Pvt. Jordan Was Wounded On June 15th In France

Word was received Thursday afternoon, June 22, from the War Department that Private Kermit B. Jordan, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Jordan and husband of the former Miss Louise Ranson of this city, had been wounded seriously on June 15 in France.

Pvt. Jordan, 23, a member of the anti-aircraft division, has been overseas since February. Until recently, he was stationed in England. He entered the service approximately 2 years ago.

He has 3 brothers who are also members of the armed service. One brother, Pfc. Wendell Jordan, also a member of the anti-aircraft division, is stationed in New Guinea. Sgt. Dewitt Jordan is now in California and is with the air corp, and Pvt. Bill Jordan, a member of the Quartermaster Corp, is stationed at Walnut Ridge, Arkansas.

Another brother, Sgt. S. J. Jordan, Jr., was recently killed in England, where he was a turret gunner.

Pvt. Jordan has one sister, Miss Mary Ruth Jordan, who resides with her parents in El Wanda Heights.

Pfc. Carl S. Hester Tells Of Great Job Done By Medics

TEMPLE, June 22 (AP) — One of the great jobs of the war has been done by the medics, and the long list of wounded already back here at McCloskey general hospital is proof that no outfit is more constantly exposed to danger at the front.

Pfc. Carl S. Hester of Lamesa, whose medical unit was attached to the 36th in Italy, tells of an incident at Mignano when the medics had gone forward under heavy artillery fire to remove wounded from the battlefield.

"We found one man pretty badly hurt," he said. "It was rough and muddy and it took four men to carry the litter. Enemy artillery spotters must have seen us on our way to the aid station, because we hadn't gone far when we were bracketed by shells. One of the shells burst right over us, hitting everybody except the man on the litter. I was blown into a hole 15 feet deep. It took quite a bunch of medics, then, to get us all out of there. But they got us out after dark."

Selected for this special school on the basis of his recruit training aptitude test, the Bluejacket's course of study included the use, function and maintenance of all electric tools used by the Navy. Electricity and the radio elements of electricity were also included in the course.

Drouth Broken In Dawson County

Dawson County farmers who live in the dry districts, report a much needed rain Friday and Saturday of last week. The northern part of Dawson County reports as much as one inch, while one district about 7 miles north on Brownfield road received up to five inches.

Reports coming in from other parts of the county indicate that from one-half to an inch of moisture was received.

Official rain gauge figures in Lamesa reveal that three-quarters of an inch fell in the city during the two days.

The Munger and Welch districts will be greatly benefited. Many farmers in those districts had been unable to plant due to dry weather. While it is getting late for planting it is thought that farmers in the dry belt will be able to get a feed crop started.

Some damage to growing crops has been reported from heavy rainfall.

Lt. McBride Is In A Military Police Unit In Italy Now

ALLIED FORCE ADVANCE PRESS HEADQUARTERS, Italy—Second Lieutenant O. C. McBride, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar C. McBride, 501 South Sixth Street, Lamesa, is with the regiment of Military Police that has made war-disrupted Naples into one of the most efficient ports in the world through its regulation of traffic in the city's maze of narrow alleys and congested streets.

Traffic MPs have had to untangle snarls of vehicles driven by soldiers of the American, English, French, Indian and Polish Armies while happy-go-lucky Neapolitans sauntered down the middle of the street. Despite their many problems these men have cut traffic accidents by 85 per cent, allowing more than 30,000 tons of war equipment to pass through the city daily.

A particularly successful bond rally was conducted at the Matched Roping Contest held at Lamesa Ball Park Arena Sunday afternoon, June 25. J. R. Earnest, chairman for the Fifth War Loan Drive reports that at this rally a total of \$24,000 War Bonds were sold in a 20 minute period.

J. R. Earnest stood at the gate of the arena, and took the names of all persons present for the affair who had relatives in the armed services. One hundred and twenty-six names were included on this list.

During the intermission of the matched roping contest, chairman Earnest explained to the group gathered there, that Dawson County was lagging in bond sales and asked their permission to use some of the time to hold a short bond rally. He asked them to buy a bond for each of the men he had on his list who are now serving their country in different parts of the world. The people at the affair gave their full cooperation in this matter, and bought seven bonds apiece for each of the boys on the list.

A feature of the rally was the auctioning of a Plymouth rope, which sold to E. E. Barron for an \$8,000 War Bond. Next Sheriff Buck Bennett agreed to mow any persons lawn, who would buy a \$1,000 bond. Bill Boyd bought the \$1,000 bond. E. E. Barron agreed to wash dishes for any person buying a \$500 bond, and James Sumpter bought the bond.

Chairman Earnest states that the whole hearted cooperation on the part of the members of the Lamesa Roping Club, and the citizens present at the rally was appreciated very much. He reports that the fine results of this auction has proven very helpful in the Fifth War Bond Campaign.

A report from bond headquarters early this morning (Monday), shows that a total of \$297,652.35 bonds have been sold thus far in Dawson County, including \$181,396.35 worth of series E bonds which have been sold here. With the \$24,000 worth of bonds which were sold at the contest Sunday included, the county now has a total of \$321,652.35 bonds to their credit.

Chairman Earnest reports that 4-H Club members are also assisting a great deal in this bond drive. Nelda Bankhead, 4-H Club Chairman at Key has already sold \$1,600 worth of bonds.

Earnest states also that another bond drive is scheduled for the county. He reports that citizens at Klondike are making plans for a rally, and asks you to watch for the date and time of this rally, which will be announced later.

Bob Huff Issues Statement To The Voters Of County

The Courier was authorized last Thursday to announce that Bob Huff was a candidate for County Attorney of Dawson County subject to action of the Democratic Primary, July 22.

His formal statement follows: "I will be 31 years old May 4th. Was born near Crowell, Texas, and was reared in Altus, Oklahoma. After finishing high school I attended Oklahoma A. & M. In 1933 I married and moved to my farm in Dawson County. In the Fall of 1936 I went to Tennessee to attend Law School. After completing my law course I returned to Dawson County for a short while and was employed by the Texas Railroad Commission, Oil & Gas Division, in January of 1939 stationed at Pampa, Texas. I was granted my law license the same year and was put in charge of the District office. In 1941 I was transferred to Houston where I was in charge

of the largest Railroad Commission District office in the State where I remained until I recently resigned. During all this time I operated my farm, paid taxes, and maintained my legal residence in Dawson County.

I have been rejected twice for military service and am now classified as 4F with no hope of getting into the service. I am offering my candidacy to this office because I think I can render a greater service on the home front. I feel that my legal training together with the experience I have had enforcing the conservation laws qualify me for this office.

If elected I promise to enforce the law and prosecute all violators regardless of race, creed, or color. I believe all officials are public servants and not rulers and will conduct the office in a businesslike efficient manner.

I ask that you investigate my past and consider my qualifications, and give me your vote and active support if you feel that I am worthy. In return I will give you honest,

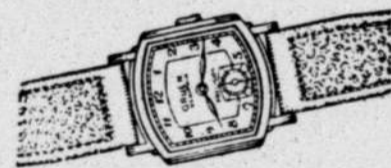

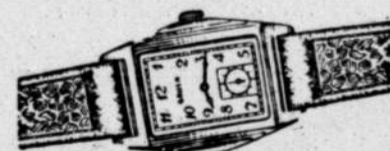
