Highway 117 Work Is To Be Started Monday

Construction work on Highway 117 from Perryton to Booker will be started Monday morning, according to Herbert Shindler, when the first crew of relief workers will report on the job which will be supervised by the State Highway department.

Probably not over ten or fifteen men will be started on the project, the number to be increased until a full crew is at work. All of the grading work will be done according to specifications drawn up by the State Highway department and will be done with teams and manual labor as far as possible.

Farmers or others having teams available for work are requested to get in touch with A. E. Dyatt, resident engineer for the highway department, who will also be responsible for paying for the use of the teams.

CROP PRODUCTION LOANS ARE

Crop production loans are again being offered farmers in this section, according to word received by County Agent G. R. Sheets and application blanks are available at the First National bank.

The application blanks are similar to those used during the spring crop loan period. The loans are available to buy seed, fuel and machinery repairs for putting in a fall wheat crop.

Loans Up To \$300
If you are one of the many who have already secured a crop loan and need further assistance it is possible to get a loan under this plan, providing you have wheat land that is not already mortgaged.

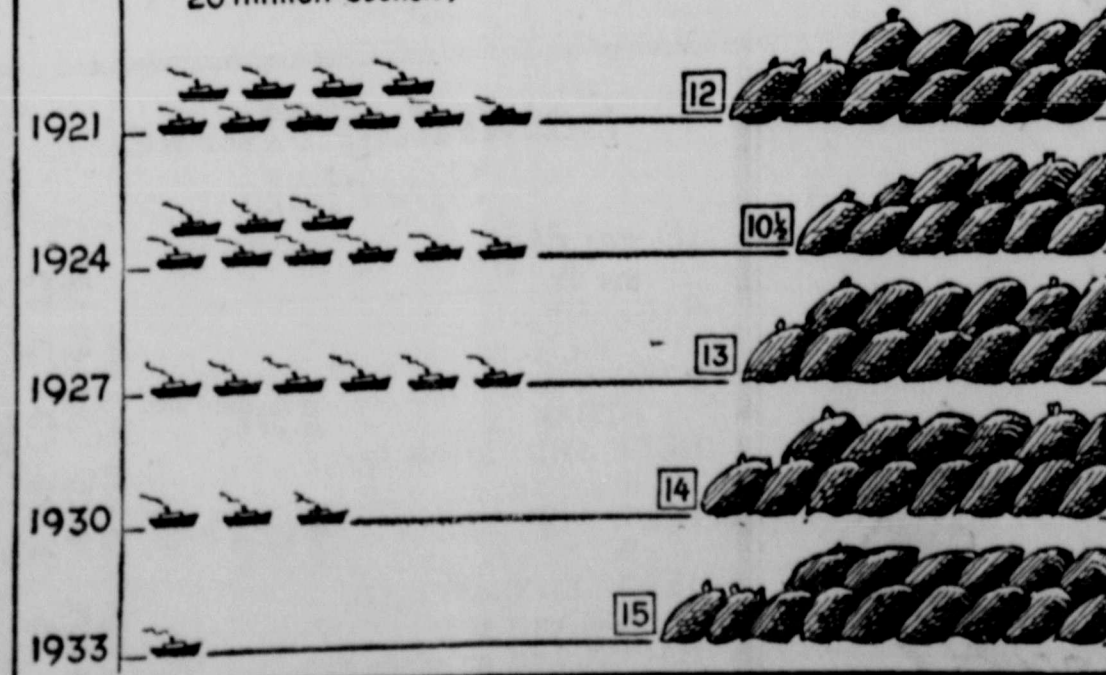
It is pointed out that some other member of the family can borrow money up to \$300 on one of the Federal loans, offering a crop mortgage on any lands that was not given as security on the first loan.

PIGS TO FORT WORTH DRAWS SPECIAL BONUS

Payment Scaled From \$5.40 to \$8.90
For Pigs From 25 To 100
Pounds

Shipments Leave Sat.

Two Double Deck Cars Included In
First Shipment Authorized
From County

The first pigs to be shipped from Ochiltree county under the government's allotment plan to pay a special bonus on light pigs will leave here Saturday morning, billed for Ft. Worth. Two double deck cars will be filled for the first shipment, containing from eight to nine hundred light pigs.

According to Guy R. Sheets, county agent who is directing the work through the extension service, the pigs will weigh from twenty-five to one hundred pounds and will be purchased by the government at prices ranging on a sliding scale from \$8.90 per hundred weight for the light pigs to \$5.40 for the heavier pigs.

To Be Delivered Friday
J. S. Talley, Burt Cutter and J. L. Donley are assisting County Agent Sheets in arranging for the shipment and if farmers have not already arranged for delivery of their light pigs, they must do so not later than Friday night.

Pigs shipped in this allotment must be the property of the original owners, as only the owners can obtain the government premium. The shipment comes under the recent emergency program for adjusting hog production, it being the plan of the administration to take light pigs and sows due to farrow within a few weeks, entirely off the market by slaughtering them.

High Government Program
The extremely light pigs and the sows will be converted into tankage and fertilizer at the packing plants, and some meat can be secured from the heavier pigs but it will be stored and will not go into commercial channels to further depress the already glutted pork market.

The government project calls for the purchase of four million of the small pigs and one million sows. The program will place fully \$40,000,000 increased income in the hands of hogs farmers over the nation.

Arrangements were completed this week for the establishment of a Federal Re-employment office in Perryton with Herbert Shindler appointed as manager of the new bureau with headquarters at the courthouse.

The re-employment office is a branch of the Federal and state project to assist in securing work for unemployed men and women who are not on relief roles. Anyone who is unemployed is requested to register, there being no charge for the service.

All contractors on jobs where Federal funds are involved must apply through the re-employment office for employees, according to a new law and other contractors voluntarily apply at this office for assistance in securing workers.

Want Men To Register
This would mean that those registered would have the first opportunity of securing work should contracts be let on any of the proposed highway projects in this county, other than those handled by the relief board.

Many unemployed who have not applied for relief may desire to take advantage of this service as it cannot in any manner be construed as asking for relief, according to Mr. Shindler, and he urges all unemployed men to register with him under this service.

FOLLOWS LAND NOT THE MAN

LANDLORD-TENANT RELATIONSHIP MOST TROUBLE-SOME IN ALLOTMENT CONTRACT

College Station—Questions about landlord-tenant relationships in the domestic allotment plan for wheat seem to be the most troublesome to growers, judging by inquiries received at Extension Service Headquarters and by county agents.

Two guiding principles help to explain most such question, students of the plan state. In the first place the contract follows the farm and not the farmer, and in the second place the right to share in benefits depends upon having a vested interest in the crop.

Farmers sign up land and not themselves, but in signing up the land they obligate themselves and all who come after them in the farming of that land for the duration of the contract. If a tenant and landlord sign now both share in the 1933 payments, but if tenant moves away the new tenant must assume the contract for the remaining two years and the landlord is responsible to see that this is done.

The landlord in no case can receive more than his customary share of the benefits. If tenant has already moved away and cannot be found the landlord may sign the contract and hold his new tenants to it, but he cannot get more than one-third (if that is his usual rental) of the 1933 payments. The department tenant, later hearing of the contract, may file claim for his portion of the 1933 payments. If he fails to do so the two-thirds coming to him is simply never paid.

If a landlord has several tenants part of whom sign contracts with him and part do not, he cannot allow those who do not sign to increase their wheat acreage above what it was for the three-year average 1930-32, or above 1933, whichever is larger.

If a landlord rents for cash he cannot share in the benefits, but must sign the contract with tenants.

If a succeeding tenant next year or the year following should break the contract, all advances made previously are collectable by the Government, and the landlord and not

the 1933 tenant is liable for the 1933 payments. When a tenant legally severs his connection with the land he is released from all contract obligations, and the same is true of a landlord who sells. The contract binds the new tenant or new owner, however.

PIONEERS OF TRANSPORTATION, 200 ACTORS MAKE "WINGS OF CENTURY" TRUE WORLD'S FAIR THRILL

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Conquest and travel will always thrill Americans. It took conquerors brave and bold to mould America from a vast wilderness. It took conquest as courageous to gain victory over the tremendous distances between the corners of a great nation.

What patriot has not wished for the chance to turn back the years that he might see for himself the struggles and the triumphs of his forebears? A dream, a dream...

Now in the Chicago World's Fair—A Century of Progress—it is a dream come to life. For "Wings of a Century", gigantic pageant of the romance of transportation, brings it to life.

Here, in a great amphitheater, on a spacious stage whose only backdrop is the spread of the skies, making the onlooker feel that he is gazing over the heads of the actors into a glorious future, are the actual vehicles that created the history of transportation in the United States.

Reenact Boone's Trip.

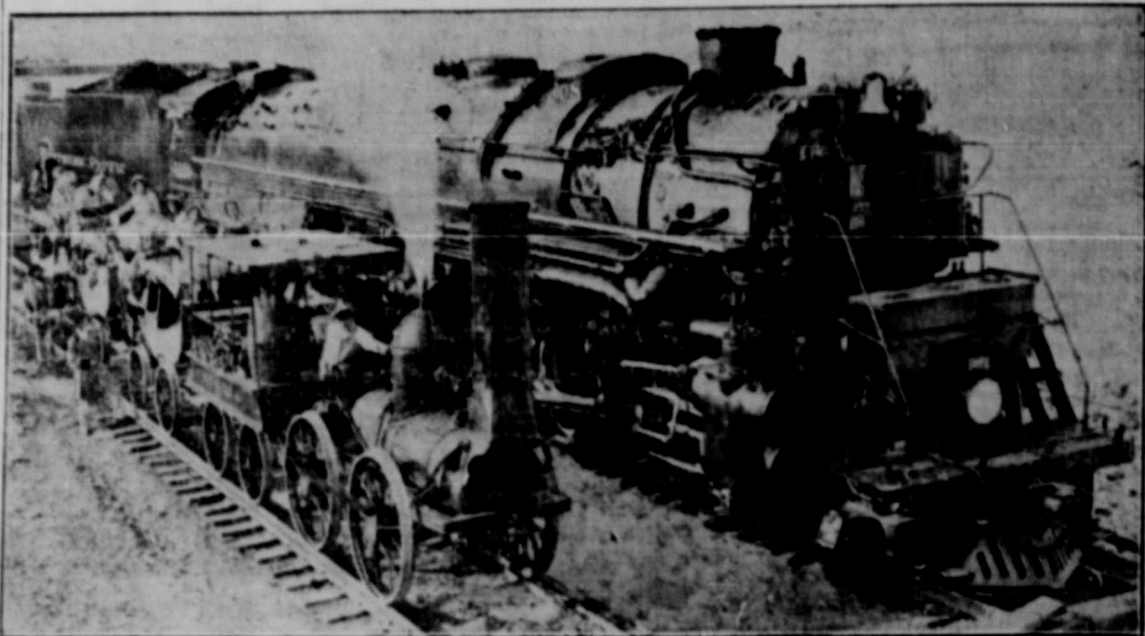
As the pageant begins, the wilderness pathfinder of 1700 to 1750, with his fellow pioneers, beats his way across the wastes on foot, on horse, in canoes, Indians, priests, hunters and trappers all are garbed actually as they were in the days of their work. The caravan of Daniel Boone follows, with the first wagons and carts to probe the new West. Even the blood-thirsting battles with savages are accurately reproduced.

The scene shifts to 1807. It is "Little Old New York", and the day is that of the voyage of the first steamboat, creation of Robert Fulton, opening a new chapter in water travel. The mayor and his party are on hand to greet it. Seeing the smoke, city firemen rush to the fore with buckets to save the ship from destruction, only to learn that it is meant to smoke like that.

Next come the barges of the old Erie canal of 1825, with their motley crowds arrogant and happy in this, for them, last word in modern travel. There is the landing of the famous Baltimore Clipper ship reenacted in the next scene.

Now 1830 brings that new wonder of wonders, the "iron horse" across the stage move the old Tom Paine of 1829, the De Witt Clinton of 1825, the Thomas Jefferson, and the locomotive of 1825. The great rails carry their trains

through the years up to the World's Columbian Exposition of 1893, and finally to the giant, sixteen drive-wheel monster of the Northern Pacific.



cific of today. All of them are carrying their load of passengers dressed authentically in period to lend realism.

Not replicas or miniatures are these pioneer locomotives. They are real, the actual engines that made history, and they all move under their own power. Many of them are operated by the same men who were in their cabs when they rendered actual service. Thrills run up many a chilly spine when the ancient whistles blast the message: "There's life in the old girl yet!"

Produce Old Autos.

The "horseless carriage" is not long in appearing upon the scene, and long and loud are the laughs at some of the ludicrous trail-blazers that paved the way for one of the world's greatest industries. And when the newest models of 1933 automobiles speed into view, there is a world of sincerity and gratitude in the applause of the thousands who view "Wings of a Century" every night.

In a grand finale, the take-off of the Wright brothers' airplane is brought to life again to the tune of rustic jeers and farsighted acclaim. In a final center-stage gesture, a huge transport plane of today hoves into view, with the question: What will tomorrow bring?

There is plenty of life in "Wings of a Century". Unlike many pageants, it moves fast and is full of

humor, quaint and real. More than 200 actors, directed by Miss Helen Ticken, enact Edward Hungerford's production with a sincerity and gusto born of pride in the accomplishment of their countrymen. There are three shows daily, at 7, 8:15 and 9:30 p. m.

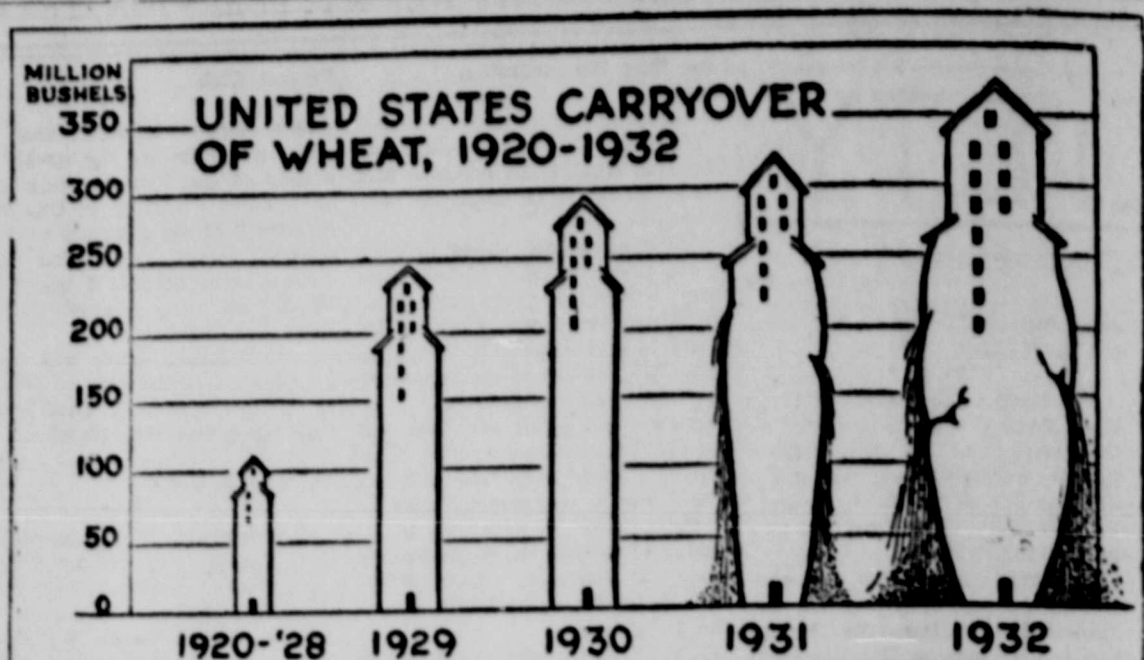

From 1920 to 1928 the carryover was about normal and a bin or grain elevator capacity of slightly more than 100 million bushels was sufficient for supplies from year to year. Since 1928

the carryover in the United States has increased rapidly. In 1929 it was nearly 250 million bushels. In 1930 it was nearly 300 million bushels. It was over 300 million bushels in 1931 and in 1932 it reached a new peak of more than 300 million bushels. Secretary Wallace has estimated

that even with our short crop this year, the carryover will still be above normal a year from now because of the present large carryover, the lack of export demand and reduced feeding and, unless something is done to check it, the carryover is likely to jump again to around 350 million bushels in 1935.

No Thought Of Boycott

NRA Administration Chief Tells Retailers Steps Will Be Taken For Protection

WASHINGTON.—"There is no thought of boycott here", Administrator Hugh S. Johnson said in an address at the opening session of the hearings on the retail merchants codes, and with special emphasis, "We have provided machinery here in Washington to take care of people who find the grade too steep for them. But when we find a man chiseling behind the Blue Eagle we are going to step in and take that Eagle in such a way that the whole world will know it. That is only our simple and just duty to those high-minded citizens who are earnestly trying to pull this great country out of the depression. We are building up our case against cheaters, and when we move against them it will mean their economic death."

General Johnson stressed "the duty of us here to protect those who cooperate and make sacrifices by investing in reemployment to lift buying power." The lesson learned during the war was that of wholehearted cooperation toward great national ends. In approaching the fourth anniversary of depression, with both State and individual relief funds nearing the vanishing point, "this country, with all of its vast resources, cannot still and allow drift and despair to rule. No nation, not even our own, can continue to support nearly 40,000,000 people in destitution."

He explained the attitude of NRA as to prices. "Such seasoned campaigners as you retailers know what price structure should be in such a critical time while we are restoring normal employment. You should resist advancing prices of manufacturers, and we will back you up within our limits. That is our plain duty to the public. Furthermore, it is the law, and we are here to enforce it."

WHAT BANKING WENT THROUGH

By JOHN H. PUELICHER
American Bankers Association

BANKING in its long career has been compelled to withstand many serious shocks, but it ran into the most perplexing entanglement of its whole history since the general breakdown of values in 1929. The commercial structure of the entire world seemed to have been shaken from its foundations and the marvel is that the banker, with everything breaking down all around him, was able to come through as he has.

General business failures, agricultural stagnation, income losses, capital losses, inability to meet debts and therefore inability of bankers to pay back depositors when loans were not paid, were the reasons, in most instances, for the bank failures.

No profession, no department of life is without its weaker elements, but had proper consideration been given to the relatively few instances in banking, had exaggerated and startling headlines been kept in true proportion, had banking not been used as a target for political self-seeking and with vote-seeking motives, had unfounded rumors not been spread the people's confidence might have been retained and far less would have been their losses.

There were factors in our banking experience which every earnest banker deploras—factors which many had worked years to eliminate, which it was fearfully recognized would aggravate any difficult days which might arise. One of the worst of these was due to political regulation which chartered many banks that should never have been.

That there have been incompetence and dishonesty in banking is admitted. That the instances that did occur were used grossly to increase fear in the public mind, we affirm. We shall continue to strive for higher attainments in our profession and strive for laws that require competence and ability in management. That we cannot legislate honesty and unselfishness into either a banker or a borrower must be conceded, but dishonesty, wherever found, should be punished. It is as true in banking as elsewhere that no matter how good the law, dishonest and incompetent men can make it ineffective. Good laws are essential. We must strive for ever better ones, but their enforcement will come only as the public recognizes that it is a matter not of laws or codes alone but of the men who administer them.

Our people must be brought to realize that the welfare of our country depends upon its banking system, that the strength of the banking system depends upon the public's faith and understanding, that the majority of banks, because of faithful service rendered, even through the whole of this general breakdown, had the right to expect the people's trust and confidence.

In every great catastrophe, no matter what its nature, no matter what its cause, someone must be crucified. The banker was this time selected. In the late 90's, political
