Candidates Vie For Votes As Primary Nears

The present political campaign is practically over and with the voters of the county and state rests the answer as to whom they will select to represent the party in the second primary in August or the General Election in November.

Climaxing the campaign, as well as a series of speakings held in various communities over the county, will be the giant rally and candidate speaking Friday night on the Court House Lawn in Lamesa. At this time all candidates or their representatives for all officers will be given an opportunity to make their final plea for election on the eve of the Saturday primary.

In past years this Friday night rally has drawn thousands of Dawson County people to Lamesa and it is expected that this year will prove no exception.

Up until the past few days, very little interest has been shown by the voters in the election, but as the day approaches, an increased interest is manifest, and it is expected that Dawson County will poll its full strength.

Some changes have been made in voting of the county, made by the Commissioners Court in 1939. The box at Hagan has been discontinued and these voters will vote in the Patricia box in the future, it was stated.

There are seventeen boxes in the County and the election judges for the various boxes are given in this article.

To those who may be confused in voting for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, vote for this office in every box except Ackerly, Welch and Fairview.

Dawson County 4-H Boys Win In Rifle Contest At Camp Held Near San Angelo

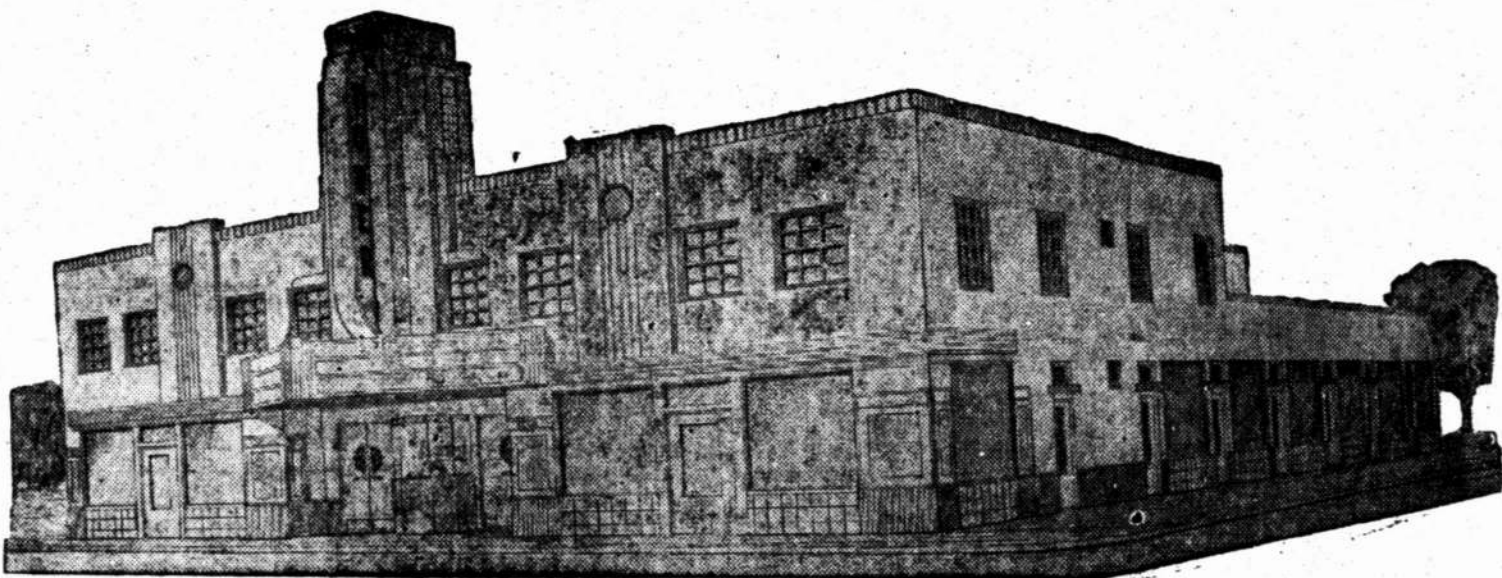

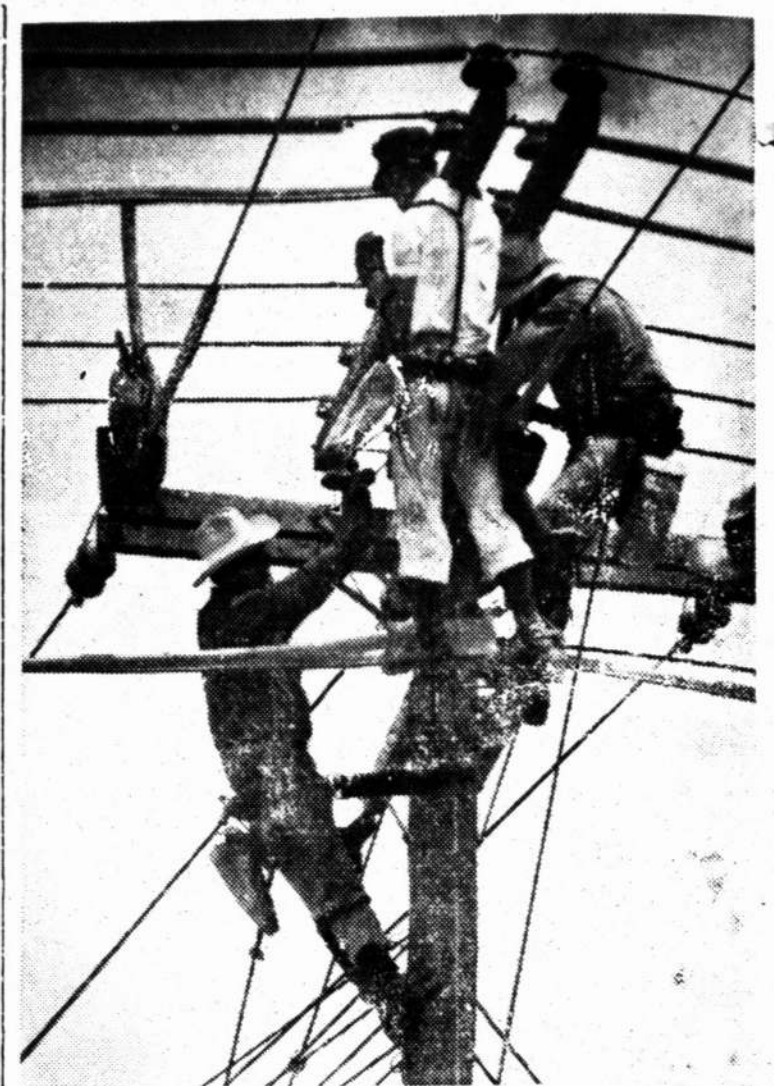

First Payments On Cotton Parity Are Received

First certifications have been made of Texas cotton and rice parity payments under the 1940 AAA program.

Butches of cotton price adjustment applications from Colorado County were the first certified by the state AAA office and forwarded for payment, B. F. Vance, assistant state AAA administrator, said.

Approximately 300,000 applications, totaling \$25,000,000, for cotton parity payments are anticipated, the administrator said, while rice parity applications will number about 900 for a total of \$260,000. Payments are expected to be completed by October 1.

Parity payments on wheat, meanwhile, are almost complete with 46,468 applications, totaling \$3,375,963, paid from an estimated 47,000 applications for \$3,400,000.

Parity payments are distinct from conservation payments and are designed to restore to the agricultural producer a portion of the difference between what he receives for his product and what is considered a fair return on the basis of what he must pay for the products of other industries. Parity payments on cotton are made at the rate of 1.55 cents per pound of the normal yield of cotton, rice at the rate of 9.3 cents per hundredweight and wheat at the rate of 10 cents per bushel.

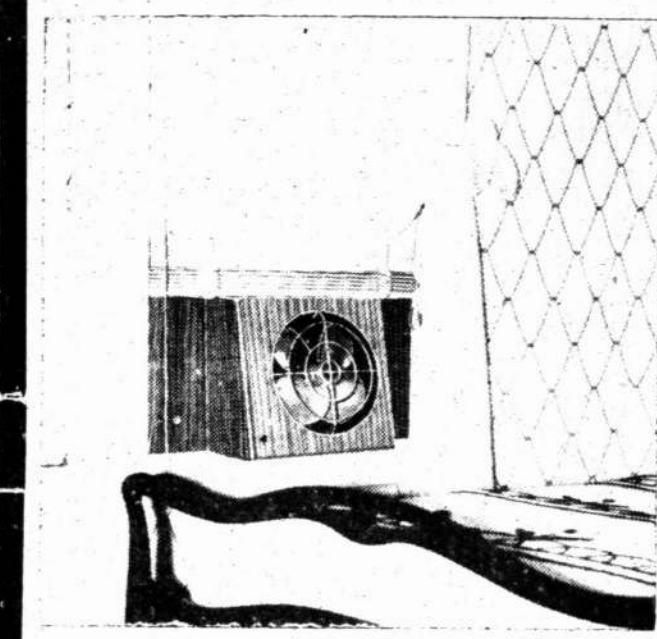

My thoughts went back through the years to a September morning in 1928. School was starting at Higginbotham and I was meeting the student body for the first time. With evident effort and discomfort a youth came swinging gently along on his crutches, his smile contradicting any pain or fear. He balanced himself and extended his hand. I took a mental gauge of his condition and thought I saw utility in his hours in school. A lad in his plight was already liked. I knew his journey would lie through bleak and barren lands. The road before him was hot and dusty. But there as fight in his eyes—and the sunshine was in his face. It was Alton Freeman.

During the summer of 1928 Freeman was seriously injured in football practice. I don't know the details—but I do know Freeman. I'm confident he was carrying the ball through. And no one has ever done a more magnificent job of "carrying the ball through" than he did during the years that followed in his fight against his disability. He wouldn't remind you of it. He asks no credit for it. To him it was a part of the day's work. But to me—and to you—it was a vast achievement. We laud the first Roosevelt for his victory over a stubborn case of asthma; and we commend his fifth cousin for a like triumph over infantile paralysis. The true American honors and respects our Helen Kellers—our Thomas Gores—all these who have fought and overcome serious physical handicaps. I know no one who deserves more credit on this score than Alton Freeman.

During his term at Higginbotham he applied himself diligently. He was always cheerful and optimistic, born with a gift for laughter—rejoicing because others rejoiced. The following year with the same hope, energy and determination, he completed high school at Lamesa. Thence to graduation from Cumberland Law School, admittance to the Texas bar and the practice of law. His high school and college education came during the leanest years of the depression. This, coupled with hospital and doctor's bills, placed a great strain on the Freemans. But all sacrifices were made toward Alton's advancement. And I am happy that none of them were made in vain. 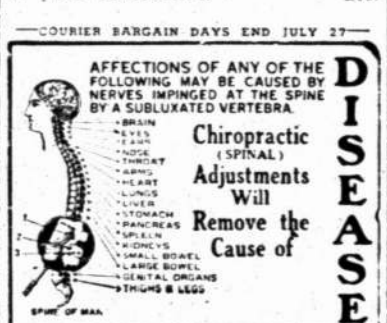

There are a number of things to be done to beautify our county, to add to the comfort of our people and to make our county an outstanding one. I will cooperate with every civic movement that means progressiveness, or any progressive move that our citizenship stands for.

During the past sixteen years I have formed many friends in Dawson County, most of them since my election as Commissioner eight years. I have tried to serve as commissioner not only of precinct four, but of Dawson County. I appreciate and value highly the support of my people. I am asking for this office which I feel qualified to hold. I shall appreciate your vote and do my utmost to fill the office of County Judge in a manner worthy of your confidence.

nesting area in the Valley is being cleared of vegetation, Game Department biologists studying the birds believe.

Whitewings were observed last year nesting as far north as Medina County, which is near San Antonio. Hunting was good in that section last fall.

Due to the fact that much of the brush native to the Valley is being uprooted to make way for agricultural practice, whitewings are not only expanding their nesting areas, but many have taken to nesting in the citrus trees of the valley. Some fruit growers have feared the whitewings would damage their oranges, lemons and grapefruits by pecking holes in them. However, Game Department biologists point out that this would be difficult for doves due to the fact that they have extremely soft bills and weak feet. They are almost entirely ground feeders and it is not likely they could pierce the citrus fruit during its green stage, which is at the time the whitewings are in the Valley. The birds migrate in October and early November.

Hunters addicted to whitewing shooting will be glad to know that reports to the Game Department indicate a better nesting season for whitewing this spring than at any time in several years.

ABOUT FISH SANCTUARIES
Waters which have been declared fish sanctuaries by the State Game Department are closed to all activities connected with fishing, the executive secretary of the Department warns and pointed out specifically that it is illegal to seine for minnows in the sanctuaries.

APPLICATIONS FOR TENANT FARM LOANS TO BE TAKEN UP UNTIL AUGUST 8 ONLY

Closing dates for applications for Tenant Farm Loans has been set for August 8th, according to announcement made today. All applications must be in not later than that time to receive consideration.

A committee will hold a meeting on the 9th and 10th to pass on the applications received.

Those who are interested in securing one of these loans are urged to get their application in at the earliest possible moment. If you are a farmer, or farming furnished your principal income in 1938, you are eligible to make application for one of these loans.

In Dawson County last year the Federal Government allowed loans for the purchase and improvement of seven farms. It is not yet known how many will be allowed the county this year.

4-H Girls List Don'ts For Ma's

Mothers are learning to see themselves as their daughters see them as Texas 4-H Club girls make frank and earnest efforts to improve family relations. In Lubbock County, for example, club girls recently were asked to list "Things I Wish My Mother Wouldn't Do." Here are some of the answers:

"I wish my mother wouldn't worry so much about hard times. It doesn't improve the times, and it keeps the family blue and depressed."

"I wish my mother would not spend so much time and money trying to look younger. After all, she's my mother and not my sister."

"My mother seems to think that all my friends are interested in knowing what I was like when I was little, so whenever they come she entertains them with stories about the cute things I said and did when I was small. I wish she'd find another topic of conversation."

These answers, according to Dosca Hale, specialist in family relations for the A. and M. College Extension Service, reveal that adolescents think more seriously about their parents' attitudes and actions than parents generally realize. They reveal, too, that most young people do not want to be pampered but desire intelligent guidance in learning to do for themselves.

Army Now Has Openings For Flying Cadets

An opportunity to earn \$75.00 per month while learning to be an aviator with all expenses paid by the United States Government is now available to young men of the Nation.

Unmarried men between the ages of 20 and 27 years are eligible to receive this training. They must be citizens of the United States and must have two years college work or pass a written examination in lieu thereof.

They also must be of excellent character, sound physique, and excellent health.

Graduates of the Flying Cadet course will receive commissions as Reserve Officers in the United States Army Air Corps. They will serve to the extent permitted by Congressional appropriations as a part of the Regular Army Air Corps, and will receive Regular Army Officers pay during this service.

During the period of training with technical units of the Air Corps the Air Corps Reserve Officer has the opportunity to observe all various phases of aviation, and in addition to build up his flying experience toward the objective of every Air Corps Reserve Officer a total of 1200 hours flying time.

This accomplished, he will be eligible as to total flying time to secure a rating from the Civil Aeronautics Authority as an Airline transport pilot.

At present Airline pilots receive an average of \$600 per month and copilots from \$190 to \$350 per month.

In addition to intensive training the Air Corps Reserve Officers during his tour of extended active duty, receives instructions in Air Corp Navigation, Engineering, Radio and Armament.

This special training helps to qualify the Air Corps Reserve Officer for administrative and executive positions in the industry. Aviation leaders agree that the best foundation for the majority of positions in the field of aeronautics is through pilot training.

Eligible young men interested in the opportunities offered to Flying Cadets should apply in person at the U. S. Army Recruiting Stations Room 217 Post Office Building in Lubbock or at the Army Recruiting Stations in Amarillo, Plainview, Childress, Pampa, Sweetwater or Big Spring, for physical examinations and application blanks.

These stations also have openings young men not eligible to be Flying Cadets or who are more interested in another branch of the Service.

TEXAS OUT-O'-DOORS

LEAD IN GAME PROJECTS

Game restoration in Texas is moving at a more rapid rate than at any time in the history of the state. The Texas Game Commission is taking many steps to restock areas now depleted of game and to improve habitat, increase game on many other areas.

That Texas is among the leaders in game restoration is attested by a recent report of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which shows there are now 196 federal aid projects under way in 43 of the 48 states. That is an average of four to a state. Texas is using federal aid funds under terms of the Pittman-Robertson act to finance six projects. Several others have been submitted to the federal bureau for approval and probably will be inaugurated soon. It is announced by the executive secretary of the Game Department.

Federal funds finance three-fourths of the Pittman-Robertson projects and the state provides the other one-fourth. Texas' projects include state-wide survey of game, state-wide improvement of quail habitat areas, trapping and transplanting of antelope, turkey and deer trapping and transplanting, javelina trapping and transplanting and a survey of the big-horn mountain sheep.

WHITING DOVE STRAYS

A whitewing dove is reported by F. L. Roark of Cleveland, Texas, as sighted in Liberty County near the Trinity river. That is a long way from the natural habitat of whitewings in Texas, which is the Rio-Grande Valley. That bird strayed farther than any other reported to the State Game Department, but whitewings are being forced to increase their nesting areas primarily due to the fact that much of their
