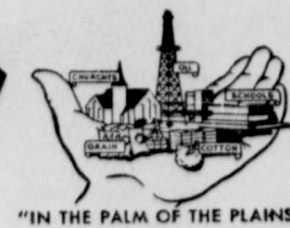

Antelopes Blank Olton, 27-0, In Last Home Game Of Season

Abernathy's Antelopes scored three touchdowns in the second quarter and added seven points in the final period here last Friday night, blanking the Olton Mustangs, 27-0. It was the Antelopes' third win in District 2-AA play against one loss.

In whipping the Mustangs, Abernathy racked up a total of 279 yards rushing, completed five out of nine passes for 63 yards, and compiled a total of 14 first downs. They allowed Olton only two first downs, one late in the second quarter and one late in the final period, and held the Mustangs to only 42 net yards rushing. The Mustangs completed only two of 14 passes for 13 yards.

Joe Ybarra, 160-pound junior halfback, electrified the shivering fans as he posted the first touchdown of the night on a beautiful 53-yard scamper off left tackle. Ybarra was the main yard-gainer for the Antelopes as he picked up a total of 120 yards on 12 carries, and he threw one pass during the game which was good for 28 yards to end Jack Waters.

Three minutes after Ybarra's scoring run, Abernathy forced Olton to punt and the ball was whistled dead on Abernathy's 44 yard line. Fullback George Reagan picked up 12 yards, Ybarra added 23 to Olton's 21, then two plays later halfback Larry Boyce, also a junior, went off right tackle for 20 yards and the first touchdown of the year. Tackle Randy Henson kicked the extra point.

The Antelopes backed the Mustangs up to their own four yard line late in the first half and a high punt against the wind gave Abernathy possession on Olton's 27. Quarterback John Kiker ran 13 yards to the 14, and two plays later quarterback Bobby Pettit took the reins and passed to Waters for 12 yards and a TD. Henson again booted the extra point.

There was no scoring in the third period, but a fumble recovery late in that quarter set up Abernathy's final TD. Olton fumbled on the 50 yard line and guard Jimmy Stillwell pounced on the ball for the Antelopes.

A 13-yard run by Boyce and a 28 yard pass from Ybarra to Waters helped to move the ball to Olton's 9 yard line early in the fourth quarter. A five yard penalty moved the ball back to the 14. Ybarra picked up 6 yards, then Boyce threw a pass from the 8 to end Don Hughes who made a diving catch in the end zone. Henson kicked the extra point to end the scoring.

The whole team played fine ball, both offensively and defensively. Linebackers Mac Houston and Kiker were in on a lot of tackles, as were tackles Larry Florence and Billy Jack Hackler. Stillwell and Kay Don Hobbings also turned in a fine game, and several others were "mixing it up."

The Antelopes will end the 1961 football season Friday night at Muleshoe against the Mules. Muleshoe was one of the pre-season favorites in District 2-AA, but fell by the wayside to other district contenders. The Mules lost to Morton, Olton and Floydada, in that order, but bounced back last week to humiliate Lockney, 44-6.

Muleshoe's Jim Young led the scoring for the Mules last week with 14 points, but four other Mules got in on the scoring.

Should the Antelopes whip the Mules tomorrow night they will hold second place honors in District 2-AA for the 1961 season. But if they lose to the Mules and Morton beats Lockney, Abernathy and Morton will have identical district records of 3 wins and two losses this season.

If the Antelopes win at Muleshoe they will have had a good season, winning four games and losing six, and coming through with second place in the district.

(Editor's Note: The following item from the Plainview Herald concerns a meeting in that city at which the Sunday closing "Blue Laws" were discussed. The group seeks countywide enforcement of the Blue Laws, which go into effect this week.)

Members of the Downtown Merchants Association met Tuesday afternoon in the Chamber of Commerce Building to discuss the new state law regarding Sunday closing.

Action at the meeting took the form of a recommendation for complete enforcement of the new law in the county.

It was unanimously agreed by all members present that a letter requesting the rigid enforcement of this law be sent by the association to the mayor of Plainview, County Sheriff, and City and County Clerks.

The letter was to be sent out in the next few days, M. G. Smith, association secretary, said.

It was noted at the meeting that voluntary action had already been taken by leading drug stores and pharmacists in the city but it was believed that a definite stand should be taken by the local downtown retail group.

A new law became effective Nov. 7 and prohibits sale of "non-essential" items on Sunday.

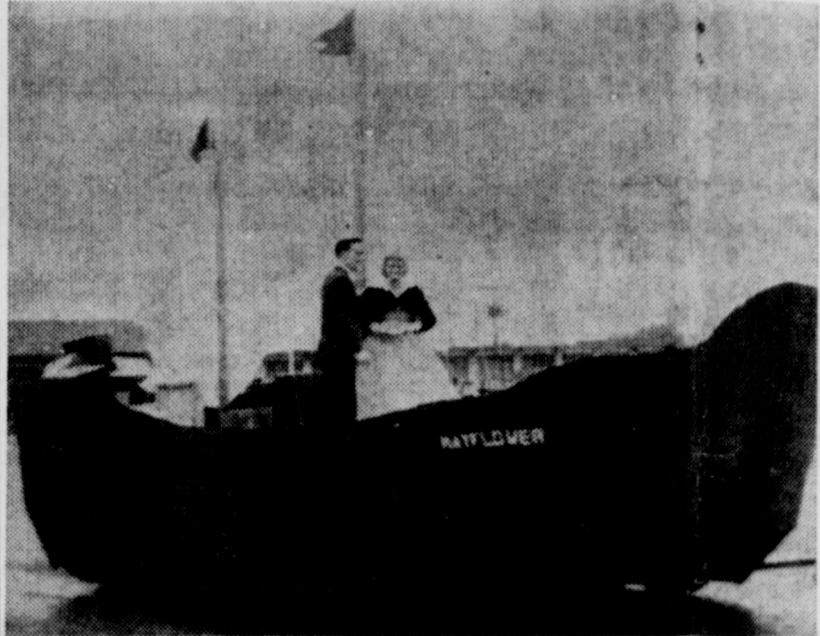

Band's Magazine Campaign Is Well Underway Here

The magazine subscription campaign being sponsored by the High School Band to finance its proposed trip to Corpus Christi next May is continuing this week with excellent results, according to Everett Maxwell, band director.

Auction Selling Brings Higher Cotton Prices To West Texas Farmers

Cotton has now joined livestock, tobacco, citrus fruit, eggs and fresh vegetables in using the auction method of selling. However, the monotone chant of the auctioneer which makes livestock and tobacco sales noisy and colorful is entirely missing from a cotton auction.

Plains Cotton Cooperative Association at Lubbock is selling some \$7 million worth of cotton each week quietly and without fanfare. Daily sales catalogs listing from 7,000 to 10,000 bales are flown nightly to cotton buying centers in Dallas, Houston and Memphis and distributed in Lubbock.

Buyers examine the listings and make their bids. These may be presented in person, but many bidders make their offers by wire without leaving their offices. At 2:00 p.m. each day, Monday through Friday, the sealed bids are opened and each quality is awarded to the highest bidder. The CCC loan support and Plains Cotton Cooperative Association's own bids operate to prevent cotton from selling below market prices. Eighty-nine Plains cooperative gin associations with 137 gin plants concentrate their farmers' cotton for Plains Cotton Cooperative Association's auction sales. Farmers find a stronger market because of the economies made possible by cooperative action and volume competitive selling.

Plains Cotton Cooperative Association was organized eight years ago to find better ways to sell Plains cotton to more mills. By its aggressive sales program, it is now selling cotton in 22 foreign countries and to many mills in the United States.

Being owned by the farmers who use it, any margins made in

the competitive auction sale, in merchandising and in warehousing are paid by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association to the farmers who send in their cotton. Last season, \$1,512,000 were paid as patronage refunds to some 11,000 Plains farmers.

Eight-eight farmers, one from each gin association, sit on the board which makes policies and directs the affairs of the Marketing Association. Howard Alford, well known Lubbock County farmer, is president of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association. Dan Davis is the Association's general manager.

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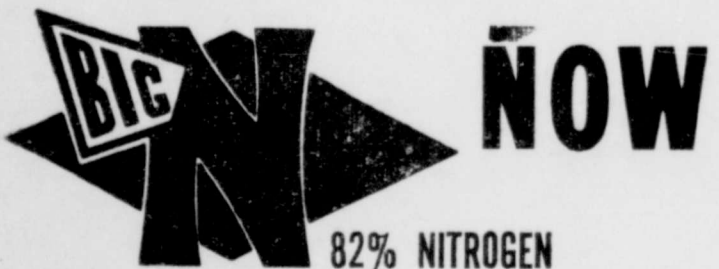
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NAMED TO FRATERNITY AT WEST TEXAS STATE
