WAR FUND DRIVE SCHEDULED FOR MONTH OF OCTOBER

Field Representative Here Wednesday for Preliminary Work

Rod Merritt, special field representative for the United War Chest of Texas who was here Wednesday, pointed out that the purpose of the united war appeals program to be carried out in October was to speed victory. He stated that more than half of the money subscribed by patriotic Americans will go directly to aid our fighting men when he addressed the Rotary Club at their regular noon hour meeting, and while conferring with Johnny Williams, county chairman.

"Of the \$125,000,000 to be raised by the National War Fund for the Military Front, the Home Front and the United Nations Front, more than \$67,000,000 will go to the aid of American men in uniform through the USO, United Seamen's Service and War Prisoners Aid," Mr. Merritt said.

More than \$40,000,000 will go to United Nations Relief, including the relief of suffering in both occupied and unoccupied countries, and about \$4,000,000 will be used for Refugee Relief. Seventeen war appeals agencies approved by President Roosevelt's War Relief Control Board will participate in this National War Fund Program.

Through local War Funds being set up in each of its 254 counties, Texas is seeking to raise its apportioned share of nearly \$5,000,000 in the National War Fund total.

Governor Coke R. Stevenson is honorary chairman of the campaign in Texas. George A. Butler, prominent Houston attorney, is president and campaign chairman.

Cadet Nurse Corps Seeks 65,000 New Student Nurses Now

The U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps, recently authorized by the Bolton act, is seeking a quota of 65,000 new student nurses this year. Corps members will attend any of the existing 1300 accredited nursing schools that meet requirements of the law. Courses are accelerated from the usual 36 months to 24 to 30 months.

Depending upon their rank, student nurses will be paid maintenance and monthly allowances of from \$15 to \$30 by the school of nursing or hospital. The schools, in turn, are reimbursed by the U. S. Public Health Service, Federal Security Agency, which has been designated to administer the Bolton Act.

Upon graduation, students in the Corps may become registered nurses through the usual procedure required by the schools for graduation and after passing state board nursing examinations. In return for benefits received, members agree that, health permitting, they will remain in essential nursing service for the duration of the war, either civilian or military. They are not required to pledge themselves to military service only.

Marriage is not prohibited, and an increasing number of nursing schools are admitting married students. Married nurses are also accepted by the Army Nurse Corps.

Bodies of Student Officers Found Beside Wrecked Plane

Victims of Crash Located in Rugged Big Bend Country

The bodies of 1st Lt. Willard Bruce Wilson Jr., 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Bruce Wilson, St. Charles, Mo., and 2nd Lt. Robert B. Renald, 21, son of Mrs. Mary Renald, Santa Barbara, Cal., were discovered beside the wreckage of their plane last Friday afternoon on the Prieto ranch, 49 miles southwest of Marfa.

The two officers, students at the advanced flying school, have been missing since the morning of July 29, when they took off from the air field on a routine training flight in a twin-engine aircraft. Though a thorough, daily search has been conducted by army planes, the wreckage was finally discovered by Jose Prieto, on the inaccessible southeast slope of Chinati peak, four miles from his ranch house. Milton Smith phoned the flying school authorities from his nearby ranch and furnished horses and burros for the army search party who identified the bodies.

Next of kin have been notified. A competent board of officers will be appointed by Col. George F. Hartman, commanding officer, to investigate the accident. —Alpine Avalanche

PIONEER RESIDENT OF SANDERSON DIES IN SAN ANTONIO HOSPITAL LAST WEEK

Burial Services Held at Marathon Saturday Afternoon

Mrs. Luella Leora Lemons, 65, pioneer resident of Sanderson and West Texas, died Wednesday, August 18, in a San Antonio hospital where she had been receiving medical attention for the past month following a heart attack. Complications resulting from the attack were the cause of her death.

The remains were brought to Sanderson Friday morning for funeral services in the home which were conducted Saturday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock by the Rev. R. L. Wittner, pastor of the Baptist Church at Alpine. Interment was made in the Marathon Cemetery with a short service at 6:00 o'clock. She was laid to rest in the family burial plot beside her late husband, W. H. Lemons.

Luella Leora Dickson was born in Wise County, Texas, February 20, 1878, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Dickson. She moved to Marathon at the age of 12 years with her mother and brother, Lee Dickson. They engaged in the ranching business there at the time.

Income From Texas Farms Shows Slight Gain for 1943

Slump Shown In Marketing of Cattle; Income Off 8 Percent

Texas farm cash income in June totaled 71 million dollars, a gain of only 10 per cent over June, 1942. Dr. F. A. Buechel, University of Texas business research statistician, points out.

This small gain over a year ago was due to the sharp decline in marketings of cattle and calves, he pointed out. The drop would have been more severe had it not been for the high prices obtained for these animals. Income from this source dropped only 8 per cent compared to 36 per cent slump in marketings.

Fruits and vegetables brought cash returns of nearly 13 million dollars during June, approximately 50 per cent more than in June a year ago, Dr. Buechel said.

Cash income from milk and milk products gained nearly 35 per cent. "In coming months," Dr. Buechel predicted, "marketings of cash crops, especially wheat and cotton, will contribute a substantial part to the farm cash income, while marketings of cattle and calves are expected to compare favorably with forwardings a year ago."

TEN MINUTES BEFORE MIDNIGHT

Charles T. Lucey, staff writer for the New York World Telegram, in describing a ride in the cab of a transcontinental freight locomotive has painted in words a picture of war-time railroading that hits the imagination with thundering power. "It was 10 minutes short of midnight when the arc of the brakeman's lantern, a curving pinpoint of light more than a half-mile back, gave the highball signal. Slowly the throttle eased back. Thousands of horsepower throbbed in steel casings.

"With a barely perceptible start, 7,000,000 pounds of war cargo was rolling. The moon was brilliantly full. The big train picked its way through a labyrinth of switches like an elephant walking a tightrope. . . . To the men in the engine cab, there was nothing dramatic about it. The man at the throttle lit a cigar; his fireman looked back over the crawling train. Here was stuff that in a few days would be feeding into Pacific Coast airplane plants and shipyards, and a little later headed out across the ocean to American men waiting for the weapons of war.

"Eight miles out and the lights of the first opposing train showed. . . still miles from where we were. In a couple of minutes the engines were racing toward each other—on the same track, it seemed. The searchlight came straight at us, a giant tracer

bullet in the night. The engineer's face was set, and none in the cab spoke. Just as it seemed sure to meet us, it roared past on another track."

More than a hundred miles later the steel monster came to rest for a moment and the dazed observer climbed down to record an experience that few people will ever enjoy. He had seen a single train with millions of pounds of priceless war materials snaked through mile-and-a-half high passes. He had witnessed the expert touch of the engineer's hand on the throttle and brake that nursed those millions of pounds up and down long punishing grades where a miscalculation in speed meant tragedy.

No, few of us will ever ride in the cab of a locomotive. But the word picture of the railroads at work, recorded by one man who did, should help us all to grasp the magnitude of present-day railroading.

Alpine Avalanche — The Brewster county Selective Service board has been notified that commencing Oct. 1, 1943, "it will be necessary for local boards to be prepared to fill a portion of their calls from registrants now properly classified in Class III-A. "It is not desirable to re-classify such registrants out of Class III-A any faster than they are needed," the order sets out, "but in order to have the required number available for induction by Oct. 1, 1943, local boards should start re-classifying immediately. The director of Selective Service, under the provisions of Sec. 622.31, Selective Service Regulations, directs local boards to: (1) reopen the classification of registrants in Class III-A in sequence of their order numbers, (2) classify them anew without reference to their eligibility for Class III-A deferment, and (3) proceed with such re-classification at such rate as is necessary to fill calls. No registrant properly classified in Class III-A who is re-classified pursuant to the provisions of this paragraph shall be inducted prior to Oct. 1, 1943."

Fort Stockton Pioneer — Project superintendents are in Fort Stockton to begin work on the 26 furnished apartments to be constructed here by Defense Plant Corporation for personnel of the Pacific Air School, Ltd., and of the Army Air Forces detachment here.

Pouring of foundations is expected to begin next week, and a number of workmen will be needed on the project. Local

Fort Stockton Pioneer — Site of Comanche Field, third auxiliary flying field for use of cadets being trained by Pacific Air School, Ltd., was being cleared this week by workmen under a contract awarded to M. R. Gonzales.

Comanche Field is located 5 and one half miles south of Fort Stockton. At the field there will be erected also a sizeable operation building.

Ozona Stockman — A seal coat of asphalt and crushed rock was being applied this week to about thirteen blocks on state highways 290 and 163 in Ozona by the maintenance division of the State Highway Department.

The topping, consisting of a spray coating of hot asphalt and fine crushed rock, was being applied on city streets from curb to curb along the east and west and north and south routes of the two highways through the city.

Wink Bulletin — Winkler County will acquire the right-of-way for several miles of county road in the southeast part of the county, to a new oil test, it was announced by Judge J. B. Salmon this week.

The county will surface with caliche, four miles of the road

and the Stanolind Oil & Gas Company, owners of the test well, will build the remainder.

Big Bend Sentinel, Marfa — A year old Monday, the training facility for men of the Army Air Forces, a few miles from Marfa, began its second year with a new name — "Marfa AAF Pilot School (Advanced—Two Engine)" rather than Marfa AAF Advanced Flying School or Marfa Army Air Field.

Activation was on August 15, last year.

Uvalde Leader-News — It was announced this week that Mr. C. D. Sadler has accepted the position of Vocational Agriculture Instructor in the Uvalde High School and will begin his duties on September 1. Mr. Sadler organized the department at Hondo and was instructor there for several years. He has recently been a supervisor of the Rural War Production work over vocational departments in 41 counties for the federal government.

He resigned this position to go into private business in stock farming in Medina County. He comes to Uvalde very highly recommended by the Department of Education.

Make the Most of Your Refrigerator in the

War Against Waste

Follow These Pointers for Better Food Preservation

Unwrap fresh meat as soon as received from market and wipe with clean dry cloth but do not wash until ready to use. Wrap loosely in waxed paper (with ends open) and store in meat keeper or defrosting tray.

Wrap and freeze meat if you plan to keep it longer than two or three days.

Wrap fish and seafood in waxed paper and store in or directly beneath freezing unit. Use as quickly as possible.

Ground fresh meat should be wrapped and frozen if not to be used day of purchase. It spoils more rapidly because of finely divided fibres.

Store quick-frozen foods in freezing unit. Do not try to refreeze thawed foods.

Store eggs in moist-cold compartment or in covered dish to prevent loss of moisture and vitamins through porous shell. Do not wash eggs before storing as it removes natural protective coating.

spread tender-skinned fruit on lower shelf of refrigerator to prevent bruising.

Do not wash or stem berries. Spread out on shallow dish or put in colander to prevent mold. Avoid bruising.

Wash, drain and place vegetables in crisper. Refrigerate as quickly as possible to prevent vitamin loss.

Never store bananas in refrigerator. They keep better at room temperature.

Never pour milk or cream back into bottles. Keep in covered jar or pitcher.

Keep opened cans of condensed or evaporated milk under refrigeration the same as fresh milk.

Keep butter in covered dish away from foods with strong odors.

Store cheese in covered container to prevent drying. A thin coat of butter on edge also helps.

Remove paper coverings from all foods except frozen foods, before storing.

Keep leftovers and all liquids covered to protect flavor and vitamin content.

Wrapped bread and coffee in tight container will stay fresh longer if kept in refrigerator.

Always keep main food compartment at right temperature—40° is safest.

There is still 13½ and 14½ cent calf contracting—Cleve Jones of Senora last week contracted the crop from Sutton ranchman at that price. G. R. White of Brady sold 300 steer calves last week to Sam Hoerster of Mason at 15 cents. White said, and this must have been tops in Texas. The calves were fancy bred. Bob Johnston of the XYZ at San Angelo writes from Kansas City that he put his first four cars of steers on the market last week and that his 11-year-old steer (mentioned previously in this column) weighed 1800 lbs. and brought 12½ cents.

Here's a dry weather sample of calf weights: J. W. Gibbons of Richland Spring weighed out his 1200 calves to Charley Ford of San Antonio last week at 365 lbs. (\$13.75). Contrast: Roy Barton of Brady says he hasn't contracted any calves in McCulloch County — doesn't know of any contracted there. In Mason County, on the other hand, A. M. Harkey of Mason said he has contracted a lot of calves from the top of 14-15 down to present range of around 12-13; adds that he got 500 last week from Alvin Dropper, L. B. Eckert and Ernest Bober of Mason.

M. N. Morrison of Junction showed us a check Friday for 500, paid by J. W. Walston of Menard for a Morrison bull. R. C. Colvin has taken charge of the famous Valinda (horse) Farm at Sabinal, replacing John Ware, resigned. Hygro, the magnificent stud of T. P. Morgan, Kerrville, looked like a million last week — he's big and powerfully muscled, keeps heavily booked at a fee that would pay for two or three good horses. G. R. White of Brady this week said he had his mare, Texa-Louise, in foal to V. Whitney's famed sire, Mahmoud, at Lexington, Ky. Mahmoud was third on the English sire list before being brought to the U. S. for \$50,000.

Approximately 3,000,000 lbs. of wool were appraised in Texas the past week—about 21,000,000 have been appraised to date, of a total (estimate) clip of 36,000,000 lbs. of 12-and-8-months wool (not including fall wool, of course). The top price on fine wool has been 51¼¢, net to the grower in at least one instance. Appraisers are working around Ft. Worth, Lampasas and out of San Angelo this week, Texas' Chief appraiser Rome Shield disclosed.

Mohair contracting is going on steadily around Kerrville, according to Scott Schreiner, warehouseman, and Clyde Young, of Winslow and Co. Prices 57-59 on adult, and 77-79 on kid. Bill Danze of Fredericksburg last week sold 100 four-year-old and under nannies from one ranchman to another at \$6 a head. C. E. Miller and Gus Young of Kerrville today (Thursday) are to receive the last of 3,000 kids contracted along the lower Pecos River at \$4.50 a head.

C. T. White of Brady last week sold five four-year-old halfbreds to Bill Barry of San Antonio at \$200 each to go to Mexico for polo ponies.

Peanut hay, good and bright, is just coming in at Fredericksburg, bringing \$21 a ton and better, says Ernest Lochte, feed man and warehouseman.
