BANKS SHOW INCREASE

Tex., May 5.—Resources of the banks total \$352,808,86, to reports of 943 banks to the state banking commission on condition on March 31. An increase of \$22,106,818 in the past twelve months. Borrowed by banks has decreased \$8,000,000 and surplus and have increased \$9,250,000, or 22 per cent. There has been 22 per cent movement in bonds owned, amounting to \$4,333,000. Deposits totaled \$267,108,809, increase of \$2,930, 409 or 10 per cent. Sight exchange has increased \$12,509,000, or 20 per cent. Banks have 100 per cent more of commercial paper and certificates of indebtedness than at any time in history, prior to December, 1923. The guaranty fund amounts to \$3,300, 000, increase \$371,422. Assessments for the guaranty fund during the year totaled \$4,522,053, decrease \$1,000, 000. —Amarillo Globe.

UNITED STATES MUST PRODUCE MORE COTTON

That the decline in cotton production with the rise in the cost of production at the per acre yield of 1923 is seriously threatening our international balance of trade is brought more forcibly to the attention of the financial world in a recent discussion of the Japanese situation by the Wall Street Journal.

While some persons are inclined at times to be prejudiced against announcements or statements emanating in Wall Street this statement concerning the cotton situation is so much in line with beliefs of economists and business men that there is no room for doubt.

The statement is interesting to financial interests because of its bearing on foreign trade conditions which in turn affects domestic trade conditions, and is of interest to the producers of cotton because of the demand in Japan for cotton which encourages foreign lands to produce the staple in larger quantities and furnishes them with further incentive to overcome the supremacy of the United States. The accomplishment of the latter, while not considered likely within the immediate future, will result in a competition so keen that American farmer will not be able to meet it and at the same time maintain a decent standard of living.

The article in the Wall Street Journal referring to the cotton situation is as follows:

"Japan has 4,877,000 active spindles and in the last year consumed 2,220,000 bales of cotton. In the same period Great Britain consumed 2,875,000. By the earthquake Japan lost 180,000 spindles, or about 15 per cent. Nevertheless, that country is now consuming cotton at a rate equal to that before the earthquake.

"Of the quantity of cotton consumed by Japan, already referred to, almost a third of the supply of the last fiscal year was drawn from America. In the past two years Japan consumed in its mills over 1,500,000 bales of American-grown cotton. Only Germany and Great Britain took more American cotton in that time. Between the first of last August and the middle of the present month April Japan and China together have 537,000 bales of cotton from the United States.

"If all our export of farm products, including wheat and other grains, beef, pork, lard and tobacco were put in one heap and the cotton in another the value of the cotton would be greater. In fact that commodity is the one that turns our international balance of trade. The Japanese markets look for a coarse grade of goods and for that they can use other cotton, particularly the staple which India produces."

The preceding paragraph makes it very plain that America is liable to meet stiff competition in one of the largest cotton consuming countries of the world. The only way to offset or avoid this competition, according to scientists and business men, is by an increase in production of cotton in America with a corresponding decrease in costs of production which can be done only through the raising of cotton in his section of the cotton belt which is not affected by the boll weevil.

WORK STARTED ON COTTON GIN

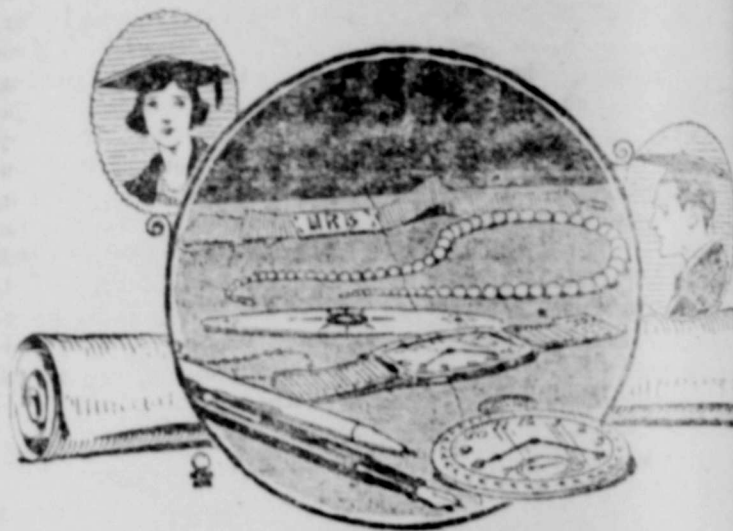

PERRYTON MAY BE NAME OF NEW TOWN PROPOSED

Perryton will likely be selected as the name for the new oil town in the Hutchinson oil field located in the shadow of the derrick of the district as well as the Carson-Hutchinson county oil field, according to plans executed in Amarillo yesterday between the promoters of the new town and Hutchinson county land owners.

Plans for the new oil town were completed yesterday in the office of Judge C. C. Triplett.

Location of the field town will be in the southwest quarter of section 36, T. 36 N., R. 10 E., S. 4 E., Hutchinson county, on the south side of W. S. Christian, former sheriff and tax collector of Hutchinson county.

W. M. Wallace, former sheriff of Hutchinson county has moved his family to Amarillo and will be prominently connected with the organization of the town which will be located on the highway between Amarillo and the oil field.

Plans outlined in the meeting of promoters of the town Wednesday indicated that plans are now under way looking to the construction of a recreation hall for oil field workmen, a forty room hotel with modern conveniences, and the selection of a name for the new town in conformity with postal requirements.

Gas from the Gulf No. 1 Burnett well, one mile south will supply an abundance of cheap fuel and water will be supplied from wells and water towers.

Low prices are being arranged to suit the convenience of oil field workmen and everything is being planned in a home like manner for oil field workmen.

General leading operators have secured option on lots in the town for their offices, and residence sites for their employees. Arrangements are

being made to connect the new town and the outside world with adequate telephone facilities. Sanitation engineers are on the ground to cooperate with civil engineers in laying out the town which may become one of the leading cities of the Plains area.

Offices of the new townsite movement are at present in the office of Judge C. C. Triplett, suite 5 Green Building, though arrangements are under way to erect a townsite office building on the Christian ranch which will be the telephone exchange and headquarters for offices of the town site.

While the new town will be in the south portion of the county, and on the south side of the Canadian river, it bids fair to make the leading town of the county. The sheriff and constable will protect the interests of the state until the new town is incorporated.—Amarillo News.

"TAX IMPROVEMENTS AT A LOWER RATE THAN LAND"

The present system of taxing farm land is unjust to the good farmers, for the reason that it tends to penalize their thrift and energy. It does not encourage improvements of either soil or farm buildings, for after making such improvements the owner is always called on to pay a higher rate of taxes on his property.

Take, for example, two adjoining farms which have about the same soil types and are equal in value so far as improvements such as farm buildings, fences, etc., are concerned. Let us suppose that the owner of one of these farms lives in town and rents out his farm, while the other lives on his farm, personally supervises it, and puts forth every effort to improve it. The owner who lives on the farm may by his good farming and business ability increase the fertility of his soil until it will produce large, profitable crops. The income from this farm may enable him to build a nice comfortable house, a good barn, fence his farm, and stock it with purebred cattle and hogs. This farm will then be improved and is an example for the whole community. It will attract the attention of all the farmers, in the community, many of whom will profit by watching the methods used by this farmer.

Now suppose the owner of this adjoining farm who lives in town and rents out his farm makes no effort to improve his place and probably by his slack methods his farm is really getting poorer all the time, yet he holds on to it until it has an increased sales value resulting from the fact that it joins a well-improved farm and it can be made as good as the adjoining farm.

Let us see how the tax adjuster looks at these two farms. He passes by the unimproved place and considers the owner who is already paying a low rate of taxes as paying too much but he travels by the place of the good farmer who by his energy and thrift has built up his farm to a high state of fertility, has built a comfortable house and nice farm buildings, and says immediately: "This is a good, profitable business, and this farmer can stand an increase in taxes."

We all realize that it is hard to arrive at a fair and just system of taxation, but I believe the present system of taxing farm lands, as it applies in the above illustration, is unjust to the good farmer who owns, operates and improves his farm. We should encourage this class of farmers by exempting from taxation up to a certain amount (say \$3,000 to \$5,000) for improvements.

On the other hand, let the owner of the unimproved property bear more of the burden of taxes. Encourage the owner of the unimproved property to improve it or dispose of it, that it may go into the hands of a good farmer who will make the soil more productive and the farm an asset to the community instead of a liability.—W. D. Barton, in The Progressive Farmer

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE AMONG CATTLE

It is important that all livestock men in New Mexico be on the watch for any symptoms of the foot and mouth disease which is causing such a severe disturbance in California at this time. In order to prevent this highly contagious disease from spreading into this state, owners of stock should take the utmost precaution in observing their cattle for signs of the affection. Dr. Hurst, the livestock specialist at the New Mexico College of Agriculture, states that the first symptom the average observer would be apt to notice is the drooling of saliva from the mouth of the affected animal, and a peculiar clicking, snacking sound caused by the mouth and tongue. The animal goes off its feed, because of the extreme sensitiveness of the membranes of the mouth, and tries to drink often if given the opportunity. At this stage there is a high fever. If the mouth is opened small blisters can be seen, varying in size, which break, leaving irregular bright red, or raw areas. These blisters continue to spread until the tongue, lips and muzzle may be covered. If the feet are affected they too will be covered with similar blisters around the upper edge of the hoof and between the toes. This inflammation of the feet may continue until the hoofs slip off, leaving the sensitive membrane raw and ulcerated. Cattle, hogs, sheep and goats, are most susceptible, but horses, dogs cats and poultry may take it. Even man may be infected by coming in contact with diseased animals. If any animals are suspected of having this disease, the case should be reported immediately to the proper authorities.—Southwest Plainsman.

THINK THIS OVER

Here is a suggestion
Prohibitionists and antiprohibitionists agree that in general the prohibitory laws are not being adequately explained for this condition differ. There is agreement however, on the fact that booze is still in politics, and that so long as it is a political football, enforcement in many places will be difficult.

The enforcement machinery now centers in a subdivision of a subdivision of the Treasury Department. That is not where it belongs. Its importance to the future of the country warrants its having more dignity and more authority than it can possibly possess under the present system, no matter how whole-hearted the desire on the part of the Treasury Department to compel obedience to law.

There are in our scheme of government commissions that have been removed from politics and made into powerful administrative forces that are beyond criticism. Notably the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Can the Congress be induced to erect a Commission of five or seven members in whose hands would be placed the task of enforcing the Eighteenth Amendment, just as the Interstate Commerce Commission oversees and enforces the laws relating to interstate commerce? These members should be men of outstanding probity and ability—men who could be considered fit occupants of the Supreme Bench, or of one of the great non-partisan commissions that are on government rolls—and the salaries paid to them should be on a par with those paid to Interstate Commerce Commissioners.

Men of the high type to qualify for such a body would be men who could be depended on for an impartial, non-political enforcement of the law.

"TAX IMPROVEMENTS AT A LOWER RATE THAN LAND"

The present system of taxing farm land is unjust to the good farmers, for the reason that it tends to penalize their thrift and energy. It does not encourage improvements of either soil or farm buildings, for after making such improvements the owner is always called on to pay a higher rate of taxes on his property.

Take, for example, two adjoining farms which have about the same soil types and are equal in value so far as improvements such as farm buildings, fences, etc., are concerned. Let us suppose that the owner of one of these farms lives in town and rents out his farm, while the other lives on his farm, personally supervises it, and puts forth every effort to improve it. The owner who lives on the farm may by his good farming and business ability increase the fertility of his soil until it will produce large, profitable crops. The income from this farm may enable him to build a nice comfortable house, a good barn, fence his farm, and stock it with pure-bred cattle and hogs. This farm will then be improved and is an example for the whole community. It will attract the attention of all the farmers, in the community, many of whom will profit by watching the methods used by this farmer.

Now suppose the owner of this adjoining farm who lives in town and rents out his farm makes no effort to improve his place and probably by his slack methods his farm is really getting poorer all the time, yet he holds on to it until it has an increased sales value resulting from the fact that it joins a well-improved farm and it can be made as good as the adjoining farm.

Let us see how the tax adjuster looks at these two farms. He passes by the unimproved place and considers the owner who is already paying a low rate of taxes as paying too much but he travels by the place of the good farmer who by his energy and thrift has built up his farm to a high state of fertility, has built a comfortable house and nice farm buildings, and says immediately: "This is a good, profitable business, and this farmer can stand an increase in taxes."

We all realize that it is hard to arrive at a fair and just system of taxation, but I believe the present system of taxing farm lands, as it applies in the above illustration, is unjust to the good farmer who owns, operates and improves his farm. We should encourage this class of farmers by exempting from taxation up to a certain amount (say \$3,000 to \$5,000) for improvements.

On the other hand, let the owner of the unimproved property bear more of the burden of taxes. Encourage the owner of the unimproved property to improve it or dispose of it, that it may go into the hands of a good farmer who will make the soil more productive and the farm an asset to the community instead of a liability.—W. D. Barton, in The Progressive Farmer

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE AMONG CATTLE

It is important that all livestock men in New Mexico be on the watch for any symptoms of the foot and mouth disease which is causing such a severe disturbance in California at this time. In order to prevent this highly contagious disease from spreading into this state, owners of stock should take the utmost precaution in observing their cattle for signs of the affection. Dr. Hurst, the livestock specialist at the New Mexico College of Agriculture, states that the first symptom the average observer would be apt to notice is the drooling of saliva from the mouth of the affected animal, and a peculiar clicking, snacking sound caused by the mouth and tongue. The animal goes off its feed, because of the extreme sensitiveness of the membranes of the mouth, and tries to drink often if given the opportunity. At this stage there is a high fever. If the mouth is opened small blisters can be seen, varying in size, which break, leaving irregular bright red, or raw areas. These blisters continue to spread until the tongue, lips and muzzle may be covered. If the feet are affected they too will be covered with similar blisters around the upper edge of the hoof and between the toes. This inflammation of the feet may continue until the hoofs slip off, leaving the sensitive membrane raw and ulcerated. Cattle, hogs, sheep and goats, are most susceptible, but horses, dogs cats and poultry may take it. Even man may be infected by coming in contact with diseased animals. If any animals are suspected of having this disease, the case should be reported immediately to the proper authorities.—Southwest Plainsman.

THINK THIS OVER

Here is a suggestion. Prohibitionists and antiprohibitionists agree that in general the prohibition laws are not being adequately explained for this condition differ. There is agreement however, on the fact that booze is still in politics, and that so long as it is a political football, enforcement in many places will be difficult.

The enforcement machinery now centers in a subdivision of a subdivision of the Treasury Department. That is not where it belongs. Its importance to the future of the country warrants its having more dignity and more authority than it can possibly possess under the present system, no matter how whole-hearted the desire on the part of the Treasury Department to compel obedience to law.

There are in our scheme of government commissions that have been removed from politics and made into powerful administrative forces that are beyond criticism. Notably the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Can the Congress be induced to erect a Commission of five or seven members in whose hands would be placed the task of enforcing the Eighteenth Amendment, just as the Interstate Commerce Commission oversees and enforces the laws relating to interstate commerce? These members should be men of outstanding probity and ability—men who could be considered fit occupants of the Supreme Bench, or of one of the great non-partisan commissions that are on government rolls—and the salaries paid to them should be on a par with those paid to Interstate Commerce Commissioners.

Men of the high type to qualify for such a body would be men who could be depended on for an impartial, non-political enforcement of the law.

How to Avoid Grade Crossing Accidents

Automobile drivers, when approaching railroad crossings, should go into second speed. Then look and listen. Absolute control thus assured. Stop or go ahead, as conditions warrant.

During 1923 one hundred and three persons were killed and four hundred seventy-four injured at highway crossings on the Santa Fe Railway.

These regrettable accidents might have been avoided if these motorists had been careful.

The rapid increase in these grade-crossing accidents is due to the greatly increased and general use of the automobile in the hands of drivers ignorant or willfully disregardful of the perils which attend careless driving. Sometimes it is the careless driver alone who pays the penalty, but usually innocent ones pay it in part or entirely.

The method is precisely the same in either case. The driver has absolute control, can stop or go ahead as conditions demand, and is alert to the situation.

If all drivers would but adopt this simple rule and adhere to it faithfully the problem would be solved. What a saving there would be of priceless human life, of grief untold, ambitions wrecked, and hopes lost forever!

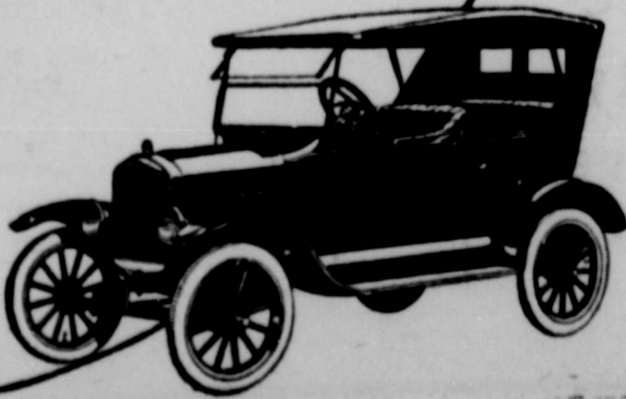

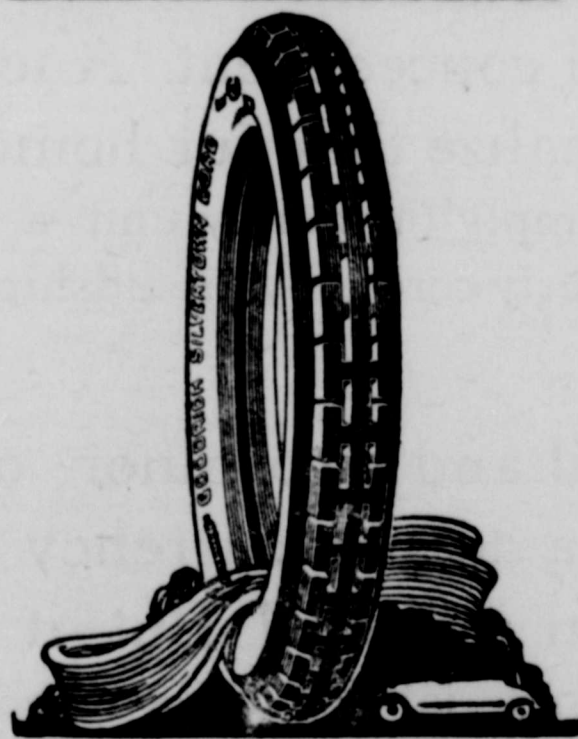
