Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Daniel have received a letter from their son, Sgt. Varge Daniel, the first word from him since he landed in Australia, about March 16. There is of course no air mail line between that country and this, hence it is a long time between letters. The message was mailed June 3.

Daniel's Letter.
May 12, 1942.

Dear Folks:
As yet I haven't had a letter from home, so I imagine it will take me letters almost as long to reach you and as there is very little—I can say I won't attempt to write often, but I will send a cablegram occasionally, just to let you know that I'm thinking of you.

I went to church yesterday, on Mother's Day. I can remember the last one was in Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis. In the future I'll try to arrange my affairs so I can go to church with you on that day.

May 19.
I received your letters of March and one written in April, last week, so you can see that it takes at least a month for letters to reach here. I don't know what gave you the idea that I could send the letters by air mail. I'm afraid that there isn't an airline from Australia now.

May 24.
I really have no excuse for not finishing this letter long ago, except that we do keep quite busy in the day time and usually there is a blackout at night and it is pretty easy for me to excuse myself, but I promise not to wait this long again.

I won't try to explain our activities here, as it seems you all know about everything we do (judging from the clipping you sent). The people, though, are very hospitable and when we have time off we have a very enjoyable time.

As yet I haven't received the packages you speak of sending, so I don't want you to bother about sending anything else—not that it wouldn't be enjoyed but there isn't really anything that I need and I can buy anything here that I could buy at home. We're issued American cigarettes and this week we have been able to get Coca Cola at the PX, which was indeed a treat. Razor blades are rationed, but I have no trouble in getting enough to keep my beard shaved.

You mentioned so many of the boys from home being down here. Several of my best friends in school are here but I haven't seen any except Donald Surles—I'm a sure you remember him. He is a first lieutenant now and is stationed at the same field I am. It was really a pleasant surprise to see him. He has just received word that he has a five pound girl.

55,332,000 HAVE JOBS.

NEW YORK, July 17.—A total of 55,332,000 men and women had jobs in May, a nationwide survey of the national industrial conference board revealed Friday. The board said the figure was a new record for employment in this country. The conference board estimated that almost 5,000,000 previously unemployed persons had obtained jobs since the first of the year.

ALIEN HOMES RAIDED.

NEWARK, N. J., July 17.—The homes of 65 German aliens were raided early Friday and Thursday night in widespread searches throughout New Jersey as the Federal Bureau of Investigation renewed its drive on the German-American Bund.

His subject at the morning hour will be "Christian Unity."

L. A. Warren, chairman of the board of deacons, and Troy Powell, vice-chairman of that board, join in the statement that the church has prospered in every way during Wright's pastorate. The church debt has been steadily reduced and there has been increased attendance and renewed interest in both the church and the Sunday school, Warren stated.

The minister, who is also popular with the general public, has been active in civic affairs and is particularly in Red Cross, Defense Guard and USO work. He was recently elected president of the Cisco Ministerial association.

CANDIDATE FOR RAILROAD COM- MISSION HERE

T. Leo Moore, mayor of Electra, was in Cisco Friday afternoon in the interest of his campaign for the unexpired term of railroad commissioner. Moore is the only man from West Texas in the field of 10 making the race for the office.

Moore is completing a swing through West Texas and is on his way back home. He will close his campaign next Friday night with a radio address at Wichita Falls.

Campaigning under the slogan of "Moore for More oil and a higher price for crude," Moore told friends in Cisco Friday that he was highly pleased, not only with the great reception given him in West Texas, but throughout the state.

A fight against the present pro-railroad system of Texas and the M-68 barrier and a fight for pipe lines from Texas to the oil-starved eastern seaboard to keep Texas refineries running and Texas labor employed, highlights Moore's campaign.

100 THOUSAND WELLS.

GREENVILLE, July 17.—Symbolic of one of Texas' greatest assets, the state's 100,000th producing oil well was dedicated Thursday 10 miles southeast of Greenville in the presence of public officials and oil men.

60 WILL BECOME CITIZENS

CAMP WOLTERS, July 17.—Nearly 60 Camp Wolters soldiers Tuesday will become citizens of the nation they have sworn to defend in Texas' first mass naturalization of alien soldiers in World War II.

Judge William H. Atwell of the U. S. district court in Dallas will conduct the naturalization ceremony at 2:30 p. m. in the camp service club.

Men from all corners of the globe—many of them with relatives or friends in nations now oppressed by the enemy—will become U. S. citizens as soon as the oath of allegiance is administered to them by the clerk of court.

It will be the first such ceremony since the last war, when many thousands of soldiers were naturalized in Texas camps.

AIR RECORD GOOD

WASHINGTON, July 17.—The war department reported Thursday that the army air forces have the best safety record of all the world's military air organizations, with an accident rate 68 per cent below the army's rate for 1930 and 10 per cent below the 1930-40 army averages. Records show, the department said, that better than 80 per cent of the air force accidents are caused by personnel failure, and special attention is being paid to takeoffs and landings in an intensive campaign to lower the accident rate as the bulk of the accidents involved them.

BIG GAS WELL.

COLEMAN, July 17.—A gas well and a new location were the highlights Friday in Coleman county. Woodley Petroleum Company No. 1 Moss Thompson is producing 2,000,000 cubic feet of gas from the Morris sand around 2,803 feet and is planning to sell the gas to Lone Star Gas company. The well is in HT&B survey, block 1, section 2, near Novice, and is 660 feet from the north and east lines of the survey.

FIVE MILLION DAILY.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—The agriculture department announced that farm products approaching a value of \$1,500,000,000 have been purchased for lend-lease and other requirements in the last 15 months. Since March 15, 1941, when the Agricultural Marketing Administration started its expanded buying program, purchases through June 30, 1942, have totaled \$1,396,182,224. For June, they amounted to \$161,449,248; an average of more than \$5,000,000 daily.

NAZARENE OF- FICIALS ARE STILL COMING

Other officials of the Church of the Nazarene continue to arrive at the Cisco encampment at the lake. Rev. Elbert Dodd of the Louisiana district spoke today. Services will continue through Sunday it was announced.

A notable fact of the gathering is that fully 75 per cent of those attending are young people, which is a very hopeful sign, said Prof. John Peters, today. Because as he says, young people are much more impressionable and can be taught better than those of more mature age.

Other recent visitors to the camp are District Superintendents I. C. Mathis, of the Dallas district, and Rev. Ira True, of the Monterey and San Antonio district.

Visiting pastors are, Rev. J. E. Moore, Rev. Howard Berson and Jack Welty of Dallas, Rev. Hamm of San Antonio and Rev. Raymond McClung of Lake Charles, La.

There are now more than 300 attending the services at the Presbyterian encampment grounds, where this group has its headquarters. "And still they continue to arrive," said Prof. Peters. He added that all are delighted with the facilities for recreation at the lake. Many are availing themselves of the opportunity for swimming, fishing and boating.

TOLL OF U. S. MERCHANT VES- SELS NOW 377

The sinking of three more merchant ships, two of them American and one Norwegian, announced by the navy Thursday raised to 377 the unofficial compilation of Allied and neutral merchant vessels lost in the Western Atlantic since America's entry into the war.

Eleven seamen on a sinking Norwegian freighter lost their lives when a second torpedo struck their vessel as lifeboats were being lowered, 15 survivors said upon their arrival at a North Atlantic port.

Fourteen men perished on the Norwegian ship and 15 others who made away in a dory and life rafts still were unaccounted for.

JULY 22 NIMITZ DAY

AUSTIN, July 17.—Governor Stevenson today proclaimed July 22 "Chester W. Nimitz Day in Texas" in honor of the commander-in-chief of the Pacific Fleet.

"The American Legion has asked that a day be set aside for special activity in all types of our effort," the governor said.

"They have expressed the desire that we re-dedicate ourselves on the occasion of paying tribute to a native son of Texas who is at this time commanding a vital part of our first line of defense and our first weapon of defense—the navy," Stevenson added.

Urging Texans to join with the Legion "in a special tribute to Admiral Nimitz' courage, devotion to duty and leadership," Stevenson said that all citizens should "redouble their war effort in every way to help win the war for everlasting peace as an individual tribute to this great sailor, our distinguished son of the hill country of Texas."

SCHOLASTICS MAY TRANSFER UP TO AUGUST 1

As a reminder T. C. Williams, county superintendent, calls attention to the law regulating scholastic transfers.

"Most school patrons are familiar with the transfer regulations, but I deem this reminder timely, as many overlook the matter and, in some cases, until it is too late," the superintendent states.

"Any child legally enrolled in any common or independent school district may, by order of the county superintendent, be transferred to the enrollment of any other district in the same county upon written application of the parents, filed with the county superintendent."

Williams requests parents to file applications for transfers not later than July 31. No transfer applications will be accepted after August 1, 1942. Blanks are now available, and parents have until August 1 to transfer their children, the county school superintendent said.

BRITISH GIVE ROMMEL HARDEST BLOWS HE HAS RECEIVED; MUCH OF FIGHT IS BETWEEN BIG TANKS

The Axis twin offensive toward the Near East oil fields was renewed in major battles today on the Egyptian desert front and toward the lower Don river in Russia.

Red Army counter-attacks, supported by squadrons of American-built airplanes, including Airacobras, were making the enemy advance a costly one and on the northern flank at Voronezh, Russian tanks had broken into two Axis defense lines, seized the initiative on some sectors and resumed a bloody and still undecided battle in and around the city.

But the main German offensive still was aimed southeastward through the Donets Basin toward Rostov and Stalingrad and the Nazis claimed that they had pushed into the Kamensk sector only 80 miles from Rostov in a wide drive toward the lower Don river and the key to the northern Caucasus.

Our mobile formations are pursuing the enemy east of the Donets river in the direction of the lower Don," the German high command claimed, while the Russians merely said they were withdrawing in the face of superior numbers.

ANDERSONS ON SEMI-BUSINESS TRIP, FLORIDA

Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Anderson left Thursday for St. Petersburg, Fla., on a business and pleasure trip. They will join the party of G. B. Adams of Waco, automobile dealer there, and proceed on their trip today.

On the return they plan to switch to the east coast to Jacksonville, and will come by way of Savannah, Ga., and will visit friends in Birmingham Ala.

They will drive used cars back and will be on the trip about ten days.

CISCO SCOUTS IN CAMP AT BILLY GIBBONS

About 19 Cisco scouts from troops No. 49 and No. 101 are spending this week in Camp Billy Gibbons, with other troops of the Comanche Trail. Eagle Scout Paul Ledford is in charge of troop No. 49, while No. 101 will be supervised by L. J. Donohoe and Bill Philpott.

Four scouts from Cisco—Marion Paschall, Homer Lee Hensley, Karl Armstrong and Cotton Harrison—were at the camp last week also.

Karl Armstrong, Jr., returned to Cisco the first of the week to accompany his parents on a vacation trip to a ranch in Wyoming. Those spending this week at the camp in addition to the above are Jack Milner, Joe Philpott, Bill Philpott, Jerry Laird, Jimmy Christie, Jerry Farnsworth, L. J. Donohoe, Glover Duff, McGee Duff, Joe Tom Poe, Eddie Jackson, Robert Shaw, Bobby Poe, Major Farnsworth and Hugh Ledford.

The communique indicated that the main weight of the German offensive had moved southward 50 miles from Millerovo (or had pushed eastward past Voroshilovgrad) to a point east of Kamensk, on the Donets, and was driving along the east side of the Donets toward the lower Don at a point well east of Rostov.

This would form a semi-circle around Rostov if the Germans reach the lower Don, presumably about where the Donets empties into the longer river 65 miles east of Rostov. The enemy also would be on the main railroad leading 100 miles eastward from Kamensk to Stalingrad.

The great cost of the German advances in the south and the urgent haste of the Nazi high command to achieve their geographic goals was illustrated by official Soviet reports that 900,000 Axis troops had been killed, wounded or captured, including 350,000 dead since May 15. This communique said that the enemy also had lost 2900 tanks and 3,000 airplanes. Russian casualties were put at 399,000 in addition to 940 tanks and 1,354 planes.

On the Egyptian front west of El Alamein, heavy battles in which armored units predominated were reported on the northern and central sectors—a sandy stretch of possibly 15 miles from the Tel El Eisa railroad station southward to Ruqesat Ridge, a 10-mile long elevation held by the British.

The British had been jabbing hard at the forces of Nazi Field Marshal Erwin Rommel for a week on both sectors and today a bigger battle—possibly Rommel's main attempt to move again toward Alexandria—was in progress without definite results.

The British communique said that many Axis tanks had been destroyed in the fighting and front line reports said that the Allies had given Rommel his "worst knocking" around, but there was no indication as to British losses.

ELKS ARE BUSY.

OMAHA, Neb., July 17.—The Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks has pledged a \$500,000 war fund to carry out the lodge's war commission activities. The commission promised the adjutant general of the army continued cooperation of the Elks in the "Keep 'Em Flying" program in which the order has recruited almost 10,000 young men for the Air Force.

PRICE PERIL

If uneasy prices once started spiraling up, it might raise a wind that would blow away values and prove almost as disastrous as the war itself. Even the government's 25 billions of gold in Kentucky might not be a strong enough anchor to hold the national economy steady.

It may not be possible to let farm prices find their natural level entirely; but surely it is perilous to all classes, including farmers themselves, to insist on propping them up at arbitrary high levels, regardless of consequences. Here is a situation where, if any large group suffers, all will suffer.

The government, in this matter, is probably qualified to act as the best friend of the big interests concerned—farmers, manufacturers and merchants alike.

GERMAN LOSSES

Sevastopol used to be compared to Verdun. Verdun was the scene of the most violent German assault in all the first world war. From the steadfastness of the French defense came the familiar phrase: "They shall not pass." They did not pass, whereas Sevastopol, after as gallant a resistance, finally fell.

In both sieges much was written about the heavy German losses. They were and are soothing to read about, but not everything soothing is wholesome. Morphine, for instance. The German losses in Russia are heavy, but perhaps exaggerated. Churchill, writing about the last war, pointed out that, despite the quantities of German dead piled up at Verdun, the French actually lost more. Conceivably that may be the case now. If omelets cannot be made without breaking eggs, neither can battles be won without losing men, often many men. Until the violence of the German attack actually falls off, Americans are fooling themselves when they call their losses crippling.

NEGRO SCIENTIST

A negro has just been called the agricultural man of the year, and by a southern paper, too. Dr. George W. Carver, director of the department of agricultural research at Tuskegee, has received this recognition from an Alabama farm journal for his work in behalf of southern agriculture. Working on new by-products of sweet potatoes and peanuts, he is to continue his research for the Ford company.

Negroes should know something about farming. Apart from their work in the South, for unknown centuries they have practiced agriculture in Africa, one of the most fertile continents in the world. Given a chance and a scientific training such as that possessed by Dr. Carver, they should make valuable contributions to agricultural life.

Every man's a hero to his dog, anyway—a fact which goes far to explain why men love dogs.

WAR WOMEN

They might be called Amazons, after the famed female warriors of ancient times. Yet those trim, martial young women heading for Des Moines, Ia., to train as officers in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps, look feminine enough in their "civvies." And even in their uniforms, too, when you get a little used to 'em. And it doesn't really seem fair to call 'em "WAACS."

How the status of women has changed in a generation! It started in the last war, when girls emancipated themselves into trousers. Since then, with "freedom" broadening slowly down from precedent to precedent, like the British constitution, they have risen above nearly every other kind of restriction, sartorial, occupational, athletic and so on. Now there seems to be dawning on the world a feminine branch of military service which goes far beyond the nursing stage of Flor-

ence Nightingale, and almost amounts to a women's army. Trust the sturdy and fearless women of this generation. If men weaken, the rising breed of girls may save the world for democracy.

CHARCOAL GAS

To an unscientific American the idea of running a car on charcoal seems like magic. Yet thousands of automobiles and trucks in Europe are powered in that way, and it can be done here if necessary.

There was a demonstration of the process in Memphis the other day. A big, six-wheeled truck drove through the city, operating on carbon monoxide from a charcoal generator and making 40 miles an hour without difficulty. The generator, made mostly from junk, cost about \$10, and the truck could run for two days on 90 cents' worth of charcoal. The process is said to be rather simple, and there is no danger of suffocation because the gas is never under pressure.

A lot of Americans might come to it, if the gas shortage grows.

FOREST FIRES

The waste of resources caused by forest fires is almost too great to contemplate. Most of this waste is wholly unnecessary. The cigar stub can be put out. The camp fire, also, can be taken care of. No camping or picnic party should ever leave its fire until it is safe or completely extinguished. These fires are bad enough in times of peace. They take the labor of men and horses. They take lives, sometimes of people and always of birds and animals. In time of war they are incalculable.

Now some labor union men are demanding a congressional probe of Westbrook Pegler. That would probably end with Pegler probing congress.

Like other regiments of the modern Canadian Army, the High Light Infantry overseas—can open, sustain and carry through an action almost within its own resources. About 82,000 Canadians out of a population of 12,000,000 are now engaged in producing munitions in Canada. Hundreds of Canadian-made tanks have been shipped to Russia, with more coming off the production lines every day earmarked for the fighting fronts.

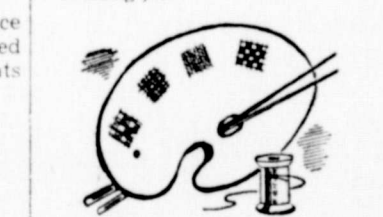

CATTLE MARKET

Trade was slow in cattle and calves on the Fort Worth stock yards Friday with prices weak and fully reflecting recent declines.

Hogs sold mostly 10c above Thursday's average levels, with the extreme top of \$14.60 equalling the highest price paid here since 1926. The packer top was \$14.50.

Spring lambs were fully steady; yearlings scarce and aged sheep slow and weak to lower.

In the cattle yards good fed steers and yearlings sold at \$12 to \$12.50 and included about six

loads of steers at \$12.50, with no choice beefs offered. Medium loads of cake fed grass steers at \$11.25; three loads at \$11.75 and

two loads at \$11.60. Common grass cattle sold from \$7.50 to \$9.

Good fat cows sold mostly at \$8.50 to \$9 with a few higher. Butcher cows cashed mostly at \$7.75 to \$8.25, cutters at \$6 to \$7 and canners at \$3.50 to \$6.

Common light weight bulls brought \$7 to \$7.75 while good heavy bulls cashed at \$9 to \$9.50.

Good fat calves sold at \$11 to \$12 with a few choice calves higher. Common to medium butcher calves brought \$8.25 to \$10.25. Culls were taken at \$7 to \$8.

Stockers were scarce. Steer calves were quoted nominally at \$8 to \$13 with heifer calves at \$12 down. Stocker steers and yearlings were quoted nominally at \$7.50 to \$11.50.

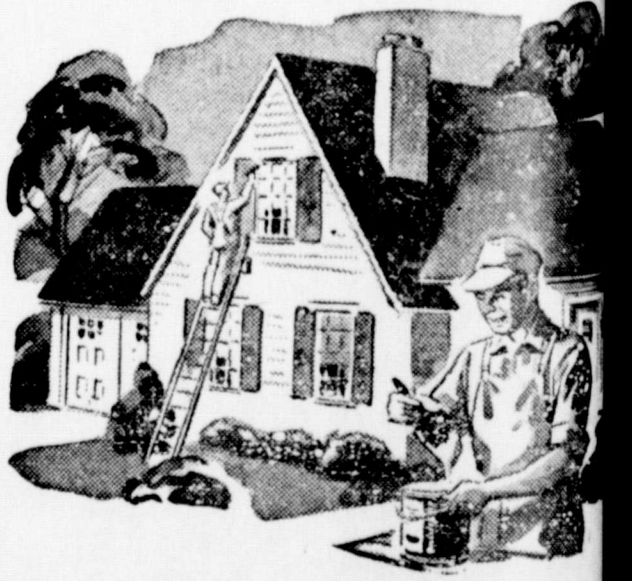
