## Census 'Not Counted' List Growing

# Over 60 Are "Missed"

At least 60 Colorado City and Mitchell County families were missed in the 1970 Census preliminary report.

The total could be higher.

Eighteen persons had reported to the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday they were not counted.

All but two of these were from Colorado City and at least eight of those reported had two or more in their families.

At the same time, the Record learned that U. S. Post Office here has confirmed to the Census Bureau District Office in Wichita Falls of approximately 60 known "misses" within the county.

are from within Colorado City or within our surrounding communities," said Chamber President J. C. Britton.

"That is why we are urging every person who believes he or she was not counted, to notify the Chamber of Commerce."

"An accurate census of our community is important to our economic and business and industrial life."

Mayor Mike Burt has officially requested a preliminary

count for Colorado City, but no report has come yet. No preliminary figures are released for towns under 10,000 population unless specifically requested by the mayor.

Postmaster Morris said the Post Office check that revealed "60" or more definite "misses" within the county was in conjunction with the census procedure. The confirmation was made at actual mailing addresses after the District Census Office reported no anticipated census forms had not come from those addresses.

"We believe we did a pretty accurate job within Colorado City on the check," said the postmaster, "but I don't believe we could do an accurate check of the county area."

For an example, Morris reported only one card for a grouping of 7 mail boxes in the Lake Champion area.

Persons receiving mail at the boxes have lake residence away from the mail point.

"It could be easy for us to

miss someone in the county," he added.

The postmaster said foot mailmen carry mail to 1,323 resident addresses within the city limits of Colorado City. There are 186 additional mail boxes within the city which are serviced by rural carriers.

In addition there are 592 Post Office boxes.

Morris emphasized that businessmen receiving mail at their place of business are not included in the count.
