss toward mid-session the market moved weak again losing part of its gain.

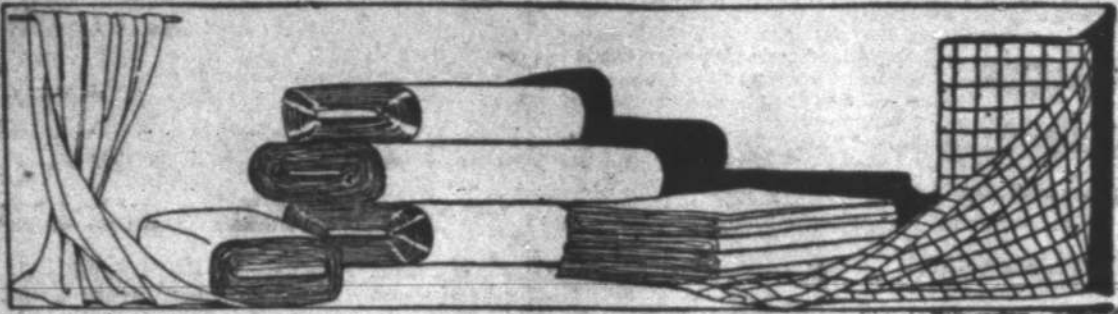

Telephone Company Is Moving Its Lines

ODESSA, July 25.—Five miles of the lines and poles of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and the American Telephone and Telegraph company will be moved one mile south of the present locations to get rid of the interference caused by proximity of high lines of the Texas Electric Service company.

High lines feeding the oil fields and cities within sixty miles, radiate from the Odessa power plant and it has been found that static and electrical disturbances in the telephone and telegraph lines are caused by the high power of the electric plant. Accordingly the lines are being moved south one mile. A crew of 25 men will be employed at the task about 60 days.

SANDINO NEAR HONDURAS BUT FORCES SMALL

LITTLE TROUBLE TO BE FEARED IN FUTURE FROM REBEL BAND

(By Associated Press)
 MANAGUA, N.C., July 25.—Brigadier General Logan Feland, commanding American marines, believes the rebel General Augustino Sandino is near the Honduras border with his field of operations small. He thinks that there is small likelihood that the insurgents will be able to cause further serious disturbance. Threats that Sandino intends to conserve his forces until shortly before the national election on November 4 and stage an overthrow to nullify the election are not taken seriously in marine quarters.

Confined to Small Area
 "Sometimes Sandino may cross into Honduras and then return to Nicaragua," General Feland said, "but the scope of his operations is confined to a comparatively small area."

The marines are as active as ever, patrolling the northern area and there is little chance that the rebels will be able to cause further serious disturbances. Patrols in both the east and west are tightening their grip, making it exceedingly difficult for Sandino and his followers to enter the populated districts. Of course bands of lesser importance are still capable of causing trouble, but we are much encouraged over the voluntary surrender of nearly 600 rebels within a month in the vicinity of Somoto Occidental, and other points in the northern area.

The last contact between ground troops and rebels occurred May 14 when a patrol of marines exchanged shots with rebels. This resulted in a few rebel casualties.

Last Air Contact June 12
 The last air contact, which was only minor, occurred on July 6. The latest serious air contact was on June 12 when a plane dropped bombs on a band along the upper River killing a number of the rebels.

At present there are nearly 6,000 marines in Nicaragua. These are distributed at fifty-four different posts. It is thought that this makes it impossible for the rebels to cause serious disturbance during the presidential election practically impossible.

The body was sent to Baird for burial.

Work Starts Soon On Odessa Gas Line

ODESSA, July 25.—Engineers of the West Texas Gas company are surveying lines for gas mains, work on which will be started immediately. According to the contract with the city, gas will be turned on on or before Sept. 15th, after which work of extending the mains to Pecos will commence.

Although there is an abundance of gas in the oil fields near here, it contains a heavy sulphur content that necessitates expensive treating for commercial use. Accordingly, gas from the Amarillo fields will be piped here.

HAWKINS SCORES MOODY, WARDLAW ON SMITH STAND

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 24.—In an address here last night punctuated frequently by vociferous applause, Judge W. E. Hawkins, of Breckenridge, candidate for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, charged that Governor Dan Moody has done more for "Al Smith" than any other man in the South.

He declared that Louis J. Wardlaw, also a candidate for the gubernatorial nomination on the democratic ticket, "has been for Smith from the start, but is keeping quiet because he is a candidate for governor."

"I am a candidate for governor, too," he said, "but I had rather defeat Al Smith than to be governor. The anti-Smith movement among democrats is not a bolt; it is a revolution, or rather a counter-revolution."

Listing names of Governor Moody

and national committeeman Jed C. Adams of Dallas, on a "roll of odium," he charged that Adams sought a special meeting of the state executive committee to strike names of candidates who said they would not support Governor Smith from primary ballots, and that Governor Moody "refused to lift his hand or raise his voice to have our names put on the ballot as prescribed by law."

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 23 (AP).—The flight to Stockholm, Sweden, of the "Greater Rockford" which was to have started at 5 a. m. today was postponed until tomorrow because of unfavorable weather predictions.

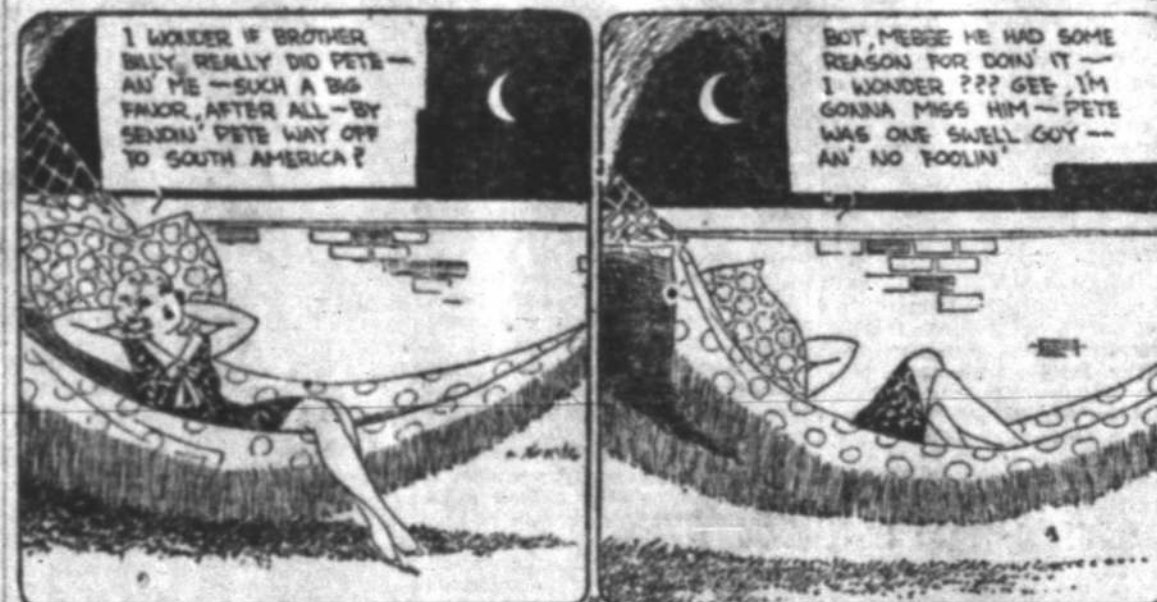

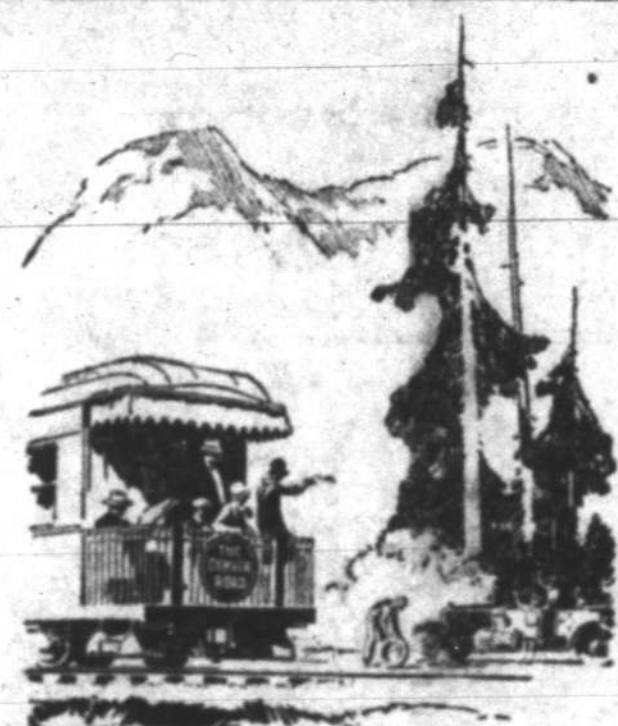

REED HELD FOR GRAND JURY IN AUTO EXPLOSION

(By Associated Press)
ROCKFORD, Ill., July 25.—Shortly after Paul Reed, 24 year old draftsman, confessed stealing three sticks of dynamite from a store near Peoria, Ill., he was bound over to the October county grand jury without bond for the murder of Vernon Plager, Rockford, radio expert, who was killed by a bomb in his automobile last Thursday.

Reed, however, continued to deny any connection with the bombing, maintaining he stole the dynamite to blast out a spring at a lake in southern Wisconsin where he planned a fishing trip.

All but one stick of dynamite was found in Reed's rooming house. He said the missing stick had been broken and he threw it into the river. It was a dynamite bomb that blew up Plager's car, experts determined.

Mrs. Iva Plager, widow of the radio man, with whom Reed had had a clandestine affair, was released today after having been held for questioning since the bombing.

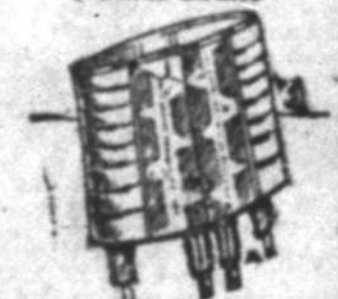
