

Forty Aviators to Train at Canyon

West Texas State College has been selected to train at least 40 young men for aviation, according to information received yesterday by President J. A. Hill.

Two projects will be underway. NYA boys, who have been on the campus for several months, will continue their shop training. Fred Smith of Fort Worth arrived this week and is installing a \$150,000 machine shop under the stadium. All of the machinery was sent here by the government.

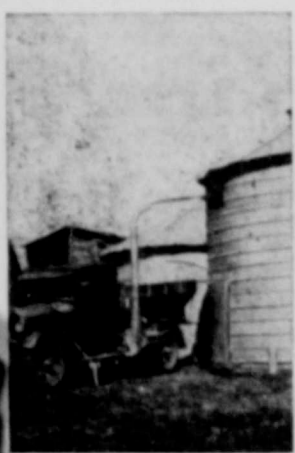
The 40 men will be trained under CAA throughout the summer. It is believed that this number will be greatly increased when college opens this fall.

President Hill stated that details for training the new aviators had not been revealed to him. As soon as President Roosevelt made his request to Congress for National Defense, Mr. Hill offered the facilities of the College to the government for training aviators. This includes the shops on the campus and the flying field north of Canyon.

More information as to the candidates for training and for the handling of the courses is expected momentarily by President Hill.—The Canyon News.

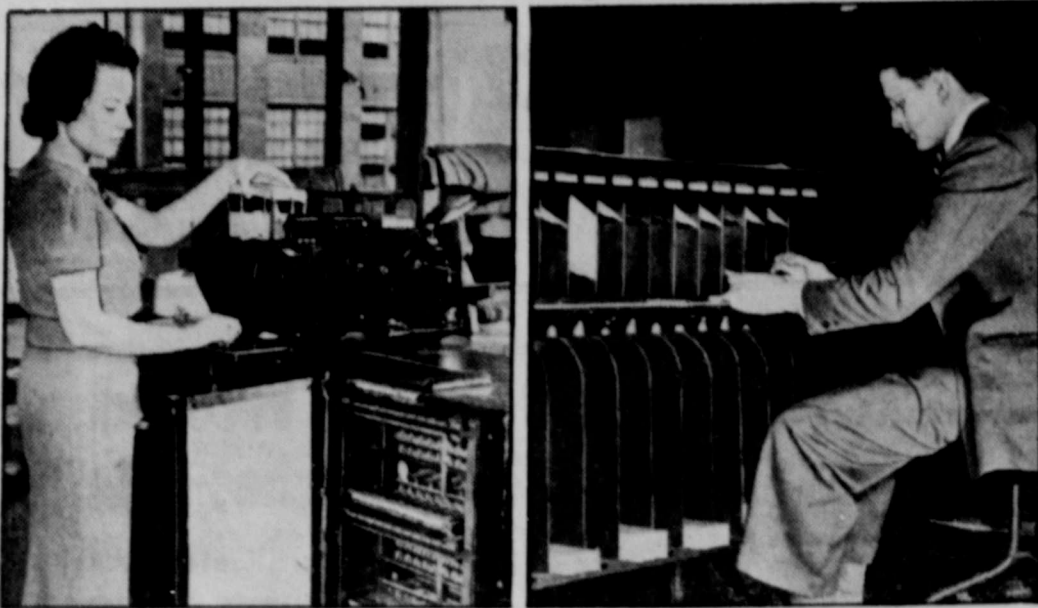
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Census Job Over? It Has Just Begun in Washington

Crop Insurance Pays '40 Wheat

Rapid progress is being made in the adjustment of crop losses suffered by Ochiltree County farmers who insured their 1940 wheat under the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation program, according to L. R. Conner, chairman of the county AAA committee. Adjustments have been made on eight farms, and indemnity payments have already been received by six of these wheat growers.

Adjustment work thus far has been confined to total or "substantially total" losses, where the crop was entirely destroyed or so badly damaged that there was no chance of it producing a yield that would justify harvesting, Conner said. Where total or "substantially total" losses have been determined, farmers have the use of the land for other crops. Altogether, 5,130 acres of insured wheat land in the county has been released for other uses, the chairman further reported.

Approximately 90 per cent of the claims of losses reported thus far have resulted from drought, while wire worms, cut worms and hail are other contributing factors.

The settlement of the 1940 crop losses demonstrates the manner in which wheat crop insurance is stabilizing wheat growers' incomes, Conner declared.

"The indemnities that farmers are receiving represent income that they otherwise would have lost. More losses may occur between now and harvest, but every insured grower is sure of income from at least 75 per cent of his average yield."

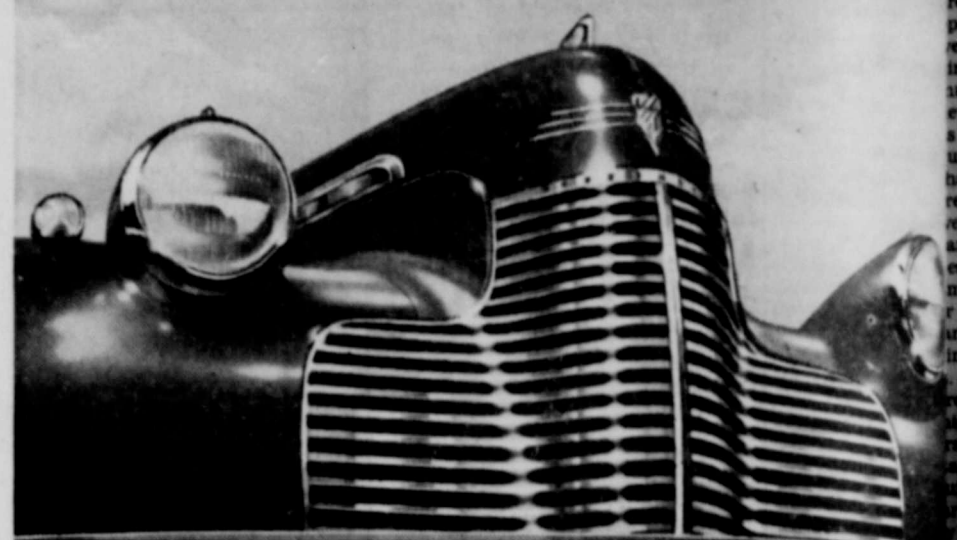

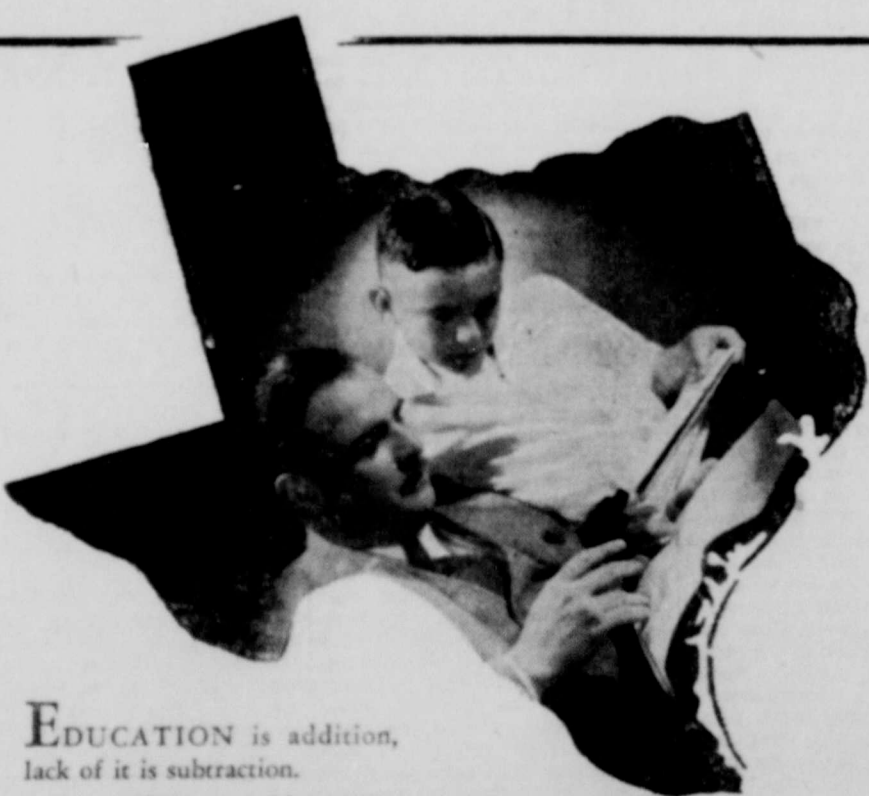

Local Organization Sponsoring Fight On Mosquito Breeding Places Here

The Parent Teacher is sponsoring a mosquito drive in Perryton and immediate vicinity to eliminate all breeding places of the insects. Assisting in the work of pouring oil on stagnant pools and other breeding places are the Home Demonstration County Council and Girl Scouts. The city council has agreed to furnish labor.

The Chamber of Commerce at a recent meeting voted \$25.00 to be used in the purchase of oil and other material for the work.

It is planned to give the lake south of the city limits a coating of oil every two weeks and at other places about the town where eggs are likely to be found.

It is pointed out that mosquitoes are not to be stamped out entirely this year, but that a continued fight will eventually eliminate the danger.

The domestic mosquitoes, and in fact all other mosquitoes as well, breed in water. Salt-marsh and lowland areas are the favorite places where they lay their eggs on the soil, and these hatch only after they are covered by water. Many of the places where mosquitoes breed in weeds, tall grass, shrubbery, and in the water in the case of the pinion that mosquitoes breed in.

Heavy vegetation serves as a harboring place for adult mosquitoes and may break the wind so that the mosquitoes can bite more readily in enclosed yards. Grass and weeds also hide water-filled tin cans and depressions in which the eggs may breed. The kind and amount of the water and the place where it is held are the factors which determine the particular kind of mosquito that will breed in it.

Thus the yellow-fever mosquito breeds almost exclusively in what is called man-made containers, and these must be close to habitation of man; rain-pool mosquitoes, on the other hand, breed in temporary pools formed by rain or by streams overflowing.

Northern and southern house mosquitoes breed in water-filled tin cans, tubs, and the many places about houses and barns where water is retained for a long length of time.

Black, oval eggs of the yellow-fever mosquito are laid on the sides of water containers, usually just above the water surface. If placed in the water at once, they hatch in 48 hours. If not moistened, however, they may remain dormant for weeks or even months. When immersed in water they promptly hatch.

To eliminate many hazards a person should check his home and grounds for all containers that hold water over a period of time. Breeding places cannot be destroyed or screened, treatment with DDT is necessary. For this reason, DDT is most commonly used.

There is no known substance that will give complete freedom from mosquito attack for more than a few hours. Oil of citronella is probably the most dependable. If oil of citronella is objectionable because of its odor, it can be mixed with spirits of camphor or oil of pennyroyal in equal proportions. Certain cut or growing plants have been reported to drive mosquitoes away, but none of these is of practical value.

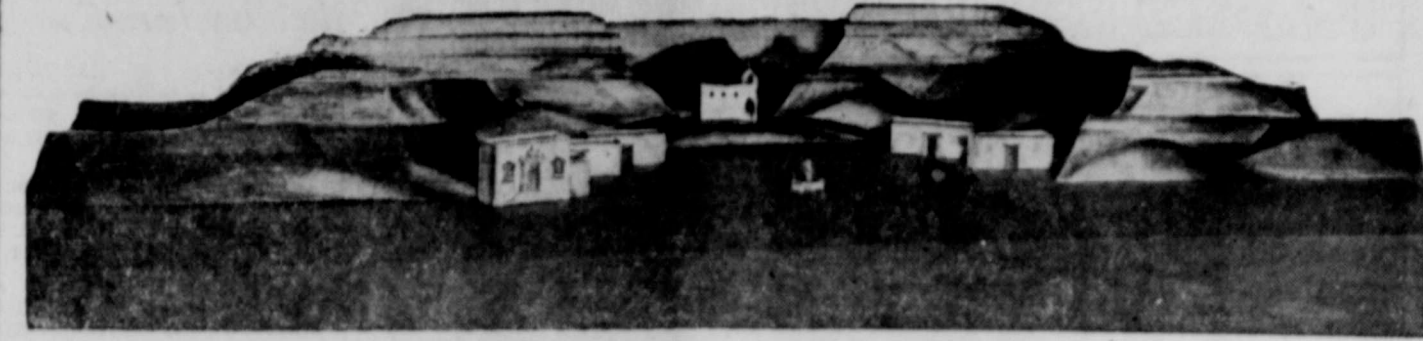

Use Care When Taking a Sunbath

AUSTIN, Texas.—"Use caution in getting your sunbath this season" is the advice of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Under a misconception as to the amount of sun they can take without ill effects, many persons thoughtlessly submit their unprotected faces, backs, and legs to over-exposure to sun and suffer painfully, sometimes seriously, as a result," Dr. Cox pointed out.

Restraint in acquiring a sunbath is advised. Exposure of ten minutes the first day should be ample, and the amount of time spent in the sun can be increased on a day-to-

day basis as the skin becomes accustomed to sunlight.

Advising sun-bathers to "learn their limits" Dr. Cox further pointed out that individual differences may determine the length of time that a person can stay in the sun without being burned.

Before becoming too ardent over prolonged sunbathing, one would do well to remember that many a vacation or week-end has been ruined because the blistering and illness-producing power of the sun's rays on tender skin was insufficiently appreciated.

Some persons are susceptible to sunburn but don't tan; other individuals tan over a longer or shorter period, but the same general rule applies to all—"don't overdo."

Most sunburns, according to Dr. Cox, are similar to first-degree

burns, but some, as the result of over-exposure, reach the blistering stage characteristic of a second-degree burn.

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Dispelling the Fog

More than a year ago President Roosevelt in his message to Congress calling for improvement in our National defense used these words: "Regardless of political affiliations, we can properly join in an appraisal of the world situation and agree on the immediate defense needs of the nation."

In that message the President asked for appropriations to bring the Army up to peace-time strength; to arm and equip it adequately; to provide for 6,000 military planes; to provide protection for the Panama Canal, etc.

More than two years ago he asked for Congress to provide, among other things, for the manufacture of gauges, dies and other aids, and asked the construction of various cruisers and battleships. In all of these messages he presented the gravity of the situation abroad and stressed our own military inadequacy.

"Calling attention to these facts does not remotely intimate that the Congress or the President have any thought of taking part in another war on European soil, but it does show that in 1917 we were not ready to conduct large-scale land or air operations. Relatively we are not much more ready to do so today

than we were then—and we cannot guarantee a long period free from attack in which we could prepare."

Generally the President's warnings were heeded—but only by reason of large Democratic majorities, and in the face of a barrage of criticism in which the possible threat to us in the then prospective hostilities was derided.

No Politics in Defense

It has taken a long time to bring the minority delegations to recognize that there must be no politics in the face of a national crisis, or a threat against our security. The reversal of form indicated by the reception of the President's message the other day in which he pointed out where we were vulnerable and the steps necessary to insure the nation's safety against all possible dangers, has been notable. However, it was only a few days ago that District Attorney Dewey proclaimed his isolationist convictions, and hinted that the administration was only stressing the foreign situation as a red herring to distract attention from our domestic problems.

But when the wave of approval and appreciation of the President's defense address swept over the land, even Mr. Dewey remembered that in Portland, Maine, he had asked for a two-ocean Navy and said that "the defense requirements of the nation should be completely removed from politics."

And ex-President Hoover, who last year told us that if the dictators should win the European war they would leave us alone for a quarter of a century at least, has now declared "the President is right that our defense armament should be revised in the light of experience from this war. . . . There can be no partisanship upon the principle of national defense."

Chairman John Hamilton, however, seems a trifle out of step for on the day before the President's speech the newspapers quoted the G. O. P. chairman to this effect: "The war situation can't react against the Republican party. The country will have to keep its eyes focused even more on internal affairs."

Value for Money Received
A favorable argument against the various recommendations by the President for improving and modernizing the Army and Navy establishment, is that under his direction more than six billion dollars have been spent and that there was little to be shown for this outlay.

The critics did not mention that under the three preceding Republican administrations the war forces of the United States had been systematically ignored. It began back in President Harding's disarmament conference when we abandoned a big Navy program that would have kept us at the top. We sunk about \$200,000,000 worth of ships, among them the very latest and most powerful battleships we had ever planned, and then we went into the doldrums. A large part of the expenditures at which they sneered was to make up for the previous neglect. The Roosevelt administration has constructed 130 war ships. It has tripled the number of Navy planes, and doubled the number of Army planes. It has given us tanks, anti-aircraft guns and anti-tank guns—none of which we had when the present administration came into power.

It may be worth remembering that there was scarcely a single measure for preparation that was not opposed by a majority of the Republicans in both houses of Congress. Fortunately the minority representation was so small that it could not prevail.

Since the Nazi drive on Belgium and Holland, the Republicans generally seem to have realized the implications of what President Roosevelt has been telling them right along. There are fewer assaults on the administration program; a diminution of virulence of the contention that whatever the President recommends must be assailed as a

political expedient. In fact the principle that we must present a united front against the dictator plans and policies is gradually becoming an established fact.

Republicans Support Administration Policy

The minority is not unanimous yet. The day after the President made his address to Congress in which he asked a comprehensive enhancement of our defensive establishments, Senator Taft, campaigning for delegates in the West, reiterated the charge that the foreign war was being exploited to distract attention from our domestic politics, and he assured the people of Topeka, Kansas, that the fight at home is just as important as the fight in Europe.

It does not appear that the Republican Presidential aspirant has a popular chord in his Topeka speech, for, according to the New York correspondent (Turner Catledge) who is reporting Senator Taft's drive, "Sympathy for the Allies has been increasing since the German invasion of Norway. Republican leaders say. No less than fifty of these men and women, Republicans all and representing each of the six States, told this correspondent that if submitted to a popular vote in their localities today, a proposal for more direct aid to the allies—anything short of war—would win by decided majorities."

After all, it is not of very much importance that contenders for the barren prestige of running for the presidency this year should continue militantly political in the present situation, when their party generally has come to the view that in the face of a grave emergency threatening our country, politics should take a back seat.

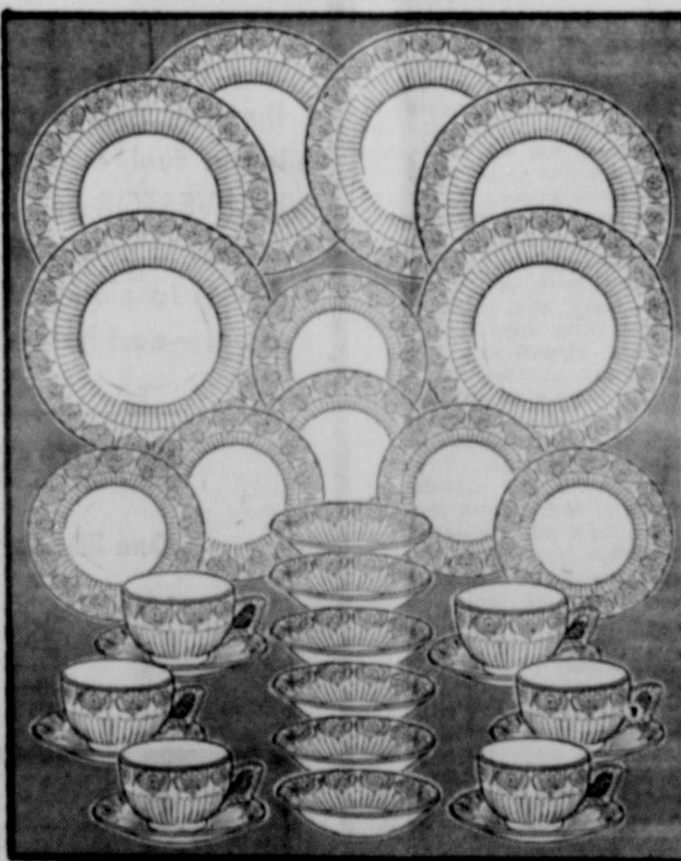

Case Worker Gives Facts on WPA And Families Helped in County

Three county offices, County Treasurer, County Clerk and Court Clerk, will be decided by the Primary Election, July 9. The others will face opposition in the General Election. — The Herald-Democrat, Beaver, Okla.

Mrs. F. L. Garrett, Ochiltree county case worker, discussed "The Welfare Viewpoint" at the Kick-off dinner held in Perryton, May 20, in connection with the national observance of the Professional and Service Projects of the WPA. The following excerpts from her talk gave some data on the number of persons and families helped locally by WPA.

"As county worker under supervision of the State Department of Public Welfare, I shall discuss WPA from the Welfare viewpoint.

"It is through the State Department of Public Welfare that the client makes his initial application for WPA referral. The State Department of Public Welfare through the county worker, whose referrals are approved by the Area supervisor, refers eligible families to WPA.

"Eligibility for referral is determined on a basis of need. Need is defined as insufficient income or resources to maintain a standard of living compatible with health and decency. The client, or some member of the family, must be employable. He must be 18 years of age or over. He must either be a natural born or naturalized citizen of the U. S.

"After a case is certified to WPA, it is the responsibility of that agency to assign the client to work if there is a WPA project available to him. At this time, we have 135 cases certified eligible to WPA, and of this number 119 are working on projects in the county. The eligible certifications represent a total of 428 individuals. Twenty-six certified cases are not assigned to work; 20 of these have private employment, leaving only 6 cases in the county awaiting assignment to work at this time. In all six of these cases the priority workers are women and have not been assigned because it has been necessary for WPA to reduce the number of workers on the WPA projects.

"If these 119 cases were not assigned to WPA, it would be necessary to provide some other means of assisting them and their families. Our agency also certifies cases for the Federal Surplus commodities. The Federal surplus commodity Corporation is sponsored by the State Department of Public Welfare. The principal purpose of the corporation is the removal of price depressing surpluses. This program increases returns to growers, relieves human hunger and distress by distributing through the State Department of Public Welfare, to needy persons these foods which might be wasted. It is always understood that commodities so distributed are in addition to, rather than substitution for foods, which these clients buy from local merchants.

"Surplus commodities distributed during the year 1939 in District No. 16 were as follows: Total retail value foods \$185,588.85; total retail value clothing \$211,583.50; total value of food and clothing \$397,172.35. One of the ten store rooms in district 16 outside of Potter county is located in Perryton.

"In order to give you some idea of what takes place in the Ochiltree county store room I shall give you the following figures taken from the record for the month of April 1940: total pounds of food commodities issued 3,322 pounds. These consisted of corn grits, corn meal, white and graham flour, prunes, raisins, lima beans, onions and lard. These were issued to 94 cases or a total of 313 persons. Clothing issued totaled 228 garments. These were issued to 36 cases and benefited 146 persons.

"This is just a short report of some of the benefits which the county is obtaining from WPA program."

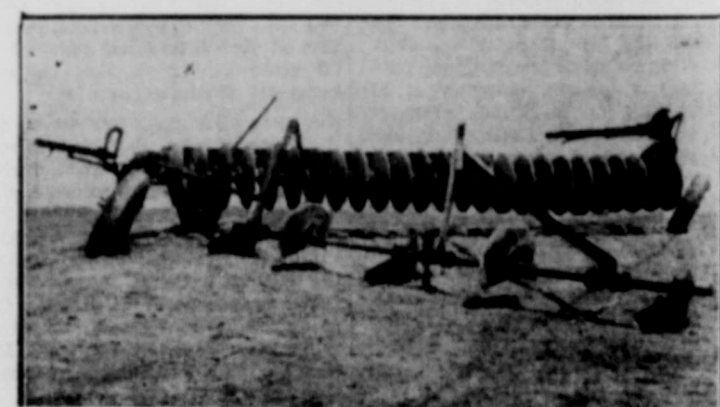

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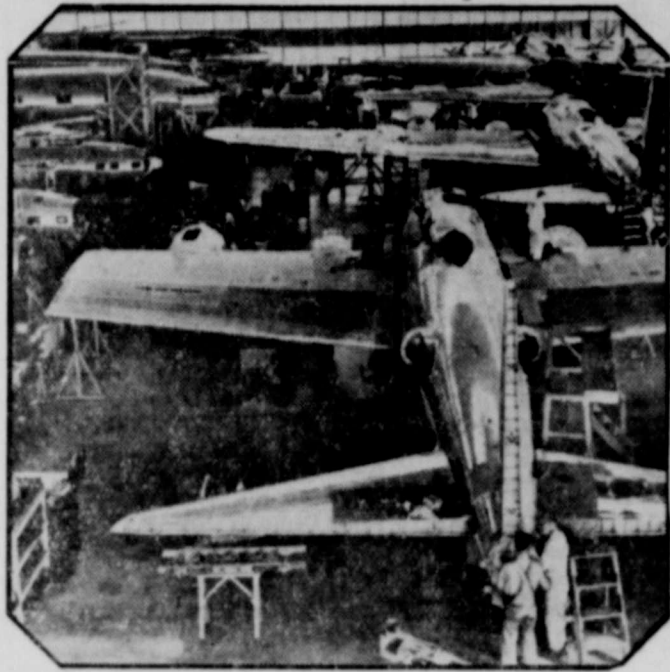
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Fifty Thousand Warplanes Will Mean a New U. S. Air Army

WASHINGTON. — President Roosevelt's plan for 50,000 warplanes may mean the United States will have a whole new army—an air army.

This is the opinion of aviation experts, who point out that such a gigantic fleet must operate as an independent military unit, which is just how the Germans operate today with the greatest air armada in history.

Consider some of the figures. Fifty thousand planes would require a personnel much greater than the present peacetime strength of the U. S. Army. The usual ratio is two pilots per plane, although the Germans allow more. Next, experts estimate a ground crew of 250,000 men, and still another supply crew of 200,000 to 250,000 men, all told, 550,000 to 600,000 men in the air arm alone.

But that is visualizing the ultimate fleet. How soon can Uncle Sam turn out these 50,000 planes? That is the big question.

THE machine tool companies, the big concerns who first make the lathes, presses, drills and grinders before production can begin, say they are ready now, having geared up their capacity on allied business of the last two years.

The aircraft industry says it is ready, too, for the same reason, that it is prepared to triple floor space, triple the number of employees, build new plants, operate on a 24-hour shift. It is

operating at high capacity now, for that matter, turning out about 450 planes per month.

How many planes then will the United States turn out when the big machine gets moving? The experts aren't so sure yet. For one thing there is likely to be a shortage of skilled labor in the plane factories. There was a shortage even before the war.

Still another drawback may be the financing of plant operations. The plane companies are hesitant to take the risk of expanding plants without government protection.

FINALLY, despite the start gained from allied production, there are the months of planning necessary to get the gigantic program, or even a part of it, say for 10,000 planes, under way. Industry estimates by the last of this year we may produce 1200 to 2000 planes per month, and by spring perhaps 4000. At this rate industry says it can meet the President's full program in two years; with utmost expansion, in less time than that.

How will this production compare with Europe's? Germany now builds about 3300 planes per month, England about 900 to 1200, and France about 400 to 700. Germany now has the world's greatest air force, perhaps 20,000 ships.

But when the United States finishes its great program it will have, at a cost of billions, an air fleet greater than all Europe's.

Perry led the field in gains, with an increase of 19.8 percent. Pond Creek was second with an increase of 18.6 percent. Guymon's increase was 4.6 percent during the ten years, with a gain of 103 persons.

In the loss column, Hooker showed the greatest decrease, losing 29.6 percent. Garber was second with a decrease of 20 percent.

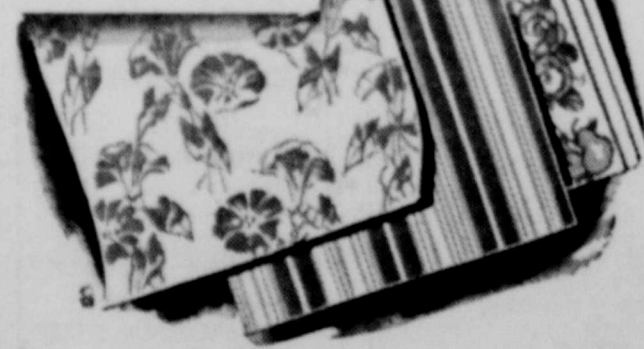

Republicans Again Trying to Fool Farmers With More Empty Promises

Representative Clifford R. Hope of Kansas, Republican, who throughout the seven years of the Roosevelt administration has been a consistent supporter of its policies to rehabilitate agriculture, was lately chosen by the Republican National Committee to tell the farmers over the radio that those measures which he so emphatically endorsed were failures.

By what means Mr. Hope was induced to repudiate his own record and discredit his own intelligence is immaterial, but Representative Frank E. Hook, Democrat, of Michigan in a later address intimated that while the voice was the voice of Hope, the words were those of the Republican high command.

"The farm population and the American people," said Mr. Hook, "have not forgotten the Republican days of 10 cent corn, 25 cent wheat, 6 cent cotton and 3 cent pork and beef, or the fact that nearly \$500,000,000 was lost in the ill-fated Republication farm board blunder."

"In 1933 agriculture lay in ruins, shattered by the Smoot-Hawley tariff, by uncurbed financial speculation, by wastage of our resources, and by the final knock-out blow of neglect to meet the needs of the people. The Republican wreckage was complete. In the last seven years a Democratic administration has been putting together this difficult 'jigsaw puzzle' which was left by the Republican party on the doorstep of the nation in 1933."

"In building toward a sound picture of substantial and lasting prosperity, new pieces had to be shaped. The first job was to pry open closed banks and to guarantee deposits, restoring the faith of our people in our financial institutions. The next great piece of legislation fitted into the picture was the Agricultural Adjustment Act that enabled farmers to adjust their production, control their marketing, and increase prices toward parity. With the establishment of the New Deal Farm Security Administration in 1935 competent tenants, sharecroppers and farm laborers were able to become farm owners. Under this program loans are also made to destitute and low income farm families for the purchase of farm supplies, equipment and livestock, for the refinancing of indebtedness and for family subsistence."

"Through the Farm Credit Administration a wave of foreclosures on farms was halted and credit given to farmers for the production of crops and livestock at low rates of interest. The conservation of soil, water, and trees became a vital part of the new Democratic picture of a permanent and lasting prosperity. The Rural Electrification Administration brought light and hope to millions of Americans. Progress was made in winning back our lost export markets by reciprocal trade agreements with foreign countries."

"This nearly completed picture of a reconstructed America has been developed from the Republican chaos of 1932. When full parity of agricultural prices to farmers is really achieved, a huge piece will be set into the picture of economic prosperity. The farmer has not yet attained parity of price or income, but his economic condition has been vastly improved over the melancholy days of 1932, as indicated by parity tables. Translated into terms of commodities, it takes a little over 7 pounds of cotton to buy a work-shirt, but in 1932 it cost the cotton grower 11 pounds to buy that same kind of shirt. A little over two pounds of wool will buy a work-shirt today, but in 1932 it cost 7 pounds of wool. A bushel of wheat today will buy the work-shirt, but in 1932 almost two bushels were needed. A little over one bushel of corn will buy a work-shirt in 1940, while in 1932 over 3 bushels were required. No wonder the farmer felt that his shirt had been taken off his back in 1932."

"Our farmers have been told they are being regimented but I do not believe that the independent minded farmers of this nation feel that they are being led by the nose when they go to meetings where they can express their opinions and where it is left to them to decide whether they wish to cooperate with their neighbors in a farm program directed toward their mutual benefit. They have it in their power to say whether we are to continue the New Deal with its nation-wide farm program under the AAA, a program that has steadily and surely pulled agriculture out of the morass of low prices and low income, or whether we are to try some new-fangled plan to be offered by that party which for more than half a century, under the guise of a protective tariff, has promised agricultural equality with other industry and has never fulfilled that promise."

"The Republican party has never kept faith with the farmer, and it never will."

Many Policyholders

Die Within Year

Statistics just compiled by the

American Life Convention indicate

that 77,000 policyholders die an-

nually in the United States, within

a year after they invest in life in-

surance, and that their beneficiaries

receive approximately \$52,000,000 as

a result of their insurance.

The statistics, just received here

by Homer Garton, who is local rep-

resentative of Southwestern Life

Insurance Company an affiliate of

the American Life Convention, were

taken from a survey which also cov-

ered the field of health and acci-

dents. Based upon estimates of

the United States Public Health

Service, the American Life Conven-

tion reports an average of 5,000,000

persons invalided each day by sick-

ness, and 500,000 by accidents.

The report estimates the annual

loss in wages from sickness and ac-

cidents, not covered by Workmen's

Compensation benefits, total more

than \$6,500,000,000. Where perma-

nent disability is involved, however,

much of this loss is covered by life

insurance.
