TEXAS LEGISLATORS HEAR DAN MOODY Poison Death Overtakes Writer Of Love Message CHIPPS' COMPANION TELLS COURT HIS STORY

TOLD DEAD MAN WHERE TO FIND NORRIS, STATES

D. E. REDMOND IN SEARCH
FOR BIBLE AS SHOTS
KILLED CHIPPS

(By Associated Press)

COURT ROOM, AUSTIN, Texas.

Jan. 20.—The companion of Dexter E. Chipps on his climb to death in the office of Dr. J. Frank Norris in Fort Worth last July 17, today told his story of how he had directed Chipps to the room in which he was shot.

Redmond proved to be another of the many witnesses of the tragedy.

When the body of the dead man was taken to the morgue, Redmond was the only one who knew where to find Norris.

He happened to be going to the church office building in the city when he saw Norris, who was on his way to the same place.

Redmond knew Chipps as "Large Man." He knew Chipps then only as a "large man" who accosted him on the street and invited him to Norris' office. The witness said, "He told 'the large man' he would show him the office, and the man said, 'how in hell will I know him when I see him?'"

His was the same remark R. B. Rideway yesterday testified he had heard as he sat in his automobile across the street from Norris' office.

Redmond mounted the stairs with "the large man," showed him the door to Norris' office, and then went for his Bible. The man, whom he afterward identified as the same man who was shot in Norris' office, walked into the pastor's study without knocking, he said.

Was Examining Bible
While Redmond, who has been a gospel song student, was examining Bibles in a rear room of the building, he heard the shots that ended Chipps' life. Rushing out into the hall, he saw "the large man" who had a few

Dan Won't Use Ma's Private Park Space

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 20. (AP)—Because he believed the practice "undemocratic," Governor Dan Moody Thursday ordered that the choice space near the governor's office set aside by Miriam Ferguson for the exclusive parking of her automobile be thrown open to public.

By parking her automobile in the reserved space, Mrs. Ferguson would avoid about forty yards to her office, executive mansion is about three blocks from the capitol, and Moody walk much of the time to and from his work.

Methodist Adding Machine Is Found

An adding machine, stolen from the study of the First Methodist church here last summer, was found in a shop at Abilene, and will be returned here in the next few days, it was learned here today.

According to reports from Abilene, a farmer living near Abilene brought the machine into town, and sold it to the shop there for \$40. It has not been learned here who the farmer is.

The machine disappeared one night along with other articles from the First Presbyterian church, some of which have been found in the meantime.

BONNER DENIES HE SENT BOMB

Man Charged With Killing Of
J. A. Barnes, Takes Stand
In Own Defense

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas, Jan. 20.—Frank Bonner, on trial for the murder in 1923 of J. A. Barnes, his prospective father-in-law, closed his own defense today by taking the stand and denying categorically all of the charges against him.

He denied flatly that he brought a bomb to San Antonio November 13, 1923 and expressed it to Barnes. His denial was supported by Robert Badger, Austin filling station proprietor who produced his books to show that Bonner had made a payment on account on that date.

Bonner denied all knowledge of the bomb or the package in which it was delivered. Barnes and his son, Jesse, were killed when the father opened the package and Bonner later married Dorothy Barnes, daughter of the bomb's victim.

Was in Austin, Claim

Bonner said that he was in Austin and attended a class in electrical engineering Nov. 13, the day the package was delivered to the express office. He said that he had not written an examination given in that class, however, because he knew he would make a grade of zero. Yesterday the instructor testified that Bonner had not turned in a paper for examination.

Any intimation that his trip to New York shortly after the murder was made to escape was denied by the defendant. He went to New York, he said, to find a job so that he could marry.

New Governor Would "Publish The News"

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 20. (AP)—Dismissing from his prepared speech today Governor Moody declared "I believe that newspapers should be able to report without fear of suit what ever is said or done at a public session or one affecting the public. The law now is that the statements must be true. I go further and favor publication of any and all things happening, stated or done."

Boy Has Narrow Escape From Death

Chas. Gordon Moore, small son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Will Moore, narrowly escaped death Wednesday when he was thrown from a horse he was riding at the corner of Avenue M and 14th just before the horse was struck by a car and instantly killed.

The car, was driven by W. C. Wood, who was unable to stop his car after he discovered that the boy was unable to bring the horse to a halt. The horse, which was being ridden by the boy, slipped as his front feet touched the pavement on the Avenue, fell, throwing the boy to the ground. The horse skidded into the rear wheel of the car, the hub cap of which struck him squarely between the eyes. The boy was unhurt except for a mere scratch on one finger, and no damage was done to the car.

WITNESS TELLS COURT HE MADE BEER PURCHASE

'NO SPIK INGLIS' HEARD
AS MEXICAN'S TRIAL
IS CALLED

When the case of The State vs. M. Lucero, Mexican, charged with sale of intoxicating liquor, was called in criminal district court here Thursday morning, the court hit a snag when it was discovered that the interpreter, thought previously arranged for, was not found in the court room.

Nearly a dozen fellow citizens of the defendant, including several women, were in the court-room as defense witnesses, and the most of them were unable to speak the English language. The court machinery was delayed for some time, while arrangements were made for E. E. Silva, Mexican police officer in "Little Juarez," to act as interpreter.

Jim Stewart testified. The taking of testimony started about 11 o'clock, with Jim Stewart, named in the indictment as the purchaser of the alleged liquor from Lucero, as the first witness. He testified that he went to Lucero's place of business in the Mexican quarter of town October 31, 1926, and purchased a quart of beer, wrapped in a sack, and that before he had left the place, officers came in and took possession of the place. Other state's witnesses were Terrill Williamson and Rufus Ruddy, deputies.

Lucero was indicted by the grand jury at the October term of court, and is facing four other counts of pro law violation. It is expected that the case will be completed today.

Dillon Trial Tomorrow
Court attaches said today that the case of J. W. Dillon, local hotel and confectionery proprietor, set for trial at the afternoon session today, probably will be called Friday morning.

Broken Arm Causes Young Girl's Death

Virginia Stevens, 9, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. D. Stevens, of this city, died in a local hospital last night from complications that arose from a broken arm sustained by her about a week ago.

Virginia broke her arm when she attempted to jump a fence at her home, and gangrene set in soon after the accident. The family came to Lubbock from Dover, Arkansas, about four months ago.

Negress Held Here After Hale Murder

Mary Neale, negress, wanted in Hale county on a charge of murder growing out of the fatal stabbing there some time ago of a negro man in a row between the two, was arrested by J. C. Roberts, constable here last Wednesday, and is now confined in the Lubbock county jail.

The negress was arrested in the "African" quarter of the city. She says that during the argument that proved fatal, she was insulted by the negro man, who was stabbed with a large knife, and died shortly afterward. She probably will be returned to Hale county in a day or two to face the charge.

Bishop Diaz Safe In Guatemala, Is Report

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala, Jan. 20. (AP)—Bishop Pascual Diaz of Tabasco, expelled from Mexico has been allowed to enter Guatemala by President Chacon. He arrived last night at Ayutla, on the border.

May Bring Peace To Sooner State

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 20.—With Governor Henry S. Johnston, of Perry, a country lawyer, regularly installed as chief executive, peace in Oklahoma politics looms as a probability. Governor Johnston, a quiet, conservative type of man, is being looked to by rival political factions, at several points since the hectic rule of "Iron Jack" Walton, to pour oil on the troubled waters.

CORONER'S JURY UNABLE TO FIND MURDER MOTIVE

DEAD LAD'S FIANCEE IS
SILENT; SHE TEASED
HIM ABOUT RIVAL

(By The Associated Press)

MARSHALLTOWN, IOWA, Jan. 20.—A dying love note in which Charles Elrod, of Lewellen, Nebraska, told his sweetheart of his waning strength and assured her of his forgiveness if she had contributed to his dying condition, constituted a dramatic finale here yesterday to the evidence submitted to a coroner's jury inquiring into the young man's death, January 8.

"Dear, I don't feel like I will get to give this letter to you. I hope that you or no-one else has poisoned me, as I dreamed you did. But if you have I will forgive you with all my heart," Elrod wrote to Veda Bellefeuille, his 19 year old fiancée.

Letter Trails Off
Then the letter trailed off into unfinished words and unreadable tracings of his pen, marking the point at which death overtook him.

After receiving this evidence late today, the coroner's jury returned a verdict that Elrod had died from poisoning, administered by a person the jury could not name.

Reading of the letter proved a shock to the girl, who exclaimed "I can't stand any more," and appeared to be nearing a breakdown, but she had recovered before the verdict was returned. She declined all invitations to make a statement refusing also to comment on the case for coroner B. O. Tankersley.

Post Mortem Is Held
Post mortem examinations offered the principal evidence, aside from the letter written by Elrod to Miss Bellefeuille. They said they believed Elrod's death due to some form of poison which might leave no trace in the viscera. There were no marks of violence on the body and the appearance of the vital organs, they testified, gave evidence of death from an unnatural cause. The physicians were Dr. W. W. Southwick and Dr. J. J. Noonan.

Previously a chemist's report stated no trace of poison had been found. Elrod had been keeping company with Miss Bellefeuille for some time immediately after his death, it was disclosed that the girl had written him letters referring to his supposed rivals to arouse his jealousy and increase his interest in her. These letters, it was evident from Elrod's replies, began to prey upon his mind and that he police advising them that he feared his life and possibly that of the girl.

Bond Called For In Texas Peonage Case

HOUSTON, Texas, Jan. 20. (AP)—Jack Chadwick was to face L. A. Masterson, United States district clerk here today in an effort to make bond on a charge of peonage and of conspiracy to violate the peonage act. Chadwick was arrested late Wednesday by federal officers on an indictment returned at Brownsville December 13 and was taken to jail. Chadwick is a former deputy sheriff of Wilacy county and was indicted with several others.

Railroader And Girl Found Shot To Death

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Jan. 20. (AP)—A. B. Moore, superintendent of safety and sanitation of the Southern railroad, and an unidentified woman about 22 years old, were found shot to death on the outskirts of the city here today. The woman was later identified as Mrs. Ruby Thornton, 32, of Birmingham. Moore had been struck in the face with a shot gun charge, police said, while he apparently was working on the motor of his automobile, which had been stopped at the side of the road.

Urge Cooperation Against Smallpox

While city and county health officials are not greatly alarmed over the small pox situation although 15 or 16 cases have been reported to authorities, they have issued an appeal to the citizenship of the city to co-operate in every way with health authorities.

Every house in the city where small pox is known to be has been quarantined, and officials are keeping a close watch, but they urge that quarantine rules must be strictly obeyed if the disease is to be controlled.

Several hundred, including most of the public school students, have been vaccinated during the past few days, and others are being vaccinated daily.

OKLAHOMA BANK ROBBER BREAKS

Rav Terrill, Alleged Bandit,
Gets Away From Officers
Enroute To Pen

(By The Associated Press)

MCALISTER, Okla., Jan. 20.—Ray Terrill, alleged bank robber wanted in Oklahoma on several charges, escaped from Lee Pollock, member of the federal bureau of criminal identification and investigation and Sheriff John Johnston today. They were bringing him to the state penitentiary for safe keeping, the trip being made from Joplin, Missouri, in secret by automobile.

Man Leaps From Car
When the party reached the Katy railroad in the northern part of McAlister, Terrill leaped out of the car and disappeared into the darkness among freight cars. He was wearing bandages and a leg chain. Blood hounds from the penitentiary were put on his trail less than half an hour after the escape.

Terrill was in the back seat of the car with Johnston, sheriff of Sequoyah county, and Pollock was driving. No shots were fired at the fugitive, the officers said.

New District Court In Texas Panhandle

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 20. (AP)—Sustaining the rules, the house today finally passed a bill by Representative Lee Satterwhite creating a new judicial district, the 16th, in the Texas Panhandle to take care of court business greatly increased by the recent oil developments.

The old 31st district will be divided to form the new district, which will take in Croston, Hutchinson and Hansford counties. Berger is in the new district.

Tims Funeral Held At Baptist Church

Funeral services were conducted today for Cecil Tims, 18, who was a victim of a truck accident near New Hope yesterday morning, at the First Baptist church with Rev. W. A. Bowman and Rev. W. R. Campbell in charge. Young Tims is survived by his father, and mother, and three brothers, Jesse, Hubbard and N. C.

While attempting to leap onto a motor truck driven by his older brother, Jesse, Cecil was instantly killed on the Tims farm, 11 miles southeast of Lubbock. The lad had driven some miles back into a pasture and tried to leap on the truck while it was going. His hand slipped and he fell under the truck, sustaining a fractured skull. He lived but a few minutes after the accident, never regaining consciousness.

GOVERNOR ASKS LAWS COVERING PARDON GRANTS

NEW EXECUTIVE IS ALSO
IN FAVOR OF OTHER
LEGAL CHANGES

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 20.—Accorded a tremendous ovation from the floor of the hall of representatives and from packed galleries, Dan Moody, Texas' youngest governor, Thursday urged most constructive legislation in his first message read to a joint session of the 40th legislature. He declared that he appeared "in the interest of friendship and co-operation."

When Dan Moody, escorted by a house committee, entered the door, the crowd rose and cheered until he took his seat on the platform with judges of the appellate courts, Attorney General Claude Pollard and other high state officials.

Speaker Robbitt, in introducing Lieutenant Governor Barry Miller to present Moody, declared, "this is a great day."

Miller said, "we have come out into the shadows into the light of a new day. Let us hear the message of our governor which I am sure will redound to the good of our state."

His First Message

AUSTIN, Jan. 20.—Enactment of laws "to protect the public from the indiscriminate pardoning of criminals" was urged here Thursday by Governor Dan Moody in reading his first message to a joint session of the 40th legislature.

Moody's predecessor, Miriam A. Ferguson, granted 3,595 clemency acts. The new governor also said that he believed it better to have a few laws wisely enacted and well administered than to attempt to regulate all the details of human conduct by legislation.

"I further believe that a wholesome respect for the laws of our country is essential to the good order of society, and that to secure respect for law it is necessary that the law itself be kept respectable," he said.

TRACY, Calif., Jan. 20. (AP)—Mrs. Mary Hannon and two of her four small children are dead and the other two were in serious condition today from the effects of poison said to have been administered by the mother. No motive has been disclosed.

Operation Saves Morton Baby's Life

The nine months old baby of Mr. and Mrs. D. Gieson of Morton, which was brought to the Lubbock sanitarium last week in a very critical condition is doing well and will be released within a few days.

When the baby was brought to Lubbock an examination was made and a very serious condition of the intestines discovered. This condition rapidly becomes very serious and death occurs unless the child is relieved by an operation; as medical treatment is of no avail. The child was operated on by Dr. J. T. Kruger, which immediately relieved the condition. Very seldom a child of this age survives from such a serious operation, doctors say.

Governor Moody's First Speech To Legislators Sketches His Ideas Of Needed Changes In State Statutes

(Continued from Page 1)

Moody urged thorough consideration of every bill and declared that at the end of the regular session of sixty days he would not hesitate to convene the legislature in special session, if the need should be apparent.

"I believe it to be an axiom of political science that it is better to have a few laws wisely enacted and well administered, than to attempt to regulate all the details of human conduct by legislation," he said.

"I further believe that a wholesome respect for the laws of our country is essential to the good order of society, and that to secure respect for the law it is necessary that the law itself be just and equitable."

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More Taxes Necessary

"The state should not be parsimonious, but the exacting of a greater tribute by way of taxes levied and collected than is necessary for the efficient and economical administration of the government is to be condemned."

"I urge that the legislature in the appropriation of the public revenues bend every effort toward the utmost degree of frugality consistent with the functions of government. Necessary actions of the government should not be crippled for the want of sufficient funds, but in the expenditure of the people's money let us realize that they have not security for the practice of economy except in the fidelity of their public officials."

Moody, as attorney general, filed suits attacking acts of the first Ferguson highway commission and his recommendations with respect to highway legislation were carefully noted by the legislators.

Talks About Highways

"I do not believe that the legislature can well afford to undertake by legislative enactment to fix the general policy of the highway department."

"I do believe, however, a great improvement of our highway system can be accomplished by adopting the following policies:

"That the highway commission shall cause to be made, under the supervision of its engineering force, a survey of all designated roads; and that such roads shall be classed as first, second and third class, according to character of construction, traffic demands, and relative importance in a connected and coordinated system of public highways."

"That in the construction of public roads, regardless of the funds used in the construction thereof durable types of road building material should be used, demanding only the minimum amount of maintenance with the view of keeping a connected system of principal highways intended to serve the greatest number of citizens. Where roads are built from state and federal funds, the plans should contemplate the completion of the principal highways of the state, accommodation of the greatest number of people and the heaviest traffic. Where the funds available are insufficient to construct a road of durable type, the effort should be to use a type of construction which may be maintained at a minimum of cost until funds are available to complete the road with a more durable character of construction."

"Should Follow Engineers"

"That the advice of the engineers and technical experts employed by the highway commission shall be followed insofar as possible and consistent with the good of the system."

"That the program of maintenance of the large mileage of designated highways consisting of dirt and other unimproved roads which, for lack of funds cannot be made into durable highways in the immediate future"

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should include the substantial betterment year by year, of such roads by proper drainage, grading and repair of deteriorated areas using good material which would increase the serviceability at small cost.

"That the highway department shall at all times retain direct supervision over all maintenance work but when practicable funds should be allotted to the counties by the highway commission for the highway funds to be used exclusively in the maintenance of

designated highways within the respective counties to which the funds are allotted. Such maintenance to be subject to the supervision, and under the direction of the maintenance engineer and the district engineers of the highway department.

"Would Listen To Counties"

"I favor giving the counties a larger voice in the administration of highway affairs; and as a protection against waste and extravagance, I ad-

vocate the passage of a law which will give the commissioners court of a county in which a highway is to be constructed, by the use in whole or in part of county funds, the right of representation to the extent that it shall have the privilege of naming some person who, as the representative of the county, shall sit with the highway commission and have a voice in the selection of the type of construction and in awarding the contract."

CARDINALS PRESENT A STRONGER LINEUP

CHAMPIONS ARE READY FOR NEW LAURELS IN 1927

BREADON CONSIDERS HIS CLUB STRONGER THAN IT WAS LAST YEAR

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 20.—The world champion St. Louis Cardinals will go into the 1927 season in defense of their title with a lineup virtually intact, except for Manager Rogers Hornsby, traded to the New York Giants.

"We are making no claims, for it is difficult to repeat," said President Sam Breadon. "But the Cardinals will be fighting right up at the top of the National League. I consider the team in better shape now than prior to last season, because Douthett has gained experience and we have Southworth whom we did not have a year ago."

Blades To Be Back
Douthett, Southworth and Blades, all heavy hitters, probably will make up the outer defense. Blades, who was out of the game the latter part of last season because of a knee injury, has just left the hospital and while still on crutches expects to be able to report at training camp.

Except for Frisch instead of Hornsby, at second, the inner cordon probably will be the same as last year. Breadon considers Frisch the equal of Hornsby as a defensive player. And the former Giant batted .315 last season, or one point higher than Hornsby, who suffered a slump after leading the league for six consecutive seasons.

Thenew, considered by many critics as the best shortstop in the major leagues, again will occupy the key position, with Bottomley at first and the slugging L. Bell at third.

"Big Four" Pitchers
The Cardinal pitching staff will have its "big four"—Alexander the Great, hero of the world series, Haines, Shurtliff and Rhen—and in addition, Reinhardt, Kenna, Herman Bell and Jimmy Ring, the latter obtained with Frisch in the Hornsby trade. Bob O'Farrell, newly appointed manager, named as the most valuable National League pitcher last season, again will be behind the bat and is expected to have the full co-operation of the players by whom he is well liked. Breadon hopes to sign Snyder this week as a substitute catcher. He was obtained from the Giants last season, but refused to report.

The board of strategy has been strengthened by acquisition of Bill McKechnie, former manager of the champion Pittsburgh Pirates as coach. The advance guard will leave for training camp at Avon Park, Fla., February 19. The Cardinals will play 21 pre-season exhibition games, all against major league clubs, including nine against the Yankees, American League champions.

Bristling Battles & Bare Fist Days

MY LIFE STORY

If Tex Rickard had been promoting fights around Boston and New York at the time I was fighting and he was just half as active as he is today he'd have been convicted and sentenced to serve about five life sentences in prison.

Just when the Puritanical war against the manly art was at its fever heat my best pal, Ned O'Fallon, was sentenced to ten years for just attempting to stage a fight.

Notwithstanding all this I went ahead and matched myself against Harry Gilmore, a Canadian, a fighter of great reputation and the dude of the day.

And where do you imagine we fought? On January 14, 1927, we met in a small room in the presence of 30 well known New York and Boston sportsmen, including the original Jack Dempsey, who seconded me, right under a Salvation Army meeting.

They were on the floor above and as I jumped out of my corner to meet Gilmore the army ladies started singing "When the war is over we'll wear a crown."

I laughed out loud but Gilmore, with a snaky left, smeared the grin off my face and we settled down to one of the toughest battles of my entire career. On that nearly blinded me for life.

Gilmore was superbly built and Jack Dempsey, looking him over said, "He's slim around the waist, go after his body." So I tried to get in close but he kept sparring me with his left—the best left in the game at that time.

Gene Tunney has a clever way of hitting down over an opponent's eyes with his left fist. He nearly closed the modern Jack Dempsey's eyes that way. Well, this fellow Gilmore was the same way only he had bare fists to do his eye-closing damage with.

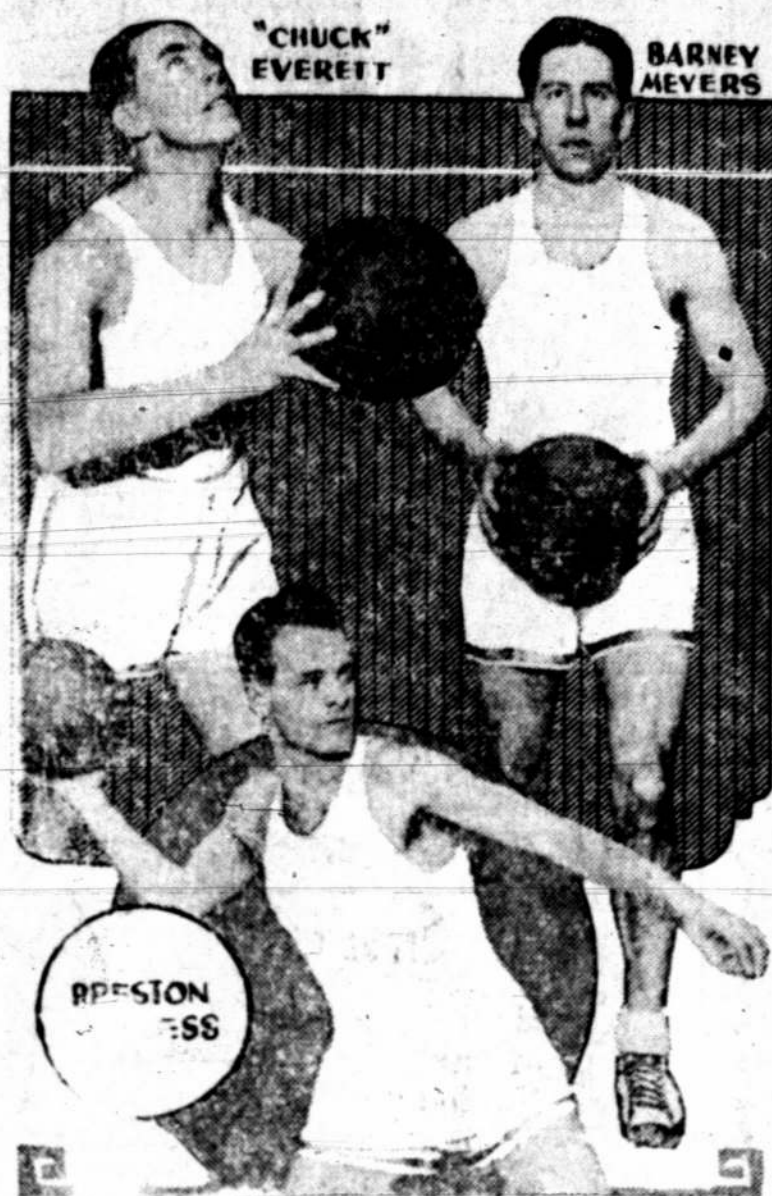
It was the custom in those days to try to blind your opponent if you were good enough. Well, Gilmore was plenty good. I was being slowly cut to ribbons and didn't know it.

When Dempsey said in a warning whisper, "Your eyes are going," he knew it, but I didn't. My face was sore and puffed but I could see fine, though I could not see my eyes closing as Dempsey did.

In the 19th round I went stark blind. I thought someone was trifling with the lamp and yelled:
"Turn up the lamps!"

Then it seemed a million knuckles were tearing at my eyes.

Spitball Fast Disappearing From Major Leagues; Very Few Hurlers Adept In Use Of Moist Delivery

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—When the St. Louis Cardinals recently released Pitcher Alan Sothern as a player and resigned him for coaching duties, another of the lingering relics of vanishing spitball hurlers departed from the major leagues.

A survey of the list now discloses the fact that merely six of the 17 hurlers unaffected by the ruling of the big league magnates against the use of the spitter and other freak deliveries remain in the big show.

And, with one or two exceptions, the last of the spitball hurlers are gradually nearing the end of their string. Within a few years the spitball delivery will be but a memory.

The 17 originally placed on the exemption list from use of freak deliveries included Bill Doak of the St. Louis Cardinals, Phil Douglas of the New York Yankees, Dana Fillingim of the Boston Braves, Clarence Mitchell of the Brooklyn Dodgers, "Doc" Ayers of the Washington Senators, Ray Caldwell of the New York Yankees, Stanley Coveleski of the Cleveland Indians, "Dutch" Leonard of the Boston Red Sox, Jack Quinn of the New York Yankees, Alan Russell of the Boston Red Sox, Urban Shocker of the St. Louis Browns, Alan Sothern of the Cincinnati Reds, Marvin Goodwin of the St. Louis Cardinals and Urban Faber of the Chicago White Sox.

Mitchell, now with the Phillies; Grimes, still with the Dodgers; Coveleski, now with the Senators at Washington; Quinn, with the Athletics; Shocker, with the Yankees; and Faber of the White Sox are the last of the vanishing race who depend upon the spitter in the pinches.

Doak retired several years ago for the Florida reality boom. Douglas was ousted from organized baseball. Rudolph has deserted the box for coaching duty. Ayers hasn't been heard of in three or four years. Caldwell is at Little Rock in the Southern Association. Leonard recently stirred up a nasty baseball scandal. Ear Troubles Have Various Causes

By DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN

Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and KINGS in the ears, throbbing, whistling, or other peculiar noises are commonly complained of by a large number of people.

Such symptoms may be associated with a vast number of causes. These are not always in the ear itself, though infections of the ear, congestion, or any disturbance at the point where endings of the nerves of hearing are located, can result in distress and in most annoying whistling and ringing.

Pressure on Blood Vessel

A large blood vessel which carries blood to the head passes through the bones of the skull near to the ear. Sometimes a person lies down or bends his head in such a manner as to interfere with easy circulation in this blood vessel. The result is that he will hear the throbbing of the blood under such circumstances.

If he will lie on the opposite side, arrange that there is no pressure upon the vessel, or avoid the wearing of tight neckbands, he frequently may rid himself of this symptom.

In most instances, the persistence of ringing, throbbing, or whistling noises should be an indication for the consultation of expert advice.

The examination for determining whether the trouble lies within the structures of the ear in general, or within the nerves of hearing, is a difficult one.

If the trouble is in the nerve, treatment of the nose or throat, or surgical operation, will help little, if at all.

Treatment

If the difficulty lies in congestion or infection of the canal leading to the ear-drum or of the tissues beyond the ear-drum, treatment of the nose, throat and ear usually is of benefit and frequently produces a cure.

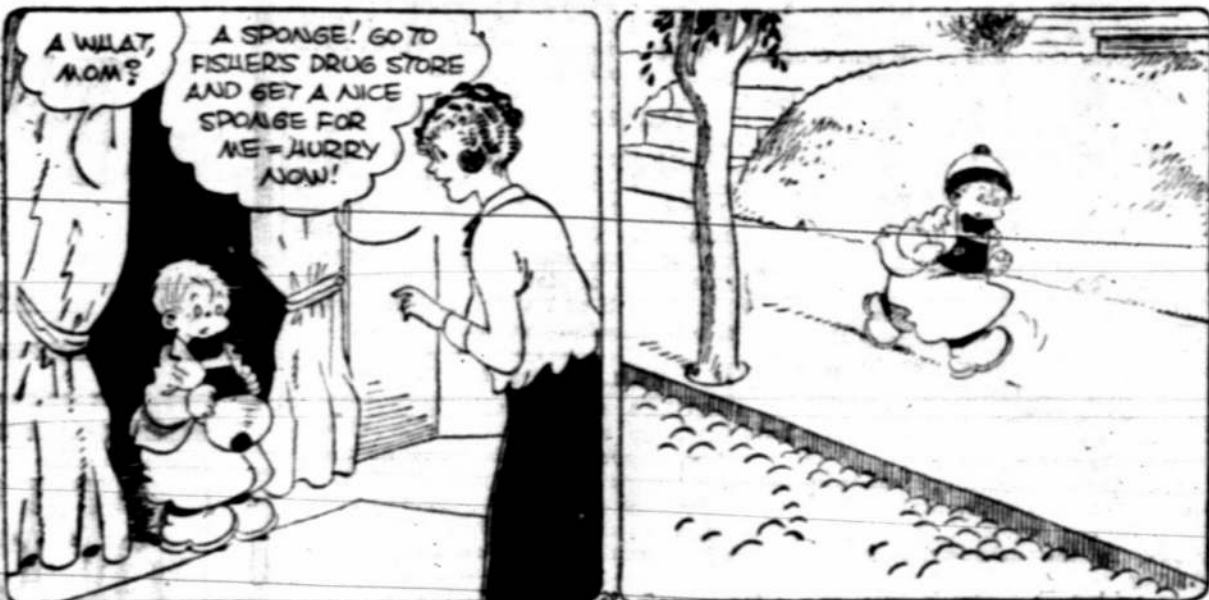

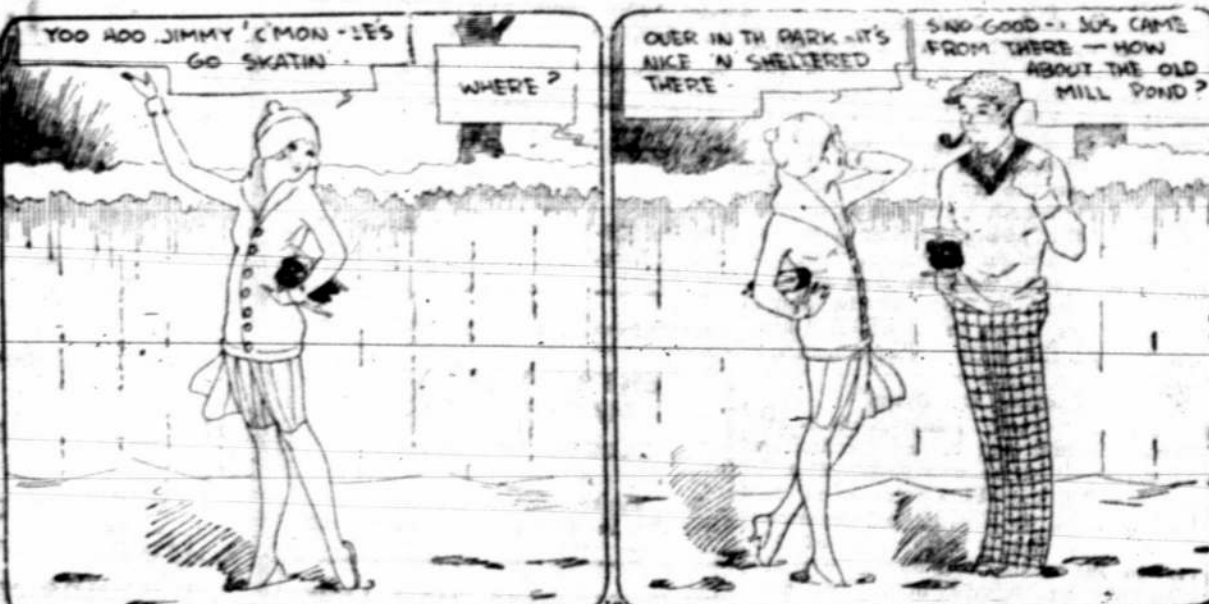

many years ago when woman suffrage
was not yet a fact, they talked about
"the womanly influence in politics,"
their "purifying presence," and refused
to believe that women could contribute
as people and workers, granting that
they could contribute as women.

No Time For Bou-uous

The greatest dangers in America,
according to answers given by a cross-
section of the country's professional
men, are disregard for law, over-em-
phasis of wealth, and lack of paren-
tal guidance.

America is going pagan, they de-
clare. Drinking, smoking, lax moral-
ity, the wobbly home and immoral
stage and books are cited as reasons
why we are going to the dogs.

This opinion comes, as we have
said, from professional men, from law-
yers and doctors and ministers.

We fear this is no "voice of the peo-
ple," that rather it is a cross-section
of good salaries, well fed, well housed
individuals, whose contacts are natu-
rally with other individuals whose in-
come gives them a surplus to play
with.

The majority of people in this coun-
try live on little more than \$1,000 a
year. They are too busy meeting de-
mands of butcher and baker and can-
dlesmaker to get into much trouble.

America may be "going pagan" in
some quarters. But the quarters are
cramped and take up little of the spa-
cious acres of this nation.

employees who take an hour of exer-
cise every day of the week.

money to the organization. Besides
adding vigor to the work the exercise
will result in fewer absences.

any concern.

IN NEW YORK SEE-SAWING and BROADWAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Among the
scattered statistics of this-and-that,
Manhattan reports \$15,000,000 worth of
jewels stolen in the year 1926. Most
of the losers were women.

This, of course, is only what has
been reported to the police.

There are, doubtless, many more
kept secret by women who feared the
resulting publicity.

BEHIND these astounding figures
crouch the menacing, almost fabulous
shadows of the immaculately clothed,
debonair night club crooks.

This latest turn that crime has

pleasure round of the night life. Lead-
ers of society and national affairs

now at that. Some are lost in taxi-
cabs, torn from throats and wrists by
frock-coated bandits met during the
evening. And now and then, a woman
is found dead, stripped of her valu-
ables.

Unpleasant as it is to face, the tide
of parasitic egotism is rising.

There is one fashionable hotel in
mid-town where each day, middle-aged
and aging matrons keep rendezvous
with youthful lounge-lizards. The
"grandmas" buy clothes, meals and
cars for their "baby swains," give
them weekly allowances and cover
their bridge debts.

This fantastic sort of situation may
seem incredible to the smaller cities
of the country, yet, so ordinary has
it become in Manhattan, that two
Broadway plays are now devoted to
the subject.

In the old days the "sob dramas"
told of the young girls from the coun-
try who came to the "wicked city" and
fell afoul villainous and evil-inten-
tioned males.

Today the fictional situation is re-
versed. One new play shows a young
man seeking to become a singer who
gets a job in a cabaret by way of a
start. Enters the middle-aged villain.
She has wealth and uses it, presumably
to help the young man along but ac-
tually to get him "in her power."

Remember the old-time villain line
—"I have you in me power!" Well,
here it is all over again, but in reverse.

A nice, plump grey-haired woman to-
day takes her place as a seducer of
youth.

This, of course, isn't entirely fair.
The rule is that the parasitic army
seeks out to capture these fatigued
women of middle age who want one
more fling before old age seizes them
and binds them forever.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—What's in
a name?

You have heard of the noise making
Tom-Toms of African tribes. When
you pound on a tom-tom it can hear
for miles through the jungle or over
the desert.

Well, there's Senator Tom Heflin
of Alabama.

And Congressman Tom Blanton of
Texas.

And Congressman Tom Connally of
Texas.

And when one of these Tom-Toms
starts to speak, he can be heard for miles.
The three probably have more
pound power than any other three men
on Capitol Hill.

Congressman Clyde Kelly of Penn-
sylvania, who stirred up the baseball
situation more than ever with his an-
nouncements that he would introduce
a bill providing for government con-
trol of the so-called national pastime,
is one of the two or three best ball
players in congress.

He is captain and second baseman of
the Republican congressional team,
which lost to the Democratic nine in
a thrilling battle last June, 11 to 9.

Inasmuch as this happened after
Kelly's team had scored seven runs
in the first inning, other congress-
men are now suggesting that he
launch an investigation into that
epochal contest.

For three years Congressman Kelly
played on the team of Muskingum col-
lege, Ohio—the first three years of the
century—Muskingum had a pretty
good team those years, too, if you ask
Kelly. He pitched for old Muskingum
as often as possible and whenever he
didn't pitch he played second base.

Back home in Pennsylvania Kelly is
a publisher. He is at least as wild
as the average baseball fan and per-
haps a little more. His favorite teams
are Washington in the American
League and Pittsburgh in the National
League.

Incidentally Congressman Kelly
claims the horseshoe pitching cham-
pionship of congress.

A patent medicine man with a case

MEXICO QUELLS INDIAN REVOLT

Troops Fighting Yaquis To Be Moved From Sonora Against Catholics In Jalisco

(By The Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Jan. 20.—A rebellion of Yaqui Indians in Sonora is reported by the war department to have entered its final phase. The Yaqui chiefs, announcing a desire to surrender, General Manzo, military commander of Sonora, sent to the war department a petition to the Indians for amnesty. They claim they were deceived by Adolfo de la Huerta, and will deliver up their arms and devote themselves to agricultural activities henceforth. General Amaro, minister of war and navy, upon receiving the petition conferred with President Calles, and the newspapers declare the chief executive instructed him to accept unconditional surrender of the Yaqui appointing General Obregon special representative to carry out the negotiations.

Troops To Jalisco
Once the Yaqui movement is completely subdued, the war department says, the troops now in Sonora will be mobilized in Jalisco and a few other states where "Catholic rebels" are active. Unimportant rebellious activities were reported Wednesday. Among cabinet changes forecast by the newspapers in the appointment of General Francisco Serrano, present governor of the federal district, to the post of secretary of the interior. Such a change, the newspapers comment might bring a somewhat less drastic religious policy, for they point to General Serrano's statement when the interior portfolio was offered him some months ago that he would not accept unless President Calles agreed to modify his religious policy. He did not mention what changes he desired. Adalberto Tajada, present minister of interior, it is forecast, will return to the department of communications, while Ramon Ross will again become governor of the federal district.

Baptists Will Stage Rally January 31st

A Baptist rally to be attended by church members and pastors from all portions of the South Plains will be held here January 31, when Dr. George W. Truett, pastor of the First Baptist church of Dallas, and L. R. Scarborough, president of the Southwestern Baptist Seminary, Fort Worth will be the principal speakers. It was announced here late Wednesday. The meeting will be held in the interest of a \$6,000,000 fund that Baptists in Texas are planning to raise during the next three years to retire indebtedness against Baptist educational institutions and to expand home and foreign mission work. Similar meetings will be held throughout the state.

BANK REPORT MADE
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20 (AP)—The report of James A. Buechler, president of the Bank of Italy, to the annual meeting of the stockholders here yesterday showed that at the end of the year the resources of the institution exceeded \$40,000,000. During the year the bank moved forward from ninth to eighth position in the roster of banks throughout the nation in respect to aggregate deposits.

RUSSIAN BANDIT DIES
SMOLENSK, Russia, Jan. 20 (AP)—After committing more than 100 murders and endless robberies and assaults in Smolensk province over a period of two years, Smirnov Antonenko, leader of a gang of desperadoes, is dead today.

PARENTS ASKED TO AID POLICE

Chief May Says Boys Ruining Shrubs And Other Private Properties At Play

FREIGHT RATES REVISED

AUSTIN, Jan. 20 (AP)—Revision of freight rates on crude oil shipments from several points in Texas Wednesday was ordered by the railroad commission. Regulations were amended to provide that tank carloads of oil weighing not less than 14,000 pounds from Beut to Fort Worth, Grand Prairie, Harris, Oriental and Gates shall be 10 cents per 100 pounds. Rates from Amarillo to Wichita Falls and Fort Worth were set at ten cents and twelve cents, respectively, provided that oil is delivered to the Fort Worth and Denver City railroad at Amarillo loading racks by pipe line. A third amendment was ordered eliminating the "plus \$10 per car" charge on oil and fuel oil from Texon and McCamey to San Angelo.

OKLAHOMA SCHOOL BILL UP
OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 20 (AP)—Legislation for aid to weak schools for which Governor Henry S. Johnston has sought right of way over all other matters, was expedited through state senate committees yesterday. The committee of education reported favorably on the passage of the house bill appropriating \$3,000,000 for this purpose, and the appropriation committee early tonight voted to report it favorably to the senate tomorrow.

SACASA MAKES REPORT
PUERTO RICO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Dr. Juan Bautista Sacasa, liberal president told a staff correspondent for the Associated Press in an interview yesterday that Nicaragua needs and desires "a friendly and just alliance with and the co-operation of the United States," but can not agree to "tutelage," with injury to her dignity and sovereignty.

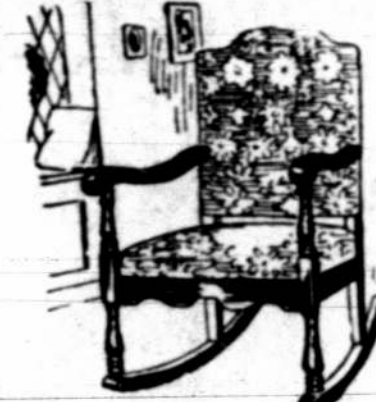
