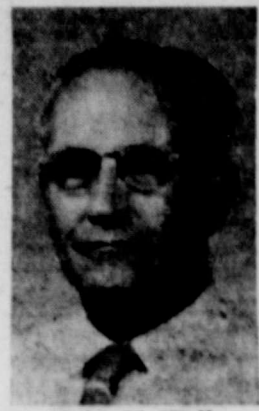


Teenage Pains Disappear When Cause Is Removed

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Now is a good time to get the cotton insect spray machine out and give it a good going over. It is time for some crops to have the first application of insecticide. Thrips are the main insects at this time of the year. And from what I observe and hear over the county, grasshoppers are likely to be a problem later on in the season. If possible, killing them off in their beds is the most economical—and at this time, not all of them have left their beds. Care should be taken that insecticides are not applied to grasslands that cattle or other livestock are grazing on.

little more than flattened places in the grass.

"Small roseate spoonbills are but slightly less ridiculous than the ungainly pelicans and, in spite of their name, only the adults have the unique appendage that has earned them their title. Bills of the young more nearly resemble those of ducks, and some time must elapse after they are hatched before they acquire the sensitive spatulate enlargement which serves the older birds so well while feeding."

We have quoted above from a newspaper story of last week because it is such a good description of what I witnessed one May day in 1926. A party of us went down to Flour Bluff, some twenty miles south of Corpus Christi, and hired a Mexican and his side-kick to carry us in his sail boat to Bird Island, another twenty miles southward in Laguna Madre. The wind was dead ahead and the pilot of the sail craft had to tack back and forth so that the trip to the island took us two hours from our point of sailing.

When about a hundred yards from the island we had to get out of the boat and wade to the island. What we saw there was the most amazing sight I ever witnessed. Bird Island is about as big as the court house square in Hamilton, and its highest point is not

The termite is different from the ant in that it does not have the pinched in waist. In other words, the termite does not have any hips.

Termites are not hard to control or eradicate as long as one uses the proper insecticides and applies it correctly. Several of the new insecticides will give good control—dieldrin or chlordane are the most popular ones in use. A solution of either one of these should be applied around everything that touches the house and ground. It should not only be applied around the ground level of the foundation, but around water pipes, gas pipes, sewerage connections and anything else that goes from the house to the ground. One application of a properly mixed spray of either dieldrin or chlordane should give protection for about five years if the solution is applied properly. I have a new publication on the use of this material which shows how to treat a home and also tells how to make the solution.

more than eighteen inches above normal water level. Almost every square inch of the island was a bird's nest with either eggs in it or young birds, from newly-hatched ones, to some almost ready to fly.

As we got onto the solid ground of the island the mother birds flew up and hovered just above our heads with squawking as one never heard elsewhere. At the same time the young went toddling off to the water and waded to where they could swim and so kept well out of the way. The smaller ones, too weak yet to get out of the nest, just tried to melt into the sand and become invisible. The young pelicans were the most interesting. Those old enough waddled off to the water and swam out far enough to feel safe, while the younger ones just sat still in the nest until we got right over them, then they began to hiss and vomit like young buzzards.

We made no effort to count the nests and their broods, but the nests must have run into the tens of thousands and each nest seemed to have from four to half dozen young in it.

Each species had its own quarters. The egrets and herons nested in the short scrub that was in the higher parts of the island while the gulls and skimmers and numerous others inhabited the sandy stretches around the rim of the island. This particular island did not have any cranes on it, almost every other type of water fowl was there, except geese and ducks and cranes, which nest toward the arctic circle. A remarkable thing about water fowl is that though they go south in winter time almost to the arctic circle, they all nest in the north.

If you ever have opportunity to visit Bird Island in Laguna Madre in the nesting season you will be glad the rest of your life.
