Forms Expected At ACA Office For Wheat Bonus

Forms for payment of the 30-cent wheat bonus are expected daily at the County ACA office, according to F. C. Collier, ACA secretary.

Farmers all over the wheat belt are being urged by the government to turn in stored wheat to elevators now, so that the United States will be able to meet its commitments to the UNRRA for wheat exports to the starving populations of Europe and Asia.

To get wheat out of storage bins and into the elevators, the 30 cent bonus over and above OPA ceiling price on the grain is offered now, and to make the offer doubly attractive, farmers who turn in wheat now can collect their bonus at once, and if they desire, set a date for the payment of the balance any time between now and March 31, 1947. In other words, farmers can turn in wheat now, collect their 30 cent bonus, and if they anticipate a future rise in price, set up a future date for payment (within one year) at whatever the market price may be on that date.

Wheat must be delivered to an approved elevator not later than May 25 if the bonus is to be paid, Collier said. All local elevators are approved to receive the bonus wheat.

Three Families Lose Home in Fire Monday

A three-family apartment house at the Walker Dairy Barn, just outside the City limits in northeast Hereford, burned to the ground shortly before noon Monday.

The frame building valued at \$8,000, was owned by Bill Neitzgen, and was a total loss. Only \$1,000 insurance was carried.

The building, once a part of the dairy barn, had been remodeled as apartments, and was occupied by the Nafzgers, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Gresham and family, formerly of Wyche, and the Walter Rogers family.

Part of the household furnishings were saved, but the fire was out of control by the time the Hereford Fire Department was called to the scene. Water was pumped from a well at the Ralph Smith home in an effort to bring the flames under control. The dairy barn was not damaged.

Military rites for Russell L. Whitehead, 34, who was killed in the crash of the ill-fated Burlington Flyer near Chicago last Thursday afternoon, were conducted here Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from the First Baptist Church.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. R. H. Cagle, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and military rites were in charge of the Roy F. Wederbrook Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Interment was in West Park Cemetery.

Simultaneous funeral services for his wife, the former Eleanor Burke of Boston, who was also a victim of the crash, were conducted in Boston, Massachusetts, where she will be buried. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Burke of 19 Richmond Street, Weymouth, Mass.

Russell was the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Whitehead of Hereford. Other survivors include a son by a previous marriage, Charles Homer Whitehead, and two sisters, Mrs. Verdon Watts and Mrs. Madeline Faughn, all of Hereford.

Mr. and Mrs. Whitehead were killed instantly last Thursday afternoon when the Burlington's Exposition Flyer crashed into the rear of the Advance Flyer on which they were traveling at Naperville, Illinois.

They were enroute from Boston, where he had been employed, to a new job at Billings, Iowa, when the crash occurred.

After his discharge from the Navy in July, Russell was employed as a printer with The Brand until February 26 this year, when he left for a job with a Boston newspaper.

He had served with the Navy in the Pacific for three years as seaman 1st class aboard the aircraft carrier Lexington.

He was born at Dorchester, near Sherman, Texas, on May 31, 1911 and came to Hereford with his parents in 1917. He graduated from Hereford High school in 1932, and prior to entering the Navy at the outbreak of war, he had been employed by The Brand and by the Amarillo Daily News and Amarillo Times as a printer.

Showers Continue This Week Over Panhandle Area

Light showers of the week before were repeated in this area Sunday and Monday nights, bringing a total precipitation of nearly half an inch in Hereford over the two-day period.

Official weather gauge readings at the City Hall showed .23 inch of rain Sunday night, and .25 inch Monday night.

Reports from outlying communities indicate that the showers were scattered over most of the county. Heaviest rainfall is reported in the Northwest section of the county, and in the Adrian area, with little or no moisture reported in areas west toward the New Mexico line.

Adrian reported .35 inch of rain Sunday night and Monday morning. Dimmitt reported .30 for the same period. Clovis reported a light shower Sunday afternoon which brought .15 inch of moisture.

Showers Monday night brought .55 inch of moisture at Vega, .14 at Dimmitt, and .35 at Amarillo.

City Files Property To Solve Housing Shortage

Spud Growers To Underwrite Labor Housing

The Hereford Potato Growers Association has advised the city that it is prepared to underwrite the cost of operating a migratory labor camp on the POW Camp property to the extent of more than \$8,000 annually.

The Association will assess one cent per sack on each one pound sack of spuds produced. Based on the expected crop this year, this would mean an average guarantee of \$8,125 per season.

In an application for the property filed with the Surplus Property disposal supervisor, however, Mayor E. S. Ireland stated that, "We feel that the income from rents will be ample to take care of all operating expenses without the necessity of using the funds which the Potato Growers Association propose to set aside."

Proposing to set up a migratory labor camp in one or more of the prisoner of war compounds at the POW Camp under city supervision, the city commission proposes to assess rentals at the rate of \$5 per week for small families, \$7.50 per week for average families, and \$10 per week for large families. The estimated annual income from this source would be near-

Swimming Pool Bond Issue Carries By Two-to-One Majority Tuesday

Hereford voted two to one for the \$50,000 swimming pool bond issue in a special municipal bond election Tuesday.

Three hundred and 46 votes were cast in an unusually heavy pool, with 228 voting for the bond issue, 118 against.

Hereford Teen-Towners, led by their president, Freddie Close, launched a spontaneous campaign Tuesday morning to get out the vote which was

probably partly responsible for the heavy ballot cast.

The proposition was officially stated as a "Parks Improvement Bond Issue," with the understanding that such improvements would be in the form of construction of a swimming pool and bath houses at Lake Park.

A meeting of the outgoing City Commission was called yesterday to make an official canvass of the election returns.

Would Aid Vet Housing And Labor Problem

The City of Hereford has officially filed an application for the buildings and grounds of the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp, Mayor E. S. Ireland announced this week.

A three-fold purpose was announced by the city in filing the application: First, to provide housing accommodations for more than 100 veterans and their families in Hereford; second, to provide sanitary housing facilities for more than 2500 migratory laborers in Hereford each summer for the potato harvest; and third, to provide facilities for a municipal airport which may be required by the city in the near future.

In making the application, the city asked for all buildings on the campsite with the exception of those which have been earmarked for schools, hospitals, and other non-profit organizations.

Both Hereford and Pecos schools have asked for a portion of the buildings, and the Deaf Smith county war veterans, through the American Legion and VFW, have put in a bid for the officer's club at the camp. The clubhouse would be used by the veterans as a nucleus for their projected Veterans' Memorial Building.

The application was filed last week with C. W. Moehring, Regional Supervisor of Surplus Property Disposal, who, as a member of the staff of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, is an agent for the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation which has taken charge of the local camp.

Housing for migratory labor was described by Mayor Ireland as the most pressing problem facing the city at the moment. There were more than 2500 Mexican laborers in this immediate area during the harvest last year, and the mayor estimates that there will be considerably more this year, due to the fact that prisoners of war, used in the past as farm laborers, have been removed, and there is a major increase in planted acreage over 1945.

"Sanitary conditions of the laborers was intolerable and a

Housing Needed For 100 Veterans And Families

Ralph Smith, Veteran's Service Officer for Deaf Smith County, estimates that adequate housing is needed for more than 100 war veterans and their families in Hereford and the immediate area.

This fact was pointed out to the Surplus property administrator in an application filed by the city for a part of the barracks and other buildings at the Hereford POW camp.

Many veterans and their families are living in one room, or in inadequate two-room apartments, and are completely unable to find adequate housing in Hereford now, Smith reports.

Mayor Ireland estimates that the population of the city and the immediate outskirts is near the 5,000 mark now, representing an increase since the 1940 census.

During this period, due to the shortage of labor and building materials, new construction has been unable to keep pace with the influx of population.

If a portion of the buildings at the POW camp can be obtained, the city proposes to utilize them to provide housing for veterans, and thus relieve, to some extent, the badly overcrowded condition of the city.

Garden Club Guest-Day Program Features Talk on Landscaping

O. B. Howell of Amarillo was the speaker at a guest-day program featured by the Garden Club Friday afternoon at the Methodist Church.

Mrs. John Jacobsen Jr. president of the Garden Club, welcomed the guests and introduced Mrs. O. G. Hill, program chairman, who introduced the speaker.

Mr. Howell, who is recognized as an authoritative speaker on landscaping gardening, used the theme "Practical Considerations in Landscaping" giving most of his attention to the small home grounds.

"The size of the house, the size of the grounds, the type of house and grounds, the type of person to live in the house, the neighbors, all must fit into the landscape pattern, and with all the world a-bloom no person dare look a rose in the face without trying to do something about beautifying his immediate surroundings. The question, however, is what to do and how to do it.

Choice of Place and Material

Don't plant your shrubs or trees under a power line or telephone line—its expensive to get the trees out of the way—and remember the sewer pipes—don't plant right over them. But, by far the most important thing to remember is the choice of plant material. Know what you are planting before you plant it. Some things grow well in your locality and some don't. Some grow on the sunny side of the house and some in the shade and remember too, winter takes a heavy toll of the frailer varieties. Look into the color harmony of shrubs and plants and if you want to get away from the monotony of dead looking shrubs in the winter, here are a few substitutes

for evergreens. "Red Ossu Dogwood and Kerria which have bright green stems and for color contrast plant lovely yellow forsythia nearby. Then there's the Elderberry with tiny white spots on the stems and the pleasing mock orange with cinnamon brown stems. Among the broadleaf evergreens is the Japanese Enonymus and the Enonymus Patens, the Cotoneaster species and the Teucrium. Also the hardy Box Wood.

Avoid the melancholy emotions created by drab shrubs and evergreens. If you want gaiety, plant a variety of plants with lots of color. Avoid the monotony of repetition in the use of plant material and arrange your garden so that you will want to see it more than once."

All this and more, make or mar your home grounds. Examinations for drivers licenses are held each Tuesday at the County Courtroom in

Hereford. An examiner is on duty in the courtroom every Tuesday to take applications for drivers licenses and to give the required examinations.

Ex-servicemen are permitted to drive without a license for a period not to exceed 6 months after discharge, but should carry a copy of their discharge papers with them at all times until a valid state driver's license has been secured.

Service Company of Dallas, and Taylor and Montgomery of Lubbock.

Bids were opened at the annual meeting of members of the Cooperative at ten o'clock Tuesday morning.

The contracts call for construction of 215 miles of single phase line, 19 miles of 3-phase line for irrigation service, 11 miles of the line, 42 irrigation banks, one 3,000 KVA sub-station located 6 miles south of Hereford, and a 600 KVA sub-station located south of the city limits of Dimmitt.

The longest extension will be 150 miles in Castro and south Farmer counties serving the Bethel-Flag community areas. There are short taps scattered throughout the project in Deaf Smith and Farmer counties, and one extension south of Nazareth is included.

The 215-mile extension, Forrest said, was set up before the war.

The cooperative plans to start work within the next 30 days on a pre-allotment survey to include 250 miles of additional lines, and will file another application in July for an allotment to build these extensions. These lines cannot be built, Forrest said, until another allotment is secured.

ly \$25,000, basing these figures on the expected influx of more than 2500 Mexican laborers during the harvest season this year.

The city estimates that during the peak season, July and August, there will be more than 250 families requiring housing, with the number dropping to 50 during May, June, and September, and probably 25 families remaining here during seven months of the year.

The Texas Cooperative Extension service of Texas A & M College would furnish a supervisor or director, and pay a maximum of \$300 per year toward his salary and expenses. The proposed camp could be operated as a labor pool for this entire area during the harvest season.

Soon thereafter I started to practice law. The people of Dallam County have been most kind to me by electing me four times as their County Attorney, and once as their County Judge and Ex-officio Superintendent of Schools. Meanwhile I had also become interested in military law. By several hundred hours of home study I qualified for and was commissioned in 1936 as a Reserve Officer in the Judge Advocate General's Department of the U. S. Army. The commission obligated me to serve on active duty in the army for the duration of any emergency or war.

When the national emergency developed in 1941, I was ordered to active duty in the army in the month of May. This necessitated my resigning as County Judge of Dallam County. The national emergency conditions that have still existed since the fighting has ended are now rapidly coming to an end.

For nearly two years I served as Staff Judge Advocate at Camp Wolters, and the past three years I have been Staff Judge Advocate of the 2nd Infantry Division. My duties have always been those of legal advisor to all military personnel—from the newest private to Lieutenant General. During this time the "Indian head Division" served about two years in the E. T. O. and it was in combat from D day plus one to V. E. Day. On V. J. Day we happened to be in the United States enroute to the Pacific to help wind up that war.

During my service overseas, in six different countries, I had occasion to observe so much evidence of oppression and injustice in all degrees and forms, that it will always stand uppermost in my mind that our liberties and justice cannot be too zealously guarded and preserved.

Among my daily duties, it has been my privilege and pleasure as legal assistance officer, to assist everyone in the military service needing the assistance of a lawyer in connection with personal problems. Most of those problems have been the same kind that people normally have in civilian life, but they were complicated by the circumstances connected with the individual being then in the military service, on overseas, or both.

Because of my long legal experience in civilian life, I am thoroughly familiar with the problems of the people of the district. From my military service I understand the problems of those now serving in the armed forces and those who have served in becoming readjusted to civilian life.

"In many ways the success in meeting the problems of the returning veteran will be the acid test of our democracy." (Report of Bernard M. Baruch to the President.)

I expect to make a thorough campaign and to meet every possible vote in the district. Meanwhile if you believe that I am qualified and worthy of serving you as District Judge, I will be grateful for your support and vote in the Democratic primaries in July.

menace to the health of the city," the application pointed out.

If the property is available, the city plans to use one of the POW compounds at the camp to establish a camp for the laborers this summer. In a letter to Moehring, Mayon Ireland pointed out the urgency of the problem and stated, "We hope that action can be taken soon so that at least Compound 4 can be made available for workers at an early date."

In the initial application, the city asked for all that part of Section 137, in Block M-7, on which the Prisoner of War Camp is located, including right of way for roadways, and the right of way for the sewer main to the camp disposal plant; and for all of the Northwest quarter of Section 138 including the sewage disposal plant, irrigation system, and garbage disposal grounds.

"This quarter section, being undesirable for agricultural purposes, could be utilized for disposal of city garbage as well as garbage from the migratory labor camp," the application pointed out.

In a supplemental application, the city asks for the right to purchase, for a nominal consideration, all land and real estate held in connection with the POW camp not covered in the original application.

This would include all of Section 137 and the Northwest quarter of Section 138, lying in Deaf Smith and Castro Counties, and would be held available for airport construction.

Hereford is listed under the National Airport Plan for airport construction, the application points out, and this property would be suitable for the establishment of a municipal airport.
