Record Numbers

Go Out For Basketball

A large turnout of basketballers is expected Monday, according to Wake Wood, head basketball coach. A record number of 19 boys are going out for basketball in third period, and about 20-25 boys are expected in sixth period. The Rebels will field three boys teams and try to give all the boys a chance to play.

They will be a very young team with only two players returning with varsity experience. Lack of height, and finding two strong post players, are the main concern. The team should be strong defensively outside, and field good outside shooting. The big question overall is the inside people, who are all young and inexperienced.

The Rebels face one of the toughest schedules in recent years. This week they will scrimmage North Lamar who has both 6'6" and 6'7" players. The first regular season game will be with Clarksville on November 27.

Clarksville is expected to be a contender in district 15AAA and always fields a strong basketball team. The three tournaments for the Rebels are at Mount Vernon, Wolfe City, and Leonard. District play does not begin this school year until January 13, 1981. The district schedule will be extremely tough and it is hoped that a tough non-district schedule will develop the young team.

Tina Nolen was approved as a teacher aide on the Talco Campus and Era Smelser was approved as a cafeteria worker at Rivercrest when the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, November 11, 1980 at 7 p.m. with all

members present.

In a relatively short session, the Board approved a \$.59 per mile rate to reimburse the Transportation Fund for extra-curricular use of school buses. It was mentioned that the only funds received from the State for transportation

are based solely on transporting students to and from school. Approval was also given to a Textbook Committee for the 1980-81 school year as well as authorization for two elementary teachers to attend a Reading Workshop this month.

The Board and administration continued to discuss the most effective way to cool the Talco Elementary School with a decision expected to be made at the December meeting. Also, there was a brief discussion of a proposed change in the bookkeeping system with this matter being tabled pending further information.

In final action, the various financial reports were approved as presented. The next regular meeting of the Board will be Tuesday, December 9, 1980 at 7 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

We didn't have the modern equipment, and what equipment we had we furnished our own. Some of it was pretty strange. We all

had different colored jerseys, and no head gear except an occasional baseball cap.

There was no school budget for football. We played anyone who would pay us a little to come play them. We had a lot of fun, and won some games, although not too many.

The fee was usually fifty dollars to go somewhere to play a team, and there was no such thing as a conference.

One of the coaches would ride a bicycle while we were playing, so we nicknamed him "bicycle." In spite of his dedication, we survived.

One of our favorite coaches was nicknamed Fruitsalad. He was nicknamed that in college. We really played our hearts out for that man. I called him several years ago to talk over old times. He said that although he coached some of the best school teams in Texas, the days he was in Deport were the ones he remembered the most.

At one time we went to Commerce to play the training school. They laughed at us because of our different colored uniforms. They were supposed to really stomp us. We wound up in a tie with them, against all odds. One boy was really giving them the dickens. He was crying and begging them to come his way. Four times they did just that on a first, goal to go, but they didn't gain an inch.

When we went to a football game back then we hired J.D. Skaggs to haul us in his six wheeler truck. On a really cold day we put a canvas sheet over the top of the truck to protect us from rain and cold.

On the way home the coach would have J.D. stop at some cafe and we would all get a hamburger. That is if we had the money. If there wasn't enough money, we came home hungry.

It's a lot different, and a lot safer now, but the amount of fun we had just can't be beat.

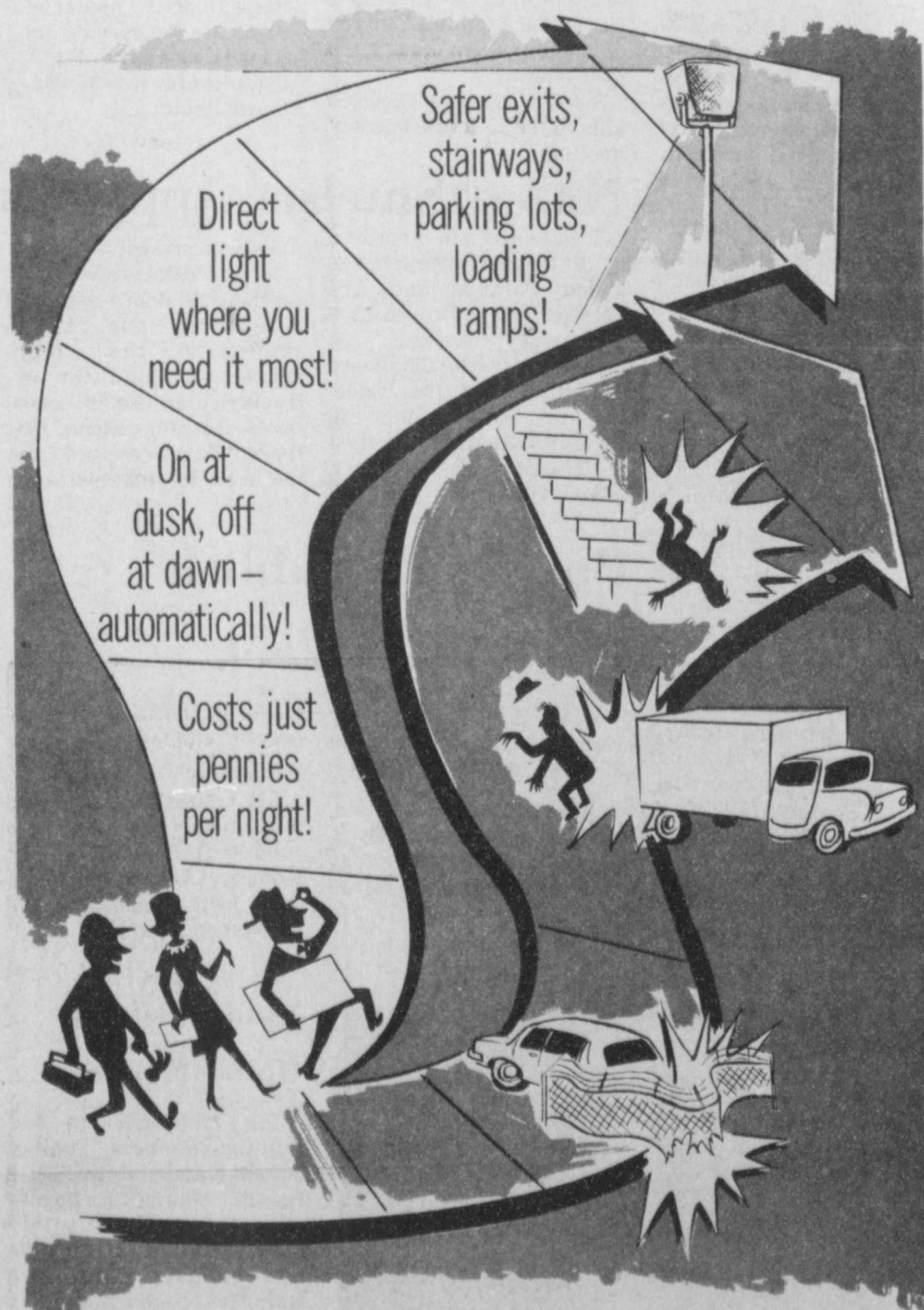

Steer Class Added To Show

All FFA and 4-H club members might be interested in knowing that there will be a steer class in the Spring Livestock Show. There are some special rules which will apply:

1. All steer entries must be at the weigh-in on December 13, 1980, and the steer calves must weigh between 450-600 pounds.

2. Entry fee is \$3.00 per head. There will be a two percent sales commission, or \$6.00 per head, whichever is greater, to cover advertising for the buyer.
3. Each exhibitor can show one steer only.
4. Only one Grand Champion and one Reserve Grand Champion of the steer class.
5. The exhibitor must submit feeding records which show the cost of the animal, pounds of feed fed, cost of feed, and cost of veterinary supplies.
6. Each animal must be well halter broke and properly groomed.
7. Each exhibitor must be a 4-H or FFA member in Red River County.
8. Each steer must be fed under the supervision of a Ag Teacher or County Extension Agent.

Also, the livestock show this spring will be an open show to breeding beef and dairy cattle. More information will be available later concerning the open spring livestock show and steer class.

Terrell Needs Christmas Gifts

The Volunteer Services Council for Terrell State Hospital is seeking interested individuals and organizations to help volunteers at Terrell State Hospital provide Christmas gifts for approximately 940 patients.

Keith Koets, chairman of the Volunteer Council for the hospital, announced the need for help in providing new gifts or money with which to purchase new gifts. "Our hospital serves 21 Northeast Texas counties and many of the patients have no one to remember them at Christmas but volunteers."

In the past the Volunteer Council has provided the wanted and needed articles for our hundreds of patients with the assistance of friends, church and Sunday school groups, social clubs, merchants, civic clubs, schools and many other organizations.

This year each gift box will be individually packed to meet the patients wants and needs.

"When a mentally ill person is hospitalized, they are often without anyone to provide items for personal care. It is sometimes surprising to many people that the 'wishes' on these lists are for simple things which most of us take for granted as necessities," Koets reported.

The following gifts are those listed as most needed. Volunteers will welcome help with even the smallest quantities of deodorant, ladies' and men's hair brushes, nail care sets, shampoo, small mirrors, hair rollers, make-up, bath soaps, hair cream, cologne, after shave lotion, cleansing tissue, hand and body lotions and body powder.

Baby powder and baby lotions are particularly

helpful for the comfort of the elderly patients according to a hospital nursing spokesman.

There is always a great demand for new Christmas cards, especially those with postage stamps for the patients to send to friends. Cigarettes, soft candies and instant coffee are items that patients express a desire to receive. Many do not enjoy these extras except at Christmas time.

Wearing apparel which was hoped for included such items as head scarves and wool gloves to protect women from the cold wet weather, men's work gloves, panty hose for women, socks, handkerchiefs and belts for men. Men and women's underwear are among the needed items included in the list of wishes.

"Although good used clothing and shoes are welcome at the Volunteer Center all year for our patients, at Christmas time we use only new items for the patients' gift packages," said Sarah Kegerreis, staff coordinator of Volunteer Services. "Actually, anything you would like to receive yourself would be enjoyed and welcomed even more by our patients," she said.

Volunteers ask that gift items be left unwrapped. "We just have to unwrap them if they are gift wrapped," said one volunteer worker. The reason is that volunteers try to assemble gifts equally in the packages and also because the age and wishes of each person receiving the gift must be taken into consideration. Gift wrapping paper and ribbon will be needed and is most welcome.

"Money is sometimes the best help of all in our work at Christmas because we can often purchase needed items at a great saving when buying in quantity," Koets said.

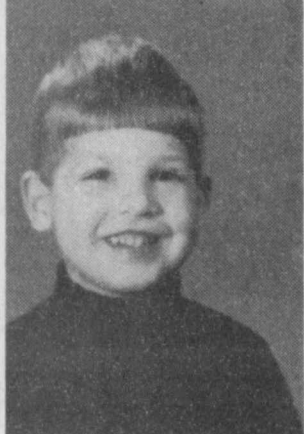

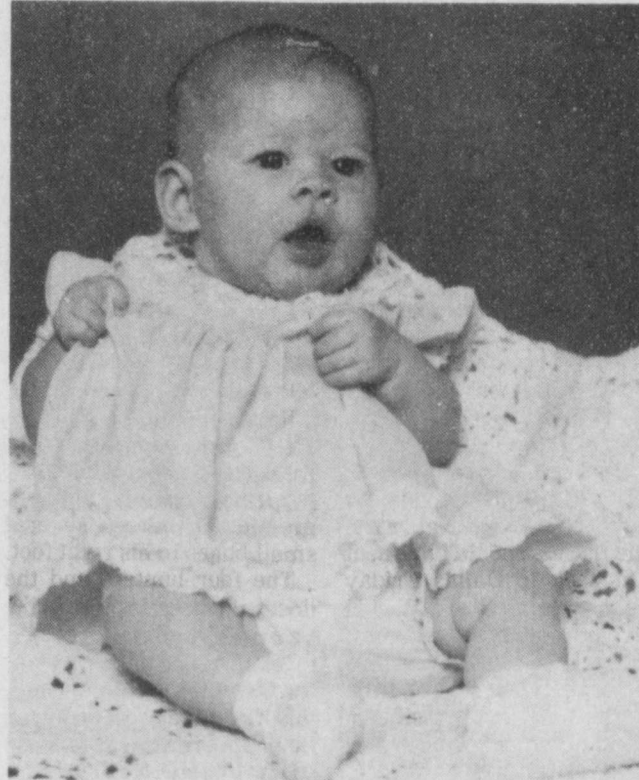

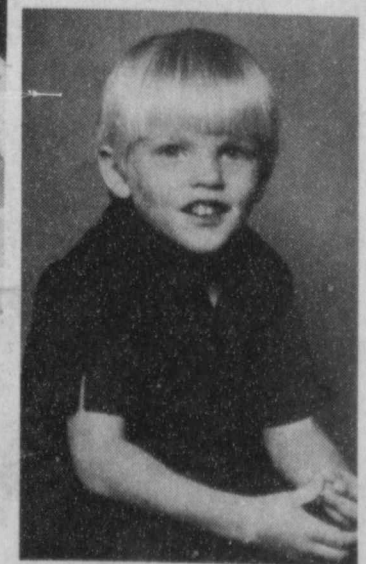

Managing winter Pastures

By Alan Donges
Ranches in Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District can provide livestock with good quality grazing, and reduce feeding costs by managing winter pastures.

Some ranchers that are using winter pastures are Murry Aubrey, Mrs. Alvin Plackter, and Robert Smith. Cool season grasses such as fescue, small grains, and ryegrass produce forage during the winter when most other grasses are dormant. Winter pastures can eliminate some of the need for feeding hay and protein supplements.

As with all grasses, management plays an important role. Stocking rates rotational grazing, and proper fertilization should all be followed.

Proper stocking is important in that the amount of top growth is in direct relation to the amount of root development. Fescue, for example is a tall growing plant and should not be grazed closer than six inches. This grazing height will insure a healthy vigorous plant.

Deferred grazing on fescue is essential between June 1 and September 15. This is important because it allows the grass time to develop good roots and to make maximum top growth. Cool season grasses can not tolerate high soil temperatures, so a good top growth is essential during the summer months.

Fertilizer should be applied according to a current soil test. Fertilized rates will vary, depending on soil type, previous fertilization, and if a legume has been over-seeded.

With proper management, winter pastures can provide ranchers with savings, by reducing winter feed bills.

Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, TAHC, said response to the first announcement of the reduced dosage has been "extremely favorable." The reduced dose is a victory for the entire Texas livestock industry in its efforts to control brucellosis, Dr. Holcombe said.

Strain 19 vaccine has been used in the program for years. But the old strength of Strain 19 was blamed for causing some animals to be diagnosed as having the disease when, in fact, it was a reaction of the vaccine itself.

The vaccine is free. Livestock producers should

contact their veterinarians or TAHC offices in their area for complete details.

Baby Tears Ideal Plant for Small Apartments

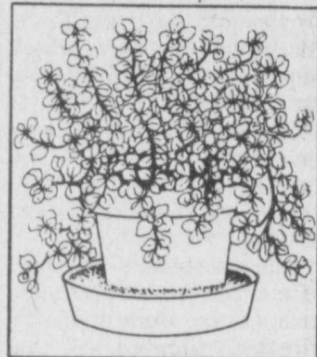
Baby tears, *Helxine soleirolia*, is commonly called Corsican carpet, Corsican curse, Irish moss and Japanese moss.

It is a creeping plant and looks like a cushion of moss with its tiny, bright green, soft textured leaves, one fourth inch in diameter on thread-like stems that intertwine.

Occasionally, very minute, almost invisible blossoms will appear. The plant sheds its foliage annually and rests.

Baby tears have shallow roots and enjoy a high humidity. For this reason, they are very suitable for terrariums.

Pot in rich humus soil with good drainage. Sink or twist the pot about one inch deep in a fancy water tight dish or container half filled with sand. Add enough water to



cover the sand. This in turn will keep the potted soil evenly moist. The plants wilt very fast if not watered regularly.

An ideal location for baby tears is an east window where it will receive the early morning sun or in a north window. Stems will root easily whenever the nodes come in contact with damp soil.



The nutritive value and the quality of the fruits and vegetables you freeze yourself depends on how you treat the food before it's frozen, the temperature it's stored at and the method of cooking and serving says Dr. Nadine Tope, agricultural extension foods and nutrition specialist at North Carolina State University.

Most fruit can be frozen satisfactorily if you select sound, ripe fruit that is slightly riper than you would want it for canning but is not yet soft or mushy.

Fruits that have ripened on the tree or vine have more vitamins and a richer flavor than fruits that are picked green and allowed to ripen before freezing.

In general, fruit is prepared for freezing much in the same way it is prepared for eating. Keep the fruit cool until it is frozen. Wash it in cold water but don't let it stand in the water. It can lose value and flavor that way.

Fruits that darken easily, such as peaches, apricots, apples and pears, need to be pre-treated before freezing with a solution containing ascorbic acid (vitamin C). This solution is sold under a number of trade names in most stores that carry canning and freezing supplies.

The seminar is sponsored jointly by the Division of Continuing Education and the Center for Professional Development of the College of Business Administration.

CETA Deemed Success

Programs to involve business and industry in providing job and training opportunities in over 100 Texas Counties are meeting with success because they respond to local needs, according to the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA).

This fall TDCA began a major effort to reach the business community over a wide territory of the state through the Private Sector Initiative Program created by the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA).

"CETA in the private sector is working," said Bud Harris, director of TDCA Manpower Services Division, "mainly because it is administered by local agencies on a local level. This means CETA can be responsive to business needs and also to community needs."

"In the small town, for instance," he continued, "CETA can help build a good, solid work force, keeping hometown residents as taxpaying members of the community."

"Our fourteen local contract areas range from the Panhandle to South Texas," he pointed out. "The variety of their successful programs in the private sector—from the classroom training of a welding school in the piney woods to on-the-job training in a family owned grocery store on the border—reflects the diversity of the state."

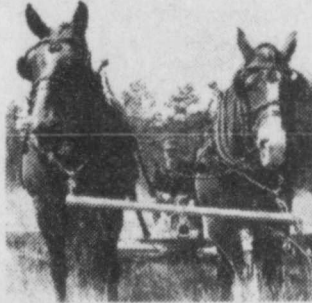
This diversity is depicted in a new TDCA documentary film, entitled "CETA: A Workin' Partnership," that explains the economic benefits available to businesses that hire and train CETA-eligible workers.

Covering a variety of job and labor market situations, the documentary features large businesses, such as foundries and the lumber industry which are primary sources of jobs in the East Texas region, as well as the small retail stores which are important employment sources in the towns of the South Plains. The film covers special training classes for heavy-equipment operators as well as vocational counseling classes that emphasize how to get and keep a job.

"CETA in the private sector offers a fresh approach to manpower programming for Texas businesses, bringing unemployed and un-

deremployed into the mainstream of the work force," said Walter Durham, president of MESBIC Financial Corporation and chairman of the private Industry Council, a Governor-appointed advisory group for CETA. "There's no doubt that CETA should be directed at private business," he emphasized, "because that's where most of the jobs are. The more permanent jobs, we want CETA trainees to qualify for and find these jobs."

The 15-minute film documenting the experiences of Texas employers and CETA workers is available to business and civic groups through local CETA-Manpower offices.

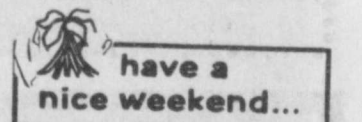

BEEF JERKY

Flank steak, thinly sliced
Salt
Pepper
Garlic Powder
Basil
Thyme

Trim and discard all fat from meat. Cut the meat into 1/8 inch thick slices. Lay the strips on a cutting board and with a flat surface pound salt, pepper, garlic powder, basil and thyme into both sides of the meat.

Use not more than 1 teaspoon salt for each 1 pound of fresh meat and other seasonings according to taste.

Arrange seasoned strips ½ inch apart on drying racks or cake cooling racks and dry them in an oven at 150 degrees. Turn once or twice during the drying period. Prop the oven door open slightly.

When strips feel hard and dry to the touch, remove from oven and let cool. Store in a tightly covered container.

Agriculture Briefs

FEED GRAIN PRODUCTION DOWN: PRICES UP

The United States feed grain crop will be substantially below the levels of the last two years, according to figures released by USDA's Economics and Statistics Service. The hot, dry weather has caused yields to drop more than 10 percent nationwide.

The smaller crop coupled with record demand, particularly by exporters and industrial users should lower ending stocks to 24 million metric tons. The result of all of this should be stronger prices for feed grains in the coming season.

Here's a look at production estimates as of October 1 and representative cash prices on the same day.

Corn Production—6.47 billion bushels, 17 percent below last year. The Chicago cash price was \$3.36 compared with \$2.86 a year ago. **Sorghum Production**—547 million bushels, 33 percent below last year. The Kansas City cash price on October 1 was \$5.42 per hundred weight compared with \$4.56 in 1979. **Oat Production**—451 million bushels which is 15 percent below previous year levels. The cash price on October 1 in Chicago was \$1.78 compared with \$1.47 a year ago.

WORLDWIDE FEED GRAIN SITUATION

The world feed grain outlook is characterized by tightened supplies. World production is forecast at 716 million metric tons or about two percent below 1979-80's production.

Foreign production, however, is expected to increase 30 million tons from last year to 523 million metric tons. Larger crops are expected in Canada, Western Europe and the USSR while Australia and Eastern Europe are anticipating smaller crops.

The growth of livestock industries in many developed and developing countries has increased the demand for United States exports of feed grains are expected to reach a record level of 73 million tons.

What this means is a definite increase in prices of feed grains to the United States livestock producer and hopefully a higher price to the United States grain producer come harvest time.

THE FUTURE OF ANHYDROUS AMMONIA

With the continued increase in the cost of natural gas and other energy inputs, there is little doubt that fertilizer costs will continue to increase above that caused by inflation. Energy affects transportation costs, which contribute to the price farmers must pay for fertilizers. Anhydrous ammonia prices are currently abnormally low due to low cost of imported ammonia from Russia and Mexico. This sounds good, but has caused several United States plants to be shut down and caused us to be more dependent on imports. We could see a repeat of Japan's experiences. After they became dependent on Russian ammonia, there was a drastic increase in the price of imports.

It is estimated that from 20 to 25 percent of ammonia used in the U.S. will be

imported by 1985. A disruption of the nitrogen supply could greatly affect our ability to produce and seriously hurt the American economy, which is increasingly dependent on agricultural production and exports.

Another serious concern affecting the availability of anhydrous ammonia for direct application, is the recent classification of ammonia as a hazardous chemical by EPA. The increase in liability insurance to transport ammonia is expected to reduce its availability to the farmer. Energy is required to convert ammonia to solid forms such as urea and ammonium nitrate. In the past, the cost per unit of nitrogen has favored anhydrous. Projections indicate the differences might widen in the future.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic levels, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Iceberg is a good choice, but consider leaf, romaine, Boston and bibb lettuce, endive, escarole, spinach, cabbage, Chinese cabbage and watercress.

Fall Is TreePlanting Time

Fall is the season for trees to lose leaves, but it's also the time to set out new trees. Fall is the best time to plant trees because their root systems have time to develop and become well established before top growth begins in the spring. Plant only container-grown or balled and burlapped trees during the fall as bare-root trees do not transplant readily until January and February. Choose trees that will adapt to the area and that will provide the desired landscape. After selecting the tree and the site, follow these planting guidelines: First, dig a pit large enough to allow six inches

clearance on all sides of the root ball. The pit should be as deep as the root ball so that it will rest on undisturbed soil. Plant the tree at the same depth it was in the nursery. This should be indicated by a discolored ring on the trunk. Place the tree in the pit carefully by handling the ball, not the trunk. Handling the tree by the trunk could cause a broken ball and excessive root damage. Next fill the pit around the ball with top soil or a prepared mixture of soil, sand and peat moss or pine bark. Do not fertilize the tree until after spring growth occurs. After filling in, stake the tree to secure it against the wind so roots can become

well established. It's also a good practice to wrap the trunk of the newly transplanted tree to protect it from sunscald, drying winds, sand storms and borer attacks. Finally, water the tree as needed during the dry winter periods.

Frozen steaks and chops require up to one and a half times as long to broil as unfrozen meat. Frozen meats should be placed at least 4 inches from the source of heat to prevent overbrowning.

Mechanical Methods For Brush Control

Chaining, root plowing and grubbing are all effective mechanical methods for controlling brush during fall and winter months, says a range brush and weed

control specialist. Chaining involves using a heavy anchor chain (weighing 40 to 90 pounds per foot) 150 to 300 feet long and drawn between two crawler

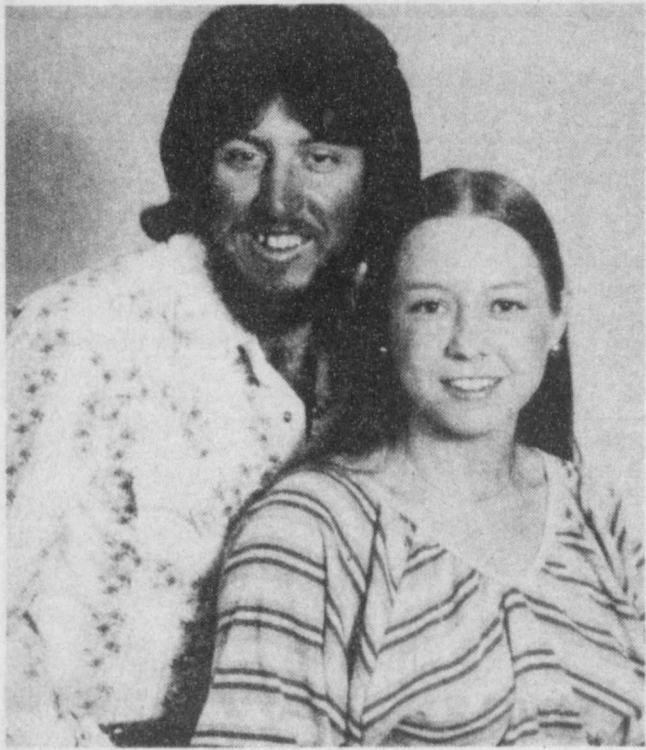
type tractors, points out Dr. Tommy Welch with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Chaining uproots or breaks off brush. Chaining of live brush species that have the capability of sprouting from a bud zone beneath the soil will provide only temporary control. However, chaining following a herbicide treatment provides effective and economical brush control, particularly of mesquite.

Chaining of mesquite is most effective about three years after a herbicide has been used, says Welch. Chaining during late fall and winter is best because the dormant and brittle mesquite plants break up easily, inflicting maximum damage. Soil moisture should be high so that the mesquite will be uprooted, thus removing the bud zone from the soil so that the tree cannot resprout.

Chaining is effective on areas supporting mesquite trees four to five inches or more in diameter. Chaining of sprayed areas uproots most large trees, increasing the duration of control over that obtained from herbicide control alone. Dead or partially dead mesquite trees are easier to uproot than unsprayed, live plants.

Root plowing is also effective in controlling brush but it's expensive. Therefore, it's best suited for sites with high production potential, points out Welch.

Root plows with fins usually provide best control, but they also destroy existing turf. If existing turf is to be saved, a thin-bladed root plow without fins will minimize turf damage. Also, root plowing during the winter months causes less damage to existing forage plants. Seeding the root-plowed area with desirable forage species is often a wise



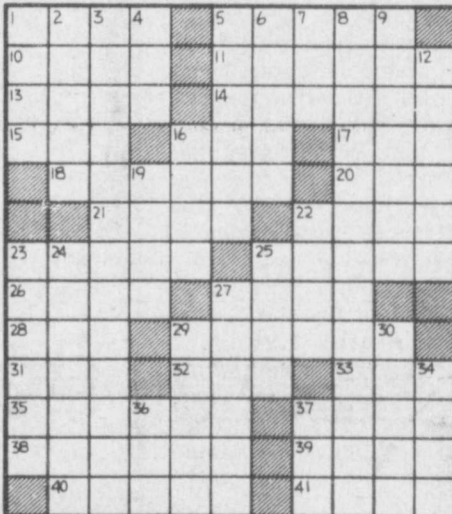

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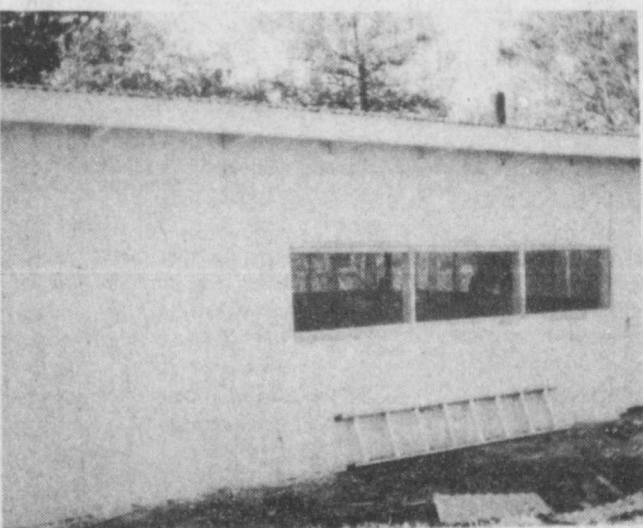

SWEET AND SOUR TURKEY

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1/2 cup pineapple juice
- 1/4 cup catsup
- 1 teas. soy sauce
- 2 tbsp. corn starch
- 2 tbsp. water
- 1 cup pineapple chunks, drained
- 1 medium green pepper, cut in 1/2 inch pieces
- 2 cups cooked turkey, diced
