Terrell on Election Law

To the Editor of The Express:
The following letter from Judge Terrell was addressed to the News: Your issue of the 24 inst contains an excellent article from a student of the State University on the defects of what is called "The Terrell Election Law." The name is a misnomer, for the most glaring defects in that law were placed there after I retired to private life, and other defects were adopted by amendment over my earnest protest. I endorse the objections made to the law by your correspondent.

First—The "plurality" rule for nominating in State conventions is a recent amendment to the law. I regard that law as a dangerous experiment—undemocratic and destructive in a republican government, where a majority should alone rule.

Second—Another recent amendment requires the voter to use a ballot at a general election which must contain a printed pledge to support the party nominee—no matter how corrupt he may be he must be voted for.

Now, those two amendments to the law are the crowning triumphs of machine politics and of political despotism. We have only to glance at their recent effects to realize the truth of this.

In the last State campaign Poindexter, Davidson, Cone Johnson and Colquitt were candidates for the nomination. Colquitt was nominated by the plurality, although the combined vote of the other three was about 60,000 more Democratic votes than Colquitt received. All know that a powerful special interest united on Colquitt, and now we have a Governor who was not nominated by a majority even of his own party and elected by a ballot that pledged the voters to vote for him. Nearly 5000 Democrats violated that pledge—for Colquitt ran nearly that far behind Lane, Lightfoot and the other State officers. The same powerful interest that nominated Colquitt is now claiming a second term for him, which has heretofore been given only as a reward for good service and under a rule that nominated all former Governors by a majority vote in convention. I only mention this to illustrate how those two amendments may defy the wishes of a majority of the Democratic party and place our State in the clutches of a minority of the people. It three or four candidates for Governor were now running, the same liquor interests that nominated Colquitt could nominate him again under that plurality rule. The most stupid men can understand how that rule, and the printed pledge, can open the way for corrupt combination to control this State in defiance of a patriotic majority.

Third—I want to limit the expenses of a candidate to the amount of his salary for the first year—search his conscience as to his expenses and if he has spent more than the limit then forfeit his office and reward him with stripes in the penitentiary. I tried in vain to provide for that long ago in committee before the bill was reported.

Fourth—The failure of the law to "permit" the presidential primary is made an objection. The Constitution and laws grant to the people no rights—they are both the creatures of popular will, the instrument of the people's convenience. If the law should "permit" the people to hold a primary election, it would not be granting them a new right, for

the twenty-seventh article of the Bill of Rights, which is above the Constitution, solemnly secures to the people the right to assemble whenever they please to express themselves for a redress of grievances or any "other purposes," and they may do so viva voce or by ballot. So if the people want a presidential primary and the executive committee will simply recommend it (they have no other power) it would be held as I think it will be anyhow.

Fifth—Whether in one respect the election law is an improvement on the old may well be doubted. It stopped the open purchase of the depraved vote, it is true, but the money power in wicked hands still corrupt the elective franchise. In the last election the open saloon (which does not have one redeeming feature) had its little array of orators, with Governor Colquitt at their head, in every part of Texas. That canvass cost much money—who furnished it? This suggests another amendment to the law, which should require every campaign orator who is not himself a candidate, to purge himself of corrupt motives by an oath to the effect that he has neither been paid nor prompted, nor does he expect, nor will he receive, any reward for his speech, but is influenced alone by what he believes to be the public good.

Unless we can keep the ballot pure, freedom will perish—and the sooner we realize this, the better. The broadest freedom of speech must be protected, no matter how absurd the speech may be, but the hired assassin of the elective franchise, employed by wealth and depraved special interests must be muzzled.

"Is that you, Dorothy?" called out a voice.

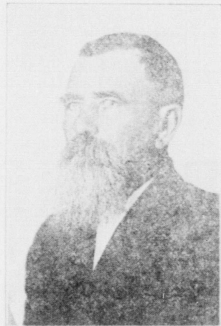

H. A. HALBERT

He was born in 1849, in the state of Mississippi. The next year his father bought a farm in Bastrop county, Texas, and moved to it. After ten years' practice, falling health caused him to buy the Corsicana Observer and large steam printing outfit, and enter a more active life. In 1883 he bought land and opened up a farm in Coleman county and entered the more active and congenial life of farming and stock raising. A few years he ran a land and loan business in connection with his farm, after he came to Coleman.

During the last twenty years Mr. Halbert has originated more new varieties and made more news discoveries for the benefit of agriculture and horticulture than any man in Texas. Among the best known of his products are the Halbert pear and the Halbert honey watermelon. These stand at the head of the list of the world over. Besides these, not so well known, is his originating of the Rubber Rind and his drought-resisting corn. His discoveries are that John's grass is an annual and not a perennial and can be destroyed in one year, like any other annual plant, and the best method of eradicating the native pest trees to be top-worked in the paper shell varieties.

Mr. Halbert has not kept his discoveries to himself and tried to profit by them, but has freely given them to the world. He has written more articles on farm topics and for more different newspapers than any man in Texas who is not an editor, giving the people the benefit of his discoveries and advanced ideas. His articles are accepted by all leading agricultural and horticultural papers across the continent and are considered good authority. Though he is not known as a "book" farmer, nor does his farm by tens, he got down in the dust and grime of hard labor to make his discoveries, and therefore if elected can show others from his own experience, and not the theories of others, which are too often misleading.

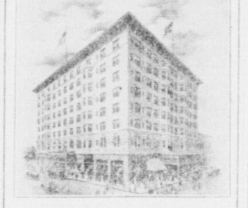

The Commission Will Review the Industrial Life of State.

The Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association, recognizing that a wholesome public sentiment is the most powerful asset that a state or nation can possess, has launched the Welfare Commission for the purpose of providing the people with dependable information essential to a more intelligent analysis of economic conditions, to the end that our citizens, as a whole may be able to more readily distinguish lines of industry conducive to its progress and to more easily recognize and maintain public policies which promote the general welfare of the people.

This body of men will sit as a tribunal reviewing the material life of state and there will pass before it the most stupendous and some of the saddest events in 20th century civilization.

In this line of march will be seen the Texas farmer hauling \$425,000,000 per annum of raw material to the foreign factory - forming a procession that will reach from the earth to the moon; the Texas cowboy will be there driving a herd of six million head of live stock to the market; our lumber mills loading a hundred thousand cars of their products for the factories of the North and East and millions of dollars of other products will pass on their journey to the factory.

More important than the mighty current of commerce that is sweeping out our raw material from our State is the mute pleading of our powerful resources for an opportunity to pour a golden stream of wealth into the channels of trade. We have less than one fifth of our area under cultivation; our mineral wealth is sleeping undisturbed; our cotton factories can handle only one half of cotton cut of every seventy produced. The opening of the Panama Canal will flood us with a new world of opportunities and we have many possibilities yet undeveloped.

The return of the tide of commerce brings with it from the foreign factory \$100,000,000 of finished products per annum and we ship in approximately \$100,000,000 of raw material per annum, 2,000,000 cars of lumber and \$100,000,000 of miscellaneous items all of which can and should be produced and manufactured in Texas.

TEXAS STATE NEWS

Austin—Attorneys for Leon Cardenas Martinez Jr., the Mexican youth who is under indictment for the murder of Miss Emma Brown, an Austin girl, near Pecos City, in West Texas, last summer, filed with the court of criminal appeals their formal motion for thirty days in which to prepare their bill of exceptions. The case is to be taken to the supreme court of the United States. No action was taken on the motion.

Groveton—The barns of J. R. Ingram, a farmer residing twelve miles north of here, were burned. In the barns were two bushels of corn and fifteen bales of cotton. No insurance.

Mart—In the municipal prohibition election that is to come off here the following interesting issue has come up. The original city laws inside one to collect \$1 toll tax for the last several years. That tax has not been assessed nor collected, consequently no one had a city poll tax receipt. The question was raised that the auditor general's department has raised that they could.

Georgetown—Several prominent citizens here have received hand letters during the past few days and a warning was received from an alleged "axman." The Ridge was a scene of much activity last night. The colored population secured all the gates they could find. Much excitement prevailed all night and many windows and doors were nailed up.

Llano—At a meeting of the board of directors of the State Bank of Llano it was decided to place the affairs of that institution into liquidation. Arrangements were made with the Llano National bank to take care of all depositors, and everyone carrying accounts with the state bank can secure their money or transfer accounts to the Llano National bank.

Austin—The John Teague murder case from this county was submitted before the court of criminal appeals. Warren W. Moore argued in behalf of the applicant. Teague was convicted of killing his brother-in-law, John Good, in a South Austin saloon one night last summer. He is also charged with slaying George Ingram, a deputy sheriff the same night.

Columbus—Such a condition of terror exists among the negroes about Columbus on account of the deeds of the ax man here and at other points in the state that a mass meeting was held presided over by Hon. J. R. Woodley, an endeavor to allay their fears and to induce them to go about their daily duties. Domestic service in the town and field work in the country is seriously interfered with. It is almost a daily occurrence for a cook or a yard man to report that they can not stay awake all night and work all day and that they will not sleep at night. They sleep as many as fifteen in a small house with windows and doors battered down by stones, bricks and iron rods.

Fairfield—Traps set around the quarry state bank here, in a trap to the quarry, were broken. The quarry on the telephone wire here the safe and money a robbery. The bank was not damaged in any way.

Laredo—Four special train trains pulled out of Laredo, will deliver two cases of cotton bolls to the North. The trains will be loaded with 100,000 bolls of cotton. Besides the cotton bolls, representatives there are also shipping cotton bolls to the Laredo market.

Born in California, She Is Entitled to the Ballot.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 22.—Mrs. Myra Lee is the first full-blooded Chinese California suffragette to register in this state. She was born in Stockton, Cal., 25 years ago. SOCIETY GOES PACE

PRETTY NEAR THE LIMIT, SAY CONSERVATIVES.

Declare Women Are Debasing Selves by Smoking and Indulging in Daring Dances—Remarkable Ball in Washington Last Week Aroused Wrath for Some Society Matrons.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—The cigarette habit, the "turkey trot" and the "jelly wobble" dances, individually and collectively, have combined to undermine the mental and moral character and stamina of Washington society women, according to Mrs. John Henderson, one of the most exclusive of the Washington society matrons.

For the past year Washington society has been the scene of dissipation, cigarette smoking, new dances which cause an instinctive raising of the eyebrows and bizarre and gay ways have become the rule instead of the exception, declare the conservatives.

Has Reached a Climax.
But the climax came Wednesday night of last week at the home of Mrs. Robert Patterson, who gave a remarkable ball at her place in Dupont Circle in honor of her daughter, Countess Glyzcki. At this function young women danced the "turkey trot" while they smoked cigarettes.

Among the most observed guests at the Patterson ball were Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth and Madame Riano, wife of the Spanish ambassador.

Cigarette Habit Growing.
"I am exceedingly sorry to see the cigarette habit growing among the women in Washington," said Mrs. Henderson, who is author of the book, "The Aristocracy of Health."

"I know society women who have taken up the smoke and drink habit and I can see the difference in their manners and appearance. They acquired the habit abroad. It is a crime for a decent mother to allow her young daughter to smoke cigarettes. One effect of drinking and smoking is that a woman loses her natural reserve and becomes listless and gay."

CARD PLAYING IS LIKE DRUGS
Writer for Medical Journal Says It Hurts the Mind.

Card playing is an stimulating to the mental system as drugs, a writer in the Medical Journal says. It is to be seen a game and simple distraction which gives rest to the system and all other distractions, to eventually exclude all of mental and close thinking.

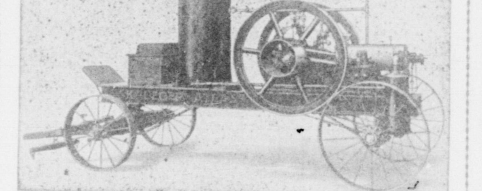

TITANIC WENT TO DESTRUCTION WITH BAND PLAYING

BOILER EXPLOSION SUNK THE TITANIC. Courage of the Crew and the Men Passengers Stood the Test When Giant Liner Went to Its Destruction.

New York, April 22.—How the Titanic sank is told by Charles F. Hurd, a staff correspondent of the Evening World who was a passenger on the Carpathia and who tonight furnished that newspaper with his account. He gives the number of lives lost as 1700. He praises highly the courage of the crew, hundreds of whom saved their lives with a heroism which equaled but did not exceed the account says, that of John Jacob Astor, Henry B. Harris, Jacques Futrelle and others in the long list of first-class passengers.

It was the explosion of the boilers, according to Mr. Hurd's account, which finally finished the Titanic's career. The bulkhead system, though probably working, revealed only to delay the ship's sinking. The position of the ship's sound on the starboard quarter admitted by water, according to Hurd's story, which caused the boilers to explode and those explosions broke the ship in two. The ship's stern band gathered in the saloon at the end, the narrative says, and played, "Nearer My God to Thee." The account continues:

"The crash against the iceberg which had been sighted at only a quarter mile distance, came almost simultaneously with the clock of the eleven o'clock of the night, which opened the engines and closed the water-tight doors. Captain Smith was on the bridge a moment later, standing all alone on the bridge, the survivors and ordered the life boats lowered.

"The first boat had more male passengers on it than the rest of the boats, and it was the last to be lowered. The men and women and young children on the decks began to cry as the boats were lowered.

"Others drew revolvers, but in that dark hour there was no use for them. The ship's lights went out shortly after the Titanic went down. Captain Smith had shot himself another bullet. "What chance of the men with the life preservers was a question asked by the passengers. The answer was that the men with the life preservers were not to be seen again. The Titanic went down with a roar that was heard for miles around.

TENSION EXAGGERATED BY MADERO'S REPLY

AMERICANS EXPECT ANY OF THREE COURSES OF ACTION FROM UNCLE SAM.

Government of Washington, It is Believed in Southern Republic, Will Either Enter, Withdraw or Withdraw Diplomatic Agents.

CITY OF MEXICO, April 22.—Mexico's reply to the State Department note, made public by Minister of Foreign Relations Pedro Lascurain, put the inhabitants of this city under a tension greater perhaps than that resulting from any previous exchange of diplomatic communications.

The sentiment among Americans appears to be reflected in the expression of one prominent American, who expressed the belief that one of three courses only was open to the Washington government, namely, to recognize the belligerent, to enter Mexican territory for the installation of Cihuatlan without reference to other parties, or to remain where government control was recognized or withdrawal of American diplomatic representation.

The last two courses, it was generally believed, would be regarded in the same light by the Mexican people.

No editorial comment has appeared on the subject of the reply. From the tenor of comment with reference to the American note, however, it is considered that the reply expressed, mildly doubtless, the opinions held by an overwhelming majority of Mexicans.

The American ambassador and his staff attended the monthly reception by Mrs. Madero at Chapultepec.

M. E. PASTORS WANT MORE PAY
Claims Clergymen Have Suffered More Than Any Other Class.

SARATOGA, N. Y., April 22.—That the clergy have suffered more severely than any other class from the increased cost of living was the statement made before the Troy Methodist conference, which adopted a resolution requesting the appointment of a commission consisting of one minister in each district to prepare the need of larger salaries before the church members of the conference.

Many churches, it was stated, have not raised their pastors' salaries in twenty years, although the cost of living has doubled within that time.

"Self respect, convenience and holy power depend not upon the claim of the medieval church, but upon a reasonable supply of the common necessities of life," the conference decided.
