## Mixed Reactions To Census Quiz

Census taking time came to Mitchell County Wednesday as enumerators began canvassing every home.

And many Mitchell County residents have filled out their census questionnaires with mixed emotions.

At least that's what a brief survey made Tuesday by the Record showed.

While most persons thought it self-explanatory and easy

to fill out, several others expressed their opinion as "too personal."

Mrs. John M. Worrell, who couldn't do her own writing because of a broken arm, was assisted by her daughter visiting like Sunday. She, in turn, helped a friend answer her questionnaire Monday.

Mr. Worrell expressed her opinion of the census form as being "simple, to the point"

and gave her approval to the delivery of census forms by mailmen enabling residents to "read it over and give a little thought to it."

Voicing a "too personal" opinion, however, was a father of four, J. J. Harder.

At another home in Colorado City, the housewife said she didn't mind answering questions, but she couldn't see the need of it - and, left to her

husband, the questionnaire would have been ignored altogether.

Mrs. A. K. McCarley Sr. reported she had thought she'd have to have help answering questions but found it very easy.

Mr. and Mrs. Gene Ward also thought it self-explanatory and uncomplicated.

A 26-year-old resident of Cuthbert Community said his

questionnaire was already filled out and ready to be picked up. "I don't know what they'll do with it or use it for," he said before expressing his thoughts that questions should not go much further "in detail than his short form."

At least five housewives confessed that they had not even looked at the census and in one home a college daughter had answered questions - neither of her parents had looked at it.

## Counters Start Calls

### Long Quiz For Every Fifth House

Enumerators after the 1970 Census began their house-to-house canvass in Mitchell County Wednesday.

And occupants of every fifth dwelling will receive a long quiz to supply additional information about their homes when they receive the brief form they received by residents through the mail.

Mr. and Mrs. Gene Ward

for Mitchell and Sterling County enumerators, explained that additional questions asked by census takers all "have a definite purpose in our county, city, and state and nation."

"Our representation in Congress and state legislatures is based on statistical totals which make up an inventory and a picture of the American people."

Statistics stand for real life

in real situations," she continued, "and they tell us whether we are going forward or backward."

Schools, the government, businesses, our States, cities and citizens groups all use these figures to plan their future and to measure our country's progress and progress.

For example, knowing the number of high school children

in our area will help local people determine future needs for our educational facilities.

What are enumerators asking? Mrs. Reilly explained a few questions this week.

Questions about hours worked last week will provide information used to develop, administer and evaluate manpower training, education and other government programs.

Statistics are also used to determine manpower resources available in an area and to measure level of unemployment in local area.

Number of automobiles; information regularly used is helpful to officials who plan highways, thruways, parking facilities, etc.

Television Sets - Statistics used to determine number of house holds who can be reached by this communication system. Also used for studies concerning educational programs.

Battery-operated radio - Used to determine how many homes are able to receive emergency messages in the event of a power failure.

Value of home? A measure of the changes in price of housing over the decades. Government and planning agencies use this information in combination with income and other characteristics to develop housing programs designed to meet needs of people at different economic levels.

State or country of birth - Used to study long-time trends in migration and useful in formulating immigration policy and in considering immigration laws.

Marital status? Used with age and relationship to identify areas with large numbers of employed wives or elderly widows; young single people who soon may be establishing homes of their own, etc. Information is used also to plan facilities and services for these groups.

Basement? Used in developing shelter programs.

Air conditioning? A measure of power consumption and water usage. Information can be used to help prevent power failure and water shortage.

## Range Clinic Set

### Three Specialists on Program

Two out-of-town specialists will join Dr. W. A. Lyle, walrus, as speakers for a beef cattle and range management program here April 9 in Lone Wolf Electric Medallion Room.

The program will be headed by Dr. Roy Miller, range specialist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Vernon, and Paul Marion, superintendent of Lone Wolf Plains Livestock Research Station at Spur.

Dr. Miller will discuss chemical and mechanical brush control methods. Marion's talk will concern semi-confinement of beef cattle and how it can complement row crop operation.

He will also discuss research currently in progress at Spur in relation to cow size and crossbreeding.

Dr. Waldrip, general supervisor for Spade Ranch, will re-

port activities of Texas Brush Control and Range Management Association; the research it is currently funding and plans for 1970.

Mitchell county farmers and ranchers contributed about \$3,200 to the brush and range development association in a fund drive in recent months, according to Bobby Lemons, Mitchell County agent.

Mahon, who with District Attorney Mahon formerly owned KVMC, was born Aug. 29, 1896 in Mahon, La., and came to Loraine in 1908. He was married to Nola Muns June 12, 1917, in Loraine.

He was a member of First United Methodist Church of Loraine and Loraine Lions Club. He was on the Loraine School board for many years.

He operated a grocery store in Loraine for 18 years and had farming interest in the area. He owned Chrysler-Plymouth dealership in Colorado City at one time.

### Direct Distance Dialing Starts Sunday For Colorado City Telephone Customers

Starting Sunday telephone customers in Colorado City will be able to dial their own Long Distance Calls direct to more than 100 million telephones throughout the United States and Canada.

This improvement in telephone service, at no increase in rates, has taken years of planning and engineering.

When you dial your own Long Distance numbers, calls always go through at low station-to-station rates - about one third less than person-to-person.

**HERE'S HOW TO MAKE A DDD CALL...**

1. Dial "1" - this connects your phone to the vast DDD network.
2. Dial the Area Code only if it's different from your own.
3. Dial the number you want to call... just as you would a local call.

Suppose, for example, you want to call 825-4199 in Denver. The Denver Area Code is 303 (see the front pages of your directory). So you'll dial:

**1** + **3-0-3** + **8-2-5-4-1-9-9**  
**DDD Code** + **Area Code** + **Telephone Number**

To make a call within your home 915 area, you will not need to dial the Area Code. To call 672-4351 in Abilene, for example, you would dial:

**1** + **672-4351**  
**DDD Code** + **Telephone Number**

In a few seconds, you'll hear the phone ring in the distant city.

**Some Questions and Answers About Direct Distance Dialing**

**Q** - Will I be charged if I reach a wrong number?  
**A** - There is no charge for a wrong number. If you get a wrong number, try to find out what city and number you have reached. Then hang up. Dial "Operator" immediately and report it to her. She will see that you are not improperly charged for the call.

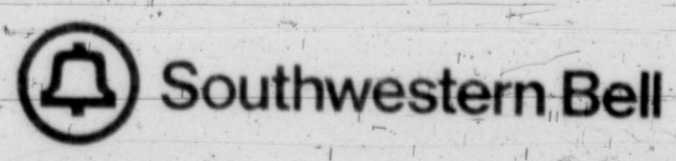
**Q** - Will I be charged if the number I call is busy or there is no answer?  
**A** - No. Just hang up and try again later. DDD calls are recorded and billed by electronic machines which record only completed calls (when someone answers the distant telephone).

**Q** - What if I run into trouble on a call?  
**A** - Most DDD calls go through quickly, efficiently, and trouble-free. However, if you should be cut off, if you cannot hear well, or the connection, or experience any other trouble, please hang up, then immediately dial "Operator" and report it to her. She will take steps to correct the difficulty.

**Q** - How do I call collect or person-to-person?  
**A** - Your DDD calls are station-to-station calls. For other types of calls - person-to-person, collect, direct, and calls made through another number, or those from coin phones - dial "Operator." She will handle the call for you.

**Q** - How do I get the area code for the city I want to call?  
**A** - The front pages of your telephone directory have a list of area codes for frequently called cities. Cities called less frequently are omitted to shorten the list and save you time. If you cannot find the area code for the city you wish to call, dial "Operator" and tell her the city you want.

**Q** - What if I don't know the telephone number I want?  
**A** - Just dial "1" plus the area code if it's different from your own, plus 555-1212. The distant Directory Assistance operator will answer. When she gives you the number, hold it down. Then hang up for a few seconds before you dial your call. There is no charge for the call to Directory Assistance.
